RCMP raid meth house

A woman has been charged with possession of methamphetamine for the purpose of trafficking following a raid on a house in the 300 block of Asp Street in Princeton on July 28. RCMP have not revealed the amount of methamphetamine seized during the raid. The woman is expected to appear in court in Princeton on December 16.

Wild west strikes again

On July 30, Princeton RCMP investigated a complaint of shots fired near a home in Coalmont. Police arrest a 56 year old Coalmont resident for careless use of a firearm and seized a cache of guns from his home. The man was taken into custody and released the next day on conditions. Alcohol appears to be a contributing factor in the several firearm offenses. He is expected to make a court appearance on December 16.

Vandals hit fairgrounds

ATV tracks may be a clue

Princeton Exhibition Association Facility Manager Pete Ruoss was visibly upset at the sight of Sunflower Downs Race Track early Thursday morning.

"This wasn't here yesterday morning when I checked," he said while waving his hands in the direction of debris tossed onto the track.

Apparently someone had entered the room located on top of the grandstand and tossed small office desks and chairs to the track below.

A bucket containing some roofing screws also ended up on the track.

The News Leader suggested Ruoss contact the local RCMP so they could file a report on the mishap.

A clearly visible set of ATV tracks ran along the race track surface and skid to a stop in front of the grandstand.

The tracks also leave the scene.

Anyone with information concerning this incident is asked to contact local police.

Long weekend busy for local RCMP

Princeton RCMP racked up a lot of statistics for the August long weekend. Most of the calls they received were from Tulameen, where the annual Family Fun Days drew a huge crowd. Police say thousands of people flocked to Tulameen to enjoy the events, the lake and surrounding area.

As in so many previous years, police were occupied with young people partying and

over-indulging in alcohol and drugs. During the weekend, there were often a number of situations occurring at the same time, and the RCMP is the only police force for the area. They found their manpower stretched to the fullest extent.

During the four-day weekend, Princeton RCMP investigated more than 105 complaints. In addition to traffic enforcement and patrols around Tulameen,

police responded to the complaints. There were three unrelated firearms investigations, three unrelated missing persons complaints, one false report of a drowning, 12 motor vehicle accidents, seven drug investigations, three impaired driving charges laid, and two search warrants executed.

Accidents keep local police busy

The mid-week rain was a welcome sight to many in the Similkameen Valley, although it was a contributing factor in a number of accidents late in the week.

Princeton RCMP received at least two reports Thursday morning of a car in Similkameen River.

The single vehicle accident had occurred approximately 11-kilometres East of Princeton, on Highway 3.

A small vehicle left the roadway and ended up on it's side in the river.

The water was only about a foot deep and all persons in the vehicle were able to make it back onto the side of the highway to wait for help.

Argo Road Maintenance crews

directed traffic and passers-by comforted the accident victims until emergency crews arrived.

The slippery road and excessive speed were believed to be the cause of the accident, as well as at least one more incident that occurred shortly after this accident was cleaned up.

Another accident later in the day took place near Manning Park.

Later in the week two trucks collided near Whipsaw Bridge West of Princeton on Highway 3.

Reports were sketchy, but no injuries were reported although both rigs had sustained a great deal of damage.

Details on all these accidents had not been released by Princeton RCMP by press time.

Highway conditions were

reported to be very slippery in places as a result of the heavy rain.

Oils were pushed up to the surface of the roadway in the rain which made driving dangerous in places.

As for road conditions related to construction, there is only one delay of note in the region.

Highway 3 continues to have minor delays 43 to 45-kilometres East of Hope with single lane alternating traffic between the hours of 5:00 AM and 6:00 PM daily.

