On October 11th, Princeton RCMP members responded to a complaint at Princeton General Hospital involving a 17-year old female victim.

The investigation revealed that two males, one 18-years old - a former Princeton resident - and a 19-year old Princeton resident were involved in the distribution of Ecstasy in Princeton.

The pair were arrested later that evening.

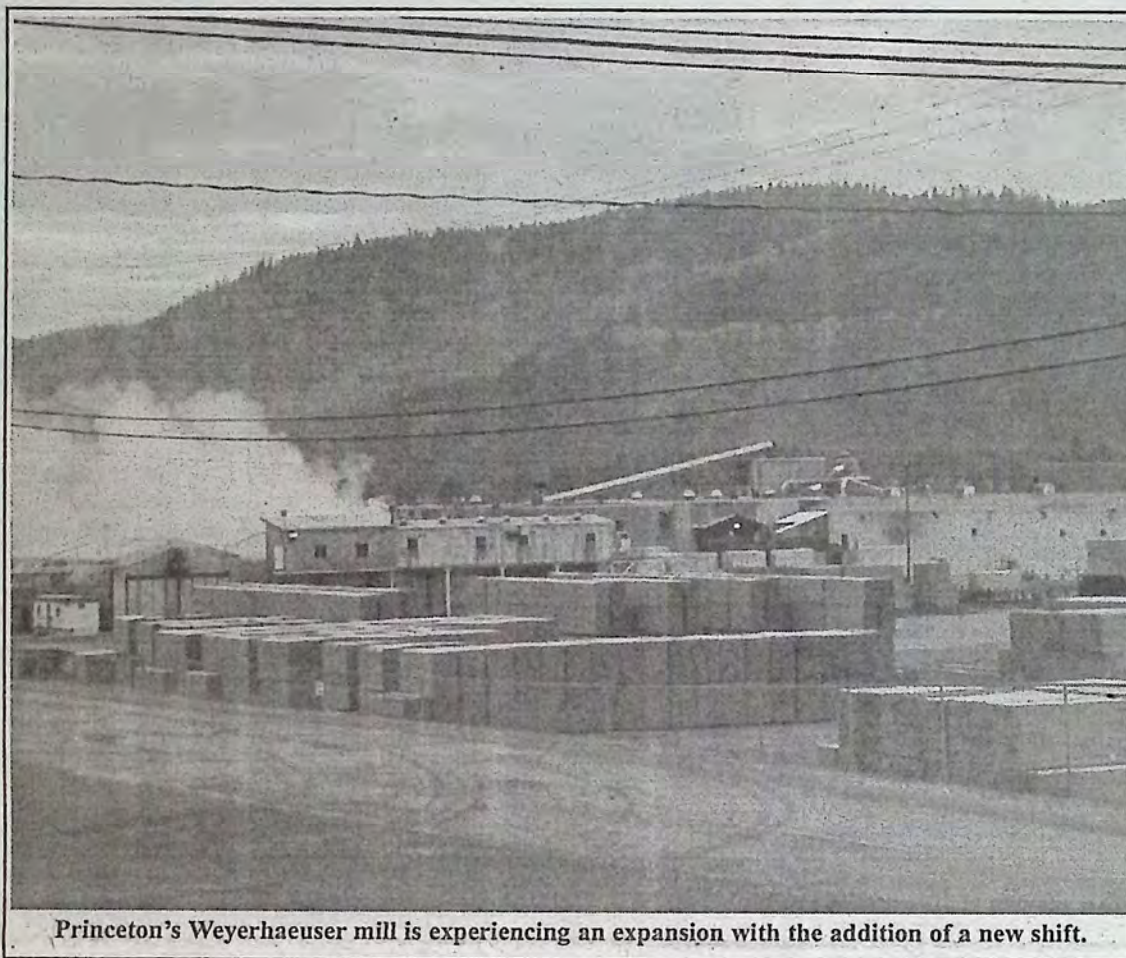
The 18-year old faces charges of Drug Trafficking and was released on strict conditions, one being not to go to Princeton unless for court or with the permission of Princeton RCMP.

The 19-year old was released without charges related to drugs; however, a year-long assault investigation in which he was the suspect was resolved resulting in charges of assault with a weapon.

