Group requests local input

The Crisis Assistance Clothing Store located on Vermilion Avenue, next to the former Goldion Restaurant, may be moving.

The store, which was once located in the basement below the former Mike's Barbershop on Bridge Street, came into being in the mid-1990's following an influx of clothing and toy donations during the annual Christmas Hamper Drive.

The basement location was flooded out during the November 1995 flood of the Tulameen River.

Large volumes of clothing, bedding and toys came to Princeton from all across Canada when word of the store's demise, and the flood's devastation, made national news.

Princeton's Crisis Assistance Society, which had originally set up the clothing store, was faced with having to create a more permanent store front location to address the needs of those displaced by the Tulameen Flood.

An emergency centre/clothing store was set up on Vermilion Avenue, where Kevin Acres Farm & Pet Supplies is currently located.

The location worked well as Princeton's Elks Club was actively involved in the project with the Crisis Assistance Society - the Elks Hall was across the street.

Once the flood victims were taken care of, a need for such a store was recognized and the clothing store eventually moved to its present location.

The store may end up moving into the Elks Hall, where the New Beginnings program was hosted.

Volunteers are concerned for their customers and are currently asking for input on whether or not they should move.

If you are a customer of the Crisis Assistance Clothing Store, let them know if you'll follow them to a different location.

Fall Fair members have been working diligently every Sunday for the past month preparing for the fair. New paint, a big new information sign, recruiting volunteers, ordering supplies, and developing support have occupied nearly every member in some way.



Governor visits Princeton

Rotary International District 5060 Governor Jim Adamson, and his wife, Carol, visited Princeton's Rotary Club last week.

The Adamson's, from East Wenatchee, Washington, have been touring the District, which contains 60 Rotary Clubs located from as far north as Clearwater and Revelstoke, includes all the clubs in the Okanagan Valley and south to Sunnyside, Grandview and Prosser, Washington.

"It's always nice to come to the clubs," Adamson told local Rotarians.

"We have a unique job in that we get to travel to the 60 clubs in the District."

Adamson was quick to praise the local group.

"For a smaller club, you've done some good things in your community as well as been involved in international activities."

Adamson pointed out it is often

difficult for Rotary Clubs that are located on the fringe of a district - as Princeton is - to feel connected to the rest of the District.

Membership issues are all the same throughout the Rotary organization. The goal this year is for each club to add one new member net.

Princeton's club added four new members in February, which Adamson pointed out as a huge success at the local level.

"There are still business owners that may not have been asked to join yet," he said stating that many who join the invitation-only ranks of Rotary have been drawn to the group for fellowship, networking and service reasons.

"All of you joined probably because someone asked you."

This year's theme for Rotary International member clubs is 'Service Above Self' which happens to be one of the group's founding principles.

"We are really caring for other people before caring for ourselves," Adamson explained.

"There's also a difference between being a member of a Rotary Club and being a Rotarian."

A member transforms into becoming a Rotarian after learning more and experiencing more of what membership can bring.

"I encourage you to continue to follow the path to fellowship, fun and service."

Adamson called Rotarians George Elliott and Rob Marshall to join him for a presentation.

Elliott, representing the new members of Princeton's Club received a fridge magnet promoting the upcoming District 5060 Conference in Wenatchee, Washington.

Marshall, who is in his second year as Club President, was presented with a t-shirt promoting Rotary activities.

Is it just me, or is there a business buzz in the valley's air? I got this feeling that commerce was picking up, new businesses were setting up, and the economy was heading up. So, I thought I would do a little research to see if my feeling was correct.

There have been 29 new businesses open in Keremeos and Princeton in 2005. About half are home-based and half store front. A few businesses have new owners, also an indicator that investment in the valley looks good. Several business based elsewhere have taken out business licences in our valley. Businesses in the rural areas don't need a business licence. I would love to know how many new businesses there are out there. I know of several, and they cover a range of industries including tourism, engineering, business services and home renovations.

We have lost some businesses, too, and that is unfortunate. Overall, however, our economy is growing. There are other indicators. Properties and homes are selling quickly and prices are rising. There were 16 new home starts in rural Princeton in May alone, Hedley is hopping, and there are new subdivisions in Keremeos.

