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## Oldtimer crashes bike

A 74 year old man from Vancouver lost control of his motorcycle on September 2 while negotiating the curve at Whipsaw Bridge on Highway 3 west of Princeton. He was transported to Princeton General Hospital for treatment of undetermined injuries. RCMP say rain and slippery road surface were contributing factors in the collision.

## Speed causes Hedley crash

At 1:30 a.m. on August 28, a 38 year old man from Chilliwack lost control of his vehicle while traveling east on Highway 3 near Hedley. Investigation revealed that the vehicle was travelling well in excess of the posted speed limit causing the driver to lose control on a curve. The vehicle struck an embankment, a large rock, and then rolled over, coming to rest on its wheels.

The driver was taken to Princeton General Hospital where he was treated for injuries not life-threatening. He was issued a violation ticket for driving without due care and attention.

## Cool weather did not hurt Fall Fair

The 39th annual Princeton & District Agricultural Fall Fair will be remembered as another one of the best events held this year.

Early morning rain Saturday did little to dampen spirits as residents poured through the main gate all day Saturday and again on Sunday.

Both days were filled with activities from start to finish including childrens events, a pancake breakfast, bingo, demolition derby, chariot and chuckwagon races, live entertainment, a gymkhana, mechanical bullriding competition, vendors, educational and agricultural displays and demonstrations.

Events extended well into the evening Saturday with a concert featuring Jason Mitchell and his band.

There were also many exhibits and entries from area residents of produce, art, crafts and photography.

Entries in all categories, including the Junior Fair, appeared higher than in previous years which must have made judging very difficult at times.

The Fair board also did another fine job of pulling together many local businesses through event and activity sponsorships to help ease the cost of hosting the Fair.

Volunteer support was strong and well organized. Volunteers were also aided this year with members of the Katimavik program.

The Fall Fair Board will finish clean up this week and start planning for next year, which will be the 40th annual event.

## Wildlife Branch has no deer answers

Wildlife biologists Brian Harris and Steve Matthews had no sure solutions to deer problems in Princeton. The two Penticton men attended the September 7 Town Council meeting to hear the problem, but were obviously unprepared for the extent of the problems local residents described.

Harris began by offering some gardening tips on plants the deer would not eat, and told residents it is their responsibility to "discourage" deer from causing property damage. He had a brochure on protecting orchards from damage by deer.

When this was not the main concern, Harris appeared to be at a loss.

Mayor Keith Olsen asked if there was any program that would remove the deer.

Harris said there is no Wildlife Branch program to remove deer, and the only way to stop them is to stop feeding them.

Conservation Officer Al Lay itemized areas in town and noted people who feed deer in each area.

People attending the meeting asked Council for a bylaw mak-

ing it an offense to feed the deer, and asked for a heavy fine for violating the bylaw. The problem of enforcement rests with Al Lay, as the Town cannot enforce legislation dealing with wildlife, even within town boundaries.

Lay remarked that the people who feed the deer are not doing the deer any favours. "You have to realize these are wild animals," he said in response to a number of instances of people having safety concerns about aggressive deer on their property.

## See jets this weekend

Beginning this Friday, Princeton will host the 2004 Jet and Scale Rally for remote controlled model aircraft. The competition will attract enthusiasts from the United States and Canada. Anyone wishing to watch the show is welcome to attend at Princeton Airport (south side entrance only).

This competition is sanctioned by the Model Aeronautics Association of Canada, and will feature the latest in turbine technology on display and in flight. The show is always interesting.

Spectators are advised to bring their own lawn chairs.

One local resident stated there is an individual who is actually taming the deer to the point where he hugs the deer as he feeds them. The biologists looked amazed, and Lay just shook his head. The Wildlife Branch will begin a public education program to tell why people should not feed the deer. Town Council will draft a bylaw making feeding of deer an offense. In the meantime, local residents are asked to do what they can to keep deer off their property.

Refreshments will be available on site. Dress appropriately for the weather as there will be no shelter provided.

## Rose clarifies Highway 5A truck issue

The Thompson-Nicola Regional District Director who wants truck traffic on Highway 5A curtailed, says he doesn't want to stop all trucks.

