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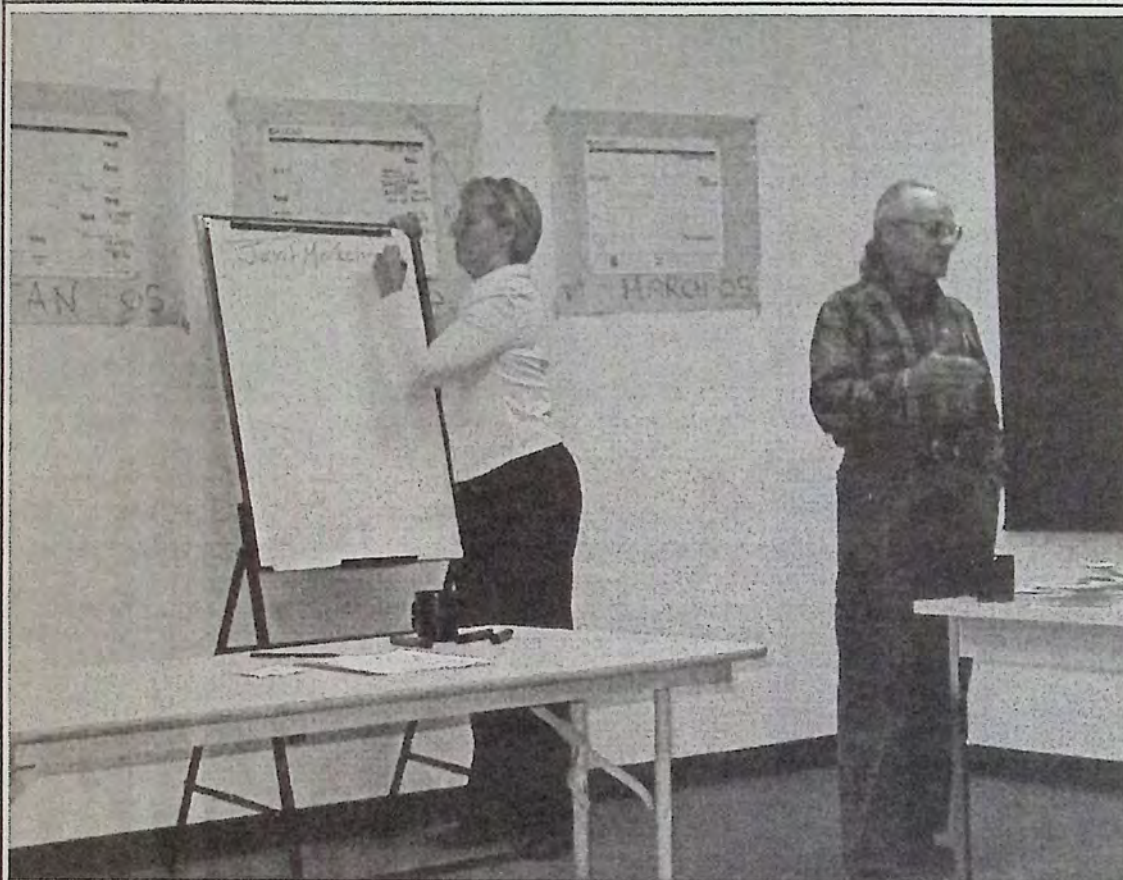

The first annual Princeton Events Calendar Development Symposium was well attended last Wednesday night.

The event, organized by the PABEA (Princeton Area Business Enhancement Association), attracted 15 representatives of 20 different local clubs, groups and associations.

John Akerley acted as facilitator, "We're trying to make it better in Princeton and the area and that's why we are here together tonight."

Once 12-months of events were documented discussion revolved around the need to create a balanced calendar in the future.

"We've got to improve ourselves in order for the community to improve."

Sharan Jung, Skills Centre Manager, explained a concept they are working on called the Similkameen Centre for Non-Profit Management.

The purpose of the management program is to provide non-profit groups with a variety of services.

"We've been thinking about the economy in Princeton and there's a lot of activity economically generated by local non-profits," Jung explained.

She demonstrated that a two-day event with a \$15 admission and attendance of 150 would generate \$17,000 in economic activity.

"So, non-profits count."

The Skills Centre is currently collecting letters of support from local non-profits to be included with an application for funding through Western Diversification.

Funding would be required the first year with management fees to cover future costs.

