Princeton RCMP arrested an individual who was in possession of a large quantity of cocaine on February 23rd at about 11:00 am.

The subject was arrested outside a local restaurant and has been charged with possession for the purpose of trafficking.

Later that evening, February 23rd, three Princeton RCMP members assisted Oliver RCMP detachment with the execution of a number of search warrants in their community. This joint enforcement has proven very successful for the detachment in the South Okanagan.

In Oliver, a total of 11 persons were arrested with a number of them being charged with drug and weapon offences.

On February 25th Osoyoos RCMP executed a Controlled Drugs and Substance Act search warrant on a residence in Osoyoos, BC on behalf of the Princeton RCMP.

The occupants of the home were arrested and have been charged with possession for the purpose of trafficking as well as facing weapon offence charges.

RCMP seized cocaine, drug paraphernalia and firearms in the home.

In the last 2 months the Princeton detachment has executed or assisted in executing over 12 search warrants under the Controlled Drugs and Substance Act.

All these matters are still under investigation.

## Country concert coming



Kelowna band Cruzeros is one of a half dozen country groups coming to perform May 13th and 14th during the "Let's Play Princeton" Concert. Advance tickets go on sale this week.

### Local youth to benefit

John Babiak of Tokn Productions has announced this week he has received confirmation for all the artists scheduled for his mid-May concert.

'Let's Play Princeton' country music concert will feature Emerson Drive, Ken McCoy, Justine Stewart, Duane Steele, Cruzeros and Tracey James.

Babiak says local talent will also be featured with a slot reserved for Princeton's Kristie McIvor.

"This concert could draw a maximum of 5,000 people to the area," Babiak says.

He already has the support of BC Country Music Association, Giant-FM, PXA and the Rodeo Club.

The exact location for the outdoor concert, set for the evenings of Friday, May 13th and Saturday, May 14th, is yet to be decided.

"I've been planning this concert for over a year and corporate sponsors are welcome as are donations from local businesses."

Babiak says there will be plenty of advertising space available for businesses to make use of in promoting themselves at the concert.

He is also pushing for advance ticket sales. Tickets will be available locally from March 8th to 18th. A two-day pass will cost \$40.00 + GST.

Local ticket outlets include Dairy Queen, Similkameen News Leader, Belaire Restaurant and Billy's Restaurant.

Tickets will be available through TicketMaster outlets on March 15th with prices set at \$60.00 + GST and service charges for a two-day pass and single day tickets will go for \$30.00 plus taxes and service charges. Rush tickets will be \$35.00 per day at the gate. Youth tickets will be a flat \$10.00 + GST regardless of when they are purchased.

"There will also be a 'Meet and Greet' event planned for after the concert," says Babiak.

The 'Meet and Greet' will take place Saturday, May 14th starting at 9:30 PM in the Arena. Tickets at the door will cost \$20.00 and will include a cold buffet, autograph opportunities with some of the artists featured at the concert and access to souvenirs. Russell Brewer will also be performing live at the event.

Babiak says a portion of proceeds collected from the concert will be donated to youth sports, culture and art in the community.

## Petrobank pleased with results

The first natural gas from coal (NGC) test well drilled by Petrobank last November in the Princeton area has delivered positive results. Initial tests indicate there is approximately 130 feet of coal in two horizons. The company now believes a significant amount of gas content exists in the coals. Early estimates indicate that a potential of 500 billion cubic feet (bcf) of natural gas may be contained within the coals under lands leased by Petrobank. Well results to date clearly demonstrate a significant amount of gas is contained in the coals, but the deliverability of gas and commercial viability of a project are still largely unknown.

The company continues to evaluate its findings from this initial well. Plans for the development of a pilot testing program with additional wells to be drilled are in the early stages with a goal to start the program in the second half of 2005.

"Once our pilot program is outlined, we will commence a variety of meetings with members of the community," said Gregg Smith, Vice President Canada, Petrobank Energy and Resources Ltd. "The potential of our find holds many benefits for the community and

British Columbia but we want to be sure people understand what our project will entail and how we will carefully manage it."

"Petrobank has already met with many officials and members of the community while developing its first NGC test well. We are aware of the many factors surrounding NGC and believe a well informed community can best make decisions based on facts. Princeton and area residents have asked us many questions and we hope to continue to earn the reputation of being open, frank and a responsible business in the community," said Smith.

## Meth traffic halted by RCMP

Princeton RCMP stopped a vehicle in the Overwaitea parking lot in downtown Princeton at about 12:30 PM on Wednesday, March 2nd.

"Police located and seized a large quantity of crystal methamphetamine, drug paraphernalia as well as tools used to break into vehicles," says RCMP Sgt. Kurt Lozinski.

"The three occupants of the vehicle, two males and one female, were arrested and are facing charges of

Possession of a Controlled Substance for the Purpose of Trafficking as well as Possession of House Break-In Instruments."

Lozinski says the two male occupants of the vehicle are from the Lower Mainland and the lone female is a Princeton resident.

"These individuals were released from custody with a court appearance for June 16th in Princeton."

Princeton RCMP continue to make

good on their pledge to 'rid Princeton of drugs' and have not let up on their crackdown.

Although Princeton RCMP are working full-time on their drug crackdown, tips from individual residents aid police a great deal.

Anyone seeing anything suspicious in their neighbourhood is advised to pass the information on to local police.