Mike Rose says local truckers have a right to use the route between Merritt and Kamloops.

“What I'd like to see is the long haul guys that don't need to be

on that highway, like the guys that are hauling through to Calgary; guys hauling from Vancouver to Calgary; Calgary to Vancouver, those are the guys I'd like to see using the Coquihalla.”

Rose adds, “The local truckers, guys from Merritt and Kamloops, (and Princeton) haul-

ing into this area up and down the valley, their paycheques are getting spent in the community and they have every right to use this road.”

Rose says the heavy truck traffic has become dangerous and he hopes the government will support his concerns.

## RCMP continue drug enforcement

Princeton RCMP located and dismantled two large and highly sophisticated outdoor marijuana grow operations last week.

These operations were located Thursday, September 9th on Crown Land in the 2900-block of Old Hedley Road.

In total, over 700 fully mature marijuana plants (some were over six feet in height) were seized.

In addition, police located \$10-thousand to \$20-thousand in equipment used to sustain the grow-op.

Although no arrests have been made, Princeton RCMP are following up on several leads and believe there are a number of people involved in these operations

who will be identified and arrested. Police investigation into these grow-ops continues.

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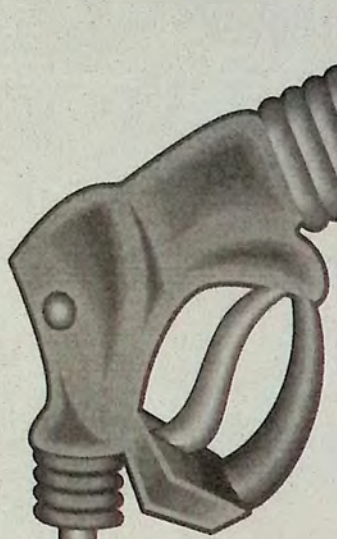

# Motorcycle crash closes highway

A spectacular crash shortly after 5:00 PM last Thursday evening held up traffic in both directions 2-kilometres south of Cawston on Highway 3.

A northbound car making a left turn onto Stewart Road was struck from behind by a motor-

cycle.

The force of the impact threw the motorcyclist more than 20-metres over the car and into the left-hand ditch, narrowly missing a utility pole.

The car had been struck with such force in the accident that it ended up on Stewart Road fac-

ing the opposite direction.

The operator of the motorcycle, Bert Elkin, a valley resident, sustained undetermined injuries.

The driver of the car, Andrew Mennel of Cawston, and his unidentified passenger, were unhurt.

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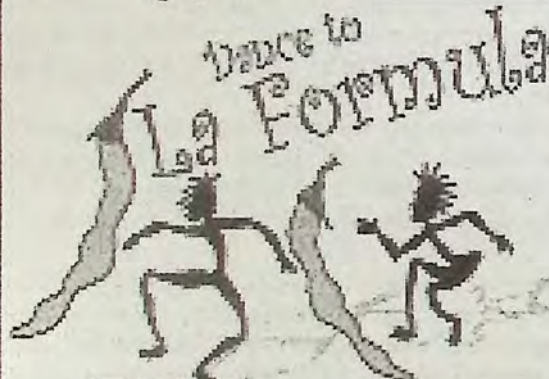

## RCMP deal with heavy traffic

On August 14, at approximately 9:50 p.m., Princeton RCMP attended a two vehicle collision on Princeton Summerland Road. As a result of their investigation, a 59 year old man from Princeton faces charges of impaired driving. At 5:00 a.m. on August 19, emergency personnel from Princeton were called to a single motor vehicle accident on Highway 3 around 17 km. east of Princeton.

Investigation revealed that the 22 year old driver fell asleep while driving eastbound. The vehicle went off the highway to the left where it struck some trees and overturned.

The driver, along with a 17 year old male passenger and two children were transported to Princeton General Hospital where they received treatment of minor injuries.

On August 20, around 1:00 a.m., the driver of a tractor trailer unit lost control while travelling on Highway 3 at a location 45 km. west of Princeton. The truck overturned and the load of lumber was strewn across the highway. The highway was closed for a short period of time until a path could be cleared through the debris. The driver was not injured.

