To the Residents of Princeton:

I am very pleased to accept the position of Mayor for the Town of Princeton. Unfortunately, however, the process of acclamation did not provide me an opportunity to introduce myself and my background to those who do not know me, nor to discuss and formulate the aims and aspirations we share for the future of this community. ## Council okays museum salary

After hard work and careful record-keeping, Museum Society members will receive funding for a paid administrator/curator. Museum Society President Nick Mills attended the October 17 meeting of Town Council to finish his reporting to Council and lobbying for \$20,000 for the part-time position.

In August, Mills presented a "Past, Present and Future" report to Council outlining the problems the Museum Society faces for the future. At the Council meeting, he outlined the value of the museum to the community.

First, as a tourist attraction, the more than 5,000 visitors this year represent a \$50,000 income to the community, as economic development officer Michael McLaughlin claims every visitor is worth \$10 tourist spending in Princeton.

The archival records preserve family history as well as community history. There is a copy of every newspaper published in the Similkameen Valley for the past 100 years.

There are more than 5,000 historic photos (most of which still need to be catalogued), updated cemetery records, as well as historic documents and artifacts. In addition to caring for, cataloguing and updating all of these records and artifacts, there is a website to update and visitors to tour around the museum.

The Joe Pollard collection of fossils and mineral rocks, along with the Dave Taylor collection of fossils and the museum's own collection of fossils, has proven to be a major attraction for people from around the world.

Mills told Council of two Germans who had toured Canada and visited

Princeton's museum on October 11. They left a comment, "This is the best museum we've seen in B.C."

The museum is a learning resource for schools. The number of student tours is increasing. This year, in addition to local students, the museum has had students from Vancouver who were researching gold and mineral resources. Next year, local students have ancient Egypt in their curriculum, and Princeton's Egyptian collection has been returned. Students will want to see the collection on display.

The museum will be 50 years old in 2008. It has operated primarily by volunteers, with student employees during the summer months. Katimavik participants have been a godsend during the past four years, but as Mills explained, it is impossible to do the work in the storage area and create new displays while showing visitors around the museum and helping people do research.

## Council looks at airport development

On October 4, Town Council met with Bill Neale, a consultant on airport development. Economic Development Officer Michael McLaughlin and pilot Dave Woodruff arranged the meeting, and received thanks from Councillor Ray Jarvis for their efforts.

In his report to Council, Jarvis said, "It was refreshing to hear someone who told us how important our airport really is."

He pointed out many assets that a

To make matters more difficult, new computer equipment and new methods of recording information are beyond the scope of Museum Society members, who tend to be older people with limited computer skills and little knowledge of what to do to accession and catalogue. There are training courses available, but these take time and money.

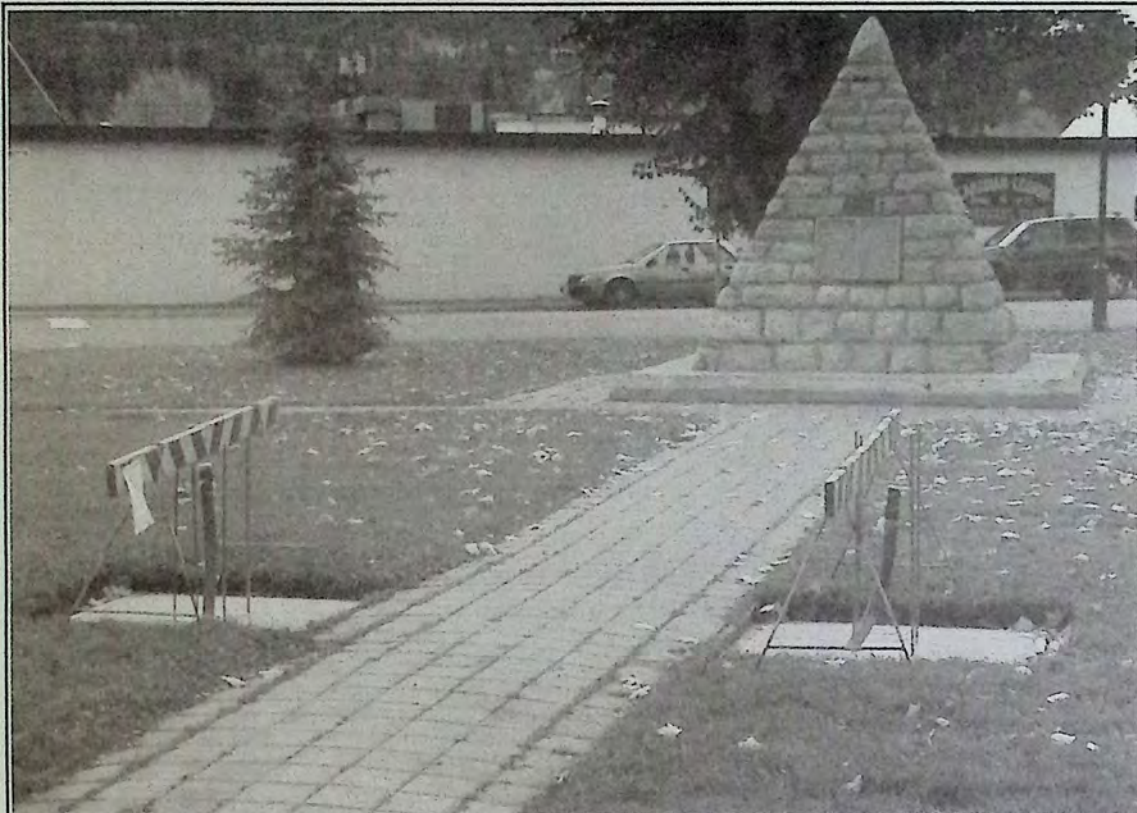
Without some paid help, Museum Society members see longer periods of museum closure and a subsequent loss of visitor dollars to the museum and to the community.