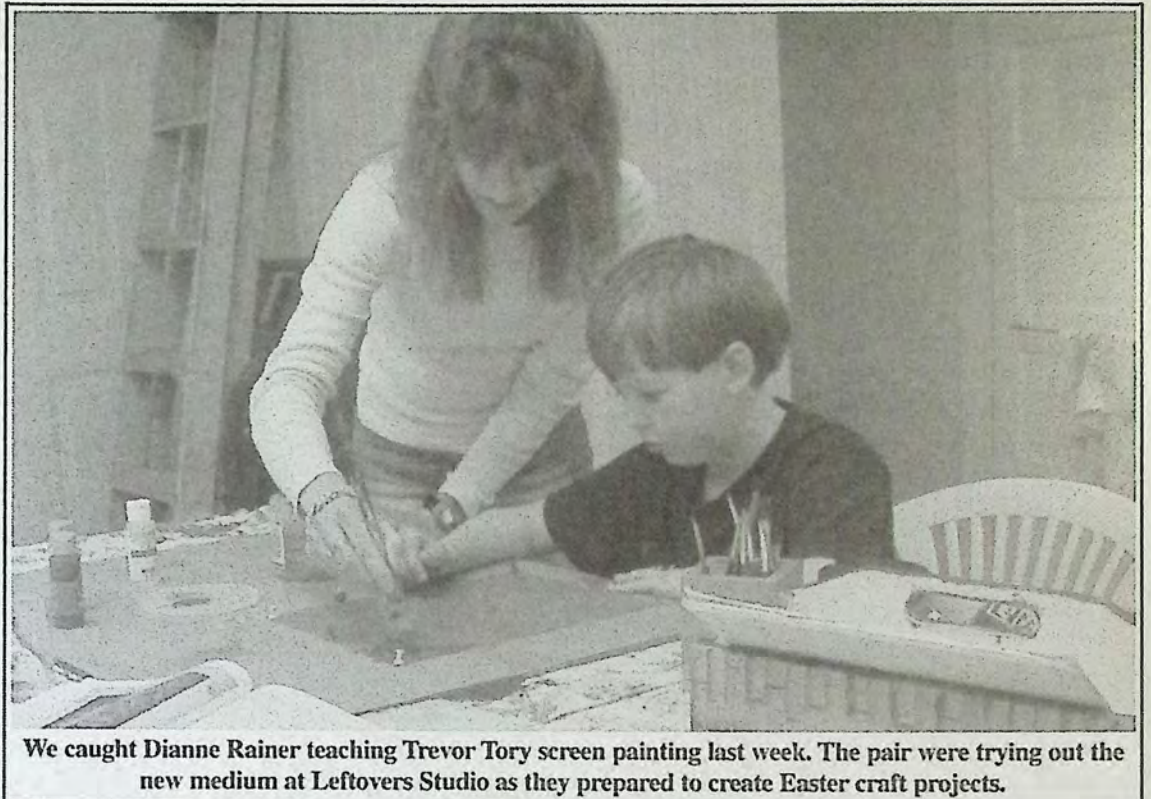

## Foundation benefits Princeton

The South Okanagan Similkameen Medical Foundation has funded the \$750,000 upgrade to the Penticton Regional Hospital Nursery which became operational on October 21, 2004. Since then, the facilities have been used for the birth of 24 babies from the Princeton area.

The Foundation is now moving to the next, and very important, stage of its, "Journey Towards Excellence" campaign - the purchase of a mobile Magnetic Resonance Imaging (MRI) unit. This is being made possible through an agreement and cost sharing between the Ministry of Health, Interior Health Authority, hospital foundations in Cranbrook, Trail and Penticton. The unit will be located in Penticton for two weeks, in Cranbrook for one week and in Trail for one week of each month.

This is a significant purchase of a very special piece of diagnostic equipment. An MRI is used for cancer tumor detection, aneurysm detection, blood vessel scanning, diagnosing back injuries, blood vessel problems and a multitude of other diagnostic tests. Early detection of most illness is critical to a satisfactory recovery. No longer will patients in the South Okanagan Similkameen region have to travel long distances in discomfort to other centers for

this service. The unit is scheduled to be operational this spring. With a second MRI in the Okanagan two weeks out of four, waiting times should be cut significantly.

Having an MRI available to residents of the South Okanagan and Similkameen has been one of the foundations high priorities for several years. The South Okanagan Similkameen Medical Foundation's share of the cost is \$750,000. To date they have received donations amounting to seventy-five percent of that amount.

