The 2005 Committee structure was announced at the December 6 regular meeting of Princeton Town Council and will remain in effect until further notice.

Sulentich asks

A bylaw to raise water rates received first, second and third readings at the December 6 Council meeting. The bylaw, which increases water rates by ten percent, will likely receive final reading at the December 20 Council meeting.

The impact of the increase will hit residential taxpayers with an added \$1.55 per month, or \$18.30 per year on the annual water bill. The impact on businesses, particularly those which consume a lot of water, such as car wash, laundry and motel businesses, will be substantially greater.

At the end of the meeting, former councillor Dan Sulentich asked Council for a reason for increasing the water rates. Councillor Lorne Esselink told him it was to build a new reservoir.

Sulentich asked whether this would be for West China Creek area. The response indicated this was under consideration. Sulentich alluded to a possible deal in the works for a development, but was told "there is nothing definite".

Following the meeting adjournment, the News Leader spoke with Sulentich to discuss the reasons for his questions. Sulentich said he knew the owner of a property located on the west side of Snowpatch Road had requested on a number of occasions that the Town of Princeton provide a supply of water.

This would be contrary to the Town's development bylaw, which states the land developer is responsible for providing water.

"I'm afraid the taxpayers are going to get hosed," Sulentich said.

Later in the week the News Leader was able to speak with Mayor Olsen on the matter.

We shared with him Sulentich's concern and asked for a response.

He made it clear the increase in water rates was a practical move.

"The only reasons for the increase is to cover the cost of the new intake on the other side of the Tunnel and operating costs."

Olsen stated the water rates have held steady for a number of years.

"They have not gone up in the past six years."

Council promises to deliver petition

Local residents are not happy with the lack of action to make it safer to cross Highway 3. Ed Goudreau presented a petition to Council on December 6 regarding a pedestrian controlled traffic light at the intersection of Highway 3 and Burton Avenue. The petition contained 454 signatures.

On receiving the petition, Mayor Keith Olsen said he had attended a meeting of resource communities in Victoria, and had reminded the Minister of Transportation about safety concerns on Highway 3, including the Vermilion Trails underpass which had been promised in writing. Mayor Olsen said Council met with MLA Dave Chutter and expressed the same concerns.

Council will send copies of the petition, with a letter, to the Minister of Transportation and to MLA Chutter.

Goudreau started the petition fol-

lowing the insistence of Southern Interior MP Jim Gouk.

Gouk had made the suggestion in a conversation regarding the intersection with the News Leader.

Council would like residuals

Princeton should receive a percentage of government money generated by resource industries.

This was the gist of remarks made by Mayor Keith Olsen and other members of Council at the December 6 meeting.

The coalbed methane project and the Compliance Energy application to produce thermal electricity prompted statements about Council's desire to see a portion of the public revenue go directly

to the Town.

The revenue, similar to royalties or residuals, would require the provincial government enter into a resource revenue sharing agreement in regard to local resource industries.

At this time, Council does not have a suitable policy or legislation to pursue, but resource revenue sharing does take place with one regional district in northern B.C.

Gouk says firearms registry is a failure

British Columbia Southern Interior MP Jim Gouk was disappointed to learn that federal NDP members of Parliament wasted valuable time visiting the area, only to go back to Ottawa and ignore what they learned.

"Five B.C. members of the federal New Democratic Party were touring our area a few weeks ago", said Gouk. "Presumably, they were here to find out what was on the minds of rural British Columbians. One of the messages they no doubt received was that the multi billion dollar firearms registry is an unmit-

igated failure and needs to be scrapped."

"How did they respond to this?" Gouk asked. "By immediately going back to Ottawa and voting against a Conservative motion to cut funding to the already bloated gun registry program."

"When Conservative MP Garry Breitkreuz moved a pair of motions at Justice Committee that would have transferred \$20-million from the \$82-million annual gun control budget to the RCMP to be used for front line policing priorities," continued Gouk, "the full committee

defeated the motion by a 7-4 count, with the governing Liberals being joined by the Bloc and the NDP members in voting against the motion."

"Unfortunately the Conservatives are the only party to agree with the majority of Canadians that this funding should go where it will be most effective," Gouk pointed out.

"I would like to invite those federal NDP members to come back to my riding and try to explain to my constituents why they voted against my colleagues motion," concluded Gouk.

