## Police release names

The names of the men who died in a head-on collision West of Princeton on Highway 3 have been released.

19-year old Christopher Miller of North Vancouver, David Dryburgh Stevens, 18, of North Vancouver and 19-year old Mohammad Reza Mirhosseini of West Vancouver were all killed June 12th.

The westbound car, driven by Miller, crossed into the oncoming lane and into an Eastbound semi truck. The accident occurred around 5:30 that evening.

Two more passengers were airlifted to Royal Columbian Hospital in New Westminster. The semi truck driver was transported by ambulance to Princeton General Hospital.

The highway was closed for several hours.

## Splash Park coming in August

What started as a project for Grade 2 and 3 students at John Allison Elementary School has turned into an example of what can be done if you keep working towards a common goal.

The students had visited pen pals in Merritt on June 3rd of last year. In their travels there, they visited a 'splash park' and with the help of teachers Lorna Gregson and Kathy Froese, started writing letters requesting Town Council consider building a similar water park for local youth.

Some of their letters were published as Letters to the Editor in the June 22, 2004 News Leader.

This year, Grade 3 pupils had not forgotten the request, and set about planning what a splash park would do for local children and adults, as well as where it would go.

Rotary Park is the place the kids think would be best for a splash park because it is a safe area with a fence and public washrooms. It is downtown, close to shopping and would attract tourists. As well, it has shade and a playground.

Town Council had set aside \$42,000 for the project and with additional funds from Area H and the Community Forest Corporation, the \$84,000 cost will be covered.

Mayor Keith Olsen and Area H Director Gerri Logan attended a school assembly at John Allison School last Friday afternoon to announce the splash park plans.

The original letter writers were recognized for starting the campaign and all students in the school were presented with pins from the 2010 Games. The splash park is expected to be completed sometime in August of this year.

This year, the event went more smoothly and Preston said there might even be some money left over after bills are paid. Many people

from out of town were favourably impressed and asked if the association would present another event this year. The local group will give it some thought. Preston said no date has been set for Moto-X.

Princeton Motorsports Association was commended for an excellent clean-up following the event.

## Museum welcomes world

Visitors to Princeton's museum come from around the world. Last month, museum staff welcomed tourists from Switzerland, the Phillipines, England, Tasmania, Chile, Germany, and from Princeton, Montana (birthplace of Calamity Jane).

In addition to visitors from abroad, the number of local school pupils has increased. The museum was a field trip for 40 pupils from John Allison Elementary School in Princeton.

A total of 1,313 visitors were signed in during May, an increase over the 1,277 recorded during the same period last year. It is worth noting that 2004 set a record for museum visits. The increase in numbers was reflected in a slight increase in donations from visitors (admission to the museum is free of charge, but many people make small donations). The museum web site has recorded 1,000 hits.

Councillor Kathy Clement attended the June 14 Museum Society meet-

ing and presented the annual \$2,000 grant to the Museum Society.

The Town of Princeton has done a number of improvements to the building, including an upgrade of the alarm system and painting the door and window frames.

The Blakeburn Reunion will be held July 2 at the Legion Hall. Evelyn McCallum is registrar for the event. The Museum Society will be involved as Terry Melanchuk will do a book signing at the museum that day. Melanchuk is the author of "Blakeburn - B.C.'s Forgotten Ghost Town". He has sent a copy to the museum for its files.

A kiosk depicting the driving of the last spike of the Kettle Valley Railroad will be constructed along the old railbed, now the TransCanada Trail. The location of the kiosk will be near A&W, along the Similkameen River. The project was described to Museum Society members, who enthusiastically support the new development.

Two new faces were at the June 14

meeting: Nicole Bertrand, who is employed for the summer, and Rob Mills, President Nick Mills son, who is visiting the area from England.

Nick Mills said he had taken his son out to Granite Creek, and was dismayed at the condition of the site. Plans are being made to improve the area.

Museum members are being asked to do volunteer work on weekends to welcome tourists and show them around the museum. This is a pleasant task for volunteers, as they learn a lot from visitors.

Large signs advertising the museum have been ordered. One will be placed at the west end of town, and the other near the Tourist Information Centre at the east side of town.

The next meeting of the Museum Society will be held at the museum on July 12 at 2:30 p.m. These meetings are open to the public, and anyone wishing to become involved in museum activities is welcome to attend.

