## Hedley attraction welcomes tourists

Hedley's Mascot Mine reopened last Tuesday, but this time it will be mining tourism instead of gold.

The Upper Similkameen Indian Band has developed the former mine site, perched high above the tiny Similkameen community of Hedley, into a first class tourist attraction.

Over 500 steps lead visitors down the mountainside and through the 80 year old buildings that made up the original mine site.

Interpretive signage and well-informed guides explain details of each building and landmark.

Tours are expected to take a total of three hours, which includes travel time to and from the site and tour buses are planned to take tourists up Nickle Plate Road hourly.

The Mascot Mine Tours are expected to draw visitors from all over the World to the Similkameen Valley.

## Rear ender wrecks two vehicles

Two vehicles were inoperable after a rear end collision on Highway 3 west of Princeton on July 19. RCMP, Fire Rescue and BC Ambulance responded to the accident.

One driver had been driving too close to the vehicle ahead. When it slowed for a curve, the vehicle following plowed into the rear end of the leader. One occupant was taken to Princeton General Hospital with injuries which were not life-threatening.

Princeton RCMP say this summer has been especially bad for motor vehicle accidents, which now far exceed the number for last year. Police are unsure as to what to attribute this increase, other than sheer volume and frustration, but speed is a factor in most accidents. Police will continue their enforcement of speed limits on the highways and encourage motorists to slow down.

## Charges laid after forest fire investigation

Two Princeton youths have been charged as a result of a joint investigation conducted by the Princeton RCMP and BC Forest Protection officials.

The charges stem from a forest fire near August Lake (a. k. a. Pitney Lake) that was started during the early morning hours of May 1, 2004.

The fire was caused by an unextinguished and illegal bush fire which eventually spread to become a 4-hectare forest fire.

The fire was fought continuously for six hours by ground crews and air tankers before being contained and was not completely extinguished until eleven days later.

Two youths have been charged under the Forest Practices Code Section 76(1) for lighting a fire against regulations/permit which carries a \$345 fine.

This offense is not only applicable for each person that lights the fire, but for anyone who is merely present at the site of an open fire that does not comply with Section 22 of Forestry Regulations.

The Forest Fire Prevention and Suppression Regulations put restrictions on the size and location of an open fire (including not to be within 1-kilometre of a forest) which also requires proper extinguishing tools to be present.

Princeton RCMP Sgt. Kurt Lozinski says local police and Forestry officials will continue to enforce this legislation in an effort to make the community safer from

the danger of forest fires.

The name of the victim is being withheld pending notification of next of kin.

## Mine becomes first class attraction

Mining at Mascot Mine ended in 1949. The buildings were stripped of their equipment and eventually abandoned for Mother Nature to reclaim.

Plans were put in place in the 1990's to burn the buildings down as they had become hazardous to anyone able to reach them.

Vandalism and safety concerns were paramount and the historic site would have been torched if a well-known local historian hadn't intervened.

Bill Barlee, who was British Columbia's Minister of Tourism at the time, saw the potential tourism opportunity in developing Mascot into a large outdoor mining museum.

He convinced the Province to purchase the site.

The Upper Similkameen Indian Band (USIB) got involved in 1995 when they installed metal roofs on the buildings to slow down the deterioration of the structures.

Most of the buildings located at the Mascot Mine were constructed in the mid-1930's with all materials hauled up to the site.

The first tours took place last Tuesday and were reserved for invited guests including local and regional government representatives, media, town and band councils - close to 100 in total.

Hedley Museum Society President Chuck Schmidt described the first tour as a test for all parties concerned.

"This will tell us how everything will come together."

The planned schedule will see bus loads of twenty visiting the site hourly with a total turnaround time of 3 1/2 hours per tour - including travel time to and from the mine.

Tours will leave the former Hedley School, on Highway 3, which has been converted into an interpretive centre with gift shop. The buses travel up Nickle Plate

Road and through a gate at Nickle Plate Mine to a staging area located 5,100 feet above sea level.

Then visitor descend, on foot, on a short pathway to the top of the 500-plus step stairway.

The stairway contains many landings and bench seating for rests along the way.

