Council cancels study request

Building a coal-fired thermal electrical generating plant, as proposed by Compliance Energy, will have no opposition from Princeton Town Council.

Council reversed its position at the November 1 Council meeting after having heard a presentation by Compliance Energy, in which Compliance gave a detailed account of their plans.

Mayor Keith Olsen said he felt Compliance had answered Council's concerns about air quality.

In mid-October, Council had responded to the Compliance proposal by asking for an environmental impact study.

When it came to the vote on cancelling the request, Councillors voted four to one, with Councillor Spencer Coyne asking his vote to be recorded.

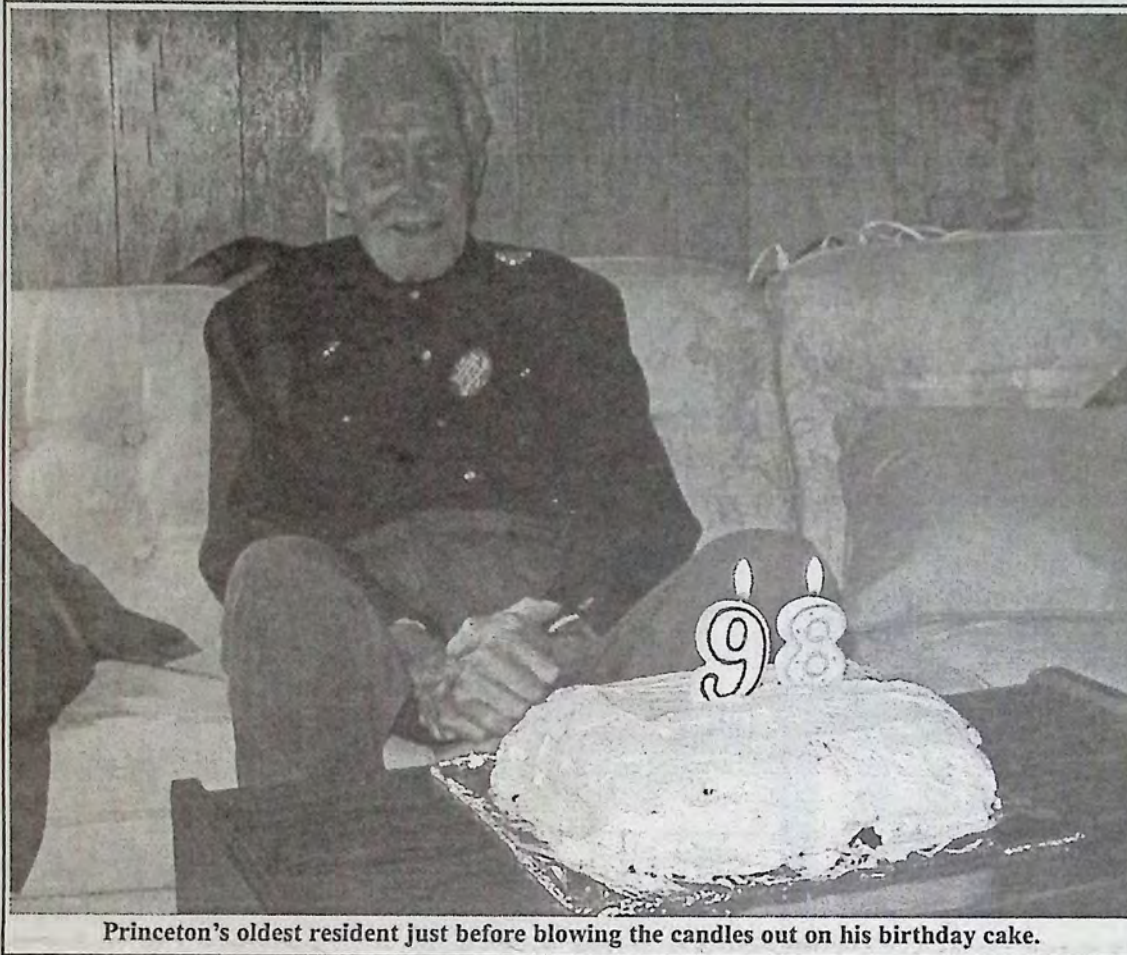
The location of the thermal plant will be the old Similco Mine site nine kilometres southwest of Princeton at an elevation approximately 300 metres higher than Princeton.

Council tables deer bylaw

Despite ongoing pleas from local residents, the proposed bylaw to outlaw feeding of deer in the Town of Princeton is tabled. The draft bylaw was promised for October, but is going nowhere.

At the November 1 Town Council meeting, the News Leader asked Council where the bylaw was, and the reply was, "It is tabled for further input from Council."

When the News Leader arrived at his home, Frank had just completed dinner with a few friends and had settled down to catch up with current affairs on T.V.

After being introduced, Frank sprung to his feet and posed for photos with his birthday cake.

He also made sure we knew he'd be 100 in only two more years.

Council supports rail trail initiative

Princeton Town Council passed a resolution at its November 1 meeting in support of an initiative to develop the area along the old Kettle Valley Railway. This follows announcement of a province-wide initiative, sponsored by Federal and Provincial dollars.

More than four million dollars is being spent on the old KVR line between Brookmere and Castlegar.

The resolution recognized the large investment by senior governments. The potential economic benefits were also recognized, along with the support given by volunteer groups such as the Vermillion Trails Society and Princeton Rotary Club.

Similkameen Valley Economic Development Officer, Michael McLaughlin, says he is pleased that Council has shown leadership in "developing a very significant economic growth opportunity."

McLaughlin went on to observe that Council ran on an economic growth platform and their support for the trail is evidence they mean to keep that promise.

