\$4.2 million to be fed into trail network

The Province and community partners will invest \$4.2-million to launch a new Spirit of 2010 Trail network that will link 18 B. C. communities through converted recreational rail corridors, creating new jobs and increasing tourism.

The announcement was made late Friday, August 27th in Penticton by Premier Gordon Campbell and the Honourable Stephen Owen, Minister of Western Economic Diversification and Minister of State (Sport).

"Tourists and communities alike will gain from this world-class trail network," said Owen.

"Community-led investments like these today mean lasting social, environmental and economic opportunities tomorrow. The governments of Canada and B. C. are working together to lay the foundation for a strong, sustainable future in B. C."

"The Spirit of 2010 Trail will be a lasting legacy for B. C. that will increase tourism and create new jobs, while also promoting physical activity and preserving local history," said Campbell.

"Working together with the federal government and communities, we are establishing a new, upgraded trail network that will open up our world-class tourism attractions and help attract new visitors from across the globe."

The Government of Canada, through Western Economic Diversification Canada, is providing \$2.1-million through the Softwood Industry Community Economic Adjustment Initiative. This initiative helps forest-dependent communities that were affected by the U. S. softwood lumber tariffs. The program helps communities create opportunities for economic development that

Although the Highways Ministry is a provincial body, the federal MP offered a common sense, grass roots suggestion.

will stimulate investment and job creation. The province and its partners, including Tourism British Columbia and four regional districts, will contribute a total of \$1.65-million. The Trans-Canada Trail Foundation is providing the remaining \$415,000.

"The Spirit of 2010 Trail is a great new tourism asset that perfectly embodies the Super, Natural British Columbia brand," said Mike Duggan, chair of Tourism British Columbia.

"It's a very marketable product that is sure to stimulate new visitor activity across all the tourism regions it touches."

The Spirit of 2010 Trail network encompasses approximately 700 kilometres of existing rail corridors that cross the Central Kootenays, Kootenay Boundary, Okanagan Similkameen and Cowichan Valley regional districts.

The four trails to be improved as part of the Spirit of 2010 Trail network are:

Kettle Valley Railroad Rail Trail: Brodie Station to Princeton; Princeton to Summerland; Penticton to June Springs; Myra Station to Beaverdell; Beaverdell to Rock Creek; Rock Creek to Midway; Midway to Grand Forks; Grand Forks to Christina Lake; Christina Lake to Castlegar.

Slocan Rail Trail: South Slocan to Slocan.

Salmo - Troupe Rail Trail: Ymir/Nelson/Troupe.

Cowichan Valley Rail Trail: Lake Cowichan to Shawnigan Lake.

Funds from the partnership will support improvements such as culvert repairs, rock scaling, tunnel assessment, trailhead development, trestle decking and railings, new bridge construction, trail surfacing, community access and signage.

Trail improvements and related construction are expected to be complete by the Spring of 2005.

The trails will be accessible for activities such as cycling, hiking, horseback riding and nordic skiing. Based on benefits created by other rails-to-trails projects elsewhere in North America, the Spirit of 2010 Trail network is expected to create up to 250 jobs over five years as well as increased tourism spending.

Federal funding for this initiative was provided for in the March 2004 budget.

Logan issues challenge

The long-awaited announcement has been made to launch the new Spirit of 2010 Trail and that 4.2-million dollars is being invested into 18 communities and four regional districts.

Almost 1.4 million of that will be injected into the Princeton economy.

I am urging the people of Princeton and area to take a keen interest in what will be happening here in the next year while the upgrading project is undertaken.

We have a project coordinator, Leslie Leong who is working with the Vermilion Trails Society on the environmental assessment and the project management plan.

There will be jobs and I have been promised that it will be local businesses and local people who will benefit. Not to be overlooked is the ripple effect of economic development that will arise from this project.

I am not suggesting that we should be anticipating new businesses flowing into town but rather to be supporting and enhancing what we have here already.

Business owners in this area have worked hard in the last few years to stay viable under the economic downturns we have faced but there is light at the end of the tunnel. And I am sure that the business community will respond to this challenge.

With promotion and advertising assistance from Tourism BC our Trail will be marketed worldwide and we had better be ready. We need to focus on what we already have, what can be added to present ourselves in the best possible light.

