Report reveals money leaks



Similkameen Valley Planning Society's Business Survey reveals forestry is the largest contributor to the regional economy. Agriculture is the second largest and employs the most people.

Economy report shows where money comes and goes

Forestry is the largest contributor to the Similkameen Valley economy, with more than \$59 million in annual sales.

Ninety percent of Similkameen Valley businesses are locally owned.

Forty percent of farms (excluding ranches) are certified organic, the highest concentration in Canada.

Fifty-nine percent of businesses are home-based.

These are just a few of the facts determined by the valley-wide Business Survey conducted by the Similkameen Valley Planning Society (SVPS) between February and May of this year. The survey and report were top priority for SVPS.

Economic Development Officer Michael McLaughlin explains, "The Business Survey Report gives us a picture of the economy. Without that picture, we cannot do economic development planning. Without it we're in the dark when it comes to assisting economic development."

Some more facts from the Report:
* Agriculture has the second largest payroll and employs the most people.

* more than half the business spending in the valley is by the Forestry Sector

* 53 percent of businesses expect to expand during the next five years.

According to McLaughlin, there are many uses for the Report data.

"It gives a model of the economy. We can actually see where money comes into the valley, how it circulates, and where it leaves. The survey shows that money leaves very quickly. Businesses purchase 55 percent

RCMP hit another grow op

In a continuing campaign to clear drugs out of the Princeton area, local RCMP executed a search warrant on August 19 on a residence in the 2200 block of Princeton-Summerland Road northeast of Princeton.

The residence's outbuilding had been modified to grow marijuana. Specific rooms had been created and complex venting systems installed throughout. A substantial amount of marijuana was seized along with growing equipment. This sophisticated operation would have been able to harvest several hundred plants had it been growing at capacity.

The tenants of the residence are facing charges of production of a controlled substance, possession of a controlled drug and theft of electricity. If found guilty, these individuals could face imprisonment for a term not exceeding seven years.

Organized crime is a major economic drain on many aspects of the B.C. economy, including insurance costs, policing, the justice system and

even natural resource utility costs (hydro bypasses cost the everyday consumer). Organized crime is not restricted to isolated groups that partake in major criminal activity far away from the lives of ordinary people, says

Lytton mayor tosses hat in ring

Lytton Mayor Chris O'Connor announced last week he intends to seek the Liberal Party nomination as a candidate for Yale-Lillooet in the 2005 provincial election. O'Connor was a contestant for that nomination prior to the last provincial election.

O'Connor, who has a Bachelor's degree in Forestry, became woodlands manager at Lytton Lumber Ltd. in 1983. He has served on the Board of St. Bartholomew's Hospital and on the Community Health Council. In 1992, he was elected to Village Council in Lytton, and has been mayor since 1999. He is 48 years old, married, with one child.

In seeking the BC Liberal nomination, O'Connor says, "The BC Liberal Party had a huge challenge in 2001 when elected to form the government of B.C. Ten years of NDP mismanagement had decimated the resource industries and just about bankrupted the province. The past three years has witnessed a rebirth in forestry, mining, oil and gas and many of the other sectors which had previously driven wealth creation in rural B.C. Unfortunately, the wildfires of 2003 and the effects of BSE in the ranching sector have slowed the recovery in many parts of the province."