Council agreed unanimously to provide funds for a part-time administrator/curator position up to \$20,000 per year. This does not mean there will be no work for volunteers, but it will create support for volunteers who can continue to take visitors on tour, answer phones and do the legwork required while paid staff takes care of the backlog of cataloguing and accessioning.

Mayor Keith Olsen said a business plan for developing the airport would cost approximately \$6,000, of which Community Futures is prepared to fund 75 percent. The remaining 25 percent would be funded by local partners. Council has approached both Weyerhaeuser and Young Life as partners, and both have expressed an interest.

## Legion plans special day

Branch #56 of the Royal Canadian Legion, the Ladies Auxiliary and the Youth Auxiliary are busy planning Remembrance Day services. Legion members will distribute wreaths and crosses to local businesses for display in shop windows. These will be laid at the Cenotaph during the November 11 service.

Poppy tag day is October 28. Members of the Legion Ladies

Auxiliary will distribute lapel poppies and look for donations to the Legion Poppy Fund.

Town Council approved the usual arrangements for closing of streets. The parade begins at 10:30 at the corner of Tapton and Vermilion Avenues, and proceeds down Vermilion Avenue to Bridge Street. These areas will be closed to vehicular traffic for approximately one hour.

Mayor Keith Olsen agreed to lay the wreath for the Town of Princeton.

The entry arch to Cenotaph Park is under construction. The foundation has been dug for the four tons of rock to be used to build the new arch. Artist Kazumi Tanaka of Osoyoos has guaranteed it will be completed in time for the November 11 ceremony.

## Booze still factors in crashes

Don't use your next big meal out as an excuse to drink and drive, say the organizers of the Community Crash Reduction Challenge this October.

ICBC, along with the provincial government, the police and communities and individuals across the province, are working together to help make October Zero Crash Month.

"There's a myth out there that you won't be impaired if you drink on a full stomach," warns Geoff Koganow, ICBC's Loss Prevention Manager.

"Driving after drinking and eating is just as deadly."

Police-reported incidents indicate alcohol was a contributing factor in over 23 per cent of all fatal crashes in 2004, second only to speeding (33 per cent). Provincially, some 93 people were killed in alcohol-related collisions in 2004, down from 105 in 2003, and approximately 3,200 were injured, down from 3,300 in 2003.

In the Southern Interior, there were 1,100 alcohol-related collisions, resulting in 32 fatalities and 700 injuries.

October is Zero Crash Month. Registered communities that reduce their crash statistics by the largest percentage are eligible to win a road safety grant of \$5,000 - \$35,000. Individuals can also take a pledge to drive safely, and be eligible to win a

grand prize of \$35,000 towards the purchase of a new vehicle.

This month alone, an estimated 22,000 vehicle crashes are predicted to take place involving BC residents. Nearly 6,500 British Columbians will be injured in those crashes.

Thanks to the many individuals and communities participating in this year's Challenge, these estimates should prove to be wrong.

According to Inspector Norm Gaumont, OIC 'E' Division, RCMP Traffic Services, impaired driving remains a leading contributing factor in fatal collisions in BC.

"Getting drunk drivers off our roads is a priority for the police. If you choose to drink and drive your chances of getting caught have increased. We have new tools and expanded resources focusing on getting drunk drivers off our roads."

Earlier this year the provincial government introduced tough new initiatives to reduce drinking and driving. These new measures include a mandatory assessment program for drivers convicted of drinking and driving and an ignition interlock system. The system requires a breath sample with zero alcohol in order for the vehicle to start.

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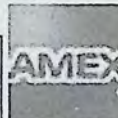

**September stats released**

Similkameen Country Tourist InfoCentre stats for the month of September have been released.

Although hours of operation have been reduced from the peak Summer schedule, visitor numbers are still very strong.

In the 178 hours the InfoCentre was operational, a total of 537 visitors were recorded.

There were also 34 phone calls received and one bus welcomed.

Of the total number of visitors 278 were from British Columbia, 82 from Europe, 59 from other parts of Canada, 45 from Alberta, 34 were local residents, 26 from Washington, 6 from other parts of the US and Mexico, 6 from Asia/Australia and one visitor from California.

A total of 319 visitors were in the area for the day, 78 spent a

night in Keremeos, 59 were there for two nights, 33 for three nights, 13 were there for a week, 5 for two weeks and 2 reported being there for more than two weeks.

Information requests totalled 125 asking about attractions, 123 asking about accommodations,

105 (adventure recreation), 100 (food and beverage), 84 (events and conferences), 83 (parks), 17 (investment and moving) 15 (transportation), 8 requested shopping and community services information, 3 asked about First Nations.

**Event marks tenth 'Taste'**

Women who are smokers and pregnant should stop smoking. Smoking does increase certain risk factors to the baby (like an increased risk of SIDS, (Sudden Infant Death Syndrome) among others. Replacing smoking with nicotine patches to help quit certainly isn't without risk to the baby but is less toxic than actually smoking tobacco with its thousands of toxic chemicals. Check with your doctor.

Work is currently being done on a vaccine for shingles. Preliminary results are promising. Shingles can be a very long and painful disease, which often occurs in the elderly who have previously had chickenpox as children. This vaccine is not on the market yet, but it's coming.

The most concentrated natural sources of vitamin B-12 are from animal foods, meat, eggs and dairy products. As we age, we sometimes are not able to absorb enough vitamin B-12 from our food. If you are over 55, it is good insurance to take a multivitamin daily that can provide an extra 2.5mg of this essential vitamin.

