## Community bands together for fun

Local organizations and businesses linked together to put on a great Halloween party once again. Approximately 1,000 people, mostly youngsters and parents, attended the annual Spook House at the fairgrounds to celebrate Halloween.

Princeton's Fire Department built the Spook House, while Citizens on Patrol and other emergency services personnel helped with crowd control and keeping everyone safe.

Connie Howe organized youth, including Katimavik volunteers, as the ghosts, ghouls, witches and other spooks to scare the children.

The Lions Club served hot chocolate and cookies, and every child received a goody bag filled with treats.

Fall Fair members and other volunteers manned the fairgrounds concession stand to hand out soft drinks, coffee, hamburgers, onion rings and French fries to people of all ages, asking nothing in return but a donation to the Fire Department for next year's Spook House. A total of \$121 was received in donations. The Fall Fair used up leftover supplies to provide these extra treats.

The fireworks were organized by Drew Nordquist and set off with the help of Jim Bernard. The Fire Department and Peter Ruoss built and managed the huge bonfire. Somebody Up There organized the good weather.

A tremendous amount of cooperation between community groups makes the Halloween event successful.

Fire Chief Eric Gregson has said the entire Spook House and Halloween event has grown far too big for the Fire Department to continue to organize it and is looking for some other group to take it over and run it. So far, no group has done so, but the benefit to the community is huge. Downtown merchants no longer fear the kind of damage that happened years ago on Halloween night, the police have a far easier job, and parents have a safe environment for their children to experience the fun of Halloween.

## All-Candidates Forum attracts a crowd

Well over 100 people packed the Legion Hall last Tuesday night for the All-Candidates Forum.

Each of the Candidates were introduced with a short bio and then allowed to present an opening statement.

Pam Jones, who is seeking her first term on council explained her reasons for becoming a Candidate.

"I'm running for Town Council because I want to give something back and to thank Princeton for making me feel welcome."

Regarding progress and the future of Princeton, Jones said, "We have to get cracking" and diversify to address the current needs of the community's demographics.

Danny Sulentich, who has served many years on council in the past, sees a Community Plan as an essential asset.

"We have to have a plan in place to encourage new business to Princeton."

He added that improvements are needed to infrastructure including water, sidewalks, streets and the hospital.

He suggests a five year plan would be helpful.

Maria Sadegur is seeking her first term on Town Council.

"I've let my name stand as I want to help Princeton emerge from economic malaise."

She pointed to the need to upgrade existing bylaws and the hiring of a bylaw enforcement officer and would also like to see the development and marketing of an economic package.

"We also need to improve the current water supply and traffic flow within our Town Limits."

Jim Manion has been on Town Council in the past. He identified a number of issues including the development of the airport and business park, marketing our community and working with existing businesses.

"I firmly believe we need to develop a Community Plan. It is a template for today's council and future councils."

Manion says such a plan requires public input.

John Babiak is seeking his first term on council.

He has a number of concerns with the top one being, "there is no official Community Plan in place."

Babiak also feels the industrial park needs development, "When you have new development it attracts new business and more people to your community."

He also sees the airport as an asset, wants to see bylaws updated and harmony with Area H and the SVPS.

Spencer Coyne is seeking re-election to Town Council.

"We're all here tonight for the same reason. The future of our community."

He says he believes the next Town Council will be very important in the development of the future of Princeton.

Other issues include development of the business park, airport, tourism and a long-term infrastructure plan.

Ray Jarvis is seeking re-election to Town Council.

"After losing the mine here and all the families, it left quite a void and it takes a long time to fill a void."

He sees the wood waste power generating plant and methane gas projects as important to the future of the community.

On attracting new business Jarvis said, "Look at the strip mall. Three years ago it was empty now it is full. Town Council must be doing something right."

Darrel Alexandre is seeking his first term on Town Council.

"We need to make our town a destination for tourists and travellers."

He feels working on marketing our natural resources, such as lakes and hiking trails would be beneficial.

"We have to promote tourism heavily to attract tourists to our unique attractions."

He would also like to see stiff penalties imposed on deer feeders.

Following the opening statements was a question period featuring questions submitted previous to the forum.

The first five questions were aimed at specific candidates challenging either individual promises or previous performance, followed by a series of questions for all candidates to answer.

All candidates agreed they should be held accountable for election promises and that they would commit to doing their homework.

Lorne Esselink was unable to attend the Forum.

# Many missed a great lesson

A lot of Princeton area people missed the opportunity to learn a lot more about today's leadership imperatives. On November 2, Princeton & District Community Skills Centre hosted the 11th annual Worldwide Luminary Series on leadership. A mere 26 people attended the teleconferenced lessons in leadership.

**Top leaders gave tips**

Leaders in business, such as Virgin Galactic President Sir Richard Branson, were the teachers, sharing the lessons they learned on their way to becoming world class examples of leadership. Branson talked about leaving school at 15 to start his magazine, and setting up his record company next. He told how his Virgin Airlines survived while other airlines went into bankruptcy, and he explained what made him start a space travel company.

**Rudy Giuliani**

On September 11, 2001, the world learned the name "Rudy Giuliani". He was Mayor of New York City. Giuliani told the audience how he managed to keep things running during his city's worst crisis. The attack on the World Trade Centre tested all of his leadership skills.

Giuliani believes leaders must have strong beliefs and communicate those beliefs to others.

"You have to know what you stand for," he repeated.

He said leaders must know where they are going, and must offer positive solutions to problems. He noted that leaders are not leaders if nobody follows, and people follow those who offer solutions. He added leaders must be optimistic about the future.

