Princeton RCMP say the matter is still under investigation.

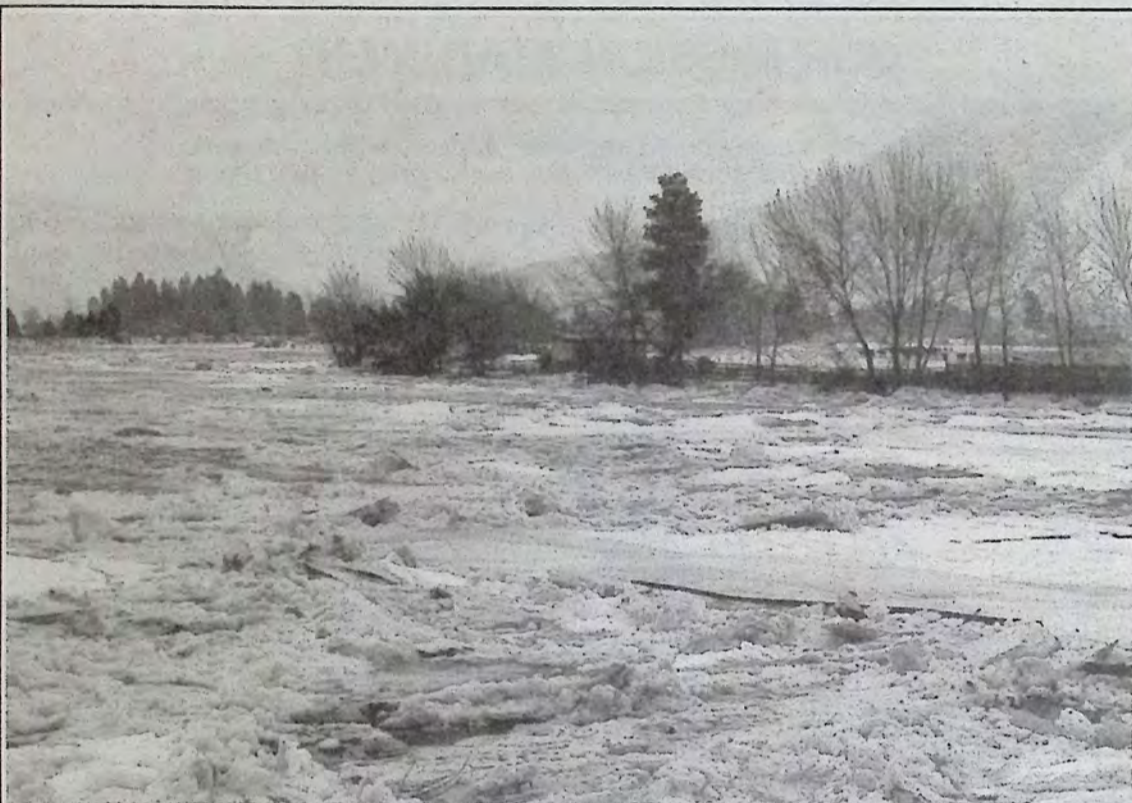

Princeton RCMP executed a search warrant in the 2400-block of Highway 3 on January 20th at about 3:00 PM.

The four occupants of the home were arrested and are facing charges of production of a controlled substance and possession for the purpose of trafficking.

RCMP seized over 3,000 marijuana plants in various stages of growth as well as growing equipment and drug paraphernalia. The home had been modified to grow pot. Court is set for June 16th in Princeton.

Ice jams at Red Bridge

The weather experienced in the Similkameen in the past two weeks contained a dangerous combination of elements.

Heavy snowfall, below normal temperatures followed by freezing rain and a sudden thaw.

It created a massive ice flow in the Similkameen River and by early Wednesday morning, Princeton RCMP had reported the river was cause for concern.

"Between 7 and 8 AM the Similkameen River rose to a considerable height in the Manning Park area and approximately 12-kilometres East of Princeton," said Cst. Myrl Stus of Princeton RCMP.

The ice broke and the river receded.

"There's a large amount of debris in the river," Stus said at the time, "Ice chunks, logs and tree branches."

Transportation links in and around Princeton were all reported in good condition and Stus estimated the river had risen between four and five feet.

Further downstream the situation was becoming very different. The Similkameen turned into a massive river of ice gathering speed and collecting debris along the way.

The only thing to stop the ice was the 98-year old historic Red Bridge just West of Keremeos.

It was at this location the ice started to jam.

"I've never seen anything like it," said Cawston resident Bryan Smith about the massive flow that choked the river and travelled at speeds estimated at up to 50 KM/h.

"It came too fast. The water came up about four feet in four seconds and the ice started to hit and the bridge started to shake and we just ran."

Smith says the ice jam broke free at around 9:30 AM, but before it did, the river backed up and flooded many low lying properties in the Keremeos area.

Homes had been evacuated and crews closed Ashnola Road.

Once the ice let go at the red bridge, it was obvious the historic structure had been damaged. The bridge remains closed as of press time.

The flow then smashed into the white bridge located near the Elks Rodeo grounds.

Smith says it was hit hard and also sustained structural damage.

"It was so spectacular, the whole thing was a once in a lifetime experience."

Team plans logging in Manning Park

A Project Team is planning fuel reduction in Manning Park. The reason for the removal of trees, according to the team, is to "reduce the potential for a catastrophic wildfire by reducing the fuel hazard on park land in the highway corridor". In a letter to Princeton Town Council, the Ministry of Water, Land and Air Protection Regional Manager, N.A. Carmichael, states, "The fires of 2003 exhibited abnormal fire behaviour as a result of fuel build-up and weather conditions."