In Britain, there are new anti-smoking TV ads that focus on how smoking can reduce sexual potency and physical attractiveness. These ads are sponsored by the Department of Health in England and aimed at the youth.

It is important to be an advocate for your own health. Be an active learner about all your health matters including the drugs you take. We can help you in that goal.

# When gambling quits being a game

In my last article I finished the discussion of what a person who chooses to gamble as an entertainment option can do to gamble responsibly. The government also plays a role in promoting responsible gambling.

They make policy decisions around gaming, provide problem gambling prevention contracts, and sponsor awareness and education campaigns as well as conduct evidence-based research to evaluate the effectiveness of prevention strategies and determine the prevalence of gambling and problem gambling in this province.

The government also funds the Problem Gambling Help line and Problem Gambling Program. In this week's article, I want to inform you about how to contact the help line and make you aware of the services that are offered by the Problem Gambling Program should you become concerned about your gambling behavior or the behavior of others.

For most people in our province going to a casino, racetrack or bingo hall or buying a lottery ticket is a form of entertainment. However, for about 4% of the population gambling can become a serious problem. Problem gambling is often referred to as the "silent addiction," and problem gamblers can go to great lengths to cover up their problem. Listed below is a few warning signs that you or someone you care about might have a problem with gambling:

- Gambling for longer and longer periods of time
- "Chasing losses"- gambling more often to win back "lost" money
- Gambling more than you intend to

- Neglecting family or personal needs to gamble

- Growing debt from gambling

- Unexplained absences for work, school or other important social activities

- Gambling to escape daily pressures or obligations

- Becoming involved in illegal activities to finance gambling

- Lying about the extent of gambling involvement

Problem gambling is treatable. In this province there are 32 qualified counselors who deliver clinical, prevention and co-ordination services.

Our counsellors speak a variety of languages including French, Mandarin, Cantonese and some Aboriginal languages.

Counselling sessions are available to those who are concerned about their own gambling or the gambling of others. We can work with children, spouses or even employers of problem gamblers to assist them in dealing with the gambling of others. These counsellors are able to meet with people in their own community at a time and location that is suitable for them.

There is no wait list in this province for service. Counselling sessions are free of charge and there is no limit to the number of sessions available. If you would like to meet with someone based on your preferences for gender, age and cultural background this will be facilitated whenever possible.

At every gaming venue in this province you will find a sticker that provides a toll free number for help. This help line is staffed 24 hours a day, 365 days a year with people from a variety of ethnic back-

grounds.

They offer services in over 10 languages including French, Spanish, Vietnamese, and Cantonese. Everyone who works at the help line has had basic problem gambling training and can assist you in clarifying your concerns, linking you to the services of a problem gambling counselor in your area, or helping you with other problems that might arise as a result of gambling such as lack of housing, abuse, family violence or financial difficulties.

Problem gambling counsellors will work with you to design a strategy that works for you. There are many stops along the continuum from gambling that is out of control to total abstinence from gambling. Why not work with someone to design a personalized strategy that works for you?

Problem gambling counsellors are trained to help people develop responsible gambling strategies that fit for them. For some, taking a complete break from gambling seems like the best option.

In the last part of this series, I will talk about a program that BC Lottery Corporation offers called Time Out which is a voluntary self-exclusion program that assists someone who wants to make a change in their lives but needs some help getting started.

# Should you travel now?

The continuing spread of avian flu may be just cause for you to consider whether you should travel at this time. Avian flu is present in Asia, and has been discovered in Romania. Health authorities fear it may spread to western Europe.

The question is whether you should travel when a serious infection affects the world. There are some diseases for which we have no cure, and some which strike so suddenly, like SARS, that many people die before a vaccine can be developed. Remember the link between SARS and travellers?

We have been accustomed to travelling anywhere we wanted to go. Most travellers make sure they have the immunization shots they need before they go. What happens when there are no vaccines to protect the travellers against a particular contagious disease?

In times before travel was so common, a virulent disease might kill most of the people within a small region, but was unlikely to become a world-wide problem. The first pandemic (world-wide epidemic) occurred at the end of World War I. People were on the move, travelling from battlefields to home, or relocating due to involvement in the war in some way. As people travelled from one country to another, they spread the disease.

The significance of travel cannot be under-rated. People are cooped up together, breathing the same air in close quarters, in ships, airplanes, buses and trains. They mix in stations, airports, and hotels. If hygiene is inadequate in restrooms and restaurants, travellers can be exposed to disease through direct contact.

Health authorities tell us a new pandemic is overdue, and we know there is at least one serious virus spreading. Should you travel now?

## Vermilion #24 says goodbye

Princeton lost a 95-year-old association this past Thursday.

The Noble Grand of Vermilion Rebekah Lodge # 24, Sister Germaine Blanchette, surrendered the lodge charter to Sister Marion Knisely of Comox, this year's President of the Rebekah Assembly of BC, who was accompanied by her Marshall Mary Mayes and Assembly Secretary Burga Black of Penticton, and the Junior Past President Pamela Ottas of Princeton.

Other members present were Marion Marsel, Dorothy Stenvold, Michele Moore, Betty Golovin, Adelle MacDonald, Nancy Holt and Freda Schroeder.

It was a sad day for the members, although some obviously believed it was time.

One or two will be joining another lodge in the area.

Vermilion # 24 was instituted on May 31, 1910, and it has had many ups and downs regarding membership over the years, but was able to participate in many local events as part of its fraternal mandate; presenting local and provincial school bursaries for Education, planting trees and flowers for Living Legacy, volunteering when asked and entering parades for Community.

Donations were made each year to Visual Research at the Vancouver General and UBC Hospitals, and to Arthritis, as these were two of the IOOF/Rebekah main programs. Some of the members felt that "the lodge" was a constant in their lives through good times and bad, and that the friendships made in these twice-monthly meetings would last forever.

