Managers prepare lottery grant application

Jody Woodford, President of Princeton Exhibition Association, asked members to review the past year's events at the fairgrounds. John Bey, is preparing an application for a lottery grant to make major improvements to the grounds. During the past 40 years, nearly all building and maintenance has been done by volunteers, and large grants have been few and far between. Including this year's \$32,000 grant for showers, last year's \$50,000 grandstand roof repair, and grants to organizations using the grounds, it is doubtful whether the total of the grants is as much as \$250,000 in 40 years. Most of the money to operate the grounds has come from user groups and rentals of stall or other space.

The newest user group is Princeton Motorsports Association, which has three weekend events this year. Princeton Fire Department, according to Fire Chief Eric Gregson, uses the fire training facility 15 weeks a year, as well as putting on the annual Halloween Spook House party for children.

The year's events began in January with Sno-X, which will continue to use the new multi-track system during snowmobile races. The system, completed this year, provides for Sno-X, auto-X, mud bog, demolition derby and Moto-X. The final Moto-X event will take place October 2 and 3, and is the second to last event of the year.

The horse racing track continues to be used for training race horses and is currently in use for that purpose. However, thanks to John Bey, the track can be accessed from the rodeo arena for chuckwagon races. Princeton has one of the few facilities which can accommodate chuckwagon and chariot races, which are now part of the Fall Fair. Princeton Rocks, a first-time-out concert, used the grounds during the July long weekend. An ATV group used the grounds earlier this year, and the annual rodeo used the

Jet Rally attracts pilots to Princeton

Despite a rainy weekend, 30 ardent model aircraft pilots gathered at Princeton Airport last weekend and enjoyed three days of flying. The 2005 Jet and Scale Rally, held in memory of previous zone director Girard McHale, featured approximately 45 remote-controlled jet planes performing aerodynamic manoeuvres.

The event was not a competition, but an opportunity for enthusiasts to compare notes and show what they can build and

fly. These model planes range in price from \$3,000 to \$40,000, and were the origins of the American military remote-controlled spy planes now used in Afghanistan.

Pilots came great distances, the furthest distance travelled by Gerry Sylvester of Bonnyville, Alberta. Pilots came from around B.C., Alberta and Washington State.

The event was sponsored by the Model Aeronautics Association and the Town of Princeton, with special thanks to the School District, who provided tables, and Cones & Dogs, which ran the concession, with profits to go to local charity.

Spectators pay no admission to watch the flights in this annual event.

