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Council supports uplift

Bug kill timber targeted

Town Council has given support to a plan to increase harvesting bug-killed timber by a further one million cubic feet per year. The plan calls for 50 percent of the harvest to go to Innovative Forestry Society, and 50 percent to forest harvest licensees.

Dr. Barry Cook objected to an immediate endorsement of the plan. He suggested there might not be a sawmill here in the future at the rate timber is being harvested, and said the Town should ask for a kickback upfront before agreeing to the plan.

Town Council is planning to enter the parade in the antique fire truck decorated with Canadian flags.

Council approves painting tenders

At the May 2 meeting, Town Council accepted a tender for line-marking from G & D Linemarking for \$7,000 tax included.

A dust control tender was approved for Dust Away Road Spraying at \$0.245/litre plus tax.

These were the lowest bids submitted.

Ballots hit the road

Tulameen area residents will not have to travel to Princeton to cast their ballots in the upcoming Provincial Election on May 17th.

A mobile polling station will be set up on Election Day in front of Tulameen Library in downtown Tulameen.

The times this service will be available were not confirmed at press time.

Five running in Yale-Lillooet Riding

There are a total of five candidates declared in Yale-Lillooet Electoral District for the 38th Provincial General Election on May 17th.

The BC Liberal Party is represented by Lloyd George Forman of Boston Bar with Merritt resident Harry Lali of the New Democratic Party of BC.

Princeton resident Mike McLean is running for the Green Party of BC with Hope resident Dorothy-Jean O'Donnell of the People's Front and Arne Jensen Zabell, from Sunshine Valley, representing the Democratic Reform Party of BC.

The Princeton & District Chamber of Commerce will host an All-Candidates Forum in Princeton Legion Hall on Monday, May 9th starting at 7:00 PM.

The incumbent in Yale-Lillooet is Liberal Dave Chutter, who is not seeking re-election.

In 2001, he beat the NDP's Victor York with a 3-to-1 margin. Preceding Chutter was New Democrat Harry Lali, who won office in 1991 by unseating then-incumbent James Rabbitt of the Social Credit Party by 683 votes.

Rabbitt tried again in 1996 but was rebuffed by nearly twice as

Fed money comes here

Federal gas tax money is to be distributed to B.C. municipalities, and Princeton will receive a total of \$355,355 spread over five years.

In Year 1 and 2, Princeton will receive \$46,885.

The money will increase in year 3

many votes. Rabbitt had been more fortunate a decade before, winning office by a 529 vote margin of the NDP's Howard McDiarmid.

Before that, the MLAs were New Democrat Bill Hartley (1963-1975) and Socred Tom Waterland (1975-1986).

In the last Provincial Election (2001), voter turnout in Yale-Lillooet was 69 percent which was just below the provincial average.

In Year 5, the allotment to Princeton will be \$116,936.

Princeton looks at 5th youth year

Princeton may have an "unprecedented" fifth year of Katimavik volunteers.

The Princeton Katimavik Committee met on May 2 with Pamela Lang, from B.C.'s Katimavik headquarters.

Despite having warned Princeton's committee last year that there would be no fifth year, Lang was back in town to evaluate Princeton's support for another year of Katimavik.

Many people attended the meeting. The group included representatives from Town Council, Museum Society, Fall Fair, Racing Days, Rodeo Club, Vermilion Forks Field Naturalists, Vermilion Trails Society

and Princeton Exhibition Association, along with school principals and billet families.

They told Lang there would have been more people there if the meeting had been in the evening.

Lang heard nothing but overwhelming positive response to the suggestion Princeton might be approved for another year of Katimavik.