Both are to appear in court in Princeton on February 10, 2005.

Princeton RCMP say they are continuing with their commitment to residents of the area regarding drugs and drug activity by adopting a zero tolerance approach with anyone involved in the drug trade.

Weyerhaeuser grows again

The Princeton Weyerhaeuser sawmill will begin a unique weekend split shift in early to mid-December. The "split" comes from a group of 20 employees who will run two different processes - sawmilling and the planer mill. These employees will work Friday, Saturday and Sunday, and may work two shifts on the sawmill and one on the planer mill, for example.

This is the fourth shift to be introduced at our local mill. During the past three years, Weyerhaeuser has added between 60 and 70 employees to cover three shifts. The newest 20 employees bring the total up to 210.

Manager Fred Kuhn says the newest shift could not have been added without the support of the employees and the union.

"This is a very, very successful mill," Kuhn says, and gives full credit to the spirit of cooperation which keeps production efficient and safety as a top priority.

"Our focus is on safety," Kuhn explains. "It's not just a money issue. We are concerned with the effects of injuries on employees and their families."

The reason for the fourth shift is to maintain the mill's success. While the current market for lumber is the best it has been in the past 10 years, nobody knows when the market will shift lower nor how low it will go.

"We are planning to design an operating structure to weather the low in the market," Kuhn told the News Leader.

Arts Council looks at new centre

Princeton Arts Council, an umbrella organization for promotion of the arts in Princeton area, is going into discussions with School District #58 regarding use of Riverside School.

At the October 13 Arts Council meeting, President Dawn Johnson reported that the school district is willing to enter discussions, and that she, Vice-President Fred Leard and Treasurer Nick Mills, had

viewed the gym and lobby.

Leard and Mills were enthusiastic about the potential for the area as a cultural centre. It has its own security system, the lobby has excellent lighting, the area has washrooms and storage space. Both recommended the Arts Council enter into discussions.

There were some concerns expressed by some members who were not familiar with the building, but after a lot of discussion, Bill Spring offered a motion to enter into discussions with the school district, listing a number of issues of concern to be reviewed in the discussions. The motion passed.

Arrangements will be made to have a tour of the building for members of groups belonging to the Arts Council to familiarize them with the area in question. In the meantime, the Arts Council executive will begin discussions with the school district.

As the year's activities wind down, Princeton Exhibition Association (PXA) is making plans for the 2004 annual general meeting, slated for November 9 at Town Hall. Ruby Bey heads the nominating committee.

There are five one-year directorships open, two two-year directorships, and president, vice-president, secretary and treasurer positions to be filled.

At the October 12 PXA meeting, Peter Ruoss gave an update on the work done on the new showers building.

The foundation and pony walls are in place, underground water and power services have been installed, as well as underground plumbing.

Princeton Motorsports Association reported a successful regional Moto-X meet on October 2.

Other clubs are becoming interested and have offered help. The Association lost very little money this time.

They are working on grounds and clean-up for winter. Issues

regarding the horse track were resolved.

Dene Thomas reported all is well at the barns, where up to 20 horses are housed, with rental revenue accruing to the PXA.

President Jody Woodford gave the Fall Fair report, saying the fair was a success, with all bills paid and some money left.

She announced the Fall Fair appreciation dinner for sponsors and volunteers will take place on November 6, beginning at 4:00 p.m., with dinner at 4:30. Everyone who volunteered or provided sponsorship money is welcome to attend.

PXA Secretary Carol Ruoss is planning a "thank you" advertisement to show appreciation for those who contributed to grounds improvements during the past season.

Local companies and individuals gave materials, time, equipment use and elbow grease to the grounds and should receive public recognition.

These contributions help keep the facility operational.

Liquor leads to volunteer work

On February 8, 2004, a number of youths were at a bush party along the road to the sewerage pond when police arrived and began confiscating liquor, telling the youths they were consuming alcohol in a public place.

Among the party people was Clayton Swanson, whose bottle of liquor was seized by an officer. Reluctant to lose his booze, Swanson swore at and threatened the officer, began pushing him, and resisted going with the officer when under arrest. Other bush party participants joined in the resistance, and all were charged.