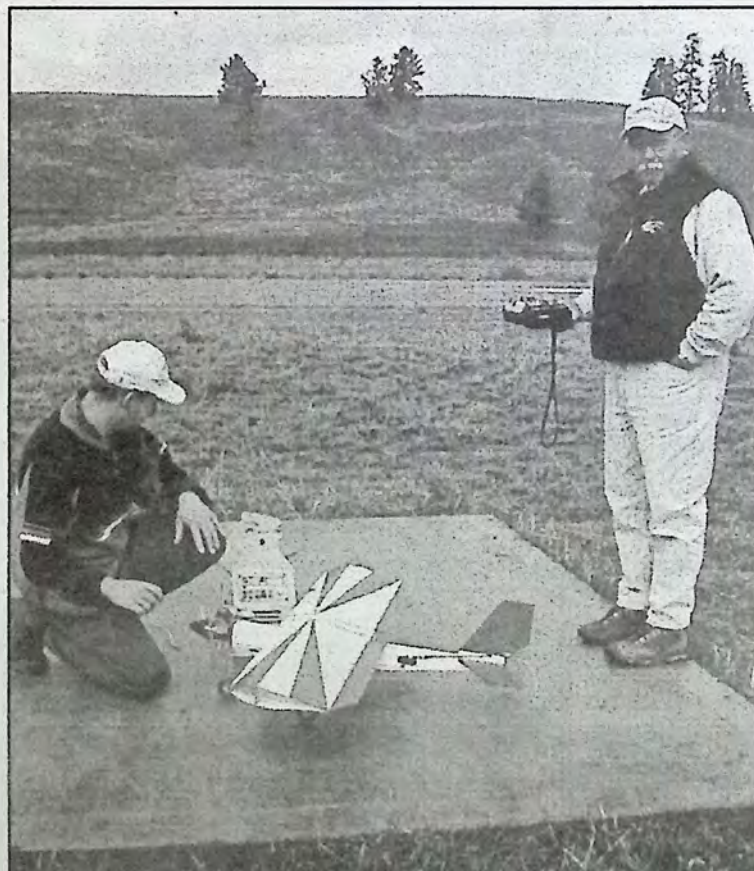
Former resident loses home

Real estate still sells well

South Okanagan and Similkameen real estate sales continue to out-perform sales levels of 2003. The August sales for the region were up 19 percent, and total sales for 2004 are up six percent over 2003.

Naramata leads with a 100 percent increase, but a low volume. Oliver is next with 29 units sold, and Summerland with 28 units sold. Penticton is up 24 percent with 97 units sold. Osoyoos increased just slightly, and Kaleden/Okanagan Falls sales remain static.

In the Similkameen, Princeton sales are down eight percent with 22 sales in August compared with 24 last year. Keremeos sales are down 20 percent, with only 12 units sold.

Sales prices in the region are up by 21 percent, with the average for the region at \$200,642 per residence. Average sale price in Princeton is \$100,131, an 11 percent decrease, and in Keremeos, the average selling price is \$109,200, up five percent over last year.

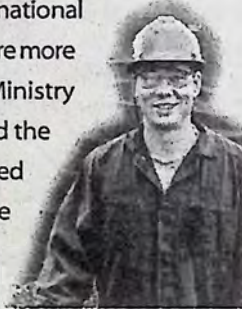
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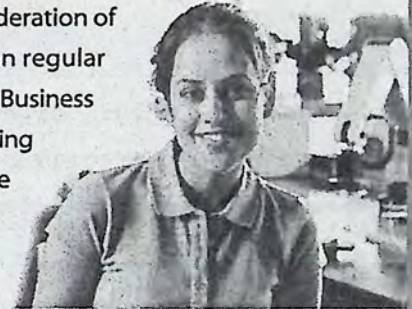

You likely have not heard of Dr. Ignaz Semmelweis, but 100 years ago he first demonstrated that routine handwashing could prevent the spread of disease. Today we know how important it is to wash your hands, but his idea was met with sneers and contempt. It was to take 50 years before the importance of handwashing, as a preventive measure, would be widely accepted by the medical profession.

Today health care professionals will tell you that washing your hands is the single most effective way to prevent the transmission of disease. Dr. Semmelweis is a pioneer who has made one of the greatest contributions to public health, and one that is simple and inexpensive. We cannot begin to count the thousands upon thousands of lives saved as a result of this discovery.

How hands spread disease

There are five common household scenarios in which disease causing germs can be transmitted by contaminated hands.

Nose, mouth, or eyes to hands to others: Germs causing colds, eye infections and other illnesses can spread to the hands by sneezing, coughing or rubbing the eyes and then can be transferred to others.

Hands to food: Germs are transmitted from unclean hands to food, usually by an infected food preparer who did not handwash after using the toilet. The germs are then passed to those who eat

the food.

Infected infant to hands to other children: During diaper changes, germs are passed from an infant with diarrhea to the hands of a parent. If the parent does not immediately wash hands, the germs are passed to another child.

Food to hands to food: Germs are transmitted from raw, uncooked foods, such as chicken, to hands; the germs are then transferred to other foods, like salad. Cooking the raw food kills the first germs, but the salad remains contaminated.

Food to hands to infants: Germs from uncooked foods are transferred to hands and then to infants.

Handwashing can prevent the transfer of germs in all five of these scenarios.

How to wash hands correctly

1. Wet hands under warm running water and apply soap.
2. Rub your hands vigorously together and scrub all surfaces for at least 10 to 15 seconds. Scrub longer if your hands are visibly

dirty.