For some, it was their only source of social contact; for others, it was one more group they belonged to, but with different interests.

The lodge had a few members with

almost 40 or more years of continuous membership, and one member with 60 years of non-continuous. It has had several 'homes' over its 95 years; from the Odd Fellows Hall on Bridge Street to the OAPO Hall on Billiter.

## Developing homework skills

As parents we want our children to do well in school and in life. Developing positive homework skills with your child or teen prepares them to do well in school and throughout their life.

The most you ever hear about homework from your children is that they hate it, doesn't have any, or has too much of it the night before a test. But it's more likely that your child is actually lacking in some essential homework skills.

Judy Dodge, author of The Study Skills Handbook and a study skills consultant, says young people need to incorporate three key skills to do homework well.

Children and young people need to be organized. They need to develop ways to ensure that homework can be worked on successfully, such as finding a homework site within the home that is quiet and free of distractions, creating a homework filing system, and using visual organizers.

They should manage their time by setting a consistent time to do the work, get proper sleep, take appropriate breaks, and accurately project how long an assignment will take.

Children and young people need to know and use a variety of learning strategies, such as rewriting drawing, memorizing aloud, and making flash cards.

Members are getting older and the young people of today have more commitments and less time for themselves, so fraternal organizations are losing ground in all communities.

But who knows, maybe like everything else, their time will come again.

teacher, bringing home all materials needed from school, begin studying at your set time, putting all your effort into doing the homework well, and placing their completed homework in their school bags or at the door to take back to school the next day.

Homework experts say the key to developing good homework habits is to make them regular and reasonable. Encourage your child to study or read something - even if they do not have homework. Study with your child. While your child does homework, read, study something new, or catch up on work. Be available to help your child.

How long should your child be studying? Preschoolers to grade 1 should work up to 15 minutes 3 days a week and read with you each day. Children in grade 2 and 3 should work up to 20 minutes 5 days per week, children in grade 4 and 5 should work up to 30 minutes 5 days per week, pre-teens in grade 6 to 8 should work up to 1 hour up to 6 days per week, and grade 9 to 12 students up to 3 hours 6 days a week.

Once children get the hang of homework basics, then they can become more creative with their studying strategies. Keep encouraging them to stick with it.

