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Artists seek 2010 Community Project

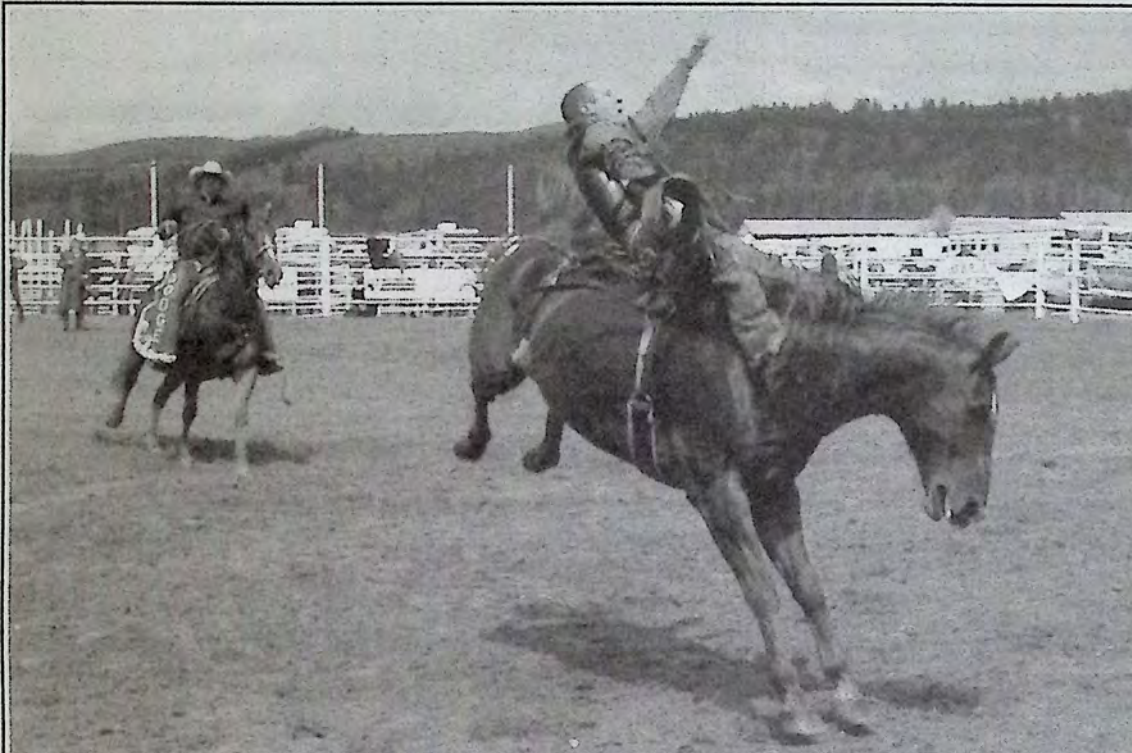

You had to check the calendar every so often over the past weekend to make sure it wasn't the May Long Weekend.

Downtown Princeton started getting busy Wednesday afternoon and it never stopped until Sunday.

Western Week will be remembered as the week where cowboys and country music kept Princeton hopping for days.

The 'Let's Play' Country Music Concert went without a hitch on both Friday and Saturday nights with attendance light the first night and a huge crowd on site for the second performance.

Campers on site at Princeton Airport had travelled from the Lower Mainland as well as from North and Central Okanagan to see the line up which wrapped up late Saturday with Emerson Drive.

Rush ticket sales at the main gate went quickly, as did a reported number of illegally purchased VIP Passes sold downtown the night before.

Princeton's fourth annual Pro Rodeo was one of the best ones put on by the local rodeo committee.

Even with rainy weather, Princeton Fairgrounds was filled to capacity both Saturday and Sunday for events that produced lots of action and excitement.

Princeton's very own Renee Willis earned the distinction of winning the Ladies Barrel Racing event at her home town rodeo with an amazing time of 17.60 seconds.

The Princeton Rodeo Club has one year left in its five year plan to 'give pro rodeos a try' and if last weekend was any indication, the club has struck gold with the CPRA-sanctioned event.

The next major events planned for Princeton in the coming months include the Princeton Motorsports Event on June 12th and Princeton Racing Days celebration from June 30th to July 2nd.

PXA is ready for events

Upcoming events were the main topic at the May 10 meeting of Princeton Exhibition Association (PXA). The PXA manages the fairgrounds complex and is responsible for scheduling of events taking place at the fairgrounds.

The rodeo was the first event, and discussion took place regarding last minute details about that event. Vern Preston, President of Princeton Motorsports, reported on preparations being made for the June 12 motorsports event. A great deal of work is being done to improve the

motorsports track. There was a lot of discussion about scheduling for crossing the horse racing track. A new policy has been established: anyone doing work inside the oval track must advise the PXA 48 hours in advance so all the horses are off the track before vehicles move across it.