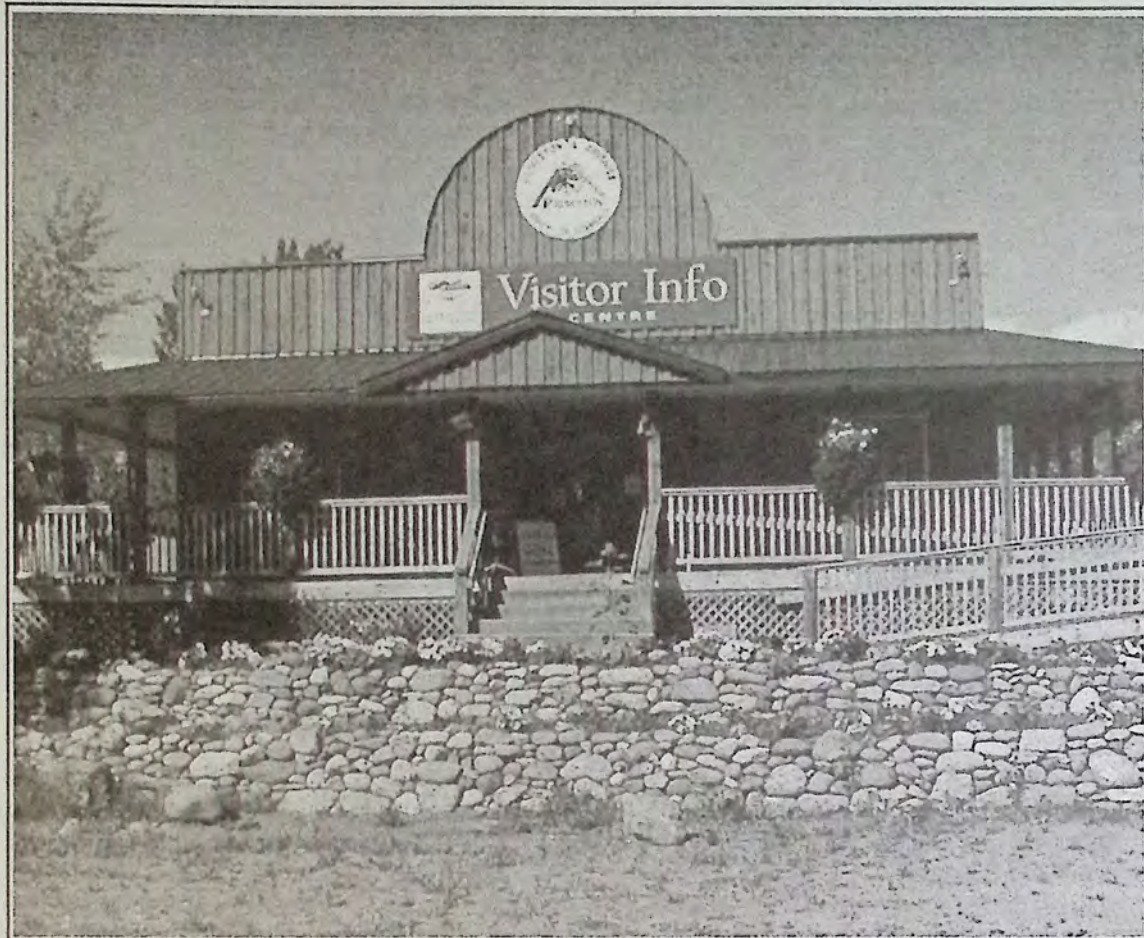
The delays are to allow for a bridge replacement project and associated road construction.

The project is expected to be completed in late October.

There will be no delays at that location during long weekends.

Princeton still attracts many tourists

Tourist figures at Princeton's Visitor InfoCentre on Highway 3 are strong.

The number of visitors who stopped there in July totalled 4,907.

"That's down from last year," says Chamber Manager Lori Thomas, "But not by much."

According to stats collected from 2003, a total of 5,119 visitors stopped into the Visitor InfoCentre in July of last year.

Forest fire conditions are a top priority for many visitors, including confusion regarding where the fires are and their severity.

Thomas says visitor trends are changing, though.

"A lot will decide to stay a night and then stay a couple of days once they get here."

Positive comments are plenty from visitors and Thomas points out many say they love this area once they get here.

RCMP sells new calendar

At any time, approximately 250 Canadians wait for a bone marrow donor.

To support the Bone Marrow Donor Registry, and to encourage Canadians to register, RCMP sell a calendar every year.

The 2005 calendar is now on sale at your local RCMP station.

How did the RCMP become involved in selling calendars?

In 1987, Constable Bruce Denniston of Powell River was diagnosed with leukemia and he was told he needed a bone marrow transplant in order to survive.

The Bruce Denniston Bone

Marrow Society was formed to raise funds and support the expansion of Canada's bone marrow registry so that all patients could benefit.

Busiest days include July 16th with 46 visitors and July 3rd with 53 visitors.

Comments collected in the guest register mostly mention the Joe Pollard Fossil Collection, but other points of interest to visitors at the museum include ghost towns and the Kettle Valley Railway.

"It was so much fun and lots of laughs."

