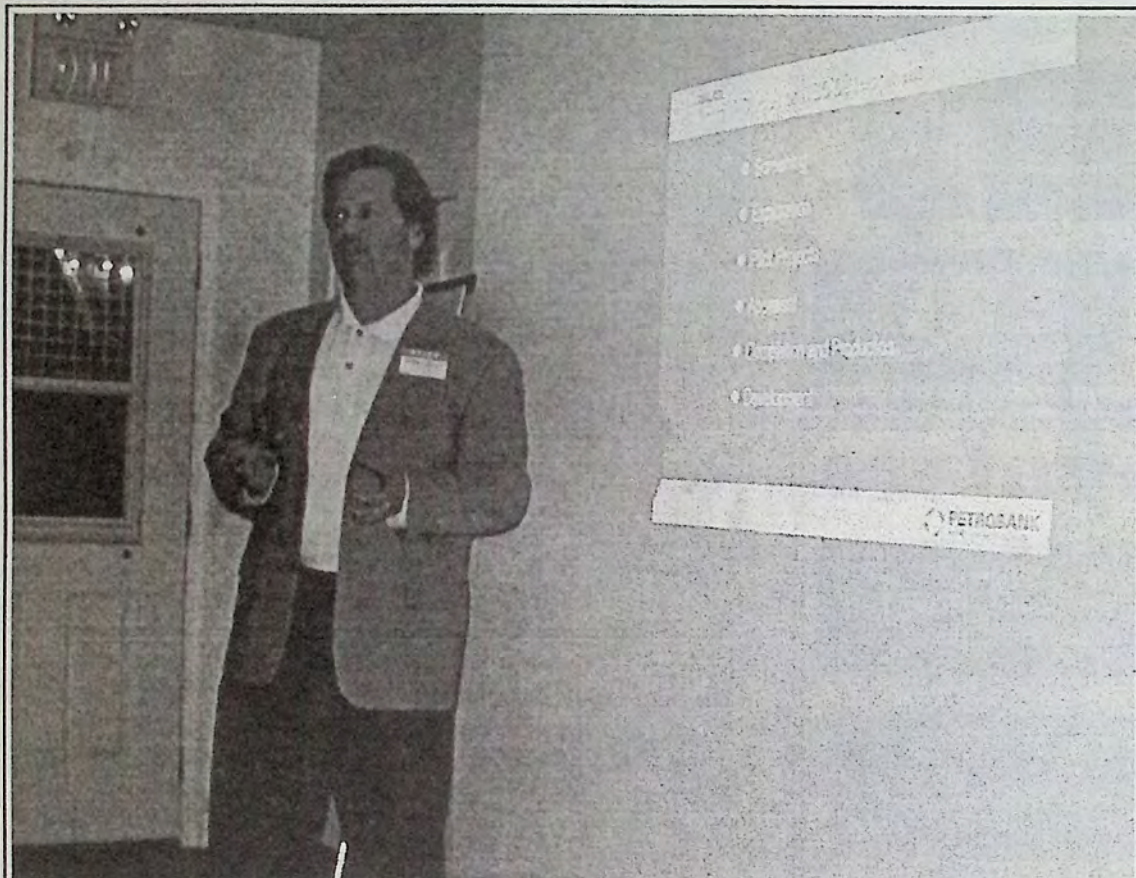
Strong glare from the sun and poor road conditions are deemed to be contributing factors in the incident.

Petrobank sells project

Chamber of Commerce hosts meeting

For Gregg Smith, Petrobank's Vice President, Thursday night's 'Business After Hours' meeting started as an uncomfortable experience.

"I'm a little bit nervous this evening," he admitted, "As this is not the kind of presentation I'm accustomed to doing."

Problems with the clarity and colour of many slides included in his PowerPoint presentation did not help matters, but the gathering of 35 let Smith proceed without interruption.

Points made during the presentation included:

- NGC is an important component in Canada's Energy future.
- BC regulations are very rigid with high operational requirements on environmental issues.

- Petrobank's procedures will be within or beyond government requirements.

Smith admitted Petrobank has no idea if a viable natural gas from coal product exists in this area, but added, "It's about responsible development."

This led the presentation into details on water production and disposal, an issue Smith said he knew was a topic of concern to some area residents.

The stages of NGC development include Screening; Exploration; Pilot Projects; Appraisal; Completion and Production; and finally Development. The test well on Wright Road represents the Exploration phase.

"You need to understand this could be a huge money pit for Petrobank," Smith said regarding the possibility of a non-viable discovery.

"What do we know about the coal in Princeton?" Smith asked of the development.

"At this point we know nothing and that's why we are drilling is to gain that knowledge."

Air quality issues were also discussed as part of the presentation and Smith summed the project up with a single statement.

"We have no idea what the size of our development will become because we just don't know."