The only drawback to having Katimavik here for another year is lack of housing at this point. Katimavik must have a four bedroom or larger house with two bathrooms and all appliances. Anyone who is willing to rent to Katimavik for the coming year, beginning at the

Council asks for bomb inquiry

Princeton Town Council has joined with the City of Burnaby in asking for further action on the Air India bombing. In 1985, Flight 182 of Air India exploded, causing the deaths of 329 people. In addition, two baggage handlers in Japan died as a result of an explosion. This year, a trial judge determined that both bombs originated in Vancouver.

Council will send a letter to Public Safety Minister Anne McLellan to request she immediately launch an public inquiry into the investigation of the Air India bombing, as there is some evidence that the original investigation was mishandled.

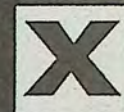

Kruncher coming soon

It's that time of year when all good men and women are just dying to volunteer for the local Keremeos Kruncher 50km run, set to start at 8:00 AM on Saturday, May 14th at Liddicoat Road.

Race Director Moe 'the Eagle' Beaulieu and his son, Logan says a 25km run has been added to this year's event.

Only a few days before entry deadline 51 runners had entered. Last year's event saw a total of 47 starters.

"This course is in the 'Top Three Toughest' for the 50 kilometre distance in the Pacific Northwest," says Moe.

"Runners have come to expect this with a Moe-designed course and given the toughness of the course - it has 8,514 feet of climb - this is a great turn out."

The race start/finish is at Art Freisen's old place on Liddicoat Road, which runs off of Highway 3 at the Keremeos Cemetery, north of Keremeos.

"New owner rancher Rod Lewis has graciously allowed us to use his front yard for the race set up."

The 'Voice of Ironman Canada' Steve King is race announcer with sponsor Peach City Runners of Penticton handling the time clock and finish chute.

Major race sponsor is Valu Plus Foods, Keremeos with other sponsors including Grizzly Water, Similkameen Country, Okanagan GPS, Hammer Nutrition, and E-Load.

Event - Chad "The Hammer" Ulansky, who won by a comfortable lead in 2004 will not be entered this year. As a geologist in South Africa he will not be able to be back to his Kelowna home 'til some days after the run.

Last year's second place finisher Rob Lang of the Lower Mainland is not entered...I believe he could be injured and/or not as trained this time round.

Last year's third place finisher The Race Director's Son, Logan Beaulieu and Matt Sessions - who finished fourth last time - look to be fighting it out for the win this time!!!

Logan finished second in Alberta's Montrail Ultra-Marathon series in 2004. What can be said about Matt Sessions??? Loads of talent, super consistent.

Matt places in most races of this type he enters and is patient. Logan has a tendency of 'too fast of a start' so we'll see.

Now remember, there could be a dark horse as well. This can easily happen in a run of this type...with quite a lot of talent just near these two.

So will these mostly guests to our town and area be "Krunchers or Krunchees" at the Keremeos Kruncher on Saturday, May 14th?

Do you have a sense of purpose?

Joseph Campbell, scholar and professor of mythology, once said, "You may have success in life, but then just think-what kind of life was it?"

In our lives we have frantic schedules where it is not always easy to take time to find out what really matters. For young people to have a sense of purpose in life, they need to look within.

What gives their life meaning? What gets them excited to wake up in the morning? What dreams do they have for the future?

Each person - including a child - gets 168 hours per week to choose what to do with their time. What subjects are they taking in school? Are they meaningful - or easy? What extracurricular activities do they choose to do? Are they giving your child purpose - or just passing the time away?

What about your family time? Is it meaningful interaction time, or is everybody so tired that they all veg out together in front of the TV?

The difference between young people who have a sense of purpose in life and those who don't boils down to one thing: they take charge of their lives. If they don't know what gives them meaning or purpose, they set out to find it.

If they know what gives them purpose, they are out there doing it - every day.

As a family, you can encourage that journey by giving family members time to reflect, discuss and try new things of interest. Identify

areas of interest, talent and curiosity. Encourage them to get involved in activities that will build on those interests and talents. Cut down on TV, computer and telephone time to give your child time to develop their own interests.