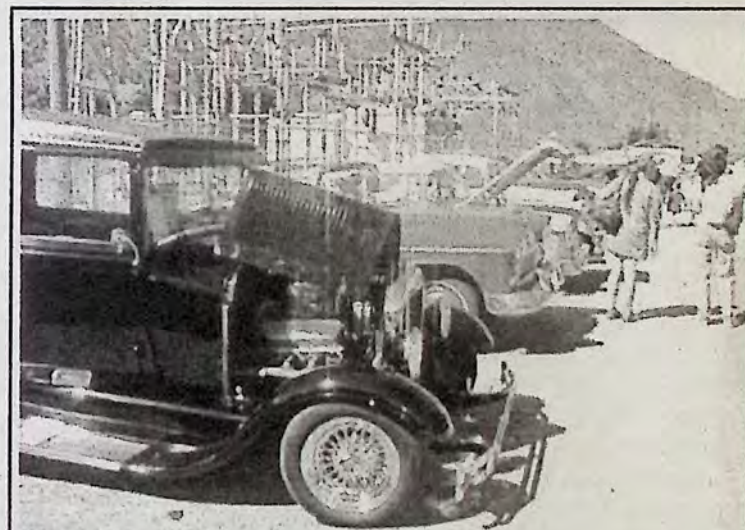
The reunion was open to all former students, teachers and staff.

Victoria plans meth attack

A strategy to combat use of methamphetamines in B.C. was announced last week by Susan Brice, Minister of state for Mental Health and Addiction Services. The strategy will try to prevent the use and harmful effects of crystal meth and other amphetamines.

Methamphetamine is a central nervous system stimulant more commonly known as crystal meth. It is often used with other substances such as cocaine or crack, heroin or alcohol, increasing the risk of injury of death related to overdose, accident or violence. This substance can be swallowed, smoked, injected or snorted.

Side effects of the use of crystal meth can include irritability, heart palpitations, confusion, severe anxiety, paranoia, violence or psychosis. Long-term use may cause structural changes to the brain, memory loss, difficulty completing complex tasks and permanent psychotic symptoms.

The province's strategy identifies five priorities for action:

- * identifying high-risk populations
- * reducing individual harm

- * building safer communities
- * increasing the skills of service providers
- * informing the public

The strategy integrates the knowledge, skills and resources of six B.C. ministries, six health authorities, police and the justice system so they can maximize their efforts, according to Brice.

Crimestoppers warning

In speaking with a CrimeStoppers agent, the News Leader learned the biggest danger posed by crystal meth is involuntary addiction among those who smoke marijuana. To ensure a better market for crystal meth, drug traffickers have begun lacing marijuana with crystal meth and selling it to unsuspecting customers. Crystal meth is highly addictive and there is a 97 percent chance the smoker will become an addict.

Warning to landlords

Crystal meth is generally made by people who are in the business of trafficking drugs, and the drug may be manufactured in a barn, garage or rental home. Drain cleaner is one of the ingredients, along with various other chemicals. The manufac-

ture of crystal meth may render a property environmentally contaminated. A rental unit in Toronto used for the manufacture of crystal meth has been condemned for use as a residence. In Spokane last year, a mobile home on a rural property was used as a meth house and it cost \$10,000 to decontaminate the property. Landlords should be very cautious about renting property to anyone they are not sure of.

How good is your sleep?

We spend 30 percent of our lives asleep. Next to breathing, it is one of the most fundamentally important physiological processes. In practice, I receive a lot of questions regarding proper sleep positions.

Sleeping is an essential physiological process allowing our bodies to rejuvenate and repair. It is the only time when muscles, ligaments and other structures in the body can completely relax. Therefore, disruption to sleep can negatively impact health. When a person suffers from a back injury or disorder, it is especially important to sleep well in order to optimize the healing process.

While there are no absolute rules, there are a few general guidelines about sleep position. The most important thing to remember about sleep position is to maintain a neutral alignment of the spine and joints of the body. From the front, this means the nose, sternum, belly button and the mid-

RCMP nab drivers

On the evening of Monday, August 2, RCMP were called to investigate a complaint of a motor vehicle colliding with the cenotaph in Hedley. point between your knees and feet align. The side profile is a little more complicated since we have natural curves in our spine. Essentially the curves of the neck, thorax, low back and pelvis should be maintained in a neutral position.