3. Rinse under warm running water.
4. In all washrooms use the towel to turn off the tap.
5. Use hand lotion after washing to prevent skin from getting sore.

Alcohol based waterless hand rinses are an easy way to clean your hands and should be used for a minimum of 15 seconds. They are as good as a hand wash when your hands are not visibly dirty.

New this fall

Some residential care facilities in Interior Health Region will have handwashing stations for visitors, staff and volunteers at the entrance. In an effort to reduce the spread of infections, particularly as flu season approaches, everyone is encouraged to wash their hands when they enter and leave a facility. Protect yourself and those you love.

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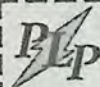
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Living Past 100

Cool weather calls for warm food

Cooler weather at this time of year promotes a switch to warmer meals. All of the root vegetables have a warming quality to them. his suggestions and the group decided to explore the possibility of a stained glass course.

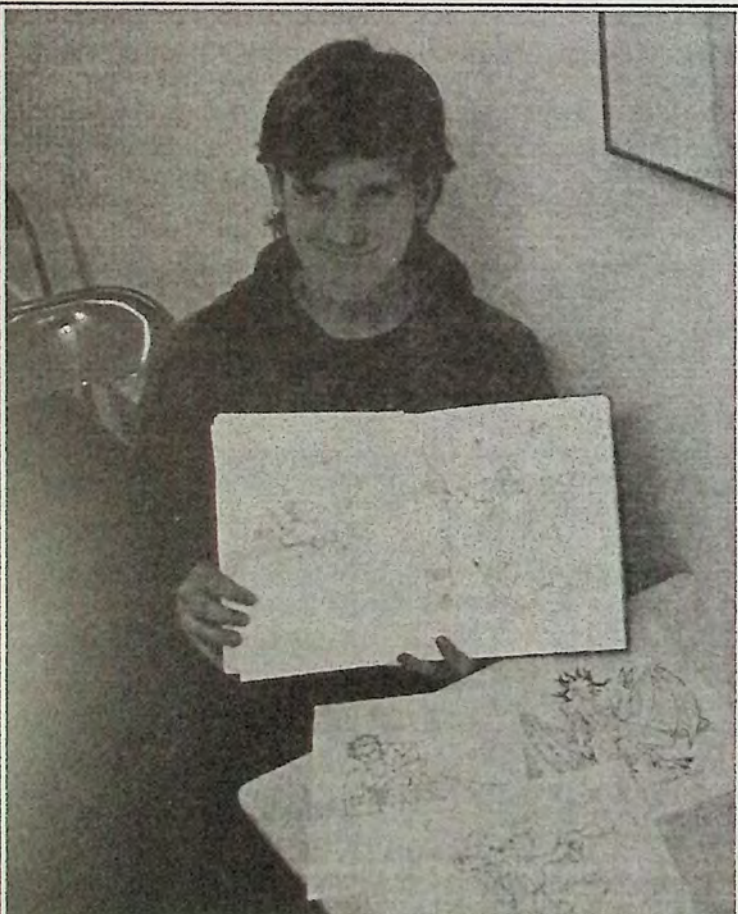
President Mary Bedford took the suggestions seriously and explained, "That's one of the reasons why we are here is to try to provide what people want."

B.C. Fairs and Exhibitions President George Tatton visited Princeton's fair on Sunday, September 12, to evaluate the fair. He remarked on the many improvements to the fairgrounds since he last visited in 1989. He was impressed with the map of the grounds, the poster acknowledging the many sponsors, and the Princeton Fall Fair poster "Agriculture is the Mother of Industries". He took one of these posters with him to display at the B.C. Fairs and Exhibitions Association convention in October.

There were only 68 adult exhibitors at the Fall Fair this year and 33 exhibitors in the Junior Fair. However, some exhibitors were "going for the gold" and entered a dozen or more categories. This year, there were a number of first-time participants, and they did very well, winning in many categories.