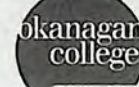

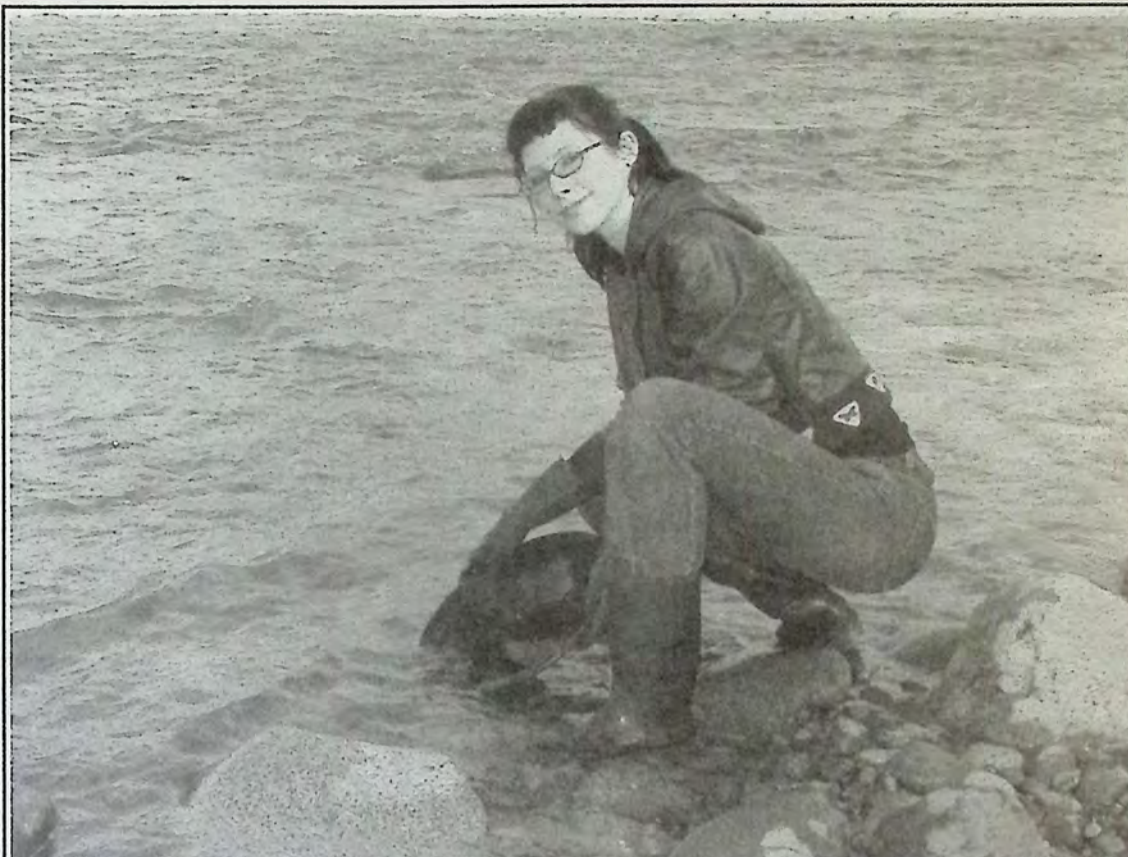

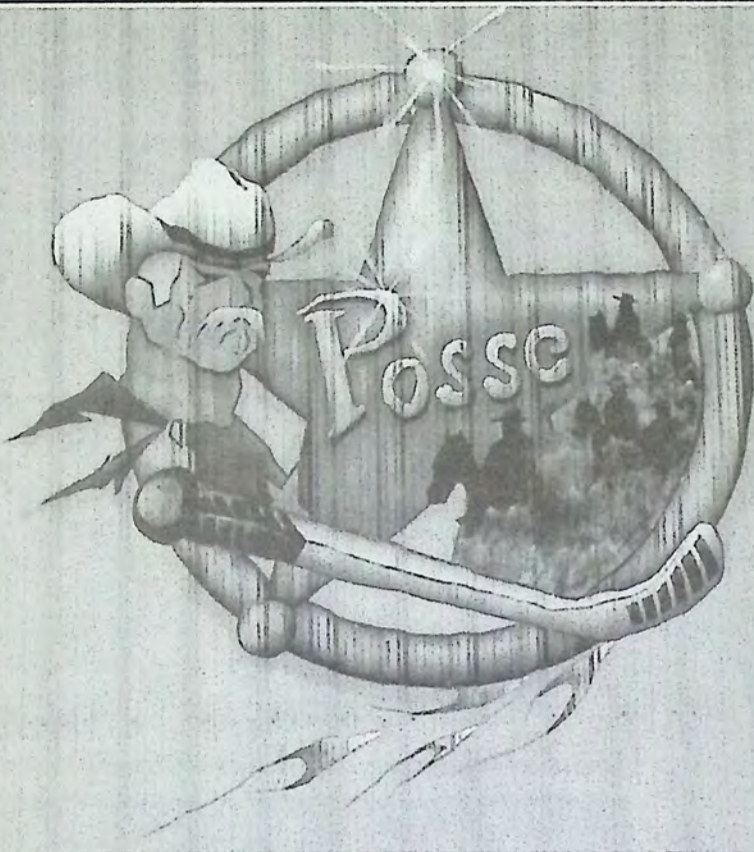

When I got home from picketing in Coquitlam and Burnaby late in the evening of October 7th there was an urgent message on my answering machine. "Geoff, it's an emergency! Call me right away. It's Robert Tarswell." I called immediately. "I need a song for a rally I'm planning for Tuesday! I have been doing a question and answer with my members. When I visit the picket lines I say 'How long are we out for?' and they say: 'As long as it takes.' That's what I want in the song."

We had planned a Thanksgiving weekend 3:00PM getaway in our little motor home to go to Keremeos for apples. But we picketed instead and we weren't packed, and Robert was insistent. So to get him off the phone I said I would have something for him tomorrow and we'd see him in the afternoon in Princeton.

As I packed I jotted down ideas, tried to create an original melody and tried them out on my wife Marion Runcie, retired Burnaby teacher. She rejected every melody. And I couldn't make the 'How long are we out for?' 'As long as it takes.' fit a workable rhythm.

So I gave up, hoping the muse would strike and my subconscious mind would create a song as I slept.

By morning, nothing. I was despondent. I decided I would have to tell Robert that it was now a rap song because I had lots of content ideas and that I was sorry there was no song.

So we hit the road early Saturday morning. On the freeway near Burnaby Lake Marion suggested we brainstorm some protest songs and see if we could fit the ideas into an existing tune.

She said 'Come on all you big strong men, Uncle Sam needs your help again.' I sang 'We have put our books away. We're on the picket line today.' And we were off.

We switched the driving chores back and forth, and through Coquitlam, Surrey, and Langley we wrote verses. By Abbotsford we were arguing about the best order and Marion was deleting my favourite lines. 'Too rude,' she said.

By Hope, Marion had printed a legible final copy. And I relaxed. Disappointing Robert would have been rough.

When we hit Princeton, and finally tracked down a rather hyperactive President, we typed it up in the office, made a few copies and then started tracking down potential singers.

Unfortunately Thanksgiving holiday weekend is not the best time to rip people away from extended families to learn a song. After a nice lunch with Robert and his family, a few trips around town giving out rally posters, a tour of backroads and 'the Castle' we retired to the safety and quiet of our RV while Robert made more phone calls.

An hour later: loud knock on the door. Robert says 'Jump in the car. We're going to record the song at Shirley and Wah Fee Low's house.' Shirley graciously loaned me her guitar.

I sat on the bench of the black grand piano and, what luck, their

son-in-law Dean, a recording engineer, was up for the weekend.

Two takes later we had a rough version suitable for teaching it to the volunteer singers before Tuesday's rally. CD would be ready by morning.

Much appreciation by me to Wah Fee and Shirley, admiration of her amazing art and after giving up figuring where Wah Fee and I had met before, time for bed.

Sunday early, we went to Petro Can to gas up, and Robert zoomed up to Low's to get my copy, promising to be back before we had filled up. Well, he must have got distracted. About thirty minutes later he roars down the main drag, windows down with AS LONG AS IT TAKES THIS TIME blaring out of his excellent car sound system.

He promises to send the lyrics around to other locals for use there and we drive off to get organic apples at Keremeos.

When we get home Monday, I have e-mails requesting the song as an MP3 file because teachers want to sing it at local rallies and on the picket line. People phone me to ask permission to use it.

Why ask! Information is free. Fortunately my daughter Alex, who started her practicum this week, knows what an MP3 is and how to send a file. By Tuesday this hastily written song was motivating teachers and others all over the province.

I have sung it on 25 picket lines in Coquitlam, Burnaby and Vancouver. It was performed at the big Victoria rally Tuesday, October 17th at the Legislature as the other unions shut down in support of teachers.

Without Robert's encouragement, creativity and perseverance this song would not have happened. So a special thanks to Princeton teachers, especially the Low's for your role in making this song happen.