# Court discharges Priest

Father Frederick J. Haffey appeared in Provincial Court on June 16 to plead guilty to a mischief charge. This charge, and others related to it, were the result of an incident in which police saw two apparently inebriated men on the street and told them to go home.

When police checked 20 minutes later, one of the men had left but Father Haffey was still there. Some remarks were exchanged and police took Father Haffey to the Princeton lock-up. After being placed in a cell, Father Haffey began yelling and screaming, and flooded his cell by stuffing a pillow in the toilet and a blanket in the sink.

Father Haffey complained he was ill and needed medication, but would not say what medication he

needed. Eventually, police found he had passed out on the floor. His skin was hot to the touch, so an ambulance was called and the priest was taken to the hospital.

Father Haffey's defense counsel gave an account of the priest's life both as a civilian priest and military chaplain, serving many communities in Canada and abroad. Father Haffey was raised in Princeton and returned in 1998 following his retirement from military service. He served two years in Princeton then became an itinerant priest for a few years, returning to Princeton between assignments.

In his defense, his lawyer said Father Haffey has medical problems, including high blood pressure. He said Father Haffey panicked in the cell and passed out.

Father Haffey told the court he doubted he would have been charged if the press had not come to him and published his story.

Judge Sinclair made a remark to the effect that Father Haffey had acquired "a taste for the grape", but gave the aging priest an absolute discharge.

# Drivers lose licence

In Provincial Court in Princeton on June 16, James M. Bernard, age 40, lost his right to drive for one year after pleading guilty to a charge of having more than .08 blood alcohol while having care and control of his vehicle. He was ordered to pay a \$600 fine.

Owen G. Matkovich, a Kelowna resident, pled guilty to the same crime. Local police found him on February 19, 2005, sitting in his vehicle in Princeton with an open can of beer in his possession. He received a \$600 fine and one year driving prohibition.

Randolph Morris, age 19, was apprehended on March 12, 2005, by police patrolling Bridge Street. He had no prior convictions, and swore this would be his last. Judge Sinclair ordered a \$600 fine and one year driving prohibition.

Correspondence, Bylaws, Reports, Accounts Payable, New Business and Public Question Period finished the meeting.

Village Council made alterations to the order of business at the June 6th meeting following the first three readings of Bylaw No. 693, 2005 - known as the Procedure Bylaw.