There are three main sleep positions. While a neutral spinal position can be achieved in all three, some positions are better than others. Arguable, the best sleeping position is to lie on your back with a small pillow tucked under the back of the knees. The neck should be supported by a contoured pillow or no pillow. This position completely unloads the stress on the spine and allows for the natural curves in each area to remain neutral. For people who prefer sleeping on their side, it is helpful to place a pillow between the knees to help keep stress off the hips and lower spine. Again, a contoured pillow is important. Notice that the width between the neck and shoulder and ear and shoulder are different. A properly fitted contour pillow should accommodate this difference. The worst position to sleep is on your stomach. For

people who sleep best on their stomach, placing a flat pillow beneath the stomach and hips can reduce stress on the spine. While these guidelines are true in general, the position that is most comfortable to sleep in is again largely dependent on individual preferences.

The guidelines are even more important to follow for those experiencing back problems. However, if you do experience a back-related problem, it is important to have it assessed by a health care professional. While these guidelines are effective at preventing the aggravation of a back problem, they are not a substitute for proper assessment and treatment. Whether you are sleeping, standing or working, it is important to think about maintaining a neutral spine position.

Health fact: Adolescence is an important time of life regarding physiological development. However, many youth are not getting enough sleep. It is estimated that youth need approximately 9-10 hours per night. How is your sleep habit?

Living Past 100

Your personality affects your ability to fight disease

Science has proven genes and health foods and medications are not the whole answer to living a long, healthy life. You will suffer more illnesses and die younger if you do not have the right personality.

You may be thinking, "Well, that sinks my ship right there!" You may be wrong. Personality is merely the cloak we create for ourselves to define who we are. Personality can change (thank goodness). A lot of research has gone into discovering what kind of personality promotes good health. Researchers discovered personality traits definitely affect the immune system. Some personality traits make the immune system stronger, some make it weaker. For example, for a long time, researchers believed "stress" was a culprit, but now they know it is not the stress, it is how we handle stress. For a long time, people were told to meditate to "de-stress". Now, researchers know that is a 20-minute relief from a longstanding problem. The solution must be longstanding, not a stopgap. The solution is changing the way we handle stress.

Before we go any further, remember that personality is not the only cause of disease. Personality affects the immune system, but a change in personality will not prevent a virus or bacteria from invading your system. What you want is a healthy immune system to prevent your dying from the invasion.

To really go into how your personality affects your immune system, you might want to read *The Immune Power Personality* by Henry Dreher, or some of the works of Dr. Deepak Chopra.

Here is your first personality clue: if you tend to ignore problems, keep your feelings to yourself, and fail to fully express your emotions, you probably have a weak immune system and come down with everything that goes around. If that is you, you need to do some work on yourself.

Five years ago Ron and Loretta Young were living in Chilliwack. She worked at an A&W and in bookkeeping, he was in construction.

They moved to Princeton and opened Princeton Outdoor Supply in what Loretta refers to as, "Ron's mid-life adventure."

Local support was good then, and has continued to be strong to this day.

"Our customers and the locals have been helpful from Day One," says Loretta.

The Young's, and their business, have been actively involved in the community operating fundraisers for the Otter Valley Fish & Game Club, Princeton Fish & Game Club, Princeton Ground Search & Rescue Society and various other clubs and groups.

The Mule Deer Contest is their way of saying thank you to Princeton, and their customers, for welcoming them here.

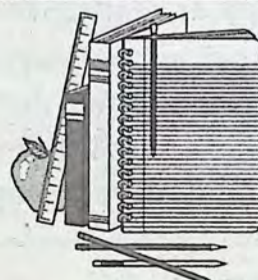

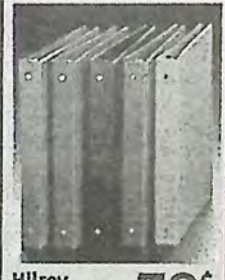

The total Board Listings inventory increased by 19%, for a total of 1,622 active listings, compared to 1,579 last July.

Actual Listings taken in July 2004 are up substantially at 468 compared to 393 in July 2003.

Year-to-date listings are up 6%, 2,751 compared to 2,577 last year.

Total Sales volume for the entire Board has diminished by -16% at month-end.