**Sweet Turkey Potato Salad**

- 3/4 lb. deli turkey breast, cut into 1/4 inch cubes or cooked turkey breast, cut into 1/2 inch cubes
- 2 lbs. red potatoes, cooked, peeled and cut into 1/2 inch cubes
- 1/2 cup dried cranberries
- 1/4 cup raisins
- 1/4 cup walnuts, chopped
- 1/2 cup low fat mayonnaise
- 1 tbsp. lemon juice
- 1 tbsp. orange juice
- 1 tsp. orange peel, grated
- 1/2 tsp. fresh ginger, grated
- 1/4 tsp. nutmeg
- lettuce leaves for garnish

In large bowl, combine turkey, potatoes, cranberries, raisins and walnuts. In a small bowl, combine mayonnaise, lemon juice, orange juice, orange peel, ginger and nutmeg. 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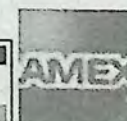
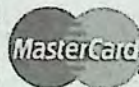

We are sometimes amazed by what we hear in our office. This week we have heard a lot of confused comments regarding the upcoming Municipal Election.

We are being asked when the vote was that elected Randy McLean as Mayor and 'do we really have to vote for anyone else now?'

The fact that no one else filed papers to seek the Mayor's position put the only person who had - McLean - in that seat by acclamation. It's a default victory. No one else to campaign against, so McLean is now the Mayor of Princeton.

The recent actions against B.C. Teachers Federation should be cause for alarm all over Canada. When a judge allows intervention into the funds and operation of a private organization, this is cause for alarm. The fact that it is a labour organization funded by members is even more alarming.

In the abstract letter of the law, the judge may have ruled on the basis that the organization was engaged in an illegal activity. That is merely the letter of the law, but certainly not the spirit of the law.

Labour organizations fought hard battles in the past, and many Canadians died in conflict, in order to establish the right to refuse to work for an employer who would not bargain.

I know about this in a very personal way, as my grandfather was a labour leader for coal miners, and spent time in a jail in Nanaimo for daring to strike. That was 100 years ago, and I hope we do not have a government that wants to go back 100 years in labour legislation.

Whether we call it a "strike" or "job action", it is the decision of a group of workers who have decided their employer is not playing fair. The right to refuse to work under unfair working conditions is nothing new in our system. If the employer is the BC government, that should give it no more leeway in bargaining than any other employer, and only the government could have put the teachers in a position in which their refusal to work was deemed illegal.

I cannot imagine any other employer having the audacity to declare strikers criminals and then find a judge who would freeze the strike pay account. If Weyerhaeuser did this to IWA, every union employee in our province would walk off the job.

I know what citizens are calling the government action. They use the term "dictatorship" without a moment's hesitation. The fact that it is teachers did not seem to enter the equation at all. What people thought of was the unilateral action against the organization's money, which its members had deposited.

I have gone to court in Princeton

for 23 years. I have seen gentler "disciplinary action" rendered to people who broke laws under the Canada Criminal Code. I have never heard a judge say to a thief or a drunk driver, "Your bank account is frozen."

Where is the balance? What makes the teachers more vulnerable than a thief, a drunk driver or even a murderer? What judge would dare to say to any common criminal, "The money you deposited in the bank is frozen."

A lot of ultra-conservative business people may support the government. This is foolish. Business depends on people spending

money. In my grandfather's time, people had little disposable income. As a result, there were few stores. There are a limited number of rich people spending on goods, but a well-paid work force will make business people rich, and a work force living hand to mouth will shut down businesses depending on disposable income.

When government takes action against labour, the threat touches every worker and every business. When the government takes dictatorial action to erase civil rights, it affects every voter. We had better sit up and take notice.

## Man supports recreation planning

The Editor;

I'm with those who want to support the pool borrowing referendum with a vision for overall recreation planning and programming.

Certainly, residents who support borrowing to build an indoor pool want our Recreation Commission to have a plan to successfully manage the pool through the future.

Those with experience in the ups and down of community rec know that the best recreation plans have broad appeal in all programs that draw in all ages to some or all of the playground, track, hiking trail, playing field, workshop, gymnasium, racquet court or swimming pool.

The proposed Keremeos indoor pool is a four lane main pool, a wading pool, a hot pool and a fitness room.

Consultants who presently do pool workups for the Town of Oliver did pool workups for the District of Houston, B.C. and suggested that Houston's four lane aquatic centre have a \$467,000 a year operating

cost with a \$302,000 operating subsidy from taxation.

Houston has a population of 3,500. A \$270,000 a year operating subsidy from taxation is proposed here. If the actual operating cost is \$450,000 then about \$180,000 may need to be made up from the pool admission fees. We have a population of 5,000 to draw upon.

In the areas of Keremeos, Hedley, Olalla and Cawston we would require 36,000 swims a year at \$5 admission to make up the operating costs.