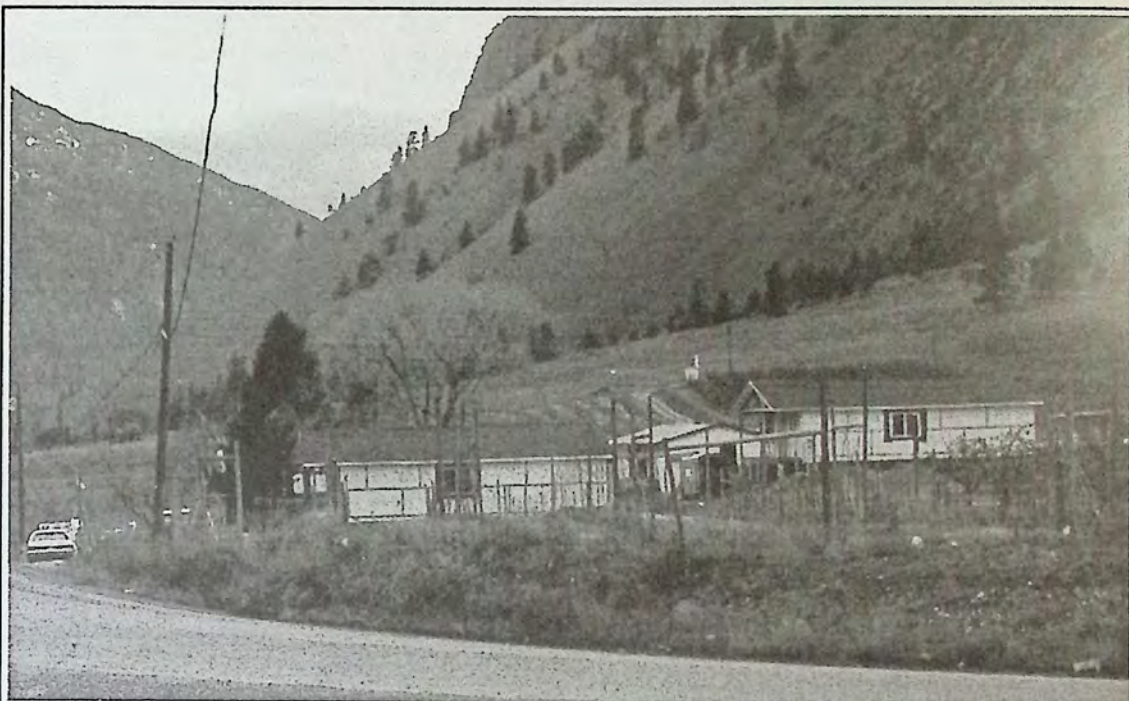

## Chopaka Rodeo marks 40 years

This year marks forty years since Barney Allison hosted the first Chopaka Easter Sunday Rodeo. This annual event will take place again this year.

For newcomers to the Similkameen Valley, Chopaka Rodeo may be hard to find. Chopaka is located south of Keremeos.

Follow Highway 3 past Cawston toward Osoyoos until you see a bridge crossing the river. There will be a rodeo sign pointing the way. Cross the bridge and follow the paved road until you see the gates to the rodeo grounds.

The rodeo arena is rather unique. It is set at the bottom of a natural bench, and spectators gather on the slope to watch the fun. Bring your own chair, and dress warmly. A concession will be open, and will serve the traditional fried bread as well as hot dogs and hamburgers.

Chopaka Rodeo is the first Similkameen Valley rodeo of the season. It is a place to socialize

## May long weekend plans are in progress

Keremeos offers some big events on the May long weekend, starting Friday, May 20, with the Cathedral Lakes Powwow.

This event takes place at the Ashnola campground, located across the Red Bridge and about seven kilometres south on Ashnola Road.

The powwow is hosted by Lower Similkameen Indian Band. The first Grand Entry will take place at approximately 7:00 p.m. Camping is available on the grounds for those who want to spend the whole weekend, but spectators can pay a daily or weekend rate at the gate.

The powwow includes competitive dancing by dancers who have earned the right to compete. Dances include traditional dances, fancy dances, grass dances, and jingle dances.

In addition, there are special junior dances, elder dances, and

intertribal dances (where everyone competes). Drum and singing groups compete, too. On Saturday and Sunday, Grand Entry takes place at 1:00 p.m. and 7:00 p.m.

The Similkameen powwow is unique in having a round house with bleachers surrounding a center circle. Visitors remark on the outstanding ambience of the area nestled in a narrow valley with a river running past the grounds.

### Elks Rodeo

The Keremeos Elks Rodeo begins on Saturday, May 21, and goes through Monday, when the annual parade is held. The rodeo action includes antique tractor pulls, junior events, and the customary rodeo events.

Fans sit in bleachers during events, and relax and socialize in the refreshment and concession areas.

# Watch Hedley grow! Big things coming in 2005

Big things are happening at the old school in Hedley. It is being torn apart on the inside to create the Snaza'ist (Snazza - east) Centre. Snaza'ist means "striped rock" which was an original name for Hedley. Snaza'ist Centre will welcome vis-

itors to the Mascot Mines tours, which resume in May. As visitors enter the main hallway, they will see a reception area, an information desk, and a shop which sells soft drinks, water and snack foods, as well as souvenirs. Further down the hall, visitors will

enter an exhibits room containing dioramas of the ochre bluffs (west of Princeton) and Hedley and area as it appeared in the 1940's, when the town was a lively gold processing centre, as well as a mural of the Rock Shelter, a historic pictograph site located on Chuchuwaya

Reserve. Going further down the hallway, visitors will enter a multi-media theatre.

The front of the building will see new landscaping to create a ramp to access the main doors. If there is enough money left, the tours parking lot will be paved.

Snaza'ist Centre is part of a major development project spanning the next five years. Plans include moving the Upper Similkameen Indian Band administration offices into the building.