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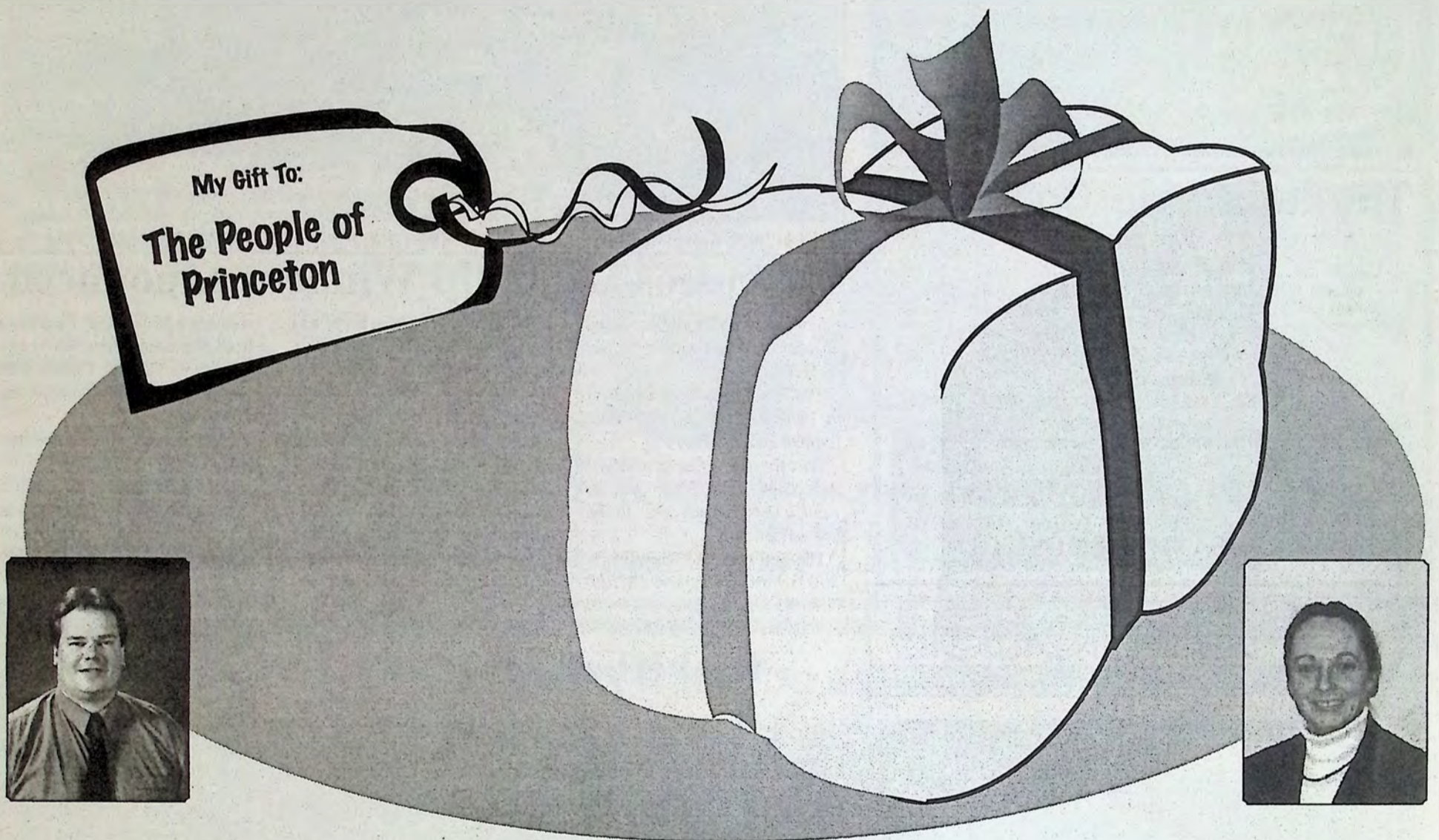

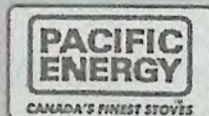

How to build assets in young children

Asset building is for all ages, not just young people aged 12 and up. It is reasonable to expect that if assets are good for youth, they are also good for younger children and even preschoolers.

Most child development experts agree that children need to start out right from day one. Given a healthy beginning and a firm foundation, children develop their full potential and make assets a part of their lives.

Those who have many assets when they are young are more likely to hang on to them as they grow.