"Support for the project by Council should send a message to the business community that this is a real opportunity."

Councillor Spencer Coyne reflects the view of Mayor and Council when he observes, "Tourism is key to the economic future of Princeton and the valley. It is imperative that local government and business

supports these initiatives. Not only for economic growth, but also for diversification."

Lyle Thomas, Princeton and Area Recreation Director, has been working with the Rotarians and the Vermillion Trails Society to design a trailhead.

Princeton is one of five provincial hubs for what will be called the Spirit of 2010 Trail.

The plans include landscaping along the trail, a park-like environment at the Forks, and a kiosk that will give trail users information about Princeton and where to shop.

Trail improvements will be enjoyed by community residents as much as visitors. The improvements will green-up the strip adjacent to Highway 3 and the park will provide a riverside beach.

Area H Director Gerri Logan is also enthusiastic about the trails

initiative. Ms. Logan was instrumental in getting Regional District support.

"I am really pleased to hear that Area H and Princeton are working together on this."

EDO McLaughlin estimates a million dollars or more could flow into the area from trail users annually.

"TourismBC is putting in big bucks to market the 2010 Trail. If we provide services, do a bit of our own marketing, we will tap the Lower Mainland market. We are their closest hub."

Advertising businesses along the trail is part of the plan. The business community will be consulted about how they want to promote their stores.

An information kiosk and sponsored trail markers are ideas that have been suggested.

Council sits on coalbed fence

A letter from Keremeos Village Council asking for Princeton's official position on coalbed methane extraction leaves Keremeos right where they started.

At the November 1 meeting of Princeton Town Council, it became clear that Council has no official position.

Mayor Keith Olsen said there are concerns as to water disposal and real estate values, but he is not against the project if it is done right.

Other Council members agreed in general.

Mayor Olsen said he would like to see Council align itself with the group circulating a petition regarding coalbed methane extraction.

Councillor Spencer Coyne moved to have the group present at the next Council meeting, but Council would not support the motion.

They decided to meet with the group after the government has given a response to the petition.

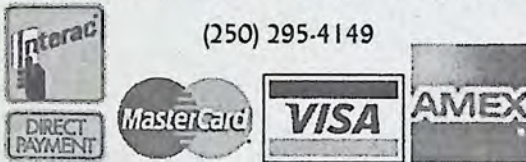

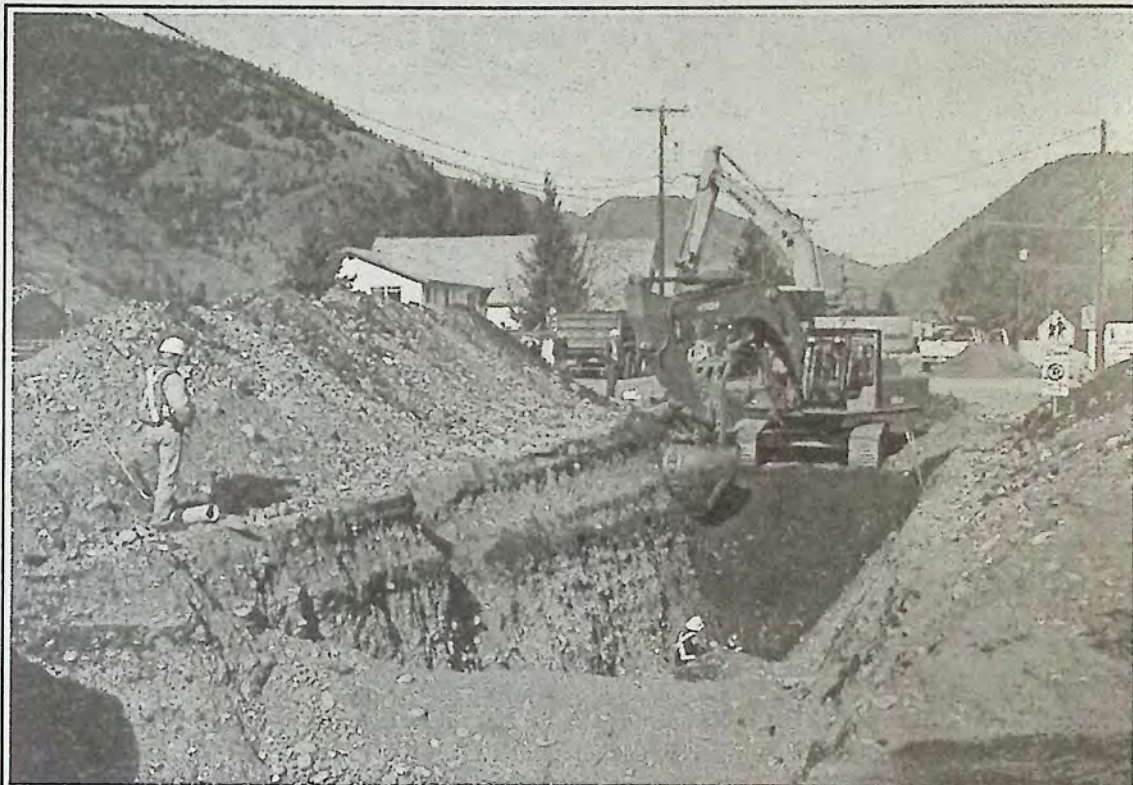

Hamper fund starts annual project

Jeff Rowe of Keremeos has been involved in the Similkameen Christmas Hamper Fund for the past four years.

"Each year we have it rotate from one church to another but we have all churches involved."

Support from the community has always been strong and Rowe, who owns and operates Valu-Plus Foods, says volunteers have made major contributions to the program.

"The work parties have forty to fifty people show up to help."