There are also numerous vantage points for photos and interpretive signage explaining some of the sights down to the Mascot buildings.

The stairway snakes it's way down past the Dry Room, where miners started and ended their shifts with a shower and change of clothes.

Next is the cookhouse and then the main level, which contains a small 'neighbourhood' of buildings.

Narrow-gauge railway tracks come out of the mountain through the tunnel identified as the Main Portal.

The shaft was named "4,800 Foot Level" after it's elevation and was the first tunnel driven into the hillside.

The tunnel from the Main Portal

goes into the mountain about a kilometre and is connected to a maze of tunnels, sub-levels, chutes and raises, which are tunnels driven upward or on an angle.

Other buildings at this level include the Mine Office, Ore Bin, Blacksmith Shop, Compressor Shed and Aerial Tramway.

Site Manager Ken Romaneski, who has been involved in the project for the past eight years, says he sees a great deal of potential.

"I believe tourism up here will generate a lot of jobs in the area."

Romaneski sees spin off jobs to area businesses directly and indirectly associated with the Mine Tours and is pleased to see the first phase near completion.

"I didn't know how long it would take to open."

The site will be manned all year and security cameras will be in place as well as night watchmen to curb vandalism.

The opening on Tuesday was a pleasant moment for Romaneski.

"I'm amazed to see all these people and it just makes me smile."

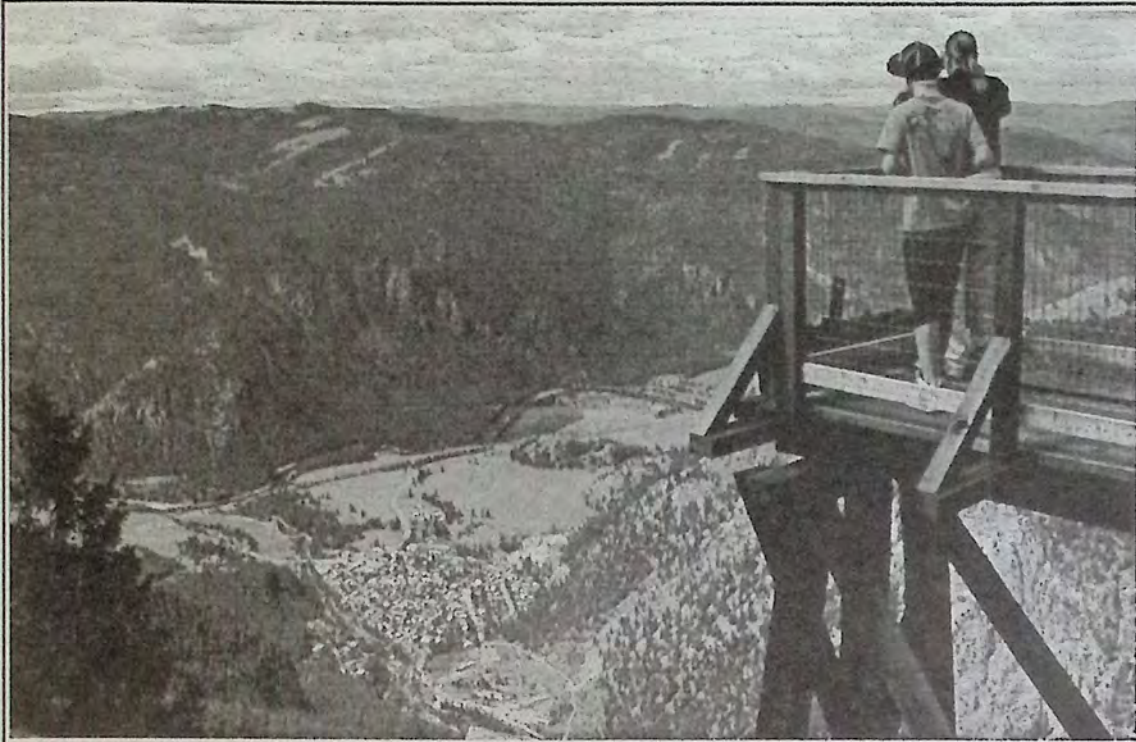

In the words of USIB Band Chief Rick Holmes, "Step by step we are determined to bring gold prosperity back to the Similkameen."