Caring adults can build assets in even the youngest child. We need to replace the old saying 'Children should be seen and not heard' with the idea that children should be seen, heard, and taken seriously.

Empower young children by listening to their thoughts and opinions. When we let children act on their ideas and find ways to help others, we encourage them to grow and learn. To feel that they are important and they belong, children need safe and caring communities, schools, neighborhoods and families surrounding them.

One of the easiest ways to build assets with young children is to play with them. Jump into their world of imagination with both feet. Take time to sip invisible tea, play a guessing game, bake cookies, finger paint or play tag.

Give children useful role at home and in the community. Let children know that every person can contribute to the family. Assign age appropriate chores or have them help with small projects. Completing simple tasks gives a child a sense of accomplishment.

For example, a 3 year old can bring a napkin to the table. An 8 year old can wash lettuce for a salad while a 10 year old makes sandwiches.

Communities can support children by inviting them to participate in fundraising activities. Express great appreciation for their donations no matter how small it is. A used toy or twenty-five cents is a huge deal to youngsters.

Having children volunteering at an early age is a way to nurture an ongoing interest in service to others. Researchers say "Volunteering is an activity most likely to be cultivated in childhood and during the early teenage years." Of youth who volunteer, 34 percent first started before age 12. Another 25 percent started volunteering between the ages of 12 and 13.

Volunteering should be something that families do together. Stop in at the Princeton Chamber of Commerce to find out what volunteer groups are out in our community and whom to contact to begin your family volunteering experience.

It is encouraging to see that our community supports children and

families in so many ways. We are a community that is helping to raise our kids.

we beat those cravings

I am going to lose weight and it won't be painful. That's the thing with diets and food plans isn't it? The things you love are cut right out and then you go crazy with cravings and end up doing binge eating and feeling remorseful immediately after (with a smile on your face).

After my breakfast I am usually looking for a muffin around 10 am but I haven't been doing that since I started paying attention to what I am eating.

I am going to share with you some of the things we have been doing.

Buy cottage cheese, 1% and dry curd (there are less carbs in dry curd). I hope you like cheese.

Our breakfast is a 3 small egg omelette each, mushrooms sliced or diced or whatever, some shredded cheddar cheese, dry curd cottage cheese and salsa.

Recipe for 3 egg omelette

-whisk 3 small eggs and set aside
-olive oil in the fry pan (no carbs in olive oil)

-add 2 sliced or diced mushrooms when the oil is ready, and saute for a couple of minutes

-add some onions, if you like at the same time as the mushrooms

-pour whisked eggs over mushrooms

-add some shredded cheddar

cheese evenly over top of the eggs and mushrooms

-sprinkle evenly over the omelette
2 to 3 tbsp of dry curd cheese (it will get the same texture as mozzarella)

-let it cook for a few minutes, watch so it doesn't burn

-get your egg turner and fold the omelette in half in the pan, let it cook, and then turn it over again a couple of times to ensure the omelette is cooked entirely through.

Add some salsa for extra flavour and enjoy. George likes BBQ sauce but he discovered that brown sugar is 2nd in the ingredient list and has chosen not to use it any longer.

George has stopped drinking pop, and now drinks lots of water, I always have had lots of water.

The other night I made a stir fry with beef, green beans, some onions, garlic, baby spinach. I added black bean sauce and oyster sauce for flavour (without looking at the sugar content in the sauces). I had a side salad of cucumbers and dressing (without sugar in the first 4 ingredients). I didn't eat nearly as much as usual and I was satisfied. It's a really good feeling and I feel in control.

I don't know what we're going to do over the Christmas Season with all the food temptations out there. We'll just have to do our best and make our choices wisely.

Plan for Christmas health

Chocolates, nuts, candies, fruitcake - all these go with Christmas and weight gain, but Christmas need not be fattening. To make sure it is not going to put a lot of weight on you and your loved ones, take the time to plan for a healthy Christmas.

Oranges, apples, pears - these are great at Christmas time as a snack. Meringue shells filled with mousse are a low-cal, low-fat dessert. Whipped topping can be low-fat, especially if you make it with skim milk.

Vegetables with low-fat dip will help keep waistlines trim. Fill up on salad, turkey and vegetables and you can go easy on the mashed potatoes and gravy.