What most people know about peppers is that they taste good and add a spicy taste to a lot of foods. What most people do not know is that peppers are good nutrition and should be eaten frequently, just for the Vitamin C. One green pepper contains more Vitamin C than a cup of orange juice!

Red peppers contain even more good nutrients, including Vitamin A and lycopene, that nutrient that prevents deterioration of the eyes. Peppers are loaded with beta-carotene, so if you hate broccoli, switch to peppers to protect your eyes and your immune system.

What else do peppers do? They improve digestion, stop bleeding from ulcers, are good for the kidneys, spleen, lungs, pancreas, heart and combat rheumatism, arthritis and pleurisy. If you ever have shingles, make a strong tea of cayenne pepper and use it as a poultice on the shingles to ease the pain.

In the meantime, go to Keremeos and Cawston and pick up your favourite peppers. From Mrs. Parsons, here's a trick to keeping peppers to spice up your winter meals. Buy the freshest, nicest peppers and cut into bite-size pieces. Spread on a cookie sheet and freeze. When frozen, gather the pieces into freezer bags and use in soups, stews, corn or whatever all winter. This works like a charm and almost no flavour is lost.

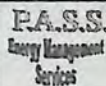

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## Landfill Kitten Fund established

Bob and Colleen Hughes of Tulameen started rescuing abandoned kittens from the Princeton Landfill site last October.

"We were worried about them freezing," Colleen says.

What started as an attempt to keep the forgotten kittens from dying in the cold of Winter has turned into a full-time project.

"We've been bringing them home, taming them and feeding them," Bob explains.

Out of all the kittens they have been able to catch, a total of 21 have survived.

There's no real estimate of how many cats have made the Landfill site their home, but the Hughes' suspect some of the felines have been left there by owners who have decided they either could not take care of them, or just no longer wanted the responsibility of raising a small animal.

The cats have taken up residence in the pile of tires at the Landfill site and are now getting to the age where they need to be spayed or neutered.

"We're also trying to find homes for them," says Bob.

As the Hughes' have been providing food and shelter for the kittens they will not be able to cover the costs of spaying and neutering.

The couple recently approached Town Council for some financial help, but were turned down.

"They're not interested in the problem although it started in their dump," Bob says.

Private food donations have helped ease the financial pressure on the Hughes', who are quick to point out Princeton Mayor Keith Olsen has been providing some food.

The couple are in the process of establishing the Landfill Kitten Fund.

Cash donations can be dropped

off at Dr. Gill's Vet Office on Vermilion Avenue for the fund.

The donations will go towards a spay and neuter program for the rescued kittens.

Not all of the kittens have been

captured as Bob and Colleen continue to pick a couple up per week.

"If we can get it down to zero, we won't have to worry as the problem will be gone," Bob says.

## New suicide prevention service launched

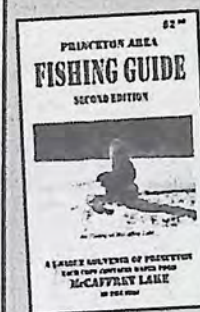


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# Trans-Canada Trail inspires cyclist

| 6 3/4 cups all-purpose flour             | 2 tbsp. sugar               |
| 2 1/2 cups shredded sharp cheddar cheese | 2 tsp. salt                 |
| 4 to 6 tbsp. chopped jalapeno peppers    | 2 packages active dry yeast |
| 2 cups hottest tap water                 |                             |

Set aside 1 cup flour. In large bowl, mix remaining flour, cheese, jalapeno peppers, sugar, salt and yeast; stir in hot water. Mix in only enough reserved flour to make soft dough. On lightly floured surface, knead dough until smooth and elastic, about 8 to 10 minutes. Cover; let rest 10 minutes. Divide dough in half; shape into 2 balls. Place in two greased 1 1/2 quart casseroles. Cover; let rise in warm draft free place until doubled in size, about 40 to 50 minutes. Bake in preheated 350 degree oven 30 to 35 minutes, or until done. Remove bread from casseroles; cool on wire rack. Makes 2 loaves.

