**Dry  
forests  
prompt  
patrols**

Dry forests and a recent rash of human-caused wildfires mean forest officials will step up patrol efforts.

Fire wardens in all Fire Zones within the Kamloops Fire Centre area will patrol forests looking for compliance with campfire regulations and watching for signs of smoke from a wildfire.

In addition, Forest District Compliance and Enforcement staff will be on standby should their assistance with patrols be needed.

Although campfires for warmth and food preparation are still permitted in the Kamloops Fire Centre, fire officials are urging the public to use extreme caution while recreating in forested areas.

With the current dry conditions, a carelessly tossed cigarette, sparks from a chainsaw, or a hot exhaust pipe coming in contact with dry grass, all have the potential to start a wildfire.

So far this year, 75 percent of fires have been human-caused.

The Forest Service appreciates the public's assistance in reporting and detecting wildfires. To report a wildfire, call 1-800-663-5555 or \*5555 on most cellular networks.

A shortage of volunteers has been hurting many local clubs, groups and organizations over the past few years.

One such group is appealing to the people of Princeton for a hand.

Princeton's Minor Hockey Association has been kept afloat by a handful of dedicated parents who are running out of gas.

"We're at the point now where parents on the executive have had enough and nobody is jumping in to help," Treasurer Jeanie Williams says.

The hockey program, which had a total of almost 100 players involved last year, is run by a total of 14 people.

The top priority at the moment is volunteers to help in the concession stand. Minor Hockey has operated the food service as a way to offset ice fees. The effort of the concession staff has made enrolling in the Minor Hockey Program much cheaper for local parents.

"Without two or three more people helping in the concession, we can't open the doors."

These people have to come forward by the end of the month so the association can plan the next season.

Coaches are also needed to help carry the load.

"There's always a shortage of dads," Williams says.

The shortage results in too much work spread over too few volunteers.

"We've had it, we're tired."

It's far too commonplace these days. The Princeton Posse struggled last year with a lack of volunteers as has most every other group in Princeton.

In the case of Minor Hockey, new parents are encouraged to participate and offer not only volunteer support, but input as new, fresh ideas are welcome.

## PXA hears racing success story

At the August 9 meeting of Princeton Exhibition Association (PXA), members heard a story of Princeton Racing Days' success. The race meet was covered in a national newspaper for people in the horseracing world, and the article had nothing but good to say about the race meet and the volunteers. All of this free publicity reflected well on the people of Princeton. (Highlights from the article are printed elsewhere in this edition of the News Leader.)

The idea of having a year-end appreciation dinner for all of the user groups has been discussed at two meetings, but no decision was made.

The concept, first proposed by John Bey, would pool the resources of user groups who now have appreciation dinners independently. It would give PXA members and members of all user groups an opportunity to get

together and learn about each other's activities and perspectives, and it would give volunteers and opportunity to gain more understanding of the role of the various groups. The matter was tabled until a future meeting.

A number of items arose in regard to the ag barn users, the new shower building, and electrical service, but the major change to the grounds is planned by the Rodeo Club. They will improve the pens back of the chutes, and Stan Thompson wanted to know if they could build VIP bleachers overtop the chutes. This poses a problem by blocking some view of the racetrack backstretch, and there was a question of whether the racing stewards would approve loss of view even for the few seconds. The present rodeo and motorsports announcer's stands block some view of the backstretch, but only for a couple

of seconds of the race. This matter was tabled to the September 13 meeting.

John Bey advised members he is working with Michael McLaughlin, economic development officer, to obtain sources of funding grants for improvements to the fairgrounds, and is re-applying to the gaming commission for a grant.

Jody Woodford reported work progressing on building #1 in preparation for the Fall Fair, which will take place September 10 & 11. Three work parties have been held in the past month. Members painted tables and display equipment, and Woodford and Peter Ruoss worked on painting the floor in building #1. Work is being done to improve the appearance of building #2 as well. Ruoss has done the repairs to the "saloon" area which was damaged in a wind storm last month.

promotional tools such as signage, brochures and websites; and events and capital projects directly related to tourism development.