Judge orders fine, probation

On October 14, Allan Materi appeared in Provincial Court in Princeton to plead guilty to one charge of impaired driving and one of obstructing a police officer on July 13, 2004. The former Princeton resident was apprehended following an alert dispatched to local police from Kelowna.

The dispatcher asked police to look for a pick-up truck which was dragging something. Police located the vehicle, which was dragging the exhaust system and lighting its wake with sparks. RCMP followed the vehicle, noting it was weaving from one side of the center line to the other. When police finally stopped the vehicle, Materi was in the driver's seat and showed strong

The group was put into a diversion program in which they were to write a letter of apology to the police and do volunteer community work. The others completed the program, but Swanson did not participate. He is working in Kelowna.

On October 14, Judge G. Sinclair accepted a guilty plea to willful obstruction when Swanson appeared in Provincial Court in Princeton. The 22 year old man was sentenced to six months probation, to be served in Kelowna, and was ordered to write letters of apology to the officers and to do 16 hours of volunteer community work.

Materi began his encounter with police by swearing at the officer, and was unco-operative when taken to the detachment office, where he issued threats and used some really unpleasant language on police, and even slammed a door on an officer's hand.

Two breath tests showed Materi had a blood alcohol level of 210/1000, nearly three times the legal limit.

The 58 year old Winfield resident was ordered to pay a \$600 fine, and was put on probation for nine months, with conditions including assessment, counselling and possible treatment for anger management and alcohol abuse.

Mini-film festival comes to Princeton

The Better Days tour is a traveling mini-film festival starting Oct 20 in Princeton, ending in Grand Forks on Nov 13 and stopping at all communities in between.

Featuring Plan Columbia, a documentary which sheds light on the complex issues of drug trafficking and civil struggle in Columbia, and Harvest of Hope, a documentary about Haiti that is the quintessential primer for understanding the roots of the current crisis in that country.

Dates, locations, and times are as follows: 6:30 p.m., Fri. Oct. 22: Princeton Skills Center, Princeton; 7:00 p.m., Mon. Oct. 25: Chuchuway Hall, Hedley; 7:00p.m., Thurs. Oct. 28: OAPO Senior Citizens Center, Keremeos; 7:00p.m., Fri Oct. 29: Cawston Community Hall.

Both films are approx. one hour long with Plan Columbia being shown first followed by Harvest of Hope. Come to see one or both.

"We are doing this tour to provide small rural communities the opportunity to see films that might usually only be shown in the cities," said one of the Better Days organizers, Anna Kirkpatrick.

"We are trying to connect communities, meaning ordinary people, across huge distances by showing what is happening in different parts of the world, on issues which are international but end up affecting everybody.

Usually the only source for this type of thing is through the major news networks, the major TV sta-

tions, the big papers, etc. but we hope to provide a different perspective where historical events are seen by the people who are directly affected by them, instead of only by those who are making the decisions."

Plan Columbia, directed by Gerard Ungerman and Audrey Brohy, and narrated by Ed Asner, has insightful analysis and interviews from Noam Chomsky, Colombian Presidential candidate Ingrid Betancourt, US Member of Congress Paul Wellstone, Colombians from all walks of life, and many others.

All help to understand how 20 years of U.S. drug-wars in the Andes have resulted in a two fold increase of cocaine import into the US in the last ten years alone. The film, described by the Los Angeles Times as: "A stinging rebuke of recent U.S. anti-drug policies," also studies the current aerial-spray program carried out by the US Defense-contractor Dyncorp and

the recent multi-billion dollar aid package delivered to the Colombian military.

Harvest of Hope was originally planned as a documentary about democracy coming to Haiti with the election of Jean Bertrand Aristide in December 1990. The film dramatically captures the seminal moments in the history of Jean Bertrand Aristide and the Lavalas movement that swept him into the presidency in December 1990.

During the final editing of the original (late September 1991) Haiti was struck by yet another military coup. Editing of the first version came to a halt as filmmaker Kevin Pina returned to Haiti and spent the next three weeks chronicling the brutality and machinations of Haiti's new military leaders and their supporters.