Target areas border the highway, the road to Blackwall Peak, the area around Lightning Lakes and the lodge area, the ski hill area, the Visitor Centre and campgrounds. The removal of dead pine trees has begun in the first phase which is focused on infrastructure protection.

The second phase will be a "fuel modified zone" along Highway 3 and roads within the park, and fuel breaks throughout the area and on Crown land near Eastgate.

Fuel reduction will include prescribed burns for ecosystem restoration. Tree removal and prescribed burns are expected to improve the health of the park forests and ecosystems. Methods of tree removal are not the same as commercial logging. Trees are removed selectively and according to the needs of the ecosystem. The logging in the park is not intended to generate revenue, and the most commercially valuable

(healthy) trees will be left standing.

The Project Team is comprised of representatives from Gibson Pass Resort, Eastgate community, Ministry of Forests (Cascades Forest District) and Protection staff from Kamloops and Coastal Fire Centres, BC Parks and Ecosystems and Upper Similkameen Indian Band. Council was asked to contact the team to express any concerns, and Council had no concerns.

Snowy runway angers tenant

Dave Woodruff, a tenant leasing a building at Princeton Airport, attended the January 17 Town Council meeting to complain the runway was never cleared after his request in December. The first snowfall of December left about 8 cm. of snow on the runway. Woodruff asked that it be cleared. It was not.

Councillor Ray Jarvis said he and Administrator Cornie Froese had inspected the runway and found it frozen under the snow, and planes landing anyway, so they did not see a need to clear it.

Further, Jarvis stated, they had concerns about damaging the runway surface if the plow blade cut too deep.

Councillor Jarvis went on to say there is provincial money available for maintenance, weed control, building and resurfacing of small airports, and Council plans to apply for some of that money.

Woodruff asked for individual responses to his question of who, on Council, is really interested in the airport. Everyone said they support having a functioning airport.

Mayor Keith Olsen said, "The air-

port is an asset that must be made available, but snow clearing in town comes first."

Woodruff said the federal government had given the town \$100,000 to be used over 10 years for maintenance of the airport. He said the money should be there to plow it. Administrator Froese stated there is \$50,000 in the airport account.

Woodruff asked Council to make a commitment to keeping the airport open, but Mayor Olsen said Council feared making it a year-round open airport and then not be able to maintain it.

Woodruff said there was nothing to fear, as Council would have to apply for a new status before any change in status could occur. His objection was to the length of time it takes to plow the runway.

He noted he had monitored snow removal from the downtown, and when it appeared to have been completed, the runway was still not cleared. He discovered the snow removal equipment parked at the works yard.

Woodruff was advised there are other jobs for the crew to do, such ascontinued on Page 8

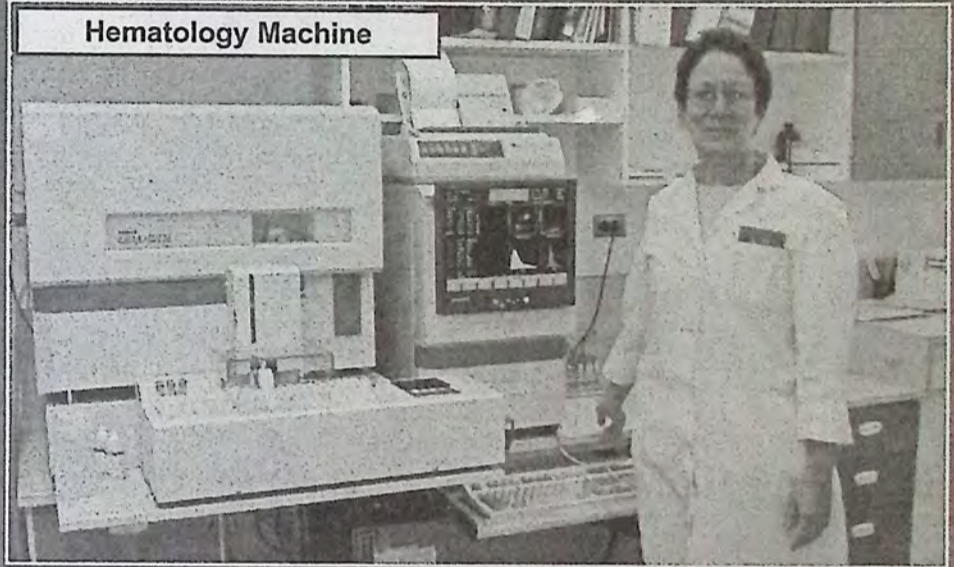

Liberal nominees visit Princeton during trip through riding

The two nominees seeking the Liberal candidacy for Yale-Lillooet were in Princeton last week.

David Laird, who is currently the Mayor of Merritt, says he has already identified a major problem within the riding.

"The biggest concern I get from listening to people in the riding is

the communication isn't flowing."

Laird says he feels an effective MLA is one that is in constant communication with members of his riding and is easy to contact, when needed.

"I'm a strong believer in communication. I run the same kind of communication as I am the Mayor in Merritt right now."

Laird says he feels a Mayors

Caucus needs to be formed in the riding putting all Mayors together in regular meetings with their MLA.

"You'll know right away what's going on and others in the riding will know what's going on."

Lloyd Forman, who has operated a successful logging business for years, is from Boston Bar.

He followed a theme of creative

common sense.

"We have to begin to realize Victoria and lower levels of government are working for us."