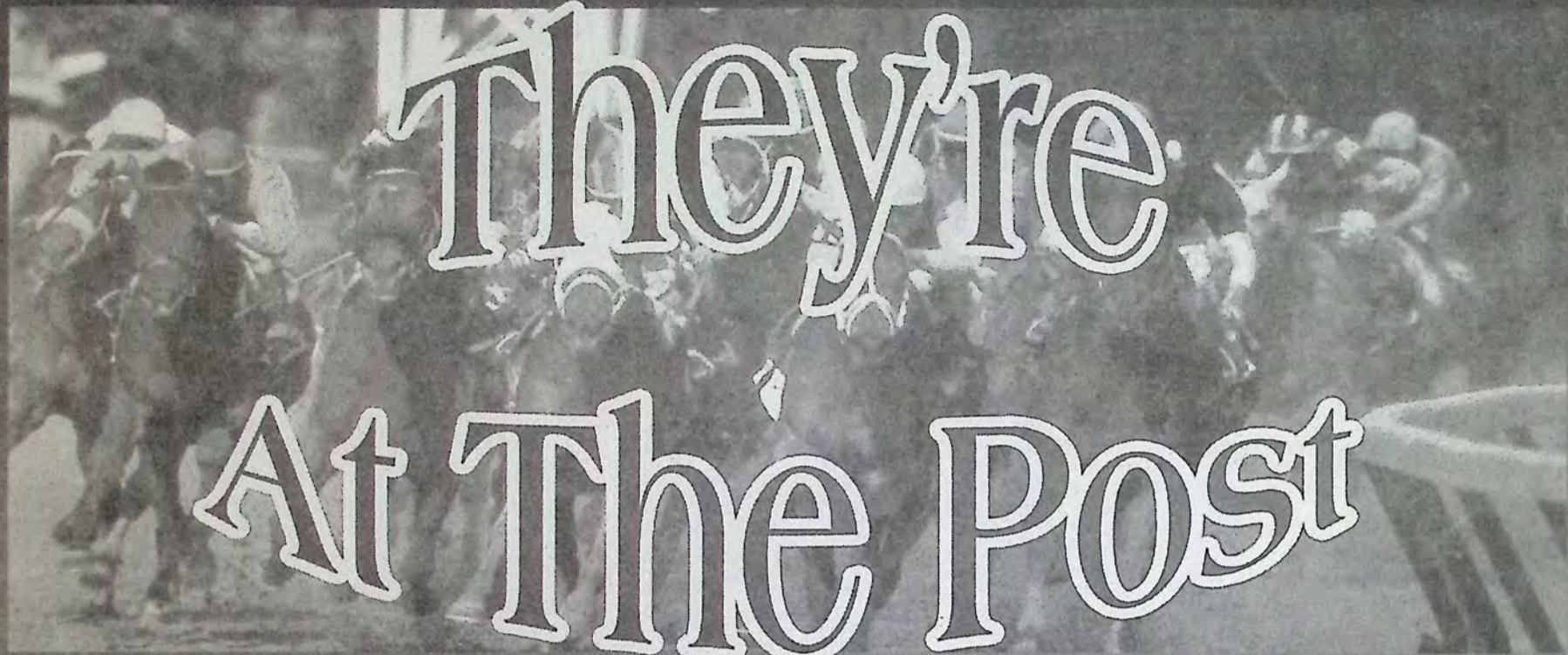

Various types and strengths of insect repellents work for different lengths of time. Some people like citronella or lavender oils but they are not too effective and act for only 1/2 to 2 hours. Products containing DEET work best and longest. Those with 30% DEET give protection for 6 hours and are still the best insect repellents. For best effect, the repellents should be reapplied after that time.

One further reminder about DEET, for use in children and infants, use only products containing 10% DEET or less. The product should not be applied to infants less than 6 months old.

Only 2% of lung cancer cases are caused by environmental or genetic factors. That leaves 98% of lung cancers caused by cigarette smoking. Lung cancer is the most preventable form of cancer.

Couples who are having trouble conceiving a child might try avoiding alcohol. Risk of miscarriage was much higher in alcohol users than abstainers. This also applies to the man, too. Alcohol can find its way to the semen which can affect the ability to conceive.

# Understanding Hepatitis C

What are the health issues associated with HCV?

Hepatitis literally means inflammation of the liver. There are various causes of liver inflammation including exposure to liver-toxic drugs or chemicals, alcohol abuse and viral causes including the Hepatitis A, B, C, D, E and G viruses, the herpes simplex virus, cytomegalovirus and Epstein-Barr virus. Hepatitis may cause acute and chronic symptoms ranging from fatigue to loss of appetite and nausea to headaches and joint pain. More seriously, viral Hepatitis may result in accelerated hepatocyte (liver cell) degeneration that can lead to liver cancer, cirrhosis, liver failure and death.

However, everyone who is infected with the Hepatitis C virus does not develop liver injury. And even those with very high viral loads do not necessarily develop liver disease, since HCV infection does not impair liver function in some individuals. The virus evokes a vigorous immune response in those affected that can be self-destructive. It is believed that the state of health of ones immune system at the time of the initial exposure and infection largely determines the course of the disease. Other factors such as genetics, environment (food, water, air and stress) and other lifestyle factors all play a role in the ultimate pathogenicity of HCV. (Pathogenicity refers to the ability of the virus to cause tissue damage

and metabolic dysfunction over time.)

What is so misleading about this disease, especially for those affected, is that symptoms may not be obvious for years, even decades. For this reason HCV is often called an indolent virus. It is relatively slow to replicate itself within the hosts cells, which is why symptoms manifest slowly. By the time symptoms show up, permanent damage may have resulted. It is common however, for vague symptoms to go totally unnoticed by doctors and under-appreciated by those infect-

ed. Symptoms such as chronic fatigue, joint or muscle aches, pains and difficulty concentrating are just a few examples that can be precipitated by the virus, but are not emphasized or focused on because non-infected persons may also have these complaints. It is always best to consider the constellation of symptoms (patient complaints) and signs (what the doctor can observe) in the context of the disease when considering their relative importance. After all, quality of life is always important...to be continued.

Have you thought about skin cancer while enjoying the sunshine? Have you thought about the high number of people who suffer from skin cancer on their scalps? It is true that your hair is no real protection against the sun's rays, and if you are bald, you have no protection at all if you are not wearing a hat.

A broad-brimmed straw hat is the best protection for head and face, and the back of your neck, in direct sunlight. Straw hats "breathe", making your head feel cooler by shading and allowing the sweat to evaporate. If you feel really hot, dip your straw hat into water for a few minutes and put it back on your head. The evaporation from the wet straw will cool your head.