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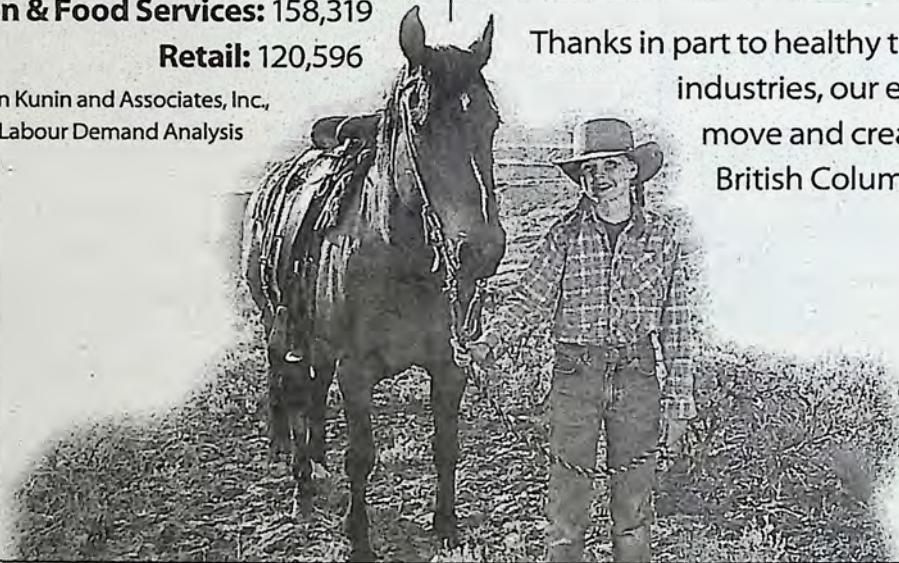

Helpful tips for avoiding the flu

Flu season is quickly approaching. Influenza, or the flu, is a respiratory infection caused by a variety of flu viruses and is highly contagious. It spreads easily from person to person, mainly when an infected person coughs or sneezes. For the elderly, newborn babies, and people with certain chronic illnesses, the flu and its complications can be life-threatening.

Prevention is still the best medicine and there are ways to keep from getting the flu. These include:

- Getting your annual flu shot.
- Keeping up your resistance to infection by eating a healthy diet, getting plenty of rest and exercising regularly.
- Avoiding exposure to the flu virus.
- Washing your hands often and keeping them away from your nose, eyes and mouth.
- Stopping smoking

You need to get the vaccine every year because it changes. Prior to the flu season, scientists prepare a new vaccine made from killed flu viruses. Because the viruses are killed, they cannot cause infections. The vaccine is prepared based on what the scientists expect to see circulating the following winter.

And yes, sometimes a new strain appears after the vaccine has been prepared and you may get the flu in spite of being vaccinated. If the circulating viruses are similar to the vaccine strains that you received you may have some protection and not get as sick.

It takes about two weeks for your immune system to respond to the vaccine and that is why you should have your flu shot well ahead of flu season. Remember, the vaccine does not cause the flu, but you could be exposed to the virus by someone else and get infected soon after you have the vaccine.

You may experience soreness at the site of the vaccination. Other side effects, especially in children who have never had the shot before, include fever, tiredness, and sore muscles. These side effects may begin six to twelve hours after vaccination and may last for up to two days.

The flu vaccine is recommended for the following people:

- Individuals 65 years and older.
- Residents in care facilities.
- Adults and children who have

heart, lung, or kidney disease, asthma, diabetes, cancer, anemia, or immune system disorders. These are considered a high-risk group.

• Caregivers or people who live with someone in a high-risk group.

• Health care workers in contact with people in high-risk groups. This also includes emergency responders (police, firefighters and paramedics) and independent health practitioners and their staff.

• Pregnant women in their third trimester.

• Healthy children aged 6 months to 23 months.

• Family member and caregivers of children 0 to 23 months.

Interior Health hosts clinics

Interior Health will be hosting Free Flu Clinics throughout the Similkameen Valley in the next few weeks.

In Princeton the clinics will be at the Senior Citizens' Drop-In Centre at 162 Angela Avenue.

Dates are Tuesday, October 19th from 9:00 AM to 3:30 PM and again on Tuesday, November 2nd from 9:00 AM to 3:30 PM.