Forman reminded those present that in his view the election is not about himself or his opponent, but about individual voters.

"The campaign is won by the people on the ground."

Both nominees agreed the local riding association requires strength and that they are up against some tough competition.

The NDP's Yale-Lillooet Candidate, Harry Lali, is well known in the riding.

Forman focused on his common sense approach to politics stating he already has connections in Victoria and has maintained those ties.

"A key issue to me is why, in a community when we have problems, we can't make it work."

He wrapped up his presentation with a promise.

"It's that time of the year. If you give me the ball I'll guarantee it'll get in the end zone."

Laird also spoke about his political connections through years on Merritt Council.

"I bring a strong commitment to my job. I will work hard for the riding and you will see me," he said.

Laird, who lives on the same street as Lali, says there is a way to combat Lali's campaign style.

"I know when you campaign

against Harry Lali these days you have to take Liberal policies door to door."

Both nominees vowed to support the other, regardless of who gets the nod as Yale-Lillooet Liberal Candidate.

The 50th Anniversary party for Keremeos is coming together.

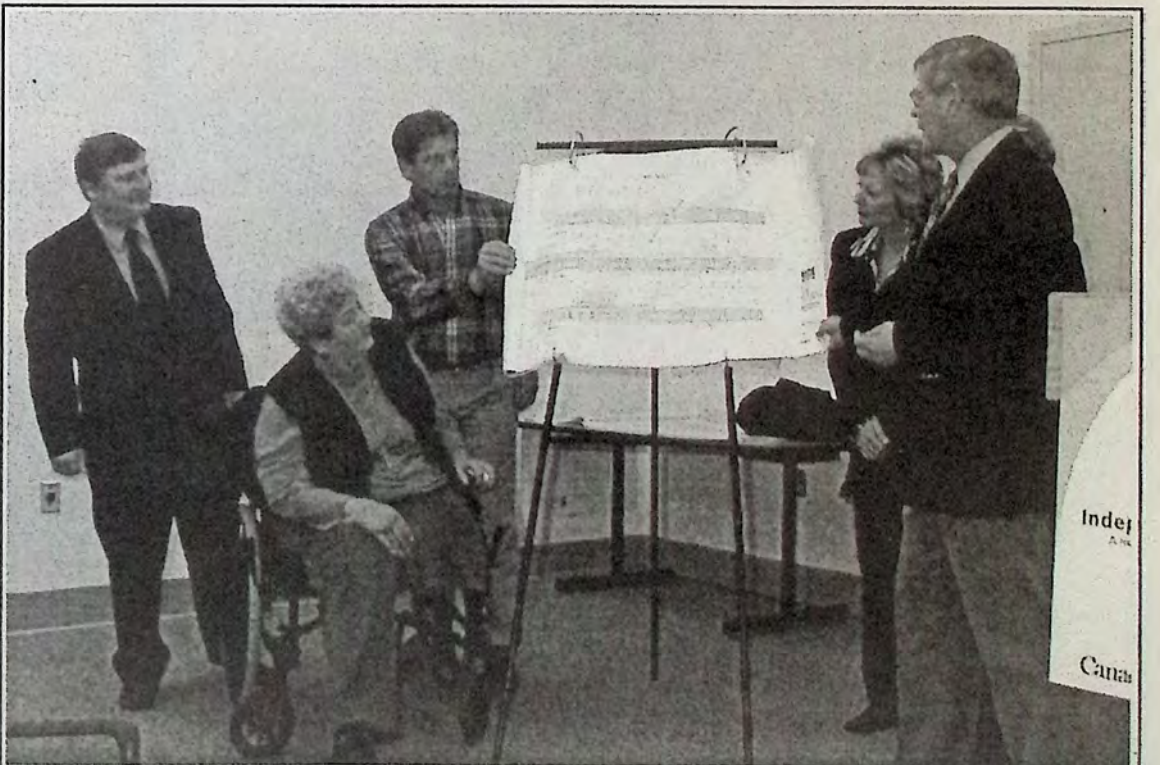
Committee Chair Judy Egli says they are looking at a variety of creative ideas to mark the occasion.

Seniors benefit from assisted living

Lower-income seniors will soon have access to affordable housing, with the construction of a 14-unit assisted living development in Keremeos.

The official groundbreaking ceremony for the South Similkameen Assisted Living Project took place on Tuesday, January 18th. It will provide affordable apartments and support services for seniors and includes one two-bedroom market rent unit.

"The government of Canada believes that healthy communities are vital to our personal and national well-being," said the Honourable David Emerson, Minister of Industry on behalf of the Honourable Joe Fontana, Minister of Labour and Housing. "Through CMHC, we are providing communities such as Keremeos

with a range of tools to create and preserve affordable housing. Projects such as these will allow seniors of Keremeos to stay close to family and friends in their community."

Thirteen of the 14 units at the South Similkameen Community Assisted Living Project are funded under Independent Living BC (ILBC), an innovative housing-for-health program that meets the needs of lower-income seniors as a middle option between home support and residential care. A benefit of the ILBC program is increased choice for seniors in their own housing in their own communities to maximize their independence.

"The Independent Living BC program provides our seniors with choices," said Dave Chutter, MLA for Yale-Lillooet. "By including

assisted living options into our commitment to build affordable housing we are providing seniors with choices, which are especially important as care needs change."

"There is a need for more affordable housing and care options all across the province, including right here in the Similkameen," said Walter Despot, Mayor of The Village of Keremeos and chair of the Lower Similkameen Community Services Society, the non-profit society which will run the development. "We're pleased that we can offer our seniors the opportunity to remain in the community as their care needs change. Many of them have spent their lives here. Many of them have roots here."