A tour of the Mascot Mine will prove the level of commitment that has been dedicated to the project.

USIB Band Manager Philippe Batini told the News Leader what he sees the project doing.

"This will increase the attraction of Highway 3 and will encourage people to use the Southern Route."

Former Tourism Minister Bill Barlee told the News Leader, "This mine is considered one of the finest old mines in the West. I've toured all the mines in the Northwest in my travels and we have the best right here in our

backyard and I was determined to save it."

Barlee says the Province made a wise decision when it purchased the property years ago.

"It cost us \$740,000 and worth every penny in my opinion."

He sees great tourism potential with the development.

"This will be a real boost for the Valley as a whole. I think it's going to be good."

Keremeos Mayor Walter Despot told the News Leader, "This will benefit the whole Valley. There is no doubt."

During the official opening ceremonies, USIB Band Chief Rick Holmes welcomed everyone to the tourist attraction.

"We are here to celebrate a major milestone, the opening of Mascot Gold Mine Tours, a major

Similkameen Valley eco-tourism opportunity."

Holmes also pointed out, "This has been a great example of Government working with First Nations to further our economic future."

Osoyoos Indian Band Chief Clarence Louie explained the importance of tourism in the Provincial economy and one important milestone, "This is the only project where a First Nation has taken a non-native property and developed it and is managing it."

Mel Woolley, Project Manager from Land Strategies of Calgary explained the next step in the mine site restoration is the filling of all empty rooms with displays representing the activities that normally took place in each location.

"To enhance the depth of the experience."

The Main Portal tunnel opens up on the other side to more buildings, which will be developed.

Long term plans include the establishment of an inn, located at a lower level, in one of the old bunk houses.

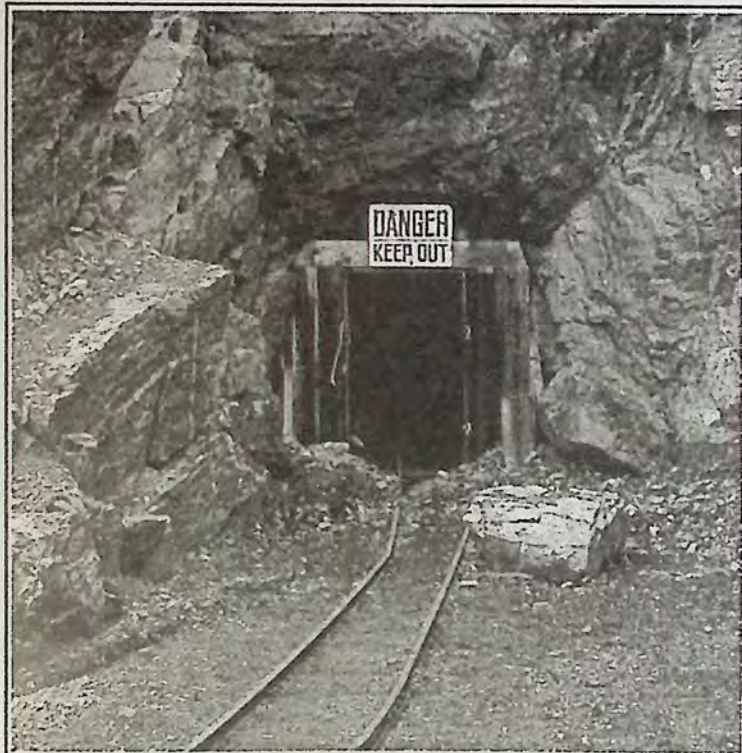
Helicopter tours will also be incorporated into the Mascot Mine Tours program.

The possibilities are endless and will continue well into the future.

Gold was first discovered in Hedley in 1897 and a year later hundreds of claims had been staked.

A lot of gold was mined out of Nickle Plate Mountain over the years giving Hedley its much deserved title of being "Famous For Gold."

Now, 107 years after the first discovery, Hedley's Mascot Mine has started mining tourism.

