## Mother Nature cooperates

May long weekend is traditionally Keremeos Elks Rodeo Weekend.

The 2005 edition will be remembered as one of the better ones in recent memory.

Lawn Mower Races - a first for Keremeos - will likely become an annual event judging from the spectator support and number of competitors.

Keremeos Volunteer Firemen served up well over one thousand plates of eggs, pancakes and bacon during their Pancake Breakfasts over the weekend.

The 45-minute Rodeo Parade on Monday morning included everything from a marching band and visiting royalty to floats from Penticton, Keremeos and Princeton.

The parade also included a collection of vintage cars, vintage tractors and an impressive collection of motorcycles - ridden by the Christian Motorcycle Association.

It was also a parade that attracted a crowd filled with residents from throughout the Similkameen Valley as well as visitors from Washington State.

The concession stand at the Keremeos Rodeo Grounds was busy all through the weekend and went through more hamburgers, hot dogs and french fries in two days than some fast food restaurants produce in a week.

The weather - although somewhat windy on Sunday - was overall warm and sunny which filled the stands at the Rodeo Grounds for both rodeo performances and gave many spectators their first sunburn of the season.

## Yale-Lillooet brings Lali back

Voters in Yale-Lillooet made it clear at the polls who they wanted to represent them in the next four years.

Shortly after polls closed at 8:00 PM on May 17th for the 38th Provincial General Election and polling stations began reporting their figures it was becoming obvious that the NDP's Harry Lali was taking a short lead over Liberal Lloyd Forman.

The final figures show Harry Lali won the Yale-Lillooet MLA seat with a total of 8,181 votes or 48.62% of the popular vote.

Liberal Lloyd George Forman was second with 6,806 votes (40.45%), with Princeton's Green Party entry, Mike McLean, gathering 1,542 votes (9.16%).

The other two candidates in the election were Arne Jensen Zabell of Democratic Reform Party of BC with 181 votes (1.08%) and Dorothy-Jean O'Donnell of the People's Front with 116 votes (0.69%).

A total of 16,826 votes were cast in the district.

As for the Referendum on Electoral Reform, popularly referred

to as the STV-BC Referendum, Yale-Lillooet voted in favour of the program with 8,341 Yes votes cast, or 52.65% of the popular vote.

A total of 7,502 voters cast No votes or 47.35%.

The total number of ballots cast on the Referendum numbered 15,843 in Yale-Lillooet.

In Princeton, a total of 1,062 voters cast ballots for the NDP's Harry Lali with 906 voting for Liberal Lloyd Forman.

Princeton supported local Green Party candidate Mike McLean with a total of 330 votes. Arne Zabell of

DRBC took 16 votes and People's Front candidate Dorothy-Jean O'Donnell was supported by 10 local voters.

A total of 2,535 voters cast ballots in Princeton.

In Hedley there were a total of 214 ballots cast.

A total of 109 went to the NDP's Harry Lali with 66 supporting Liberal Lloyd Forman.

The Green Party's Mike McLean took 36 votes with Arne Zabell of DRBC collecting 3 votes. No one in Hedley voted for People's Front candidate Dorothy-Jean O'Donnell.

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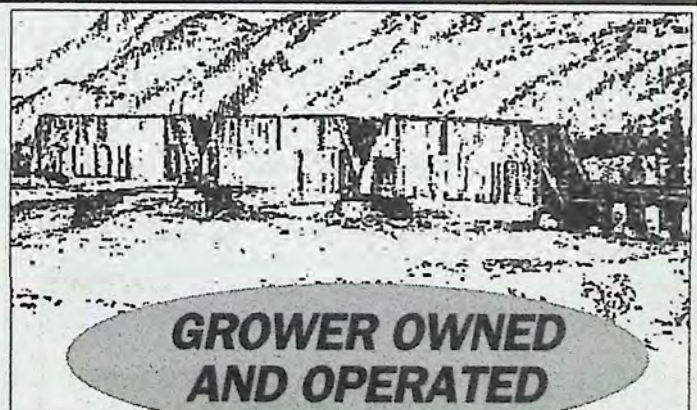

# Facts about acupuncture and allergies

What are allergies?

## we beat those cravings

Well, it's been quite some time since Brenda or I have written this column, so I suppose we should bring you up-to-date on what we are doing as we continue to 'beat those cravings.'

I think I'll start by saying I can't believe how much I like cabbage. It may sound strange, but I really quite like cabbage. Also green peppers, broccoli and carrots.

What I'm getting at is that both Brenda and I have been putting a lot of work into adding more salads to our diet.