Other communities have already begun to ramp up their marketing with first class websites and marketing materials.

We should not be far behind.

Princeton has always been based on resources and it is clear to me that surrounding us is our finest resource. The outstanding wilderness, lakes, rivers, open rangelands and spectacular air and water quality is what we have to show to the world.

Pepperfest turns up sear factor

One of the most popular events held during Similkameen Sizzle is the annual Pepper Eating Contest.

Partway through a day long celebration of peppers on Saturday, September 18th will be the "Sear Factor" contest which will crown the Champion Pepper Eater.

"This year we have adopted an Olympic theme and will include three different competitions to

determine the Gold, Silver and Bronze medallists," explains Sizzle committee member George Elliott.

The first event is called "Swimming for Chilies" and will involve contestants digging chili peppers out of a kiddie pool full of squashed tomatoes.

Each contestant will attempt this feat individually and will have 30 seconds to pull out as many chili peppers as the can.

The second contest is the Pepper Sprint.

Contestants will have thirty seconds to transfer chili peppers from one end of a table to the other using only their teeth.

"The number of chili peppers successfully transferred is very important as it will determine the scoring of each participant."

The third and final contest is called "The Big Gulp" and will involve the consumption of jalapeno peppers.

"We used habaneros last year, but they were just too much for some contestants," says Elliott.

"We want this to be a contest, but a fun event as well."

The fastest three finishers will be awarded a variety of prizes.

Prizes for First-Place include a single night B&B stay for two at Saddleback Lodge on Apex Mountain and a First Place Medal donated by Sierra Trophies and Similkameen News Leader.

Second Place will be awarded with a Mascot Mine Tour package from Upper Similkameen Indian Band, two limited edition coffee mugs from the News Leader and a Medal donated by Sierra Trophies in Penticton.

Third Place will win \$50 cash donated by Maurice Parsons and a medal from Sierra Trophies.

Entry fee for the Sear Factor Pepper Eating Contest is \$5.00 and the age limit is set at 18 and older.

The event will start at 4:00 PM.

"It's a fun and crazy event I'm very glad to be a part of," Elliott says.

"The committee has been very supportive of the changes made to Sear Factor to try to keep it fun as well as entertaining for spectators."

Entries will be accepted all day at Memorial Park leading up to the Pepper Eating Contest.

The fair gates open at 8:30 Saturday morning, but the exhibits buildings do not open and bingo does not start until 10:00 a.m. The gates will be open for the convenience of vendors and people setting up displays.

Reunion welcomes mountain dwellers

This weekend offers more than the Fall Fair. A special group of people will gather together to renew friendships and remember places they lived - Copper Mountain and Allenby. These two thriving mining communities no longer exist, but they had a long history and left an impression on the lives of thousands of people. They were "home town" to most of the people coming to Princeton this weekend. Many of the photos from those days will be on display at the reunion, and many artifacts, including curling trophies, are

on display at Princeton Museum, along with the front hall drawing of the mine workings. The two communities were inseparable from Granby Mining Corporation, as these were "company" towns. Granby was a pretty good mining company to work for, providing such things as a community hall, store, bunkhouses, homes, electricity, and even a swimming pool at Copper Mountain (Allenby folks had the Similkameen River). The copper deposits were discovered in the 1880's by James Joseph Jameson and his son, Jim, who were pioneers of the area. The first to stake claims on Copper Mountain was R.A. "Sunset" Brown. Around 1900, Granby was mining and smelting copper in Phoenix and Greenwood, two B.C. towns located near the international boundary between Midway and Grand Forks. The market for copper was good, and the company took an interest in developing Copper Mountain. This was no easy task, as it involved building a railroad to the mine, building accommodations for miners and their families, as well as doing the actual mining down in the "glory hole" (this was shaft mining). Allenby was the location of the concentrator, where the ore was ground fine and the metal extracted (gold in the ore often covered the payroll). Many of the methods developed at Copper Mountain for handling low-grade ore were leading edge examples for future mines. The people working at Copper Mountain and Allenby were clever and innovative. The mine, when built, operated for four years, 1926 to 1930, when it shut down due to the