The Similkameen Christmas Hamper Fund provide food hampers to needy families in Keremeos, Hedley, Olalla and Cawston.

"We are in contact with Osoyoos and Princeton to prevent any overlap."

Landfill closure cancelled

Mayor Walter Despot reported at the November 1st Village Council meeting on the landfill site.

He told Council the Regional District of Okanagan Similkameen proposes to operate and open the Keremeos landfill site on Sundays only.

This schedule will be in place until further notice.

This one day a week opening of the landfill site is a reversal of the original plan by the RDOS to close the site to all traffic effective November 1st.

There are many ways to make contributions to the Fund including dropping non-perishable items in the food basket at Valu-Plus Foods, or at Keremeos Pharmasave, Hilltop Esso or the Health Centre.

All area schools also collect food donations.

Rowe says there were 100 families who received hampers last

year and the average hamper contains between \$150 and \$200 worth of groceries.

Cash donations can be dropped off at Valu-Plus Foods, the Keremeos Lion Club or through the "Good News Bears" program at CHBC-TV.

"The Lions Club will issue a full tax receipt for any donation over ten dollars."

Village opposes plant

Keremeos Village Council responded to a letter from Compliance Energy Corporation with a request of their own.

At the November 1 Council meeting a letter had been received from the company regarding the air emission application for a discharge permit to operate a coal fired generating plant near

Princeton.

Village Council will advise Compliance Energy that the "Village of Keremeos opposes this application pending a full and complete environmental study with copies to MP Jim Gouk, Regional District of Okanagan Similkameen and the Town of Princeton."

Veterans honoured by Council

Veterans of the Second World War were honoured at the November 1st Village Council meeting.

Mayor Walter Despot read the proclamation and presented a

copy to members of Keremeos Royal Canadian Legion who were present at the meeting.

Mayor Despot also proclaimed November 1st to 12th as Veteran's Days.

Keremeos Royal Canadian Legion Branch 192 has announced the program planned for November 11th.

All participants are to meet at the Legion (510 Veterans Avenue) at 10:30 AM.

The group will march off at 10:45 AM and meet at the Cenotaph in Memorial Park.

Church services will be held in Victory Hall after the Cenotaph ceremonies.

A lunch will be hosted by Keremeos Legion, in the Legion Hall, for all participants, veterans and Legion members.

Our Valley during the wars

When we remember the sacrifices made during the world wars and subsequent peacekeeping actions, we tend to forget what huge changes were made during the past century in the way wars are fought. Those changes have changed our world and how nations relate to each other.

World War I began in 1914 when Germany launched an attack on Hungary. Looking through old newspapers at Princeton Museum's archives, we learn the local "boys" did not hesitate to volunteer for duty. On August 14, 1914, a contingent headed to Kamloops to enlist. Local residents gave them a big send-off party at the Thomas Hall the night before. W.H. Lyall, T. Broomfield and Fred Schisler were sent back home because they were under age!

Volunteer soldiers were told to supply their own horses and be "expert riders and good shots"! Yes, the world was still fighting wars with cavalry in those days.

Leading the Princeton contingent to war was a Lt. Brooke, a seasoned soldier who served in the Boer War in Africa.

Pat Burns, the "cattle king", donat-

ed \$50,000 to help equip a regiment. Princeton people donated \$450 to the Patriotic Fund at the beginning of the war, and in October, 1914, there was a "sheet and pillowcase" dance in which \$30 more was raised.

During the war, Princeton Red Cross sent a lot of items, including a shipment of jam, and money.

People boycotted "made in Germany" products on local shelves, but this was considered unfair as local merchants had purchased the goods before war broke out. Other industries began to thrive, notably the newspaper industry, and the production of newsprint soared, along with the price.

There were shortages of druggists' supplies, and a "war tax" on coffee, sugar, tea, alcohol and tobacco.

The war ended in 1918, and it was to be the "war to end all wars". More Similkameen Valley men died in World War I than in World War II. They died in the mud at Verdun and Vimy Ridge, and they died of infection due to lack of medicines - no antibiotics in those days.

At the end of the war, a disease

called "Spanish flu" hit every country in the world, killing millions. A new drug refined in Germany saved the lives of those lucky enough to have doctors with a supply of it. The drug was called "Bayer Aspirin".

The League of Nations was formed as a means of ensuring a lasting peace, but the collapse of the American stock market, and the ensuing Great Depression, led to worker unrest worldwide. In Germany, defeat led to horrible suffering in an economy decimated by the Versailles Treaty, a document designed to punish Germany when it surrendered.

A young soldier who fought in World War I blamed everything on the Jews and Communists, and found Germans ready to listen to his impassioned speeches about a new, stronger Germany. He was Adolf Hitler, and during the Great Depression, he gathered enough political strength to overthrow the old government and replace democracy with himself "Der Fuhrer" (the father) in total control.

In September, 1939, Britain, followed by Canada, declared war on Germany. Hitler had invaded Poland.

To say Canada was ill-prepared for another war is an understatement, but Canadians rallied. Many thought it would be over quickly, but changes in technology, especially advances made in Germany, left the British Commonwealth nations poorly equipped in comparison. As always, Canadian men volunteered at the outset, but those who first arrived in England trained with wooden guns blackened with shoe polish, and sailors travelled on ships equipped with rolls of linoleum painted black to look like artillery gunbarrels.