Spend an afternoon together day-dreaming and discussing those dreams. Write down five things that you are passionate about and talk about them with your family. Have them do the same. Together you can find purpose as a family, and as

individuals.

Families that have the sense of purpose asset are a family that will ensure that their young people develop healthy lifestyles - a life with purpose.

We are still primitive stomachs

Although society has made tremendous advances through the past few thousand years, we are still using the same bodies as our primitive ancestors. When it comes to diet, our stomachs are prehistoric. This has great implications as to how we gain and lose weight.

Our ancestors ate what they could find or kill. As a result, they ate a great variety of foods, but most of what they ate consisted of meat, fish, nuts, seeds (like peas), a lot of vegetables and fruit, and some whole grains. Often, they did not find or hunt enough. Their bodies adapted by efficient digestion and conservation of body fat. Their bodies are our bodies. Their stomachs are our stomachs.

In the best of times, their diet consisted of 30 percent carbohydrates (sugars and starches) and perhaps five percent fats. Their diet should be our diet, but we have come a long way from those days. If we look at a typical North American diet today, we see about 60 percent of it is carbohydrates and about 10 percent is fats.

A good way to gauge this is your typical hamburger deluxe, French fries and soft drink meal. The burger is the only meat, with added fat. The lettuce and tomatoes on the burger are the only vegetables not cooked in fat. The bun and the fries are high in carbohydrates, and so is the soft drink.

The rise in cases of diabetes, heart disease and other chronic illnesses, especially of old age, can be attributed to our excessive intake of sugars, starches and fats. Our #1 health problem, obesity, is our signal we are eating the wrong stuff.

Start eating the right stuff. Eat more protein foods (milk, eggs, meat) and more vegetables, fruit and whole grains.