I did a small poll of business owners. Nine out of 13 of them said business is better this year than last

year.

We need a healthy small business community. Business taxes are essential to the operation of a community. We want all of the shopping options we can get. A healthy business community attracts and supports new businesses. When people shop at home, they put a dollar in their neighbour's pocket.

My guess is we will see a hefty population increase since 2001 in the 2006 census. Population growth is fuelling small business growth. Another way to boost small business sales is by increasing tourism spending. Tourists spend money in all kinds of retail outlets, in addition to motels and restaurants. For a business that is breaking even, an increase in sales of 5-10% can make all the difference in the world because a good part of these 'extra' dollars go into the pocket and not to pay the mortgage or heating bill. Due to the efforts of many groups, we are seeing a rise in tourism spending in the Similkameen Valley. Our big draws, such as the KVR trail, wineries and the Mascot Mine, provide opportunities for small businesses to increase sales.

Industrial spending is very important for wholesale and retail economies. Industries spend lots of money on lots of different things. We need to support our

local industries and attract new industries. Three of the new businesses are in manufacturing or construction.

I think there is a business buzz. I believe it will continue to grow.

Chili contest heats up

The fourth annual Similkameen Sizzle, planned for Saturday, September 17th in Memorial Park, will include a Chili Cookoff.

Organizer Ron Murdock told Committee members at a meeting last Wednesday that he had already received commitments from seven entrants.

There is a \$20 entry fee with First Place winning \$100 and \$25 will go each to Second and Third Place winners. The winners are chosen in a People's Choice Format.

Entrants are expected to have a minimum of one gallon of chili for tasting. The chili can have beans or filler (rice, pasta) and can be prepared prior to the event but must be ready to serve hot on site by 11:00 AM.

Village narrows street

At the August 15th regular meeting of Keremeos Village Council, Mayor Walter Despot brought forward a motion that would aid in future development.

Ninth Avenue is currently 65-feet wide, far wider than most of the streets in the Village.

A total of 20-feet of the width from 7th Street to 10th Street will be 'closed' - or in other words, the North side of 9th Street will lose 20-feet of its width, bringing the street to 45-feet.

The twenty feet taken from the road will go the lots along the North side of the road to allow for future subdivision development.

There are a few more streets in Keremeos that may undergo the same treatment depending on land development plans.

There's also a \$25 prize for Showmanship/Best Booth with judging based upon the best decorated booth and/or any skits performed by the team.

Booth space measures 10 feet by

10 feet and each team is responsible for their own decorations, coverings and cook stove.

Local wins scholarship

How to enter your exhibit in the Fair

First, you need a Fall Fair prize list booklet. This tells you all of the

categories. Each entry will cost fifty cents, unless otherwise marked. The booklet will tell you. Second, if you are entering vegetables, read how many of each you will need for your exhibit.

Registering your exhibit is done at the fairgrounds on Thursday,

September 8, from 3 - 8 p.m. and from noon to 5 p.m. on Friday, September 9.

Note: Thursday entries are **non-perishable items only. Do not enter baking, flowers or vegetables on Thursday.**

The registration desk is in building

#1, the first building to the right of the paved driveway after you enter the gate.

You will be asked whether you will donate your exhibit to the auction at 3:30 p.m. on Sunday, after the exhibits buildings close. Exhibits **may not be removed** from the buildings until 3 p.m. Sunday. Any exhibits left at 3:30 p.m. will be considered donated.

Prizes:

All entries will be judged by a qualified judge who will award first, second or third. Prize money will be available at noon on Saturday at the fairgrounds office. Some people earn a lot of money at the fair because they enter exhibits in many different categories.

Ribbons will be awarded in most categories, but in some categories, only a sticker ribbon and money will be awarded.

Junior Fair winners receive ribbons, and stickers are reserved for adult categories.

Prize money that is not picked up by the end of the fair will be considered donations to the Fall Fair Association.

Special prizes:

Thanks to sponsors, there are a number of "value-added" prizes for top exhibitors. The top exhibitor overall wins a trophy, but there are special prizes for flowers, vegetables, wine and beer and home baking. These prizes will be awarded during the fair.

Acupuncture and fibromyalgia

Fibromyalgia is the second most common rheumatic disorder in the United States behind arthritis, according to the American College of Rheumatology.