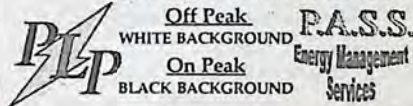

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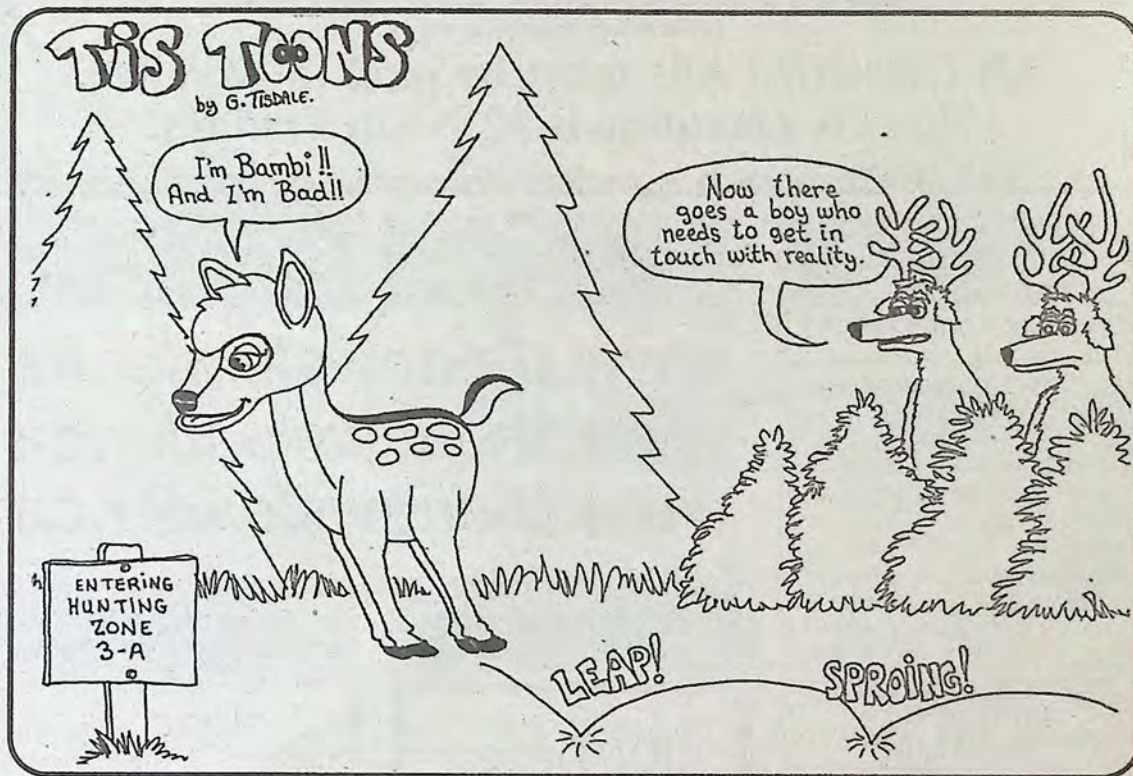

because the four are liable to define the coming debates among the 160 during the following months.

That is, til December, when a precise choice will be framed. That choice will be the basis for the earth-shaking referendum held on the same day as the next provincial election, May 17, 2005.

These four alternatives are:

- 1) The current voting system in New Zealand (Mixed Member Proportional). A key feature seldom mentioned about that system is that it's at the high end of its type. Fully 46 percent of their House is elected by proportional representation (the highest known anywhere within that "mixed type" is 50 percent).
- 2) The Status quo (no change from B.C.'s present system). The argument here - to be presented by Jim Nielsen, a former Social Credit cabinet minister - has been that what we have now is well-known and probably less risky than any alternatives.
- 3) The "Alternate Vote" used in the Australian Lower House. It

was used here in B.C. in the famous election of 1952.

4) The Irish system, called STV (Single Transferable Vote). Because of its unique features, it was chosen by the authors of the Charlottetown Accord for the proposed Elected Canadian Senate. It is also used currently for the Australian Senate.