Clinics will also be held at the Princeton Health Centre on Thursday, November 25th from 10:30 AM to 2:00 PM and Thursday, December 2nd from 10:30 AM to 2:00 PM.

Free flu clinics in Hedley will take place at the Hedley School on

Wednesday, November 3rd from 1:00 PM to 2:30 PM.

In Keremeos flu clinics are scheduled for Wednesday, October 20th from 9:00 AM to 3:00 PM and Tuesday, October 26th from 9:00 AM to 12 Noon. These clinics will take place at the Keremeos Seniors' Centre at 421-7th Avenue.

To be eligible for a free flu vaccine you must be 65 years of age or older; 6 months to 64 years of age suffering from chronic diabetes, chronic lung, kidney or heart conditions, cancer, severe anemia, or immune suppression; a health care worker or an emergency worker.

Appointments are not necessary for these clinics.

Living Past 100

Put sunshine in your body

It's that time of year again – the darkness closes in. On October 31, we go back to standard time, which means you may be going home from work in the dark, and those pleasant evenings of walks and gardening are gone. For many people, this is a truly depressing time, and for others, a time to take measures to combat Seasonal Affective Disorder. Others simply go south, or make plans for a winter holiday. Everybody seeks sunshine!

One of the reasons we tend to long for sunshine is due to the fact that our bodies do not store Vitamin D. We produce Vitamin D when stimulated by sunshine. There are a number of things we can do to ensure we get some sunshine in winter, such as walking in daylight at least 15 minutes each day, but the most important thing we need to do is take a Vitamin D supplement.

Vitamin D is essential for strong bones and teeth. For older people who take a daily calcium supplement, Vitamin D is probably part of the supplement. For younger people, a capsule containing cod liver or halibut liver oil may be necessary.


Vitamin D is very important for children, because they are growing bones and teeth. However, parents must give the Vitamin D and keep it out of children's reach as too much is toxic.

Vitamin D is important for immunity, and the family's health will be much better in the winter if everyone receives a Vitamin D dosage each day. In addition, because Vitamin D replaces sunshine, family members will have sunnier dispositions during the winter months!

Man defends self in Court and loses

Danny Ladouceur defended himself in Provincial Court in Princeton on October 14. Acting as his own counsel, Ladouceur set out to prove reasonable doubt as to his guilt on a charge of driving under the influence.

The court heard testimony from RCMP Cst. Mike Kelly that he had seen a vehicle drive down Kenley Avenue around midnight on October 25, 2003, into an area Kelly had been watching for drug trafficking. Curious, Cst. Kelly did a U-turn on Lime Street and drove back to the corner of Kenley and Lime to observe.

When he did so, the vehicle pulled back onto Kenley Avenue and drove two blocks to Billiter Avenue, where it turned right and drove into the parking lot of Silver Crest Apartments.

Cst. Kelly said he saw Ladouceur exit from the driver's side and called to him to come over. When Ladouceur met the officer, Cst. Kelly noted the smell of liquor on Ladouceur's breath as well as other signs of possible impairment. He arrested Ladouceur and took him to the detachment office for a breath test which registered .120. He then charged Ladouceur with impaired driving.

Ladouceur did his best to cast doubt on the visibility of the driver's side, the reading of rights, the right to call a lawyer, and a variety of details of the event. In the end, it was all for nought, as Judge G. Sinclair believed Cst. Kelly's testi-

mony. Ladouceur, age 59, had prior convictions, the most recent 11 years ago. He was ordered to pay a \$600 fine. He is prohibited from driving for one year.

Judge fines actor for driving

Kevin Zerebeski, who resides in Vancouver and admits he works "occasionally" as an actor, appeared in Provincial Court in Princeton to plead guilty to a charge of driving without a licence.

Zerebeski was stopped in the Princeton area after police noted he was exceeding the posted speed limit. The actor, who had prior

convictions of impaired driving and driving while prohibited, had not had a valid driver's licence in six years.

Zerebeski told the court he had not expected to be driving, but the person with whom he was riding had claimed to be tired and Zerebeski had taken the wheel.

Judge G. Sinclair ordered him to pay an \$800 fine.