Other discussion about the oval racetrack was in regard to the condition of the track in readiness for the June 30 horse races. Two officials from Vancouver had tested the track and found it satisfactory, but it must

be placed in that condition each time vehicles cross the track.

The Fall Fair asked for, and received, support for two projects in preparation for the September 10 and 11 fair. The first request was for money to repair the cracks in the floor of building #1, and to improve the interior appearance of the building.

The second request was for the completion of the antique farm equipment shed and the equipment display. These projects will be done during the coming months.

Candidates speak out

With the election looming a week away, candidates for MLA met the public in Princeton on May 9 at the Legion Hall. The event was co-hosted by the Legion, Chamber of Commerce and Toastmasters. Toastmaster Gordon Craigie was Moderator, with Maggie Trehearne as timekeeper.

The candidates were Mike McLean of the Green Party, Arne Zabell of Democratic Reform, Harry Lali of NDP, and Lloyd Forman of the Liberal Party. The Marxist-Leninist candidate, Dorothy Jean O'Donnell, failed to appear.

Each candidate was given an opportunity to lay out his party's and his personal platform, but the main body of the discussion was in answer to questions from the floor.

On questions regarding health care, Forman said the Liberals spent more

money than ever on health care, but he feels there is a lack of local voice in how the money is spent. One question referred to tearing up the hospital employees' contract, and Forman said when promises are made and facts reviewed, it may not be possible to keep the promises. He said he does not agree with privatization.

Lali said, "A contract is a contract." He is against privatization. He is against the closure of hospitals and schools, and other services, which hit rural B.C. hardest.

Zabell believes hospitals and schools are essential to the survival of communities. He is against privatization. He said in 1994 there were 3.3 million B.C. residents with 12,001 acute care beds, and now there are 4.1 million people with 7,300 acute care beds.

Forman later said more beds are not

needed because people are not kept in hospital as long.

McLean said we must stabilize health care and education funding. He is opposed to a two-tier hospital system, and privatization.

One questioner asked for an explanation of the referendum. Forman was opposed to it on the basis it creates "super ridings" dominated by urban dwellers. Lali asked, "If you don't understand it, why would you vote for it?" He was opposed.

The other two candidates would vote for it to end the two-party domination.

Approximately 100 people attended the meeting, and there were many more questions and answers. Lali stood on his personal record, and NDP principles, while the remaining candidates adhered to party policy for the most part.

Visitor numbers to the museum are down this month, but there was one group of 16 people from England who toured the museum and were quite impressed with all of the displays, and surprised to find the museum had such an extensive collection.

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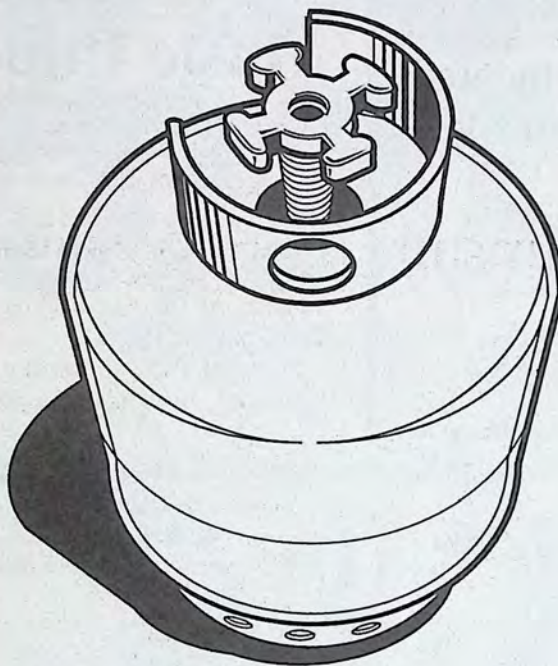

Memorial Park, in downtown Keremeos, is the site of the

Opening Ceremonies on the evening of Thursday, May 26th. Native drummers, Alysha Harker and her vocal coach, Sandra Babel, the Similkameen Elementary Secondary School Jazz Band and the Grade 9/10 Concert Band will all be featured that evening.

Friday afternoon in the park will find a variety of local musicians to whet your appetite for the supper at 5 o'clock. Beef on a bun or vegetarian lasagna will be available for \$5.

Friday evening the feature performers will be The Wheat in the Barley, The Wailin Jennys, Martin Springett and a great local band, The Black Birds. There will also be fireworks to finish off a fantastic night.

Saturday afternoon come to the park to hear local musicians leading up to the Massed Bands (featuring the 15th Field Artillery Regiment Reserve Band from Vancouver, with guest trumpet soloist Mike Herriott) in the evening. Sunday morning munch on a Pancake Breakfast from 7:30-10:30 (\$4) while enjoying more music.