Ineligible projects include any project that directly duplicates an existing tourism initiative.

For example: operational costs for existing programs.

The Regional District of Okanagan Similkameen has a maximum entitlement of \$84,860.43.

Princeton qualifies for \$15,000.00 and Keremeos earns \$15,000.00.

## ArtsNow begins survey

The ArtsNow committee has hired Sue LePoidevin to conduct a survey to determine what local people see as a lack in the arts and cultural activities in the Princeton area. LePoidevin will interview 100 residents of both town and Area H. When the surveys are completed, the committee will analyze the data

in order to decide what sort of project would be most suitable for the 2010 Legacy program funded by the provincial government. The one-page survey questionnaire will be available only from LePoidevin, who will be contacting people in the area during the next few weeks.

## Driver pleads guilty


A 20 year old Princeton woman appeared in Provincial Court on August 11 to plead guilty to a charge of driving with more than .08 blood alcohol. Jennifer Clevan was apprehended after failing stop

at a stop sign. A reading of .120 was obtained during a breath test. She had no prior convictions. She was ordered to pay a \$600 fine and serve a one year driving prohibition.


## RCMP charge driver

On Thursday, August 11th police received a complaint of a possible impaired driver on Highway 3. The vehicle was spotted and the driver pulled off onto Darcy Mountain Road near the Golf Course. "The 35 year old male driver exhibited signs and symptoms of being under the influence of alcohol," says Princeton Detachment Commander Sgt. Kurt Lozinski. "The driver became argumentative and hostile with the investigating officer, and the driver was subsequently arrested and handcuffed for impaired driving." At the RCMP office, the male

was given the opportunity to provide a breath sample but refused. The 2005 Mercedes C240 was towed, and the investigating officer found out later that the driver had an Invalid Drivers Licence and is a Vehicle Impound Candidate. The vehicle also turned out to be a rental. "This driver faces charges of Impaired Driving, Refusal to Provide a Breath Sample, and was issued an Administrative Driving Prohibition as well as a 24-hour driving prohibition." The driver will appear in Court on October 13th to answer to the charges.

## Visitors flock to Keremeos

Statistics collected during the month of July at the Keremeos Visitor Information Centre are encouraging.

A total of 1,079 visitors were recorded over the course of 189 hours. Of those visitors, 130 were local residents, 467 were visitors from other parts of British Columbia, 166 from Alberta, 134 from elsewhere in Canada, 39 from Washington, 8 from California, 29 from other parts of the United States and Mexico, 87 from Europe, 12 from Asia/Australia and 7 other visitors.

Other stats collected during the month included how many nights visitors were spending in Keremeos.

A total of 514 said they were just there for the day while 176 had spent one night, 99 had been there for two nights, 69 had been in Keremeos for 3 nights, 65 reported staying a week, 20 said they were in the community for two weeks and 5 reported a longer stay.

Information requested from the Visitor Information Centre saw 215 asking for accommodation information, 244 interested in adventure recreation, 282 looking for attractions, 154 seeking events and conventions, 136 looking for food and beverages, 44 asking about transportation, 73 asking about shopping, 67 looking for parks, 7 had made First Nations enquires, 49 interested in community services, 35 investigating investment/moving information and 669 dropping in for site facilities.

The Visitor Information Centre, located in Memorial Park, is operated by Similkameen Country.

# Man jailed for threats

A 44 year old Princeton man appeared in Provincial Court in custody on August 11. Monty McIntyre pled guilty to pointing a firearm, uttering threats, and unauthorized possession of a firearm, all arising from an incident on March 12, as well as a further recent charge.

The gun incident occurred when McIntyre went to a friend's house to play cards. There was drinking involved. At one point, McIntyre's

"sometime" girlfriend left, and refused to allow him to go with her. This made him angry.

Later, he appeared with a bottle of sherry and a rifle, and said he was going to "kill that bitch". Another person attempted to stop him, and he pointed the rifle at this person's chest. That individual managed to grab the rifle and threw McIntyre out. As he was leaving, McIntyre said he had more rifles at home and would get one to shoot this person.