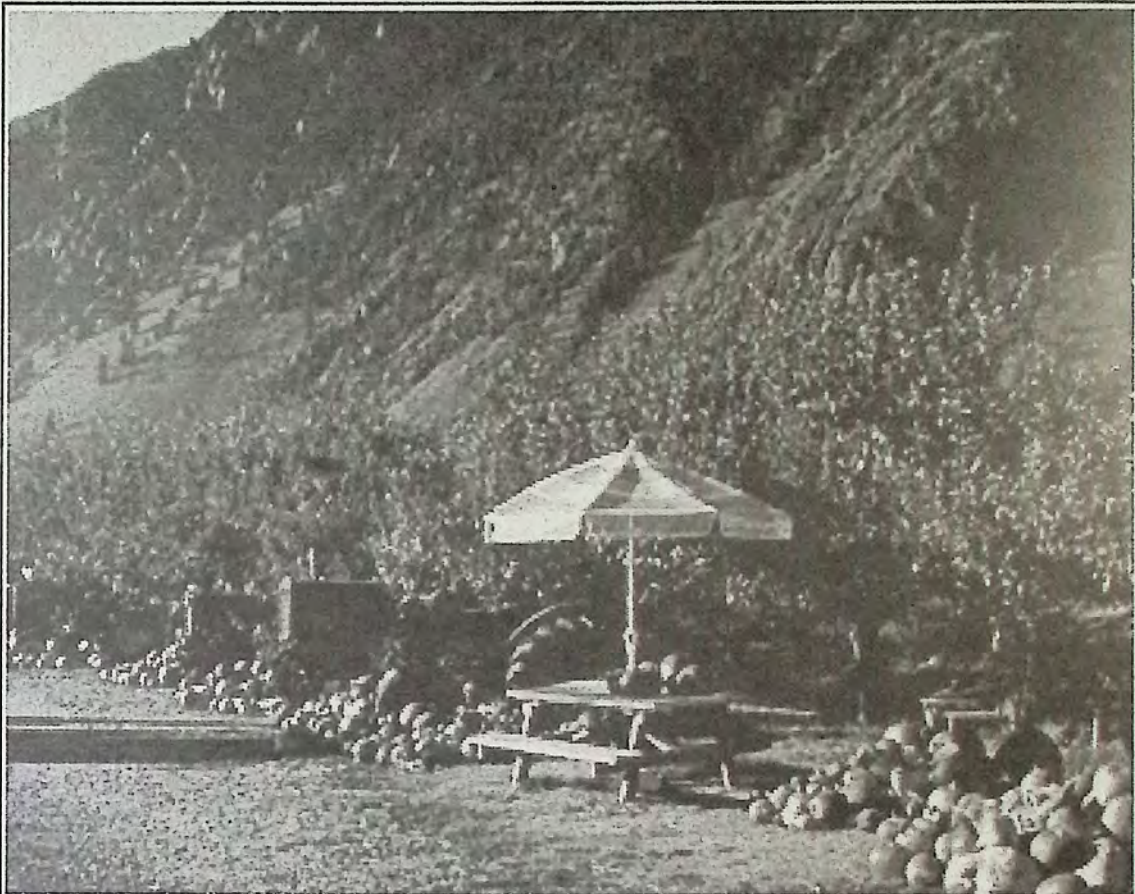

of goods and services from outside the valley. There is no data on the amount wage-earners spend in and out of the valley, but indirect survey evidence suggests considerable income is spent outside the valley.

McLaughlin comments, "The quickest way to improve the Similkameen economy is for businesses and residents to spend more money here."

The model of the economy allows predictions to be made about changes in the economy.

"We can predict how many new jobs would be created if a new employer came into the valley, or predict how many additional jobs would be lost if an employer left the valley.

The Report also provides benchmarks. Five years from now another survey would show changes in the economy.

The database that holds the survey data is quite powerful. Designed by Melanie Bagley of Cawston, it allows scores of data combinations.

"We hope business owners will inquire about the database. We

will not provide information on individual businesses, except to list them by name with contact information, and then only if we believe the business would benefit. The information we will provide can help business owners do market research, find client businesses, identify business clusters and identify new business opportunities," McLaughlin states.

The SVPS next project is strategic economic development plan-

ning. The Survey Report will help guide that planning. There will be notices calling for community involvement in the late fall," McLaughlin promises. "We also hope that the municipal and Band Councils will use the report to inform their economic development decisions." The business survey was funded by Western Diversification Canada through the agency of Community Futures Development Corporation.

Mayor tosses hat in ring from front page

In regard to health care, O'Connor still believes in more local control.

"Our communities lost a huge amount of local control over the delivery of health care when government expropriated health care decision making through regionalization - and government lost access to a lot of good common sense. I believe we need to work to return greater local control over health care decisions in our communities."

"Let's make government work for all of us - particularly the rural resource communities of our riding," O'Connor said. "I believe I can bring good common sense into government based on years of experience in public service, and I am committed to represent all Yale-Lillooet constituents in the legislature in Victoria."

The Liberal Party will select its candidate at a nomination meeting. Dave Chutter will not run.

This can be done easily with angle parking, but cannot be done with parallel parking. There must be room on the passenger side to exit the vehicle.

Council said the best they could do was designate one parking place near the Post Office loading zone at the side of the building.

If this space could not be used, then the nearest location would be the parking lot behind Town Hall.

'Playtime' happens in Cawston

A parent and child Playtime event will take place Thursday, September 2, at the Cawston United Church Hall from 10 a.m. to noon.