Ways to protect your team's health

When young people join sports teams, they develop social networks that influence their behaviour. As role models, coaches influence youth and have an incredible opportunity to positively affect their lifestyle decisions about tobacco use.

It is important to know the facts about youth and tobacco use.

- Young people who do not start using tobacco by age 18 will most likely never start.

- Nicotine is more addictive than heroin and cocaine.

- Smoking slows lung growth, decreases lung function and reduces the oxygen available for muscles used in sports.

- Smokers suffer from shortness of breath almost three times more often than nonsmokers.

- Spit tobacco and cigars are NOT safe alternatives to cigarettes.

- One in two young people who become regular smokers will die from a tobacco-related disease and will die on average seven years earlier than someone who has never smoked.

- Big Tobacco companies sponsor events such as the Virginia Slims tennis tournament in order to associate itself with anything athletic and counteract public awareness of the health hazards of smoking.

- Tobacco use is the single most preventable cause of death in Canada.

Secondhand smoke does cause health problems. The chemicals from a lit tobacco product cause eye irritation, sore throat, nausea, and hoarseness in nonsmokers. For young people involved in sports, secondhand smoke can make them feel ill, but it can also affect their physical performance and prevent them from doing their best. What can you, as a coach, do to protect the health of the youth on your team?

- Recognize that you ARE a role model. Don't use tobacco around players.

- Remind them of the importance of being tobacco-free.

- Players relate more to messages about the immediate effects of tobacco use (such as poor athletic performance) than to its long-term threats.

- Adopt and enforce a tobacco-free policy for players, coaches and referees and send a copy of this home for the parents to review.

- If the facilities you use are not tobacco free, talk to policymakers about making them tobacco free.

- Ensure that all vehicles used to transport team members are tobacco free.

You, as adult role models, can do your part to make a positive impact on the decisions of youth to use tobacco. Show them you care about their health by encouraging your team to avoid areas where tobacco use is present!

we beat those cravings

This week I had planned to write about how much I've exercised, what I'm doing in the way of exercise and share tips for easing yourself into a regular exercise routine.

Well, if shoveling snow counts, that's about as active I've been in the past couple of weeks.

So, I plan to share with you what I'm currently experiencing and maybe you've been going through the same situation.

My excuse at this point is that I haven't had the time to get into a regular exercise routine. We've all heard - and often used - the same line many times before.

The actual fact is NOT that I'm too busy, it's that I haven't MADE TIME for my routine.

What I plan to do is a combination of things.

I will work on my cardio every other day and supplement it with strength training on the cardio 'off' days.

It's a program I have followed in the past, and not only enjoyed, but had some success with, so I plan to stick with what I know already works.

Cardio workouts for me will begin with work on the cross-country ski machine until it's warm enough outside to jog lightly.

I'll start with short workouts, typically ten to fifteen minutes a session, working up to 30-minute sessions and beyond.

The weight training will begin with light weights with three sets of ten to twelve reps each. I'll add an

extra five pounds if it feels too easy to start.

I really quite enjoy upper body weight training, with my favourite exercise being upright rows. There's some kind of rush I get from feeling my shoulders getting something out of a workout.

These are all things I can do in the livingroom in front of the TV, and have done many times before, so I know it's possible for me.

A couple of tips from me to you if you plan on following my routines: check with your doctor first. They will determine whether or not you are at a place in your physical condition that will allow you to try any kind of exercise program.

It wasn't too many years ago I'd go out for a 30-45 minute run on the highway and as soon as I got home I'd pass out. I felt great during the run, kept drinking water before, during and after my run, but I'd eventually pass out.

I was in pretty good shape at the time and chose to ignore the blackouts until Brenda MADE me see a doctor.

It was at that visit I found out I had high blood pressure!

I've since beat the problem through some wise lifestyle changes, but if you are not sure about your fitness level, see your doctor.

If your doctor gives you the go ahead, ease into your routine, whatever it may be.

It's also easier if you pick something you can do easily and comfortably in your home or nearby.

A sweet way to die

Studies completed recently reveal a correlation between high sugar consumption and two deadly killers - diabetes and cancer. The links between adult onset diabetes and sugar is well-known, but the most recent study shows an added link to cancer.

All of us think of candy and other sweet foods when we think about sugar in our diet, but there is one other sugar which is well-known in the history of diabetes. This is the kind of potent sugar found in alcoholic beverages. The link between longterm excessive alcohol consumption and diabetes is well-established. The pancreas (where insulin is produced to deal with sugar) simply quits producing the needed insulin, and the result is diabetes. Now, researchers have found a link to pancreatic cancer, bowel cancer, and other internal organ cancers.

Cutting down on sugar may save your life. Cutting out alcohol may do you more good than cutting out other sugars. In particular, young people who see nothing wrong with partying and getting drunk need to know this is as dangerous as drunk driving, and there is no "designated" person who can prevent diabetes and cancer.

How much sugar is too much? How many alcoholic beverages per day is safe? These are questions for which there are no answers at this time. Further research into the influence of sugar on diabetes and cancer must be done before there are conclusive recommendations. In the meantime, we have been told, and we have an opportunity to change.