Council backs Skills Centre plan

Non-profit organizations generate \$1.3 million annually in economic activity in Princeton area.

That was the message Town Council heard at the November 15 meeting when Skills Centre Manager Sharan Jung presented a new concept of Princeton's economy.

Jung advised Council she is making applications to a variety of funding sources to provide support for the local non-profit sector.

A society called "Similkameen Centre for Non-Profit Management" has been formed and

Jung is making presentations to various groups looking for letters of support for funding for one year.

In her presentation, Jung said all service sector businesses benefit directly from events organized by non-profit groups, and offered statistics from a national report. The report said \$57.5 billion is generated annually by non-profit groups, and the financial value of volunteer hours is "staggering".

At the same time, more than half of the groups said they had trouble recruiting volunteers, and struggled with other aspects of putting on

events.

At no cost for a year, Similkameen Centre for Non-Profit Management could provide technical and administrative support, printing services, rooms for meetings, and perhaps help with joint marketing campaigns.

The idea is to make the non-profit sector more vibrant by freeing their energies for activities that generate economic benefits to the community.

Council likes the concept and will write a letter supporting the applications.

Lawyers review rights

Lawyers from Sierra Legal Defence Fund and West Coast Environmental Law will be holding a free citizens forum in Princeton to ensure that landowners know their rights when dealing with oil and gas issues.

A new guide, "When the Landman Comes Knocking: A Tool Kit for BC Landowners Living with Oil and Gas" will be handed out at the forum.

The Princeton forum will take place at 7:30 pm on Wednesday, December 1st in the Princeton & District Community Skills Centre.

Lawyers Karen Campbell and Tim Howard will be making the presentation.

As oil and gas development increases, wells will be drilled closer to homes and communities, having a greater impact on the rural way of

life. Many landowners don't know that oil and gas companies can drill on their property without consent and that they may face a range of impacts from dangerous 'sour' gas exposure, noise and pollution. Landowners in BC have weaker rights than Albertans in dealing with oil and gas issues, but there are some things they should know to protect themselves.

The tour is hosted by the Similkameen Citizens Concerned about Coalbed Methane.

Local man charged in armed robberies

- 1) Robbery with an offensive weapon contrary to s.344(b) Criminal Code;
- 2) Carry of a weapon for the purpose of committing an offence contrary to s.88 Criminal Code;
- 3) Robbery with a firearm contrary to s.344(a) Criminal Code;
- 4) Use of a firearm while committing an indictable offence contrary to s.85(1)(a) Criminal Code.

Remember the Tulameen River flood?

Longtime Princeton area residents like this kind of November – no big snows, no big rains. When the snow comes early and heavy in the hills in November, local residents begin to worry. It could mean another disaster like 1990 or worse, 1995.

The pattern is like this: early in November, the snow begins to fall. Then a "pineapple express" blows through with heavy rains, washing the snow down from the hills. On November 10, 1990, minor flooding occurred along the Tulameen and Similkameen Rivers, with some homes in low-lying areas having water in their yards and basements.

Nothing could have prepared us for 1995. The Ministry of Environment called it a "200 year" flood, meaning it would happen about once every 200 years.

The snow was more than a metre deep on Granite Mountain near Coalmont when the rain began on November 27. It was not a heavy rain, but it lasted until the afternoon of November 29. By that time, the rivers were rising one foot per hour, and half of Coalmont's residents had been evacuated to motels in Princeton. The Woodford family home was wrecked, although they were forced to live in it until the next year.

By 4:00 p.m. the Tulameen River

was licking at the top of the dikes and flooding had occurred in several locations. People were evacuated from Allison Court Apartments at that time. Those of us who knew the river realized it would not peak until around 6:00 p.m. A state of emergency had been declared. I watched as manhole covers burst upwards as the river rose higher than the storm drain outlets and water forced its way up the drains.

Tulameen residents witnessed Otter Creek reversing its flow as the river rose higher than the creek.

Concerns for the bridges became top priority, as whole trees, camper trailers and sundry debris washed down the river. Nicki McIvor looked out her window and saw the body of a deer drifting down the Similkameen River. In Cawston, people described a "river of trees" going past.

To anyone who did not see this flood, it is difficult to describe how much water was going down the rivers. Much of Allison Flats and downtown Princeton was flooded, much of Tulameen, and most of Coalmont. More than 200 people were moved to motels.

Much further downstream, the entire Columbia watershed was affected. The Similkameen empties into Okanagan River in Washington, which flows on to dams further south and east. The

huge volume of water created a crisis at the dams. At Grand Coulee dam, November is the time they do maintenance on turbines, because water levels are normally very low. In 1995, they could not do it thanks to the Similkameen flood. The Grand Coulee filled to capacity and had to begin releasing water downstream to prevent problems.

A number of houses and businesses spent the next short while cleaning out mud. Ole and Helen Lindquist lost their mobile home, which floated around the little trailer park by the Tulameen River.