This event will kick off the end of summer and early fall season, for Communities for Kids in the south Similkameen.

Communities for Kids is one of 18 separate Children First programs in operation all over British Columbia. The focus is the opti-

mum development and well-being of children from conception to six years of age.

On June 21, a lunch meeting with Communities for Kids was held at Similkameen Family Centre. The kids were occupied with supervised activities while the parents talked about what is needed for younger families in the Keremeos, Cawston and Olalla communities.

Regular parent and child activity times where the parents and their

young ones can play and socialize was one identified need, says Dave Cursons, who has been the Communities for Kids facilitator for the Similkameen Valley for the past year.

Another interest is the proper use of child safety restraints and the need to help everybody see to it that kids travel safely.

Lately, Community Care nurse Linda Partington has been meeting with parents at the Keremeos Health Unit. Partington is a certified technician and can advise and consult with families about child safety restraints.

Access to transportation and the cost of transportation for young families to get to needed services and social events both in and outside the south Similkameen are a recurrent theme, Cursons said.

Communities for Kids has some modest project funding available to parents and caregivers who would like to work together, further fundraise and develop projects to support families and help infants, toddlers and pre-schoolers in the area.

For the September 2 Playtime event, there is a general invitation to expectant parents, parents and caregivers.

Princeton supports Mayor Despot's viewpoint

Princeton Town Council received a copy of a letter written to The Honourable Rich Coleman, Minister of Public Safety and Solicitor General, asking for a fee for service coroner in the Similkameen Valley. Mayor Walter Despot had written to Coleman to express his con-

cern and stated, "Until last summer, we had two coroners! This I see as a continuation of the centralization of services at the expense of small communities in British Columbia."

Mayor Despot adds, "There is at least 125 miles of Highway #3 with no coroner. When it takes three hours plus for the coroner to arrive, this is not acceptable. Also, a fast response, as you are aware, enhances the coroner's ability to grasp a much truer picture of a violent death scene."

At the August 16 meeting of Princeton's Council, a motion was passed to send a letter supporting Mayor Despot's position.

The first regular meeting of Keremeos Old Age Pensioners Organization will be held Wednesday, September 1. The following day, the Brooker band will be back to set feet dancing for the beginning of the fall season. All regular activities will resume in September. Members who may have forgotten the regular schedule can check at the September meeting.

The Seniors Centre has been booked for flu clinics in October. The first flu clinic will be on Wednesday, October 20, from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. The second clinic will be held on Tuesday, October 26, from 9:00 a.m. to noon. At this time, no other major events have been booked.

Nothing further on Cawston homicide

RCMP have identified the man found dead in a Cawston picker shack earlier this month as 32-year old Douglas Allan Duckworth of St. Charles, Missouri.

S. Sgt. Walter Makepeace said last week police are not making much headway in solving this crime.

Investigation has uncovered the fact that Duckworth had left his Missouri home over three years ago. Duckworth had not been in

contact with family members since his departure.

S. Sgt. Makepeace says Duckworth was in the Cawston area for 14-months, living under an alias.

It is also believed that Duckworth may have been facing a jail term in Missouri when he fled the country.

Police are unable to account for a 16-month portion of his life and no clues have been uncovered to unlock the mystery.

RCMP say they interviewed 'people of interest' in the ongoing investigation but there are no suspects at this time.

Fewer police officers are involved in the probe but S. Sgt. Makepeace says the file will remain open and he is hopeful someone will come forward with additional information.