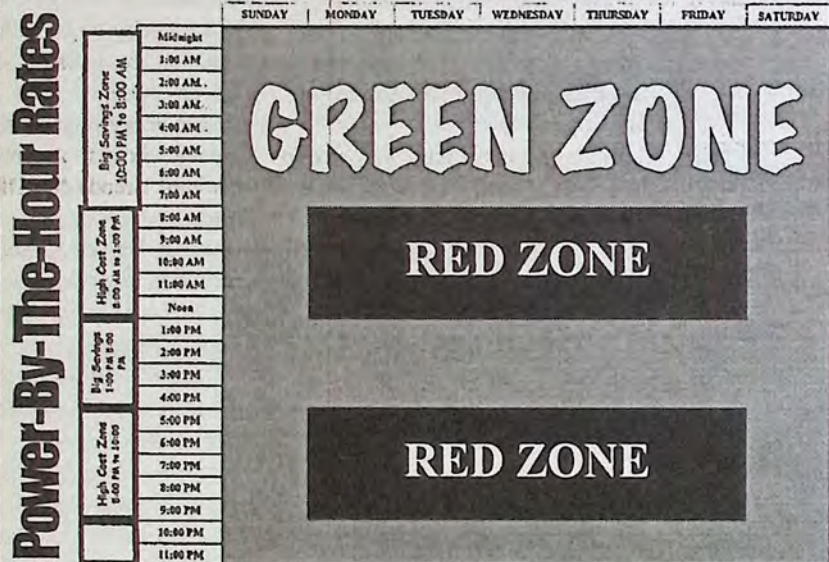

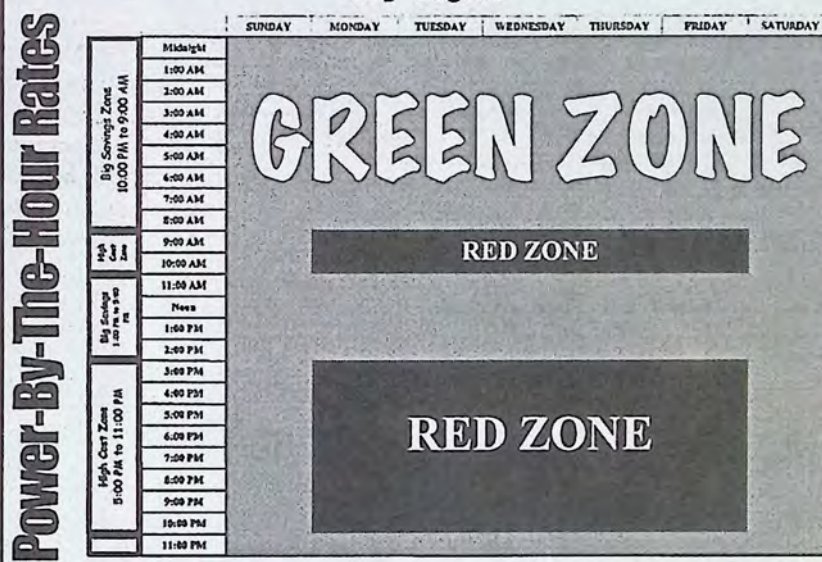

Petrobank continues with testing

Petrobank Energy and Resources Ltd. (Petrobank), is continuing extensive testing of the recently drilled exploration natural gas from coal (NGC) well located 4.5 km southwest of Princeton.

Initial testing should commence

within 3 weeks and more extensive testing of the well will be ongoing for the next couple of months. The comprehensive results will help Petrobank plan the future of the project.

"Early indications from all the

well data and coal samples have us optimistic," said Gregg Smith, Vice-President, Canada, Petrobank. "But we are completing a thorough examination of all data to help us make the best decisions about our next steps."

The drilling was conducted to determine the natural gas productivity of the subsurface coal. The exploration well encountered about 130 feet of coal in two horizons with associated gas indications. Testing over the next three months will allow Petrobank and its partners to thoroughly examine all data from the well including from zones that are not associated with coal. This process will provide geological information important to any future development.

thoughts on education

Last week's column focused on the detrimental effects of closing rural schools. This week, we look at the positive aspects of keeping smaller schools in rural areas open.

A wealth of research shows higher educational outcomes for smaller schools. The research results of the U.S.-based Rural School and Community Trust concur with the findings of many other studies showing academic achievement in smaller schools to be superior to that of large schools. Additionally, the Trust found that the smaller the school, the more effective it is at combating the negative impact of poverty.

Perhaps the most convincing research however, is from Dr. Allan Lauzon of the University of Guelph in Ontario. He notes that students in small rural schools have higher attendance rates, fewer dropouts, fewer behavioural problems, higher participation in extracurricular activities, a greater sense of belong-

ing, and fewer feelings of alienation. Overall, he found that students, especially disadvantaged students, learn more and better in smaller schools. Lauzon contends that we should recognize the special value of rural schools, not only in their home communities, but within the public education system as a whole.

Similarly, the B.C. School Trustees Association in its response to the provincial government's Rural Education Task Force, reports that smaller rural schools can lead to enhanced personal and academic self-concepts of students, as well as more positive attitudes of teachers and administrators.

The BCSTA also alerts us to the social and emotional importance of rural schools beyond their educational function. Rural schools are often used by entire communities as town halls, recreational facilities, libraries, gathering places for clubs and societies, emergency centres, and in some cases, as the sole government services outlet.

The decision to close rural schools affects not only the local community involved, but it attacks the very heart of our province, changing the social landscape and eroding our economic well-being. We call upon the provincial government to provide equal access to quality public education for the sake of our students, rural communities, and all B.C. citizens.

