During question period at the October 6 School Board meeting, a parent questioned trustees about moving alternate education students to Riverside School. She asked how alternate learning could be enhanced by the move.

School Superintendent Dr. Robert Peacock responded, saying the classroom at Riverside is better than the portable classroom they were using, and they are still close enough to Princeton Secondary School to walk there for particular courses, such as woodwork.

Dr. Peacock went on to explain moving The Bridge to Riverside, saying only 16 students were using The Bridge, with classroom time equal to six full-time students, yet the district had to pay a full-time teacher and support staff. He stated there is no problem with youth and adults in the same school.

The parent said the Board had promised no segregation or discrimination of students, but her son had told her Riverside is "where all the bad kids go". She felt the alternate learning class had been segregated.

Superintendent Peacock replied the Board is trying to have the entire building called The Bridge, regardless of who attends.

## Pilot crash lands in field



This plane, sitting next to Highway 3 just West of Keremeos, near Standing Rock, was the scene of a bizarre incident last week. RCMP and Transport Canada are continuing their investigation into the crash. The plane was removed from the scene Thursday afternoon.

### Plane runs out of fuel near Keremeos

The unusual story of the wayward plane that crossed the Border last Tuesday, attempted to land at Princeton Airport, and eventually crash landed near Keremeos, is still quite a mystery.

According to S. Sgt. W. Makepeace of South Okanagan RCMP Detachment, the story began with a tip from Princeton Detachment that a plane had crossed the US/Canada Border and had failed to report to Customs.

The Princeton Detachment attempted to speak with the pilot but he departed the Princeton Airport upon seeing RCMP approaching the aircraft.

"The plane headed East and eventually ran out of gas near Keremeos."

South Okanagan Detachment were alerted to the crash at 4:39 PM. The plane had crash landed in a field near Standing Rock, just narrowly missing Highway 3.

The plane suffered structural damage.

"The pilot of the plane left the crash scene and was picked up by a passing motorist and taken to Keremeos," says S. Sgt. Makepeace.

"The pilot did not want to go to the police to report the crash and this prompted the motorist to contact the police."

The pilot was apprehended and arrested under the Customs Act a short time later by RCMP in Keremeos.

"The actions of the pilot caused RCMP to believe he was involved in criminal activity."

The 57-year old pilot, who is known to the South Okanagan Detachment, lives in both the Lower Mainland and South Okanagan.

He was released later in the week with no charges laid, but is scheduled to appear in Court in December.

"A small amount of drugs were recovered on the route the plane took, but it is not certain if the discovery is related to the incident", says S. Sgt. Makepeace.

The plane was removed from the scene late Thursday to allow Transport Canada officials to investigate further.

## Local dentist sees dim future

Dr. Barry Cook, who owns a dental practice in Princeton, attended the October 4 Town Council meeting to campaign for a community centre with a swimming pool. He reminded Councillors of their promises made before the last civic elections.

He began by expressing his concern that local health professionals are growing older and cannot "replace themselves", and Weyerhaeuser cannot attract trades people, because Princeton does not have a community centre. He said Princeton is going to go downhill.

Dr. Cook asked about money from Community Forest Corporation, and asked to see the audited financial statement, and asked that it be published. He said it could be seed money for a community centre.

Council assured him the statements are available and could be published.

The dentist recognized that such a centre would have to be subsidized by the local taxpayers, and went on to point out other subsidized local recreation facilities.

"The PXA has sucked a tremendous amount out of taxpayers locally, provincially and federally. The Town subsidizes the curling rink," Dr. Cook stated.

"The focus of this community has got to change, from western attitude to something more modern," Dr. Cook added.

He went on to comment on the

appearance of the town, saying he did not know whether there are any "building standards" in Princeton. He said as he walked through town he found it "pretty depressing".

A community centre, according to Dr. Cook, would mean "instead of renting houses to local crackheads we could get a better class of residents."

Dr. Cook complained that businesses are closing due to the attitude of Princeton people who will go out of town to shop.

He added that a community centre would improve the health of local people, "Instead of stay-at-home, do-nothing individuals we could be healthier instead of overweight."

Following Dr. Cook's presentation, Mayor Keith Olsen said Council had looked at Riverside as a possible community centre, but the school district is still using it. The former Argo Road Maintenance site has been considered, too.

He went on to tell Dr. Cook that the only withdrawals from the Community Forest funds are the ordinary costs of doing business, such as the annual audit. The funds are earmarked for a community capital project.

