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## Pot grow yields jail

On March 9, 2004, RCMP searched the home of Roland Meier and Deborah Gauvin in Princeton. Police discovered 21 mature marijuana plants at the residence, with some indication there may have been more plants there prior to the search. Due to the low number of plants, Meier and Gauvin were not charged with trafficking, but only with production. Meier pled guilty, and charges against Gauvin were stayed.

Roland Meier had a long criminal record, but had been "behaving himself" so was given a nine month house arrest with electronic monitoring and several conditions. He is permitted to go to his job and attend medical and dental appointments, and have Sunday afternoon free for exercise and/or shopping.

In addition, he must do 25 hours of community work service and take counselling recommended by his supervising officer. Meier and Gauvin plan to apply to the methadone program. If Meier is found in violation of any conditions of sentencing, he will be moved to a correctional center.

# Slides muck up highway 3



This was the scene last Wednesday morning as Argo Road Maintenance crews worked to clear a safe passage through mud and debris on Highway 3 near Stemwinder Park and campground.

## Twelve slides in total

Princeton RCMP responded to a call at 6:30 PM last Tuesday night regarding a mudslide on Highway 3 35-kilometres East of Princeton.

A severe rainstorm, with gumball-sized hailstones, had just passed through the area creating a series of slides moving earth, rock and debris across the highway in a number of locations.

The highway was closed to all traffic and a total of 12 slides were identified with two of the most serious ones located at Stemwinder Park and Campground.

Some travellers were caught between slides on the highway as well as some campers in the Stemwinder campground.

Geotechnical crews examined the site early Wednesday morning and at 8:00 AM gave Argo Road Maintenance crews the go ahead to start clearing the road.

First priority was to provide access to the travellers caught on the highway and campers at Stemwinder.

The highway was opened to single lane traffic, with a pilot car escort, at 6:30 PM Wednesday night.

## Arts Council cleans house for new year

Princeton and District Arts Council met on Wednesday, August 18, to deal with issues raised at the July annual general meeting, and to put in place those policy motions which will set the Arts Council on a new course.

The first issue dealt with financial reporting to the provincial government under the Societies Act. The second dealt with applying for a grant from BC Arts Council to cover grants approved by Princeton & District Arts Council to local arts and cultural groups. One of the newest member groups to join is the Princeton Community Band. Treasurer

Nick Mills urged the group to submit an application for a grant, and there are now eight groups who applied for \$250 each. The membership approved grants to be given to Vermilion Artists, Princeton Concert Society, Princeton Museum Society, Garden Club, Community Band, Writer's Group, Bunchgrass Quilters and the youth arts and drama group.

Town Council has requested the Arts Council pay utilities bills. A motion was passed allowing the Arts Council to enter into a tenancy agreement with Town Council with the stipulation there be no restrictions placed on the Arts Council's or users to sell from the

site. President Dawn Johnson said she had asked if Council had a draft of the agreement but one has not been done. A building committee consisting of Fred Leard, Cathie Orser and Cory Oerlemans will negotiate the agreement with Council, as well as assessing what improvements may be made to the building. The President had asked Town Council for a site plan and some kind of plans, not necessarily blueprint, for the building, and was told no such plans exist. As the site was the old fire hall, the firemen will be asked whether they have a plan of some kind.

The Arts Council has very little money which can be spent on

capital improvements. Grant money from the Town of Princeton must be spent on expenses, and money from BC Arts Council must be spent on grants to local groups. Consequently, the Arts Council will be actively engaged this year in revenue-generating events. Proposals from members will be welcomed.

Del Hall announced Princeton Concert Society will be hosting an evening of music by a group from Vernon called The Jewel. This group of professional musicians will feature some classical favourites at the Baptist Church on Saturday, October 2. Hall received approval from members to turn the

# Mudslide damages property

A storm bringing hail the size of gumballs and torrential rain brought down a slurry of mud and rock near Stemwinder Provincial Park on Tuesday, August 17 between 6:00 and 6:30 p.m. There was so much heavy hail it lay thawing in ditches alongside Highway 3 until noon the next day. The slides crossed the highway and flowed into the park while blocking the campsite entrance preventing campers from leaving the park.

As campers in some locations were in the direct path of the slide, they struggled to remove their belongings, and at least one camper had his vehicle ruined as he tried to drive away through the mud.

The park sites were not full, so campers moved to safer campsites, but visibility was negligible in the heavy downpour, so finding a safe site was difficult. Water flowed everywhere, and campers had no idea how much mud and rock was coming, so they were very frightened.

"It was scary," a camper told the News Leader. He had moved his truck and camper trailer west to a safe site.