**Here's another heat safety tip:**

Many athlete's have died from heart attacks brought on by excessive heat within the body. This syndrome begins with a hot day, high-energy activity, and lack of cool water. What happens is this: the body cannot reduce its temperature on the INSIDE. When the internal temperature climbs, it stops the heart.

Drink plenty of cool water or other drinks. **Warning:** when you are very hot and thirsty, do not drink a very cold drink quickly. You will faint, and could be seriously hurt. Sip the cold drink slowly. Try to avoid ice cubes except to rub them on your forehead and the back of your neck.

Finally, when you begin to feel too hot and the sweat is pouring off you, take a break in the shade. Heat stroke can be deadly.

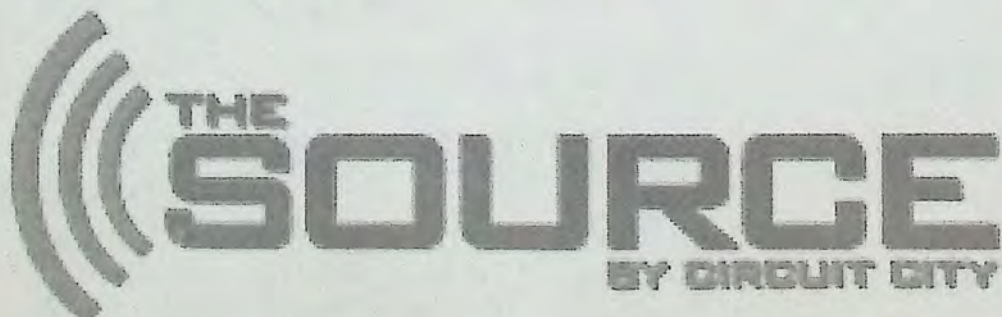

## What was Racing Days the first time?

The first Racing Days was held July 15, 16 & 17, 1965, after the formation of the Racing Days Association in October, 1964. The first objective of the association was to "assist, develop and foster community spirit" and to create an annual celebration for the town.

Main organizer of the weekend celebration was the late Ernie Walsh, with special commendation given to the late Rudy Kozak and the late William "Pinky" Foster, and Carl Stenvold. Enthusiastic booster, Laurie Currie, later became known as "Mr. Racing Days" due to his long association with the organization of the races.

The biggest project was building the track, turning rough ground into a racetrack, using volunteer labour and equipment. Princeton Light Horse Club members took over this project with the help of many community volunteers.

Princeton Rotary Club put on the parade (they still do!) while local "elders" repaired and refurbished

the Welby Stage for the parade. The stage coach, now the only authentic stage coach in Canada, is housed in a coach house on the grounds of Princeton Museum.

The selection of a Racing Days Queen received the support of Princeton Secondary School Student Council. The coronation of the queen took place at the old school on Vermilion Avenue (Princeton Plaza area) in the auditorium. Edna Boulet was the first Princeton Racing Days Queen. A big dance followed, admission \$1.50.

The first Similkameen Cup winner was Man o' Mark, (\$350 purse) owned by Bob Elliott of Vancouver. He promised to come back the next year, as did many other racehorse owners.

Their intention would be prophetic: Racing Days went on, year after year, until there were not enough horses to fill the racing program.

The first races included a Pony Express race. Glen Sellers of Princeton won it, followed by R. Sahara (Merritt) and Alfred Webster (Princeton). Alf Webster has spent a lifetime racing horses. So has Jack Powell, who had a stock horse winner named Poco at the first Racing Days.

The first Racing Days held a pancake breakfast at Frosty's, a fast food business located across from the Chevron station (now a paint supply business). The Elks featured a huge bingo with \$800 in prize money. The big game boasted a \$500 jackpot!

A "Gayway" was set up on the school grounds. Rotarians built and manned many booths, where everyone could play skill games such as ring toss, softball throw, and so on, to win prizes.

The event was a huge success, and in later years, would see additions in some activities, and other activities reduced. In the 20th anniversary year, Racing Days featured a dance and casino night, river raft race, a footrace from Coalmont, a pancake breakfast, a golf tournament, a ball tournament, a parade and coronation, and the races, of course.