Mary Mogge was Top Exhibitor, taking home \$171 in prize money. Runners-up were John Sandness and Helene Ramsay with \$60 each in winnings.

KIDD LAKE - Ron says although this is a catch and release lake, anglers are having a good time here lately.

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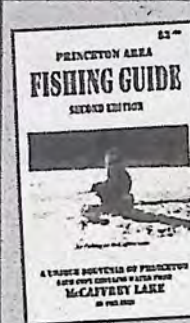

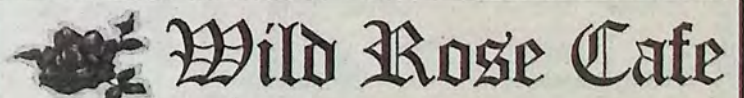

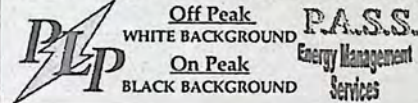

We solve parking problem

We believe we have come up with the most cost-effective and sensible solution to the parking problem in downtown Princeton.

Town Hall should be relocated to the now vacant Health Unit building.

Here are a few reasons why it makes sense to do this:

The Health Unit building is already owned by local taxpayers; Town Hall, once moved, would still be easy to access for all residents; and the setting (next to a park and near the river) is inviting.

What would we do with the empty Town Hall? Flatten it and use the land to expand the existing parking lot up to Bridge Street.

Our reasons for doing this include: the present Town Hall building is getting old and costly to maintain; the extra parking stalls would be welcomed by many; and with downtown parking now visible from the main street, it may actually be used more.

If the Town wants to reserve a dozen of the parking stalls for a monthly fee and leave the rest for free parking for residents and tourists, then fine.

The bonus here is there will be more parking stalls in the downtown core available for everyone.

These extra stalls will ease the pressure on both Bridge Street and Vermilion Avenue when traffic is heavy and parking is hard to find.

Once this new parking lot is in place, extra signage would be required to announce 'free downtown parking' and direct travellers directly there.

We know there are already signs, but larger ones and more of them would help.

Local businesses would also have to help get the word out by encouraging employees to remind customers about all the extra free parking available downtown.

Or the Town could install parking meters everywhere. Which would you rather see?

Reader responds to dentist's letter

To the Editor:
RE: Dr. Barry, Cook's plea for a community pool centre.

Inadvertently I have done some research that is relevant to consideration of an indoor pool for Princeton. This came about in two ways.

Firstly, two years ago I came up with what I thought was a brilliant idea for an 8-km (5-mile) path around Princeton which would utilize existing pathways.

It would go up the dyke along the Similkameen River, through the tunnel and across the KVR Bridge then on roads and trails along the Tulameen River down to the Tulameen dyke, then along that dyke and back to downtown.

I pitched "The Two Rivers Path" idea to a local service club and I compared it to the building and operation of an indoor pool, which I knew the club was also considering. The advantages of the "Two Rivers Path" which I saw were: low capital cost, very low operating cost (no light, heat, water and sewer, depreciation, building and liability insurance, lifeguards and supervisors, building and equipment maintenance), always open, no user fees, four seasons use, suitable for use by bicycles, baby carriages, wheelchairs and cross country skis, no special clothing or skills required and suitable for young and old, locals and visitors. (If you are interested in trying to establish the Two Rivers Path please contact me at 295-6778.)

Secondly, I decided to try to compete in the 2004 Tulameen Triathlon (a very well run local event in an outstanding location

with bargain basement entry fees) which meant that I had to seriously improve my swimming. I started by going once a week with two friends to the indoor pool in Summerland for ten weeks. Then I went three times a week to the Princeton pool from when it opened on June 2nd until it closed on September 6th. In spite living in Princeton for 30 years I had never previously been down to the pool, let alone having had a swim in it!