Police were called, and entered McIntyre's mother's home, where McIntyre was living. They found everyone asleep. Police arrested McIntyre and seized more guns.

The ensuing charge arose after McIntyre had been ordered not to contact the woman he threatened in March. On July 29, he was waiting in her house for her, and she reported him to police. He was picked up for breaching the conditions of his release.

McIntyre was contrite in court, and wept, admitting alcoholism was his biggest problem, and expressing hope that his jail term would help him beat the problem.

Judge G. Sinclair ordered four months in jail for the firearms charges, to be served concurrently, and an additional month for the breach, to be followed by a year on probation. McIntyre is to receive assessment and counselling for alcohol and substance abuse.

## Judge orders jail, probation

On August 11, in Provincial Court in Princeton, Donavin F. Costa, age 18, of Princeton, entered a guilty plea to a charge of trespassing.

A local police officer had awoken in the night to the sound of loud voices on the street. On looking out his window, he saw a man sneaking onto his property, approaching his house. The officer went to the door and the man ran away. Later,

the officer and another member of the RCMP saw the same man running in another area, and apprehended him. Costa was intoxicated at the time and was placed in cells. Costa claimed he had been chased by somebody brandishing a crowbar.

Costa had no prior convictions and was ordered to serve six months on probation.

## Judge orders big fine

Richard A. Van Skiver appeared in Provincial Court in Princeton on August 11 to plead guilty to an assault charge.

A Mr. Renaud had been outdoors when Van Skiver approached him and punched him in the face. Van Skiver then picked up a lawn chair and threw it at Renaud, missing,

and followed with another lawn chair, and missed again.

Renaud's girlfriend saw what was going on and called 911.

Van Skiver, age 42, had a record of convictions from the 1980's, and one from 2001.

He was ordered to pay a \$400 fine.

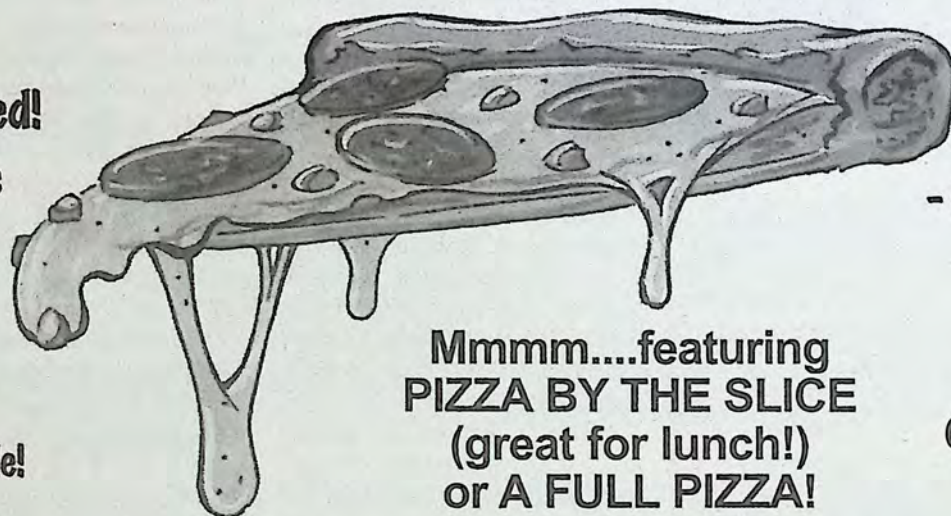

## Watch those pesky mosquitoes

So far, so good, report public health officials when it comes to the West Nile virus. While the virus has moved closer, it has not yet been identified in BC. Despite this good news, public health staff and local governments continue with mosquito control and monitoring programs - especially since the mosquitoes that carry the virus are quite common throughout the Interior Health region.

Over the past few years, we have seen West Nile virus move progressively across North America since it was first found in New York in 1999, reports Dr. Paul Hasselback, Senior Medical Health Officer for Interior Health. It has been found in every province except BC and Newfoundland and it has come as close as Washington and Idaho. So far we are fortunate that it has not yet arrived in BC, and we need to continue with prepara-

tions for the day it does.