KVR author draws 'a good crowd'

Railroad historian and author Barrie Sanford spoke to a crowd of 50 in the Princeton Castle Resort meeting room Saturday afternoon.

Sanford, who lives in Brookmere, has written three books - two covering the history of the Kettle Valley Railway.

Following an introduction by Princeton Museum President Nick Mills, Sanford gave a brief overview of the history of the KVR.

The railway was completed in 1916 with the last passenger train to use the line in 1964. The final train travelled the route in 1989 and the rail was removed in 1991.

Sanford put the importance of the railway into perspective quickly.

"The telegraph line along the railway was the internet of the day."

He also pointed out the significance of the project today.

"The KVR is a debt we owe to our forefathers."

Sanford said the workers who spent time on the KVR worked hard to realize a better life for themselves.

He stressed how railroaders wives were important but never really received the recognition they deserved.

"They often sent their husbands off to work not knowing if they'd be back home in days or weeks."

Sanford also showed a number of slides to demonstrate the enormous task of establishing the Kettle Valley Railway.

Historic photos included shots of early construction and development to some taken the last day a train travelled on the famous tracks.

Sanford then opened the floor for a question period and was eager to share many railroad stories related to the men and the workings of the KVR.

Following presentations to Sanford from both the Town of Princeton and Area H,

Similkameen Valley EDO Michael McLaughlin discussed future development of the former KVR railway right-of-way.

McLaughlin tried to emphasize the potential of the Spirit of 2010 Trail system and what it could do to the local economy.

"Princeton has been designated one of five hub communities," he said.

He explained the reason for the designation is that Princeton is, "well-connected to many services."

He estimated a total of "ten-thousand cycle days per year with each cyclist spending one hundred dollars per day" in the Princeton area.

"That's a total of one million dollars a year coming to this area."

He also stressed the importance of local support for the project.

"Business needs to understand the potential of the trail," McLaughlin said.

"You are the ones who will make it happen."

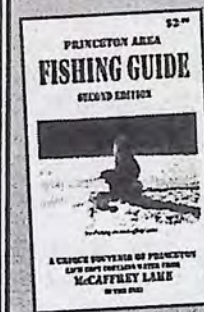

Grilled Turkey Stacked Sandwich

- 2 tbsp each: olive oil and lemon juice
- 1 tsp dried rosemary, crumbled
- 3/4 lb turkey scallopini
- 8 slices eggplant
- 1 round sourdough bread
- 1/2 cup prepared pesto, divided
- 2 plum tomatoes, thinly sliced
- 1 each: roasted sweet red and yellow peppers
- 1 bunch watercress, trimmed
- 1/2 red onion, thinly sliced

In a small bowl, whisk together oil, lemon juice and rosemary; divide in half. In shallow baking dish combine half of marinade and turkey; let stand 15 minutes. Place remaining marinade in another shallow dish with eggplant slices, turn to coat both sides; set aside. Grill or barbecue turkey slices and eggplant for 2 to 3 minutes per side.

Slice top third off of bread. Tear out bread from top and bottom sections, leaving 1/2 inch rim, to create hollow bowl. Spread inside of bread bowl with half of pesto. Layer with eggplants slices, tomato, half of watercress and turkey. Add roasted peppers, remaining watercress and onion. Spread remaining pesto on inside of bread top; place over bread bowl, pressing down firmly. Wrap well with plastic wrap and refrigerate overnight. Serves 6-8.

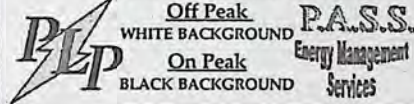

To determine whether or not you fit this category ask yourself these questions: Can I swim? Do I use Centennial Pool?