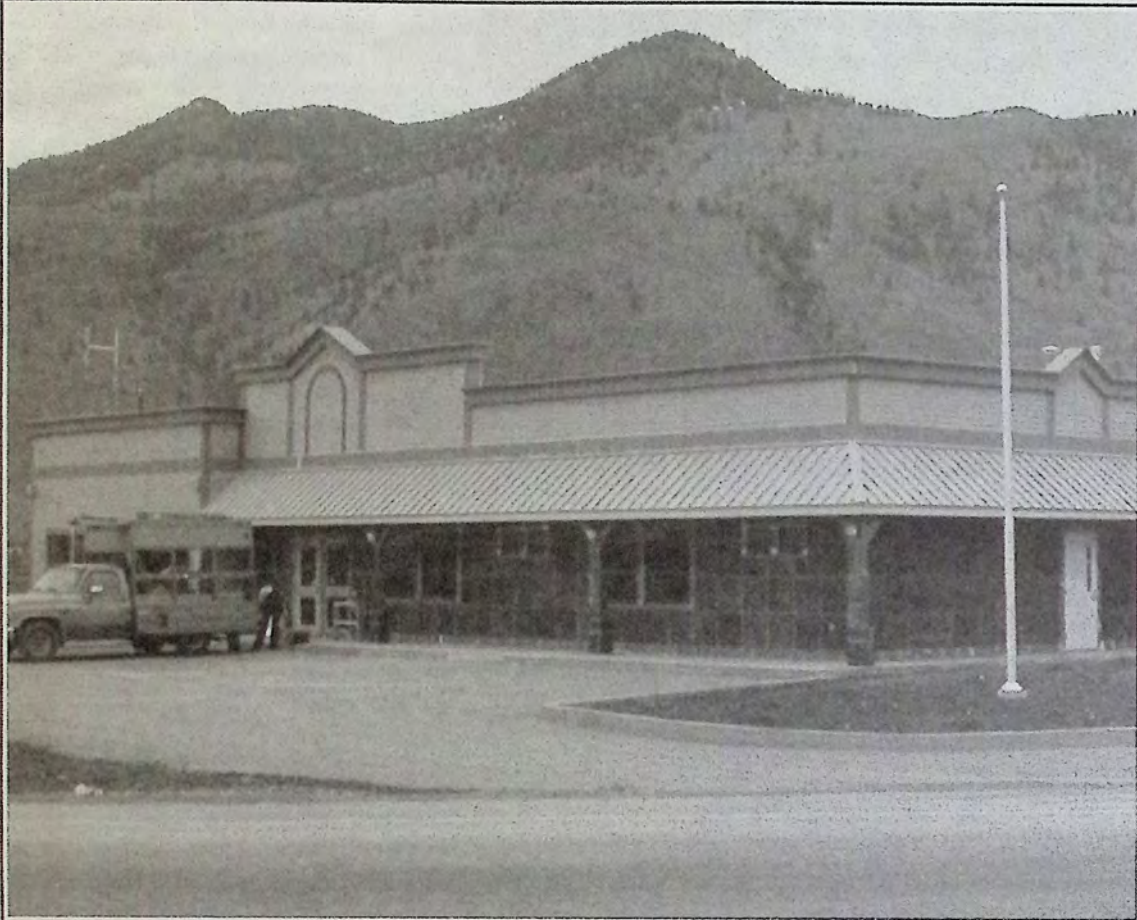
These are presently located in Keremeos. The archaeology offices will move from the Hedley Post Office Building into Snaza'ist Centre. The Princeton office, which serves the Upper

Similkameen logging operation, will remain in place.

Another phase of development is at Mascot Mine heritage site high on the mountain. A crew will refurbish 200 metres of tunnel to make this safe for tourists to enjoy an underground mining adventure.

In addition to development connected to the mine tours, plans are in the works for an RV park to help accommodate travellers. The plan will be carried out as finances permit.

The development of Hedley's history resources has created a number of jobs in a formerly bleak area. As the tours become more famous, the tourist traffic will create more business opportunities for Hedley, and additional jobs.

## Learn more about Hepatitis C

Hepatitis C is a liver disease caused by the hepatitis C virus (HCV), which was first identified in 1989. It is perhaps more common than you know; 1 in 100 people in Canada has the disease. HCV is spread by direct contact with the blood or body fluids of an infected person.

Some people are more likely to contract hepatitis C than others. People at higher risk of having hepatitis C infection include individuals who have used or do use injection drugs or share drug equipment, people who received a blood transfusion prior to 1990, individuals who have been tattooed or pierced with non-sterile equipment, and the prison population.

Currently there is no vaccine to prevent the virus from spreading. Infection can occur through:

- Illicit drug use including sharing drug snorting, smoking or injection equipment such as needles and syringes, straws, and pipes.

- Exposure to blood and blood products (for example, receiving a blood transfusion) in a country where the blood supply is not tested for hepatitis C. In Canada, this applies to blood and blood products received before 1992.

- An accidental needle poke with a used needle or syringe.

- An infected mother passing it to her newborn infant (risk of about five to six per cent).

- Sexual intercourse, especially for those who have multiple sex partners.

- Sharing toothbrushes, dental floss, razors, nail files, or other items which could have tiny amounts of blood on them.

- Using non-sterile equipment for tattoos, body piercing, acupuncture or electrolysis. There is a very low but real risk of passing on the virus through other body fluids such as saliva, semen, or vaginal secretions. Hepatitis C is NOT known to be spread by:

- coughing or sneezing
- contact such as hugging and kissing

- using the same dishes or cutlery
- swimming in a chlorinated pool when you have cuts, scrapes or are menstruating

- being bitten or stung by an insect which then bites or stings someone else

- when your body fluids such as saliva, urine, feces or vomit comes in contact with the healthy, intact skin of others

It is important for people with hepatitis C to live a healthy lifestyle. Consider the following:

- Avoid all alcohol.
- Maintain a nutritious diet. Consult with your doctor before taking megavitamins or herbal products.
- Over-the-counter and prescribed medications should be taken only when advised by your doctor.

- Avoid smoking and illicit drugs.