Many farms lost acres of soil. The scars of the flood still remain.

The aftermath of the flood led to higher dikes and numerous compensation claims. In downtown Princeton, Santa's Workshop, with all its donated toys and Christmas hamper goods, was wiped out. This was such a poignant story that it put Princeton on the national news and goods, especially toys, were sent here to fill the void. Church members from the Lower Mainland arrived to offer their help, which was a godsend. A depot of donated furniture, bedding and clothing was set up for flood victims. So many toys were sent that when Quebec residents were flooded out, Princeton found a trucker who took a load of toys to Quebec.

In Tulameen, BC Forest Service ordered logging of the trees on the sandbar. They harvested six truckloads of timber for the mills, and an equal number of truckloads for firewood.

We do not know how much timber the Americans harvested from the flood.

Environmentalists blamed loggers for the flood, saying if the trees had not been harvested, the flood would not have occurred.

Others pointed to the build-up of river bottoms and wanted to see sandbars cleared and some dredging done.

Ministry of Environment officials would not hear of it, but they did allow the Town of Princeton to bulldoze the river junction, although they warned that the embankments formed by the bulldozers would just wash away in the next high water.

The experts were wrong. The sloped embankments have lasted eight years.

The Woodfords eventually had a new house, but the compensation fell far short of adequate and they had to build it themselves. Other residents tore out floors, or jacked up the house to fix the foundation, and all would agree compensation was inadequate.

Yes, this year has brought a good November.

The Tulameen River flood will forever be etched in my mind.

I was Assistant Manager at the local radio station at the time and recall finishing my morning shift on November 29, 1995.

It was an eerie morning where it felt as if something was going to happen, but you weren't really too sure what it was.

I remember hearing reports on the street about how fast the river has risen overnight and at coffee that morning there was talk about the river possibly flooding.

It was later in the morning I got back into the radio station and found my Boss (the late Laurie Currie) trying to figure out the on air controls in the broadcast studio.

He told me someone from Town Hall was trying to get an emergency announcement on the air.

I seem to recall sending Laurie out to find the Mayor while I returned the call to Town Hall.

The announcement consisted of a request for volunteers to gather in the parking lot at Allison Court Apartments to help build sandbags.

I passed the message on to our sister station in Penticton and tried to impress upon them the serious nature of the announcement.

I waited for the news to air and was shocked the announcement didn't run.

The radio station in Penticton, which was providing all the pro-

gramming to Princeton listeners at the time, chose not to air the item.

Their decision to 'snub' what I thought was a big news item made me shift gears.

Currie was unable to locate Mayor John Stinson, but Alderman Betty Pilon was available.

She left her job at the post office to join us at the radio station. It was shortly after 1:00 PM and I chose to interrupt regular programming to go 'live' with Pilon.

We ended up staying there throughout the evening bringing listeners updates on the situation as they developed.

The phone calls we received helped us to determine the severity in areas that could not be reached by vehicle.

We announced where displaced residents could gather for temporary shelter and had people coming up to the radio station to tell us what they were going to do to help.

A group formed to build sandwiches for volunteers and before we knew it, the community was banding together to help each other.

It was a great thing to experience. We stayed on the air until 12 midnight, not leaving until we were sure everything we could do had been done.

I've never forgotten that night and it made me realize how powerful a tool radio could be in case of emergency.