By September I had a pretty good idea of what was happening at our pool. As my swimming buddy Dave Metcalfe and I kept asking each other, "Where are all the people?" Dave and I were the only people of any age who regularly showed up for afternoon laneswim all Summer! (Laneswim

is when part or all of the pool is reserved for anyone who wants to swim so long as they swim back and forth in a lane). The aquasize (exercise in the water), swimming lessons and public swims were better attended but numbers varied from a few to many from day to day. Our pool is an excellent facility, it is very clean and well maintained, Carol and her staff are friendly and helpful and the user fees are little more than the price of a coffee, it is a bargain. The times allotted for laneswim are thoughtfully scheduled so one could swim before work, during the day or after work. How much better could it get - excellent facility, bargain prices and convenient open times but, "Where were all the people?"

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Search and Rescue members belay a subject down rough terrain as part of an exercise in Nelson. Princeton GSAR sent two members to participate in the training program.

Local GSAR members attend exercise

Trina Adams and myself, Lorraine Stubbins, of Princeton Ground Search and Rescue Society, attended SAREX 2004, in Nelson, BC at Kokanee Glacier Park, over the weekend of Sept 10-12th. This Search and Rescue Training Scenario involved members of various GSAR, Mountain Rescue, and Rope Rescue teams including persons skilled in technical ice climbing rescue operations. Members attended from the many Kootenay Region Search and Rescue teams, including but not limited to: Nelson, Castlegar, Golden, Kaslo, Rossland, Slovan, and Creston. Also in attendance were persons from the Victoria region, Vernon, and Spokane, WA., in addition to our Princeton contingent.

This exercise was used as a training initiative for general members, team leaders, search managers, communication and other support people, with observers from both PEP and the Justice Institute, in attendance.

Trina and I attended as recent GSAR graduates with the goal of learning 'hands-on' as much as possible, gaining experience to be put to practical use within our own group, while involved in searches in our area.

We arrived Friday evening in time to report in and set up our tents in Kokanee Creek Park where the Command Center was set up in well-equipped trucks from the larger SAR groups. We were briefed as a group, at 9:30 pm., as to the events planned for the following day.

We were going to be part of a multi-faceted mountain rescue in Kokanee Glacier Park involving the regions of Gibsons Lake, Kootenay Lake, Kootenay Pass, Slovan Chief and Kokanee Glacier. The scenario was to involve 2 brothers whom had gone climbing on Kokanee

Glacier and were reported overdue. The exercise was designed to emphasize more the rescue element than the search element.

An initial response team (IRT), Team Gulf, consisting of 4 Mountain Rescue Personnel (MR1's and MR2's) and 2 physicians who are GSAR members, was to be deployed onto the mountain from Gibsons Lake Camp at 3 am. They were to take the stretcher without the wheel into the glacier area, approx. 9 kms from the staging area at Gibsons Lake, where the road ended.

The other 4 support teams: India, Kilo, Sierra, and our team, Team Mike, were given wake-up calls at 4:30 am Saturday. We received instructions to be fed, watered, packing with us sufficient gear to spend the night out in extreme conditions, and to be ready for transport by 5 am.

We were split into teams and briefed regarding the fact that the subjects had been located. One brother was found in good condition and the other one Erin, (who weighed 280 lbs) had a broken leg. The injured subject was stabilized.

We met our team leader Roy, and he reviewed gear requirements for the expected bad weather. Some scrambling occurred while we searched for alternate gear and supplies. We spent 45 minutes being vanned up the rough road to Gibsons Lake staging area. Team Mike's specific mission was to take the subject by wheeled stretcher on the portion of the trail from Slovan Chief Cabin down to the Kokanee Pass area. Each team was responsible for an area of the trail either carrying or belaying the stretcher depending on the nature of the terrain and the technical expertise of the team.

We hiked in for approximately 3 hrs with Team Kilo pushing the stretcher wheel on a steep, narrow and rocky trail to Slovan Chief

Cabin passing beautiful Kootenay Lake enroute. The wheel was difficult to transport without the stretcher because it was too bulky to strap on a backpack and the handles were too short to make pushing it comfortable. Sticks were duct-taped to the bars but proved ineffective.