Even when we eat out we normally just eat salads. Our favourite places with the foods we don't feel guilty eating are Copper Mountain Bar & Grill during their 'all-you-can-eat' baron of beef buffet on Sundays and Chap's Restaurant.

Let me explain why we like these places.

Don't let the label 'all-you-can-eat' scare you. Along with the baron of beef, there are usually three salads to choose from at Copper Mountain Bar & Grill.

They include a cole slaw, a lettuce-based salad and a broccoli salad. I normally stick with the broccoli salad.

As for Chap's Restaurant, we normally just hit the salad bar. My choices there normally lean to pasta salads, raw veggies and something from the hot buffet. Usually I take a piece of vegetarian lasagna (when available) or rice.

Don't get me wrong, we do eat other foods, but normally in moderation.

As for our fitness routines, I have

started a walking program. I have so far taken a brisk 30-minute walk every other night for the past couple of weeks.

Brenda has started to work out at Curves every other night after work.

I hope to eventually get back to running before too long, but I thought I'd best start with brisk walking and maybe I'll break into a light jog in a few days.

If you're asking yourself, where would anyone go for a walk in this area? I have to answer with a single word: anywhere.

Brenda and I are very lucky to own a home in Princeton that has the Trans-Canada Trail pass by only 200-feet from our front door.

Normally I'll walk the Trail from our place to the missing railway bridge on Highway 5A over the Tulameen River.

Other times I'll add a loop to the route that'll take me to the Chamber of Commerce office and back to the Trail.

For a change of scenery I'll walk the Similkameen River dyke (again, only 200-feet away, but this time behind the house) to the old railway crossing that once fed coal to the Granby Power Plant.

I love the history of the area and quite enjoy being only a few minutes away from any of it in our neighbourhood.

My free weights are sitting in the livingroom and I will soon be adding a light toning program to my walking program to see what results that will bring me as I continue to 'beat those cravings' with Brenda.

## living past 100

### Cholesterol control can harm you

Millions of North Americans are taking drugs to lower cholesterol, but the drugs used could be doing harm to their hearts. These cholesterol reducing drugs, such as Lipitor, are called "statin" drugs because the chemical term for the drug ends in "statin". These drugs are beneficial in reducing blood cholesterol, but they block an enzyme essential to proper functioning of the heart.

Medical practitioners who are aware of the latest findings on statin medications are recommending their patients take Co-enzyme Q-10 along with the statins. Co-enzyme Q-10 is the enzyme essential for the heart's timing mechanism. Without this enzyme, a heart may lose its proper heartbeat rhythm.

Co-enzyme Q-10 can be purchased in most pharmacies and health food stores. If your doctor has not recommended taking this important enzyme along with your statin medication, perhaps you should ask why.

As we age, our production of Co-enzyme Q-10 decreases (like so many other things in older people!) and many people over 50 take this enzyme even if they are not on statins. In Japan, CoQ10 is used to treat high blood pressure and heart disease. This enzyme enhances the immune system, too, protecting against other diseases, and is beneficial for people suffering from allergies, asthma and respiratory diseases.

If you want a good natural source of this essential nutrient, eat salmon and sardines.

# Council okays student plan to clean view

Clean up the view of the dump? Town Council likes the plan. Nicole Thomas and Jana

McKenzie, two Princeton Secondary students, intend to beautify the view from Highway

40, which leads past the landfill to Princeton fairgrounds and a number of rural tourist locations.

On May 16, the students, accompanied by Nadine McEwen, placed their proposal on Council's table. The proposal calls for planting carigana bushes along the slope between Highway 40 and the dump.