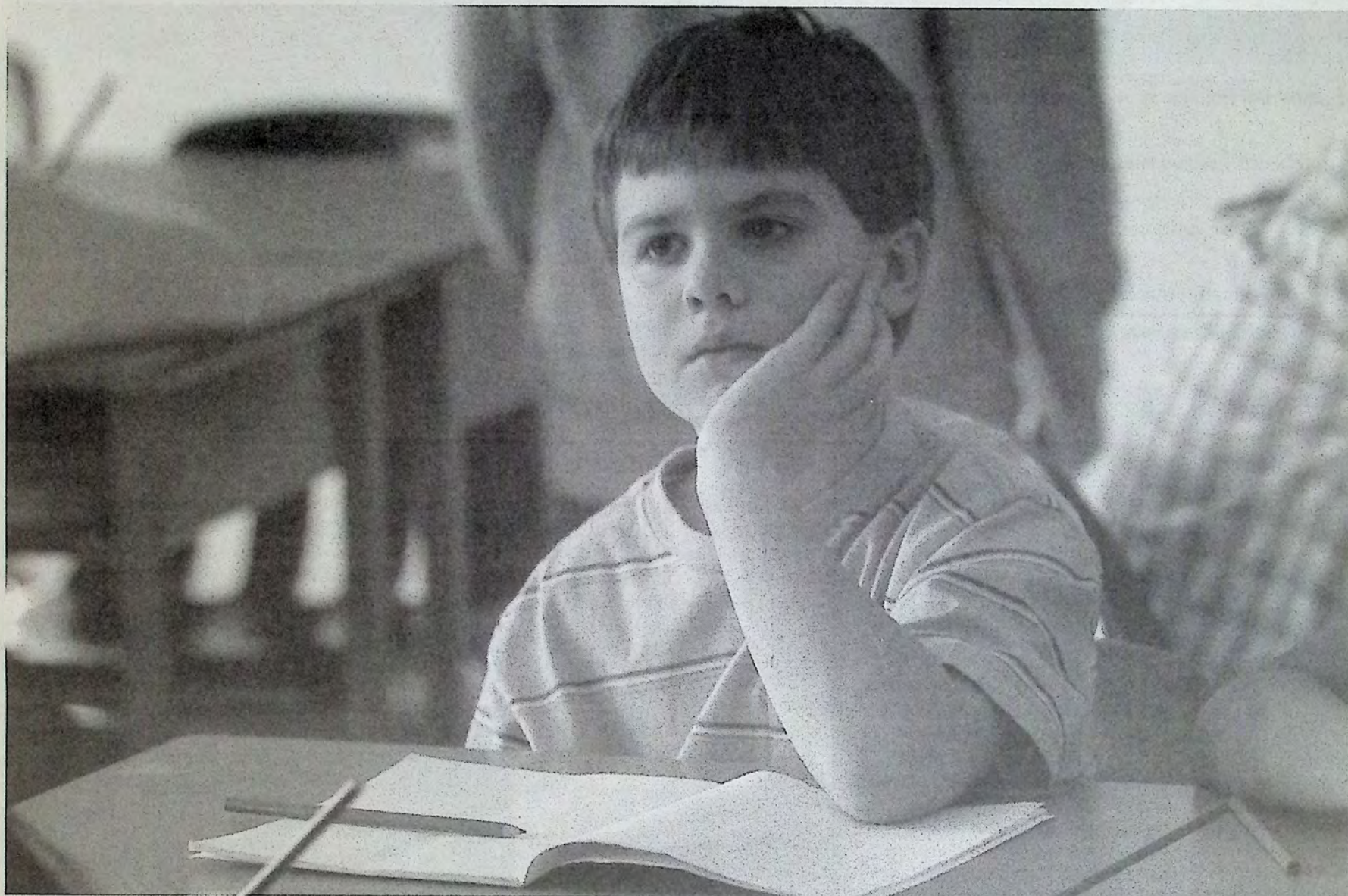

"Our children are our future" - Jinny Sims

Our children are our future and they need well-staffed neighbourhood schools with sufficient resources to ensure their potential is realized. There has never been a period in human history when a sound education was more necessary.

Any parent with children in school can tell you what has happened in our schools over the last four years. They know about larger classes, fewer services, and the lack of resources. They know about the shortage of textbooks, or textbooks that are sadly out of date.

Any teacher can tell you about the larger classes and the struggle to give each child the individual attention they need, and the frustration

of trying to do more with less. In this district services for special needs have been reduced by 16% and teacher-librarian time has been cut by 22%. This district has had to cut 18 teachers even though student enrollment is only down by 88 students.

Some Liberals, including the premier during the debate, claim that student enrollment is down by 30,000, however, ministry of education figures from September 2001 to September 2004 show a decline of only 19,273 in the whole province.

The cut of 2,500 teachers and the closure of 113 of neighbourhood schools displacing 14,000 students cannot be explained by declining enrollment. Only one in four of those teacher cuts can be attributed to declining enrollment.

Ironically, these cuts to education are being imposed during a period when the B.C. Liberals are claiming that the economy is booming. Our children cannot afford to have their potential and their future short-changed.

May 17 is an opportunity to vote for a change. I would like to encourage all voters to get involved and vote for public education on May 17. Our children are counting on us. Make your vote count!

Electoral Reform Referendum

On Tuesday, May 17th, you decide.

British Columbians will vote in a provincial general election and in a referendum on electoral reform on Tuesday May 17th.

Voting in the referendum will take place at the same time and place as voting in the general election.

Voters will be asked to decide the following question:
Should British Columbia change to the BC-STV electoral system as recommended by the Citizens' Assembly on Electoral Reform?

An electoral system is the process for translating votes into seats in a legislative assembly. Moving to a different system would alter the way we elect our Members of the Legislative Assembly (MLAs).

Under B.C.'s current First Past the Post (FPTP) system, voters choose one candidate and the candidate with the

most votes wins. Under the proposed Single Transferable Vote system (BC-STV), British Columbians would vote for as many candidates as they wish, in preferential order. There would be fewer but larger electoral districts, each electing between two and seven MLAs.