Great Depression. It re-opened in 1936 and continued operation until 1957, when it closed its doors. Houses were moved to Princeton and Greenwood, and a lot of buildings were simply torn down and scrapped. 1958 was one of the saddest years, as mining families moved to other mines. There were many sad partings of friends and family members during that time. In 1968, copper prices were good again, and Newmont Mines took an interest in the property. By 1969, a mill was under construction and areas were cleared for open pit mining at Copper Mountain. Newmont operated the mine until 1986, when a new company took over... Similco Mines, a subsidiary of Imperial Metals and Mitsubishi. A new subdivision opened in Princeton to house the mining families, and many of the former Copper Mountain and Allenby miners came "home" to work at Newmont and Similco. Similco began a gradual shut-down in 1996, and has remained closed, although the mill building is still standing. Compliance Coal operates a cleaning plant on the property, and Envirogreen Technologies, an earth decontamination facility, has operated at the top of the hill for many years. The last of the children to live in Copper Mountain or Allenby are grandparents now, but the memory of shared good times and tough times, and good friends, lingers on and draws them together again. As both company towns are gone now, Princeton is as close as they come to "home town". When you see them on the street, give them a smile and welcome them home again.

Living Past 100

Pears are peerless cholesterol fighters

Hate that bran? When you live so close to excellent pears, switch to pears. They will provide you with just as much fibre as bran, and they taste a whole lot better. One single pear contains five grams of fibre, which is a lot. Better still, 80 percent of that fibre is insoluble, which makes it even better. The fibre in pears fights cholesterol, and keeps your digestive tract healthy.

Many people find they bloat on oat and wheat bran, and their gut feels upset much of the time while they fight cholesterol and/or irregularity. Eat two pears a day and you will feel a lot better. Eat them fresh when possible, and ignore those funny brown spots on the skins. They do not affect the quality of the pear. If you are able to preserve the pears, do so, and have a pear every day. You can make pear sauce and pear butter, too. You can have baked pears, pear pie, or pureed pears on pork or poultry. You can use pureed pears in muffins, pancakes or waffles, and cut down on sugar. You can use preserved pear sauce in the same way.

When you buy pears, remember they ripen from the inside out, so you don't want them soft on the outside. To preserve pears, buy firm, unripe pears. To test for ripeness, press gently at the stem end. If it gives a bit, it's perfect.

Pear season has begun and will last into November at local fruit stands. Be sure you get your share.

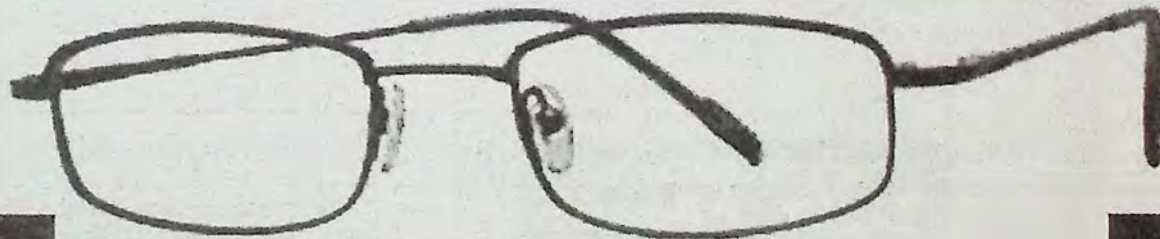

A copy of Cycling Kettle Valley Railway by Dan and Sandra Langford is a must-read.

We understood why when we hit Kathleen Creek and there is no bridge! The book describes how to reroute. For the history buffs Steel Rails & Iron Men by Barrie Sanford is a terrific read about the history of a Canadian railway.

At Bankier, the end of Link Lake, we pull up at Three Lakes Store (restaurant, liquor store, post office, library, city hall and payphone) - unabashedly declaring itself as the Home of Elvis! This was definitely worth further investigation. Not only was there no Elvis, there was no food, or refreshment of any kind, no services and definitely no LATTE!

I can now relate the feeling one might have crossing the Sahara, only to find out the oasis that has been pulling you along is in reality a mirage. Remember to bring spare change to call Les at the Jellicoe Station B & B from the payphone, as he would happily pick you up from the store saving you another 3k. The property does boast a For Sale sign with a local realtor, the only restaurant and store within a 100 mile radius is available for a mere \$240,000 - is opportunity knocking? Viva Three Lakes!