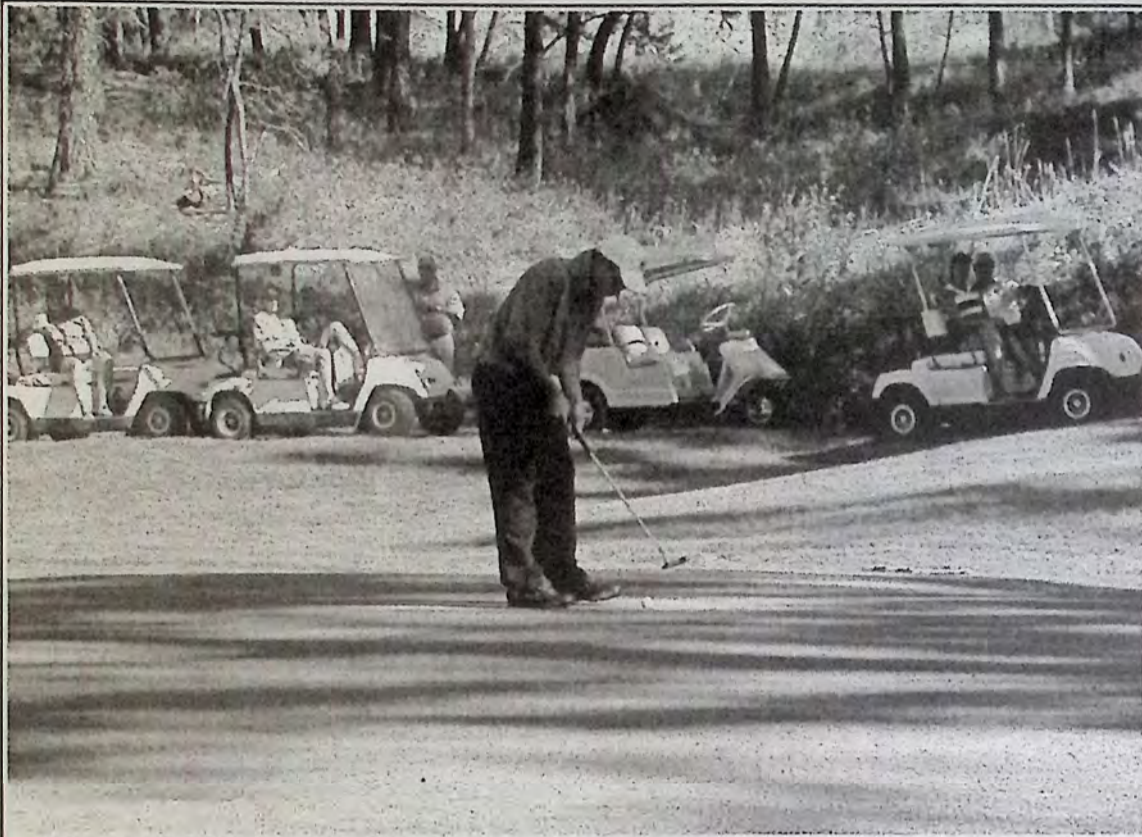

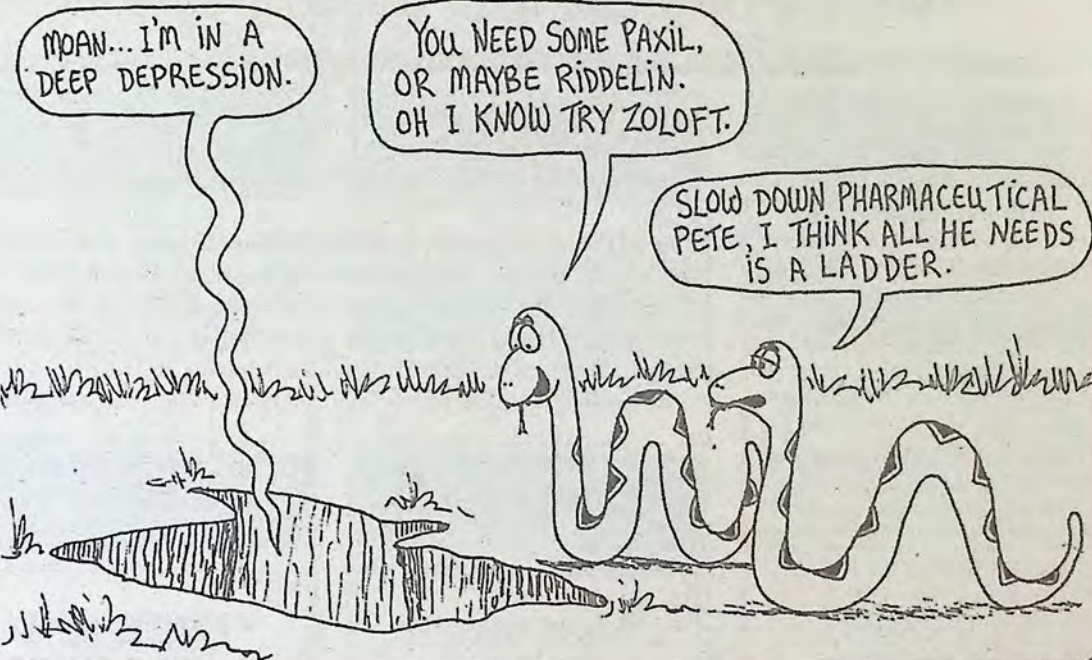

Anti methane group formed

Dear Editor;

A committee to "Save Our Vale From Methane" has been struck to mobilize all dwellers, ranchers and land owners of the Town of Princeton and the surrounding Regional District of Upper Similkameen against the Methane Gas Well Project.

Methane Gas Wells on Princeton's grasslands will not only be an environmental, ecological disaster, but will result in destruction of one of the most beautiful grassland areas in British Columbia.

It will also be an economic disaster for the tourism, vacation, holiday-retirement home base assiduously built up by the town and district over the last fifteen years to replace it's once great copper mine base.

This has been done through first class town planning and fine landscaping, including a boulevard.

The two main streets, well off the highway, have refurbished original stores, a picturesque court house, a handsome brick hotel and a one way at a time wooden truss bridge crossing the Tulameen River, all dating back to the early 1900's.

B. C.'s most unjust mining and gas drilling laws in effect allow the government, or the company to which it sells the mineral and gas rights, to come onto our lands without our consent, and to pay a most minimal 'lease' rent established by the government.

If the gas drilling companies had to buy all land owners out at

fair market value plus damages, for what is known in expropriation law as "injurious effect," the whole project would be uneconomic. (Injurious effect is the harm and hurt done to the owners by the loss of their land and its enjoyment.

This could be long family possession, simple intense sentimental love of its nature, its beautiful setting and landscape generally, in effect, compensation for the destruction of their way of life.)

Ninety percent of the gas rights recently sold by the government lie under grasslands owned by ranchers.

The ranchers of the grasslands will, effectively, be robbed of their lands to subsidize the methane companies!!

The towns-people, whether retired or working, while they will not suffer direct destruction of their land, business or way of life, will pay through the sharp decline in value of their real property and business.