The scenery was absolutely spectacular and the weather was ok in the morning. When we arrived at the alpine cabin it was unexpectedly locked and we had no access.

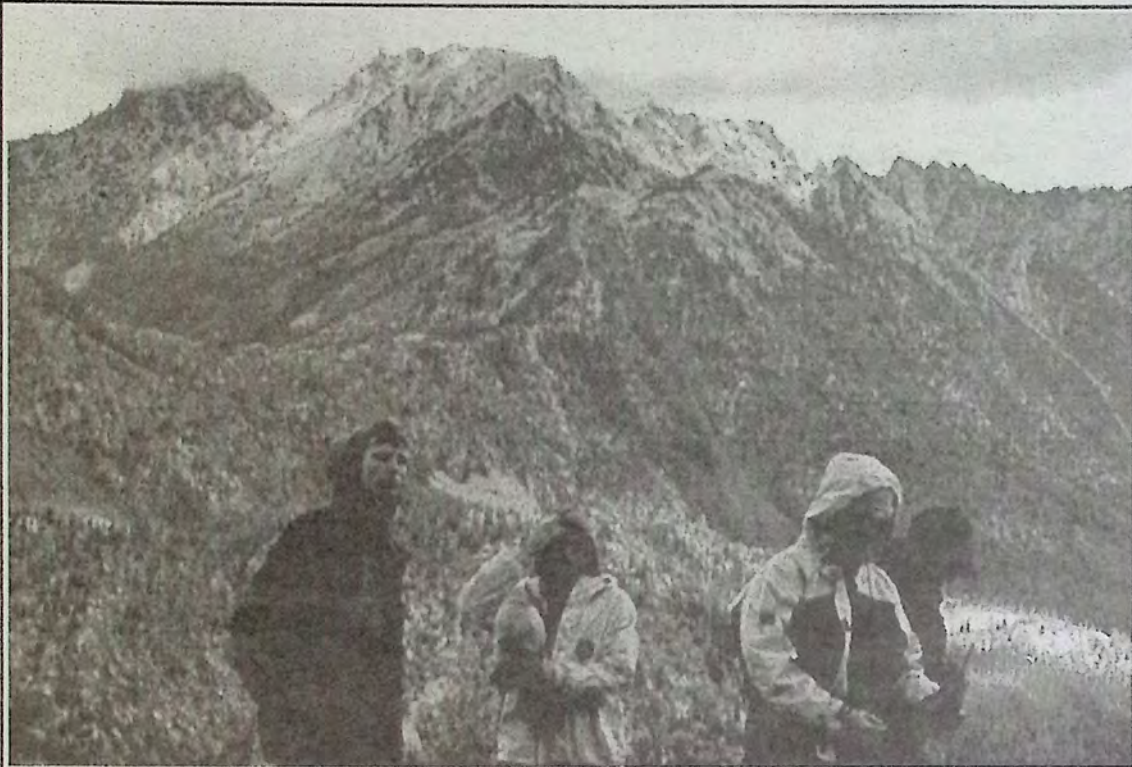
We were told that our group could hike up the next section to observe the rope work on the glacier slope above the cabin. We were also told to leave our packs behind and just to take water as we would just be going up and then right back to the cabin. We were told to expect cold mountain temperatures and warned that there was expected to be sleet, rain and/or snow up top with extreme wind. I packed my toque, gloves, put on rain pants, an extra fleece and stuck a bag of nuts in my pocket.

We hiked a very rough vertical boulder field up to within several hundred metres of the toe of the glacier and were able to see the rope rescue guys of Team Gulf working in the centre of a 25 degree slope on the icefield. Radio communications revealed that they were installing ice bolts to support the belay system to haul the stretcher to the middle of the field from the extreme edge and then to lower the stretcher over the slope. The anchors were taking longer than anticipated.

Once over the slope, the stretcher was then to be passed off to Team Kilo waiting on the skree below the toe.