### The commercial side

Although service clubs formed the backbone of the volunteers for the first (and most) Racing Days celebrations, the business and industry sector of Princeton and area threw themselves into the celebration. They put entries in the parade, they sponsored races, gave prizes to the winning Queen Candidate, and dressed the windows of their shops and their storefronts so no visitor was in any doubt that this town was the place to be that weekend.

This support continued throughout the history of Racing Days until the 1980's, when business people began to feel less inclined to become part of the spirit of the celebration.

This was an unfortunate trend, as the celebration had been created to promote Princeton, and it worked. Before Racing Days, Princeton was a depressed area. After Racing Days began, the town began to grow and thrive. More people came here, invested, and joined in the fun.

Compared to the Princeton of the first Racing Days, the Princeton of today is much more attractive, and looks far more prosperous. Whether it has the same kind of community spirit is something to be tested this year as the town emerges from three years of no horse racing celebration weekend.

### Shopping cart wars

It has been an interesting week.

A parking lot incident pretty much occupied our minds in what was slowly developing into a very interesting piece of investigative journalism.

The story: the News Leader Office Administrator was shopping. When she had loaded the News Leader 'News Cruiser' with her purchases and delivered the shopping cart a short distance from the vehicle - it happened.

A gust of wind propelled the shopping cart into another parked vehicle. The owner of a vehicle hit by yet another shopping cart at that very same moment filed a claim with ICBC for \$200 damage.

Since the News Leader 'News Cruiser' is an easily recognized vehicle, the finger was pointed at us.

Our investigation determined two deciding factors. Had the shopping cart still contained purchased items, then responsibility would have been laid on the News Leader. The fact that the cart was empty meant that it was no longer the responsibility of the News Leader.

However, since the shopping cart was not put away in its 'shopping cart parking space' the decision was not clear. The wind kind of helped matters.

We were amazed how much time was wasted on such a small detail. We were equally amazed that ICBC spent so much time on this considering neither vehicles touched each other.

Our concern rested with the decision. Had the News Leader been held responsible we saw a whole can of worms opening. What if you are driving in a parking lot and a gust of wind blows a roof shingle off the store, hits your vehicle and then strikes another? Are you at fault because it hit your car last?

What if you witness a hit and run accident and can't identify the vehicle other than it was black? Are all car owners driving near the scene in black vehicles responsible? Of course not, but you get the idea.

ICBC did say there could have been a claim as the shopping cart was not returned to its holding pen.

So, remember, when shopping and using a shopping cart, put it back where it belongs.

And that's not a bunch of hot air.

### Our friend Sherida needs a hand

Dear Editor;

My name is Sherida Crane, for those of you that don't know or remember me, I am currently completing a spring semester at the University of Winnipeg. I am 19.5 credits away from completing my degree in Conflict Resolution.

I have a problem, and I am hoping someone in the Native and Non-native community can assist me and/or give me some ideas. I have four children, Ashala(16), Mary-Rose(8), Emma (6), Willy(3) and they all are living full-time with their father and step-mother on Okanagan Indian reserve, near Vernon British Columbia.

As it stands I receive post-secondary funding from my reserve, Siksika Nation in Alberta. I receive single person funding from them which is eight hundred dollars a month, (\$800.00). My rent is four hundred and fifty dollars a month, (\$450.00), plus hydro, and phone bill, and food.

I also have to pay for automobile insurance etc, unfortunately it has been impossible to save money.

I finish my last exam June 31st, and will start my last year of studies in September.

I miss my children terribly, and I know they miss me. Currently my band has no travel funds. I choose the University of Winnipeg, not on a whim, but because it was the only place I could receive a BA in Conflict Resolution in Canada, other than a university in Ontario. There are no Conflict Resolution BA programs in British Columbia, and Alberta. I have a GPA standing of 3.5. I have been working hard.

I come from a back ground of alcoholism, family violence, and sexual abuse.

I have had to work hard at changing my own abusive patterns, and believe me I have worked hard at changing my life,( it seems to be a work in progress). I do not want to be stuck on the welfare cycle.

I don't come from BC, and my children are used to their BC S'quix father, and relatives, so my life will have to remain in British Columbia.

Once I complete university it is my hope that I can receive permanent employment after graduation to be able to buy my own home in the Similkameen area since I will live off my ex-husband's reserve. My children, and I love the Similkameen!

Unfortunately I have no relatives in British Columbia other than my children.

I want to desperately spend July and August with my children in BC. I have not seen them since Christmas.