And the people of "Beautiful British Columbia" will pay in the loss of one of its finest scenic areas.

Highway 1 construction completed

Construction has wrapped up on a repaving project in the Boston Bar area, said Yale Lillooet MLA Dave Chutter.

"This section of Highway 1 had rutting problems and was in need of new pavement," said Chutter.

"Now driving from Boston Bar to Jackass Mountain will be a smoother and safer ride for motorists."

Three sections of the highway were included in the project and a total of 14 kilometres were repaved, including an 11-kilometre section at Jackass Mountain, a 1-kilometre section at the Skuppa Rest Area and a 2-kilometre section at Tank Hill. High quality asphalt was used on all the truck climbing lanes to increase the life span of the road surface and reduce the rutting

problem.

In addition to the resurfacing, 900 pieces of guardrail were removed and replaced and 730 new pieces were added to facilitate fifteen kilometres of shoulder widening and paving.

At the Skuppa Rest Area, one kilometre of the highway was completely reconstructed to improve the alignment.

Chutter said the wider shoulders will greatly enhance safety for cyclists and accommodate the future installation of rumble strips for driver awareness.

Centreline painting will be done in early August, after the long weekend.

The contract was valued at \$2,521,143 and went to Penticton's Peter's Bros. Construction Ltd.

I see them as the most arrogant of all people, who dare to use God or Allah or their version of religion as an excuse to place themselves on an equal footing with the Creator and decide who lives and who dies.

The illogical behaviour of religious fanatics is lost on them, of course. They do not see they are equal to everyone the Creator has made. They think, because they

have chosen a particular form of worship in a particular form of belief system, they must be right and everyone else is not only wrong, but inferior. I suppose the Al Qaeda have convinced themselves that Allah does not love us because we do not subscribe to Islamic faith and worship Allah. If there is only one God and His name is Allah, then logically speaking, all of us who worship this Supreme Being must be worshipping the same Being, regardless of what name we use in worship.