As we forgot to bring a quarter we had to cycle the final 3 km of the day, and were met at the Trail by Les Sirokai, who with his wife

Darleen are the owners of Jellicoe Station Inn B&B.

The driveway to their place is 2 km straight up the hillside, and the courtesy ride was much appreciated. The original Jellicoe Station was a rail stop. Named after Admiral Jellicoe of the Naval Battle at Jutland fame in World War One, the original building has been destroyed by vandals. The B&B is situated almost directly above the original building. As we pulled into the complex, we were amazed by the home and outbuildings.

Les and Darleen have spent 7 years hand building a 4,000 sq ft home, cabins and outdoor cabana. We had pre-arranged the dinner package, and watched Darleen collect produce directly from the garden and prepare our meal while exchanging sore butt remedies with other cycling guests.

Virtually everything was either hand canned or fresh, from sauces to pickled vegetables, and complimented with homemade bread and dessert. Even the wine was hand bottled. Joined by other guests at the table the conversation was lively. We felt like family heartily wel-

comed. During our stay, we met with Rick Hudson of Kettle Valley Scenic ATV Excursions.

Jim and I were both intrigued by the prospect of getting off the beaten track and going for a backwoods excursion by quad. We may book an excursion in the near future, and pass on our experience. We also discovered that Rick offers a full cyclist and vehicle shuttle service. We had no idea of the logistics involved. Putting people and vehicles back together is definitely part of the challenge of cycling the Kettle Valley Trail.

Originally we had assumed we would cycle back to Summerland and our parked car, but instead arranged with Rick to pick us up in Princeton, allowing us to complete the entire section of the trail.

The morning was beautiful and sunny as we joined other guests (a couple from Whistler, and 4 of us from Surrey) for a breakfast of fresh fruit, pancakes, eggs, bacon, and coffee (so good - must be the water) and fresh apple juice proudly made and served by Les.

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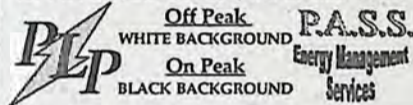

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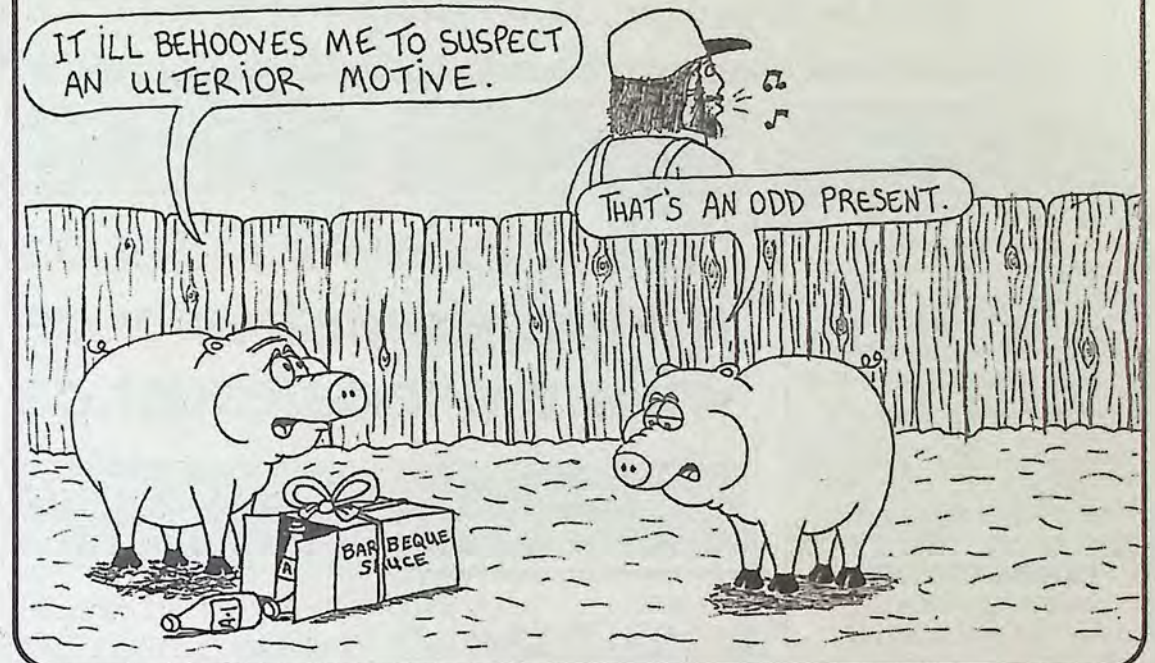

Resident begs for deer solution

Dear Editor;

Oh Deer! Oh Deer!