We were told by our team leader that we were to wait on the boulder field to help with the stretcher move to the second belay point with Team Sierra. This point was below our current location and above Slovan Chief hut.

We waited for 5 and 1/2 hours while the ice bolts got installed and the stretcher got lowered to our location.

We remained on the exposed boulder ledge below the ice and the weather got nasty. We had high winds, sleet, hail and heavy rain for most of the afternoon with one system rolling in after the other.

Trina, Orion and myself were soaked thru, initially from perspiration and secondly from rain. We got very cold. Our clothing turned out to be sub-standard. It wouldn't breathe so that it could dry once we were wet.

Orion hiked up onto the exposed boulder field from the cabin with no jacket, hat or gloves and was very cold and really wet. After about 4 hours on the slope we were offered dry clothing by a member of Team Sierra, which we gratefully accepted. Our comfort level improved dramatically. We had left stoves, sleeping bags, tarps and all our survival gear back at the cabin. No one suggested that we return there to get it and warm up.

The ice bolts were still causing problems due to the second safety belay-line anchor not holding. The stretcher did eventually get lowered down the steep ice slope and was passed off to Kilo. Team Kilo had 6 guys and they carried it without the use of a wheel and without any rotations or other relay members to spell them off. It took them 2 hours to carry it down to the area where we waited and one of their team was spent from the exhaustion of carrying a 280 lb subject over huge boulders, falling frequently, with absolutely no rotations available.

Finally, at 5:02 pm, we had communication from base telling us that the rescue was being called off. There was some confusion at this point as to whether the scenario was to continue or not and the second team of mountain rescue guys began working on their rope anchors to go over the first boulder slope. Some radio discussion was heard between members

and base and they were in disagreement as to the direction the exercise would take. It seemed that they were going to go ahead with the belay below us anyway.

At this point the tired man from Kilo was going down off the mountain with one of the Mountain Rescue rope guys whose feet were bleeding from his boots rubbing. I was starting to realize that I would be a burden to the group if I had to continue down the trail in the dark (I have impaired night vision). We still needed three hours to get down so I asked to be able to go down with the other two. I headed down, picked up my gear at Slocan Chief and continued down with Bruce. We hiked the last half-hour in darkness and our head-lamps proved essential. There was heavy rain for about the last hour and a half of our descent. When we got to Gibson Lake cabin at the trail-head we were met by the support team and taken to a warm shelter with food and hot chocolate. The other teams arrived about an hour later as they had to carry the stretcher in the dark for about the last hour or so and it was very slow going. Trina carried the stretcher at the early part of the trail down from Slocan Chief. It was very tough. The trail was extremely narrow and steep and so there could only be two persons on the wheel stretcher, one at the front and one at the back.

There was no subject in the stretcher but there were lots of heavy ropes, gear and packs. People fell frequently. There were many bridges on the trail and they were challenging to pass the stretcher over with the wheel.

When every one of the 37 rescuers was down off the mountain, we loaded into the vans for the 45 minute drive down to the camping area. We got back to camp at 10:30 pm in heavy rain and headed for our damp but welcome tents.

Sunday morning debriefing started at 10 in meetings with our team leaders where we were asked to give constructive feedback.

Search Manager Joe of Nelson SAR led the event and each of the divisions had their say. Pre-planning, Communications, PEP, JI, Team Leaders and then it was opened up to general discussion.

Our team expressed concern at the instructions given to us, by team leaders, to leave our survival equipment behind, at Slocan Chief. My greatest lesson came from the realization that I was in danger of becoming hypothermic due to being ill equipped without my pack.

Had I waited on the mountain I could also have been hiking in boulders with no head lamp and poor eyesight.

I could easily have become a danger or additional burden to my team.

All in all this was a very valuable learning tool for both Trina and myself as well as for everyone involved in all aspects. We learned that there are many factors involved in a rescue and that all factions must consider the other in order for the system to work effectively. This is no place for the lone wolf.

We were very impressed with the high level of dedication shown by the many different groups present.