Power and control is really what it is all about. Al Qaeda, and a lot of other Muslims, fear a loss of power and control in their own traditional lands. They fear the exposure of their devout people to the influences of non-Islamic culture and customs. They fear change. If they lived in a place where the mullah did not call prayers from the minaret every morning, noon

and night, how could they live? Would they lose their faith? Would they change into something else and lose all hope of going to Paradise when they die? Will their young people leave the faith? Would they see grandchildren born of mixed marriages? Would their women quit wearing those things on their heads, and their sons quit wearing the turbans? Allah forbid! They would rather kill, or die, than risk these possibilities.

The Q'ran does not advocate violence and terrorism. In fact, a lot of the customs of Muslims are not necessarily demanded by the Q'ran. Shiites and Sunnis are quite different in customs and, like Catholics and Protestants, they fight among themselves at times over the proper conduct of those who worship Allah.

When everyone respects the right of freedom of religion, and learns to accept other customs, then the world will live in peace.

Forest fires still burning in district

There are a total of 93 active fires burning in the Kamloops Fire District (as of August 7th).

Only 23 of those are larger than 10 hectares.

Of the total, 82 were lightning-caused fires and 11 were classified as human-caused.

This brings the total fires to date in the current fiscal year to 483 in this district alone.

The Ministry of Forests fiscal year runs from April 1 to March 31.

A total of 9,680 hectares have been destroyed to date in those fires.

The closest fire to local residents is probably the Pasayten Creek fire (#K604128).

It is located directly South of Princeton at the U. S. Border.

It was first discovered on July

29th and was only 20 hectares in size on August 8th.

The largest fire burning in the Kamloops Fire District is the Hobson Lake fire (#K10367) which was discovered July 25th and was last reported to be 3,782 hectares in size.

There are currently no camp fire bans in the Kamloops Fire District, but there are some restrictions on open fires.

No restrictions exist either on forest use or travelling in the district.

Province-wide figures show a total of 250 active fires burning with 3 new lightning-caused fires identified as of August 7th.

The total number of lightning-caused fires in the province is 222 with 26 being human-caused.

To date, there have been 1,726 fires in the province destroying 178,776 hectares.

The largest fire burning in British Columbia is the Swan Lake fire near the Yukon Border. It is 32,000 hectares in size.

If you see a wild fire anywhere in British Columbia you are asked to call 1-800-663-5555 or *5555 on your cellular phone.

The Burn Reference Line can be contacted toll free at 1-888-797-1717.

For Wildfire information, including details on current wildfires, B. C. Forest Service bans and Restrictions call toll free to 1-888-3FOREST (1-888-336-7378).

The Fire Danger Rating for this area (as of August 7th) is Low to Very Low.

Band acquires 5% of Mt. Baldy

The directors of Mt. Baldy Ski Corporation announced Friday the recent completion of a letter of mutual understanding between the Osoyoos Indian Band and Mt. Baldy Ski Corporation.

The agreement is being hailed as an historical first in North America in that it goes far beyond the usual mitigation of First Nations' concerns regarding ski area expansion plans.

Both parties to the agreement have been in communication months prior to the acquisition of Mt. Baldy by the parent corporation, Winter Recreation, ULC.

The agreement recognizes and supports the traditional values and sanctity of the land as well as acknowledges the Band's support for the orderly completion of a master plan for the ski area's expansion.

An appointed committee comprised of Band members and Baldy representatives will study and define an accommodation process.

The process is intended to foster a sensitive solution to development issues.

In addition, the Osoyoos Band will have a Board seat, further contributing to the collaborative approach to this development.

The pact also addresses business initiatives including co-marketing opportunities in conjunction with the Band's resort developments located in Osoyoos.

The Band's direct investment into the Mt. Baldy venture will provide employment and professional development opportuni-

ties for the Band and its businesses.

This investment will also encourage Band members and in particular the youth, all of whom are now shareholders in Mt. Baldy, to become actively involved in Winter Recreation activities.

"Our investment in Mt. Baldy once again demonstrates the Osoyoos Band's determination and capacity to be a significant contributor and driving force to the South Okanagan economy.

Over the past few years the Band has invested millions of dollars into Tourism based projects, including Nk'Mip Canyon Desert Golf Course, Nk'Mip Cellars Winery, Nk'Mip Desert and Heritage Centre and Nk'Mip Campground and R. V. Park.