Dr. Cook responded by saying Princeton lacked foresight, and "lack of foresight killed Princeton" He went on to comment that the town had the "curling rink for the uppies and the arena for the lowlies" subsidized by the town.

At this point, Council suggested Dr. Cook begin to prepare for a referendum next year seeking taxpayer approval for a community centre. Dr. Cook appeared surprised that the election would be next fall and was not every four years. He agreed to review the costs of Merritt's community centre complex, which Council had reviewed.

Mayor Olsen had expressed a "dire need" for a community centre, and assured Dr. Cook that Council has not forgotten it.


Council went on with the meeting, and during that time, Dr. Cook left. During question period at the end of the meeting, members of the public talked about the cost of a community centre. While Council was in favour of having a community centre, they wondered whether the community really wants it. The Town administrator pointed out there are five school gyms empty every night of the week, yet only the badminton players use them.

Councillor Kathy Clement said the operating costs of the present swimming pool are a deficit, and a year-round swimming pool would cost \$300,000 a year deficit. Council explained that the existing pool has a shortfall of \$20 - \$30,000 in the 3.5 months it operates. On evenings when public swimming is free, there are a lot of swimmers, but when user fees must be paid, there are very few.

**Village to establish own website**

Village Council decided at their October 4th meeting to move forward with a plan to create a website for use related to municipal business.

Keremeos CAO Bob Lafleur says there are a number of private websites already operating with information on Keremeos, but nothing like what Council has in mind.

"We decided why not team up with Similkameen Country and Council decided we should have our own website with links to things you can find on other municipal websites."

Those links would lead to minutes of Council meetings, bylaw information and details on most matters from Village Hall.

The Village has budgeted

\$4,000 in the 2004 budget just for a website and there is a website committee on Council.

"That's part of your community's marketing strategy is to have a good website."

## Interior Health says protect yourself with annual flu shots

The best way to protect yourself and those you care about is to get your flu shot, recommends Dr. Paul Hasselback, Senior Medical Health Officer for Interior Health. It could be the person we meet in the grocery store or a family member we visit in a residential care home. Either way, a flu shot can help prevent you from getting sick with the flu or from spreading it to others.

Free flu shots are available if you are 65 years and older, or if you have a chronic illness (children included), if you are a household contact of someone with a chronic illness or work in the health care or emergency professions.

Flu shots are also free for those who live in a residential care home or who work there. Watch for local announcements on times and dates for free flu clinics in your community or contact your local Public Health office (check the blue pages in your phone book under Health Authorities) or visit our web site at [www.interiorhealth.ca](http://www.interiorhealth.ca) for a complete listing.

While we offer free shots to those at risk, anyone can benefit from a flu shot, which can be purchased through pharmacies, travel vaccine clinics, walk-in clinics or family physicians.

A flu shot is one of the best steps you can take to stay healthy this winter. It is 70 to 90 per cent effective in preventing influenza in healthy children and adults. Influenza is a highly contagious

infection spread by respiratory droplets. Influenza disease may lead to more severe and life-threatening illnesses, such as pneumonia, especially for older and younger age groups and people with chronic illnesses.

Influenza starts with muscle ache, headache and fever and often develops a dry cough. Colds on the other hand, develop a runny nose and don't often develop a fever. If you suspect you have the flu, stay home, drink plenty of fluids, get lots of rest and consult your family physician if your symptoms don't improve - especially if you have other health concerns.

On average every year in Canada, about 5 million Canadians (1 in 6) are infected with the Influenza virus, 50,000 are hospitalized and sadly, 4,500 will pass away.

As for our economy Influenza accounts for about 1.5 million workdays lost at a cost of \$1 billion dollars to the Canadian economy.

## Living Past 100

### Yes, herbs really work!

On a recent television newscast, the announcer said research had revealed that "natural" remedies such as herbal preparations really work! Duh! The public could have told this to researchers long ago.

The billion-dollar natural foods and herbs industry grew out of the disappointment with "magic bullet" medicine. Part of the problem with the single solution to disease is side effects which may prove worse than the disease, and the fact that many bacteria have mounted defences against the "magic bullets" called antibiotics.

Herbal remedies may take longer, but they are far more complex than the single solution, and bacteria and viruses fall victim to them. Most herbal preparations have no side effects and no lasting damage to bodily organs, a general statement which cannot be made about prescribed medications.

An example of a complex herbal remedy is oregano oil for treating cold and flu symptoms. Oregano oil contains more than 200 different elemental qualities which the infecting virus must combat. The high number of elements overwhelms the infection. Whereas an infectious agent might adapt to a single element of attack, such as penicillin, there is no way it can adapt to more than 200 at once.