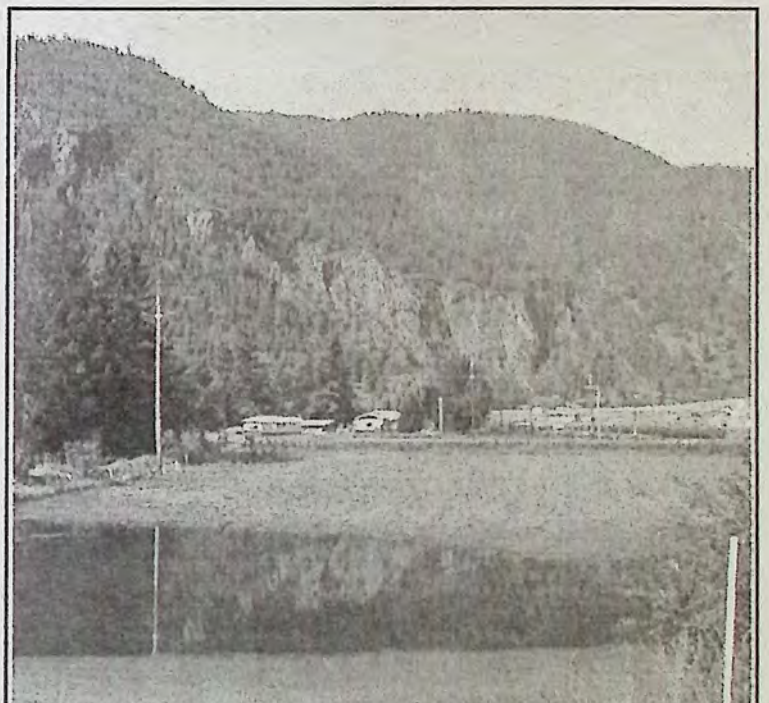
In one place, the mud flowed through the park and down to the Similkameen River, where it

did not wash away as it had dropped into a backwash.

Residents in the area were trapped either in their homes or away from their homes.

The News Leader spoke with a Victoria man who said he had left most of his belongings at his campsite toward Hedley, and could not reach his site as the highway had been closed overnight and well into the morning.

Crews worked frantically to clear the slurry from the highway, but it flowed in like warm molasses behind each load pushed out of the way. Although nobody was in danger from the slide, another thunder storm with heavy rain was predicted for the afternoon, and crews feared it might hit in the same location. They wanted everyone out of the park before another storm hit.

## Deer problem haunts Council

Conservation Officer Al Lay will be invited to speak to Council on September 7 regarding the deer problem in Princeton. As Councillor Kathy Clement commented, "The herd is growing."

The downtown herd, which Council estimates to number around 60, continues to be a nuisance for all homeowners and a hazard to some. Last summer, a local woman enjoying an afternoon in a residential area was struck and injured by a doe. Numerous complaints have gone to Town Council, but Mayor Keith Olsen says Council is powerless to take action over wildlife. Only the Conservation

Officer can declare the animals "pests" or "nuisances" and dispose of them.

Council contacted Lay some months ago about finding a solution to the deer problem, other than just asking people not to feed them.

Administrator Cornie Froese said Lay had advised them some municipalities have bylaws for control of the deer, but Froese had looked for such a bylaw and no municipality in B.C. has such a bylaw.

Councillor Clement said Council could pass a bylaw forbidding the feeding of deer, but that would not stop the herd from growing.

A member of the public attributed the invasion of deer due to the town having taken over deer territory, but this was quickly disproved. Councillor Clement commented that there was no deer problem until people began feeding them in town, and now the deer are born and raised in town. She noted many of the does have twin fawns, rapidly adding to the size of the herd.

The public offered other suggestions, none of them legal.

## Driver pays for record

In Provincial Court in Princeton on August 12, Richard Herd entered a guilty plea to a charge of driving while impaired. Herd was arrested on June 21, 2004, when police observed him driving through Princeton in the wrong lane on Highway 3. Police followed the vehicle, stopped it, and issued a breath test demand. Readings were .270, more than four times the legal limit. Herd had prior convictions, and was ordered to pay a \$750 fine and a one year driving prohibition.

top floor of the Cultural Centre into a "loft" where local musicians, poets or authors may give recitals and readings.

Treasurer Nick Mills proposed that groups using the Cultural Centre pay a fee toward the cost of utilities. Members argued that this would discourage use of the Centre. Finally, it was agreed to put a six-month moratorium on user groups paying toward utilities and to determine, in the meantime, how the bills could be

paid.

To monitor heat and power costs, and to ensure lights and furnace are turned down when people have left, the Arts Council negotiated with Joseph Dubé to have him act as the security person for the coming year.

Nick Mills will make an inventory of all of the Arts Council property in the building for insurance purposes. This inventory will not include any personal property left on site.