Giuliani believes leadership requires "relentless preparation". The best decisions are made by those who have anticipated problems and prepared for them. He

credits the emergency preparedness plans in place in New York for giving him the tools he needed to give the right commands for organizing the response to the 9/11 emergency.

"Leaders must understand teamwork," Giuliani stated. "Nobody knows everything."

**Jack Welch**

Jack Welch was CEO of General Electric for 20 years. He shared his concept of what happens in a crisis, using Hurricane Katrina as an example. He gave five stages: 1. denial there is a crisis (it can't happen here) which results in lack of preparation; 2. containment (it's happening but let's not tell everybody); 3. blame (it's not our fault); 4. over-reaction (panic) and 5. find the solution.

He said FEMA was hampered by the top-down administration governed by Homeland Security, a department concerned with terrorism "not wind and rain". FEMA could not act until it had authorization from Homeland Security.

He said good leadership lets everybody know where they stand. The purpose is clear and concise, and the team is continually upgraded.

**Bill Marriott**

A panel of CEOs and Presidents of Fortune 500 firms included Bill Marriott, who added crisis management assessment for the Marriott hotel chain. Two thousand Marriott hotel employees were involved in the Hurricane Katrina crisis. Marriott explained how they had anticipated surviving a hurricane in New Orleans. The hotels had stored equipment needed in a hurricane and employees had practiced their emergency plan. Marriott head office had organized evacuation of guests and employees, and arranged for financial support or employment at other Marriott hotels following the disas-

ter.

Bill Marriott said the company is committed to its employees and he, personally, went to hotels and talked with employees as a matter of course. He is a great believer in training programs for employees and Marriott hotels keep employees longer than most.

**Carly Fiorina**

As former CEO of Hewlett Packard, Fiorina nursed the company through its merger with Compaq. She described starting out as a History major, then working as a receptionist. She advanced because others saw her potential and encouraged her. Fiorina said everybody can have potential leadership skills.

"Leadership has nothing to do with power," Fiorina stated. She emphasized leaders make a choice to make a positive difference.

Fiorina said bluntly that the old vertical chain of command style will not work in today's digital, mobile, virtual, personal environment. She said the key to success is horizontal collaboration across boundaries.

"Information is no longer power because anyone can get it," Fiorina said.

**Marcus Buckingham**

He wrote *Breaking All The Rules: What the World's Greatest Managers Do Differently*, and Marcus Buckingham brought a new slant to the seminar, as well as a lot of humour. He emphasized the need to be clear about what it is you want to achieve before you can lead others.

"Leaders take people's fear of the unknown and change it into confidence," Buckingham said.

Buckingham poked fun at Americans, saying he knows they are the most competitive people in the world because they measure everything. His lesson was not .....continued on Page 3

.....continued from previous page only about clarity, it was about finding the core strength in an organization or its personnel and building on it.

**Malcolm Gladwell**

Overtuning all of the above, Malcolm Gladwell talked of the accuracy of instantaneous judgments - the "gut" reaction from the unconscious. He described it as "mysterious", a combination of everything a person has learned focused on one problem.

Gladwell uses scientific research as the basis for his concepts. He spoke of how we become confused by too much information, and need to make decisions based on the most important information, the "make it or break it" information needed to make good decisions.

"Focus on the variables that really matter," he said.

**Stephen Covey**

Covey's message about leadership is this: "Leadership is communicating people's worth and potential so clearly that they are inspired to see

it in themselves."

He has built on his groundbreaking book *The 7 Habits of Highly Effective People*, and has gone on to write *The 8th Habit*. The seven habits applied to everyone, but the eighth habit is geared more to leaders in business, industry and government. It deals with kinds of authority.

**Summing up the seminar**

The world of business and industry is changing in its concepts of assets and liabilities, and people are emerging as the top assets. Those who spoke at the conference recognized the importance of a "people first" approach to running a successful organization. The old vertical organization chart (top-down management) is being replaced by not just a horizontal chart, but a circular chart.

Every business manager or service organization leader who missed this conference missed a great opportunity to learn new approaches to leadership. Fortunately, the Skills Centre has many books in its

library written by people who spoke at the conference.