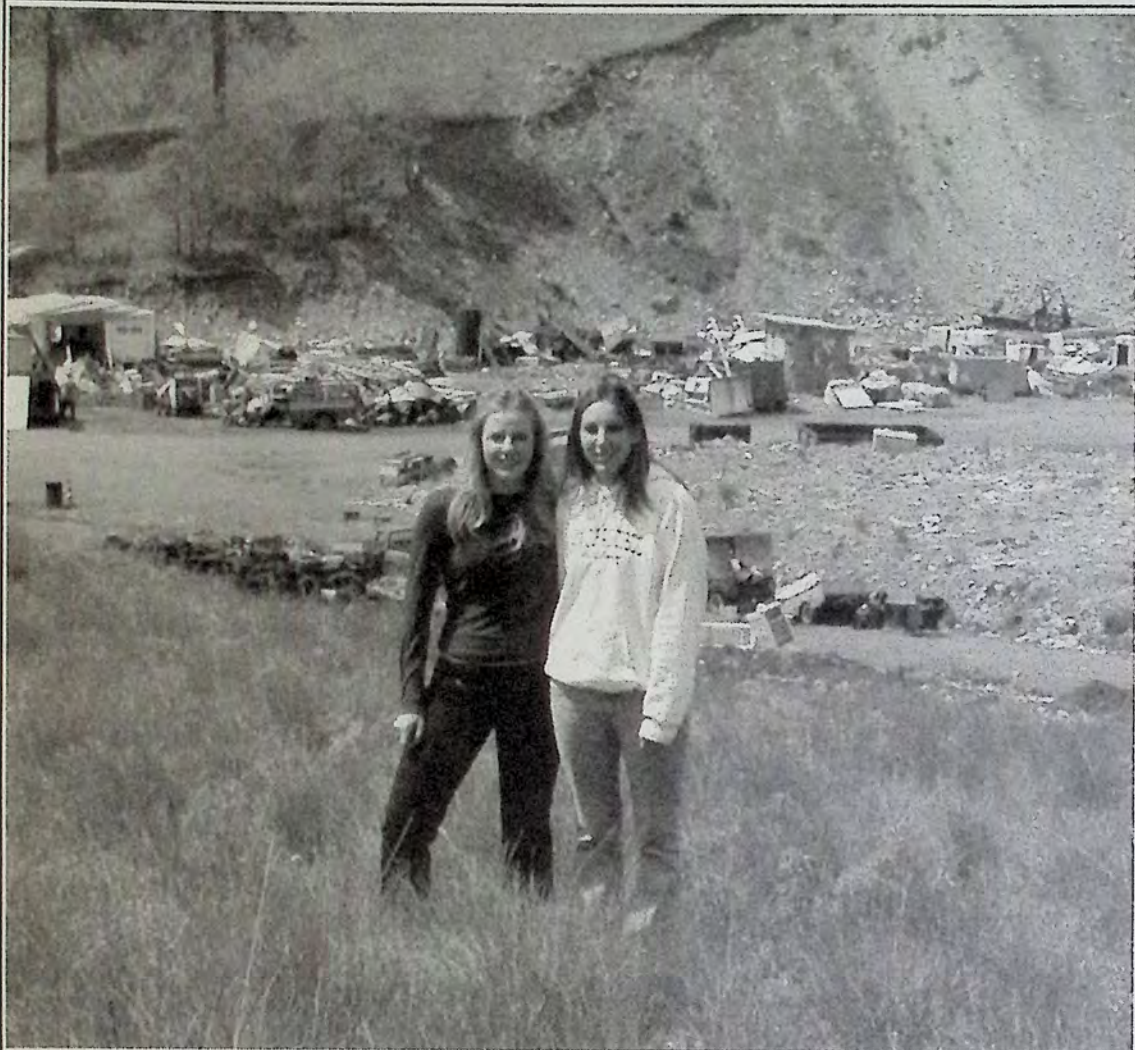
The students had done their homework. They had talked to Don & Anna's Greenhouses to find the kind of bushes that would survive without much care and create a visual barrier. Carigana blooms in spring, which adds a bonus. The hedge will stop the plastic bags from flying as well as hide the view of the dump.

McKenzie and Thomas had spoken to businesses along Highway 40 and received support for the proposal.

They will look for support from the community for the purchase of enough carigana bushes to do the job. Each bush would cost between seven and 10 dollars.

The two girls are prepared to do all of the work themselves, if necessary, but hope others will turn out to help on planting day. There will be about 200 carigana bushes to plant.