## Burton Avenue petition building momentum

Ed Goudreau has started a petition to lobby for a traffic light on Highway 3 at Burton Avenue.

The petition states:

"We, the undersigned residents of Princeton, demand a pedestrian controlled stop light be installed at the intersection of Highway 3 and Burton Avenue for the safety of all residents, visitors and motorists who use this intersection."

Copies of the petition are currently located at The Hut, Golden Hills Grocery, the Doctors Offices, Seniors Drop-In Centre and the News Leader.

Goudreau is following up on a suggestion made by Southern Interior MP Jim Gouk to start a petition to present to Town Council in support of the need for a light at the intersection.

He spoke to Princeton Town Council in August regarding safety issues related to the location.

Goudreau is not sure how many people will sign the petitions but says, "I will collect as many signatures as I can."

He will take the completed petitions to Princeton Town Council in hopes of getting support for his request of a controlled crossing at Highway 3 and Burton Avenue.

## Council wants study on thermal plant

A proposal by Compliance Energy to build a thermal power plant at the old Similco Mine site has raised Town Council's concerns. At the October 18 meeting, Town Council decided to request

an environmental impact study be done prior to giving their support for the project. Further, they would like a public meeting hosted by Compliance to explain to the public exactly what they

intend to build and how they will obtain the fuel.

Council acted in response to a letter from Compliance to comment or make recommendations regarding the Compliance application for an Air Emission Discharge Permit which defines the plant as fuelled initially by diesel, then maintained with wood waste and coal fuels. At a regional district air quality meeting, Mayor Keith Olsen heard some concerns expressed about air quality in the event the thermal plant is built.

Another question Council would like answered is where the wood waste would come from.

Councillor Spencer Coyne pointed out that the air quality requirements for such a small thermal generating plant are not as stringent as those for a larger plant. He felt more information was needed before Council could support the project.

## Council supports union letter

In response to Canada's successful settlement in the Free Trade Agreement softwood lumber appeal, United Steelworkers of America - IWA Council wants Canadian money back from the USA. A letter to Princeton Town Council asks Council to write to international trade minister Jim Peterson to say the government of Canada should work hard to recoup the \$2.8 billion US paid in countervailing duties in the softwood lumber dispute.

The union points out "companies enjoyed the help of Canadian politicians and diplomats, financed by workers and taxpayers, in ensuring access to our largest market".

In addition, the union requested the letter ask for a commitment from forest industry companies "to measures that will ensure investment levels sufficient to allow Canada's forest industry to compete in international markets, create new jobs in a more diversified industry, provide workforce training as well as pension-bridging aimed at allowing older workers out and younger workers in, develop infrastructure and increase research and develop-

ment spending"

Council did not hesitate to vote in support of sending a letter to Minister Peterson.

## Deer bylaw is in the works

A bylaw making feeding of deer illegal is being drafted by Princeton Town Council and is expected to be ready for public presentation at the next Council meeting (October 18).

In making the announcement at the October 4 Council meeting, Mayor Keith Olsen expressed surprise at the interest of television and radio in the deer problem in Princeton.

## Airport lease is on hold

Rylant Construction Ltd., which leases space at Princeton Airport, asked Council for a one year extension of the agreement, with a five percent annual increase.

As the rental agreement does not expire until June 2005, Council decided to take no action at this time, and will advertise the rental opportunity through public tender when the expiry date is closer.