BCTF contributes \$50,000 to tsunami relief

The B.C. Teachers' Federation has pledged \$50,000 to the Education >International Tsunami Relief Program. The funds will go towards immediate humanitarian relief for teachers, students, and their families hit by the devastating tsunamis.

In addition, the BCTF leaders have

committed to developing a longer-term plan for involvement in the reconstruction of schools and public education in the stricken regions.

"Like so many people around the world, we were shaken by the massive scope of the devastation, and moved to take action," said BCTF

President Jinny Sims. "Teachers all over B.C. have made donations as individuals and now are working with thousands of students to raise additional funds for the relief effort. But we also know our members would want us, as a Federation, to make significant ongoing efforts to help students, teachers, and families rebuild their schools and communities."

Sims noted that children are the most vulnerable in the wake of the catastrophe. Thousands have been killed, thousands more are orphaned and homeless. There are disturbing reports of children being trafficked across borders. "The sooner we can get schools reopened, the sooner we can begin helping survivors deal with the trauma and loss they have suffered," Sims said.

Education International estimate at least 10,000 teachers are among the tsunami victims. At least 2,000 teachers are reported missing in the northern Indonesian province of Aceh alone. With more than 1,000 schools destroyed, 140,000 elementary students and 20,000 secondary school students have nowhere to learn. Emergency schools will be set up in tents located near the refugee camps.

According to the Ministry of Education of Sri Lanka, more than 80,000 children and 3,000 teachers are displaced. Up to 60 schools were completely damaged, and 110 schools were partially damaged with all school furniture and equipment destroyed. A large number of schools are now used to house the refugees.

and the regional health authorities.

The Village of Keremeos also contributed to this development by providing waivers on various building and property-related costs making it a collaborative venture between all three levels of government. Interior Health is providing the funding for the personal care services and hospitality top up, and is leasing the site for \$10 for 60 years. Okanagan Similkameen Regional Health District (OSRHD) and South Okanagan Similkameen Medical Foundation (SOS Foundation) also contributed.

The Province, through BC Housing and the ILBC program, is committed to providing 3,500 affordable apartments with support services across the province by 2006. To date, more than 2,660 ILBC units have been allocated, 76 percent of the program in communities across the province.

The Government of Canada, through CMHC, will contribute \$130 million by 2008 towards affordable housing in this province. The provincial government, through BC Housing, will provide a minimum of \$34 million annually to subsidize the costs of units built under this agreement, as part of a larger strategy to provide a range of housing options British Columbians in greatest need.

The Society, which is volunteer run, sponsors free services and programs such as a mental health drop-in centre, a literacy outreach program and a complement of volunteers for services such as meals on wheels and a volunteer driver program.

The assisted living development adds to the current range of housing and care options currently available and better suits a population of seniors who are living longer, healthier lives.

"This development provides a great option to our seniors in Keremeos to live as independently as possible for as long as possible," said, Alan Dolman, board chair of Interior Health.

"Assisted living can improve the health of seniors who need some assistance with medications and mobility and it can open the door to social and recreational opportunities as well."

The ILBC program is managed by BC Housing in partnership with the Government of Canada, through Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation (CMHC),

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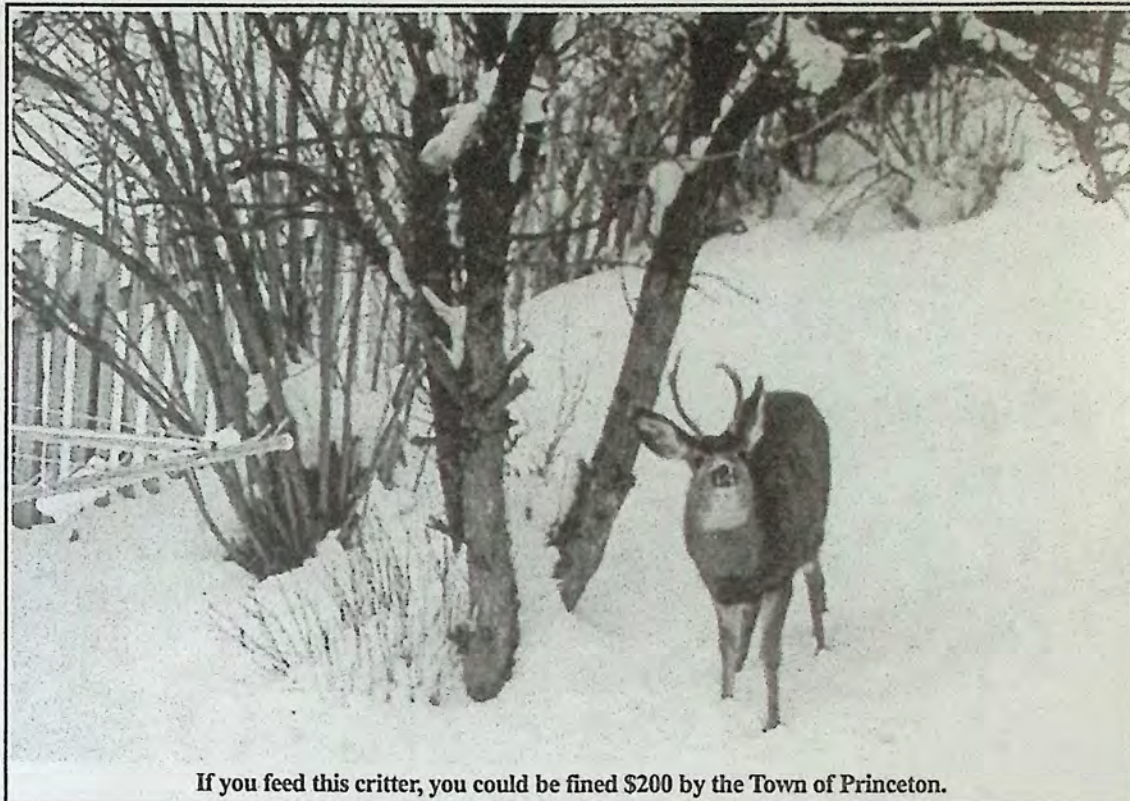

Council drafts anti-deer feeding bylaw

Feeding deer within Town boundaries will soon be an offence for residents of Princeton.