- Protect your liver by talking with your physician about having the hepatitis A, B and pneumococcal vaccinations.

- Have your annual flu shot. (Immunizations are free if you have hepatitis C.)

- Ask your doctor to refer you to a

specialist.

There is NO hepatitis C vaccine to prevent infection.

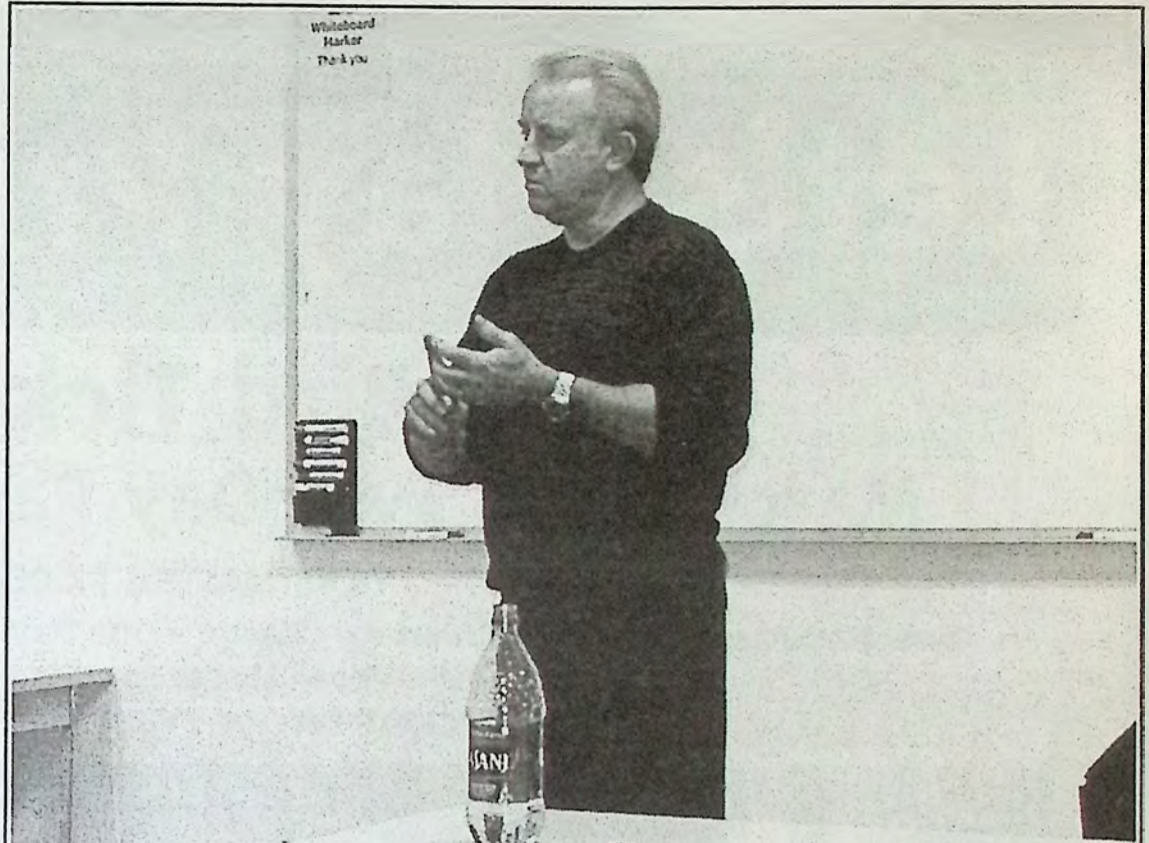

### "Teachers win class-size ruling" - Jinny Sims

A recent unanimous decision by the B.C. Court of Appeal determined that teachers have the right to grieve the legislated class-size limits and averages imposed by the B.C. Liberals three years ago. This represents a significant victory not only for students and teachers, but also for democracy. In January 2002, the Liberal government, apparently dissatisfied with not having control over class sizes, decided to take away what was previously bargained in good faith. Using their heavy legislative hammer, they mandated class size limits for K-3 that were higher than those stipulated in the col-

lective agreement and removed firm limits altogether for grades 4-12.

In March 2003, the International Labour Organization, a United Nations body, ruled that the B.C. Liberal laws stripping collective agreements contravened conventions to which Canada is signatory. The government ignored the ruling even though it places B.C. in violation of international law.

In January 2004, the B.C. Supreme Court quashed an arbitrator's ruling stripping provisions of the teachers' collective agreement. With typical arrogance, the Liberal government simply passed a new law overruling the Supreme Court's decision.

This brings us to the recent unanimous decision by the B.C. Court of Appeal in which three judges express strong opinions about the role of class size and teachers' rights to enforce the legislated limits. If three court rulings stress the fairness and justice in teachers being able to negotiate class size, then one would hope that the government would finally acknowledge that it should also respect the laws in a democratic society.

## Field Naturalists demand answers

Last week a letter was sent to Victoria demanding details on the coal-fired electric power plant project located at the former Similco Mine location.

Vermilion Forks Field Naturalists sent the letter, which appears here in its entirety.

To the Honourable George Abbott, Minister Sustainable Resource Management

RE: COAL-FIRED THERMAL ELECTRIC POWER PLANTS IN B.C.

Dear Mr. Minister Abbott

The Executive and members of the Vermilion Forks Field Naturalists Society have been aware of the impending development of a Coal-fired Thermal Electric Power Plant, to be located on the old Similco Mine site, 14 Km. West of the Town of Princeton.