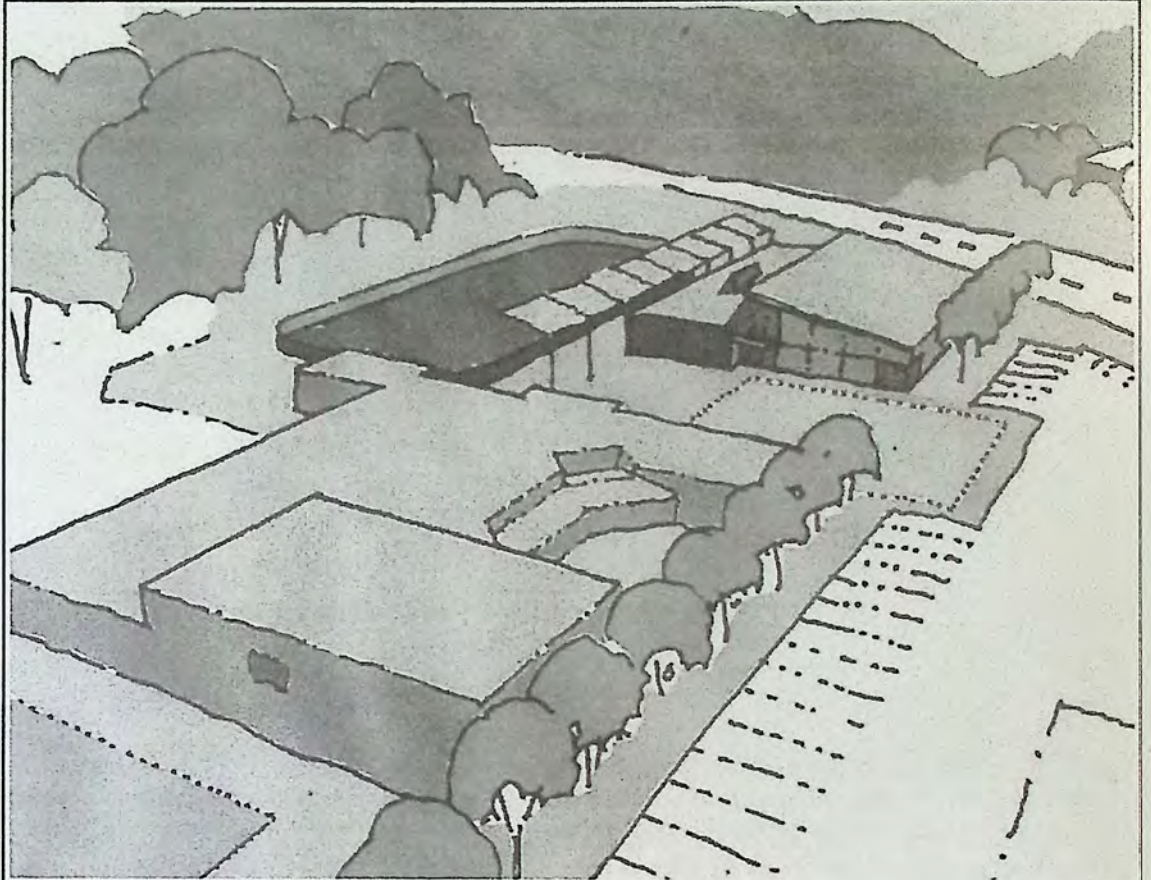

## RDOS issues referendum details

On November 19th, electors of the Regional District Okanagan-Similkameen (RDOS) Electoral Areas B and G and electors of the Village of Keremeos will go to the polls to cast a vote on the following referendum question:

"Are you in favour of the Regional District Okanagan-Similkameen enacting Bylaw No. 2348 and Bylaw No. 2119.02 to provide the following:

- authorizing the borrowing of a sum not to exceed \$4,000,000 for the construction and operation of the Similkameen Swimming Pool; and

- annually requisitioning up to a maximum of \$485,500 or \$2.05/\$1,000 taxable value of land and improvements for the construction and operation of the Similkameen Swimming Pool?"

Bylaw No. 2348, Similkameen Swimming Pool Loan Authorization Bylaw, if adopted, would authorize the Regional District to borrow not more than \$4,000,000 to construct a new facility. The bylaw states that the provincial and federal governments will be requested to make a minimum contribution of \$2,000,000 towards the project. The construction of a new swimming pool will not proceed without funding from the provincial and federal governments.

Bylaw No. 2119.02, Similkameen Swimming Pool Service Establishment Amendment Bylaw, if adopted, will amend Section 7 of Establishment Bylaw No. 2119 by increasing the total amount of money to be requisitioned to cover the costs of construction and operation of the new swimming pool.

Bylaw No. 2119.02 does not amend the apportionment section of Bylaw No. 2119 which states:

"6. The annual costs for the Similkameen Swimming Pool Service shall be apportioned with-

in the Service Area on the basis of the converted value of improvements."

## Let's open up for business!

"You turn on the tap and water comes out."

I wonder if that statement summarizes the amount of thought most of us have about the complexities of maintaining our community infrastructure.

All the wells, pumps, fire hydrants, storm drains, treatment plant, endless lines on to infinity needed to service 3,000 people, 24-hours a day, 365 days a year, all operated and maintained by seven crew members.

For many of us who maintain a household or a business it boggles the mind.

When I represented Princeton, one of my proudest responsibilities was to recognize the dedication of our employees. Hard work combined with a pride in conserving tax dollars makes them unique whenever I compared them to other communities that I visited.

So when our past council was given a report by staff and crew, we proceeded to follow it by bringing our equipment up-to-date and

establishing a \$55,000 annual line item that would provide for needs of the day as well as fund a reserve for future, larger items such as trucks or a grader.

The financial commitment of bringing our equipment up-to-date was not easy, some other portfolios were temporarily short-changed but the end result was a fixed amount which would maintain an appropriate standard in coming years.

Our council felt it was one way to reward a job being well done.

I believe that recently this line item has not been maintained and if the new councillors are in agreement, I would like to see that short-fall replaced and a policy put in place that would ensure that the annual line item amount is not subject to the whims of subsequent councils.

Another infrastructure concern that I have is the completion of the business park, in short, I believe we are one reservoir and 500-feet of line away from providing fire protection and therefore making it wide open for business.

From the economic summit in 1993 where the people of Princeton asked for this development, to the acquisition of the land, to the providing of most of the services it is frustrating that this asset is not completed and being fully exploited.

How can we attract potential businesses when their proposed buildings are restricted by our lack of fire protection?

We were given a mandate by the people, after 12 years of waiting it is time to fulfill it.

Eating fish is a powerful, good heart-health habit. In fact, eating fish at least once weekly can cut the risk of sudden cardiac death by 50%. If you don't like fish, use fish oil supplements containing omega-3 fatty acids. Those who already have heart disease and consume 1,000mg per day of fish oils from diet or supplements can reduce further heart events by 15%.