When researchers make this great discovery that natural healing agents really work, it is laughable. How do they suppose the human race survived so long without pharmaceutical companies?

**AMENDMENT BYLAW NO. 2313, 2004**

This text amendment proposes to provide general regulations for temporary dwellings in the Electoral Area H Rural Land Use Bylaw No. 1725, 1997. Under the proposed general regulations for temporary dwellings section, an application will be able to construct a second single detached dwelling, however, a completion inspection will not be given until the existing dwelling is made uninhabitable (by removing the cooking appliances and the energy source for these cooking appliances). By inserting regulations for temporary dwellings, the applicable RDOS Bylaws will be made easier for the community to abide by, to interpret and to enforce. The text amendment also seeks to revise the general regulations for temporary dwellings sections in both the Electoral Area E Zoning Bylaw No. 1566, 1995 and the Electoral Area F Rural Land Use Bylaw No. 1742, 1997.

A copy of the above Bylaw is available for inspection between the hours of 8:30 AM and 4:30 PM Monday through Friday, excluding holidays, from October 12, 2004 to October 28, 2004, both inclusive, in the office of the Regional District of Okanagan-Similkameen, 101 Martin Street, Penticton, B. C. and at the Princeton Town Hall, 169 Bridge Street, Princeton, B. C.

Written comments regarding this application will be received at the Regional District office up to and including October 27, 2004. At the Hearing, all persons who deem their interest in property affected by the proposed Bylaw shall be given an opportunity to present written information or to speak to matters contained within the Bylaw.

Pursuant to Section 891 of the Local Government Act, this Public Hearing has been delegated to the Chairman, Regional District of Okanagan-Similkameen.

**Cawston blaze leaves family homeless**

The Cawston Marketplace was totally gutted by a spectacular fire early Friday morning.

A bright glow could be seen from Highway 3 through the Similkameen Valley in the darkness of the early morning hours.

The Keremeos Volunteer Fire Department had help from both Osoyoos and Kaleden Fire Departments supplying both personnel and equipment.

The visiting fire crews attending were sent home at 8:00 AM Friday. Plans to bring in a excavating crew

to work on the lower level portions of the burned out building have been on hold until insurance crews and fire investigators get a good look at the situation.

Social Services have also arrived in Cawston to offer help to a family who lived in a living quarters behind the Cawston Marketplace. It too was taken out by the fire. The family of five included two young children and a day-and-a-half old baby.

Seven of the Keremeos firemen remained at the site all day for mop up.

Water trucks from Dutchies

Water Transfer and T. L. Timber shuttled water to the fire site since the fire started due to a lack of a strong enough water source at the fire site.

Cawston Primary School was officially closed first thing Friday morning by school officials who acted on the advice of fire crews to keep the children home.

During the peak of the fire, smoke was blowing directly at the school spreading debris around the classroom area.

There is also a concern there may be some smoke damage to the school.

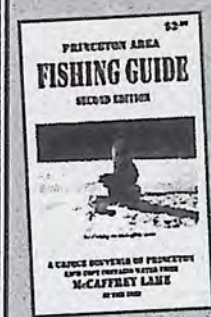

**Turkey Wontons**

- 1 lb. ground turkey
- 2 cloves, garlic, minced
- 1 tsp. dried thyme
- salt and pepper, to taste
- 1 pkg. light cream cheese
- 1 bunch green onions, chopped
- 1 pkg. wonton wrappers
- 3 cups oil, for frying

In a large non-stick skillet, cook turkey, stirring and separating until pink disappears. In a separate bowl, combine garlic, thyme, cream cheese, green onions and salt and pepper. Add turkey and stir to combine. Put 1-teaspoon of filling in centre of each wonton wrapper. Wet edges with water; fold to form a triangle. Press around edges to seal. Wet both side points and pinch together over centre. Heat oil to 375F. Fry wontons, a few at a time, until golden brown (about 2 minutes). Drain on paper towels. Serve with dipping sauces. Makes approximately 50 wontons.

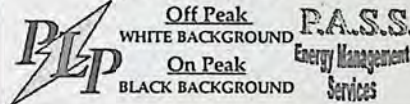

One characteristic of American national psychology has been an appreciation of the freedom to rebel against government. This spirit of rebellion laid the foundation for the American way of life, and despite the attempts of some repressive elected governments, Americans claim the right to oppose repression. I see signs now of a revolution taking place in the United States as the national election date approaches.