As these mosquitoes may still be breeding through to the end of September, it is still important to take precautions to reduce mosquito breeding grounds. In addition, if you are travelling to areas where the virus has been identified, be sure to take steps to protect yourself and your family.

**Prevent mosquito breeding around your home and yard:**

- Remove any standing water on your property at least once a week, including sources like trays under flower pots, birdbaths, old tires, rainwater barrels, water on pool covers, eaves troughs, flat roofs, drain ditches, even low depressions in your lawn. Mosquitoes can breed in as little as a teaspoon of standing water

- Install proper fitting screens on your windows and doors to keep mosquitoes out

**Protect yourself and your family against mosquito bites:**

- Wear insect repellent with DEET to protect yourself when mosquitoes are out, usually at dusk and dawn. Be sure to follow the instructions on the label of all insect repellents, especially for children

- You may also try "Oil of Lemon Eucalyptus" in "Off Botanicals" as an alternative for those who don't want to wear DEET, but it is not long lasting. DEET is considered by authorities to be safe when used according to the label. Be sure to read all labels.

- Consider wearing light-coloured clothing, long sleeves, pants and a hat when outdoors - temperature permitting

- Avoid mosquito infested areas or consider staying indoors at dawn or dusk when the type of mosquito that carries West Nile Virus is most active.

## Understanding Hepatitis C

**How is HCV transmitted?**

Hepatitis C is transmitted through contact with infected blood. Intravenous drug users account for 60% of all new infections. A staggering 90% of IV drug users have the virus. The Hepatitis Branch of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommends getting tested for HCV if you've ever shot up drugs, even once, even 20 years ago.

People on hemodialysis, who received blood transfusions prior to 1992, prison inmates, babies born to HCV mothers (up to one in 16 get infected during birth) and intranasal cocaine users are other groups at very high risk for the infection.

The virus was also spread through dental equipment prior to the early 1990s when autoclave sterilization of instruments became mandatory. Health care providers such as phlebotomists, nurses and emergency medicine workers are also at high risk for coming into contact with infected blood.

According to a 1998 report released by the CDC, having multiple partners or already having a sexually transmitted disease also puts you into a high risk group that is believed to account for approximately one in every five new cases of HCV transmission.

However, transmission through intercourse in a monogamous long-term relationship is thought to be extremely low.

None of the above-mentioned risk factors are identified in as many as 10% of newly infected people.

This leaves open to suspicion other possible modes of transmission, such as medical and dental equipment and nail and hair salon tools.

One study demonstrated that ster-

ilized instruments used for endoscopic procedures such as cholangiography and colonoscopy infected hospitalized patients in the same ward as HCV carriers.

Sufficient disinfecting procedures and solution strength must be used

at all times to prevent the spread of HCV, the Hepatitis B virus and HIV. According to the CDC, the Hepatitis C virus is not believed to be transmitted by kissing, hugging, coughing, sneezing, casual contact, breastfeeding or mosquitoes.

The 36-year old male driver is well known to police and known to be a prohibited driver from past impaired driving charges.

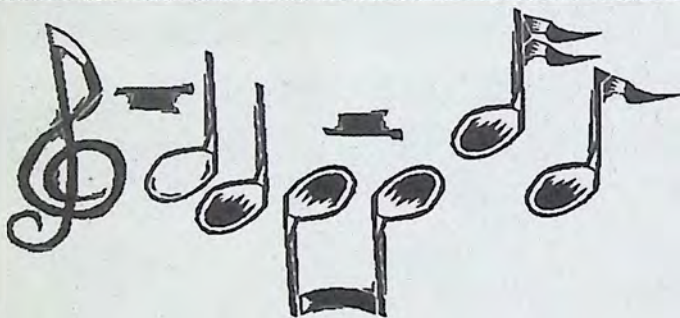

A lot of testimony was heard from everyone but Spahan, who said he had no memory of anything that occurred after he left the pub.

Judge G. Sinclair, after some deliberation, stated he believed it was "probable" that Spahan had committed the assault, but there were inconsistencies in testimony.