The unfortunate thing about all this is what is being left out: a super-lean form of the New Zealand system. That form would have one-eighth of our House at Victoria elected by P.R. That would mean just 10 seats instead of 37 under a copy of the New Zealand system.

The trouble is: will the 160 ever know of this super-lean alternative (it's the writer's submission in August) before they hold their crucial debates this fall?

# Outgoing money keeps Similkameen poor

sending it out again.

Businesses in town send a lot of money out, too. They spend it to bring in goods and services to our community. When they sell the products here, some of the money sticks here.

Ideally, we make the money stick by buying here what is produced here. I know of two businesses where I can buy goods produced here and the money stays here. One is a furniture manufacturing business, Lendale Pine Furniture. If you buy furniture from them, you keep the entire transaction on home ground. Another product is Eagle Valley wood pellets, which I buy from a local retailer to use for cat litter (it's the cheapest cat litter you can buy). The money stays here.

We have a local bakery which produces good bread at a reasonable price, but we do not produce the flour locally. Even so, most of the money we spend at our local bakery stays here.

When it comes to shopping out of town, I make a point of adding \$30 to every purchase I make. Twenty dollars covers the cost of gasoline to go there, and \$10 is for lunch while I am there.

Lately, lunch for me and my husband has cost more, so I should add \$35 to my cost. It does not pay to shop out of town unless I cannot buy what I need in town, or at least in Keremeos.

I shop with another thought in mind: who owns the company? Does the owner live here in the valley? If I want my community to grow, if I want my property values to stay reasonable, and if I want shops and services to remain open here, then I have to think in terms of what good my money is doing my community. Each dollar I spend out of town may cost a job in Princeton.

When you look at the bills you pay each month, look at the direction your money is going. If you are not knowledgeable about the businesses you support, you may be sending it to places you don't want it to go.

There is a major department store in another community and I try never to shop at it. It is an American company which has lawsuits against it in the United States for violations of federal laws dealing with treatment of employees. In my mind, that puts two strikes against it. First, it is not Canadian, and second, it keeps prices low by violating laws for the protection of employees. Further, I tell my friends why I don't shop there.

So here's my way of scaling where I spend my money, in order of priority: 1. Is it manufactured here? 2. Is it locally owned? 3. Does the owner live here? 4. Is it Canadian?

How many of you spend like this?

A report done on the economy of the Similkameen Valley shows why the valley communities stay small and poor, especially the business sector. All the money flowing out of the valley keeps us poor. The money coming into the valley keeps population, and business, growing.

The money we earn comes primarily from forest industry businesses and agriculture, two basic resource industries. Tourism brings money into the valley, too, with even more money coming in now that Upper Similkameen Indian Band has opened tours to Mascot Mine.

One of the variables is consumer spending and outgoing tourism. For example, if you earn your living at a local industry, but most of your earnings are spent at a shopping mall in, for instance, Penticton, what you are creating is a negative flow of money. The company you work for may be bringing money in, but you are busy