**Public must approve application**

A public meeting will be held on September 7 at 6:30 p.m. in Council Chambers to review the proposed blanket application to amend the Official Community Plan to exclude several properties from the Agricultural Land Reserve. These properties are located within Village of Keremeos boundaries, and each property owner has been asked to respond to Council's proposal. The public will have an opportunity to comment on the proposed bylaw granting Council the right to make the application. If the exclusion is permitted, Keremeos will be able to meet the increasing demand for residential property.

**New appointments**

Councillor Steve Hecoeks has moved, and at the August 16 meeting of Council, Mayor Walter Despot appointed other councillors to take over Hecoeks' duties. Councillor Jeremy Evans was appointed to the Recreation Commission and Councillor Terry Zeller will serve on the Skateboard Park Committee. Councillor Ed

Minshall will undertake investigating an expansion of the Manor through contact with BC Housing.

**New flush limits**

Council passed a motion to insert the six litre low water consumption toilet into the Village Building Bylaw. All new construction will have the low-water flush toilets.

**More property**

Council will pursue the pur-

chase of Ministry lands north and south of the abandoned right of way located south of K Mountain Inn.

Keremeos recycling program is going well, after an initial period when some residents were confused about dates or times, or type of materials that can or cannot be recycled. Some residents hope the program will expand to allow even more items to be recycled.

**RedBridge upgrade continues**

Work continues on the upgrade of Red Bridge, a historic landmark and one of the few covered bridges left in North America. The Ministry of Transportation, in conjunction with the Department of Fisheries and Oceans, chose this time of year as the window for reconstruction of the bridge.

The Keremeos Red Bridge Committee has been promoting preservation of the bridge and is pursuing having the bridge designated as a historic site. The Ministry of Transportation did a

study completed last February which showed the bridge still had some life to it. Now, beams over and under the driving area are being replaced. Steel sheathing will be installed on the inside of the bridge, but Similkameen Country has painted the one inch by eight inch tongue and groove cladding boards. Putting the boards back on the bridge is the Ministry's responsibility.

No date has been set for reopening the Red Bridge. Traffic is now detoured to a downstream bridge.

Triggered by a lightning strike at approximately 8:30 AM, flames and smoke were clearly visible to valley residents.

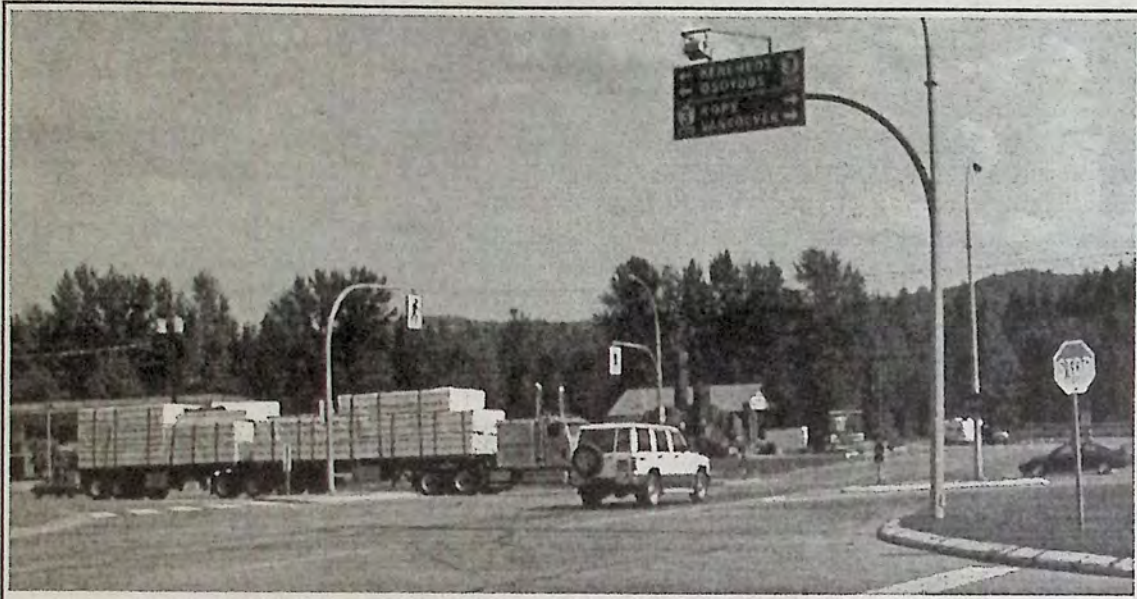
Within 45-minutes a helicopter arrived to examine the scene, but lost its water bucket when it attempted to drop water on the fire.