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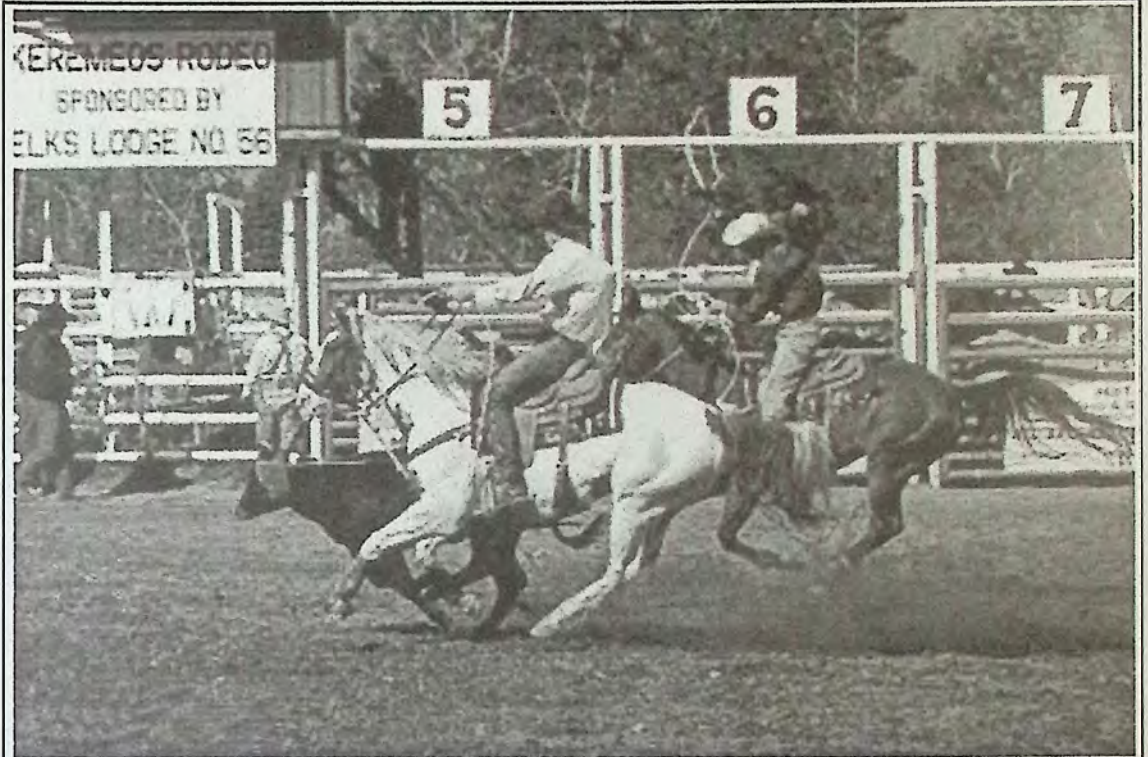

Keremeos Elks optimistic about Rodeo

To rodeo or not to rodeo: that was the question Keremeos Elks members talked about at their November 18 meeting. Plans will go ahead for the 2005 Keremeos Elks Rodeo on the May long weekend, but after 66 years, will this be the last rodeo?

Elks members took a positive approach to the problems they face, which include fewer Elks members and difficulties recruiting volunteers. Some of the volunteers come from neighbouring communities every year to help make the rodeo a success. Elks wonder what they can do to improve the rodeo weekend to make more money and attract more volunteers.

To learn more about the public's perspective, Elks will put together a questionnaire. Thanks to Jeff Rowe, the survey will be included in the ValuPlus flyer for distribution in Hedley, Keremeos and Cawston. Some of the questions will deal with possible changes in the weekend schedule, and there will be a question asking if the respondent would consider a volunteer job. Look for the survey early in the new year.

The Elks hope for corporate and business sponsorships, too.

During the discussion of the future of the rodeo, Elks considered whether there should be a rodeo association separate from the Elks lodge. The rodeo originally began as an event of the Keremeos Rodeo and Racing Association in 1938. This organization bought the rodeo grounds and built the first rodeo arena. In 1944, the association ran into financial trouble, and turned to the Elks for help. The Elks took over the rodeo and were given the rodeo grounds.

Sixty-six years later, tremendous improvements have been made in both the grounds and the events that take place there. At the same

time, the overhead is heavy. There is insurance to pay for (two policies – rodeo event and property), property taxes, and continual repairs.

The Elks would like to make improvements, such as roofs over the bleachers and concession areas, but are not about to spend thousands of dollars without the solid backing of the community at large, the businesses, and corporations.

The past couple of years have been losing propositions due to foul weather, and the Elks hope for a really nice May long weekend in 2005. They want a big success to replenish the rodeo account, and to ensure rodeos in the future. There was a time when Keremeos Elks Rodeo was such a huge success the Elks were able to donate money back to the community. This year, they will be asking the community to back the rodeo.

Cawston inventor loves CATS

Cat owners will want to read about this!

A Cawston inventor has addressed the problem of cat litter and cat odour travelling throughout your home.

Vince Thompson has developed C. A. T. S. - the Cat Approved Toilette System, a new twist on the old cat litter box design.

The CATS unit measures 21-inches square and 16.5-inches high and contains a waste pan that measures 20-inches by 12-inches by 6-inches.

The box shape of the CATS unit contains a 8.25-inch round entrance, which leads to a ramp to the waste pan area. The ramp has small holes in it which allows for litter caught in the cats paws to be removed.

The entire unit is made of hard plastic and double-walled corrugated plastic which dismantles easily for complete cleaning. The top can be removed for access to the waste pan.

Thompson says the CATS product was created and designed to be an inexpensive, multi-purpose cat centre.

It is designed specifically for cat owners who live in apartments, condominiums and mobile homes where space and outdoor access is restricted.

With the closed design of the

box, the spread of odour and litter from the box is greatly reduced.

Another bonus to the design is that it also restricts the chances of toddlers and dogs gaining access to the cat waste.

"Great care was taken to design CATS to be a basic and simple but very effective facility for cats."

The light weight design of the CATS litter box system also allows for placement in any room of the home and even on a table top to eliminate bending, squatting or kneeling while cleaning the waste pan.