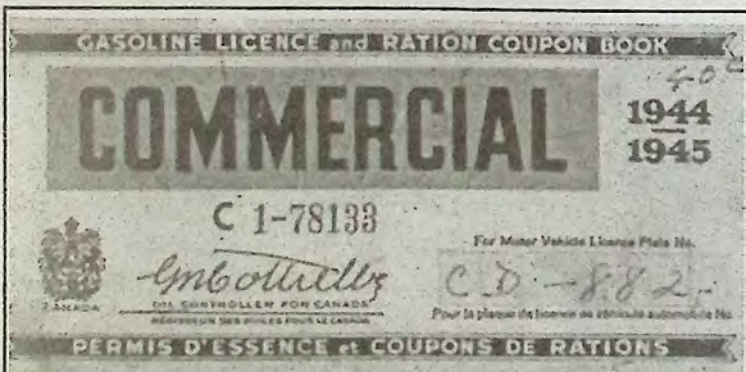

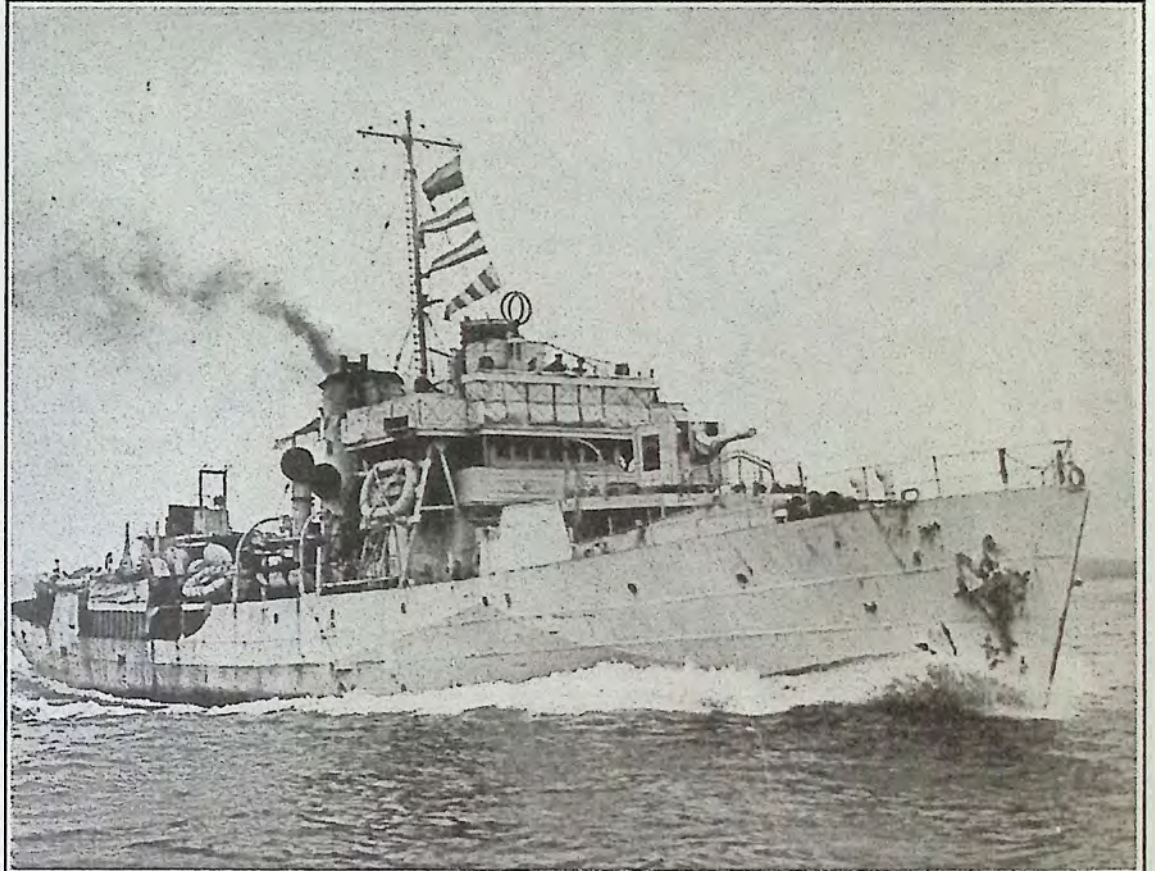

In 1941, the Similkameen Valley had 210 men overseas, and more either in training or about to enlist. The war in Europe was going badly. Germany swept across Europe, and Benito Mussolini, dictator of Italy, and an ally of Hitler, invaded North Africa. The Japanese had invaded China, where superior equipment rolled over China like a scourge. From triumph in China, the Japanese went to Indonesia, the Phillipines, and on December 7, 1941, attacked the American naval base in Hawaii. (At that time, Hawaii was not a state, it was a protectorate.) The Japanese were allies of the Germans and Italians, and the war had expanded to three fronts: Europe, Africa and the Middle East, and the Pacific. The United States, which had been neutral up to that point, entered the war.


At home, Canadians listened to the radio (television had been invented but not distributed). The war effort created shortages of all kinds. People saved fat in tins and donated the tins of fat for explosives. There were shortages of sugar, butter, cotton, liquor, petroleum products, rubber, metal equipment, chocolate, and woolens. German submarines attacked merchant ships to interfere with supplies of all kinds.

Local communities formed militia groups and there were "blackouts" in B.C. and the Maritime provinces in which dark blinds shut out lights. Local people feared bombing raids by the Japanese.

Many people watched their Japanese neighbours taken by police and moved to camps. The government feared the Japanese immigrants would betray Canada.

Individuals and organizations bought war bonds (loans to the government) and women knitted socks, scarves and rolled bandages. The Elks Lodge sent cigarettes. By

March 10, 1945, they had sent 2,197,800 cigarettes to soldiers (now we discouraged tobacco consumption).

Many things changed quickly during World War II. Princeton residents helped build our airport, because, in this war, airplanes were a key defence and offense force. Telephone and radio communications improved dramatically, and radar was invented.