The Referendum Information Office has been established to help voters make an informed choice on the referendum question.

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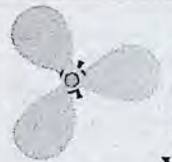
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'Let's Play' this weekend in Princeton

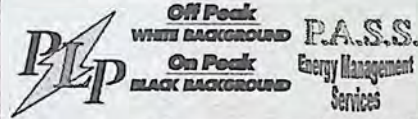

Connecting the dots

The Princeton-Coquihalla Connector is back on the table.

If you don't know what it's about, let's explain the conceptual route as best we can with a map of the road produced in June 2003 by Urban Systems Planners and distributed by the RDOS.

There are two options for the road.

Option 1 (totalling 48 kilometres) follows Tulameen Road from the wooden bridge downtown out on what eventually becomes Coalmont Road, bypassing Tulameen (there's a catchy road name: the Tulameen Bypass) and joining up with the Coquihalla Connector just North of the Toll Booth.

Option 2 (about 50 kilometres) follows mostly the same route but dips further South once it bypasses Tulameen to eventually join Option 1 a couple kilometres before it joins the Coquihalla Highway.

We have to shake our heads at the need for such a route, not because it is or is not needed, but because we believe that maybe we should work on existing routes before we start adding more.

We have a perfect route connecting us to the Coquihalla Connector already. It's called Highway 5A. The 'A' indicating it's status as 'Almost' good enough to receive attention once in a while when there's some asphalt left over from patching jobs on the Coquihalla.

The last time we travelled that route we encountered frost heaves and pot holes so big we figured we must have missed the 'Four Wheel Drive Only Beyond This Point' sign near Dry Lake.

The point we are making here is we agree it's time to spend money on Highways. But not on establishing new ones to feed traffic to the Olympics.

Let's fix the ones we have first before we start blasting away at the Tulameen Bypass.

Even if it means three laning sections of Highway 5A to ease traffic flow or to straighten out the odd curve.

It would be far cheaper to tackle what we already have than to build something new. Think about it, the proposed Tulameen Bypass would create the kind of traffic the wooden bridge could not handle and it would have to be replaced, adding to the expense of the new route.

Isn't the wooden bridge and Highway 5A worth more to us than this?

Why I will vote "no" to a new system

It has never been my policy to tell people how I intend to vote for a candidate, but the upcoming referendum is not about political candidates, but about our election system, and I intend to vote "no" and I am going to tell you why.

In the past, I advocated a new voting system to prevent the domination of one political party over another. The single transferable vote, the subject of next week's referendum vote, seemed like a good idea, until I read the method used to determine how we will elect our MLAs.

Here's how the new system would work: urban (city) areas would elect more MLAs per district and rural areas would elect fewer.

That's where I drew the line. The new system would make our rural electoral districts much larger, geographically, and give us fewer people to fight for us in Victoria.

The big problem in B.C.'s politics is the bigger number of MLAs from cities at the coast. It is a problem because the cities can swing the vote for things like Expo and the Olympics.

People may say, "Well, that's fair. The cities have more taxpayers and that's where all the business is."

Wrong! It is not fair.

The reason it is not fair is because it is the rural, B.C. Interior communities who produce most of the wealth generated in B.C. and it is the city dwellers at the coast who consume the biggest slice of that wealth. In the history of British Columbia, the oldest communities of the province, places like Princeton, Nelson, Golden, Ft. St. James, Prince George and Quesnel, have remained small while Vancouver and Victoria have grown by leaps and bounds because the wealth of the provinces goes through their hands.

Our only defense has been our ability to elect a good number of

dynamic MLAs to ensure the people of the smaller, resource-based communities would have the benefits of productivity returned to their areas and not be entirely soaked up by the cities.