On January 17, Town Council gave first, second and third reading to a bylaw prohibiting laying out food for deer.

The bylaw will be welcomed by numerous residents who have complained bitterly to Town Council about the territorial deer within the town.

The bylaw states the Town of Princeton prohibits the deliberate feeding of deer within the Town boundaries. A person appointed by

Town Council may, on any day of the week, at all reasonable times, enter a property to determine whether the occupants of that property are feeding deer.

If a person is found guilty of feeding deer on that day, a fine of \$200 will be levied, plus any costs of prosecution.

If the same offence occurs the following or subsequent days, the offence will be deemed a new offence and a further fine will be imposed.

Anyone who prevents or obstructs the Town officer from entering the

property will be deemed guilty of a violation of the bylaw.

The reasons for the bylaw are stated within the bylaw: deer are attracted to neighbourhoods because they are safe, healthy places to live away from natural predators, deer are becoming aggressive and presenting a safety concern to residents, and urban areas are not a natural habitat of deer.

Unless there are reasonable objections to the draft bylaw, it will receive fourth and final reading in the near future.

Group applies for cultural grant

An ad hoc committee met twice this month to put together an application for a grant to inventory and organize Princeton area arts and cultural assets.

The grant is available under the 2010 Legacies Now funding, in the ArtsNow category.

The grant, worth \$5,000 from 2010 Legacies Now, will be matched with equal funds from the community.

The application is for a Cultural Scan which supports assessment and inventorying initiatives that enable communities to take stock of local cultural assets, strengths, challenges and aspirations.

The committee has identified many assets and strengths, and a lot of challenges, but also identified the fact that there is no real inventory of arts and cultural assets on which to create a plan for future development of the assets.

The application must be made by January 31, 2005, and most of the committee's work has been organized by Michael McLaughlin, Economic Development Officer.

Other committee members include Mayor Keith Olsen, Regional Director Geri Logan, Recreation Director Lyle Thomas, Chamber of Commerce manager Lori Thomas, Museum Society President Nick

Mills, artist Marilyn Huycke, Arts Council President Dawn Johnson, Monty Raine (Princeton Writers Group), Dianne Rainer (art business) and Julia Halipchuk and Fine Arts teacher Debbie Cappos, representing arts and cultural interests of students.

Citizens will be invited to submit input to the cultural scan if Princeton receives the grant.

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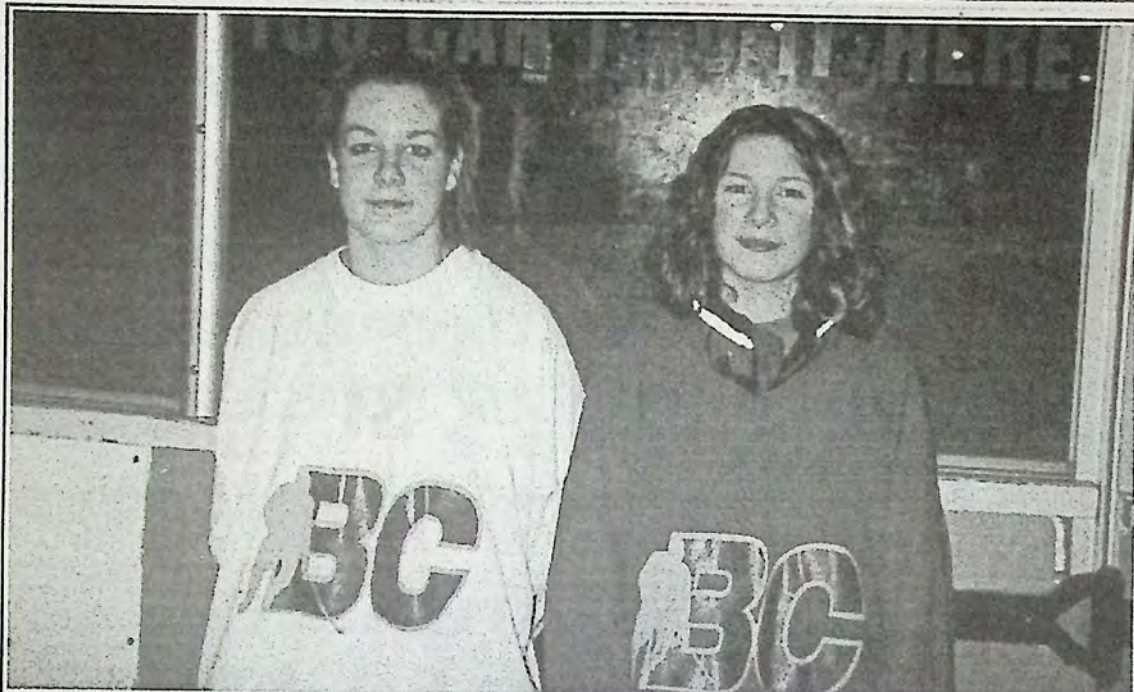

The new Town bylaw template

The Town of Princeton has drafted a bylaw that will make the 'deliberate' feeding of deer illegal. The fine for such an offence will be \$200.