The Compliance Energy Project was initially rated at 49 Mega-Watts, just below the threshold of 50 Mega-Watts established by the Reviewable Projects Threshold, thus the project is not reviewable under the present Provincial Regulations.

Since the initial rating was publicized, various other ratings have appeared on the Company's Website, ranging from 48 to 50 Mega-Watts and above. The rating

that now appears to be stated for Princeton is 50 Mega-Watts, which would make the Project "a reviewable Project under the Reviewable Projects Regulations of the Environmental Assessment Act, Section 10.1". We submit that because of this conflicting information further development or issue of permits should be halted, until these inconsistencies in ratings have been clarified.

We are aware that -

A. Coal-fired Power Generation is being phased out in many countries across the globe, with Ontario being a leader in Canada with its goal of phasing out all of its coal-fired generation by 2007.

B. Toxic and undesirable substances are emitted when coal and wood waste, which Compliance has stated they will use are burned. Sulphur dioxide, nitrogen oxides, mercury (not listed in the Provincial Guidelines and considered the most dangerous emission), lead, carbon dioxide and particulates all contribute to significant environmental and health risks. It has been well documented across the world, that coal-fired generation has contributed to acid rain, global warming, cardio-pulmonary disease and many other health problems.

C. To our dismay we find that the limits for gaseous and particulates emissions, new to B. C. are higher,

thus more permissive than in other jurisdictions.

We ask "Why has B. C. not adopted the best available standards, instead of the worst in North America?"

Given the confusing, inconsistent information we have received on the Compliance ratings and given the known health and environmental impacts we are appealing to the Government of British Columbia, that

a. the Compliance Project be a reviewable project, whether ratings are 49 or 50 mega-watts,  
b. the B. C. Government take steps to adopt policies which will protect its citizens from know environmental and health effects.

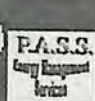

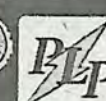
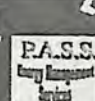

# Missile defence poll results released

As promised, BC Southern Interior MP Jim Gouk has conducted a poll of his constituents on the subject of missile defence. The poll was conducted by SES Research on February 11th and 12th and is considered accurate within 4.5%, 19 times out of 20. The poll disclosed that 43.6 % strongly oppose and 13.8% somewhat oppose Canada's participation with the United States in a missile defence shield system. In comparison, 14.8% strongly support and 15.8% somewhat support Canada's participation.

The balance neither supported nor opposed the system. "I am not really surprised at these results," said Gouk.

"Feedback generally has been more negative than positive. Oddly though, this has been the first big issue where I have seen a significant split in opinion between the eastern and western parts of this riding," Gouk continued.

"While there are supporters of the missile defence system in the eastern part of the riding, the predominant reaction I have heard is opposition. In contrast, while there are opponents to Canada's participation in the South Okanagan and Similkameen, most feedback indicates that constituents there support

some involvement by Canada."

"Had there been a vote on this subject, I would have voted against Canada's participation -- in keeping with the results of this poll," said Gouk.

"However, I am not hesitant in informing people that this would not have been my personal opinion. The Americans only really wanted two things from Canada. The first was an amendment to the North American Aerospace Defence Command (NORAD) to permit NORAD to provide system information to the Missile Defence Shield Program. The then existing agreement did not permit this.

That amendment was signed under the approval of Paul Martin last summer, unbeknownst to parliament or the Canadian public," added Gouk.

"The only remaining request from the US was for direct information sharing between our two governments and input in the decision making process.

They reportedly wanted no money from Canada, nor did they want to build any new installations of any kind in Canada. So apparently, all Paul Martin turned down was the opportunity to be kept informed of what was happening

and to have some input for Canada in actions being considered or taken," stated Gouk.

It appears that Paul Martin's announcement rejecting Canadian participation was more about his leadership review vote at the Liberal convention than it was about Canada's interests," said Gouk. "Beyond that, the lead up to the announcement is typical of his dithering leadership style.

He gave off strong signals of supporting the US request, then suddenly reversed his position and announced it with no notice to the US. The American people and the President found out about his decision through CNN. No matter which side people support, they will know that this is mishandled diplomacy at its worst," Gouk pointed out.

"At minimum, Martin should have waited until the US border opened to Canadian beef on March 7th before making his announcement. Better yet, he should have brought the whole issue before the House of Commons for full disclosure, debate and a vote as he agreed to in the vote on the Speech from the Throne as amended by the Conservative Party," Gouk concluded.

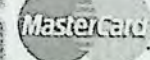

**Garden Fresh Turkey Stir-Fry**

1/2 tsp each salt, pepper, garlic powder and paprika  
 3 tbsp vegetable oil  
 1 lb turkey breast cut in 1/2 inch strips  
 1 each yellow and green peppers, thinly sliced  
 1 cup snow peas  
 1/2 tsp Italian seasoning  
 8 - 10 cherry tomatoes

In a plastic bag combine salt, pepper, garlic powder and paprika; mix well. Add turkey strips and coat with seasonings. In a skillet or wok, heat 2 tbsp oil; stir fry turkey 3 to 4 minutes or until no longer pink inside. Remove from skillet, keep warm. Add remaining oil, yellow peppers, green peppers and snow peas. Stir-fry 1 minute. Sprinkle with Italian seasoning; reduce heat and cook 2 minutes until vegetables are tender crisp. Add turkey and tomatoes. Heat 2 minutes longer until warmed through.