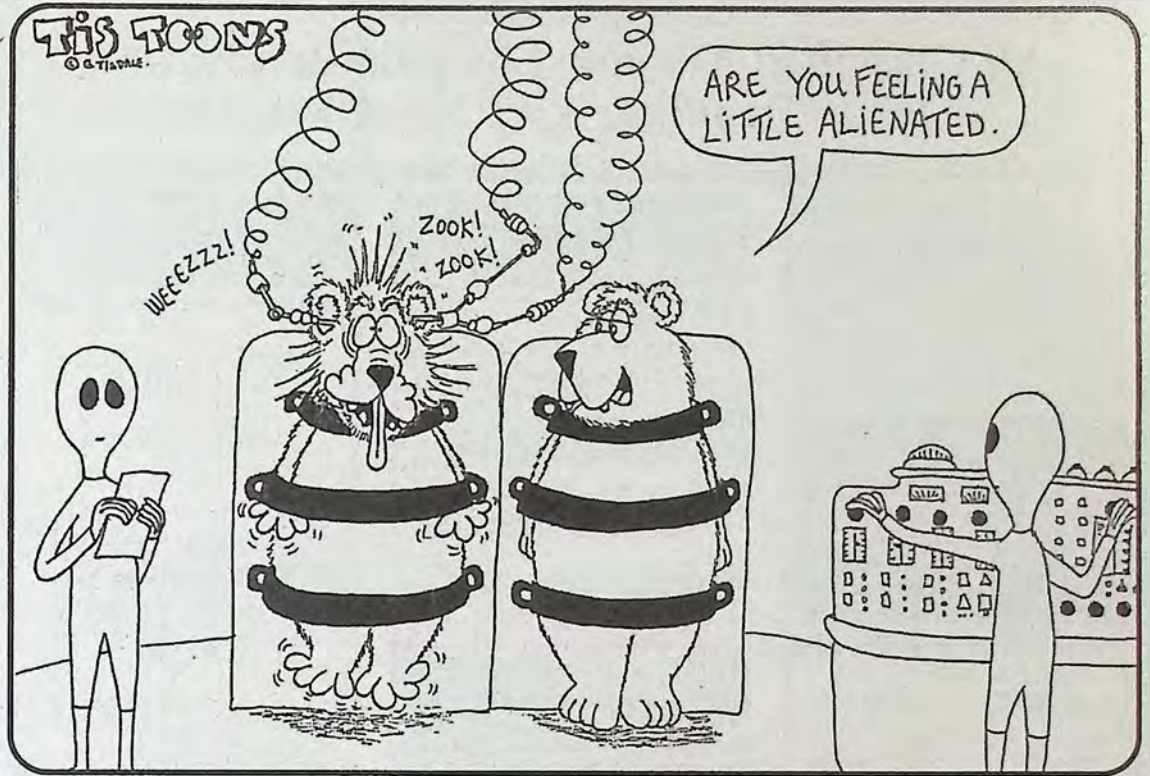
If you answer 'yes' to one and 'no' to the other, you are a "middie."

Cook, are living in the real world and understand the distinction between capital and revenue costs, realizing what a drain on the town coffers to keep open such a facility year round would be.

The public referendum held some years ago that rejected the idea of an enhanced swimming pool can indeed be repeated, but adjoining Area H, who in the recent past turned down the opportunity of using the town's library services, pay little or nothing towards the annual deficit of the present Centennial Pool and contribute zilch in grants to various groups that are already giving valuable services to the whole district, are they willing to make a sizeable contribution to Cook's scheme of things? Before he is too critical of Town Councillors for protecting the financial interests of their own tax paying electorate, I suggest our Area H friend sees what sort of response he gets to his suggestions from his own local government representatives about what share of the costs they would be prepared to meet? As for Copp-Laroque's feelings on where she is spending most of her days in Princeton she is clear.

"I love it, it's a cool place to be."

It appears in each rotation of Katimavik participants there's one member who will always be remembered as the comedian.

Denny Zhou, 19, of Markham, Ontario has been tagged with that label.

He has earned it, too, according to Ruoss.

"He's quite a clown."

Zhou says he learned about the Katimavik program through a peer.

"My cadet officer told me about it and after camp I checked the

website, it looked good, sounded good and here I am."

He also views Katimavik as holding answers to his future.

"One of the reasons why I'm here is that I hope after Katimavik I'll have a better picture in my mind of what I want to do."

Zhou is also working at Princeton Fairgrounds.

"He fools around a lot," Ruoss chuckles, "But he's willing to learn."

She even says the combination of Copp-Laroque and Zhou working together has been beneficial to the projects they are working on.