## Keremeos voices concerns about RCMP

On July 29, the Village of Keremeos plans to voice concerns about the slow RCMP response time under the current regional policing system. All of the mayors and administrators from the South Okanagan - Similkameen will meet with RCMP Regional Inspector Randy Wilson to express policing issues in their communities. Oliver, Osoyoos and Keremeos will talk about the same problem - the lack of prompt response to calls for RCMP assistance.

The problem stems from having no resident RCMP member in Keremeos. All of the police reside in Oliver or Osoyoos areas, and response time can be more than an hour in some instances. In a shooting case, RCMP did not arrive for more than an hour. In the case of a break and enter, response time was 40 minutes. This situation is ironic in Keremeos, where a new RCMP building is under construction, but there will be no resident RCMP members to occupy it.

Members of Citizens on Patrol find the current absence of police officers equally frustrating. Citizens on Patrol have no power to arrest anyone. They

can call and inform RCMP of an incident, but the call may be futile due to the late arrival of police.

Bob Lafleur, administrator for the Village, says, "Regionalization (of the RCMP) was done for budget reasons, not for police protection in communities."

He has another criticism: RCMP are federal police and they deal first with federal matters. He cites an incident in which no officer

could respond immediately to a call because the officer was dealing with a matter at the international border. Lafleur feels it is unfair to residents because each household in B.C. pays more than \$125 a year in taxes to cover the cost of RCMP, but some are not receiving the kind of policing which residents deserve.

If no improvement comes as a result of the July 29 meeting, Village Council plans to lodge a formal complaint in Ottawa.

## Village plans more lots

The Village of Keremeos is out of residential lots for building. To deal with the problem, the Village is preparing a blanket application to the Agricultural Land Commission to remove from the Agricultural Land Reserve 49 properties within Village boundaries. The owners of these properties have signified their willingness to participate in the application, with the condition that the properties be developed within two years. Property owners are responsible for the

subdivision of their acreages.

Currently, \$1.5 million in residential building permits is on the books at Village office. There are 20 houses under construction. The demand for residential property is high, but there are no more lots for sale. To meet the demand, more properties must be available.

If the application is approved, the Village will have the potential for 100 additional single family dwellings and around 20 country residential lots.

## TL Timber awaits covenant

At the July 15 meeting of Regional District of Okanagan Similkameen (RDOS), the Board of Directors passed a resolution to grant a two-week extension to finalize a covenant with TL Timber of Cawston. The Agricultural Land Commission (ALC) requires the sawmill to enter into a covenant with Regional District to remain located on the Agricultural Land Reserve. One outstanding issue remains to be resolved: the issue of work on Saturdays.

Failure to reach an agreement by the deadline will result in the

### Coalmont played host to motorcyclists

The 50th Annual Bob Routlege Memorial Road Run and Dual Sport Ride took place over the weekend.

A total of 65 motorcyclists from all over the Province, Alberta and Washington State left the Greater Vancouver Motorcycle Club's clubhouse in Surrey early Saturday to participate in the event to honour one of their club's founding members.

Routlege, who died by accident in 1954, was remembered as always being involved in the sport of motorcycling.

Ted Blow, one of this year's ride organizers, explained the difference between street bikes and dual sport cycles.

"Dual sport is motorcycles that ride off road and on road that are street legal."

For example, in a ride such as the Memorial event on the weekend, a dual sport motorcyclist may choose to travel the route via

paved highways.

The biker may at some point in the ride decide to take a dirt road for a little exploring.

With a dual sport bike, the transition is possible.

Blow points out the early years of the Memorial Ride were strictly Dual sport.

"When it started, it was dual sport as it (the ride) was mostly on dirt roads."

Blow, who ages himself as 'over 50,' is a Lifetime Member of the GVMC and Vice President of the Pacific NorthWest Motorcycle Association - a club which contains 27 member organizations and was first formed in 1931.

The Memorial Ride did not raise money for a cause, but got members out to enjoy the outdoors and the freedom of riding while participating in a club activity.

The Memorial Ride was very different for the street riders and the dual sport riders.

Each class received a 'route sheet' - a course of directions on a

paper roll for easy reading - which took the street riders from Surrey to Hope, Spences Bridge, Merritt, Princeton then on to Coalmont.