Cawston Hall is once again the site of the "Piano Venue" or more accurately the "Classical Venue". This year there is an incredible line-up of talented musicians, including Mike Herriott on trumpet (Herriott is the Yamaha, Long & McQuade sponsored artist) accompanied by David Enns on piano, and Bruce Vogt, a classical pianist, on Saturday afternoon

beginning at 1 p.m.

On Sunday local junior piano students will be performing from 1:00-1:50 p.m. Beginning at 2 p.m. will be Penticton's Tracey Fehr (vocals) accompanied by Dennis Nordlund on piano. Cawston is about three miles down Highway 3 from Keremeos, and the Hall is located on Main Street (turn right at the Amber Light).

If you need a lift to Cawston, there will be a FREE SHUTTLE BUS running between Memorial Park and Cawston Hall on Saturday afternoon. The bus will pick up passengers behind the O.A.P. Centre, in Memorial Park. St. John's Ecumenical Church, in downtown Keremeos (just one block from Memorial Park), with its fabulous acoustics, is the perfect venue for some of the quieter groups. I call it the "Folk Venue", but any label can be limiting. If you're in a mellow mood and want to slow down a bit, take a break and visit the Church on Friday afternoon, Saturday morning and afternoon. 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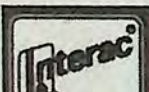


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Turn off the TV and get active

The only thing the average child spends more time on than watching television is sleeping!

Studies indicate that Canadian children spend between 14 and 23 hours a week watching TV and by the time they graduate they will have spent more time watching TV than in the classroom.

TV viewing can limit a child's time for vital activities such as playing, reading, learning to talk, spending time with friends and family, participating in regular exercise and developing other necessary physical, mental and social skills. However, in some disadvantaged settings, healthy TV habits may actually be a beneficial teaching tool.

In an effort to protect your child from the negative influences of television and to promote good television viewing habits, consider these points:

- Limit TV watching to one hour per day for preschoolers and two hours for school-aged children.

- Don't use the TV as a babysitter.

- Try to watch TV with your child and then discuss the show with your child.

- No child should be allowed to have a TV (or computer or video game equipment) in his or her bedroom. A central location is strongly advised.

- Turn the TV off during meals, when visitors arrive and during study time.

- Help your child understand the difference between fantasy, make-believe and reality.

- Make a rule that homework and chores must be completed before the TV gets turned on.

- Don't change bedtimes according to the television schedule. Consider taping a program if it comes on after bedtime.

- Television is a powerful advertiser. Talk to your child about the commercials and the claims they make.

- Allow older children to plan their weekly viewing schedule, but you, as a parent should still supervise these choices. Praise your child for making good choices.

- If you are divorced and your child spends time with both parents, the rules for TV watching should be consistent between the homes.

- Ensure that your child's television viewing is balanced with sports, hobbies, creative play and playing outdoors.

- It's best to start good television habits before children go to school because as they get older it will be more difficult to enforce restrictions or influence their choices.

- Speak up! If you see something inappropriate or offensive let your voice be heard. It is also important to speak out in support of quality entertainment.

Probably the most important point of all is for you, as a parent, to look at your own television-viewing

habits. Your example as a role model will make a big difference.

Primitive bodies die at desks

Last week, we discussed our prehistoric stomachs. This week, let's look at our prehistoric bodies and what modern work and lifestyles are doing to those poor antiquated bodies.

Until 70 years ago, most people did hard physical work to make a living and keep a household running. Now, the majority of people make a living in a lot less physical ways, but our bodies are built for work. All of our muscles, including those vital heart and artery muscles, come to us from distant ancestors who exercised those muscles every day.

Think about how we work today. Most of us drive to work, sit in front of some kind of machine, and drive back home. That's work today. Contrast this with our past. A typical worker would walk to the job, or saddle the horse or harness the team to go to work. Before you can take the horses out of the barn, you have to feed them, give them water, and then you have to lift the harness or saddle and struggle with the horse to put on the gear. This alone would be more physical exertion than most modern people do all day. Is it any wonder our #1 health problem, obesity, is related to lack of exercise?

Many workers today do have a lot of exercise. Waiters, shop clerks, warehouses, ranchers and short order cooks are on the move constantly. These people will probably live longer than people who sit at a desk all day.