"Claren's even teaching him some things."

One of the major projects the Katimavik volunteers are involved with this year is the Spook House. They are helping construct it and many will be participating in the annual Hallowe'en celebration hosted by the Fire Department.

AMENDMENT BYLAW NO. 2313, 2004

This text amendment proposes to provide general regulations for temporary dwellings in the Electoral Area H Rural Land Use Bylaw No. 1725, 1997. Under the proposed general regulations for temporary dwellings section, an application will be able to construct a second single detached dwelling, however, a completion inspection will not be given until the existing dwelling is made uninhabitable (by removing the cooking appliances and the energy source for these cooking appliances). By inserting regulations for temporary dwellings, the applicable RDOS Bylaws will be made easier for the community to abide by, to interpret and to enforce. The text amendment also seeks to revise the general regulations for temporary dwellings sections in both the Electoral Area E Zoning Bylaw No. 1566, 1995 and the Electoral Area F Rural Land Use Bylaw No. 1742, 1997.

A copy of the above Bylaw is available for inspection between the hours of 8:30 AM and 4:30 PM Monday through Friday, excluding holidays, from October 12, 2004 to October 28, 2004, both inclusive, in the office of the Regional District of Okanagan-Similkameen, 101 Martin Street, Penticton, B. C. and at the Princeton Town Hall, 169 Bridge Street, Princeton, B. C.

Written comments regarding this application will be received at the Regional District office up to and including October 27, 2004. At the Hearing, all persons who deem their interest in property affected by the proposed Bylaw shall be given an opportunity to present written information or to speak to matters contained within the Bylaw.

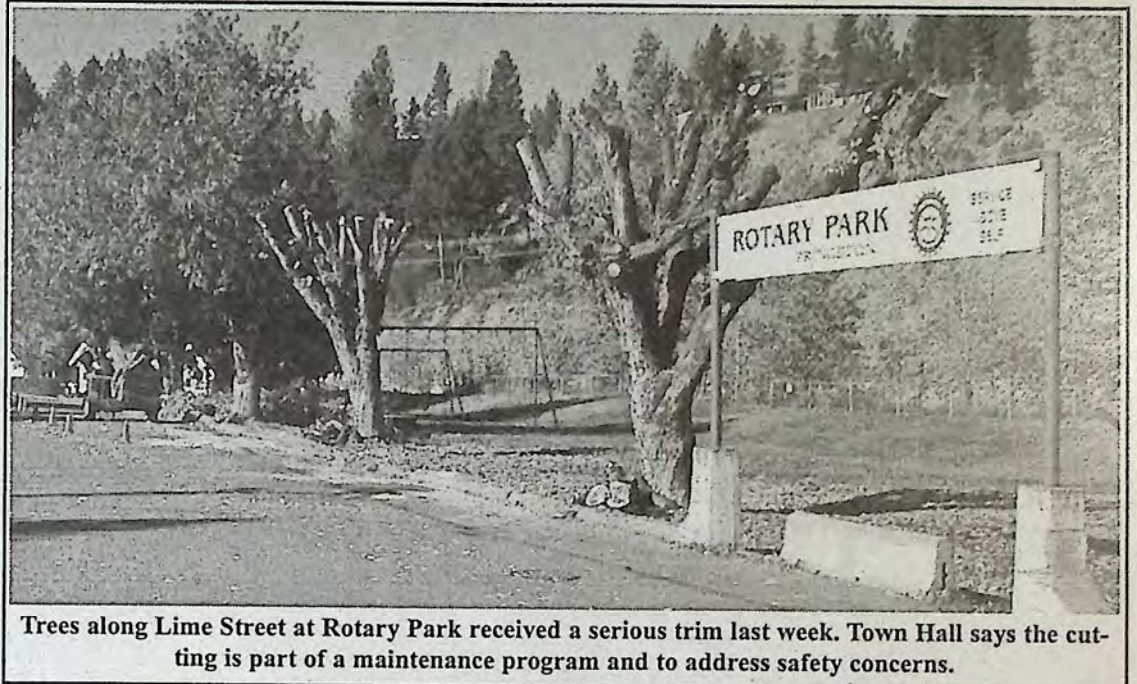