The CATS system comes with a sweep and litter scoop/shovel.

Pricing for the units is around \$90 and more information is available through a website designed specifically for promoting the product.

Arts Council sponsors ice candle contest

Take a bucket of water and freeze it to make an ice candle. Then enter it in the December 3 Christmas light-up ice candle contest.

Princeton & District Arts Council is sponsoring an ice candle contest for the most artistic ice candle. First prize is \$50, second is \$20 and third is \$15.

So, what's an ice candle?

Ice candles are a Christmas tradition in Scandinavian countries, where winter is much like ours. They take a container of water, freeze it, and leave a hollow center. In the bottom of the hollow center, they place a candle, and put it outdoors. The candle does

not melt the ice, and the candle is protected from the wind. As the flame flickers, the light is reflected through the ice, making a sparkling outdoor light.

Ice may remain clear, or can be coloured with food colouring, and can be sculpted. Ice candles must be delivered to Cenotaph Park by 6:30 p.m. December 3 to be eligible for judging. Prizes will be announced during the festivities of the evening.

The Ice Candle Contest is open to anyone of any age. The Arts Council hopes everyone in town will make an ice candle and really light up the town streets on December 3. In Scandinavian

Legion looks for cadets

Air Cadets offer boys and girls some really great programs. Princeton's Royal Canadian Legion is looking for young people to form a Princeton squadron of Air Cadets. Princeton did have a squadron at one time, but recently Air Cadets have had to travel to Penticton as part of Panther Squadron 259. Things are changing.

Penticton is changing its policy toward Princeton and wants to see Air Cadets here, either in Princeton's own squadron or as a satellite of Panther Squadron. On Remembrance Day, 10 Air Cadets graced the parade and formed part of the Honour Guard.

Ray Jarvis is Chair of the Air Cadet committee for the Legion. The Legion sponsors Air Cadets, and currently helps pay the costs of transporting them weekly to Penticton. Jarvis gives full credit to the efforts of Diane Wanner for driving the local Air Cadets to Penticton weekly, and for promoting the Air Cadet program to local youth. At the same time, Jarvis points out how much better it would be to have a local squadron.

Boys and girls ages 12 through 17 can join Air Cadets. Programs include studies to learn the basics of flying, some of the computer

technology used in flight, some basic skills in deportment and protocol, and opportunities to travel to camp or go on exchange programs to other Canadian locations or foreign locations. Boys and girls learn leadership skills, too, and develop self-confidence. In addition to the educational component, Air Cadets form lasting friendships with each other, and earn respect from the community.

Parents may be concerned about costs, but need not worry. There is no cost to cadets for the programs or uniforms. The Legion and the federal government cover these costs. An annual fee must be paid by each squadron, but this is covered by fundraising activities done by the squadron.

Jarvis says a recruiting day will be held early in 2005, and encourages parents to attend the recruitment session with their children to learn more about the value of Air Cadets.

Jarvis told the News Leader, "With recruiting in the new year, I hope we can have a good contingent of Air Cadets in our parade next summer."

Jarvis advises young people and their parents to watch for advertisements in local newspapers to learn when recruiting day will be.

RRSP or Mortgage Pay-Down?

Which is better, contributing to your RRSP or paying down your mortgage? The RRSP-versus-mortgage question is a source of ongoing debate among many investors and financial professionals. The question is complex, and there is no definitive answer. The challenge is to determine what is more appropriate for you, given your current situation and long-term goals.

Three possible options are:

Option 1: Pay off your mortgage first and then contribute to an RRSP. With this strategy, you get a guaranteed after-tax return through your mortgage interest savings, which is important to many conservative investors.

Option 2: Contribute to an RRSP and use tax refunds to pay down the mortgage. When various personal situations are assessed, many investors decide to build two types of assets - home equity and RRSP savings. Here you achieve mortgage interest savings by paying off your mortgage earlier and building a retirement savings base. This also provides further diversification of your investment strategy.

Option 3: Contribute to an RRSP and use tax refunds to contribute more to your RRSP. This strategy maximizes long-term tax-free compounding of RRSP assets, and gives the psychological benefit of knowing you are building a capital base to fund your retirement. Should you decide to stay in your home during retirement, it's the RRSP capital base that will help give you financial security.

The major factors influencing the choice of options are the mortgage interest rate versus the expected return in the RRSP, the investment time horizon, the availability of RRSP contribution room, and the ability to capitalize on mortgage prepayment privileges. Given an expected RRSP return equal to the mortgage interest rate, and an investment time horizon of over 30 years, maximizing RRSP contributions generally maximizes net worth because the tax-sheltering advantages of the RRSP last for a lifetime, while the advantages of the mortgage prepayment end when the mortgage is discharged. As the mortgage interest increases, or the investment time horizon decreases, it becomes more attractive to prepay the mortgage.