The chance to talk to persons from different areas was very good and highly informative. The sophistication of vehicle and equipment support and the funding that provides such was impressive from the Kootenay groups.

The high fitness level of the Kootenay members was apparent as the terrain is punishing and they get many searches each year.

An additional highlight of this experience was the spawning Kokanee Salmon who were plugging up the spawning channels in Kokanee Creek and seemed not to notice us all hanging over the bridge photographing them.

If you are ever given the chance to participate in another of these exercises I can recommend it as a very worthwhile experience. Thanks for the opportunity to attend Sarex 2004, both from Trina and myself!

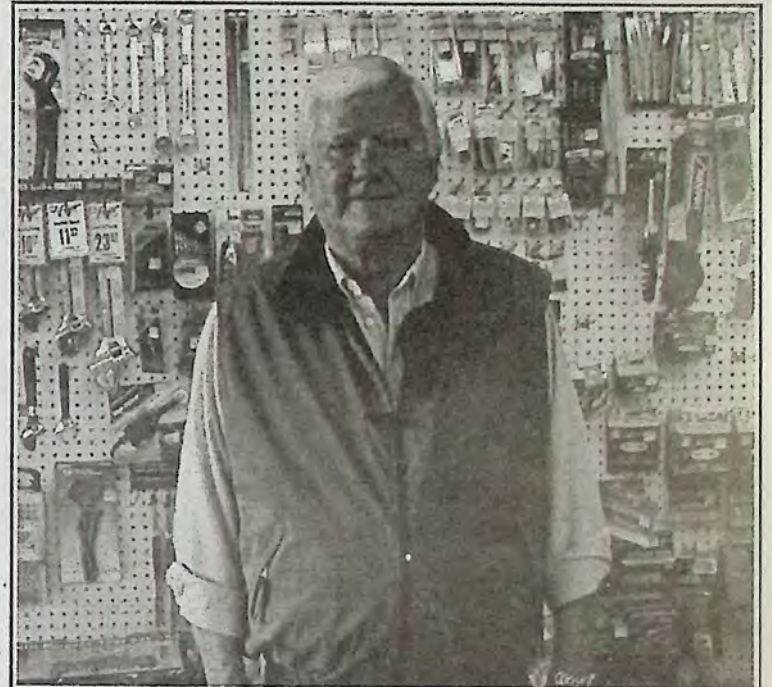

I much preferred our outdoor pool to Summerland's indoor pool. We apparently require only about half the chlorine. This makes goggles optional and after you swim you don't have to wash with soap to get the chlorine stink off yourself. On a sunny day the ripples on our pool cause light pat-terns to dance across the bottom of the pool, delightful.

I also had no trouble with cool outside temperatures, the water was a constant 27C (80F) so the outside temperature was more or less irrelevant.

My conclusion is that the demand for our pool by our com-munity is light in spite of it's excellence. I am sure a good indoor pool would attract more people, but how many more and at what cost? My use was heavily subsidized. On a few occasions I was the only swimmer, however, safety rules require two lifeguards at all times so they just had me to watch as I did my laps.

In any community there are only a certain percentage of people who will swim in a pool and an even smaller percentage that will swim in it regularly, no different from any other sport. Even in

Summerland in March, April and May the Tuesday and Thursday afternoon laneswims only had about four regulars. Our pool operates at a substantial deficit each month and there has been some investigation in our Town Hall about the operating deficit for the indoor pool in Merritt. It is substantial and a concern.

I have also heard that even Kamloops with it's Olympic size 50-metre pool, courtesy of the B. C. Summer Games, is not happy about it's operating deficit. In short, Princeton somehow with grants, etc. could probably get a facility built, but could we afford to operate it?

The problem of attracting highly trained people to rural towns is more complex than this or that recreational facility. I think the biggest problem is that most peo-ple now live in or near a major urban area and that is where they also want to work. Even medical students who have grown up in the country, after experiencing the cultural and other amenities in the big university cities often decide after graduation to locate in a large city.