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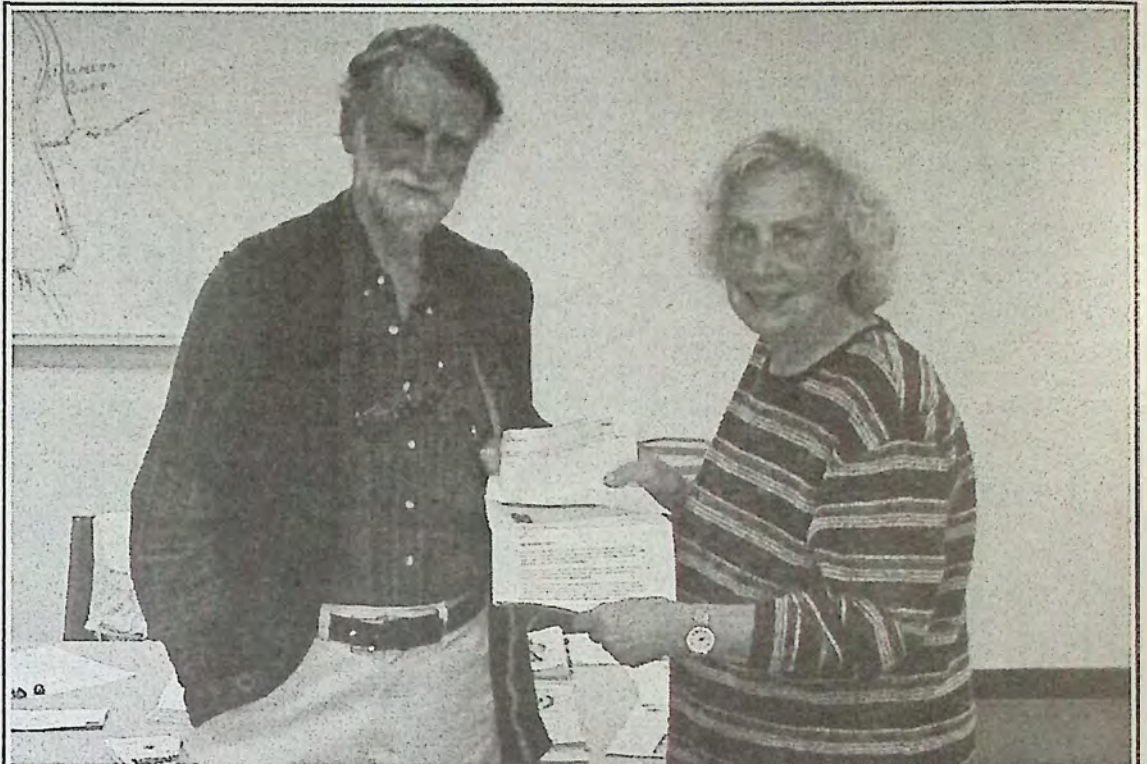

## Naturalists discuss variety of items

Vermilion Forks Field Naturalists met last Monday night in the Skills Centre for the regular monthly meeting.

President Madelon Schouten suggested the group apply to Town Council for a small grant to go toward the creation of more banners to be displayed downtown.

"We have been encouraged by one of the councillors to apply for a grant which I think we should do as the town seems to be quite keen on the idea."

A motion was made to send a letter to Town Council requesting a grant, not to exceed \$500.

The banners are hung on lamp standards on Bridge Street and Vermilion Avenue and have been well received.

The group then shifted its focus on the coalbed methane project.

Schouten reminded the membership a letter has been prepared by the "Concerned Citizens of Princeton" where all one must do is fill in their name and address then mail the letter to the Mining and Environment Ministers.

Copies of the letter were made available at the meeting.

"They are trying to fast track this project," Schouten said of the CBM developers.

"There is public resistance to this type of mining and they may not be as interested in getting involved in the project as a result."

A grant had been received by the

group from the Public Conservation Assistance Fund for work at Swan Lake.

Schouten said the grant, worth \$4,171, would be spent on fencing, the clean-up of nesting boxes, the collection of trail signs, a trail map project and more work on bird blinds.

Doug Rebagliati made a presentation to the group on a walking trail system around the town he is trying to develop.

He had proposed the idea to another community group two years ago and just recently discov-

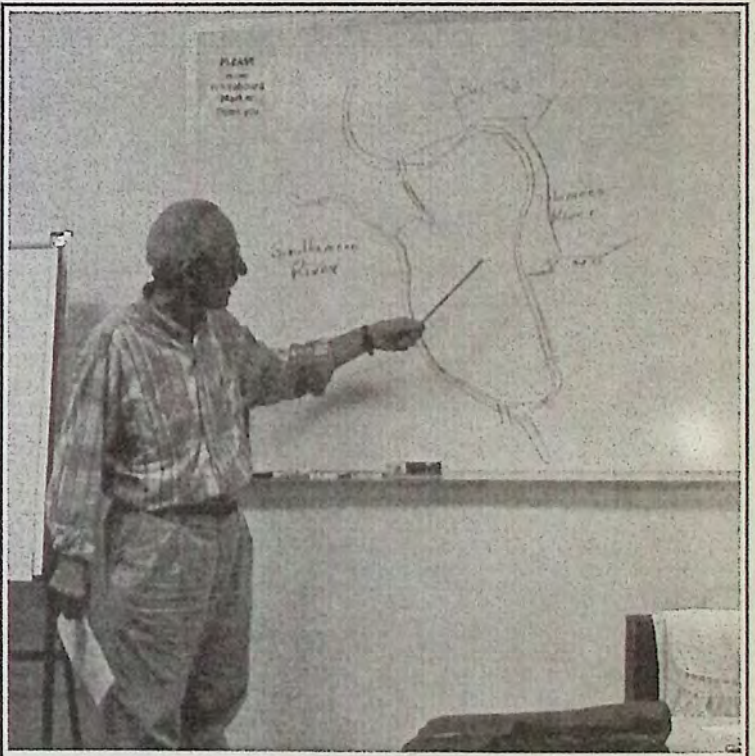
ered that group had dropped the project.