However, the answer comes back to your investment objectives and what is most appropriate for your personal circumstances. The best step to take is to assess each of the options available to you and decide which fits best with your current situation, risk tolerance, and goals for the future.

"Engage and energize" students was the message Darryl Brewer delivered to the School Board on November 17. Brewer had attended a seminar on learning in which she, along with 400 other people from industry, was energized. She learned techniques to bring back to the district to teach other teachers.

The idea was to accelerate learning in the classroom by bringing every student into the process through energizing them.

Brewer was teaching school trustees and the public as she delivered her report. She demonstrated the importance of bringing physical, mental and emotional energy into the learning process.

"It's not what you teach, it's how you teach," Brewer told the meeting.

She said she had learned a number of valuable techniques for the classroom she will teach to fellow teachers in the new year.

Video contest announced

High school students in the BC Interior are once again invited to come up with their own video ads on the subject of reducing youth access to tobacco products. Last year we had 31 video entries from 17 schools throughout the BC Interior. Twelve winning entries received \$500 in prize money and two of those winners were chosen for the top ten finalists in the province wide contest.

This contest for students in Grades 8 to 12 is being sponsored by Interior Health and funded by Health Canada as part of its media campaign on reducing youth access to tobacco.

Many underage youth obtain cigarettes and other tobacco products from parents, friends, and others who are not tobacco retailers. It is illegal for anyone - parents, siblings, friends or strangers to supply tobacco products to an underage person.

In Canada, it is illegal to furnish tobacco products (cigarettes, cigars, cigarettes tubes, filters and papers, and all other types of tobacco) to anyone under the age of 18 years. In BC, the law prohibits the sale of tobacco products to anyone under age 19.

Deadline for entries is February 18th 2005.

Cancer vaccine points the way

Three things you can eat will help fight viruses: selenium, Vitamin C and aspirin (ASA, not painkillers like Tylenol). Do not take selenium at the same time as the other two virus fighters, take it at a separate meal.

Exercise, weight loss and taking three virus fighters daily can go a long way toward preventing the cancer virus from invading your body until we have vaccines for every form of cancer.

RCMP encounter many impaired drivers

Since the evening of November 12th, 2004, RCMP Princeton Detachment have investigated and charged 5 drivers with impaired driving, drive while over .08, and Care and Control of a Motor Vehicle while Impaired (Over .08).

The highest reading was .250 the driver in this incident was located in Hedley after a report of a collision with the Nickel Plate Restaurant, the driver failed to remain at the scene, and was identified by several witnesses. The vehicle was located later, parked, the driver was in Care and Control of the motor vehicle, and a Breath Demand was made, resulting in the two readings.

The accused drivers are to appear in Provincial Court in Princeton on February 10th, 2005.

On Saturday evening, a New Driver from Nanaimo was stopped on Hwy #3 in front of the Happy Hut Store after the investigating member noted that the driver was travelling 100 km/hr in the 50 km/hr zone.

This Driver was charged under the Motor Vehicle Act for Excessive Speed, and Driving Contrary to restrictions when it was noted he had alcohol in his system. The 19 yr old driver was issued a 12 hr prohibition, the fines total almost \$500 dollars. This New Driver is at risk of losing his licence for suspension by the Superintendent of

Motor Vehicles.

There has been an increase in the number of impaired drivers on the road the past two weeks. Princeton RCMP urge those who are drinking to seek alternative means of getting home, either a sober driver to pick them up or have a designated driver ahead of time. From January 1st, 2004 to present, there have been over 50 Impaired Driving charges, over .08 and/or refusal to provide breath samples.





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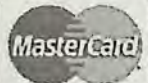

We have just uncovered at least one instance where we may have been better off lying about medical history.

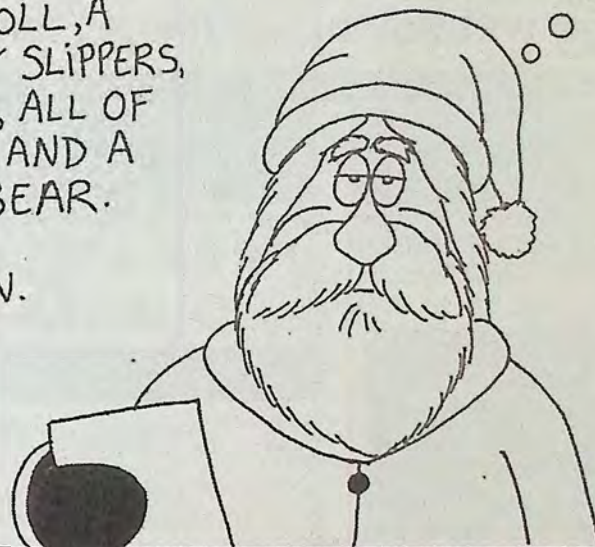

Skills Centre faces new challenges

To the Editor,

Since 1997 the Princeton Skills Centre has been working with people who are unemployed, underemployed or exploring career changes under contract with Human Resources & Skills Development Canada.