The worst thing about Christmas gatherings is the lack of action after dinner. Plan to have dinner earlier, and arrange for a walk to see the Christmas lights after dinner, or arrange a game that keeps people moving. Make sure everyone chips in with the after-dinner clean-up.

If you have house guests, ask them to help with tidying the house after the gifts are opened, and encourage them to get involved in dinner preparation as well as clean-up. Involve everyone in some kind of activity.

During the holidays, restrict alcohol consumption as much as possible, first for safety's sake, and second for good health.

If they stay for Boxing Day, make that a day to go outdoors and perhaps do some hiking, skiing, sledding or other activity. If your guests are older folk, encourage them to take a walk for their health.

Having a healthy holiday is going to make you, and everyone else, feel better when it's time to go back to work.

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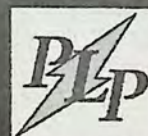

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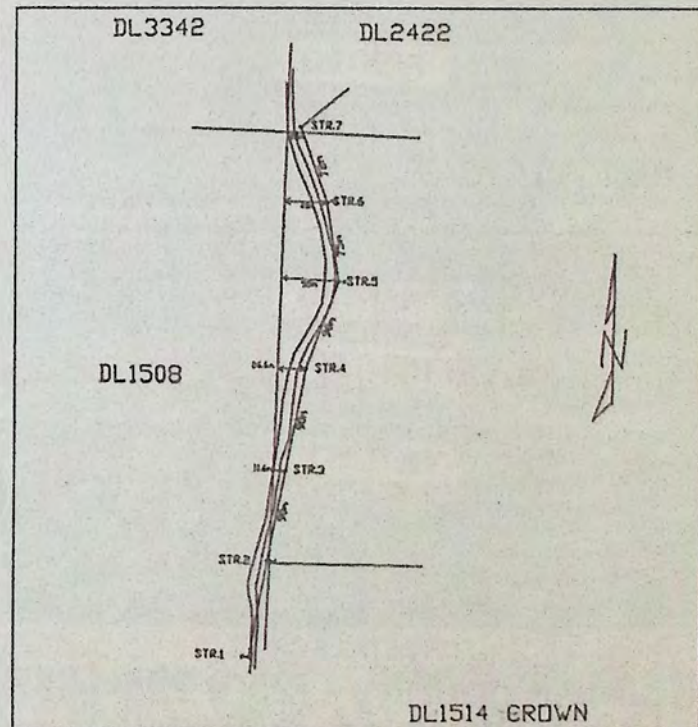

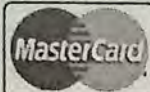

Gouk's statement comes under fire

To the Editor,

The Kootenay Region Branch of the United Nations Association (KRUNA) is concerned about our MP's statement on the US National Missile Defence System (NMDS) as posted on his website. The implication in this statement is that somehow we are not really aware of what the NMDS involves and that we have to listen to what the Bush administration is going to tell us before we make a decision.

The position of KRUNA is clear. We do know what is involved and we see the NMDS as a threat to world peace and stability. Enough material has been published reflecting research on NMDS which explains how the system works. Had Mr. Gouk attended the International Peace Conference in Castlegar Nov. 19-21 he would have received more than enough information from such knowledgeable speakers as Steven Staples, Director of the Polaris Institute, a public interest research organization based in Ottawa. In his presentations Mr. Staples pointed out that the NMDS cannot distinguish between a warhead and decoys. Land based NMDS missiles fired from California or Alaska can only intercept an attack after the warhead separates from its booster rocket. This is after the time when decoys are released. To counter this the rocket and its warhead have to be shot down before separating. This can only be done by firing weapons already based in space.

According to some defence ana-

lysts, once Canada signs on to the program it will be almost impossible to back out. So then, why is it that we should say NO to taking part in the American missile defence system?

First, the NMDS violates our international legal obligations. Both Canada and the US have ratified the Outer Space Treaty in 1967. Article IV of the treaty clearly states that parties will not place in orbit around the Earth any nuclear weapons or any weapons of mass destruction.

Second, the NMDS is destabilizing. In 2002, the US withdrew from the Anti-Ballistic Missile Treaty leading many analysts to argue that a new arms race has begun.

Third, NMDS is not necessary. The US Missile Defence Agency admits and military analysts acknowledge that a missile attack from a terrorist group or a rogue state is unlikely given the certainty of immediate US retaliation.