Health Unit moves

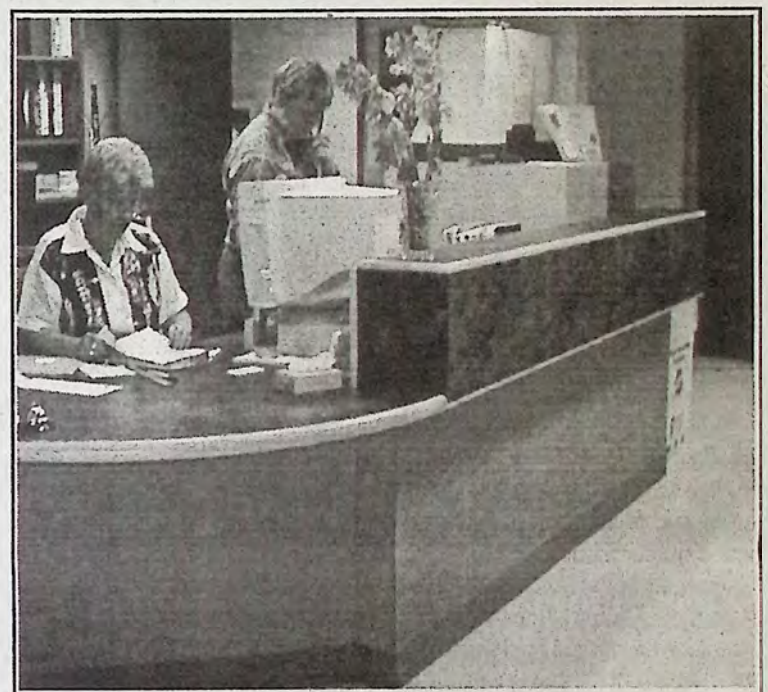

Living Past 100

Proteins are essential

The relationship between a healthy cell, and especially a healthy cell nucleus, and protein, is vital to an understanding of good health. We can talk about obesity, high cholesterol, vitamins, and all of those things, but the most deadly diseases are fought with proteins. Research done by a Canadian in East Africa shows some people can resist HIV infection. He studied prostitutes who have never become infected, and he traced their lack of infection to a specific protein coating on their cells. Other cancer researchers have identified the importance of certain proteins in preventing cancer from developing. Proteins take many forms and have many different names. We can call some of them the B vitamins, and others are called amino acids. Every one of them is essential to good health. For example, many of the diseases which involve breakdown of the central nervous system have been connected with a lack of certain amino acids. Whether the body ceases to produce them, or the affected person has not been careful to consume an adequate diet, is a moot point. The point is this: protein is essential to health. When we look into protein, we discover it can be found in many different foods. Protein comes in meat, fish, eggs, milk, dry beans, nuts, many vegetables, and brewer's yeast. To use an illustration of a well-balanced meal of protein, think of chili con carne with potato salad and whole grain bread, or traditional salmon and potato soup followed by baked squash with butter on top. Both these meals are loaded with different kinds of protein. The traditional Thanksgiving dinner is loaded with proteins, starting with the turkey and ending with pumpkin pie. As summer comes to an end, we need to look at flu season and the need for resistance to disease, especially viruses. Protein seems to play a key role, along with selenium, Vitamin C, and aspirin, in fighting viral infections.

Just over a year ago, the five owners of Copper Mountain Bar & Grill were living and working in Coquitlam and Port Coquitlam.

Brian Suo-Anttila, now 27, was in construction, his girlfriend, 23-year old Harmony Montgomery, was a server, mother Diane Vandermeulen was an accountant, her husband John was in manufacturing and friend Nathan Cook, 27, was a welder fabricator.

They all knew about the former Bromley Station Pub as Suo-Anttila, who has had property in the area for the past few years, was interested in the business.

"We all sat around one day and started talking about it."

Montgomery adds, "I wanted to see what it was worth and in two months we had keys."

The group had quite a task before them as the business sat closed for a year and a half. They spent two months cleaning up and prepping the site and finally opened for business on August 25, 2003.

Problems surfaced shortly after taking over the pub.

"We couldn't even get insurance, vendors wouldn't supply to us," says Suo-Anttila as previous operators of the pub had left a trail of unfinished business.

"We couldn't get a lot of things, it was ridiculous."

On the other hand, residents were very supportive of the new owners and were pleased to see the pub back in business in a family-run manner.

"The locals were good, and still

are," Suo-Anttila says. "They were happy to see us, but it was pretty shocking to deal with the other problems at first."

Copper Mountain Bar & Grill has made more than just cosmetic changes to the site.

The outdoor patio has been expanded, an RV site is under development as well as the conversion of the upstairs into a family restaurant/conference centre.

"We get requests for family dining almost daily."

For five people, who openly admit their experience in this sort of business is minimal, they have come a long way.

"It's as if we've had ten years of experience crammed into one," says Montgomery.

She says they have learned a lot about running a business, life experience and other valuable skills.

"We've learned more in one year than most probably have in four years of university."

Suo-Anttila agrees, "It seems like it, yeah."

Staffing is key to the success of any business and Copper Mountain Bar & Grill is no exception.

The business has a total of 14 on staff - six in the kitchen alone.

"We're happy with the people we have here."

Montgomery adds, "We have a staff where we all get along and they work well together."

The recently expanded menu and late kitchen hours was meant to address local needs.