If you see someone having a seizure do you know what to do? Protect the person from injury, loosen tight clothing from around the neck and put something soft under the head if possible. You don't need to restrain the person or stuff anything in her mouth. Most seizures are self-limiting but call 911 if the person is unconscious for more than 5 minutes.

Many elderly people deficient in Vitamin B-12 take it by injection. Oral B-12 could be taken but the dose has to be much higher. This is because oral B-12 is poorly absorbed...only 1% of the dose is available to the body. So if you want to take it orally, take enough. About 1,000mcg per day. For serious deficiencies, the injection is still better.

Just to "clear the air" about smoking and cancer...it's not the nicotine that causes the cancer but the contents in the rest of the smoke. So nicotine replacement patches and lozenges are a great way to kick the habit and possibly save your life.

# Breaking the gambling habit

This article is the last in this series which has explored responsible gambling from a player, a government and finally an industry perspective. This week's article will focus on a program that is offered by the British Columbia Lottery Corporation (BCLC) which helps a player take a break from gambling. This is a program that is designed for people who feel it is in their best interest not to participate in casino or bingo gambling for a specified period of time. This program also provides people a link, if they choose, to the services of the Problem Gambling program.

The Voluntary Self-Exclusion program is a voluntary program. It was first introduced into our province in 1998 and has since gone through many changes to try and make it more effective. This program, which is administered and run by BCLC offers a person an opportunity to self-exclude themselves from either a commercial bingo facility or a gaming facility with slot machines including casinos, community gaming centers and the gaming floor of racetracks. Every self-exclusion applies to all venues with slot machines or commercial

bingo halls in the province; you may not self-exclude yourself from only one facility. This self-exclusion is time-limited; that is, a person must decide whether to self-exclude for a period of 6 months, one year, two years, or three years. At the end of the chosen time frame, a person may extend this exclusion by sending a letter to BCLC indicating their wish to do so and for how long.

Self-exclusions are handled in a discreet, respectful and courteous manner. The required paperwork can be done at a gaming venue by the Security Manager or security designate or in a location requested by the player. The information pertaining to self-exclusion is available only to security and management personnel and is handled confidentially. The process involves filling out a self-exclusion application and providing any government-issued picture ID that includes your signature. This could be a driver's license, passport or other B.C. ID. A photograph of you will be required and will be taken on site. You will also be asked if you would like to see a counselor from the problem gambling program. This link to the problem gambling pro-

gram could help you develop strategies to make this period of self-exclusion less stressful and more productive.

The self-exclusion begins as soon as you sign up. It is your responsibility to honor your commitment to the program. You will not be allowed back in a gaming facility before your exclusionary period is up. If you violate your self-exclusion contract, according to the B.C. Gaming Control Act, charges can be laid and you may be fined \$5,000.

Self-exclusion is a difficult decision. However, for those who wish to make a significant change in their lives and are need help getting started, it's an excellent choice. This program provides a kind of external control mechanism that helps you make a start and gives you the time to develop internal controls. This is why the link to counseling is so very important. The counsellors in the problem gambling program can help you develop strategies that reduce cravings, acknowledge and avoid triggers to gamble, and replace what has become an unhealthy habit with a healthy one. If you begin to gamble as a way to socialize with others and the gambling becomes a problem so you self-exclude, how will you fill your original need to socialize? These are some of the topics that typically come up in conversations with a problem gambling counselor.

One final note: enlisting in the self-exclusion program is completely voluntary and must be done by the person seeking exclusion. People cannot sign up their spouse or other family members. However, those that are affected by the gambling of others are eligible for the services of the problem gambling program. In conversations with a problem gambling counselor they can develop strategies that help them deal with the gambling of others.

Responsible gambling is a shared pursuit. There are many strategies that a player can employ to keep the fun in gambling. The gaming industry is doing many things to promote a healthy customer base including displaying a variety of responsible gambling messages in venues, limiting admission to gaming sites to those 19 and over, advertising the problem gambling help line at all its venues, and making