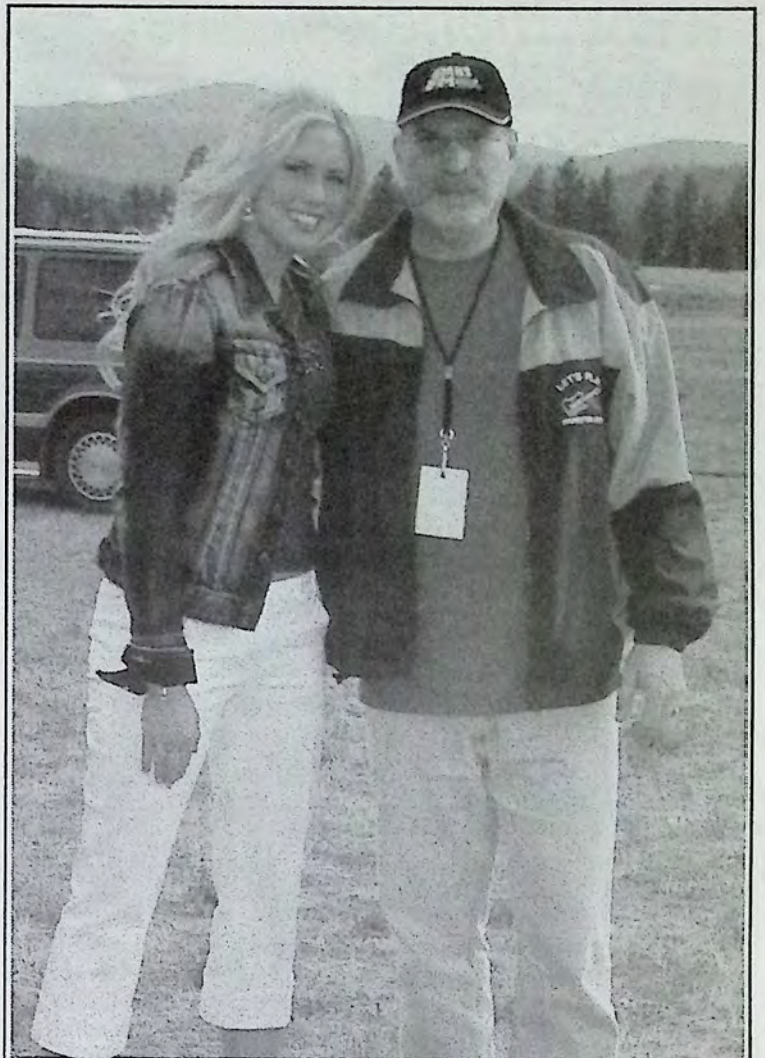
Our desks are deadly. We sit for hours in front of a machine and our muscles weaken, spasm in an effort to do something, cramp, and give us pain. Our internal organs do not function well, and we have problems with loss of lung capacity, with digestive disturbances such as constipation, and we suffer from lack of energy and poor circulation.

People go home from the desk feeling exhausted, and then lie on the sofa and watch TV. What they really need is a brisk walk, a gym workout, a softball game or some other sports activity to repair and restore all of those neglected muscles.

Our bodies are adapted to primitive living. We need to treat our bodies to the kind of primitive activities that kept our ancestors fed and safe from predators. We need to be on the move putting out a lot of physical effort. Other wise, we are going to die from those deadly desks and sofas.

Hepatitis C awareness campaign underway

The May Hepatitis C Awareness campaign has kicked into gear in Princeton.

It was officially started with the signing of the official proclamation from Mayor Keith Olsen marking the month of May as Hepatitis C Awareness Month and marking May 1st as Hepatitis C Memorial Day.

The signed proclamation states: "Whereas Hepatitis C is a blood infection transmitted by blood and blood products that can lead to liver cancer, cirrhosis and other severe health problems; and whereas Hepatitis C is a treatable illness affecting hundreds of people in Princeton; and whereas early detection, education and awareness can reduce harm to those already infected with Hepatitis C and prevent the spread to others at risk, therefore be it resolved that I, Keith Olsen, Mayor of the Town of Princeton proclaim May 2005 as Hepatitis C Awareness Month and May 1st as Hepatitis C Memorial Day and do commend its thoughtful observation to all citizens of our area."

An information kiosk, set up in

front of the Princeton Post Office, was used to promote awareness and prevention of the Hepatitis C virus (HCV) with support and encouragement from local health officials, Town Hall, Public Health, doctors and nurses and community volunteers.

The kiosk will appear throughout the month at that location.

A display of awareness posters was presented with pamphlets provided by HepCBC and information handouts.