The group also firmly believes in the importance of giving back to the community.

Fundraisers have been hosted for Princeton MotorSports Association and the Business Enhancement Association uses the upstairs for regular meetings.

They've also participated in Princeton Rodeo Club events and other non-profit activities.

"There's been a lot of progress," Suo-Anttila says about the past year.

"It's like a baby," says Montgomery. "You can't just leave it, it always requires attention."

To celebrate their first year in business, the pub will host Blue Sky Flyer on Labour Day Weekend.

"It's our way of thanking Princeton for the support when we came here and for continuing to support us."

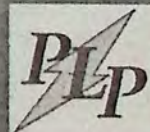

Trans-Canada Trail inspires cyclist

What is it about steel wheels on steel rails that stirs the imagination within us? Growing up in White Rock, trains are a natural backdrop to day-to-day life. Omnipresent trains passing through several times day and night, warning whistles extending through neighbourhoods long-acquainted to the wail, to the extent it takes an outsider to redraw your attention to the sound you have grown oblivious to after so many years. Standing on the beach, feeling the power and thunder of massive steel on rail, reawakens the dream of far away places and adventures to be discovered. Two steel rails stretching as far as the eye can see and the allure of what lies beyond. All that is missing is the steady chugga-chug and the thick black smoke. Let the quest begin - time to hit the trail.

A peaceful night in Summerland before our journey begins. Part of the preparation was a stop at Summerland's Visitor Information Centre to pick up one of their detailed maps on the Summerland portion of the Trail and find a spot to stay for the night. There are 17 Bed & Breakfast's, 3 Campgrounds and 3 motels in Summerland - complete information on accommodation facilities and restaurants can be obtained at the Info Centre.

The Rosedale Motel got us started in a comfortable room, all the helpful info and tips we could assimilate before starting the trip included for the asking. You can pick-up a trail lunch around the corner at Yaki's -- the best subs to go -- not forgetting to pack some of the local fruit. There is also take out Deli-style sandwiches and lunches available at an array of restaurants in Summerland's quaint Tudor Style downtown.

The trip starts with the Kettle Valley Steam Railway in Summerland. Yes, a real steam train journey on the only remaining 10-kilometre portion of the historic Kettle Valley Railway built from 1910 to 1915. Finding our way to Prairie Valley Station via Prairie Valley Road, keeping a close eye on the signage, we leave our vehicle in the lot behind the station for the days of our journey, then all aboard for a 90 minute round-trip. The trail ride is optional - but the scenic ride through a small part of Kettle Valley history will put your trail ride well on the rails to some wonderful memories.

On our return to the station, the KVR / Tran Canada Trail is waiting. We bike down Fenwick Road to the rodeo grounds just a short distance from the station. Those wishing to shorten the distance on bike might consider having Summerland Taxi picking them and their bikes up in the parking lot for drop-off at Faulder Station (that should take 10 km off the trip).

We are prepared for the trail with plenty of water, food and supplies, as the first overnight accommodations are 55 km away, either at Osprey Lake or Chain Lake. There are no services for the next 55 km and you will lose your cell phone service about 6 km out of Summerland until Princeton, which is 95 km

away. The Princeton Summerland Road is close by and crosses the trail a couple of times. I saw the forest patrol drive by no less than three times in the 6 hours of biking towards our stop for the night.

The north end of Thirsk Lake (40 km) has a beautiful beach area where we planned to have lunch, we were greeted by some nude sunbathers on our arrival and opted for a different view point further on down the lake. The lake is surrounded by tall evergreens so finding a table in the shade was no problem.

Next stop, post-card perfect, Osprey Lake, so pretty as we bike across the wooden bridge towards the lake. On the edge of the lake-side community was a street sign declaring this part of the trail as the Right Way and the entrance to a beautiful ranch and home to Mark and Bettina's Wong's Gallery, as the Wong Way. Kind of prophetic considering after so many kilometers with no signage, it's reassuring to know you are going the right way out here, as we did go the wrong way more than once. (Part 2 Next Week)

- 4 lb. chuck pot roast
- 1/4 cup water
- 1 cup sliced onion
- 1/2 cup chopped turnip
- 1/2 cup sliced carrots
- 1/4 cup sliced celery
- 3 tbsp. chopped parsley
- 1/2 cup frozen peas
- 1 small can sliced, drained mushrooms

Brown meat in a small amount of shortening. Season with salt and pepper. Place rack under meat and add water and onions. Simmer for 3 1/2 hours. Add vegetables except mushrooms. Simmer for 30 minutes longer or until vegetables are tender. Thicken liquid if a thick gravy is desired. Add mushrooms.