## Council hears citizen's traffic concerns

Ed Goudreau wants a pedestrian-controlled traffic light at the intersection of Highway 3 and Vermilion Avenue. The intersection is just west of Chevron and pedestrians who wish to cross the highway toward Irly Bird builders mart have an exceptionally hazardous crossing during the summer months when highway traffic is at its peak.

Goudreau referred to a particular incident which was a "near miss" situation, and an incident in which a cyclist was injured.

Council sympathized with Goudreau's feelings about the dangers of the crossing, but has sent letters and had a meeting with Highways Department authorities, who denied the request.

Councillor Spencer Coyne noted he has seen women pushing baby strollers, older people on foot, and youngsters, all of whom have a difficult time finding an opening in the traffic to enable them to

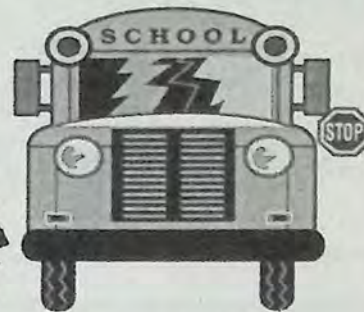
cross safely. He said Council must continue to pursue some kind of safe way for pedestrians to cross that intersection. Council agreed, and will try again to have the Highways Department authorities see things Princeton's way. Councillor Coyne requested that copies be sent to MLA Dave Chutter and to Jim Gouk, the new Member of Parliament for the Similkameen Valley.

Ed Goudreau, who lives on the south side of the intersection, wrote, "A fatality is of great concern ..."

This is far from the first time a Princeton Town Council has complained about the hazards of that intersection. Every Princeton mayor, for the past two decades, has appealed to Highways authorities to have some kind of light at the intersection. The proposal was for a regular traffic light used on highways in B.C. in which drivers are warned by flashing lights

to prepare to stop at an intersection ahead.

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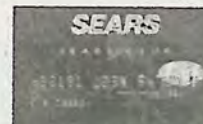

## How to prepare your child for school

Here are some tips to help parents prepare their child for school, courtesy of the British Columbia Ministry of Education:

- \* Confirm what time school starts on the first day. If your child is going to a new school, be sure to bring the required information and identification with you on registration day.
- \* Find a safe route to and from school and practice the route with your child. Make a travel plan with your child. Discuss traffic safety and how to safely interact with strangers.
- \* Start a new routine. Consider

having your child shift to a school bedtime and wake-up routine before the first day of school.

- \* Choose clothes for school early. Have your child select an outfit the night before. This helps start the morning on a calm note.

- \* Help keep your child healthy. Schedule medical and dental check-ups. Encourage your child to choose healthy foods and stay active. Let the child help prepare the school lunch.

- \* Be positive. Acknowledge and talk to your child about the mixed emotions about school as the first day of school approaches. Remind the child of meeting friends, learning new things and having fun at school. Take note of how your child reacts to separation and changes to routine.

- \* Let your child see you read, and set aside time each day for family reading. Talk to your child about books. Read to your child.

- \* Set up a homework area away from the TV with adequate supplies and lighting.

- \* Review the previous year's learning. Play games to review last year's curriculum just before the child returns to school.

- \* Listen to your child. Focus on your child at the end of the day. Ask questions and listen to how the day went and what the highlights were.

- \* Meet your child's teacher and school principal. You can gain

valuable insights into your child's progress by talking to school staff.

- \* Become involved in your child's school community. Contact your local school board or Parent Advisory Council at your child's school for volunteer opportunities.

## Teach your child how to study

Parents can play a key role in the process of helping a child learn good study skills. Effective study skills go hand in hand with success in school.

Tips for parents:

- \* provide a quiet reading time for your children each day

- \* make time for question and answer sessions to reinforce learning

- \* schedule some time to review and proofread your children's book reports, essays and projects

- \* teach your children how to use calendars, day planners and journals to organize their time

- \* be a resource to your children and teach them how to effectively use the library, Internet and reference books

- \* turn off the TV and radio and other distractions such as the telephone, and keep pets away, during study time

### Salad season is good for you

For a real treat, add a fruit salad to your menu, now that a variety of fresh fruit and melons is available. You will love the taste, and your body will love the nutrition.

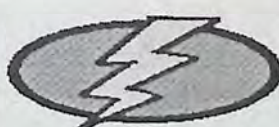


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# Local taxpayers help RCMP buy equipment

Cst. Myrl Stus attended the August 16 Town Council meeting to appeal for money to obtain an Alco-Sensor IV unit. This unit can be used in the field to detect drivers having over the .08 blood alcohol level permitted by law. Cst. Stus told Council the older units are no longer acceptable and the detachment has no money in the budget to purchase the new models. He reminded Council

they had set aside money in the Town budget for a summer student for the RCMP and this will not be used, due to the fact that there are three rookie constables at the detachment this year, which means there would be no person available to supervise a student constable.