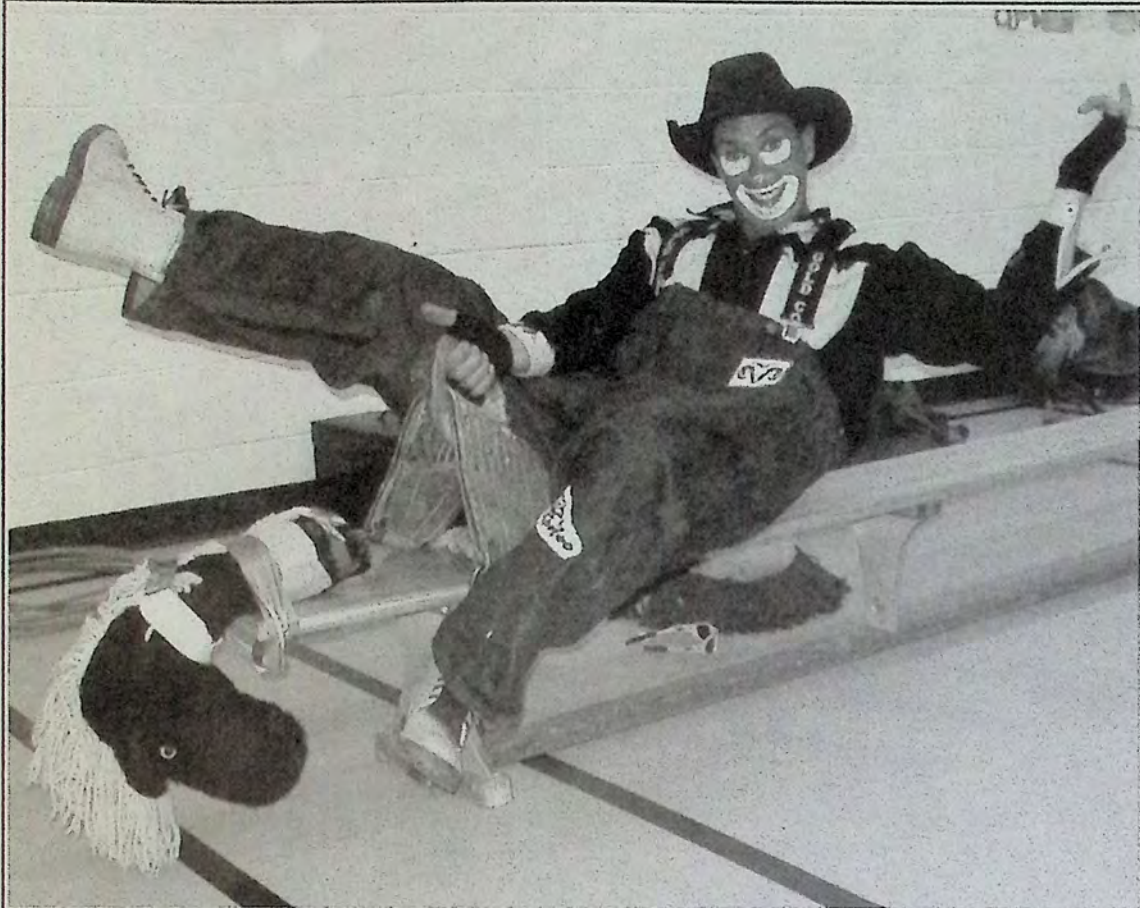

our economy

Last time I wrote about some good news for Princeton and area. This time I want to look at an important, growing sector of our valley's economy.

Agri-tourism is just what it sounds like. It is tourism on a farm or a ranch. A guest ranch is an agri-tourism business. Other examples of agri-tourism are farm B&Bs, farm tours, farm gate sales, farm weddings, horse drawn sleigh rides, gift shops, trail rides, and the list goes on.

The Similkameen Valley has a great diversity of agri-tourism. I can only give a few examples. Harvest Moon Guest House and Retreat offers a big, handsome, log guest house over-looking the river at the very southern tip of the valley. There are tours of the organic apple orchard, an ecological reserve, fruit sales, an art gallery, and soon the

farm will produce fruit ciders.

There are about a dozen B&Bs in the valley and most are on farms or hobby farms. Each of them is unique. In the Princeton area Jellicoe Station and the Friesian Ranch work together and with tour operators. Kettle Valley ATV Excursions bunks its guests at Jellicoe Station.

BC Horse Vacations provides rides between the two B&Bs. Along the way guests are treated to a delicious meal on the top of a mountain where the table is covered in white linen and set with finery. Guests may ask for a massage at the end of the day on the trail.

This is a fine example of the type of inter-business partnerships we see in tourism in the valley. This is the secret of success. Now look at the economic benefit.

The B&Bs receive guests from the

tour operators. The tour operators provide additional services, allowing them to raise their prices. A caterer and a massage therapist find work with the tour operator. This is called adding value. All of these businesses by their goods and services in the Similkameen Valley.

All of the people in this these examples are self-employed. There is a myth that tourism jobs are all at minimum wage.

These businesses provide handsome incomes to the families that operate them.

As tourism becomes a larger part of our valley's economy, we want to foster business-to-business cooperation - because it pays. And, we want to foster private, family run businesses because they provide decent incomes and the profits stay in our economy, as opposed to going to distant shareholders.

The Wild Horse Race injured a total of three cowboys, with Terry Arnholtz of Okotoks, Alberta crossing the finish line first. He also won the event the day before.