Americans' right to question government was severely repressed in the wake of the World Trade Center attack in 2001. The PATRIOT Act forbade Americans to actively oppose government, or to discuss whether their government had engaged in a conspiracy regarding the attack. There were a lot of unanswered questions about that attack. Writers from other nations have published books and magazine articles suggesting a conspiracy. Within the United States, this speculation was forbidden under the PATRIOT Act.

I saw an TV advertisement which clearly opposed the PATRIOT act on the grounds that it is un-American. The ad said Americans should have the right to speak their minds on any subject. This is the first ad I have seen aimed at the Bush administration's repressive legislation.

Another major activity taking place in the USA is Oprah Winfrey's campaign to have every voting age American registered to vote. Winfrey is not advocating any particular party, but if one reads between the lines of what she and her volunteers are saying, there is the hint that Americans will lose their freedom to a Hitler-style government if they do not exercise their right to vote. My guess is that Oprah Winfrey has a lot more influence on the public than either John Kerry or George W. Bush.

The American economy has not fared well under the Bush administration, although a lot of companies in the USA are making more money due to higher prices for beef and lumber. "The people there are great." As for Pike's contribution to the program, Debbie Schwarz says he has been very helpful.

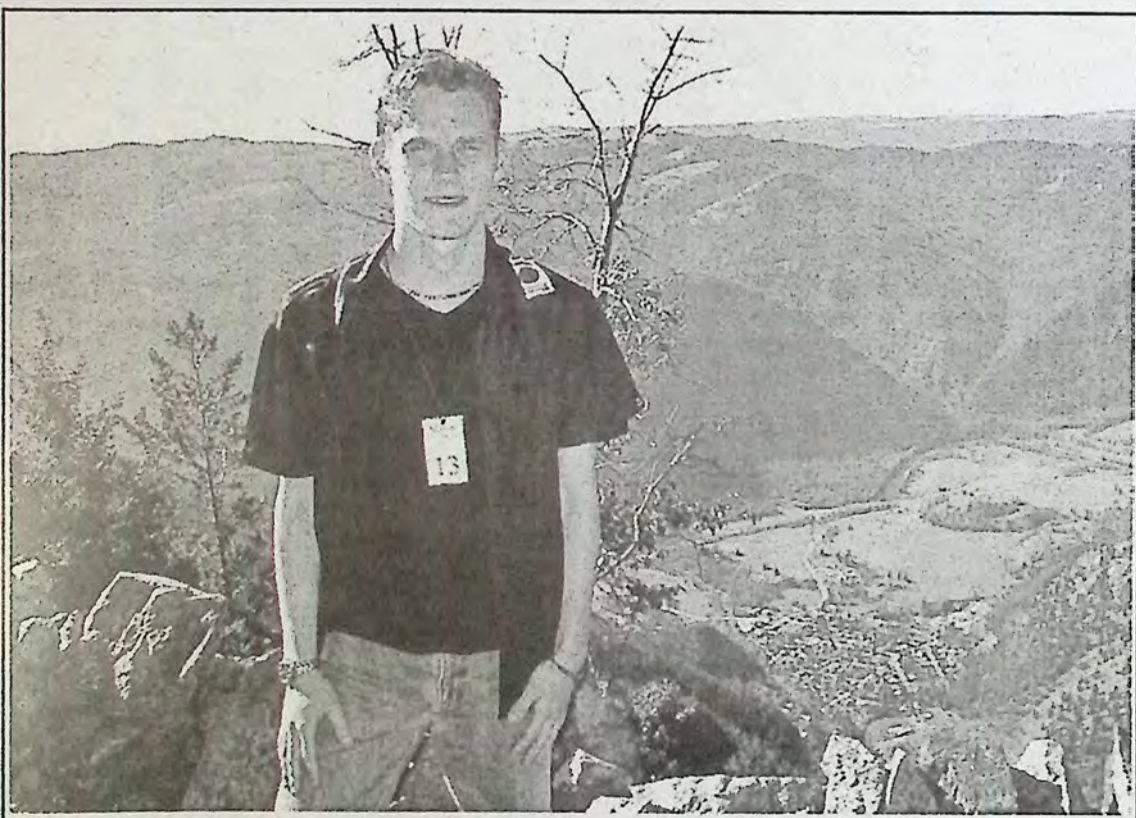
"He's great, very easy going and fit right in. He made himself at home and the clients really love him."

Katimavik participant Berkeley Pike poses with Hedley in the background.

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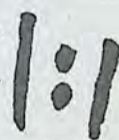