As it stands, I have no travel funds, ie gas money, and no money to pay rent let alone damage deposit. In order to apply for social assistance I would have to be a resident of BC for at least a month, and wait thirty days before I could even see a social assistance worker.

I am looking for a low-rental house and/or apartment to rent in the Similkameen/Cawston/Hedley area just for JULY AND AUGUST.

The landlord has to be extremely understanding until I can receive rent from SA or another source.

It is a complicated matter, and I am hoping that someone can help me, and or present some ideas. Please feel free to reply to me at the following email: calchild@yahoo.com, and or phone 204- 783-9219.

I'm hoping to leave this July 1st and head to BC.

Fun week is coming to Princeton again. It is called Racing Days.

I am so glad to see horse racing back in Princeton this year. There is a special thrill I get when the announcer shouts, “And there they go!” My pulse quickens and I feel excited, and it has nothing to do with how much I bet.

Yes, I admit it – I often put money on a nag at Princeton’s races. I have won some big purses, thanks to Sage Thyme, Cutie Rosebud and Washington Lady, but I’ve missed out by a nose on some other big wins. Most of the time, I feel content just to break even.

Like so many Princeton residents, I learned all about horse racing and wagering right here at Princeton’s racetrack. I had a good teacher – my father. He learned about horse racing when he lived near Melbourne, Australia, where it was a major pastime. My dad had a way with horses, and a good eye. He always made money at the track, but he bet just for the fun of it, not to make a bundle. That became my attitude, too, and it was a good thing, because I never had as good an eye for horses as he did. However, we never say we’re losers, we just say we’re “feeding the horses”. I have fed a lot of horses through the years.

Racing Days was never just about horse races. Although horse racing is part of our heritage, and a lot of good racehorses have been raised in our area, the races were always part of a bigger celebration.

The races started with our native people, who raced horses here more than 100 years ago, and in just about the same location. My grandmother told me, “Our people (the Similkameens) had ranches here before the white man came.”

The ranches raised horses. They raced horses. As horses were the main form of transportation, horses were in big demand, and a fast horse was considered a good horse.

When the European and Chinese settlers came, they needed good horses, too, and they raised and raced horses, and bought stock from the Similkameens.

The festivities surrounding the races, including betting, continued from the native people to the settlers. Eventually, Princeton

became well-known for its racing stock, and maintained its reputation throughout the twentieth century.

With the coming of the 21st century, horse racing began to fade away, and we thought those days had gone forever. Wrong!

This year, I probably won’t see much of the races, nor place any bets, because I will be working in the concession, serving hamburgers and hot dogs. It’s my little contribution to making the event a success. Others are doing much more than I. The sponsorships for the race purses show a real community spirit and the sponsors deserve our gratitude. Without the

purses, the horse owners won’t come, and without horses, there are no races. Been there, done that!

There is more to the weekend than races. Organizations put on events to make the weekend full of fun. You can see a parade on Canada Day, you can go to a pancake breakfast or a golf tournament, and you can buy a ticket on a duck race. You can see our Youth Ambassadors chosen and meet them at other events. You can go dancing. You can listen to a bluegrass band. Some people will go to a reunion.

We can have fun at Racing Days. We always have.

Fine comes from lack of attention

*Please Note the Home Owner Grant Application must be completed for each and every year in which you are eligible for the Grant.*