That's seven or eight swims a

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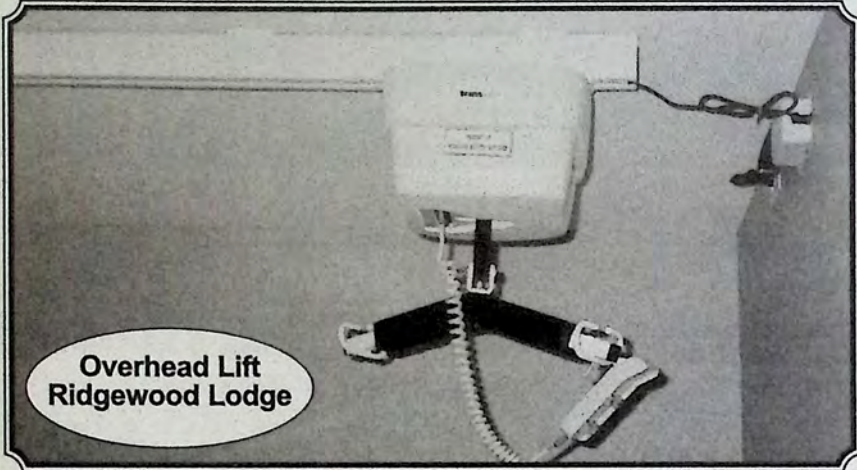
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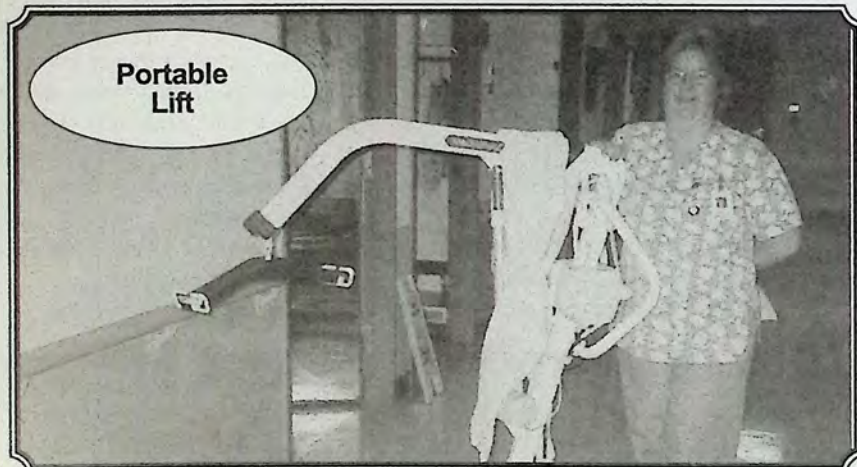


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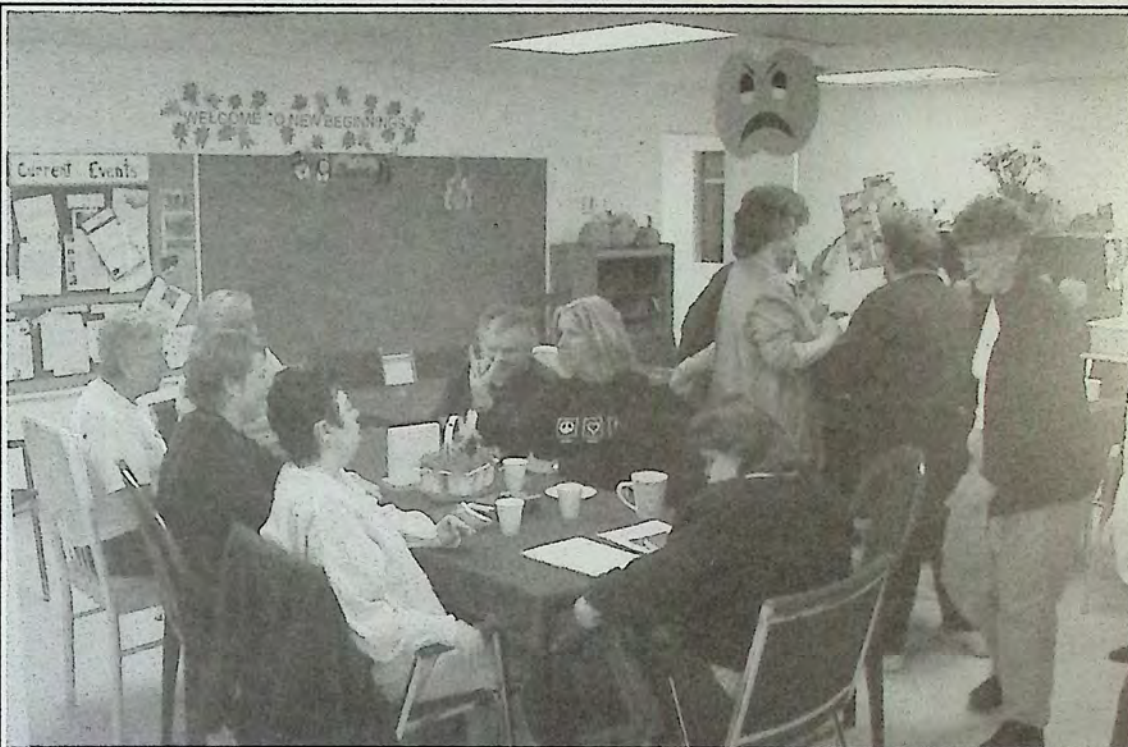

## Council hears Arts Survey report

The Princeton area arts survey shows residents want performing arts available in the community. Dawn Johnson, President of the Arts Council and chair of the ArtsNow committee gave the report at the October 17 Council meeting. Town of Princeton is a sponsoring partner, along with Area H, and the report has gone to Gerri Logan, Area H Director. (See survey results in full at the end of this article.)

Johnson told Council there is a similar survey of what Princeton Secondary School students want, and it shows the same desire for performing arts.

Johnson said to Council, "Most people think of theatre as actors, but much more expertise is required. Theatre arts include writers, sound system management, lighting management, set design and set management, prop management, budget management, promotion, direction, costume making and make-up, and finally, music for some productions."

She said the ArtsNow committee had done an inventory of talented people in the arts residing in Princeton, and found a wealth of talent. The next step in the process is to help the community launch a performing arts group. The committee will be looking for people interested in the performing arts to create the group, and will be applying for a government grant to pay professionals to train local people so the group will be sustainable for many years to come.

Johnson warned Council the ArtsNow committee will be going back to Council to ask for funding for the project. Grants must be matched dollar for dollar by local sponsors and supporters. The committee is hoping to attract other funding partners in addition to Council. At this time, the committee does not have a budget, but when the project plan is completed, the search for funds will commence. Funding partners must have made a commitment in writ-

ing by the third week of January, as the grant application must be in Victoria by January 31, 2006.