People may think I am an alarmist or pessimist, but I can recall a number of issues of our recent past in which city dwellers decided how our rural industries should be run. Acting from a base of no practical experience, we saw them come up with environmental ideas that made no sense in terms of what we needed to do.

to stop logging entirely, when we should have been removing over-mature trees like crazy. They tried to reduce cattle ranching when cattle keep down the grass in the forests. They wanted, at one point, to remove all riverbank development to 500 metres away from the river (move the town of Princeton, the highway, and the farms) to protect the river.

Fortunately, our MLAs from the rural areas, and our mayors, kicked up a fuss and some of the ideas were shelved. Who knows what the cities may impose on the rural areas if the cities run the province?

I will vote "no" to the referendum, and I hope you will see my point and vote accordingly.

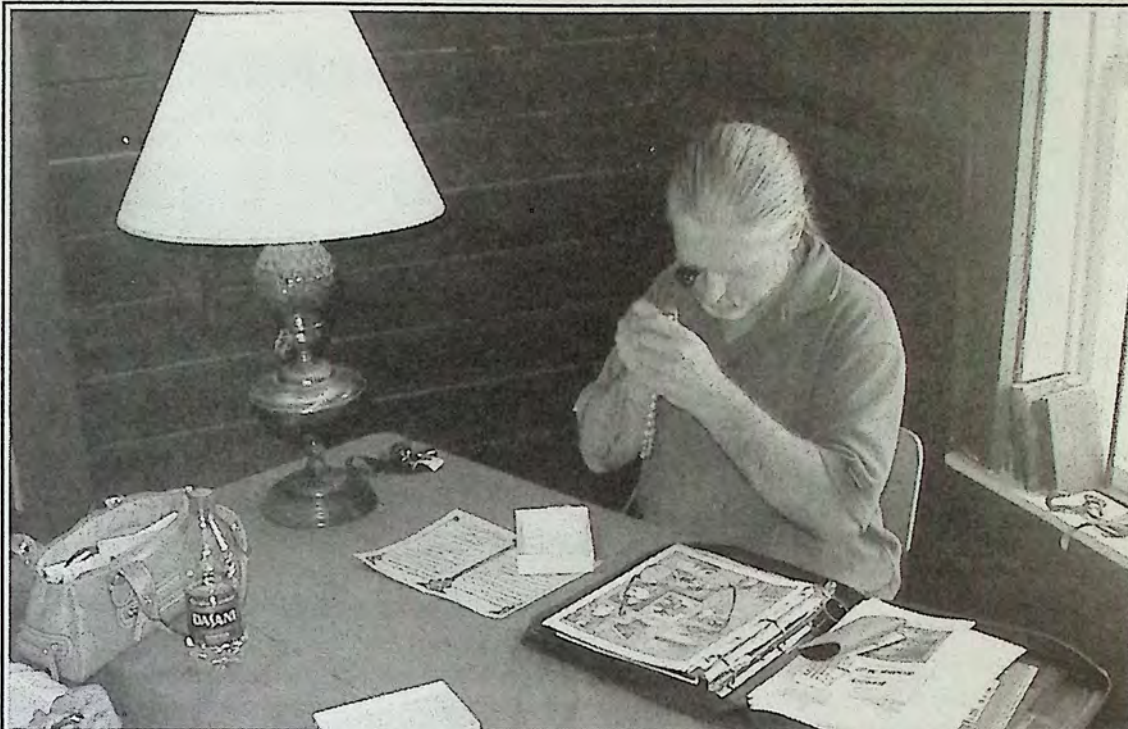

BCTF President shared her passion

Kids matter, teachers care. It's more than a catchy slogan, it's fact.

British Columbia Teacher's Federation President Jinny Sims spoke at Princeton Legion Hall last Thursday night on a number of education issues.

Aside from changes in education from school closures to larger class sizes and less resources, she made it clear teachers have a passion for what they do.