Rebagliati feels it would be a simple and important project to complete.

"I was blown away by how lovely it was and there's varied terrain."

The 8-kilometre loop trail seemed to interest many of the members present, although there was no formal commitment made.

"If this was developed as a trail," Rebagliati said, "It would be accessible from a multitude of locations."

## GSAR introduces coroner to locals

There are a total of 21 full time coroners in British Columbia with 120 community coroners serving communities in five regions throughout the province.

Mike Barrett, a community coroner based in Penticton, and regional coroner Jeff Dolan attended last Tuesday night's meeting of Princeton GSAR.

They were invited to make a presentation on the coroners service for members of GSAR and invited guests, including Princeton RCMP detachment, Princeton Paramedics and Princeton Highway Extrication.

Barrett outlined what a coroner is and what one does, which is to establish the cause of a death.

The five questions a coroner must answer are who the victim is, how the victim died, when the death occurred, where it occurred and by what means did the death occur.

To identify a body there are a number of methods which include the use of ID, unique jewellery, consulting family and friends, fingerprints and tattoos, autopsy, dental and medical records and finally, DNA.

Dolan says DNA testing is the absolute last method used, "because it is so expensive."

Barrett described how he normally works on a case when it reaches autopsy stage.

"Usually when I go in the autopsy room I have all my photos from the scene, all the medical records I could find and we'll go through it

with the pathologist to try to figure the death out," Barrett explained.

The coroner says working closely with RCMP, emergency response crews and doctors provide valuable clues in determining a person's cause of death.

When asked whether or not police traffic analysts provided help in cases involving motor vehicle accidents Barrett replied, "I find his stuff interesting but my concern is with the body."

The subject of natural causes was mentioned and Dolan pointed out, "anytime it's anything other than natural causes for a death, we're involved."

There are five classifications of death the coroner uses: natural causes, accidental, homicide, suicide and undetermined.

Each death will fall under one of these classifications following the coroners investigation.

Barrett, who spent many years as an RCMP officer, then later opened a successful coffee shop in Penticton and later moved into fish farming, has been a coroner for just over two years.

## Street honours Stouts

The street which joins Burton Avenue to Similkameen Avenue, and provides access to Tri-Valley Construction, has a name.

At the October 18 Town Council meeting, Councillor Kathy Clement proposed it be called "Stout Street".

Councillor Clement based her suggestion on Tom Stout having started Tri-Valley Construction,

"This is the most satisfying career I've ever had."

Barrett took over the Princeton District when Larry Caitlin left the service last November and handles about 150 cases a year with about a dozen annually in this area.

He also stated there are two different investigations going on in most cases.

For example, in the case of a homicide, the RCMP are trying to determine who killed the victim while the coroner is trying to determine how the victim died.

Both investigating teams will share information and findings.

The coroner can also make recommendations based on cases where a safety concern may be identified.

Barrett says the average autopsy lasts between one-and-a-half to two hours and that the people involved in GSAR, EMS and Victim Services do not receive the credit they deserve in the work they do before the coroner gets involved.

He then thanked all members present for their help and cooperation.

and his wife, Gloria, was a founder of Princeton Museum Society, and Tom assisted in building the first museum.

Council agreed with her and voted in favour of "Stout Street".

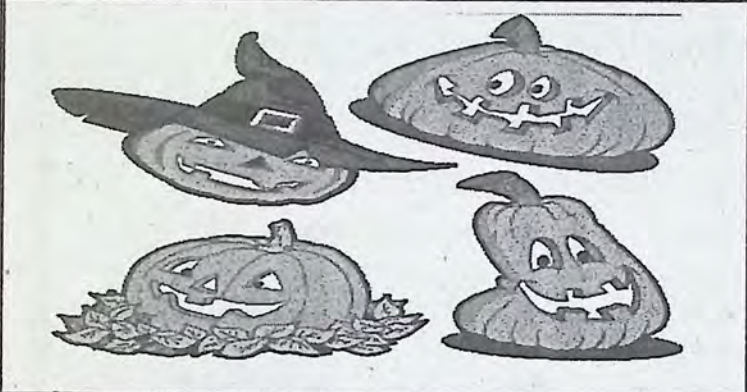

# Local student health ranks low

*BC Health: Local Health Statistical Profiles 2003* ranks communities according to health and children at risk, as well as ranking socio-economic status.