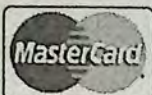

Hiring a consultant to tell us what we already know is a waste of taxpayers money.

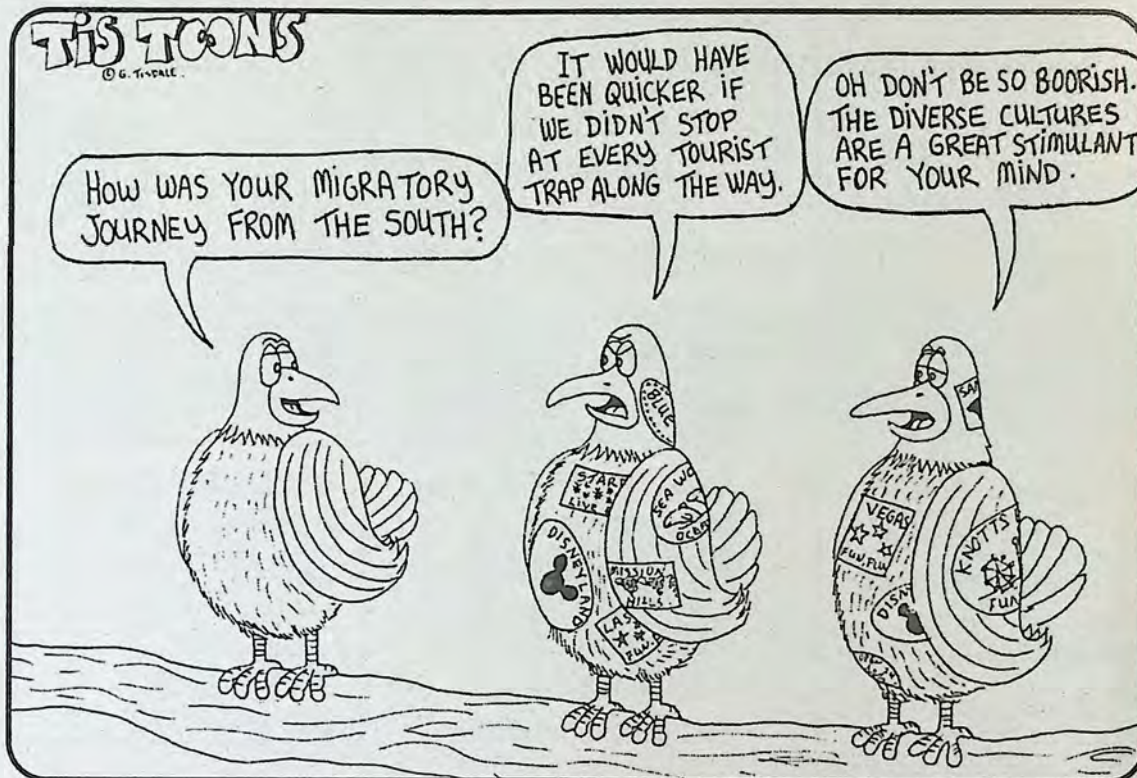
Having Town Council actually direct the community into the future is money well spent.

No French Immersion reflects our economy

When the School Board turned down French Immersion, parents asked, "What do we have to do to bring this back to the Board? What will it take to get French Immersion?"

The School Trustees did not answer this question, but I know the answer, and I will tell those parents what it is.

Fred Kuhn touched on one aspect of the problem when he challenged Council to do what is needed to make Princeton grow.

There is a link between economic development and French Immersion. Parents are not going to have French Immersion until there are more good jobs for young families in Princeton, because it is the young families who create the number of children needed to include French Immersion in Princeton. The school district budget is based on the number of school-age children in the district. The fewer the children, the lower the budget. As the School Board Chair noted, enrollment is declining rapidly. Unless good, full-time, permanent jobs increase, young families will not be moving to Princeton to increase enrollment.

People tend to look at population numbers without seeing what those numbers express. Yes, we have the same number of people in Princeton area now as we had 10 years ago, but the number over age 40 is the majority. People over age 40 tend not to increase the number of school-age children.

If you are a family with school-age children, or a young couple planning to have a family, you need to get off your butt and get involved in the kind of activities which will promote economic development in Princeton. Meet with Michael McLaughlin and ask him where the potential exists for economic development. Look at the kinds of industries that produce permanent jobs with good pay, and then help him make those jobs available here.

Look at your Town Council. How many of them have or will have school-age children? Will they, as a group, promote the kind of economic development which

will bring permanent, high-paid jobs to Princeton? A civic election is coming this year. You may want to change who is elected.

Your School Board is not responsible for economic development, it is responsible for providing education, within budget, for the children enrolled in local schools. This Board of Trustees has closed two schools in the past five years because there are not enough children in our area. Focus on getting more children before you focus on getting more programs.

I believe in children learning French. I began learning French in Grade 7, and it served me well, although I no longer speak it well due to lack of practice. I believe in expanding children's verbal and literary skills by whatever means possible, and learning another language does that.

Learning another language is not the problem, and lack of money for French Immersion sustainability is a reflection of the real problem: population imbalance. Too high a percentage of our population is over age 40 and more concerned with retirement than getting out and getting involved in

activities that promote our community as a place to find a job and raise a family.

Despite all of these people who have more leisure time than those raising a family, their level of participation in local community initiatives is not in proportion to their numbers. I see organizations begging for more members and yet membership is declining. Vermilion Trails Society is a good example. They would like a lot more members who could work on trail projects and promoting the trail, which would bring many more people to our area and develop our potential to attract new businesses. They beg for members, yet no new members come forward.