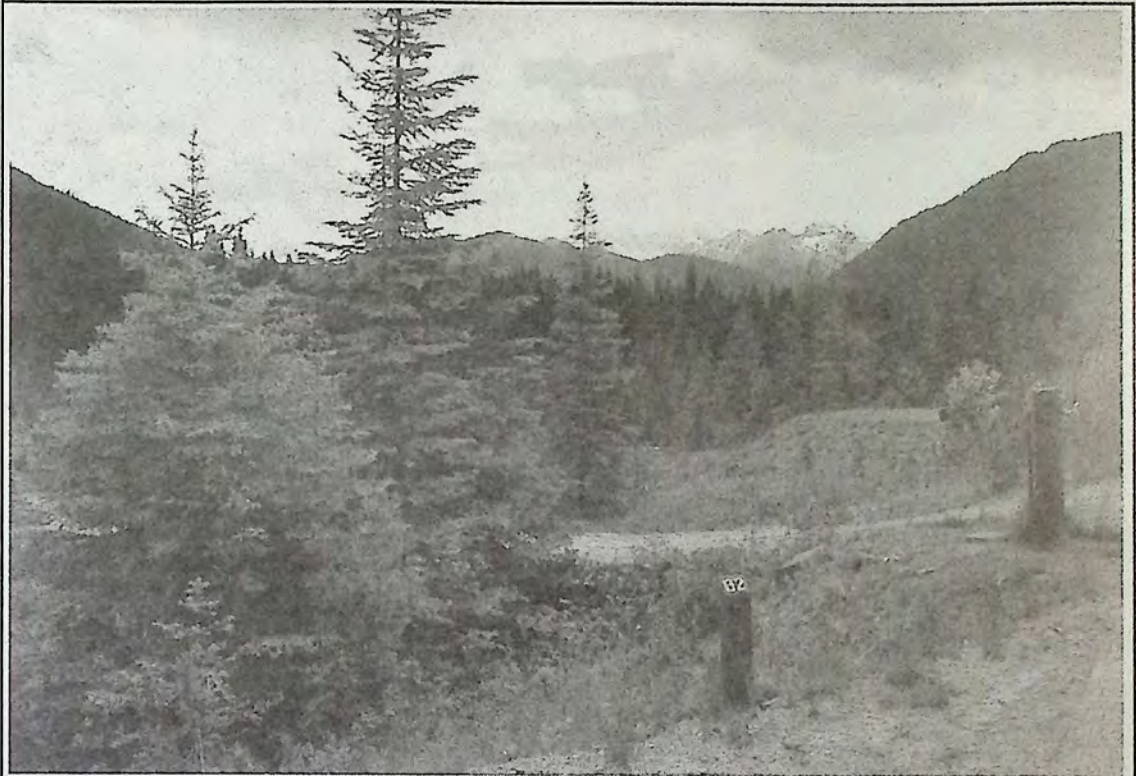

## Reduction project gaining ground

The Ministry of Water, Land and Air Protection implemented a fuel reduction project in Manning Park last December.

A number of partners are involved in the project, including Ministry of Forests, Gibson Pass Resort Inc., BC Hydro, Ministry of Transportation, Upper Similkameen Indian Band and Eastgate Fire Protection Society.

The partnership hosted an open house June 11th to review the project and provide anyone interested in a tour of some of the work completed as part of the fuel reduction project.

A Fire Management Plan was developed in 2001 with the project team established in 2004. The group has met monthly since April 2004.

The project has two objectives: to

reduce the risk to human life and property by removing hazard trees near developments and reducing the fuel complex to prevent catastrophic wildfires and for ecological restoration.

From 1981 to 2000 a total of 10,000 trees were removed from Manning Park. The Mountain Pine Beetle epidemic had to be addressed and in 2002 trees were removed from three campgrounds. To date over \$250,000 has been spent on fuel reduction.

Two major elements are being focused on with this project. The Mountain Pine Beetle epidemic has killed so many lodgepole pine trees that it has added far too much fuel - in the form of dead trees - to the existing parkland.

Fire Ecology is also an element of concern. Forest fires are going to happen every year and the increased fuel created by the

Mountain Pine Beetle has brought the need for this fuel management program, implemented for public safety by creating fuel breaks. The 'fire guards' are a precaution taken to reduce the risk of wildfire.

You've probably heard talk every Summer of the 'big fire' expected to wipe out Manning Park.

The Manning Fuel Reduction Program will eliminate that from every taking place by managing the risk.

WLAP Ecosystem Biologist Judy Millar took the News Leader on a private guided tour of the Hampton Campground area in Manning Park. She referred to the closed campsites as the worst hit location in the park, which required extreme action.

Bug killed trees were removed leaving some of the campsites bare and without shade. A couple of .....continued on Page 25

locations had wide swathes cut through them.

"This is the type of area we'll be putting in deciduous trees as it will be replanted."

Although the sites looks less than attractive from a campers perspective, Millar says it's only a temporary sight.

"In five years you may not notice this as a bare spot. It'll be open but it won't be bare."

Part of the reduction plan is to not remove every dead tree from Manning Park. A priority protocol has been developed in deciding what trees go and what trees stay.

"We're looking at fire protection."

Treatments emulating natural processes were used wherever possible, while tree removal was used where it was considered to be the most appropriate treatment option. There were a few burn piles used

at the Hampton site, with all marketable wood removed. The remaining fuel was burned off during February of this year.

"I view this area as a place for people to recreate so their safety is first," Millar pointed out.

Ecological concerns also play a large role in how the fuel reduction program attacks certain areas of Manning Park.