This intent of this letter is to hopefully raise the awareness of residents feeding the deer. As well, to add perspective to damage, safety and health issues which surround wildlife in a community and residential areas.

Yes, there are divided opinions about the deer that roam. Some residents love them, some find them an extreme nuisance because of the havoc they create. We can debate the deer problem until we are blue in the face, however that does not solve the problem. We must take deer management measures. I believe educating the public is the first step. We have many new residents who have moved here from the coast and are fascinated by these lovely creatures and

are feeding them. Previously deer grazing was a beautiful sight, but they have now taken over and deer on your property means damage to gardens, flowers and shrubs, causing not only frustration in terms of expense, time and energy. Our gardens have become a free "all you can eat restaurant" with many menu choices 24 hours a day for deer.

So when and how did the problem begin? Some will argue we have taken over their habitat - NOT SO! We have lived here for nearly 60 years and wildlife was never a problem until 12 or 13 years ago, when good-hearted souls began feeding them.

Now let's examine the big picture. Deer are wild animals, not pets, and feeding them destroys their natural instinct for survival. They have no

fear of people and some have become very aggressive and, yes, they have attacked people and pets. Several years ago they nearly killed our small dog in an attack on our patio. If I had not been outside and chased the deer away, they would have killed him. I know of four dogs that they have maimed recently. Then there is the health issue - Lyme disease is a public health concern, especially in areas where there is an increased deer population. It is transmitted to humans by the bite of ticks who feed on deer. One wonders about deer droppings on our properties. Could they be a source of E-coli as we recently saw on the news at a petting zoo?

Soon we will have problems with predators like coyotes and cougars who follow the deer. Our two small grandsons often play outside. Now we have to be concerned for their safety not only from the deer but the predators looking for dinners. Our property and gardens whether big, small or somewhere in between, should be our sanctuaries, a place where stress is left at the gate as we can enjoy our lives in a pleasant and safe environment - not so in Princeton. Each year the deer herds get bigger as the fawns are born in our residential areas. One wonders what will the deer population be in 10-15 years if deer management measures are not taken now. I'm sure there are humane options for controlling deer. I'm asking you, please consider all these factors and stop feeding the deer.

Dentist says professionals won't come here

Dear People;

I write this letter out of concern for what is happening to our area. As you may or may not know, I am now entering my thirty-third year of dental practice in Princeton. When I first arrived, in June 1972, I was asked by Laurie Currie, Editor of the Similkameen Spotlight, to give a talk to the Rotary Club. During that talk, I expressed my surprise that Princeton did not have a community center, and made the remark, "How can you have a community without a community center?"

I told Rotary Club members if they did not build such a facility, the community would have a difficult time bringing new professionals to our area, as young ones would not raise their children in a town without an indoor pool complex. Thirty-two years later, this is becoming a reality as we, the medical team in this town, cannot recruit replacements and a number of us are beginning to suffer from burnout because of

excess demand for our services. Approximately 15 years ago a committee was formed in town and a public referendum was held in regard to building such a facility, almost an exact replica of one now in place in Merritt. The vote was 57 percent in favour in Princeton and 53 percent in Area H. Because provincial law requires a 55 percent majority (not an average) the center was turned down. It was to cost Princeton taxpayers approximately \$45 per year and Area H residents about \$75 a year. We also lost a \$450,000 grant from the BC Lotto fund.

As one of your medical team who is coming up to retirement age, I think the citizens of the area should sit back and examine what the loss of this type of facility is doing to our community.

Look at your doctors - one is Canadian trained and has been in practice here longer than I have, is now working part time, and will retire soon. Our other physicians have been recruited from

Great Britain and South Africa. It is becoming very difficult to bring foreign trained professionals into Canada today. Ask them how long they are planning to stay here. Will the younger ones stay here and raise their families?

Look at our other dentist, recruited by me from the USA many years ago. How many years will he continue to practice here before he retires?