Cst. Stus pointed out that Princeton Detachment officers are responsible for policing sev-

eral locations, such as resort areas and small communities in addition to two busy highways. He noted there can be 10,000 vehicles on local highways on any weekend and three times that number on a holiday weekend. He said the South East District, in which Princeton is located, leads the province again this year in motor vehicle fatalities attributed to speed, lack of

seat belt use and drinking drivers. The Alco-Sensor IV unit helps RCMP take drinking drivers off the highway.

Council agreed to grant the RCMP \$1,200 for the purchase of one unit.

The RCMP are appealing to other groups in the community to provide additional units. One unit will hardly suffice for the number of officers on the road.

## Teachers' Day

Princeton Town Council, at the request of BC Teachers' Federation, has passed a motion to recognize Tuesday, October 5, 2004, as World Teachers' Day. Further, they expressed appreciation to public school teachers for the role they play in assuring the well-being of society. The motion passed unanimously at the August 16 meeting.

### TRANSPORTATION ASSISTANCE

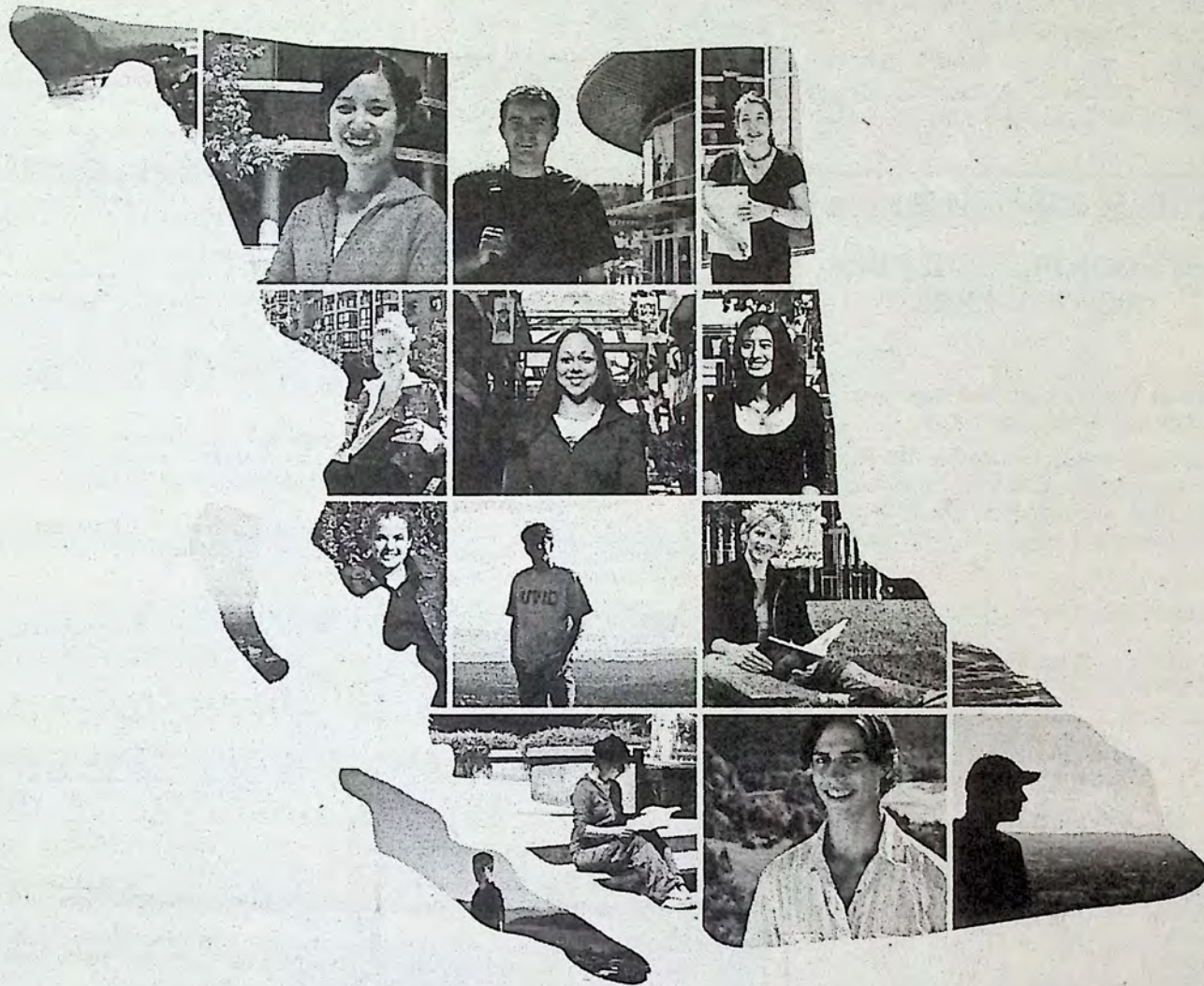

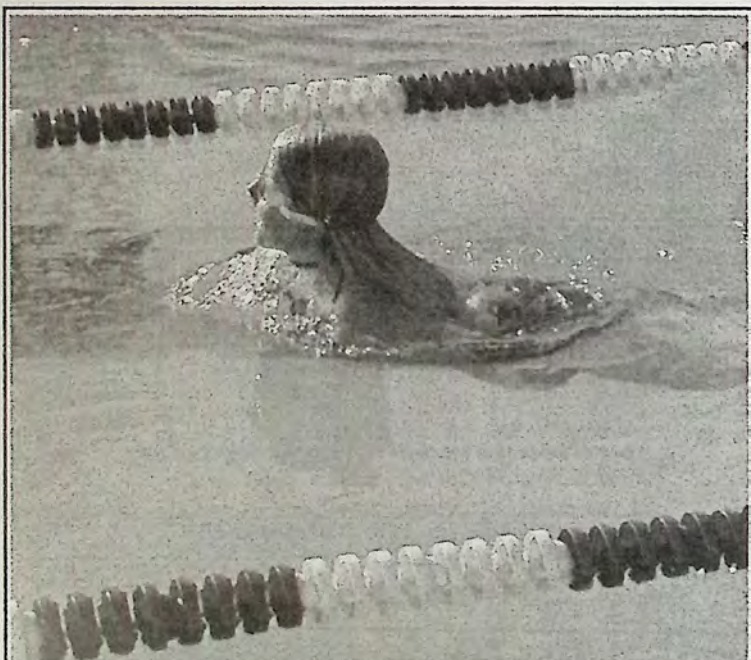

volunteers will be given special wristbands, and will have to sign waiver forms to enter the motorsports area. Gerri Swanson of Princeton Motorsports Association, will manage the demolition derby, and other Motorsports members will take over the mud bog event and the auto-X.

Woodford advised everyone the motorsports part of the fair will be dedicated to the memory of Guy Nordquist, and a number of his friends from the coast will be attending to participate in motorsports events.

Members of both groups discussed how the rumour mill had ground out repeated stories about conflict between the Fall Fair and Motorsports members, and concluded the rumours were an outcome of opposition by some members of the public to the kinds of changes going on at the fairgrounds. Woodford said it would be a pity if the public did not appreciate the efforts that had been made during the past five years to promote increasing use of the fairgrounds.

Don Mare, a member of both the Fall Fair Association and the Motorsports Association, pointed out that, with the demise of Racing Days, the annual fair is now the biggest event in Princeton. He said it takes a lot of cooperation between all groups to make it a success and it

is important for the public to see the many uses of the grounds. The track used for horses is still in good shape and the fair now includes chuckwagon and chariot racing. The other tracks add to the uses, and all of these things happen at the fair.

Sandy Gabor, Vice-President of Princeton Exhibition Association, said horse racing may have become healthier in the lower mainland, but horse racing in a 'B' circuit may never return to Princeton. In the meantime, the horse track is main-

tained and used for horse training and the chuckwagon and chariot races.