Fourth, the only beneficiary of NMDS will be the American Military Industrial Complex who will receive lucrative contracts. Their Canadian subsidiaries might pick up a few crumbs.

Finally, the projected total cost of the system after full deployment is said to eventually reach one trillion dollars. It is naive to assume that Canada will not be asked to contribute significantly.

It is time for Canadians to take a stand. If we truly believe that a better world is possible and that the NMDS will impair that vision we should make this known to Mr. Gouk and other members of

Parliament.

What better message to send in the name of peace than to have the majority of our elected officials in Ottawa vote against Canadian involvement in the US NMDS. We did not engage in lengthy discussions with the Americans when we said no to Iraq. Our Prime Minister made the right decision not to take part in the invasion. It is time for the Government of Canada to again stand up for what is right.

Demonstrations on friction and gravity were simplified to explain specific findings by using small cars, different surfaces and marbles.

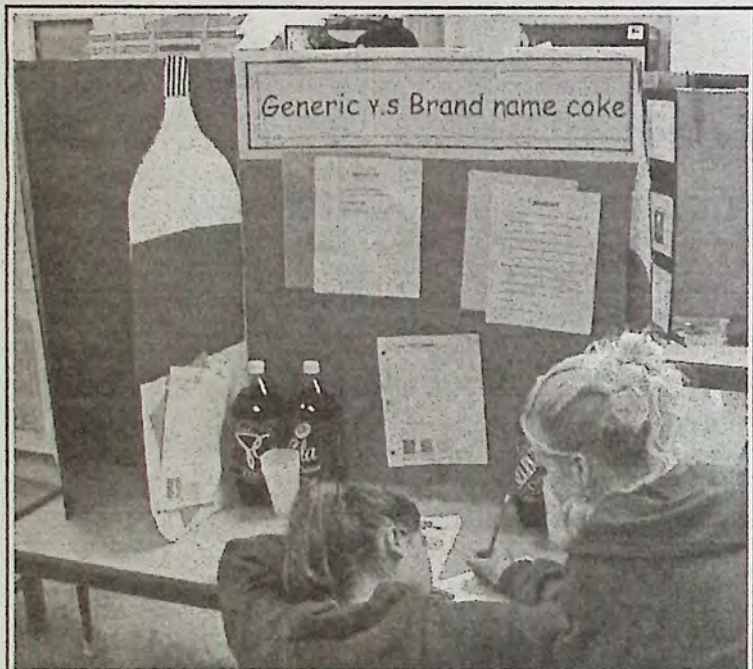

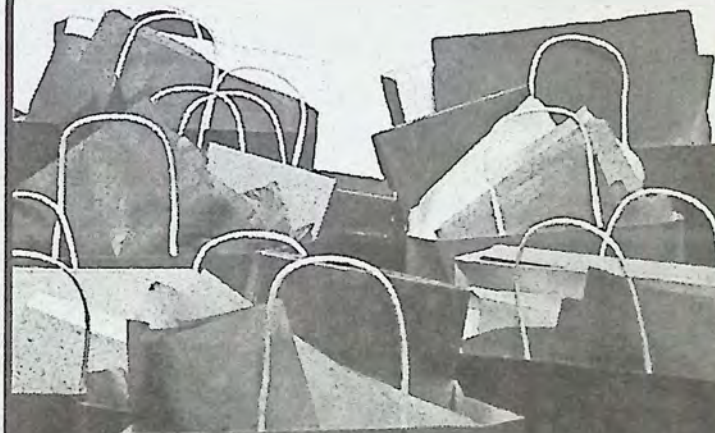

PLP gives aid to VTS

The cost of lighting in the Tunnel was discussed at the regular meeting of Vermilion Trails Society last Wednesday night.

A meeting had been held with John Hall, President and CEO of Princeton Light & Power on November 16th to discuss the matter.

Hall resolved the issue in a letter to the Trails Society, which was read aloud at their meeting.

The letter stated, in part, "PLP is anxious to assist where it can and feels that a good solution which falls within the limits of the tariff will be to switch this account (VTS Tunnel

lighting) from the small commercial category to the street lighting category."

The street lighting category, which is normally reserved for customers such as the Town of Princeton and Ministry of Highways would save VTS quite a substantial amount.

"Our calculation shows that this would reduce this accounts cost by 47% annually using the past nine months consumption records."

The group will also experience higher savings on months where there is no electricity use, creating a bill in the amount of \$0.00.