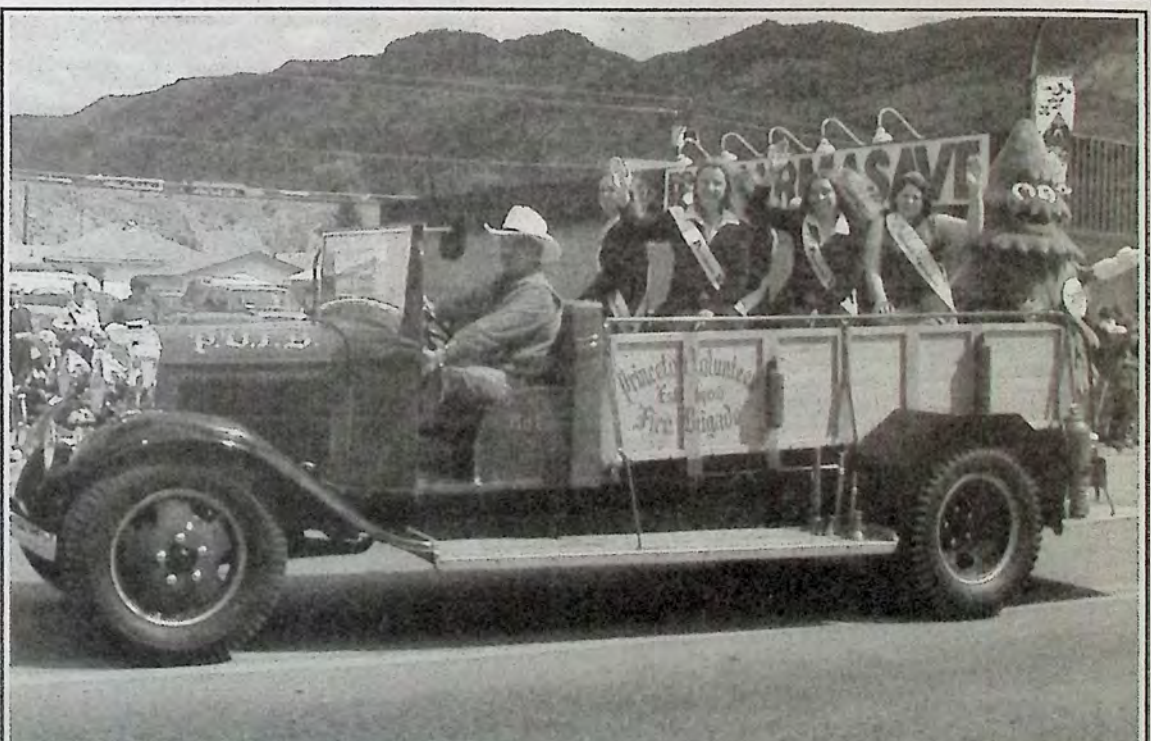

At the May 19th meeting of the Princeton Area Business Enhancement Association (PABEA) the "Defining the PABEA" Committee released its final report.

The committee was formed in March of this year with the mandate of identifying the strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and threats of the association, and to then survey the membership for their feedback.

From the results the committee was to make formal conclusions and recommendations to the PABEA membership.

These results were to enable the PABEA to better serve the members and define its future direction.

The report was well received and commented on. The committee was given praise for being so bold as to point out the organization's flaws.

Basically it was time to take a good hard, critical look at ourselves in the mirror and see what changes were needed as we go forward.

This is an exercise performed by many organizations. The committee identified a number of areas where improvements are needed which will help the PABEA better serve the membership.

Some of the recommendations go directly to improving the internal structure of the organization and its communications to its members.

After the report was accepted and voted on, the PABEA appointed a Committee to revisit the original Mission Statement and make any changes that may be needed to ensure the association's mandate is current for 2005.

This was step one of the committee's recommendations. One of the other main items the committee identified was the perception that

The PABEA's intent is to work with the Chamber and not against it. A proposal was set forth to contact the Chamber and see if the two groups could form a committee to have better communications between each other and to identify where each other has an opportunity that can jointly benefit the business community in Princeton and area.

Basically identifying where each other can fill the gaps by ensuring we are not duplicating each others work. As we go forward then we

need to ensure that the work the PABEA is doing is filling a different need to the local business community.

Much like other communities have a Downtown Business Association or Mall Association that works with their local Chambers of Commerce.

More positive changes will be happening in the future with the PABEA. We will keep the members and the public informed as they happen.