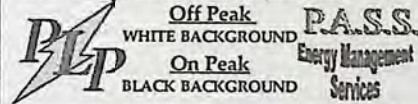

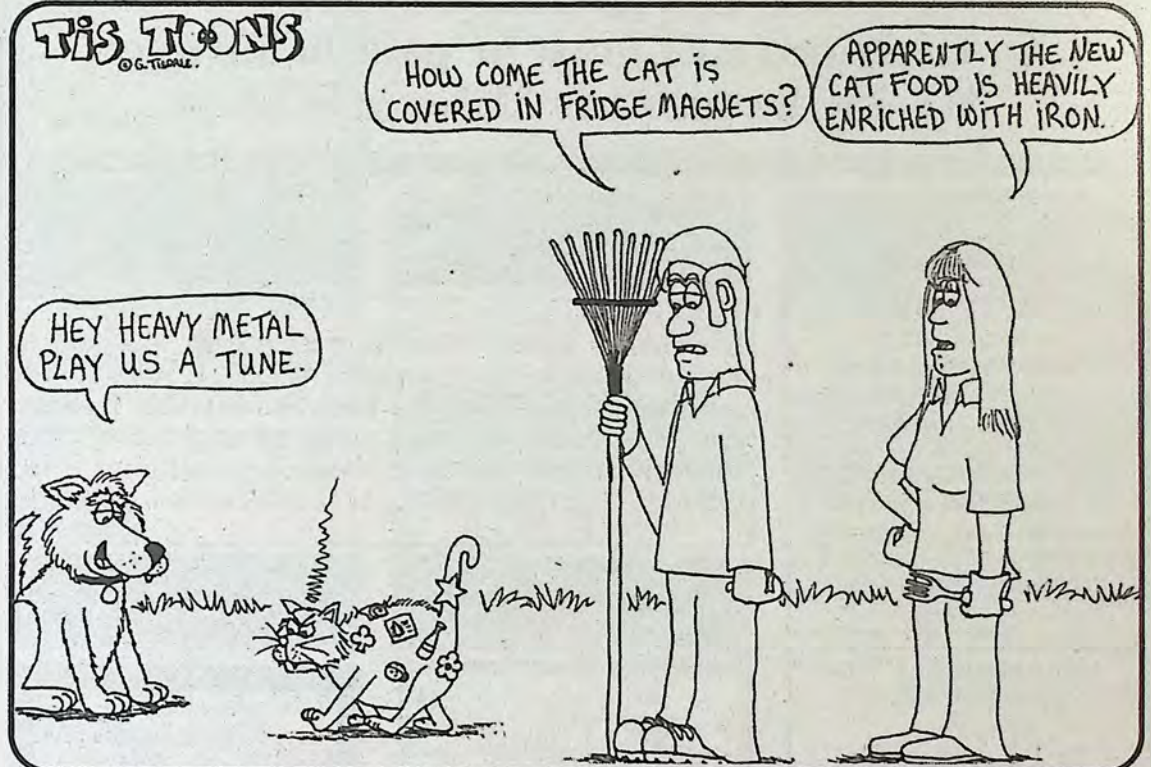

Some questions need answers now

People in our community give me a variety of information sources about the attack on the World Trade Center, now known as 9/11. The latest source is Global Outlook, a magazine published in Canada but aimed at a U.S. reader. It is openly critical of "official" truths about 9/11. An article titled "26 Top Anomalies of 9/11" is worth reading.

In past columns, I raised a few of these anomalies, but I was especially interested in Global Outlook's facts and questions about the buildings in 9/11. We can speculate about politics and lies, but buildings are a truth in solid form.

The official story of the collapse of the World Trade Center

buildings is that the extreme heat of the fire weakened the support structure and they "pancaked". The Global Outlook article points out that the 62 story First International Bank of L.A. and Meridian Plaza in Philadelphia were skyscrapers that burned for hours and did not collapse. The World Trade Center buildings are the first to "pancake" from a fire. However, and get this: Building 6 of the World Trade Center burned for several hours after being hit with debris from the towers, but it did not collapse! Why not - it was built the same way.