In School District #58, the socio-economic status ranks Merritt as third worst in BC, and Princeton as eighth worst among the province's 78 regions.

In *Children at Risk Indices 2003*, Princeton ranked fourth worst region while Merritt is seventh worst. This was an improvement!

When it comes to health problems, Merritt ranked worst, with Princeton fourth worst.

Merritt ranks the fifth worst in BC for crime.

School District #58 enrolls 2900

students and serves a general population of approximately 16,012 people living in the communities and surrounding areas of Merritt and Princeton. Approximately 37 percent of the district's population is classified as rural.

### Success markers

Approximately 22.4 percent of Merritt's population and 4.2 percent of Princeton's population if of First Nation's ancestry. The percentage of students with First Nations ancestry continues to increase while the total student population remains relatively constant. In Princeton area, 70 students are registered as First Nation's ancestry.

In terms of First Nations achieve-

ment, School District #58 has steadily increased the number of First Nations students graduating from secondary school, and has become a model for other districts. School District #58 has been remarkably successful in working with First Nations in planning how to spend federal funds for First Nations education. Working with six Indian Bands, including Upper Similkameen Indian Band, School District #58 has reached an LEA agreement for spending federal funds. Many school districts, such as the one serving Hedley and Keremeos, have been unable to reach an agreement. This is detrimental to the district as well as First Nations students.

## New Immunization Programs: More Protection for your Baby

Families and their babies are now eligible for free flu shots, as the province has recently announced funding to increase immunization programs aimed at protecting children from influenza, as well as chicken pox and meningitis.

Starting this October, children aged 6-23 months, families and caregivers of infants 0-23 months, as well as pregnant women in their third trimester are now eligible for a free flu shot.

This is great news for parents and families, reports Dr. Paul Hasselback, Senior Medical Health Officer for Interior Health.

Influenza (the flu) can cause significant illness for young babies and their families. The flu vaccine offers extra protection for this vulnerable population.

Families and caregivers of infants 0-23 months can simply call their local public health office to arrange an appointment for their flu shot. They are also reminded to bring their infants Passport to Health with them so the vaccination can be recorded.

Women in their third trimester of pregnancy can simply show up at their local flu clinics for their free shot.

In Interior Health, children aged 6-23 months, number about 5,000 or roughly 1% of the population, yet they make up a higher portion of hospitalizations due to complications from influenza. The flu is a highly contagious infection of the nose, throat and lungs. Influenza disease may lead to more severe and life-threatening illnesses, such as pneumonia, especially for in people 65 years and older and other at-risk groups.

Influenza starts with muscle ache, headache and fever and often develops a dry cough. Colds on the other hand, develop a runny nose and don't often develop a fever. If you suspect you or your child has the flu, stay home, drink plenty of fluids, get lots of rest and consult your family physician if symptoms don't improve - especially if there are other health concerns.

As part of the announcement, more immunization programs are in the works for Chicken Pox (Varicella) for infants at 12 months and for children in Kindergarten and Grade 6. A catch up vaccination program will see children in Grade 9 receive vaccinations for a form of meningitis (Meningococcal C). Both of these

programs will start in 2005.

This is an exciting and important step in expanding protection for our children from these diseases. Some of previous programs only targeted those with chronic illness who are more susceptible to disease.

These new vaccines add to our comprehensive immunization program, which currently provides free infant immunizations for: diphtheria, whooping cough (pertussis), tetanus, polio, measles, mumps, hepatitis B, German measles (rubella), Hib meningitis, pneumococcal disease and meningococcal C meningitis.

## Living Past 100

### Take steps against falling

Many middle-aged people are not cautious enough when dealing with the slippery conditions of winter. They may change the tires on their cars, but they may not change their other habits, such as walking or running as a form of exercise. A person may actually be safer driving to work than walking on icy sidewalks!

A broken hip or back can shorten the life of anyone over age 50. You are much better off with exercise indoors. Buy a membership in a gym and do your exercises there. It is cheaper than falling, cheaper than a wheelchair or time off work.