A new drug, sulfanilamide, saved thousands of lives, and another antibiotic, penicillin, would save thousands more in 1945. The first

plastics were invented.

For the first time, missiles (called rockets) were used in war. The weaponry became bigger, better, smarter, and the war machines became tougher.

The world had never seen so many bombs dropped nor so many tanks used.

Victory in Europe came on May 8, 1945 (V-E Day), and people celebrated joyously in our valley.

There were parades and parties, and tears, too, of joy and sorrow. Many men who had left would never return.


The war in the Pacific raged on until early August, when a new kind of bomb, called an "atom" bomb, was dropped on two Japanese cities, Hiroshima and Nagasaki. Japan surrendered on August 8, 1945.

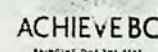

"Or ask how closing 113 schools across our province is improving the quality of education for our kids," added Sinclair.

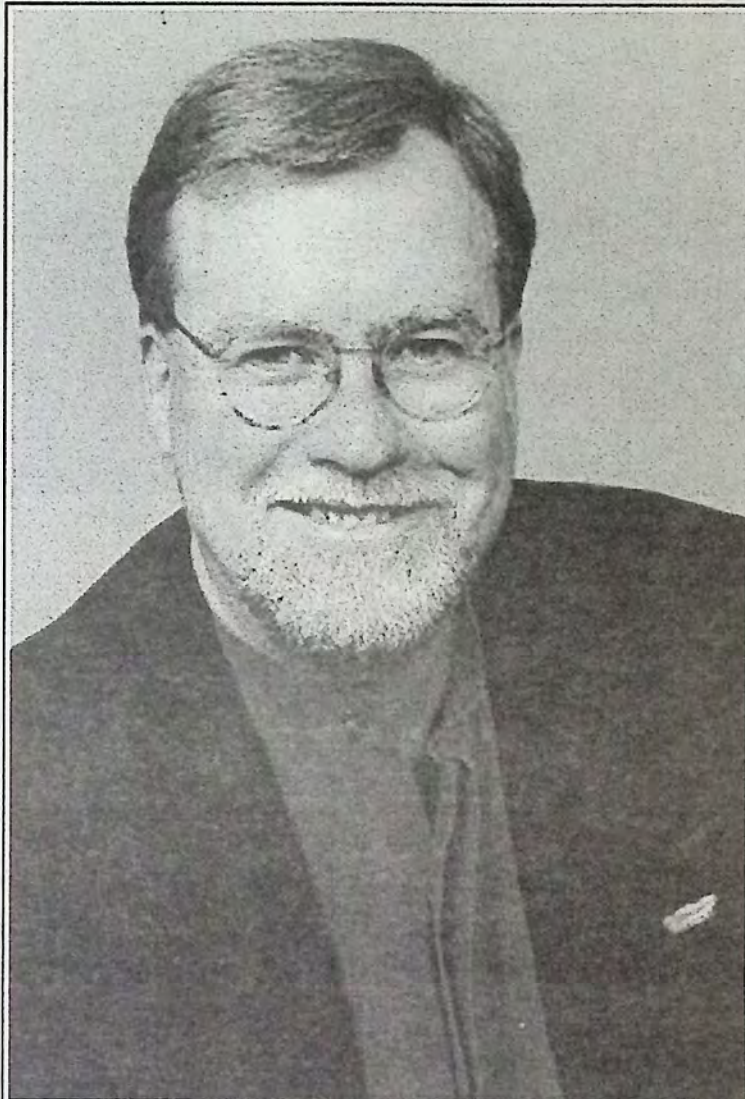

Tarped bodies anger Council

Princeton Town Council responded angrily to the lack of respect shown to persons murdered on Penticton Indian Reserve on October 30. Council had sent a letter to the BC government expressing concern that there is not a coroner readily available within the Similkameen Valley as there was in previous years. The reply to Council assured them there is a coroner in both Summerland and Merritt who would attend when needed.

"Those bodies in Penticton lay under tarps for 24 hours waiting for a coroner," said Mayor Keith Olsen. Council has had concerns based on precisely the possibility of similar circumstances occurring in the Princeton area in the case of death under suspicious circumstances or in motor vehicle accidents.

Council intends to follow up

through cooperation with Princeton RCMP and the hospital. There will be further communication with Regional Coroner Jeff Dolan and the BC Chief Coroner.