## Domestic dispute leads to Court

Police responded to a report of a domestic dispute and met resistance when they tried to persuade Kevin Loyer to come with them. Loyer appeared in Provincial Court in Princeton on August 11 to plead guilty to a charge of wilful obstruction of a peace officer.

Loyer had sworn at the police offi-

On attending the scene, police discovered the driver had a suspension on his licence. His vehicle was impounded.

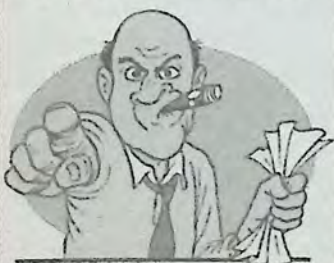

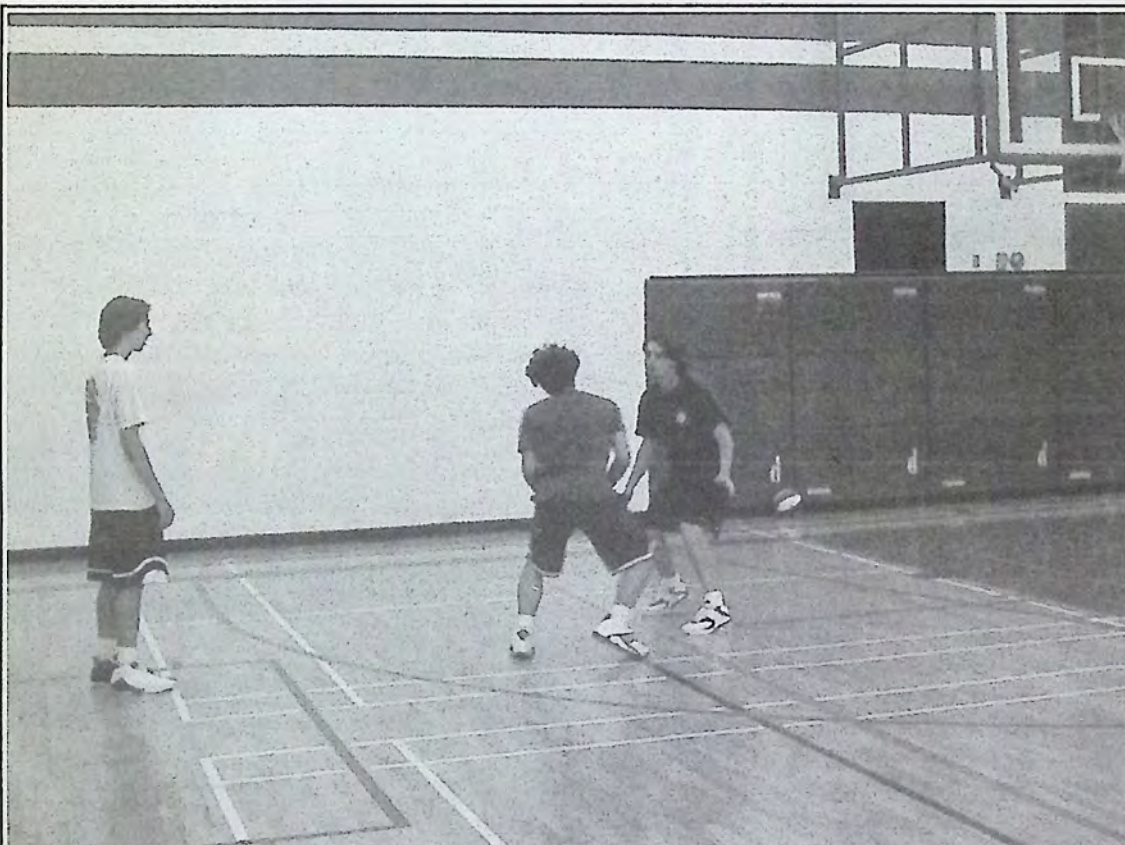

- 4 cups sugar
- 1 pkg. powdered pectin

Peel tangerine; discard white fibres. Cut tangerine sections into 3 pieces; remove seeds. There should be 3 1/2 cups prepared fruit. Place over high heat. Add powdered pectin and stir until mixture comes to a hard boil. Stir in sugar at once. Bring to a full rolling boil and boil hard for one minute, stirring constantly. Remove from heat; skim. Ladle quickly into sterilized jars. Paraffin at once. Makes about five 8-ounce glasses.