Watch out for slippery sidewalks and steps. Sometimes you are safer slogging through deep snow than walking on a slippery sidewalk. Even if you fall in the snow, at least it cushions the impact.

Use safety salt or sand on your home walkways. Make sure the boots you wear have a good tread.

For people over 50 years, thinking about quitting some winter sports may be in order. You may need to quit downhill skiing and switch to cross-country, and you may be wise to give up skating. Older bones break far more easily than those of younger people. As we age, bones become more brittle.

If all of this sounds discouraging, take heart. You can still enjoy the winter simply by changing your habits and taking a few precautions against falls.

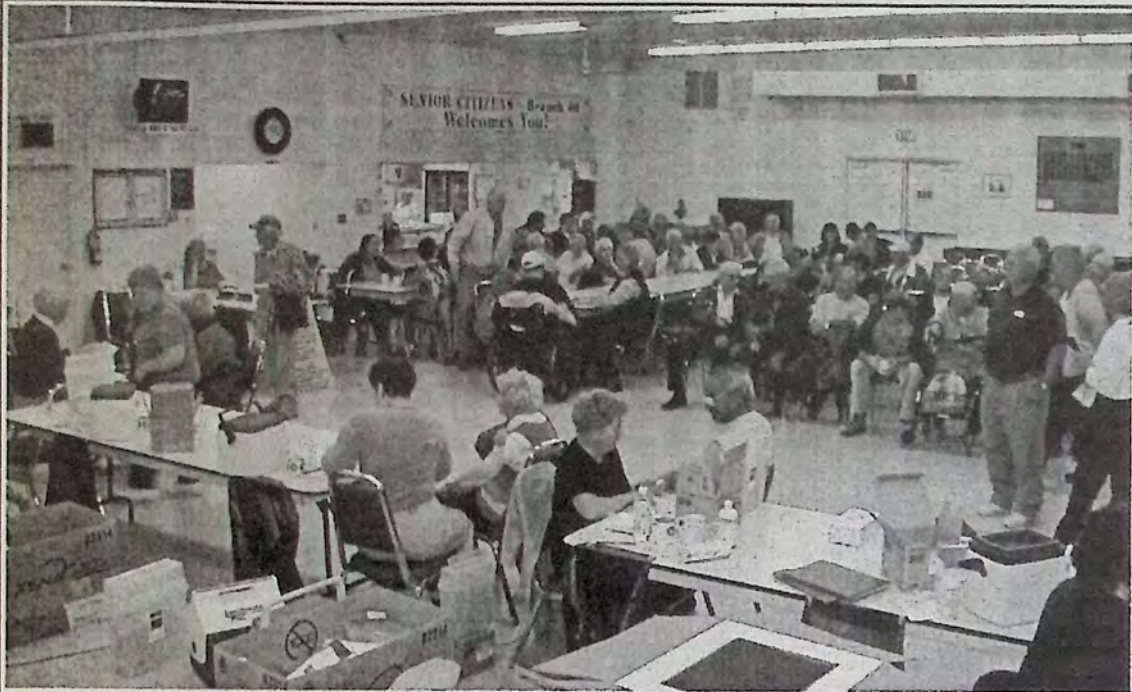

## Town works crew is ready for snow

The Town of Princeton works crew is ready for the snow. They will use a sand and salt mixture as a de-icer, and the plowing schedule will remain the same as previous years. The schedule is as follows: emergency routes and school access routes will be plowed first; then side streets, and finally the downtown core. Crews will begin snow removal early in the morning, and motorists are asked to watch for snow removal equipment at work in low visibility conditions.

Snow removal on the sidewalks in front of homes and businesses is the responsibility of property owners, who can be fined for failing to clear the snow. As well, property owners are expected to use de-icer on slippery sidewalks. Snow from sidewalks may be shoveled into the street, but only to the extent it does not hamper the movement of vehicles down the street.

In extreme snow conditions, residents are asked to keep vehicles at home unless they must go to work or have an emergency. Both town and rural residents should ensure they have extra food and medication supplies on hand during the

next four months in order to avoid travelling in extreme conditions.

Precautions for winter should be made now. Stocking your vehicle with salt, sand, flashlight, jumper cables, a working flashlight and a blanket should be done now.

## Museum stays open

Princeton's museum has set a number of records this year due to being open a record number of days, thanks to the assistance of Katimavik workers and Museum Society volunteers.