As part of the submission, the ArtsNow committee will look for a historic component to the project to tie it to Princeton's 150th anniversary in 2010.

### Arts Survey Results

One hundred survey forms were completed, and the data compiled was analyzed by Dawn Johnson and Mary Bedford.

Of the 100 people who completed the survey, there were three youths, 11 young adults age 20-40, 44 mature adults age 40 plus, and 42 retired.

The majority, 89 percent, were well aware of what constituted the arts. However, only 36 percent were aware of arts available locally. **This clearly shows a lack of public awareness of arts groups and arts resources available in our area. There is a need to make existing resources more visible.**

**Fifty-five percent** of those interviewed are involved in artistic activities, primarily as a leisure activity. Only 12 received money for their art activity. This would reflect paintings, pottery or other art works sold. Only one indicated a livelihood from art work.

An overwhelming majority expressed a desire to do some kind of activity in the arts that is not available locally. Although some were not aware of this activity already available, most were most clearly aware it is not available.

A breakdown of what people would like goes as follows:

- music performances - 12
- sculpture - 1
- dance, including ballroom dancing - 8
- drama, theatre arts - 28
- landscaping - 3
- painting for teens - 1
- pottery - 6
- crafts - 3
- photography - 4
- First Nations art - 1
- singing group - 1
- film making - 3

- woodworking - 1
- flower arranging - 1

When asked what they would like to see in Princeton to improve the arts and cultural environment, there were many who had no ideas. Of those who made a choice, the breakdown is as follows:

- Community arts centre - 23
  - Art destination - 2
  - Street market of the arts - 1
  - Alpine theme downtown - 1
  - River walk - 1
  - Band shelter at Cenotaph Park - 1
- When asked if they would be supportive of the Town or Area H giving grants for the arts, only one person responded with a "No".
- The survey gave a choice of amounts of money in the grants. The results were as follows:
- \$2,000 - 11
  - \$5,000 - 12
  - \$10,000 - 13
  - more than \$10,000 - 26
  - Yes, but no specific amount - 24 (this group answered with "whatever we can get" or "whatever is available" or similar responses.)

A summary of arts activity in the community indicates not only a high awareness of the arts but **involvement by 50 percent of local people in some kind of arts activity in their leisure time.** This held true regardless of age group.

The survey was designed to discover what people feel is lacking in arts and culture in the community. Among our adult population, it is clear there is a demand for the dramatic arts and music performances. **A full 39% of responses fell into those two categories.**

Surprisingly, **86% of respondents are in favour of grants to the arts.**

\*\*\* Not all of the figures will add up to 100%, as some respondents did not answer some of the questions. However, all of the respondents answered most of the questions. Many put considerable thought into the open-ended questions about what is missing in arts in the local scene.

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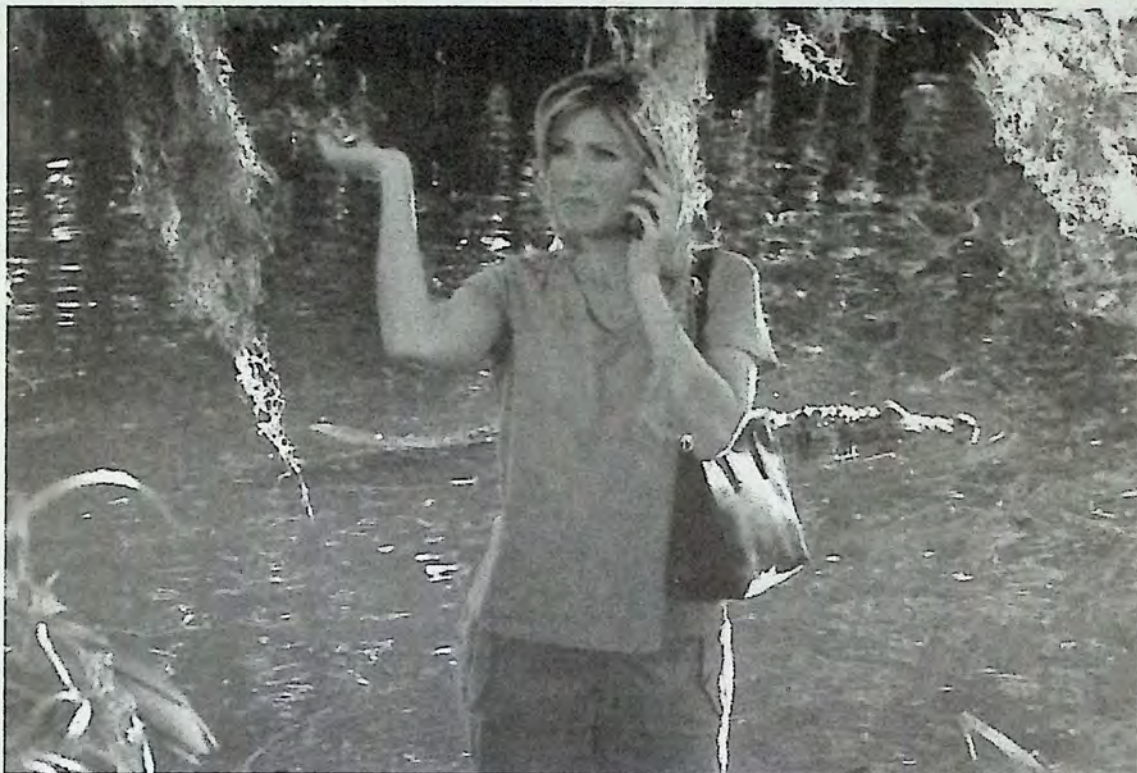
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