People diagnosed with fibromyalgia can suffer from a wide range of problems, including fatigue, pain, stiffness, aches, muscle tenderness, along with sleep disorders, intestinal and bowel troubles.

The diagnosis of fibromyalgia is further confirmed when 11 out of 18 specific points on the body are tender to pressure. Interestingly, some of these tender points closely correspond to the location of ancient acupuncture points.

How acupuncture and Chinese medicine can help:

According to the theories of traditional Chinese medicine an imbalance to the flow of Qi and blood can lead to symptoms and signs that reflect a Western diagnosis of fibromyalgia.

Qi is the energy, or the power that animates and supports the functions of the body. It flows through specific pathways, called Meridians, and provides the body with nourishment for every cell, tissue, muscle and organ system.

When Qi is abundant and freely circulating throughout the body, there is health and pain-free living. When Qi becomes 'blocked' or the supply is inadequate, pain, stiffness and other symptoms related to fibromyalgia can appear.

What does an acupuncturist do?

An acupuncturist will take a complete health history in order to find out where Qi has become blocked, and/or why the amount of Qi within the body has changed. They will then develop a treatment plan tailored to your specific symptoms and signs that best reflect the organ and meridian systems that are out of balance. The goal(s) of such a plan will be to eliminate visible symptoms, while addressing the root cause(s) and underlying imbalances.

What is out-of-balance?

The body constantly strives to regain and maintain a healthy balance of Qi traveling through the meridian and organ systems. When the flow of Qi has been disrupted, or the supply of Qi has changed, the body becomes unbalanced and the meridian and organ systems are not properly nourished - signs and symptoms will then appear.

Most cases of fibromyalgia fit into the Chinese diagnosis of a Liver, Spleen and/or Heart disharmony. This doesn't mean that these organs have a problem, it means that the functions of these organs according to the Chinese medical diagnosis are out of balance.

The functions related to the Liver organ, according to Chinese medicine, are to control the smooth flow of blood, Qi and emotions and to

nourish the tendons. When the Liver organ becomes blocked there will be an inadequate supply of blood and Qi flowing throughout the body. The tendons and muscles will not be properly nourished, leading to stiffness and pain. Other symptoms of a blocked Liver are depression, anger, anxiety, and insomnia. A Liver imbalance can occur from improper diet, stress, deep, unexpressed anger, drugs and alcohol.

The Chinese function of the Spleen is to transform the food that we ingest into Qi and blood. The health of the Spleen is affected by diet, over-concentration and worry. An unbalanced Spleen can result in fatigue, digestive troubles, muscle stiffness and pain.

When there is an insufficient amount of Qi and blood produced by the Spleen, the Heart organ will be affected. The role of the Heart is

to pump blood throughout the body, it is also considered to be the home of the Spirit. If the Spleen cannot generate enough blood to nourish the Heart, the Heart Qi does not have enough control to properly house that spirit. Symptoms such as anxiety, palpitations, insomnia and emotional unrest.

Acupuncture and Chinese medicine can provide a safe alternative in the treatment of fibromyalgia. Along with the use of acupuncture, natural Chinese herbal formulas, dietary recommendations and calming exercises can also help promote balance and health.

In November 1997, the National Institute of Health (NIH), suggested that acupuncture could be an effective modality in treating fibromyalgia. Not only by treating the pain and discomfort, but also by addressing the underlying problems that have caused the imbalance.

Are you eating your medicine?

Some foods are really medicine for your body. While your stomach may not immediately recognize a vitamin pill as medicine, it will cheer when you eat certain foods.

The season of harvest is here, and one of the fruits fresh on the market is pears. Pears taste great, and they clean the cholesterol out of your digestive tract. They are excellent for bowel regularity and preventing colon cancer. Pears also contain pectin, which is good for your heart. From heart to head is the next step, and pears are excellent brain food due to their good levels of boron.

When you eat a pear, make sure you eat the skin for the full benefits. Canned pears are good for you, but fresh pears are better. Keep in mind that pears ripen from the inside out, so don't wait to eat the pear until it looks ripe on the outside - that's probably too late. If the stem pulls out easily, the pear is ready to eat.