The number of visitors this year tops any previous year, with more than 4,000 signing in the guest book. There were more tours of the museum this year, in which large numbers of students and tourists saw the historic displays and the fossil and rock collection in the Joe Pollard Wing.

More than one busload of Taiwanese tourists enjoyed the tour this year and managed to overcome the language barrier to some extent.

One of the popular "sit down" displays has been the new continu-

ous loop video trip on the KVR and the Princeton lifestyle video. The television set sits high on the wall and visitors can sit on an old church pew to watch. For some of the older visitors, the KVR video brought back memories of trips they took on the railroad.

The fluorescent rocks and the excellent fossil collection remain a constant attraction for young and old. This year, the museum featured artifacts from Copper Mountain and Allenby for the reunion. Plans are already underway for a change in displays for next year.

There were no long-range plans for what could be done if the public shows as little interest as the business community.

**Turkey Chili Nachos**

- 1 tbsp. oil
- 1 lb. ground turkey
- 1 medium onion, chopped
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 1 tsp. dried oregano
- 1/2 tsp. chili powder
- 1/2 tsp. cumin
- salt and pepper to taste
- 1 cup cooked black beans
- 7.5 oz. can tomato sauce
- 11.3 oz. pkg. white corn tortilla chips
- 1/2 red sweet pepper, diced
- 1/2 green sweet pepper, diced
- 1 to 2 jalapeno peppers
- 1/2 cup black olives, optional
- 2 cups shredded Monterey Jack cheese
- guacamole, sour cream

In large skillet over medium-high heat, heat oil. Stir in turkey, breaking up with spoon; cook until no longer pink. Stir in onion, garlic, oregano, chili powder and cumin; cook until onion is soft. Season with salt and pepper. Stir in black beans and tomato sauce; simmer until heated through. Place corn tortillas onto large baking sheet, spoon turkey chili over top. Sprinkle with peppers and olives, if desired. Sprinkle with cheese. Bake at 425 F about 5 minutes or until cheese melts. Serve with guacamole and sour cream.

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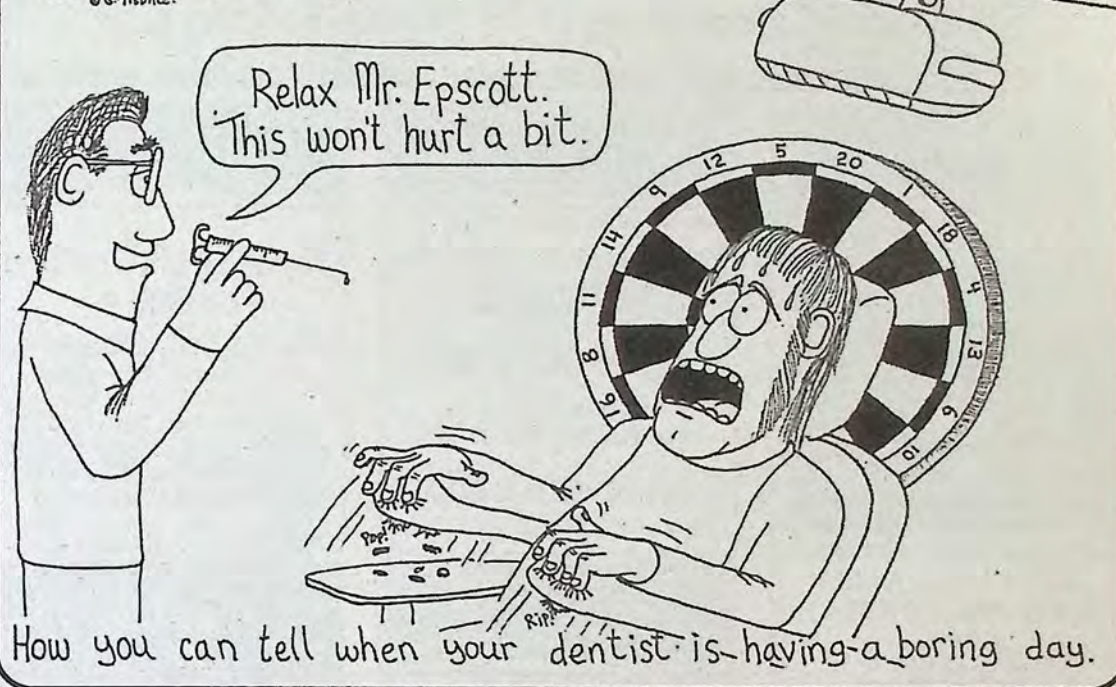

If your asset allocation strategy requires you to maintain a large fixed-income component, generally try to hold the higher interest-paying investments inside your RRSP, and hold the more "tax-favoured" dividend or capital gains paying investments outside of your RRSP.