While we're still not sure this is the answer to the deer 'problem' we do see it as a spring board to other long overdue bylaws.

Here are a few suggestions:

Bylaw #2005-0010 The Clean Up After Your Dog Bylaw. It's pretty much self explanatory. You walk your dog downtown - or anywhere outside your property - and if Fido decides to leave a deposit on someone's yard or on a sidewalk, you must clean it up. If a Town Official can determine you chose to 'deliberately' not clean up after your pet it's a \$200 fine. Same goes for 'deliberately' taking your dog to the dyke behind Chevron to do his business. What if the Town Official determines Fido 'deliberately' messed the sidewalk?

We'll have to take that to a Committee meeting.

Bylaw #2005-0123 The Skateboarding/Bicycle Bylaw. If you are operating a skateboard or bicycle on a sidewalk, clearly labeled "NO BIKES" and a Town Official determines you are doing it 'deliberately' then it's a \$200 fine.

Bylaw #2005-\$1.99 The Retail Drift Bylaw. If you are found shopping out of town for an item that can be purchased in Princeton, and a Town Official can determine you are doing so 'deliberately' then it's a \$200 fine. If the purchase happens to be an item NOT available in Princeton, and a Town Official can determine you 'deliberately' searched all retail outlets in Princeton before venturing out of town for the purchase, then it's a \$200 reward!

How about this one?

Bylaw #2005-\$200 The Town Council Challenge Bylaw. This is only for members of Town Council. If a Town Official can determine any of them 'deliberately' missed a meeting, did not attend a function or any other duty expected of them, it's a \$200 fine. The money collected from this fine will 'deliberately' go towards a local charity.

We are not against bylaws in any way, shape or form, we're just wondering what will determine a 'deliberate' feeding of deer.

Will we be required to raise our fence another two feet to prevent the deer from 'deliberately' entering our yard and feeding off a tree we have 'deliberately' not chopped down?

Actually, we can't do that either. There's a bylaw in place restricting the height of our fence, isn't there?

Caution urged around high water, ice flows

Emergency officials are advising the public to exercise extreme caution around creeks, streams and riverbanks. The current spell of very warm temperatures combined with heavy rainfall is leading to above normal stream flows and flooding of low lying areas.

People should also avoid the area on or near ice jams. These blockages are unstable and can shift at any moment. When ice jams suddenly break free, flooding can occur as water rushes downstream.

The public should report any flooding or soil instability concerns immediately to municipal or regional authorities.

If any rising waters become a threat to safety, the public is reminded to obey emergency officials who are involved in rescue or flood control operations, including those directing traffic. If you are under an evacuation order, shut off power in your home and leave. Then, immediately register with the local Emergency Social Services reception centre.

There are a number of things you can do to ensure you and your family are safe during this period of high water runoff:

- Consult local news media for information and announcements regarding the flood potential in the area you are in or going to, and stay alert for changing conditions.

- Do not try to clear blocked culverts or log jams. Instead, contact your local government that has the proper equipment and trained personnel.

- Monitor water levels and talk to your children about potential hazards around waterways around your home, their school or local playground.

- Parents of small children should ensure that children are never left unattended near fast flowing streams.

- Always tell someone where you are going, or leave a note in your home, trailer, tent, or car, providing the date, time of departure, number of people in your party, destination,

and expected return time.

Continued heavy rainfall and melting snow and ice since Sunday have resulted in increased localized flooding in many parts of Southern British Columbia.

Road closures, avalanches, landslides, power outages and other incidents associated with the current unusual winter weather pattern are being reported.

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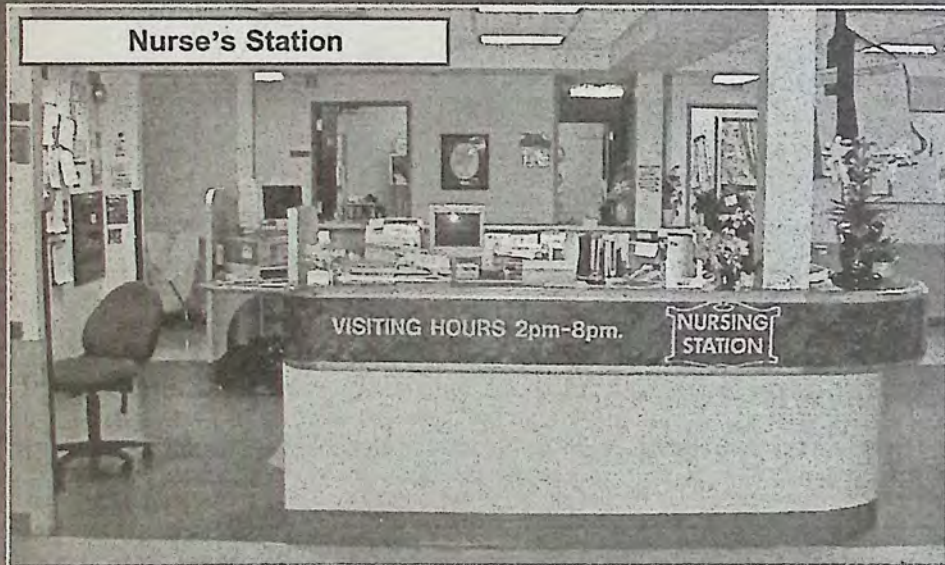