There is nothing like prunes to keep you regular, but there is more to a prune plum than just bulk. Fresh prune plums contain a wealth of fresh medicine for your whole body. Prune plums contain generous amounts of beta-carotene. That's the stuff found in broccoli, but prune plums taste better. Prune plums are loaded with potassium, a mineral needed to keep blood pressure normal.

Prune plums are available now, and not expensive at fruit stands. You could preserve your medicine for the cold winter months.

All carbonated soda drinks (pop) are acidic in nature and can have an adverse effect on the enamel of our teeth. Other teeth enemies are hard candies, jelly beans and other sweet sticky confections. It's always good to rinse your mouth after eating or drinking any of these. And floss well at least once daily.

Do you wash all your fruit before eating? It's a good idea. This includes cantaloupe, bananas, watermelon, etc. Even though we don't eat the rind or peel, these still can carry bacteria that can be harmful to us. Much of the fruit travels long distances and is touched by many people. Wash then eat. Good advice.

We see some new sports drinks contain extra amounts of caffeine...as much as 125 mg per can. There are even some beers with added caffeine now. It's not a good idea to depend on stimulants, like caffeine, for energy. The best energy comes from a well-balanced diet not from a can of pop or beer.

If you are taking a fibre supplement, like Metamucil, for your bowels, it will work better if you take it with meals.

Good communication between healthcare professionals and patients is important for your better health. Let us communicate with you regarding your medication concerns.

Smokey's tip of the week

The BC Forest Service issues weekly FireSmart Tips.

This one is important to most rural residents in the Similkameen Valley. When living in an interface area, be prepared for wildfires.

- Work to reduce the fuels in the 10 to 30 metre area around your home by thinning and pruning trees and

shrubs.

- Remove or reduce the number of evergreen trees in the area. Evergreens such as pine and spruce are more combustible than deciduous trees. Aspen, poplar and birch all have very low flammability rates.

- Thinning the third priority zone,

from 30 to 100 metres around your home, will reduce the risk of high-intensity fires in that area.

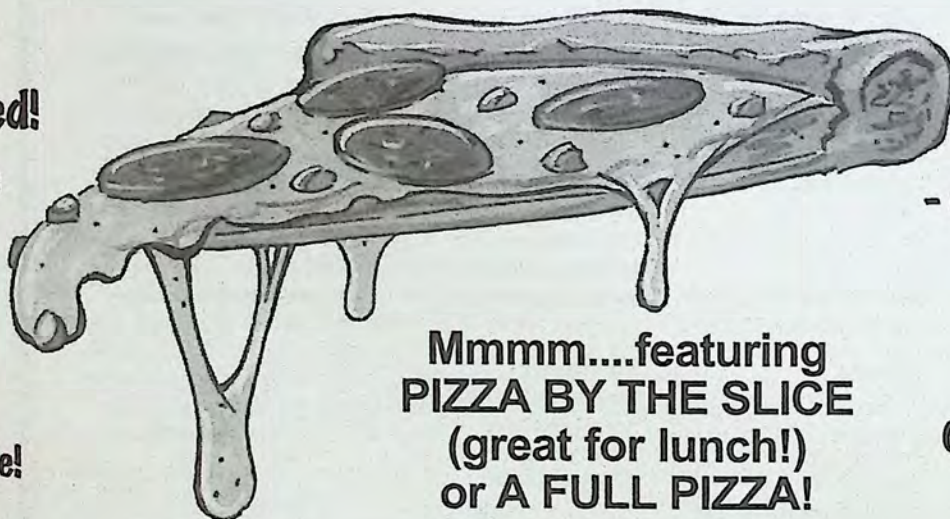

It Burns...Like A Four-Alarm Fire

FireSmart your property

As the weather gets cooler and the days get shorter, fall yard clean-up cannot be far off.

When cleaning up your yard this year, take time to assess how FireSmart your property is by picking up a copy of the Homeowners FireSmart Manual.

A wildfire can produce sparks or burning debris that can travel up to two kilometres ahead of the fire. If you live in or near an interface area, you can lower the risk that these sparks or burning debris can pose to your home by ensuring that the three priority zones identified in the FireSmart Manual have been maintained.