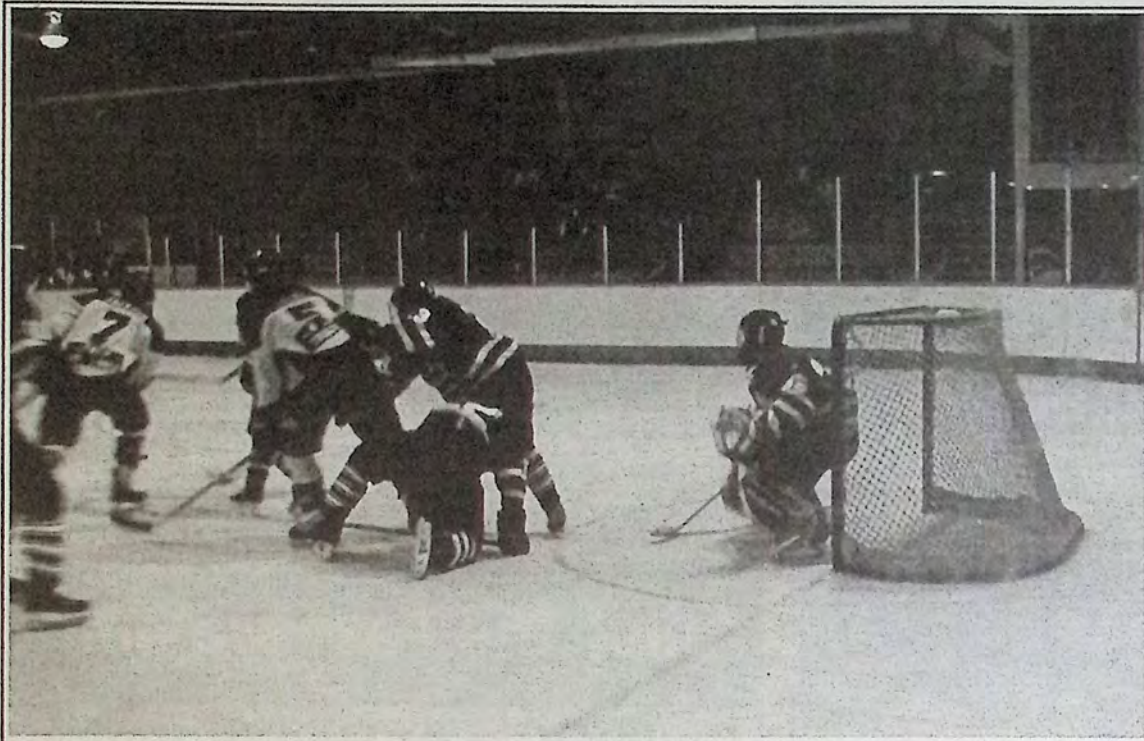

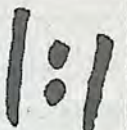

What Is Probate?

Probate is a legal process that confirms a Will is the last known Will, and that the named executor(s) has authority to administer the estate. Probate taxes vary from province to province and are payable to the court and determined based on the size of your estate.

Once your Will has been probated, the court issues "letters probate" that allow your executor to carry out your wishes as outlined in your Will. Many financial institutions will not release your assets to your executor without a certified copy of letters probate.

What is the difference between a Power of Attorney and a Will? A power of attorney authorizes the person you appoint to manage your financial affairs on your behalf while you are alive, whereas your Will names an executor to manage them after you pass away. You may appoint a relative, friend or professional as your attorney or executor. Often the person(s) named for the roles of attorney and executor are the same. A power of attorney is only in effect while you are alive. By granting power of attorney, you are giving permission through a legal document to have someone handle your financial affairs. If you are unable to look after your finances, your power of attorney will provide continuity in managing your affairs. A power of attorney could ensure that your bills are paid and investment renewals are handled on your behalf.

The person(s) or corporation you name should understand what they may or may not be able to do, and you can limit their authority to certain decisions or transactions. You may also incorporate wording to ensure your power of attorney endures or continues, even if you become mentally incompetent. You may also prevent the person(s) you've granted power of attorney from acting independently if you name a joint attorney. A power of attorney becomes invalid upon your death which is when your Will becomes effective and directs your executor(s) to manage your affairs and settle your estate. The executor is responsible for all aspects of managing and distributing your estate's assets and personal possessions according to your Will.

What is a Living Will? A Living Will is yet another potentially invaluable document. The purpose is to ensure your wishes regarding medical care are carried out. Should you become incapacitated and unable to communicate such instructions yourself, a Living Will allows you to state in advance, which forms of treatment you may or may not wish to receive. Note that not all provinces have legislation that permits the creation of a Living Will. Consult your legal advisor when considering appointing another individual to manage your affairs.

Across the Lake is a forestry campsite, where we lit a fire and enjoyed our lunches.

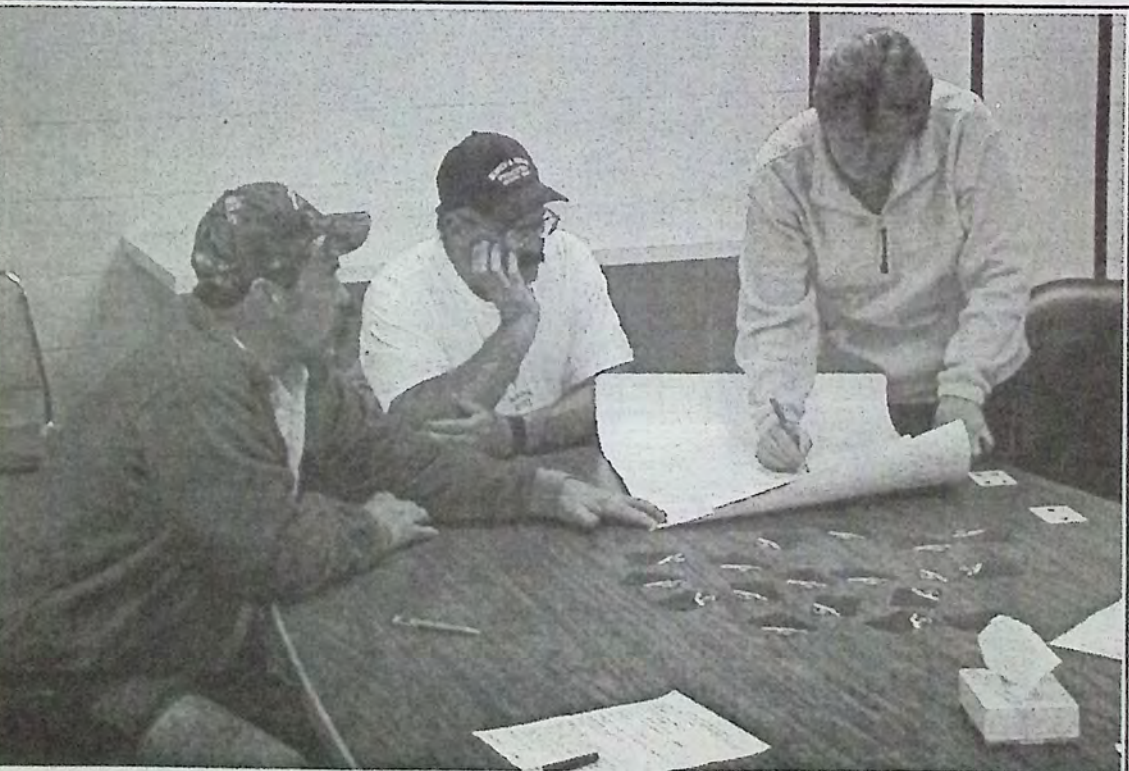
Of interest was an eagle's nest. The only wildlife sightings were two mallards.