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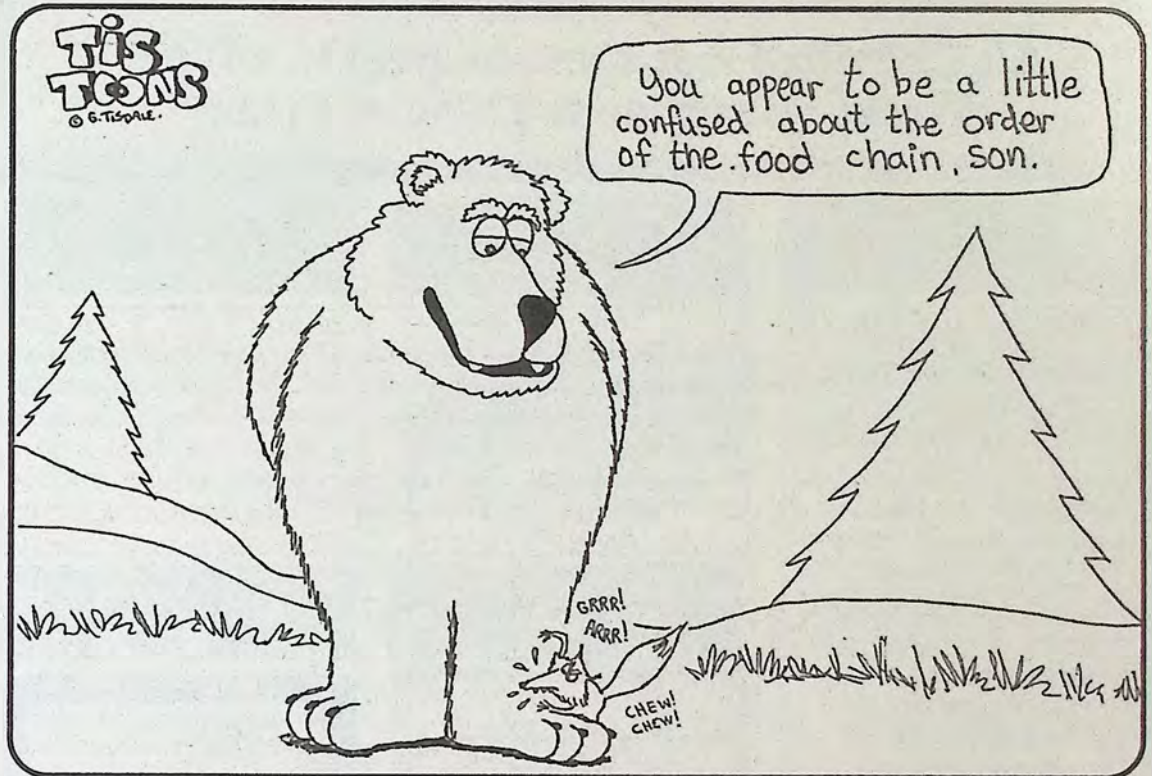

### Reader continues with drug stats

Dear Editor;

Last week I pointed out the misguided approach that America has taken in her war on drugs.

I also pointed out that we always follow her example like the obedient little lapdogs we are.

This week I wish to follow up with some more statistics from the National Institute for Drug Abuse regarding the deaths from the misuse of drugs in a typical year in America:

- \* tobacco kills about 390,000 people per year
- \* sidestream tobacco smoke kills another 50,000

- \* alcohol is responsible for about 20,000 disease related deaths, although I don't have those statistics at hand, accidental deaths as a result of alcohol abuse would probably quadruple that last figure

Now, I wish to draw your attention to the situation as it presently exists in America. Fifty-seven percent of prisoners in the American federal prison system are there on drug-related offences, but not one is in jail for selling tobacco, alcohol, prozac or aspirin.

If we are following America's lead, do we have our priorities right?

During the past 20 years, I have been a Fall Fair member. One of the many things I like about the organization is its purpose. The Fall Fair was established to show what people can produce through their own efforts in a rural environment. The idea is to exhibit a wide range of products produced at home.

Fairs are not new. They originated in Europe, where they have been well-established for many generations. In Princeton, the Women's Institute began the Fall Fair. In its beginning phase, it was very small. It was held later in the fall, and most of the exhibits of vegetables and fruit were of the kind harvested late. The date was moved to the second weekend of September and now includes most vegetables, fruits and flowers, as well as livestock, poultry, baking, preserves, art, needlework, and handicrafts. Of course, there is a lot of entertainment, a pet show, horsemanship displays, and displays of musical talent, but it is the exhibits that are the backbone of the fair.

My father encouraged me to put in a few exhibits from our garden each year, but it was not until a decade ago that I began to exhibit everything I could, as exhibits were down. It seemed people were losing interest in putting in exhibits.

Some people had the idea that they were not rural people. Everyone in the Similkameen Valley is a rural dweller, as there is no urban center in the valley.

People wonder what "rural" skills they may have. Here is a simple key: if you made it, raised it, or grew it yourself, then you have a rural skill. If you baked a cake, a pie or cookies, you could enter it. If you sewed a garment during the past year, you could enter it. If you grew flowers, or vegetables or fruit, you could enter them. If you built a birdhouse, a chair, or a lamp, you could enter them. If you carved an item from wood or rock, or built a pot, or did a ceramic, you could enter an exhibit. If you raised a goose, a pig, a sheep or a chicken, you could enter an exhibit.

Perhaps because I grew up with instructions on the importance of

self-sufficiency, I admire the aims and objectives of the Fall Fair Association. To be self-sufficient is to be more independent and stretch money further. Even during all of my hectic years as a member of the workforce, raising a family, caring for older folks and running a newspaper, I always found something I had done which could be entered into the Fall Fair.