The Hampton Campground presented an interesting challenge.

"Because of the fuel load here a fire would burn so intense that it would sterilize the soil."

This is one of the reasons why fuel reduction is required and often includes the use of prescribed burns of designated areas.

Other areas at Hampton saw a form of selected logging where just the bug killed trees were removed, often cut to a 20-centimetre stump, and the surrounding area virtually untouched.

Millar says the main thrust of the program at this point is focused on keys areas.

"We're looking at high risk areas only. Blackwall, Lightning Lakes, the Highway Corridor and the Resort area."

There are plans in place for a total of four fuel breaks in the Region with one of them to be placed outside the park. These fuel breaks will greatly reduce any chance of a wildfire causing extreme damage to Manning Park.

Statistics show that the majority of wildfires in British Columbia are people caused, so remember, be careful in the forests this Summer and report any wildfires you see.

## Threats bring fine

## Harassment leads to court

On Friday, June 17, Judge G. Sinclair heard the story of Dave A. Stromquist, of Quesnel, who was answering to a charge of criminal harassment.

He had worked for a local rancher, and when the job was finished at the end of the summer of 2003, he moved to Quesnel, but he continued to contact the rancher.

He sent letters, e-mails and gifts, despite her telling him to leave her alone.

In answering to the charge, Stromquist said he would never do the rancher harm.

He read a long, impassioned speech about his good character, occasionally gulping back tears.

The judge ordered a one year peace bond with the condition Stromquist is not to contact the rancher nor any members of her immediate family.

If he breaches the bond, he will have to pay \$1,000.

## Gouk responds to Gattrell's letter

Dear Editor:

This is in response to Gary Gattrell's letter, "Reader fires one at Gouk," which was published in your June 14th edition. It seems that the fundamental premise of Mr. Gattrell was that I was using my mailing privileges to campaign against the NDP. In actual fact, the survey that went to the Similkameen area was one of six mailings sent throughout the riding covering such topics as definition of marriage, child pornography, the firearms registry and various justice issues. The true intention of the mailings was to determine from constituents whether or not the position that I and my party had taken on various issues was on track with local opinion. This is a necessary process if one is to truly represent the wishes of constituents. Ironically, Mr. Gattrell may be one of those who would also be quick to complain if I didn't seek constituents' opinions. You just can't win with some people.

For Mr. Gattrell's information, most of my federal riding has always been NDP except for the previous provincial election when the entire province was anxious to kick the NDP out of office after they had spent two terms in Victoria proving just how badly they could run our province. I can assure Mr. Gattrell that very few of the many constituents who have returned my questionnaires selected NDP as the party that best represents their views.

Mr. Gattrell asked why I didn't mention the Liberals' purchase of Belinda Stronach or their attempted purchase of Gurmant Grewal. The answer to that is that those

events hadn't occurred at the time I prepared the surveys. It takes quite a bit of time for writing, camera ready prep for the printers, and then the actual printing, shipping and distribution by mail of this material. Beyond that, these blatant examples of vote buying had nothing to do with the subject of the questionnaire he is reacting to.

Obviously an NDP supporter, Mr. Gattrell suggests incorrectly that Jack Layton got \$4 billion for social programs. In fact, nothing could be further from the truth. Plainly, Jack was out-manuevered by a cagey Prime Minister. While a spending commitment of 4.6 billion dollars for items from urban transportation to foreign aid was made, there are no details as to how that money would be spent. This is a favourite Liberal tactic of creating slush funds that can be spent without further scrutiny or consultation in vote buying tactics that support little except the Liberal Party of Canada. In actual fact, the NDP played right into the Liberals hands. Jack Layton wasn't bought -- he was simply rented for a few weeks to enable the Liberals to complete their own political agenda. Mr. Gattrell's claim that the gas tax rebate wouldn't have happened under a Conservative government is totally false and I suspect he knows that. It is our party that has pushed for this fuel tax funding. I am on record as far back as 1996 with then-Finance Minister Paul Martin pushing this very issue.

In a final shot, Mr. Gattrell asks what responsible person needs a gun for their business? Many very responsible community members own and use firearms for recreational purposes. This includes

such activities as hunting, trap and skeet shooting and other firearms competitions and recreational pursuits. Law-abiding citizens are not the problem when it comes to firearms, yet that's where the billion dollars firearms registry takes aim. Too bad the Liberals and NDP cant seem to understand that.