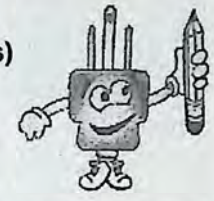

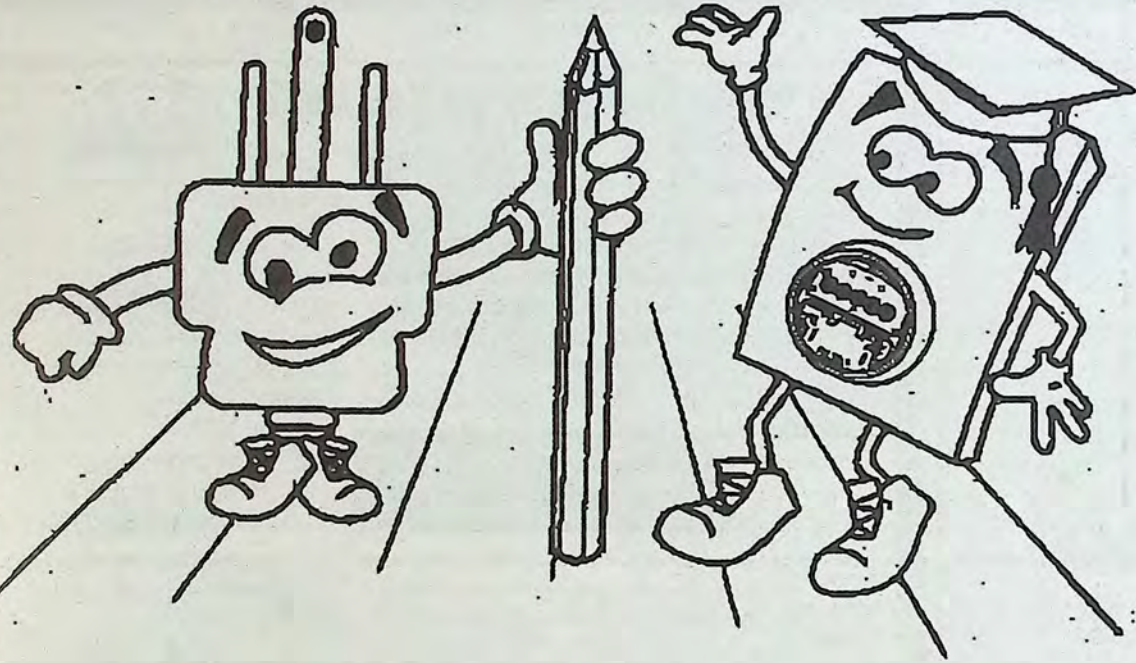

### PETER'S ACTIVITY NO. 2

We know that large cars use more fuel than small cars. Well, it's the same for electrical appliances. A large appliance, such as a refrigerator, uses more electricity than a small appliance, like an iron. To calculate the amount of electricity an appliance uses, multiply the wattage by the length of time it operates. For example: If the light bulb in your bathroom used 100 watts and it is on for 10 hours, it consumes: 100 watts x 10 hours = 1,000 watt hours of electricity = 1 kilowatt hour (kWh)

- A 600 watt coffee percolator operating for 1 hour. \_\_\_\_\_ kWh (kilowatt-hours)
- A 100 watt electric iron operating for 30 minutes \_\_\_\_\_ kWh (kilowatt-hours)

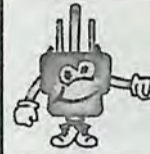


Hi! I'm Peter the Plug and this is my friend Professor Meter. We're here to tell you about electricity - where it comes from how we use it and how we measure it. Let's start by asking:

#### What is Energy?

Energy is what makes things work. Every minute of every day we use energy in one way or another. When you ride your bicycle, you're using your own physical energy to turn the pedals. Whenever your Dad or Mom drive the family car, they're using the energy in gasoline. When you turn on a light, you're using electric energy.

There are two types of energy: **RENEWABLE** - Renewable energy comes from resources which will always be with us. Some renewable energy resources are water, sun and wind. **NON-RENEWABLE** - Energy resources that we will eventually use up are non-renewable. Non-renewable energy resources include coal, oil and natural gas. Non-renewable energy resources are created over millions of years from the remains of animals and plants. The gasoline your parents use when driving your family car will take millions of years to replace.



### Meet Your Meter!

My friend, Professor Meter, can help measure how much electricity your family uses.

Reading your electric meter is as easy as telling time. By reading the dials on the face of your meter, you can figure out the amount of electrical energy (kWh) you use. Once you understand the instructions, you can do the exercise.

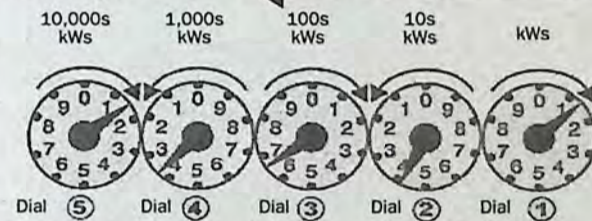
The example below is a close-up of the dials on your electrical energy meter.

Most meters in homes have five dials, but some of the older models may have four. Reading and writing down how many kWh you use is the same for both types.

Each dial turns in the opposite direction from the one beside it. Dial 1 turns clockwise; dial 2 counter-clockwise; dial 3 clockwise, etc... As dial 1 goes around completely, dial 2 will move 1/10 of a full turn. When dial 2 goes around completely, dial 3 will turn 1/10 of a full turn. In other words, dial 1 must go around 10 times before dial 2 will go around once. Read the dials from right to left, and write the figures in the same order - from right to left. When the pointer on the dial is between two numbers, write down the smaller number.

← READ DIALS RIGHT TO LEFT

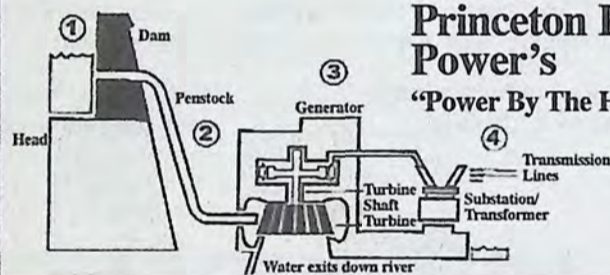

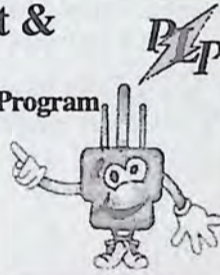
### Hydro Electricity (hydro means water)

Water is used to generate most of the electric power in B.C. A very small amount is also generated from wind, natural gas, diesel and other resources. Hydro electric plants use the energy in rivers, a renewable resource, to generate electricity.

1. A large amount of water is held by a dam in a reservoir.
2. Rapidly moving water is directed through tunnels turning turbine blades, creating mechanical energy.
3. The mechanical energy is then turned into electric energy by a generator.
4. The electricity is transported to your home or farm through high-voltage transmission lines. (Those big metal towers.)
5. Smaller distribution lines carry the electricity throughout your home or farm buildings to electrical outlets.