Effective March 1, 2005 these Employment Services funded by Human Resources & Skills Development Canada (HRSDC) will no longer be offered through the Skills Centre.

The Skills Centre has become synonymous with Employment services, at times at the expense of

our other services such as training, computer access and facility rentals.

During 2003 and early 2004, HRSDC began a series of consultations and internal strategic planning around the contribution agreements formats.

These changes are now being enacted.

One of the major changes is in response to an effort to streamline the employment services, their accessibility, design and service delivery. A means to accomplish this is to develop large contribution agreements with one service

provider.

As a result, a Call for Proposals was issued for the South Okanagan and Similkameen area. This call was all inclusive, meaning one contract for the entire area encompassing the communities of Summerland, Penticton, Oliver, Osoyoos, Keremeos and Princeton. The services included Resource Centres, Needs Assessment, Employment Counseling and Case Management.

Whether it is a good Muslim like Arafat, or a Christian, or whatever, it seems to me there is something completely immoral about one person having excessive wealth while surrounded by peo-

ple who struggle for the basics of life. It seems to me that should be classified among the crimes against humanity.

I remember a statement by a speaker at a Chamber of Commerce meeting.

"The good we do justifies the space we take up on earth," he said.

It seems some people really do not justify the space they take up.

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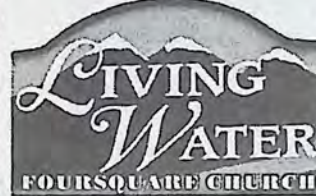
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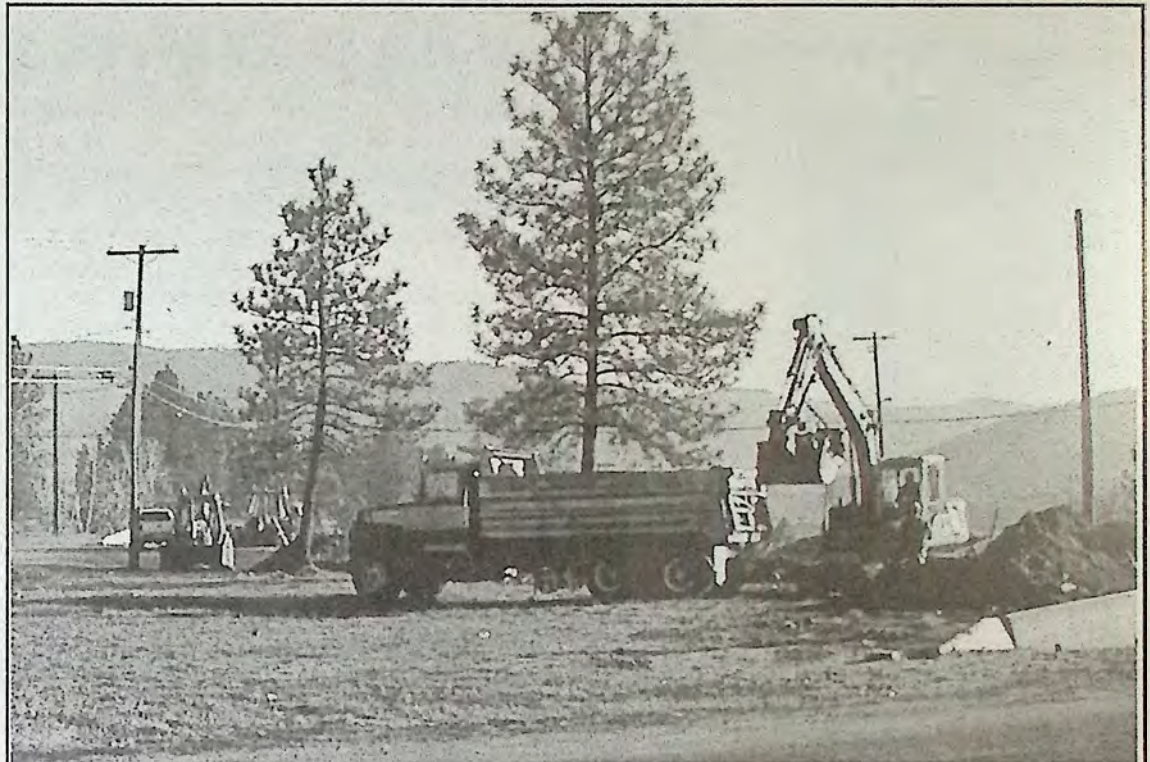

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Minister speaks out about coalbed methane

To the Editor;

British Columbians need energy natural gas - we use it to heat our homes, cook our meals and as a feedstock for many of the items we use daily like sporting equipment, fleece, pharmaceuticals and even surgical tubing. B.C. is blessed with abundant natural gas resources - including enough coalbed gas to provide energy for future generations. As with any emerging resource development opportunity in our province, we appreciate that many citizens are not familiar with B.C.'s long history of responsible natural gas production or existing regulations and safeguards that guide this vital sector.