To begin with, remove fuels from the first ten metres around your home. Dead grass and leaves as

well as overhanging branches should be removed. If you are going to plant shrubs or trees in this zone, consider deciduous trees because they burn less readily than coniferous trees.

For example, aspen, poplar and birch all have very low flammability rates.

From 10 to 30 metres, you can reduce fuels by thinning and pruning so that combustion will not be supported. Space the trees so that the crowns or tops of individual trees are three to six metres apart. Fires spread more easily uphill, so it is important to extend the second priority zone precautions further on downhill slopes.

The third priority zone, from 30 to 100 metres around your home, should have the trees and shrubs thinned, so that if a fire occurs, it will be of lower intensity.

As well, reducing the fuel will provide a zone that is safer for fire crews to work from.

Properly preparing your home and community doesn't guarantee that you will not incur fire damage, but it does reduce the risks. These are simple steps that anyone can take to create a more FireSmart home, community or business site.

Remember, though, that for these actions to be effective, they must be maintained.

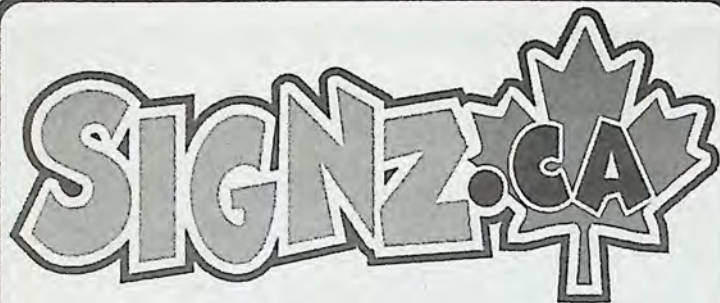

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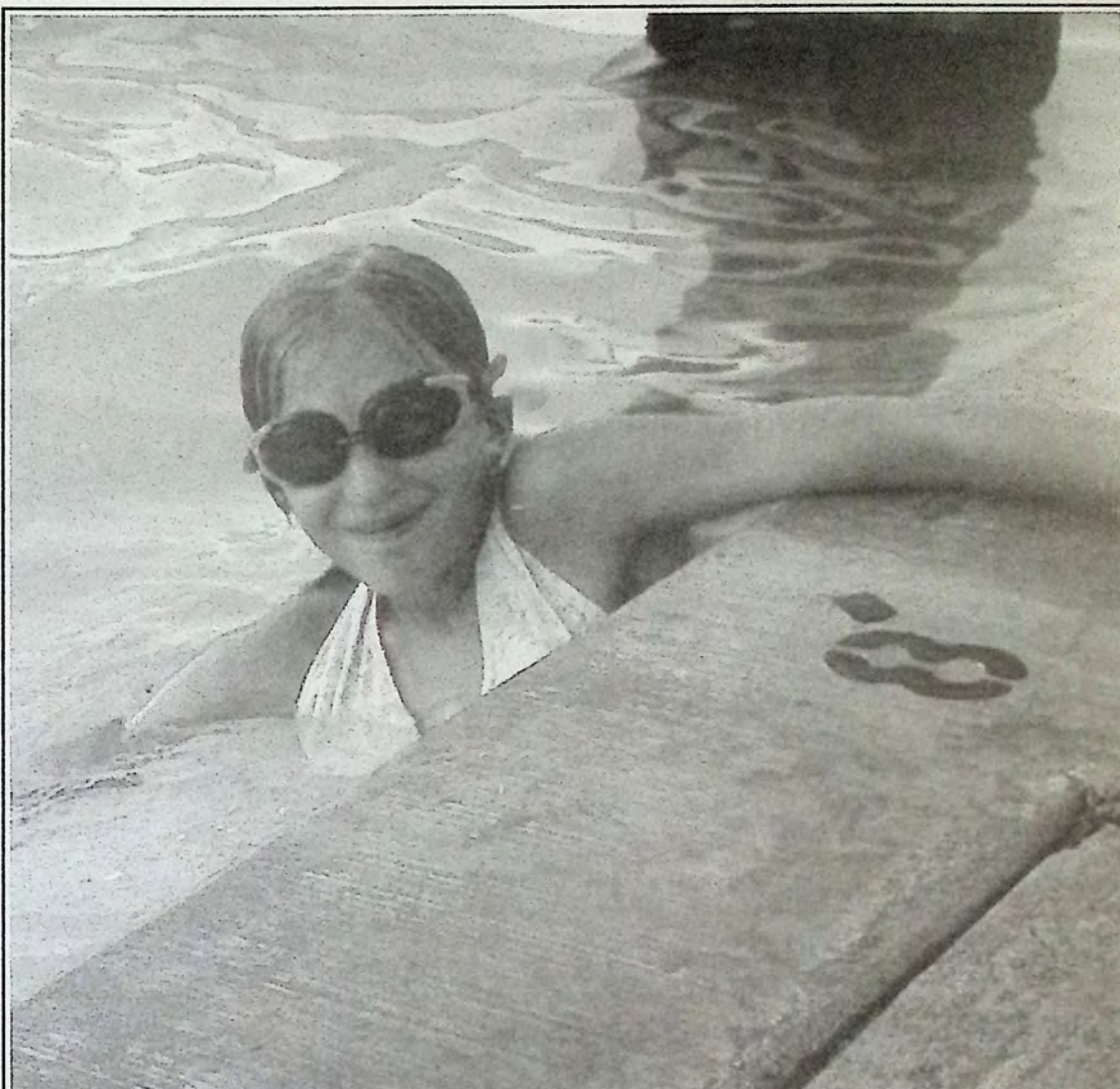