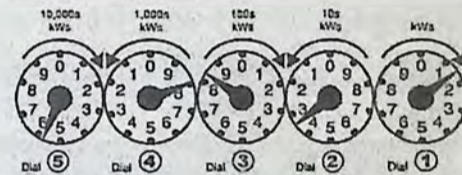

#### How To Read Your Electricity Meter - Digital Meters

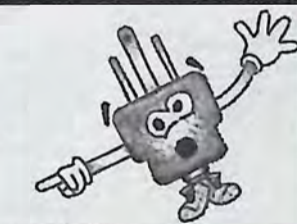
To read a digital meter, write down the numbers shown from left to right. When you next read your meter, take away the previous reading from the new one. This will give you the number of units you have used.

### Just How Much Electricity Do Things Use?

Cars and appliances have one thing in common - they both need energy to work. A car uses the energy in gasoline while an appliance uses electric energy.

The amount of gasoline a car uses is measured by a gas pump in litres. The amount of electric energy an appliance uses is measured by the energy meter in your home in kilowatt-hours.

Just as the speed of a car at a point in time is measured in kilometres per hour, the amount of electricity an appliance needs to work is measured in watts or kilowatts (1 kilowatt = 1,000 watts) and is called wattage. Every electrical appliance has a nameplate which indicates wattage (how many watts of electricity it uses) of the appliance.

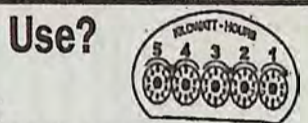

### Turning 69? You Have An Important RRSP Deadline

If you turn 69 in 2005, you're facing an important and immediate deadline. You must wind up your Registered Retirement Savings Plan (RRSP) and convert it to a Registered Retirement Income Fund (RRIF) or other income option before December 31. By law, you can't have an RRSP beyond the end of the year in which you turn 69. If you do, the entire value of your RRSP could be considered income and taxed accordingly. That would take a huge bite out of your retirement savings. And the deadline may be more pressing than you think. You must get the process of winding up your RRSP underway long before year-end. Most financial institutions require advance notice to transfer your investments to a RRIF often a month or more. And if you plan on another option, such as an annuity, you'll need time to complete the transaction.

RRIFs are the retirement income option chosen by most Canadians. They're widely available from financial institutions and offer a great deal of investment and income flexibility. A RRIF is much like an RRSP, only you must withdraw money instead of making contributions. You can hold the same types of investments in a RRIF as in your RRSP, and if you want maximum investment flexibility you can open a self-directed plan. Your investments continue to grow sheltered from tax as long as they remain in the plan. You can withdraw as much as you wish from a RRIF each year. However, government regulations require a minimum annual withdrawal, based on your age and the value of the plan. You'll be taxed on the funds you use for income.

But there are alternatives to a RRIF. If you're looking for a simple way to create income for the rest of your life, without the chores of managing investments, an annuity may be a better option. With a life annuity, you provide a lump sum to an insurance company in exchange for a guaranteed income stream for life. These payments, usually made monthly, are a combination of investment returns and repayment of part of your principal amount. Generally payments are fixed for the term of the annuity. The income you receive is taxable. Many factors influence the level of income your annuity will generate. These include age, gender, the type of annuity and investment conditions. Annuity payments are influenced by interest rates at the time of purchase, so buying an annuity during times of higher rates will produce more income. And the longer the annuity is expected to make payments, the lower the regular amount. Some annuities provide payments for lifetime, others to age 90.

Of course, you can choose both a RRIF and an annuity. By combining the two you can position yourself with steady, worry-free retirement income and a chance to exercise greater control over part of your retirement assets. Your other option is to take your RRSP money in cash. But this definitely, isn't a good idea. You'll be heavily taxed, since the entire amount will be considered income on a single year's tax return. It's a good idea to speak to an investment representative before you make a retirement income decision. With professional help you can select the right income option for your needs and the right investments.

And here's one more important item: don't forget to make your final RRSP contribution. Those turning 69 can contribute during the calendar year, but not up until the RRSP deadline of the following year. By getting more money into your RRSP before December 31 you'll increase your retirement savings and reduce this year's tax bill.

**Turkey Burrito Burgers**

- 2 lbs. ground turkey
- 1 can chopped green chilies
- 1 cup onion, chopped
- 1 pkg. taco seasoning mix
- 8 flour tortillas (8-inch)
- 1 can refried beans
- 1/2 cup cheddar cheese, shredded
- lettuce, shredded
- salsa, optional
- vegetable cooking spray

Spray cold grill rack with vegetable cooking spray. Preheat charcoal grill for direct-heat method cooking. In a medium bowl combine turkey, chilies, onion and seasoning mix. Evenly divide turkey mixture into 8 (9x2-inch) rectangular-shaped burgers. Grill burgers 3 to 4 minutes, turn and continue cooking another 3 to 4 minutes or until 170F internal temperature is reached and meat is no longer pink in the centre. Remove and keep warm. Heat tortillas and spread each tortilla with refried beans and sprinkle with lettuce. Place burgers in the centre of each tortilla and sprinkle with cheese. Fold sides of tortilla over burger to create a burrito. Serve with salsa. Makes 8 servings.

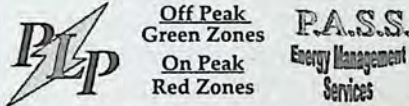

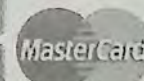
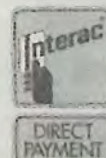

Then we went to last Tuesday night's All-Candidates Forum. It was there that we discovered that we had been doing it all wrong.

We should have allowed each Candidate a short opening statement. You know, tell us a bit about yourself and your vision. But only enough to get comfortable in case we turn around and ask a tough question.