We acknowledge concerns about how other jurisdictions have developed coalbed gas. We cannot account for practices that have led to concerns in the United States; however, British Columbia's regulatory system is based on global best practices and we are committed to balancing environmental, economic and social values. We have over 50 years of experience in responsible oil and gas development with a strong regulatory system that is based on current knowledge and is second to none in its protection of the environment.

The oil and gas industry is also very innovative and is constantly re-thinking practices to minimize and reduce potential impacts. All human activity has social and environmental impacts and society is challenged to constantly look for ways to do things better.

A key issue associated with coalbed gas activity is the regulations governing water disposal. Water extracted during natural gas production has always been re-injected well below the water table to protect our aquifers. Surface disposal of water would only be considered if the water met standards, established by the Ministry of Water, Land and Air Protection, that ensure the water would have absolutely no adverse impact on the environment.

Contrary to what our critics would say, coalbed gas development is not being pushed through without care. In fact, industry has yet to identify if there is a commercially viable resource to develop. Government has dedicated resources to ensure that we take all the necessary steps to develop the resource responsibly. Simply compare the 40 coalbed gas wells in B.C. over the last 20 years to the over 15,000 in the U.S. Powder River Basin in the same

time frame to gauge the speed of B.C.'s coalbed gas development.

When questioned why we don't require a comprehensive environmental baseline assessment prior to issuing tenure for development - the response is simple -tenure does not confer any right to exploration or development. It is simply the right to apply for further activity. Environmental assessments of all areas with coal deposits in the province would cover over 2.5 million hectares. Assessing this large area does not make sense because we know most areas will never see development. Furthermore, we believe that taxpayers would prefer industry pay for research where further study is needed.

Once a company has purchased tenure and is confident that they want to move forward with a test or drilling program, the company must apply to the Oil and Gas Commission - an independent regulator responsible for ensuring that any environmental and social impacts are addressed before they provide approval for activity. Any company wanting to develop oil or natural gas resources must address environmental, social, and economic values such as stream crossings,continued on Page 23

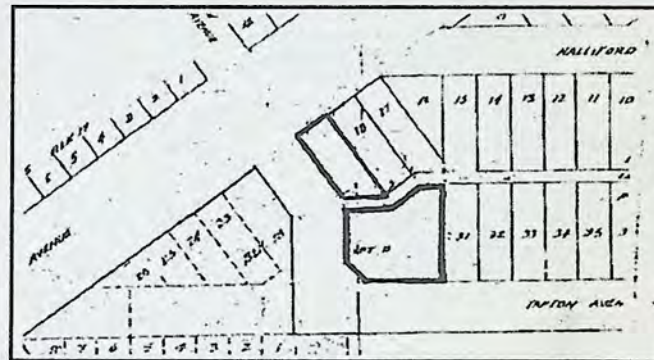

Sinclair slices and dices the Liberals

BC Federal of Labour President Jim Sinclair got right to the point Wednesday night.

"I want to talk about BC because I think we should talk about BC." Following a brief overview of how the labour movement formed, Sinclair touched on many subjects.

"Is our society going to work for all the people in it or not, or are we building a society that will leave a lot of people behind? We are not

going to make it if we leave people behind."

Sinclair took many humorous and sarcastic jabs at the provincial government. He criticized the privatization of BC Hydro and BC Rail but made strong points as to why he viewed these as poor business decisions.

"That's what wrong, we're not only getting rid of the goods but the capacity to build this province."

Forestry was another target where Sinclair stated the real problem was the shipping of trees elsewhere to be manufactured.

"Where does wealth come from in this province? We have to process everything here."

Health care was another subject of discussion.

"Health care is so important to us," Sinclair stated.

"Health care starts in our community. Poverty does not help health care."

Sinclair explained how a healthy community supports itself in many ways.

"We will divide our society and our community when we privatize health care."

He also emphasized the impor-

tance of a health care system available for all British Columbians regardless of income or social status.

"When everybody gets it, we're going to defend it."

On the subject of the Liberal governments move to privatizing Sinclair was very clear.

"They want us to hate the public system so we'll all like the private system."

Education was another topic.

"Public education is still how we look at our kids and how they get their dreams."

He stated those will a high school education qualify for 67% of all jobs.

"It turns out having smart people who can contribute to the economy is a good thing."

Sinclair spoke for less than an hour then fielded questions from the floor.

"You're not here because you don't care," he told the crowd, "You're here because you care and I want to thank you all for the important things each of you do in the community. Thanks for doing whatever you do to make this a better place."