As I am now retired, I can safely point a finger at all these able-bodied old folks who do very little for the community except live here and spend their money here (when they have to). They are primarily self-involved or involved only with their own age group. While this is unhealthy for them, it is very unhealthy for our community.

To conclude: this is why we cannot have French Immersion.

## Wood Stove exchange program returns

The Great Okanagan Wood Stove Exchange Program returns for its fifth annual four-week run. The wood stove exchange program gives consumers with older inefficient wood stoves the opportunity to replace them, at a 15% discount, with new EPA/CSA emission-approved wood, gas, pellet or electric appliances. Customers purchasing pellet, electric or gas inserts for open-hearth fireplaces receive the same discount.

Cash rebates offered by participating manufacturers, distributors and retailers range from \$100 to \$500. Consumers receive the rebate when they surrender their

old stove for recycling. No trade-in is required when purchasing an open-hearth fireplace insert.

The past four wood stove exchange programs have seen a total of 567 old wood stoves traded in for new cleaner burning EPA emission-approved appliances, which has meant a reduction of smoke particulate of approximately 24 tonnes per year.

A wood stove change out program has been identified by Okanagan Valley air quality and health officials as a way to quickly move cleaner and more fuel-efficient stoves into local households.

Approximately 21% of Okanagan

homes (21,654 residences) have an indoor burning appliance; 86% are inefficient conventional wood stoves or masonry fireplaces. These wood burning appliances release approximately 478 tonnes of smoke particulate into the Okanagan Valley air each year.

The Wood Stove Exchange Program is a limited time offer, which ends March 31st.

#### What Happens To Your RRIF After Death? Part 2

The previous article touched on how to defer some of the tax liability incurred after death. This article provides additional information on what happens to your RRIF after death.

In most cases, a "qualified beneficiary" person is your spouse, or common-law partner. But you can also leave your plan assets to a minor dependent or to a disabled child or grandchild of any age that was financially dependent on you at the time of your death.

**Minor Dependent** - You'll manage to avoid tax if you leave your RRIF assets to a child under the age of 18 who was financially dependent on you at the time of your death. Financially dependent means that person earned less than the basic personal amount. In this case, the child cannot transfer the proceeds to an RRSP, but instead can use the proceeds of the plan to purchase a registered annuity that pays amounts every year to age 18.

**Disabled Child or Grandchild** - You can also leave your plan assets to a child or grandchild of any age, who was financially dependent on you at the time of your death due to a physical or mental infirmity. In this case, your dependent can transfer the assets to his or her own RRSP or RRIF.

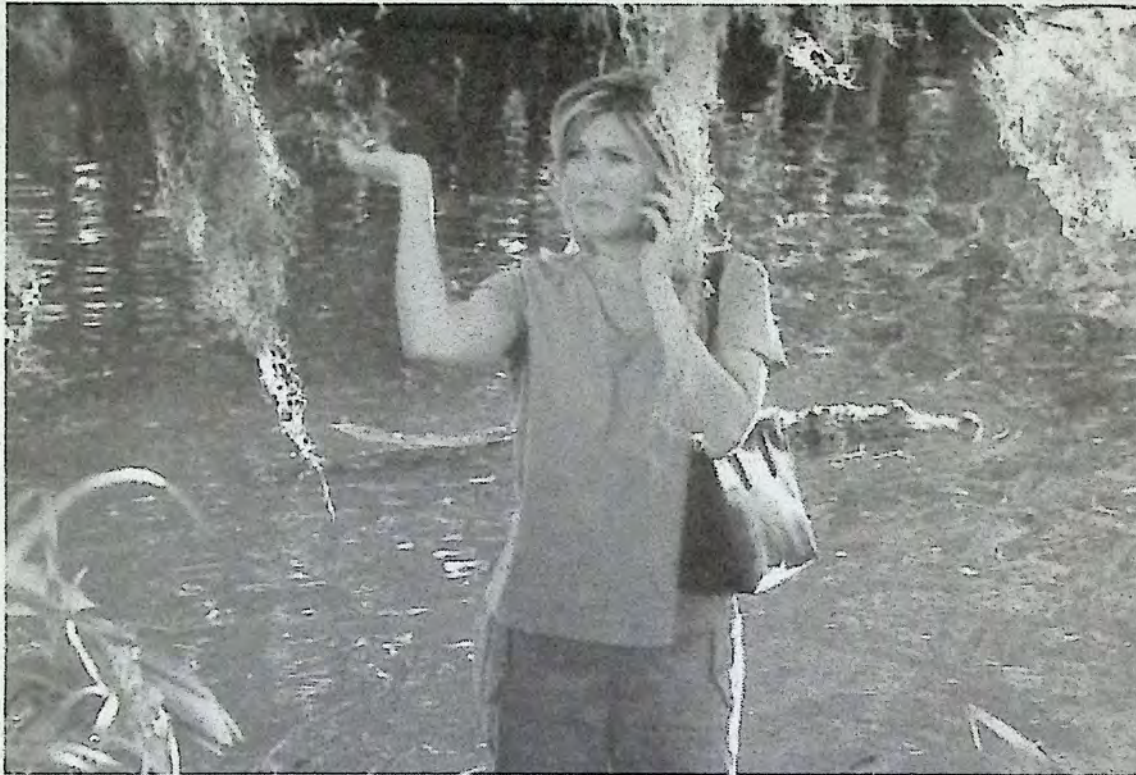