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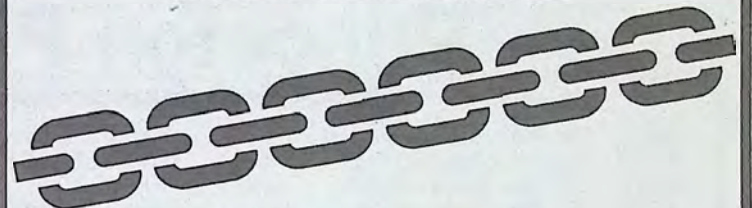


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Mule deer contest returns

Turkey Cobb Salad

- 3/4 lb. Turkey Breast - 1" cubes
- 1 clove garlic, finely minced
- 1/4 cup olive oil
- 1/4 cup lemon, zested and juiced
- 1 lettuce, torn in pieces
- 6 slices Turkey bacon, cooked and crumbled
- 1 avocado, cubed
- 1 1/2 cherry tomatoes, sliced in half
- 2-3 oz. blue cheese, crumbled

- Dressing:
- 1/4 cup low-fat mayonnaise
 - 1/4 cup low-fat sour cream
 - 1 1/2 tsp. dijon mustard
 - 1 tbsp. cider vinegar
 - 1 tbsp. water

Mix garlic, oil and lemon juice/zest in a bowl, add salt and fresh pepper to taste, add turkey. Refrigerate 1 hour. Preheat barbeque (medium-high heat) or oven 400 F. Grill turkey cubes for 9-10 minutes, turning once until no longer pink in centre. Toss turkey with remaining ingredients in a large bowl, or arrange on plates. Combine dressing ingredients and drizzle over salad.

Mosquito Control and the West Nile Virus

With the start of mosquito season, the Regional District of Okanagan Similkameen is taking steps to prepare for and respond to concerns related to the West Nile Virus.

These Steps Include:

- Mapping potential mosquito development sites in areas of standing water.
- Working closely with the Interior Health Authority and the BC Centre for Disease Control.
- Providing information to the community on how to reduce the risk of mosquito bites
- Applying registered granular larvicides when West Nile Virus vector mosquitoes are present in identified development habitats.

Practice the Four D's

- **Drain** your property of standing water by emptying pets' water dishes daily, covering or overturning toys, equipment or containers that may collect rain water, and cleaning out eaves troughs.
- **Dusk/Dawn** is the time to take extra care as this is when mosquitoes are out most. Reduce outdoor activities during these times.
- **Dress** appropriately by wearing light-coloured clothes that are loose fitting, but tightly woven and cover-up with long sleeves and long pants when there are a lot of mosquitoes out.
- **Defend** against mosquito bites by using mosquito repellents such as DEET, Citronella candles or mosquito coils.