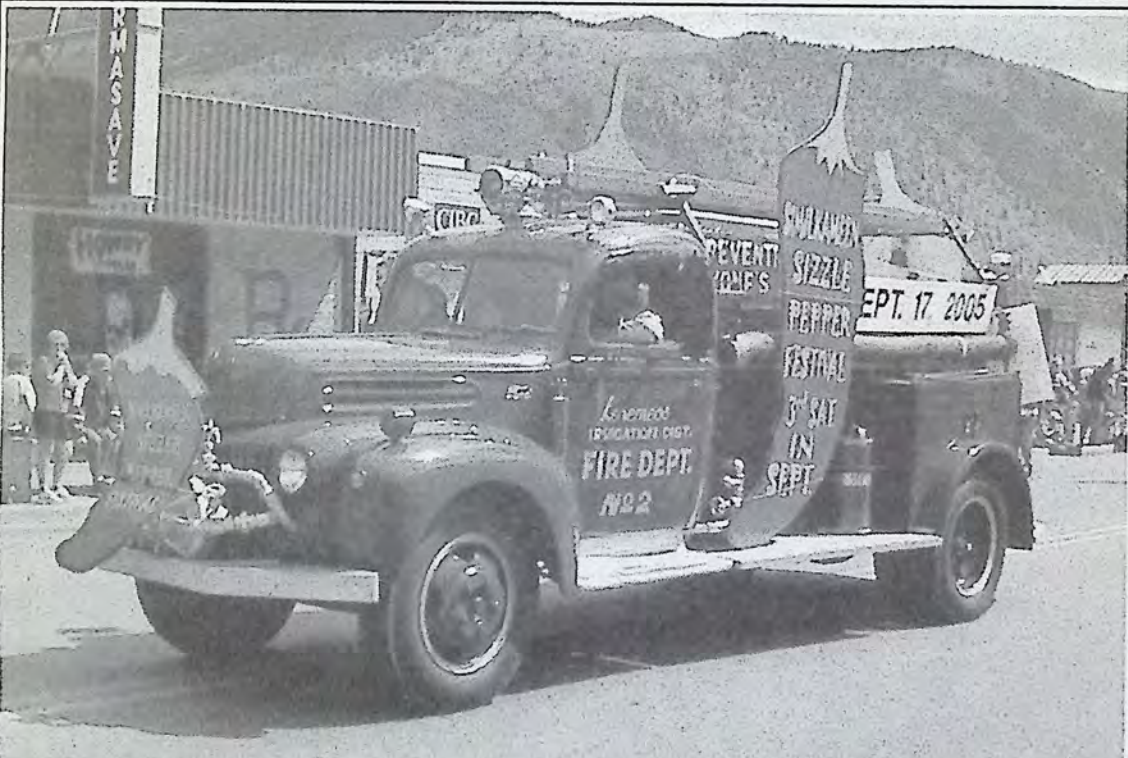

- 2 large eggs

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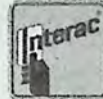

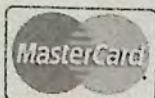

Good government starts here

For the first time in decades, we have good government.

You may think, "The old girl's lost her mind" when you read that statement, but I believe the best government is one with a slim majority, and that is what we have now.

When one political party dominates our government, then we might just as well live in a dictatorship. That is what we have had in the past and those days are gone for the next four years. Good for us - this is democracy.

There is another aspect of the new government that the Liberals will have to address: the rural ridings. It is no accident that the NDP gained back their seats in predominantly rural ridings. The Liberals tore the guts out of rural areas of B.C. They closed courts, reduced hospital services, cut government services, and increased fees for campgrounds and other recreational activities, from which rural ridings gain tourist income.

This attack on rural British Columbia meant a reduction in service businesses at the local level. Let me give you an example. An elderly couple was forced to make an emergency trip to the Okanagan because the services one of them required are not available at the local hospital. The whole event cost them around \$100. As a result, they had to cut back on spending for food and non-essentials at their local stores.

Here is another example. A young couple, with few resources, was forced to live with relatives in another community to await the birth of their first child. Where do you think they spent what money they had?

There are some advantages to having a long memory. I can recall when a couple could get a divorce in Princeton without having to travel to Penticton. Yes, we had county court here. Where do you think couples spend their money when they go to Penticton for divorce proceedings?

Only four years ago, we had court twice a month. Now we have court once every two months, and the backlog of cases is appalling. I hear people complain about certain crooks still out wandering our streets, committing more crimes,

and still not sentenced. The backlog is the reason.

It was not so long ago that we had a fully staffed Forest Service office in Princeton.

I can remember a time, not so many years ago, when surgery was performed at our local hospital. Not just removing slivers - major surgery, done well. Now, a lot of people have to move to the city to receive the kind of continuing care they need.

Every time people travel out of town, or have to move, they drain money from our economy, and we share that experience with every rural community in B.C.

Premier Campbell is going to have to face the new polarity in B.C. - urban versus rural.

Rural people produce most of the money-making resources of B.C., but most of the money is spent in cities. This injustice must be stopped. Campbell balanced his budget on the backs of rural citi-

zens who produce the wealth.

Let me tell younger folk about a government that did things differently. The leader was W.A.C. Bennett. He enhanced the Interior of B.C. and the province thrived. When he came into office, there were hardly more than 100 miles of paved road in the entire province. His government built roads, schools, hospitals, and infrastructure of all kinds. The cities did not suffer, and the rural communities grew like grass.

Those of us who know history well will recall how Rome became weak: all of the resources went to Rome, and the rural citizens who had made the empire strong were ignored and impoverished. They became easy marks for the overthrow of the empire.

The world is full of archaeological remains of cities. Cities cannot survive without a strong rural support system. This is a truth none of us can afford to ignore.