Interest, dividends and capital gains are not taxed at all when they are earned inside your RRSP. Investments grow on a totally tax-sheltered basis within an RRSP. Tax only becomes payable when you make a withdrawal from your RRSP, and all withdrawals are taxed as "regular" income (it does not matter if investment returns were ever in the form of interest, dividends or capital gains). Also remember that you cannot take advantage of any losses in an RRSP.

Outside an RRSP, interest, dividends and capital gains are all taxed differently. Interest income is fully taxable, the same as your salary, net business income and other "regular" income, while dividends and capital gains receive preferential tax treatment. Dividends from Canadian corporations are "grossed-up" on your tax return and then a special dividend tax credit applies.

This generally means that dividends are effectively taxed at a much lower tax rate than "regular" income. Capital gains are also effectively taxed at a lower rate. Only 50% of net capital gains are included in your income. Your asset allocation should be reviewed regularly to maximize return and adjusted as required to correspond with changes in age, risk posture, and economic climate. As for Raegan, Burbidge could not resist pointing out the progress she has made on the project.

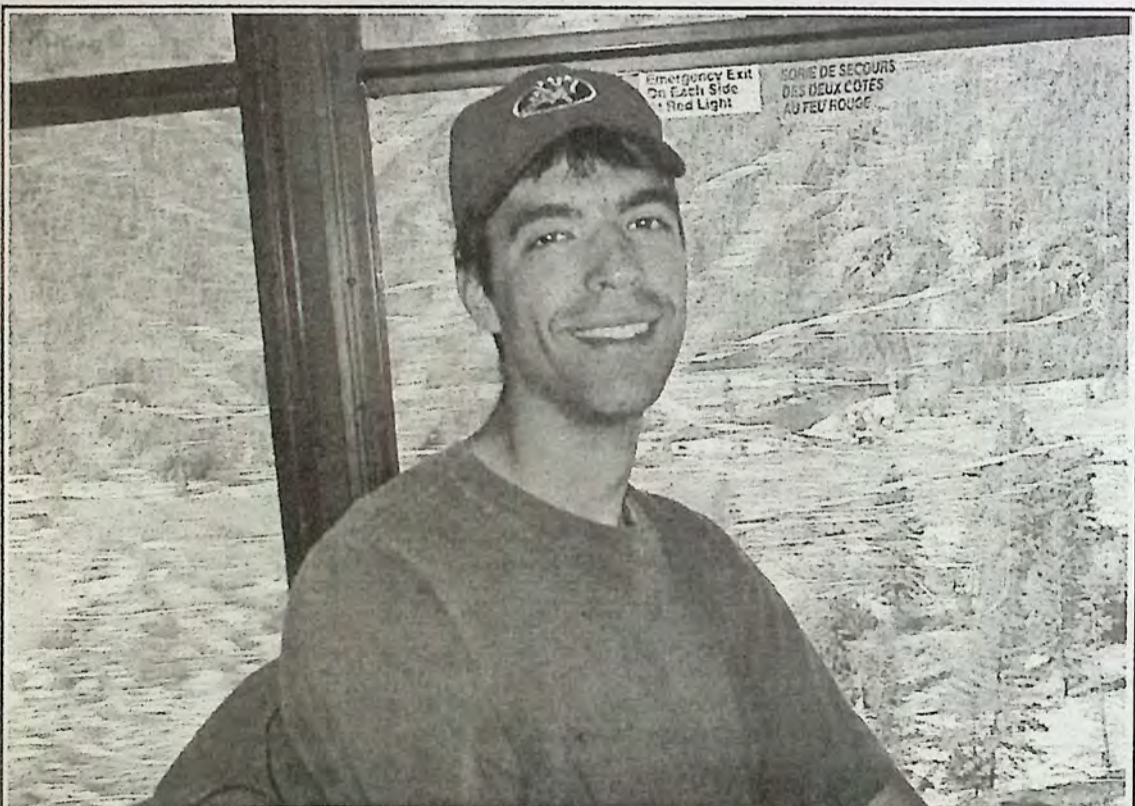
"She's certainly becoming more skillful with a hammer."