One of my other motivations, when it comes to exhibits, is to take special delight in produce made in the valley, especially when I see grapes grown in Princeton (yes, you can!), cheese made at home, eggs produced locally, and great vegetables grown in Coalmont or Tulameen. Sometimes, somebody will put huckleberry jam or a huckleberry pie into the fair, and I gloat over it. You know this person went to a lot of bother, having to pick the huckleberries, which is very hard work. You will not find huckleberries on your store shelf!

Occasionally, I see venison or salmon preserved in jars, and I think about how much effort went into home production (first, you had to catch the critter!).

Have you ever really looked at a bale of hay? Some hay is meant for horses, other for sheep or goats, and most of it for cattle. A bale of hay is as individual in quality, from field to field, from cutting to cutting, that the bales can be judged for quality and nutritional value! To a city person, this may seem insignificant, but they are less aware of the source of our food, and making them aware is another goal of the Fall Fair.

If you have anything you can exhibit, please consider showing people our local products. This year, the Bunchgrass Quilters will display their products. Quilting is indeed an old-fashioned skill and an art as well. I look forward to seeing what they have done this year.

## Princeton GSAR continues to grow

Last Tuesday night's meeting of Princeton's Ground Search & Rescue (GSAR) members was a special one.

It was an opportunity for the group to thank Princeton Lions Club for helping purchase their latest piece of equipment.

The Ferno plastic basket stretcher, with all its add-ons, is worth \$2,982.81.

Generous donations from Princeton Lions Club, Regional District Area H, the New Initiatives Fund (PEP) and a private donation from Maria Carlos of West Vancouver covered the cost of the apparatus.

"If we use this once, it's worth it," says GSAR member Peter Rytkonen.

Princeton's GSAR Society was incorporated on April 26, 2001 and as a society, tax deductible receipts can be issued for any donation to the group.

Donations are a large part of what keeps this dedicated group functioning.

"All our equipment we've fundraised for or members have purchased on their own," says GSAR Secretary Randy Rorvik.

Regular expenses related to call outs is covered by the Provincial Emergency Program (PEP).

"All other money we get comes from our own fundraising," says Rorvik.

Training is provided through the Justice Institute, which is contracted by PEP.

"The Justice Institute provides a lot of our training."

The direction of Princeton's GSAR is specific to the type of terrain and situations one would encounter in a rural setting.

"One thing we're doing, which I

think is strategic," says Rytkonen, "is we are developing trackers."

Trackers are searchers using methods to track a missing person by gathering various pieces of information.

Rorvik told the News Leader common sense is also a very useful tool when looking for someone.

Princeton's GSAR is dispatched by RCMP and a mutual aid agreement with GSAR crews in surrounding communities allows for more resources when needed.

Princeton's group is still adding to their collection of equipment.

"We've got a long way to go," says GSAR President Arnie Powell.

"Even Keremeos is way ahead of us, but for being together only four years we've come a long way."

Other members agree with that statement.

"But we are only scratching the surface," says Powell.

The next big purchase for Princeton's GSAR is a mobile command centre, which is basically a fully-equipped trailer which would be used on location at a search site.

The trailer would contain rescue apparatus and communications equipment.

Weyerhaeuser and BC Lotteries are providing a lot of the funding for this project.

The next training session for Princeton's GSAR is in Clearwater next month.

The session is on Swift Water Rescue and BC Lotteries has provided funding to send local members for the training.

With two major rivers in the area, Princeton's GSAR members see value in the training and look forward to the experience.

The training also puts local members in a better position to help with a water rescue, when needed.

Rorvik says Princeton is being serviced by a solid group of trained individuals who work well together in any situation they are called upon to participate.

Regular Tuesday meetings for Princeton's GSAR are quite interesting.

When they don't have a business meeting scheduled the group trains itself.

"What we do is someone picks something they are interested in and we do a training session on that," says Rorvik.

Last Tuesday was his turn and he shared his knowledge on GPS - the Global Positioning System.

The system, which includes a constellation of 27 Earth-orbiting satellites has proven extremely valuable for search and rescue.

"Usually what GSAR uses GPS for is evidence collection," Rorvik told the News Leader.

For example, when a searcher is following a trail and notes something unusual, the notation can be made on the handheld GPS unit for reference at a later time.

"It tells you basically where you are, where you've been, how far you've gone, etc."

Rorvik warns the accuracy of GPS is affected by a number of factors, but for basic usage, it proves to be a valuable tool.

Local businesses have been supportive of GSAR for years.

Princeton Outdoor Supply is currently running a Rifle Raffle fundraiser.

The Remington 710 is valued at \$800.00.

## Council offers hope to taxi business

The ongoing problem of maintaining a taxi service in Princeton was addressed by Town Council at the August 16 public meeting. Town Council had obtained information about Taxi Supplement and Taxi Saver Programs of the provincial gov-