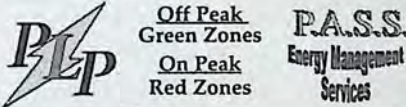

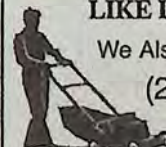

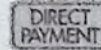

### Reader praises Princeton

Letter to The Editor:

Thank you, Princeton! When a boy became 16, he was cut off welfare during the Great Depression, so if their family was on welfare and couldn't afford to keep him, those boys went out on freight trains across Canada looking for work, but there wasn't any work, so they ended up in relief camps, poorly fed and run with some harsh rules.

If the boys left the camps they couldn't get back in again so they stayed and put up with it.

In 1933 my brother went into one of those camps in Merritt at 17 years with a broken shoulder blade. The cast he had on was a big board strapped to his back. Everybody in the camp had to work very hard building roads and repairing bridges for 20 cents a day, about 2 cents a hour. My brother's broken bone should have had time to mend, but they said he had one good arm still, so they sent him out in a boat with an axe to cut brush across the lake.

A few yards out and the leaking boat filled up with water and sank. With the board tied to his back he couldn't save himself and he drowned. We were on relief alone with our mother in Calgary and didn't have the \$20.00 for a ticket to Princeton where they had taken my brother's body.

The Salvation Army got her a ride in a caboose at the end of a freight train. She was broken hearted from losing her only son, so the kindness of the people of Princeton was wonderful. Some people met her at the train and took her to their home, where they gave her a bed and fed

her. At the funeral home my brother was wrapped in a sheet because he had no clothes and was put in the wooden box that coffins come in. The people came to his funeral and brought flowers from their gardens.

When it was over, they took up a collection and gathered \$20.00 for a ticket home on the train. The people of Princeton were suffering from the Great Depression, as much as everyone else in those days, so that

On reading the new measures - penalties - for drivers charged with repeated impaired driving offences - the BC Governments new legislation, our office supports and finds these new measures will prove effective.

To date - since January 1st, 2005, to present (August 7, 2005) Princeton RCMP have investigated over 40 impaired - Over .08 or Refusal to Provide Breath Sample Criminal Code charges. This does not include the drivers issued 24-hour driving prohibitions, to which there are many more. For many of the impaired drivers charged, it is NOT their first offence for drinking and driving. Impaired driving investigations for 2004 is at 62.

It is no longer 'social acceptable' to drink and drive, consequences of doing so result from being charged if caught by police, to risking the lives of other motorists, drivers and passengers, and even pedestrians,

When I stated 'if caught,' chances are high that the impaired driver, will continue to offend and drive impaired if not caught, so eventually, police have to have contact with these drivers.

Legislation for repeat offenders to address alcohol abuse is a welcomed addition in prevention, and in some cases, the alcoholic has no option but to admit that they do have an addiction.

Our office, as a result of Community Support, now has three Alcosensor IV Roadside Screening Devices which assist us in removing these Impaired Drivers off our roads. Every member at this detachment, from the top down, is committed to making the community - our roadways safer.

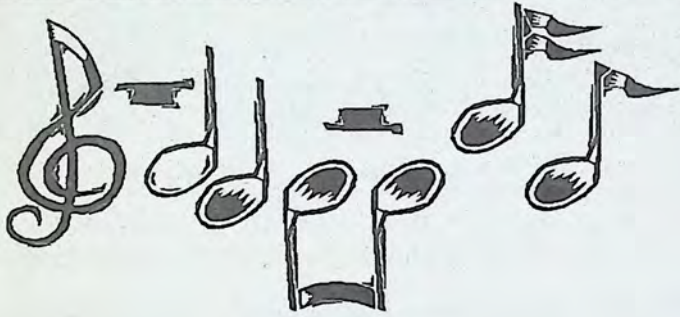