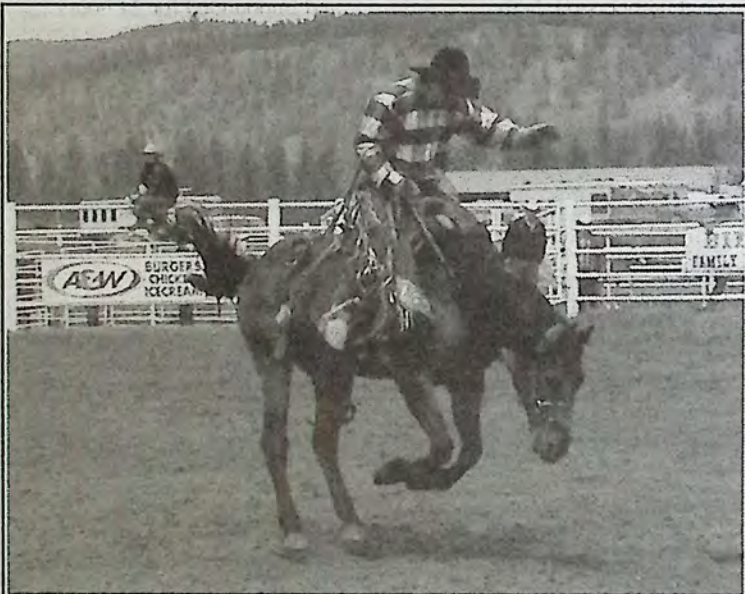
As for the rest of the day, the cowboys did much better than the four-legged competitors.

In the Bull Riding only four cowboys scored out of the 13 competitors. They all ended up on the top of the leader board for their efforts.

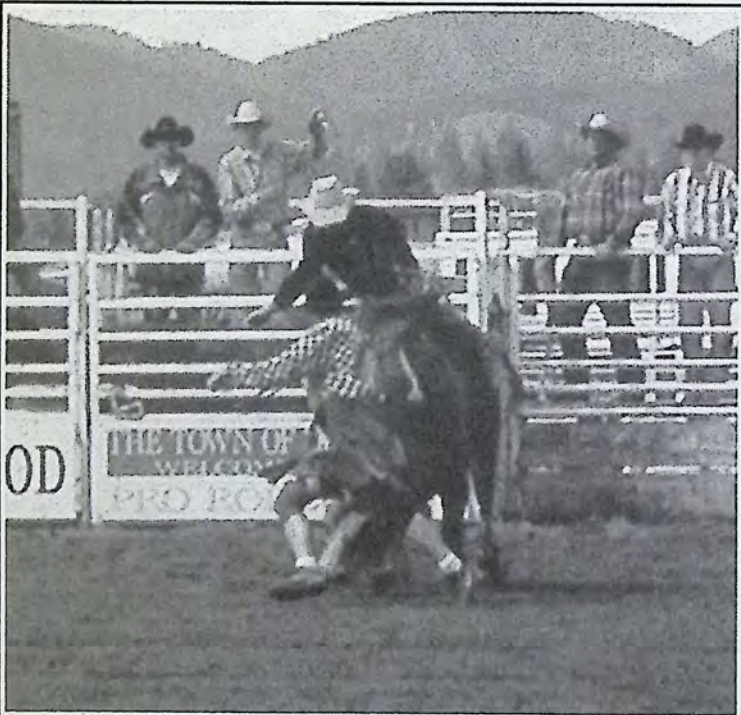

Chutter unravels Lali's statements

Dear Editor,

No wonder there is public distrust with politics. A politician and a political party that repeatedly lie to the public, ruins the reputation of all those sincere individuals and political party's that contribute to the democratic process in governing our society.

Websters dictionary defines a lie, lying as "to make an untrue statement with intent to deceive", "to create a false or misleading impression", "an untrue or inaccurate statement that may or may not be believed true by the speaker".

I attended the all candidates forum on Wednesday evening in Merritt and was disgusted to hear Mr. Lali repeatedly make false and misleading statements in order to discredit the BC Liberal Party. Websters defines Mr. Lali's actions as lying to the public in Yale-Lillooet.

I respect different political opinions and honest debates are informative to the undecided voter. Outright lies by a politician to the undecided voter is dishonest and unethical. Why can't Mr. Lali be constructively critical and explain a defensible alternative? I assume because he is incapable of providing effective and affordable solutions to governing, as his 10 years of involvement in the worst government in the history of the province attest to. Let me support my claim of lying - with facts.

Lali stated "sale of BC Rail" Fact-BC Rail, a crown corporation owned by the people of BC, continues to own the rail bed, the tracks and the right-of-way land. A lease of use by CN provided \$1 billion dollars to pay off \$500 million debt saving 30 million per year in interest costs. A lease of use is not a sale.

Lali stated "killed mining...no new jobs or mines" Fact-300% increase in mining developed and 72% increase in drilling, all employing more people, with intent to discover new mines and oil and gas.