Then, after each Candidate completed this task, we should have picked the four or five Candidates we don't like, or don't want to see on Town Council and asked some sort of personal question - you know, something just short of an attack but enough to make them look bad if they answered correctly - then after we got that off our chest we'd get down to asking the same question of all Candidates.

Then we'd decide who to vote for after that.

What actually impressed us about the Candidates who were 'singled out' at the All-Candidates Forum was their answers. Each of them handled the unfair questions with grace and - from what we could tell - honesty.

Whoever's plan it was to derail these Candidates backfired as each of them probably earned extra votes at the Forum as a result of their responses.

The unfortunate part of the whole evening was that probably only half the questions submitted were asked. We bet there were some pretty darned good questions that never made it to the podium and the ones that were asked were not identified as to who contributed them.

Judging by the feedback filtering back into our office, we aren't the only ones bothered by the procedures used at the Forum. But that's not for us to sort out.

If you missed the Forum, you missed hearing eight of the nine Candidates (one was unable to attend - and probably dodged one of 'those' questions as a result). Princeton voters have a tough choice to make as each of them are pretty good choices, based on what they say and what we're hearing.

It's really not going to be that easy to choose four people to join our Mayor-Elect in pushing Princeton into the future.

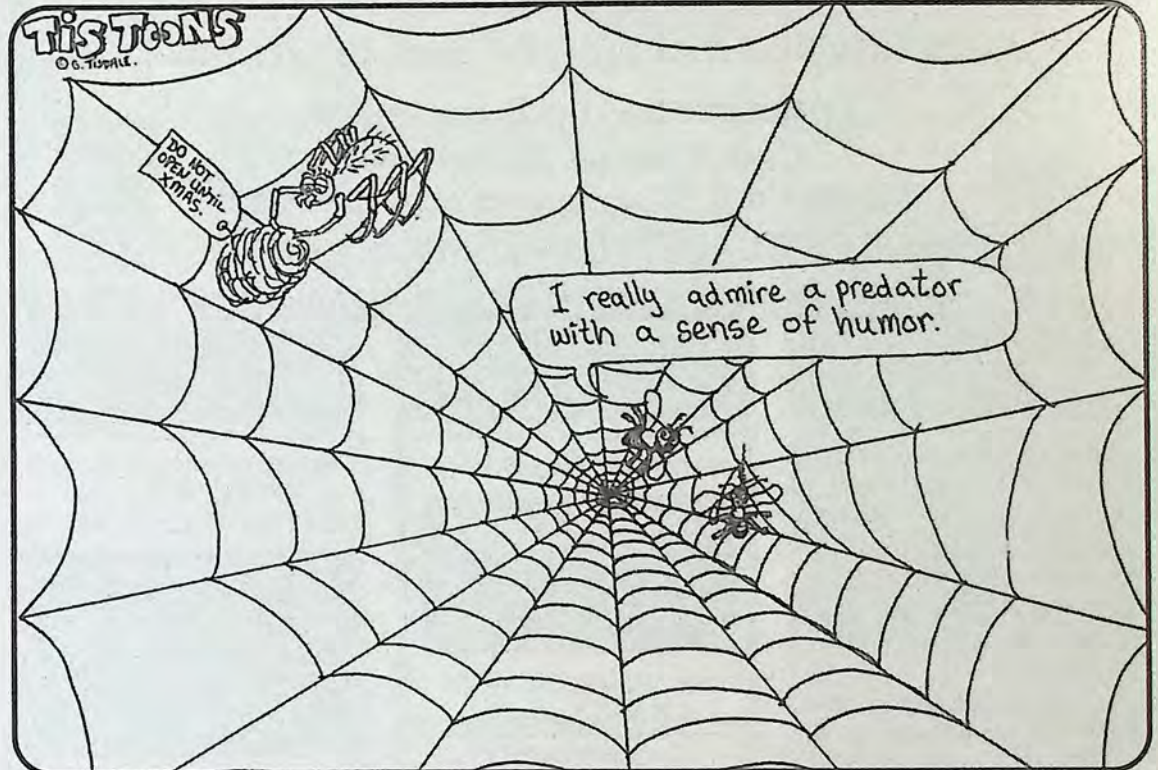

## Building Assets: A Powerful Parenting Approach

Assets inoculate young people against a wide range of risk-taking behaviour. Peter L. Benson, Ph.D., president of Search Institute says, "It's easy to get scared as a parent. Watching the news, we see crime, drinking and driving, teen pregnancy, suicide, drug use, bullying. We wonder what's going to happen to our children."

In our fear, we may end up scaring our kids so that they live in fear as well. Or we may look the other way, thinking that these things would never affect our families.

Whatever the approach, most parents feel uncertain at times. We would like to know the secrets of healthy parenting in a world that often seems very unhealthy.

The idea of developmental assets, introduced by the Search Institute in Minneapolis, gives a new sense of hope and practical direction for parents. Researchers at the institute have identified developmental assets that have a powerful, positive impact on young people. Children and teenagers who have a lot of assets get involved in very few at risk behaviours-the kinds of problems we worry about. And when young people have a lot of assets, they are much more likely to do the positive things we value.

Assets do make a difference. By incorporating them into your par-

enting, you can help your child grow up healthy and competent.

How to Start? You are already building assets by supporting and loving them. By empowering your child. By setting clear, consistent and realistic boundaries and expectations. By helping your child use his or her time in meaningful and constructive ways. By encouraging your child to develop a commitment to learning. By instilling in your child positive values. By developing social competencies in your child. By encouraging your child to form a positive identity.

If you focus on the positive then your child will too.