The dual sport riders left Surrey, met at Harrison Hot Springs, then followed dirt roads to Boston Bar onto the Coquihalla Highway and off near the Toll Booth and over dirt roads to Coalmont.

They followed the same routes home on Sunday, with many travelling over 350 kilometres round trip.

Blow says this is probably the tenth year Coalmont has been used as the halfway point and the hospitality shown to the participants from Peter Jack at Coalmont Hotel and other locals keeps them coming back.

There is no first place finisher as the Memorial Ride is a pleasure ride with various prizes awarded to riders through draws.

## Keremeos weed is dangerous

Could a plant puncture your tires? Yes, and it is invading the Similkameen Valley. Watch for it. Kill it, but do not touch it!

A horrible weed called puncturevine has invaded the Keremeos area. It was found at the side of the road.

This is a vine that spreads along the ground and looks harmless. It has tiny yellow flowers, and this is where the trouble starts. When the flowers create little star-shaped seed pods, those pods are so tough and so sharply pointed they can puncture a vehicle tire. They can do damage to anyone or any creature stepping on them or handling them. This is a plant which will prove a major safety hazard if it is not eradicated. Children should be warned not to step on the plant, or touch it, and if you are walking your dog, do not allow it to step on this plant. A seed pod that can puncture a tire can wound flesh. Unlike most weed species, puncturevine is not merely a nuisance, it is dangerous.

Puncturevine reproduces only by seed. One plant may produce

a million seeds, and the seeds do not wait until next spring to germinate. They begin germination as soon as formed, and the plant may be producing germinating seeds and the infestation could spread until frost kills the plants.

Watch for the plant on roadsides and on your property. First plants should be destroyed before seed pods develop. Use Roundup or Rodeo or 2, 4-D to kill the plant. If there are seed pods on the plant, burn the plant. Use a garden fork or rake to lift the plant, do not touch it. When plants are removed, seed the area with something which will grow densely - puncturevine hates competition. The only way to

eradicate this noxious weed is to prevent seeds forming, so early detection and immediate action will prevent the spread of this weed.

If you have this weed on your property, chances are that your neighbours have it in their properties. Talk to them about cooperative efforts to remove the weed from all adjacent areas. If this action had been taken with knapweed, toad flax and hound's tongue, those weeds would not have become the massive infestation they are today.

## Living Past 100

### Are you living no-carb?

The latest fad in dieting is the low carb diet, but it is really not new. This diet went through a popular phase 35 years ago, and had people involved in it for long periods of time. This diet does pose some risks over the long term and is certainly not a diet suitable for anyone with cholesterol problems!

The diet is great in its promotion of vegetables, but it screens out fruit and fruit juices, grain products and anything with sugar in it. The diet focuses on meats and cheese to make up the energy sources. This is a reverse of what health experts recommend for sensible eating.

Nutritionists promote vegetables, fruit, whole grains and products containing calcium. Nutritionists recommend moderation in meats and cheeses due to the high fat content. As in all things, balance is the key to good nutrition.

People who go on diets to lose weight will often make the mistake of believing a diet can do no harm. There is the potential for real harm to the body by going on a crash diet, as your body's organs are geared to produce certain enzymes and hormones to meet your needs according to your existing diet. A sudden change may cause ailments you did not expect.

There is another risk - the weight can come back after you return to your regular eating pattern. The only time weight does not come back is when you eat a balanced diet but eat less and exercise more.

As Oprah Winfrey tells her audience frequently, exercise is the key to losing weight sensibly and keeping it off. She spent many years as an obese person, and now looks terrific, but arriving at where she is now took a lot of effort, and her program was about exercise, not food. She paid a lot of money for a personal trainer (you could go to a local establishment and work out) and she had a personal chef to ensure her food intake was balanced. Even so, she had to do the work to lose the weight.