Lali stated "3 balanced budgets". Remember the 2 fudget budgets with deceptive accounting. The last so called balanced budget was due to a windfall in electrical sales but even Paul Ramsey NDP Finance Minister stated that significant spending cuts would be necessary to achieve balanced budgets...another deception.

Lali stated "health care cut". Fact-BC Liberal government added 2.3 billion or over 20% to health care and made changes to address escalating costs, poor service and burnt out Dr's and nurses. For example NDP created 52 health authorities which was changed to 6, saving \$30 million per year in administration costs. Changes include providing optimum care in regional hospitals, closer to home, provide 24/7 assured skilled and practiced specialists and support teams with modern equipment.

Lali stated "education cut". Fact-highest grade 1-12 funding in history in spite of 29,000 fewer students, an increase of \$2 billion (2001-2007).

Lali stated "offer \$10 million more than BC Liberal tourism budget". Fact-NDP platform cuts tourist budget.

Lali stated "special needs education funding costs". Fact-this funding has always been provided through school districts and will continue to be \$231 million now and growing by \$28 million in 2005...almost \$75 million more per year than in 2001 (than the NDP!)

Lali stated "closed schools" deceptive. Fact- 29,000 fewer students than

2000 so fewer teachers and classrooms needed. 19 new schools built, 24 replacements, 124 additions and 24 renovations. School districts have decided to put funds to best value in teaching our kids. NDP would hire more teachers to sit in empty classrooms.

Lali stated "class size gone up". False-elementary class size has remained unchanged for the past decade. Fact-average class size increased by only 0.6 students since 2000/01 and there are fewer students on average in 04/05 (23.2) than in 95/96 (23.5).

With Mr. Lali, Carol James and the NDP (Party Flyer Feb 2005) spreading false information, where can undecided voters obtain the truth? The public can view the government website www.gov.bc.ca to obtain ministry information as documented by public employees, contact the independent Auditor General or visit their government agent office. The media should verify all statements reportedly made by politicians as a service to the public.

The public should act cautiously with political information, confirm information and check out the credibility of the speaker and party.

Based on the false statements made by Harry Lali, he is not credible and can not be trusted. Based on history during the 90's the NDP cannot be trusted and are incompetent to govern. Corky Evans, NDP Health Minister, January 17, 2000 stated "We made announcements about things we weren't ever going to do". That is called lying! Do not forget the Harry Lali NDP way on election day.

We don't like politicians much. Our elections seem to be based on who we dislike least.

Politicians talk about the bad attitude of the public toward their chosen careers, but the sponsorship scandal points out why the public has a low opinion of politicians. monitor each other's behaviour. The top priority seems to be to win at any price, and to reward those who help them win. That is how the game is played in politics. After winning, some believe they can do anything they want. By and large, they are right - until the next election.

Political parties should spend more time vetting their candidates to ensure honesty and morality are top priorities, and less time on charisma and clout. In short, clean politicians make for clean politics.

There is an old saying that power corrupts. It may seem to corrupt some people, but those people must have been corruptible in the first place. Why do people try to gain power? Isn't it a question of power versus principles? In too many cases, the hunger for power seems to overcome the need for principles. That's my view, anyway. I guess I'm not as forgiving as most taxpayers. I always take their scandals personally. After all, I have paid them for an honest day's work with no nonsense.

Gouk challenges federal Liberal credibility

Jim Gouk, MP for British Columbia Southern Interior advises that the impact of testimony coming from the Gomery Inquiry into the Quebec advertising scandal is paralyzing Parliament.

"Truth has become the first casualty in a pre-election battle as the Liberals try to deflect corruption charges with a series of 'spin-doctoring' of facts and fabricated accusations against the opposition," said Gouk.

Following is a list of Liberal fiction that even the national media are starting to ridicule.

- Fiction: Parliament is working well since the Liberal/NDP budget agreement.

- Fact: Fearing the possibility of an election, the government has dredged up a continuous litany of procedural roadblocks to normal parliamentary activity. Votes are being delayed, the Order Paper has been clogged with old, outdated issues and opposition days on which opposition parties get to bring forward issues for debate have been pushed to the end of the parliamentary session.

- Fiction: The only people who want Gomery to fail are the Conservatives. This was declared in Parliament by Public Works Minister Scott Brison on May 2nd.

- Fact: As a reporter from the National Post stated after Brison's remarks, "he (Brison) then had to try very hard not to shake his head at the lunacy of his own words".

- Fiction: Cities will be denied their promised share of gas tax revenues

if there is an election.

- Fact: While technically true in the short term, the Conservatives are committed to honouring the agreement and in fact are the Party that has pushed for committed funding from fuel tax revenues. "In a documented exchange on December 4, 1996 between me and then Finance Minister Paul Martin, I pushed for dedicated revenues and Martin agreed that it was appropriate when the deficit ended," Gouk said. "Well, the deficit ended eight years ago and we are still waiting for the fulfillment of the commitment we pushed for."