We, the owners of these medical and dental practices, cannot even sell them because our locally trained professionals will not come here because of the lack of facilities. Look at our British trained physiotherapist who has been here for 30 years. How will we replace her when she retires?

Look at your nurses and teachers and pharmacists, many of them coming to retirement age. Do you really want to drive to a larger town for these services in the future?

swim. It is a place that helps a community become healthy, and when we look around Princeton it sure needs something to increase the health of its citizens, young and old. Obesity is increasing along with other social problems.

An indoor pool-sauna-hot tub complex provides a meeting place for young and old, mainly during those cold winter times when everyone remains indoors. It is a place where people of all ages and physical conditions can exercise in a non-stressful environment where it is warm. Let's face it, Canada has more than enough forms of cold recreation.

Many will ask "How can we afford to build such a center?"

I ask, "How can we afford not to?"

Look around you at your town, Princetonites. It is time for change and now is the time to start making those changes. So how do we do it?

1. Location - an ideal site is available in the old Argo service yard. It is centrally located, large enough to hold a pool complex and future relocation of the curling rink and arena to reduce upkeep. It is also next to the highway to attract drive-by business.

2. Funding - Princeton has a Community Forest fund that has been in place for a number of years and has been managed by the Town and Weyerhaeuser. Word has it that it produces between \$200-250,000 a year for use by all of the citizens of Princeton. Now is the time those funds should be publicly disclosed and audited for each year since it was started so we can all know what is left in the fund and where monies have been used to date.

3. Service Clubs - Rotary, Lions, Legion, Old Age Clubs could work together on a combined fund-raising project.

4. Local Citizens - the Merritt pool has had lots of donations by its citizens

5. Local businesses - machinery and labour.

Weyerhaeuser Foundation - because so many industrial injuries involve back problems, I'm sure it would decrease their WCB bill if their employees had a pool. Many injuries are treated with swimming type exercises.

6. Princeton Rocks - perhaps the Forestry fund can help finance this festival to bring in bigger name performers to increase profits to the town, for example Bryan Adams or Nellie Furtado or Sarah McLaughlan.

7. Federal Funds - allocated to areas in need when major employers shut down (Similco Mine).

8. Provincial funds - Lotto BC. Maybe some of those millions of dollars in taxes from mining and forestry can be returned to us. A newspaper article recently stated that 20 percent of rural BC produces 80 percent of the export revenue of B.C. We want some of that money back now.

The time has come for Princeton to stop focusing on the race track area unless it is used as a venue to produce profit for the community. I'm sure if someone goes through the local papers and adds up the grants over the last 32 years, close to one million dollars will have been invested for use by a very few on few days of the year, unlike a community center. No doubt, the City of Merritt would provide us with their pool plans and maintenance costs per year.

So what would we do in the future with the old arena and curling rink? I think the ideal situation is to use them as facilities to train people in the woodworking trades. Use Riverside School as a classroom area and use the arena as an indoor area to build log homes or modular homes, for example. I'm sure lots of uses could be found.

Locals should also be aware that Weyerhaeuser is having a difficult time attracting trades people here

because there are few facilities for their families. Do we really want to give Weyerhaeuser a reason to close our mill and move it to a bigger place like Kamloops?

The upper Similkameen Valley is a great place to live, close to Penticton, Kelowna, Kamloops and Vancouver, good weather, lots of sunshine in the winter, great fishing, hunting, camping, bicycling, X-country skiing, and little air and water pollution. This is the kind of environment both families and retirees want to live in today. So let's get it together Princetonites, and make changes for the better, before it's too late.


Remember, 35 years ago, Whistler, B.C. was once nothing in the middle of nowhere and is now a world-class destination. Princeton has the potential, if we work together, to make a great place to live even better.

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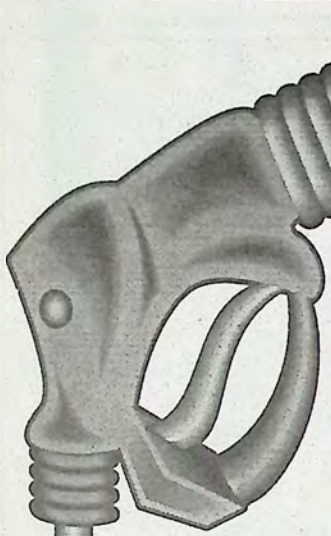
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