"What keeps us there is our commitment to the students and the teaching profession."

Sims, who was born in India and

educated in England, came to Canada to teach in Quebec in the mid-1970's.

Declining enrollment is common across the province, Sims says stating as a result, the Princeton School District lost 10.8 teachers with over 20% of teacher/librarians lost.

"A school is a place where far more than reading and mathematics happen and that's how it should be."

Sims says when schools close, small families move away from the community. They are soon fol-

lowed by grandparents who move to be close to their grandchildren which is the beginning of a chain of events.

"What you see is a dismantling of communities."

A reduction in resources has put some teachers into a position where they are buying supplies out of pocket in order to teach or as Sims put it, "Can you imagine a nurse going to work saying I better pick up some bandages and some plasma and while I'm at it I better take a bed with me?"

Sims says teachers have been pushed by the government into a position where they have to stand up and fight for their rights.

It also means involvement in political activities.

"I don't think I could live with myself if we stopped our advocacy. We have to stand up and stop this if we believe in public education. I fear for public education in B. C."

Sims also explained the close relationship between education and health care.

"They are one in the same which is why teachers are concerned about the communities we live in."

With 37% of teachers leaving the profession in their first five years of teaching, Sims' passion for the future of education was clear.

"This election is about values. It has to do with the kind of society we want for our children, for ourselves and for our old age."

Teachers' election issues reviewed

To the Editor:

Mike de Jong has recently received press on his vain attempts to silence the voice of teachers. Recent comments by de Jong are intended to deflect attention from the current Liberal governments disturbing record on public education.

De Jong, running for re-election in Abbotsford - Mt. Lehman should look to his own riding to see why teachers are advocating for public education.

Between 2001-2002 and 2004-

2005 the Abbotsford school district cut 47 teaching positions even though enrollment increased by 237 students. More over the Abbotsford school district cut 17 teacher librarians, a 63% decrease and 12 education teachers and 3 teachers of aboriginal education.

Women's issues discussed

To the Editor;

A recent poll shows women favour the NDP by a 10% margin over the BC Liberals--48 to 38% in an Ipsos-Reid poll released April 29th, 2005.

RCMP issues weekly report

Subject: Fatal motor vehicle collision - Princeton-Summerland Rd.

On Saturday, April 30th, at approximately 5:00 PM Princeton RCMP Detachment, South Okanagan Traffic Services received a call of a single motor vehicle collision on Highway 40 in the 2800 block.

A vehicle with three occupants was traveling southbound on Highway 40 when it lost control and rolled over.

One of the passengers was thrown from the vehicle as a result of the collision and subsequently suffered fatal injuries. The remaining occupants were transported to Princeton Hospital by BC Ambulance Services.

Investigations are still ongoing at this time however speed, alcohol and drugs are believed to be casual factors in the collision.

Subject: Break and Enter Suspect Intercepted - Stolen Property Recovered

On April 28th, at approximately 6:45 PM, Princeton RCMP received a complaint of a break and enter which had occurred at Paradise Ranch west of Princeton. The complainant reported that an unknown suspect had gained entry to a residence, while the resident was still inside, and had managed to steal cash and other valuables. Although the suspect had remained unseen by the resident, a suspicious vehicle had been seen in the area hours prior and was currently being monitored by police.

At approximately 7:20 PM, police located a suspect vehicle exiting Highway 3 and took the driver into custody near the Princeton Hospital. The suspect was found to be in possession of the stolen items from the break and enter, as well as a stolen bicycle which had been taken, coincidentally, from the Princeton Hospital approximately 7 hours prior.

A 36 year old male from Mission faces numerous criminal charges related to break and enter, theft, possession of stolen property, and breach of probation. A small quantity of drugs was recovered from the individual and he was also found to be a vehicle impound candidate.

The male will appear in Princeton Provincial court on August 11th, to answer for his charges.