The same day, Building 7 of the World Trade Center was reported on fire at 3:00 p.m. on Floors 7 and 12, and it did collapse even though it had not been hit by any planes or debris! Why? Coincidentally, this building housed the offices of FBI, CIA, Secret Service, Internal Revenue

When the buildings collapsed, they did so at the speed of gravity. According to the laws of physics, there should have been several seconds elapse as an upper floor collapsed onto the one below it, because the lower floor would offer the resistance of all of the floors below it. If all of the lower floors had been burning, this would have made sense, but the fire on the upper floors was actually reducing pressure to the lower floors by reducing weight. The first set of new Katimavik participants (five men and six women) will be welcomed at a social event set for Tuesday, September 7th at 3:30 PM at New Beginnings.

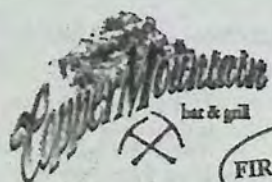
The event is open to the public.

Later in the evening, an east-bound vehicle also failed to negotiate a curve and rolled into the ditch near Sunday Summit.

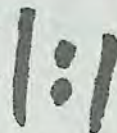
The vehicle was seriously damaged.

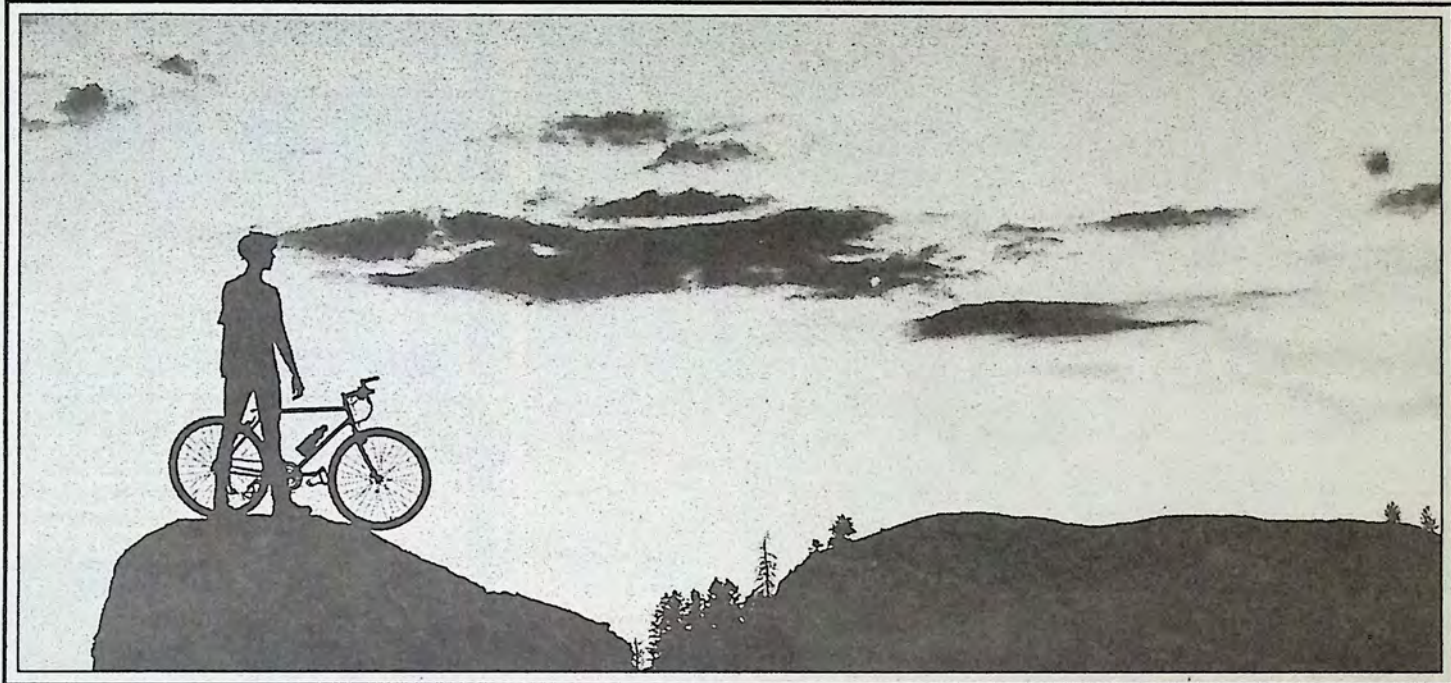