Our investment in Mt. Baldy allows us to extend our operating season into the winter months.

The Osoyoos Indian Band will be providing jobs and business opportunities for their Band membership through this investment.

Furthermore, the Band will have members of their community fully participating in the master site planning process to ensure that environmental concerns are addressed and areas within which the Band practices their traditional methods are sensitively managed," says Chief Clarence Louie.

Mt. Baldy is preparing a comprehensive long-term Master Plan to present to Land and Water British Columbia.

"Thanks to tremendous support by the provincial government we expect to receive an interim

agreement for expansion plans within the next few weeks, followed by an approved master plan for expansion by early 2005," said Brett Sweezy, Winter Recreation's President.

"Not only does the Osoyoos Indian Band's involvement expedite our master plan process, but our partnership will benefit the South Okanagan as well. This agreement further solidifies the Osoyoos Indian Band's reputation as a progressive business entity."

Mt. Baldy is a unique ski area that retains the character of ski resorts long since vanished - relaxed, affordable, un-crowded, fun for the entire family.

"Our vision is to maintain this atmosphere while creating a destination mountain resort."

The five-year plan for the mountain includes a new day lodge, ski lifts, major terrain expansion, both lift serviced and accessible backcountry, hotel, and development of a new core village, all with an eye to the traditional architectural and cultural themes of the South Okanagan.

The Osoyoos Indian Band Development Corporation manages nine companies and provides employment for over 80 Band members.

Through land leases and joint ventures the Band has built meaningful business relationships that have created social and employment opportunities for both Natives and non-Natives in the South Okanagan.

The Chief and Council of OIB are business people who have a desire to develop more business opportunities.

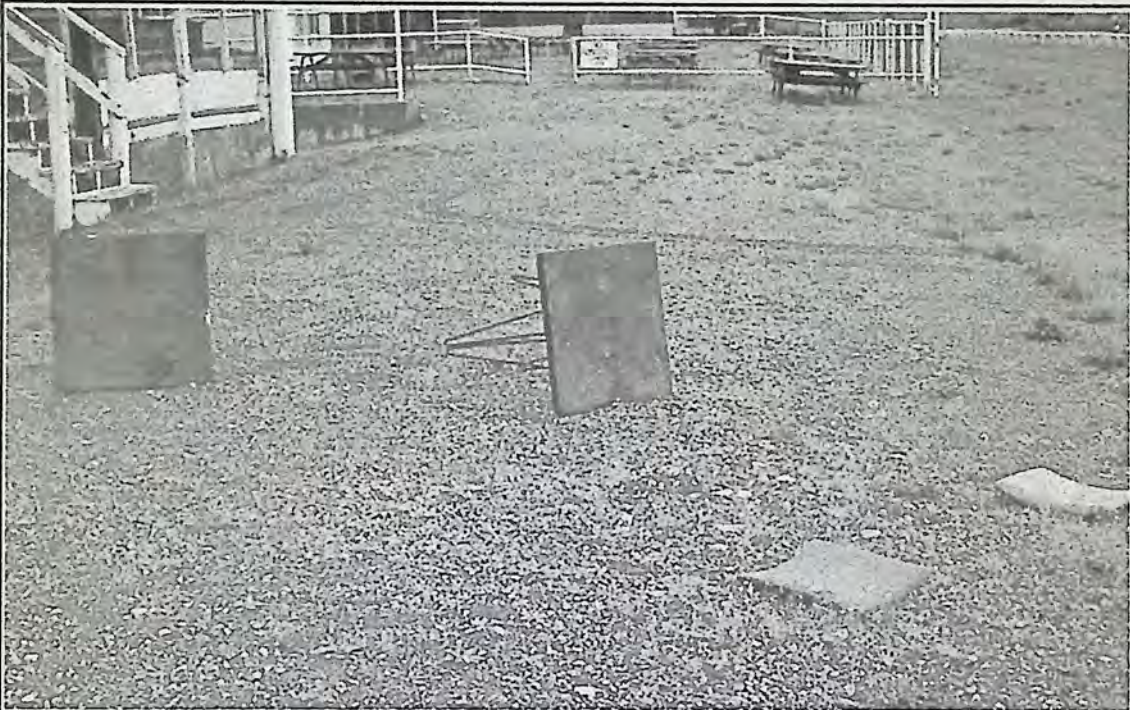