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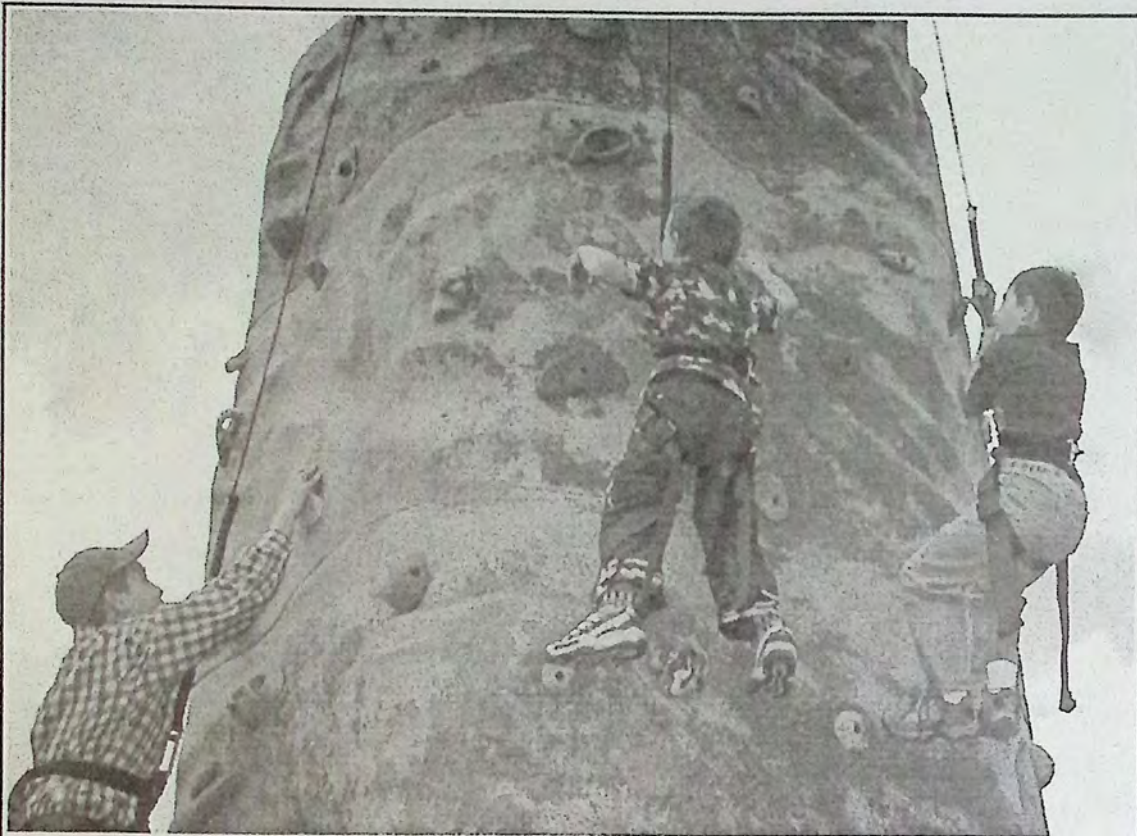

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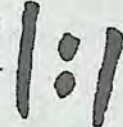

## ATV user upset with 2010 Trail

Dear Editor;

With the recent announcement of Tourism BC's \$4.2-million for the launching of a new Spirit of 2010 Trail network, we the motorized recreational sector wish to express our extreme displeasure and disappointment at the lack of involvement or participation in the decision making process, after receiving assurances from Don Foxgord that we would be included.

With the apparent banning of motorized use from the KVR railbed as per media release, maintenance will become an issue. Since the de-commissioning of the railbed, it has been the motorized recreational community that has done up keep and repair of said railbed free of charge. We have always been of the mind to share with all users but, it would appear the courtesy is not extended to us, the motorized sector.

With the announcement of the 2010 initiative on Friday, August 27, 2004, the exclusion of motorized recreation from Tourism BC's projection makes it glaringly apparent that we, the motorized sector, do not count, nor do we project any income into the economy. Statistics compiled for 2002 in Alberta show a direct expenditure associated with visitor spending and purchases attributed to off-highway vehicle and snowmobiles were estimated at \$649-million. These expenditures resulted in a

province-wide economic impact (value-added) of \$653-million to Alberta alone.

Over \$268-million (2002) in taxation revenues accrued to all three levels of government combined. The Federal share accounted for \$163-million, the Provincial share was \$79-million, the local governments province-wide share was \$26-million. Studies in other provinces (Ontario, New Brunswick) indicate that motorized recreation plays a vital part in the economic well being of the province, and the communities bordering a trail system.

Tourism BC and Trails BC apparently feel that the German tourist (their words) buying a bottle of expensive wine contributes more to the tourism industry than motorized sports can. When observing a given group preparing for a ride, and taking note of the trucks, trailers, ATV's, sleds, dirt bikes, etc. equipment, fuel purchases and food purchased locally, contributes to the well being of the local economy throughout the year. After looking at the above figures I would suggest motorized recreation has a great economic impact.

It is my firm belief that Tourism BC must include the motorized recreation sector in all discussion and planning for the use of our lands.