- 1/2 cup cornmeal
- 1/4 cup whole wheat flour
- 3/4 cup shredded cheddar
- 5 tbsp. parmesan
- 1/4 cup milk
- 1/4 cup water

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Combine dry ingredients with the cheese and mix together, then add the milk and water and mix. Knead dough and add more flour or water if necessary. With a rolling pin, roll dough on a flat surface, cut into small pieces and place on a cookie sheet. Bake for 10 - 15 minutes then shut off heat and let cool in oven.

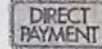

I remember my father and other men doing rifle practice as part of the local militia.

The boy next door, my dear friend, was taken away because he was Japanese, and I remember how angry I was at the police for taking his family.

I remember my mother and her friend cutting down old woolen coats so they could make snow-suits for us kids. I remember some horrible brown stockings made of some kind of itchy stuff (we couldn't buy cotton any more) and I remember darned socks on everyone's feet.

I remember the blackouts, and the siren warning us to be ready for attack, and every dog in town howling in reply. Fortunately, these were just drills, but they were scary.

I remember the day Barbie Bushanan learned her dad had been killed, and another day when Bobby Hatton's mother got the

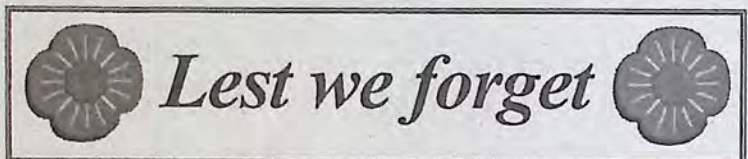
telegram saying her husband was dead.

How does a child see war? My girlfriend and I had a favourite game - Red Cross.

We were the valiant rescuers who bandaged wounded teddy bears and dolls, transported them to hospital (the porch) in our wagon, and fought off the enemy with our make believe rifles. I had a little nurses kit with pills, bandages, and a wooden hypodermic needle. The boys went to war in skirmishes, and a couple of local boys (no names) became quite expert at pipe bombs, blowing up at least one outhouse.

I was among the lucky children. I have heard the memories of those who were children in Europe, England and southeast Asia during the war, and their memories are nightmares compared with mine.

We need to keep telling our stories to children, so they understand how to value peace.



Heart Food

The Lord is gracious and full of compassion, slow to anger and abounding in mercy and loving kindness. The Lord is good to all and his tender mercies are over all his works. (Psalm 145: 8-9) Will the real God please stand up? Ever since the Garden of Eden, the Devil has been devising schemes to separate people from God. The one scheme that seems to have worked the best for him is causing people to either doubt or disbelieve God's goodness. He has been using it ever since it succeeded with Adam and Eve. God had given them everything they needed to live peacefully and prosperously. There was only one restriction. The difference is that, that is an accurate picture of their gods because they are not gods at all - they are demonic spirits. They all needed offerings of gifts of some kind to make them happy. But God is not like that. We don't have to do penance or make sacrifices to appease him. He Himself has already provided the supreme sacrifice for sin in the person of His son. This is a week of remembrance, when we remind our young people of what war is all about. It is hard for them to visualize what war means in a child's life. The wars we see today are on television and scarcely touch our lives. I am old enough to remember being a kid during World War II.

My first memory of war stems from a cold December day. My mother was doing laundry, using a green wringer washer and a tub for rinsing. She would carry each load out to hang on the line in our back yard. That's where she was as I waited for "Little Orphan Annie" to come on the radio. Instead, what I heard was an announcement that the Japanese had attacked somewhere, and my favourite radio program had now become a list of where American troops were to report for duty. I rushed out to tell my mother my disappointment.

Mom was talking over the fence with a neighbour. She didn't pay much attention at first, but I guess my insistent noise finally got her attention and the neighbour's. Mom rushed in to listen to the radio, then rushed out to talk to the neighbour about what this would mean. To me, it meant Little Orphan Annie was shot that day.

My next memory is of my brother, in his uniform, home because he was leaving to go to England where my oldest brother, of whom I had no memory, was already fighting the war.

Other memories are of later years of the war, when I could have only one cup of cocoa a day due to rationing. I remember my mother swapping ration cards so she would have enough sugar to make jam. I remember the overseas packages sent to my brothers - food in tins, socks, the occasional gift - enclosed in a parcel wrapped in oilskin sewed tightly at the seams. Most of all, I remember having to shut my mouth for every news broadcast.

I remember the young fellow from the telegraph office riding a bicycle up the street, and everyone holding their breath lest the telegram told of the death of a loved one.

I remember the day he stopped at our house with a telegram saying my brother was "missing in action". (He was found and even-

An expert shares Winter gardening tips

by "Gardens By George"

The 'outdoor' growing season has now come to its end or dormancy for now, but gardening has not stopped. We now turn our attention and interest to the 'indoor' growing season.

GROWING HOUSE PLANTS: "WATERING OF"

The questions most often asked are, "How often should I water my house plants? Is there a rule?"