About West Nile Virus

West Nile Virus is a mosquito-borne illness that is spread when a mosquito bites an infected bird and then a person. The health risk to humans is low and there is no reported cases of West Nile Virus in BC at this time. However, it is still important to be informed about this illness and how you can limit your exposure.

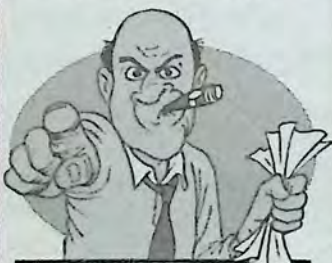

- The Regional District Okanagan Similkameen gave three readings at the August 18th meeting to a new bylaw.

The South Similkameen Economic Development Service Establishment Bylaw will encompass Electoral Area B, Electoral Area G and the Village of Keremeos.

- The Regional Hospital District has agreed to provide property in Keremeos to Interior Health.

The property will be used for the construction of a ten-bed dementia

care unit and new mental health drop-in centre.

The announcement was made at the August 18th meeting of the Regional District Okanagan-Similkameen.

- The Regional District Okanagan-Similkameen has entered into an agreement with the Hedley Community Recreation Commission Association.

The agreement puts in place a lease for Woodlie Park for the next five years.

The park is located in Hedley.

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No-Burn product comes to town

To demonstrate that point, Harrison, armed with a one million dollar partially-treated No-Burn bill, lit it and once the flame

reached the area that was treated, it simply went out.

Company Vice President Dell Harrison, along with Regional Distributors Terry and Darlene Townsend were also on hand for the demonstration at Princeton Irlly Bird.

The foursome were in town to inspect a home on Coalmont Road that will be the first one treated with the No-Burn product in British Columbia.

The home, being constructed by Fred & Company of Princeton, happens to be located outside the fire protection zone.

Mark Harrison, who has had the company for the past two years explains his interest in the product. "My background is fire. I've been a firefighter for Sherwood Park and the concept is what hit me."

Harrison says his years of training revolves around finding faster ways to get water to fire to prevent it from spreading.

"The idea of stopping the fire before it starts hit me like a ton of bricks."

The product is simply sprayed on

to the wood studs and framing of a house during the construction phase.

"The two things we're trying to promote is life safety and giving the fire crews more time to respond so they can save something," Harrison points out.

Rigorous testing of the No-Burn family of products in both Canada and the United States, using several private and government testing facilities have supported No-Burn's assertions that their products are safe and effective as a flame retardant for use in residential and commercial applications.

Ernie Lawrence, owner of Princeton's Irlly Bird, and local supplier of the No-Burn product, says he quite likes the product.

"It's going to do a fine job on reducing disasters, it'll cut insurance rates and make people more comfortable about living in their homes knowing they won't lose it when a fire goes by."

Driver falls asleep behind wheel

At approximately 1:00 PM on Monday, August 22nd, Princeton RCMP, two units from BC Ambulance and Princeton Fire-Rescue attended a collision east of Princeton, near the Golf Club.

"The vehicle was travelling west when it started to veer off to the left, entered the ditch and continued for approximately fifty yards before it collided with a dirt embankment," says RCMP Cst.

Myrl Stus.

"It missed a utility pole by two metres."

Three occupants from the vehicle were transported by ambulance to Princeton Hospital, the backseat passenger was extricated by Fire-Rescue Services.

"The backseat passenger was examined at Princeton Hospital then transferred to Penticton," Cst. Stus says.

He had suffered broken ribs and internal bleeding.

The 19-year old front seat female passenger suffered from a compressed vertebrae, and the 73-year old female driver, from Abbotsford, suffered a facial injury.

"The cause of this accident was due to the driver falling asleep while driving."

Charges will be laid against the driver in this incident.

"Luckily there was no oncoming traffic," Cst. Stus points out.

"Also lucky that the vehicle went off the road to the left as to the right there is a steep drop off which is also the campground along the river."

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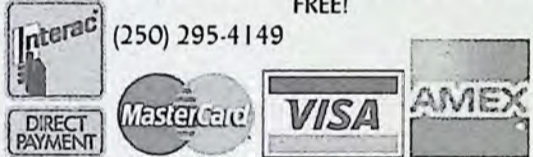
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