Think about where we humans came from and why exercise is so important. Until 100 years ago, nearly everyone in the world was engaged in a struggle to provide enough food and shelter to survive. This took great effort, whether on a hunt or growing crops or fishing the sea. Even simple things, like keeping the stove hot, required the effort of chopping wood or hauling coal. Keeping oneself clean might involve packing buckets of water or going for a swim. Washing clothing was done by hand. Even in industrial societies, daily life demanded a lot of physical efforts. Now that we have made life easier physically, our bodies still demand activity. Our genes did not change and who we are physically is determined by genes. If you cannot do physical work, then you must exercise. The old rule applies, diet or no diet: use it or lose it.

# Weyerhaeuser summer job grants help youth and community

## "Tourists think we're burned out!"

Peter Jack, owner and manager of Coalmont Hotel, has welcomed bicycle tour groups in past years, but says this year is "the worst it's ever been." According to Jack, the media did such a sensational job of reporting B.C. fires, people outside our province think the whole TransCanada Trail burned.

"They think our trestles and bridges burned down," Jack told the News Leader.

Jack wanted Tourism BC to launch a campaign to counteract the negative view of the B.C. Interior, but he says no action has been taken. He has talked to other businesses depending on tourism, and all say the numbers are down this year. There are very few Americans this year.

Jack says if it were not for the motorized traffic on the trail, he would have no business at all coming from tourism. The ATV's and dirt bikes are keeping him going this summer, along with a few bicyclists.

While he is trying to send the message to various metropolitan media, he does not put all of the blame for a slow season on the media and forest fires. He says tour companies are cancelling, and part of the problem is the high cost of vehicle fuel and the skyrocketing cost of insurance for tour companies.

Jim Stolth, owner of Backroads Bike Shop, reports his business is steady, but it is mostly bike repairs. He has had few rentals. He enjoyed a visit with a couple who were biking from Argentina to Alaska and camped in Princeton for a day, but he has

not had big bike tour business this year.

Although tourist numbers held steady at the local Tourist Information Centre, Peter Jack says those numbers indicate people stopping for information, and do not give a clear view of who is stopping to stay and spend money

locally.

The tourist numbers are down in the Okanagan in general, a clear indication that the Okanagan is not a destination this year. Unfortunately, the Similkameen appears to have been lumped in with the "big burn" area and is suffering as a result.

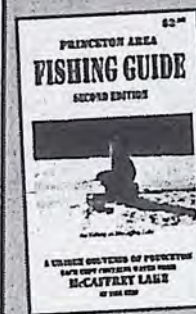

## B.C. Parks Minister answers mayor

Town Council wrote to BC Parks Minister Bill Barisoff expressing concern about the fuel on the ground in Manning Park and the fire hazard it poses. A response from Barisoff clearly stated tree removal in parks for commercial purposes is not an option. 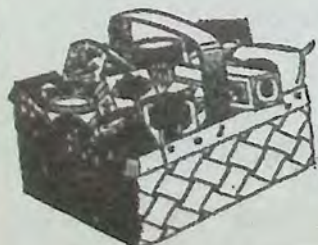

### Cawston man says: check your power bill

Dear Editor:

For the past several months I've been hearing from friends and neighbours about the exorbitant rate increases our power company (Fortis, I think it is now - it changes names faster than most of us can keep up with) has been charging.

Our bill has always been high given how little electricity we seem to use, but this month's scared both my wife and I silly. It was almost \$800 for 58 days! Fortis claimed we used over 11-THOUSAND kilowatt hours of electricity! I couldn't see how this was possible and given that I am disabled and on a limited income, a bill of this size would almost break us. To add insult to injury,

the bill arrived the exact same day it was due by, so we would also have to pay the late fee.

After two phone calls, a re check of our meter and several hours of discussion with a very nice man at Fortis, it turned out that they had accidentally over billed us by a mere 10-thousand kilowatt hours! Past conversations with the power company about our seemingly high bills have been very brief and terse with them simply telling us that the meter reading is correct and to pay or be cut off, period. So having someone kind enough to help us was a pleasant surprise.

With great relief, our nearly \$800 bill suddenly dropped to \$63. To add further insult to injury, a check of past bills by Fortis shows that

we've been over charged on our power bill for quite some time. Given that the past billing period's usage was slightly higher than our annual average and the fact that we've been paying an average \$300 every two months for electricity, it looks like we've been taken to the cleaners for the past four years running and it doesn't look likely that Fortis will be forthcoming with a refund!