Only in a very general way can a

rule be offered. When the topsoil feels dry to the touch, then that is the time to water. But at this time of watering, we must water thoroughly so the entire root system is saturated. Upon this full absorption of water the soil will allow seepage into the tray or saucer. At this point, remove the water from the saucer continually until the contained soil stops seeping. We do not want the plant container standing 'in' water.

The most important 'beware' in connection with watering applies to the unfortunate habit of 'little and often' method. As we do this, we cause an interruption of the soils capability of maintaining an even moisture content. This will result in a 'too wet' top half of soil or 'too dry' bottom half of soil.

Using room temperature water is much safer than using directly from the cold water tap. The excessive cold will cause stunting of growth. Other factors to consider as well are the container sizes: small ones dry out faster, glazed pots do not allow for the required evaporation. The sunny days (plants near windows) will tend to dry out containers much more rapidly.

INDOOR GARDENING PRODUCTS

Foliage cleaners: the polishing or cleaning of hard leaved plants for a 'winter brightness' by means of

sprays and cloths. When treating for shine and cleaning, be certain you treat only the topside (surface) of the leaves. Do not apply soaps, cleaners, chemicals, etc. on the underside of the leaves.

As your plants age, the process of developing chlorophyll slows, and the chlorophyll is needed to manufacture the food that the plants take in. A micronized-iron is that which promotes the development of chlorophyll.

It prevents yellowing, stunted growth and other problems that could arise due to lack of iron (chlorosis).

It also assists plant food and fertilizers, encourages nutrition building soil organisms. It goes to work very quickly. Micronized-iron is a natural iron concentrate and works without burning.

Another proven 'assistant' for winter plant condition is Fish Fertilizer, a liquid, low make up (5-1-1) of nitrogen, phosphate, potash.

Plants benefitting from this fertilizer include violet, philodendrons, fern and most all-tropical house plants. This is a good winter food for your tropical plants because it maintains a 'minor' supply of nutrient throughout the winter months.

Healthy Dental Tips for Handling Halloween Candy

Now that Halloween is over, its time to make sure that your little ghosts and goblins don't let their goodies go to their teeth.

In this post-Halloween week, when children are eating all the goodies they collected on Halloween night, it is really important to make sure they practice some good dental hygiene, advises Senior Medical Health Officer Dr. Paul Hasselback. After eating sugary Halloween treats, proper brushing and flossing will help prevent cavities.

When it comes to enjoying the hard-earned Halloween treats, here are some simple tips to help ensure Octobers treats don't turn into Novembers cavities:

1. Avoid grazing. Eat Halloween

candy at specific times during the day and follow with brushing and flossing.

2. Set up a candy bank to help manage the flow. Allow your child four or five pieces of candy, then store the rest in a sealed container. Freeze chocolates and candy bars. Establish times when the bank will be open for withdrawals.

3. Eat sweets at or just after meal-times when there is more moisture present in the mouth. This helps to wash away the extra sugar.

4. Brush after eating. If brushing is not possible after mealtime or eating candy, chewing sugarless gum with xylitol. For example, brands like Trident and Extra contain xylitol. Rinsing with water is also helpful.

5. Make sure candy is age appropriate. Jawbreakers and hard candy can cause choking in very young children. Toffee can dislodge fillings and crowns.

6. Enjoy Halloween treats in moderation. Ensure you and your trick or treaters eat a balanced diet year round.

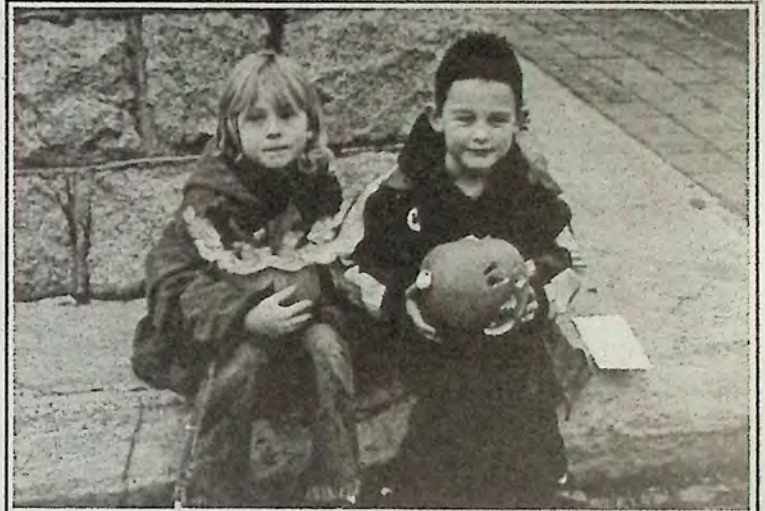

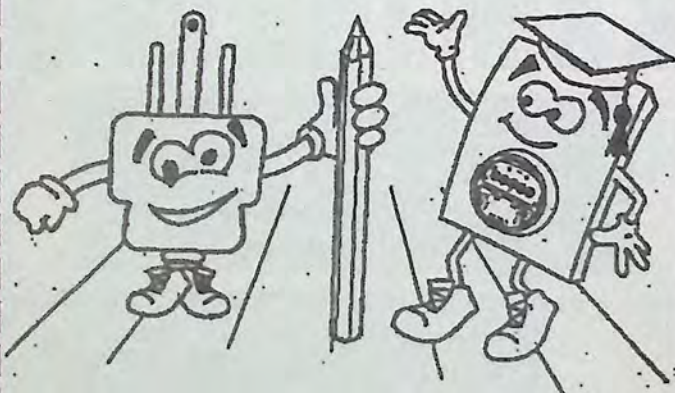