## Remember their legacy

On the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month, we remember.

Remembrance Day was set at the end of World War I and has continued as a tradition in Canada. In the early years, this day was known as Armistice Day. It is now Remembrance Day. As we come to the end of the Year of the Veteran, we are reminded by television that the men and women who fought the wars on behalf of Canada have left a legacy for those who have never had to go to war. How do we define their legacy?

### They gave us national identity

Young people today know who they are - they are Canadians. The soldiers who went to World War I and World War II fought under the Red Ensign, and were British subjects. They fought under the direction of British commanders as part of Britain's armed forces. They have never done that again.

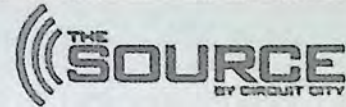
In World War I, nobody could beat the German army back from Vimy Ridge until the Canadians came along. The Canadians took Vimy Ridge, advancing one metre at a time. A memorial stands to the

Canadians at Vimy, France, today. For the first time, Canadians were identified as Canadians. In World War II, Canadians fought and died in Africa, Italy, Hong Kong, China, France, Germany, Belgium and especially in Holland, where Canadians took territory against terrible odds in terrible conditions to free the Dutch from the Nazi grip. Around the world, people have learned about Canada and Canadians thanks to peacekeeping forces deployed to places like the Gaza Strip, Pakistan, Bosnia and Afghanistan.

### Activists for peace

Canada supported the formation of the United Nations Organization (UN) which was formed at the end of World War II as a means of bringing nations together to settle their differences through words instead of arms. Canada's Prime Minister Lester Pearson won the Nobel Peace Prize for his efforts in

making the UN effective. Canada's armed forces have served under the United Nations flag, and were among the first to do so, beginning with the Korean War and numerous peacekeeping efforts.

### Veterans' legacy at home

The Royal Canadian Legion became the peacetime service organization formed to care for veterans, and the widows and orphans of those who died in wars. The Legion became much more than a service to veterans and dependents. Following World War II, veterans continued to serve their country in many ways through the Legion.

for youth, contributed to youth sports, supported Cadet troops providing leadership and skills training, and most recently, the Legion Youth Auxiliary. They continued to serve in every walk of life.

**The 'never again' message**  
Every year, the Legion organizes the Remembrance Day parade and

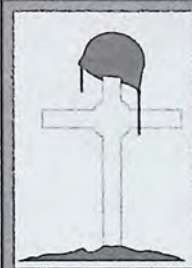

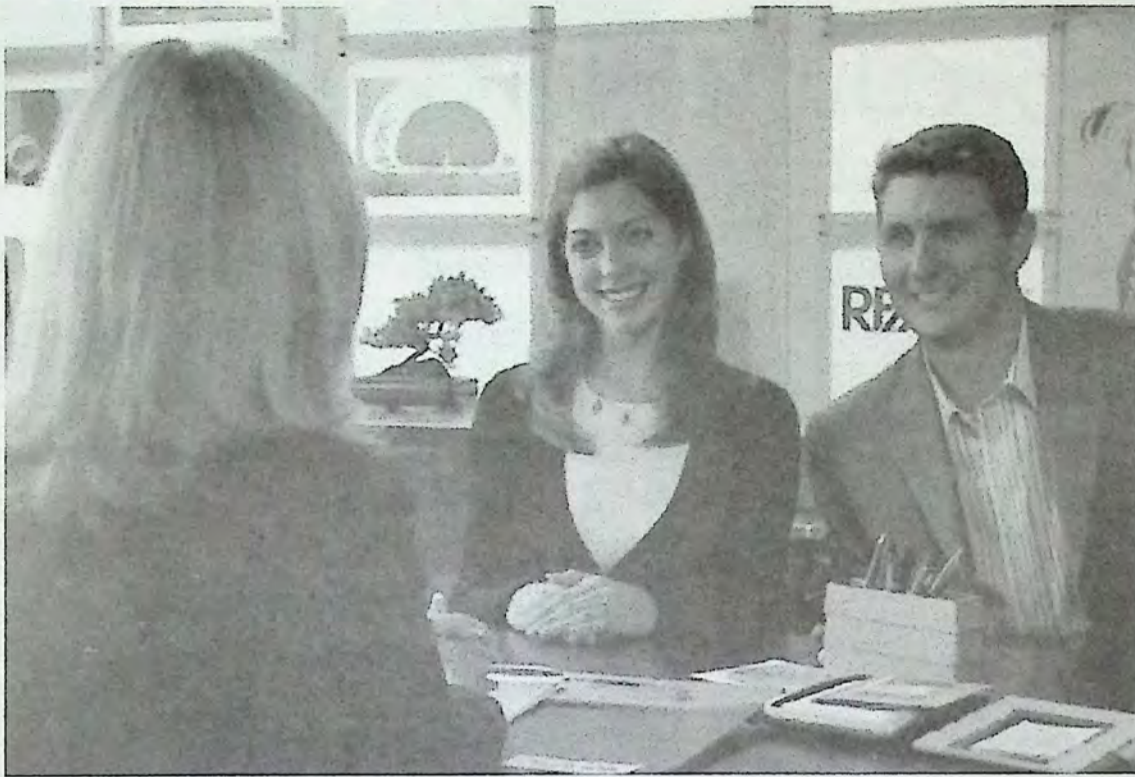

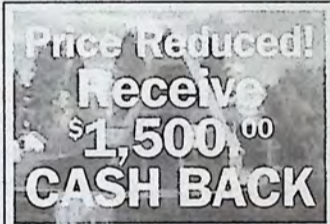