Therefore, I recommend anyone with a hydro bill that seems impossibly high to compare the actual meter reading on their bill against the numbers on the meter outside.

I suspect there's more of this going on than any of us realize.

## Local couple reports on Legion convention

We're back! What a trek! My wife, Maria, and I put on over 10,000 km. in 35 days last month as we journeyed across Canada to attend the Dominion Convention of the Royal Canadian Legion. The event, held at the London Convention Centre in London, Ontario, marked the fortieth biannual gathering of the organization. Approximately 2,000 delegates and guests would spend four days deliberating over 300 resolutions that will ultimately determine the future of the Legion. One of the main highlights was the installation of Mary Ann Burdett as our R.C.L. Dominion President. Mary Ann, who resides in Terrace, B.C., was the first woman to become a Provincial President and is now the first woman to become our Dominion President. Maria has known Mary Ann for years and who knows, she may even be able to coax her to pay our Legion branch a visit.

The convention began with a parade from Cenotaph Park to the Convention Centre. Approximately 500 Legion members, along with another 100 band, pipe corps, cadet and RCMP members smartly marched the 20 minutes it took to get to the Centre. There were lots of news media on hand to record the event. Upon arrival at the Centre, the parade was dismissed and, as we entered the room, I was immediately impressed with the size of the hall. The main ballroom was designed to accommodate 2,000 people and we darned near filled it. We sat on soft chairs in air-conditioned comfort and were aided by giant video screens and a wonderful sound system. The proceedings were simultaneously translated into French and broadcast through wireless receivers for those delegates who requested it.

The opening ceremony was

equally flashy. First, a colour guard brought in our huge national flag followed by a parade of colours. Next, the Chief Padre for the Canadian Armed Forces read out the opening prayer. The Lieutenant Governor of Ontario then treated us to a wonderful speech. He is an eloquent speaker and his words stirred many in the huge hall. There were several welcoming speeches including the Dominion President, Mayor of London, DVA, Superintendent of the RCMP, and a General from Department of National Defence. All in all, it was a wonderful start for what promised to be a good convention.

The next three days were business days and we had a heavy agenda to get through. Some issues were settled quickly, while others took more time than expected. One of the hotly debated issues concerned the recognition of same-

sex marriages. Our Constitution and Laws Committee had brought forward an amendment to change our bylaws to be in line with the Charter of Rights and Freedoms, recognizing same-sex marriages. Well, I am sure you could have heard the uproar all the way back here in Princeton! Cooler heads did prevail and eventually the amendment passed.

One of the major topics dealt with our declining membership. Attrition has had its effects as many of the older veterans have now passed on and have not been replaced. We now have fewer than 450,000 members and unless the tide is turned, we will continue to decline.

Another hot button topic dealt with the plight of the British Commonwealth Ex-servicemen's League (BCEL). Following World War 2, many of the

The main differences in a dual sport bike are obvious - a larger gas tank, skid plates and hand protectors on the handlebars called 'bark busters.'

Some of the riders have GPS units mounted on their handlebars.

"The average bike costs between eight and ten-thousand dollars for either a street bike or off road bike," Blow says.

The other add-ons for a dual sport bike can cost another thousand dollars.

Most of the riders own at least two bikes - one street bike and a dual sport model.

One of the participants at the Memorial Ride told the News Leader he owns six different motorcycles, "My garage is full."

Riders also range in age from 12 to 60 and include people from all walks of life.

"Everything from business owners to truck drivers," says Blow, "A very diversified cross section of occupations."

As the Ride is not a timed event, late riders are noted and watched for. Sometimes a few riders will go out and try to locate overdue participants.

"It's not the destination, it's the journey," Blow says about the casual approach to the event.

"We also like to promote it as a

dual sport adventure."

The GVMC organizes two dual events annually, with about six events planned in total each year.

"A lot of different people come up and ride events," Blow says.

Proving that point was easy as bikes in Coalmont had licence plates from B. C., Alberta and Washington State.

The GVMC has a membership of 200 motorcyclists, with about 80 active members.