- Fiction: National daycare program will die if there is a spring election.

- Fact: Again, this is technically true although the current deal has little strings attached to ensure it would cause an increase in daycare spaces.

The Conservative plan is to continue the funding as tax breaks and other incentives for stay at home parents and for various day care options.

"Never kid yourself. If nationally funded daycare comes into force, we will see very little of it in rural areas. It will all go to major urban centres," Gouk pointed out.

- Fiction: The Conservatives are in bed with the Separatists to help break up Canada.

- Fact: This is the wildest fiction of all. The fact that the Bloc will vote the same way as the Conservatives on a non-confidence motion is purely a "one shot deal". The Bloc

have historically voted far more often with the Liberals than with the Conservatives. If federalism is at stake, it is Liberal corruption in Quebec that has caused it.

"Other false beliefs include those who think that the Gomery Inquiry will end if an election is called. This is simply not true," said Gouk. "The inquiry will continue and Justice Gomery will produce his report." The other misunderstanding is that Gomery will identify individuals and organizations who are guilty of various crimes and will lay charges against them. "In actual fact, the terms of reference set out by the Liberal government specifically prohibit Justice Gomery from doing this," Gouk pointed out.

"Charges will largely be up to the Liberals, the very group widely implicated in the scandal. Expecting justice from them would be like asking the arsonist to come back and put out the fire," continued Gouk.

"People must realize that for the government to survive, it would be necessary for us to actually support them. Given the proof of their involvement in election fraud, kickback schemes and the gross misuse of taxpayers' money, there is no way we can continue to do this. The real question is: Why is the NDP willing to prop up such a corrupt political party who has stolen the taxpayers' money and fractured the entire parliamentary process to cling to office after being exposed?" concluded Gouk.

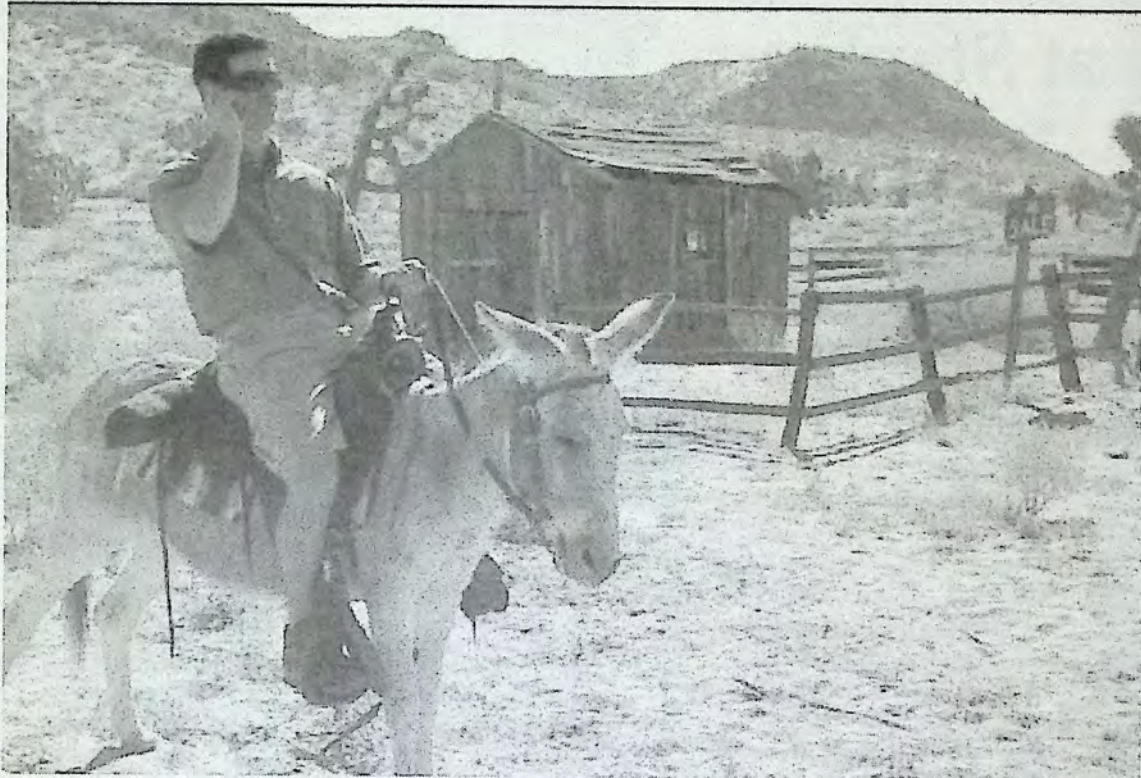
