# Groups reach agreement



Princeton lost a landmark early Saturday morning when the Princeton Hotel was destroyed by fire. The brick building, built in 1910, was the oldest building in downtown Princeton.

## Mayor praises USIB

Representatives from the Upper Similkameen Indian Band, including Chief Rick Holmes, Councillor Miranda Squakin, Band Manager Philippe Batini and Band Archaeologist Brenda Gould met with Area G Director Joe Nitsch, Area H Director Gerri Logan and representatives from the Town of Princeton, including Mayor Randy McLean, council members Jim Manion, Ray Jarvis and Pam Jones and the Chief Administrative Officer Patrick Robins.

The purpose of the March 27th meeting was to discuss the revision and resigning of a 2001 Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between the Band, Area H and the Town of Princeton. The Upper Similkameen Valley local governments and the Upper Similkameen Indian Band have been meeting for several years in order to improve communications and collaborate on a number of mutual objectives.

The parties all agreed that further discussion should occur to review, amend and potentially re-sign the agreement. A number of key issues were identified for further exploration: The development of a Cultural Heritage Protection procedure to address a potential policy change within the provincial government's Cultural Heritage Act; the creation of a communications and information sharing protocol to improve the interactions between the local governments and the Band; The development of a dispute prevention/resolution procedure; and The development of a cultural heritage resources mapping system.

The meeting was funded in part through the UBCM's Community-to-Community Forum program, which supports local government and First Nation relationship-building initiatives. There will be a follow-up application to seek funding support for additional community to community meetings as required to complete the tasks identified during the March 27th meeting.

In making the announcement at the April 3rd Town Council meeting, Mayor Randy McLean commented, "We don't give this Band enough credit for their ability to work cooperatively on matters of mutual interest. We are so lucky to have that here."

## Fire destroys local landmark

The first members of Princeton Volunteer Fire Department arrived at the scene of the Princeton Hotel fire at 6:45 AM last Saturday. It was obvious at the time that they would need extra help and Keremeos Volunteer Fire Department got the call for help at 6:55 AM. Crews from Hedley's Volunteer Fire Department were also called to the scene.

The first brick building to be built

downtown, Princeton Hotel was constructed in 1910 by owners Swanson and Broomfield. It was also noted as the first place in Princeton to have hot and cold running water in the washrooms.

The hotel, built for the arrival of the railway to Princeton, burned for most of the day and firemen worked continually to contain the fire and protect surrounding structures.

Downtown Princeton businesses stayed closed for the day to aid firemen in keeping people a block away from the scene.

About 10 residents in apartments in the second floor lost their homes. They were placed in temporary housing through efforts of Emergency Social Services.

Living Water Church provided meals for them on Saturday.

## Council approves transit plan

Princeton Town Council approved the 2006/07 Annual Operating Agreement for the Princeton transit system at their April 3rd meeting.

The motion was made by Councillor Pam Jones and seconded by Councillor Maria Sadegur.

In a letter from Transit Planner Myrna Moore of the Municipal Systems Program in Victoria were directions for Council to follow.

"Once the agreements have received signature/seal from Council, please forward to Princeton & District Community Services for approval with a request to return all originals to the undersigned for execution by BC Transit."

The Princeton and area Para transit operates Monday to Friday providing local service and three days-per week services to Penticton. The service also includes the communities of Hedley, Keremeos, Tulameen and Coalmont.

The Town of Princeton has part-

nered with the Interior Health Authority as of November 2005 to fund service on day per week to Penticton. The Town of Princeton has also approved the introduction of a Taxi Saver Program, effective April 1st. The transit contract is negotiated with the Society annually.

Total costs for the 2006/07 AOA is budgeted at \$116,000. This represents a \$10,400 (9.9%) increase from 2005/06. This is based on an increase in service hours resulting from the annualization of the IHA service that started in November. The increase in costs is due to the following factors:

- Operating Company fixed costs provide for a 2% lift to reflect inflation.

- Variable hourly costs increase \$5,300 (11%) due to the IHA service.

- Variable distance costs increase \$1,600 (17.3%) due to the increased service and higher fuel

costs.

- The introduction of a Taxi Saver program in the amount of \$5,000 (with \$2,500 in Taxi Saver Recoveries).

Rider ship is forecast at 7,650 in 2006/07, a 4% increase from 2005/06 based on the increased service level and the introduction of the Taxi Saver Program. Year-to-date actual rider ship is below budget and this is reflected in the forecast. Revenue is projected at \$15,500 with a productivity rate of 2.8 rides per hour.

The BC Transit share of costs increases by \$449 (0.8%) to \$55,200. The overall Net Municipal share increases by \$10,800 (33.3%) to \$43,238.

This includes \$8,600 in flex funding for the service, which is recovered by Princeton through a Community Transit Partnership Agreement with the IHA.

The agreements must be received by BC Transit by April 28th.

## Performing arts group makes presentation

Marilyn Huycke and Joanna Nott of the Princeton Performing Arts Group made a presentation at the April 3rd meeting of Town Council in period costumes.

Huycke, who used a presentation provided by Similkameen Valley Economic Development Officer Michael McLaughlin, outlined the background and plan for use of a financial contribution from the Town of Princeton.

- Princeton Arts Now Committee, sponsored by Vermilion Arts

Society, obtained an Arts Now Grant of \$4,000.00. The Town of Princeton contributed \$1,000.00 in cash and \$1,000.00 in kind.

- This first project has the objective of identifying and assessing the arts and culture resources in the community, and selecting a project to coincide with the 2010 Games and 150th birthday of Princeton.

- It included a survey that showed residents overwhelmingly named creating a performing arts theatre as the number one arts and culture priority.

- The Regional District is acquiring funding to create the theatre.

- The new Performing Arts Committee wants to apply for a second Arts Now Grant under the Catalyst Program, which is designed to help arts societies to build skills.

They intend to bring in a series of theatre experts in acting, set design, theatre management, lighting and sound, etc. They also intend to work with a consultant on building a well-functioning organi-

zation.

- The cost is estimated at \$18,000.00. \$9,000.00 will come from Arts Now. The community must come up with the other \$9,000.00. \$2,000.00 will be in kind contributions from the Town (meeting space, photocopying, etc.) and from the Similkameen Valley Planning Society (project administration). \$7,000.00 needs to be raised.

- Area H has agreed to contribute \$2,000.00. The Vermilion Arts Society has offered to contribute \$2,500.00.

The Performing Arts Committee will raise \$1,000.00 from donations and fundraising.

"On behalf of the Princeton Arts Now Committee, Vermilion Arts Council and Performing Arts Committee (soon to be a Society) we respectfully request a \$1,500.00 contribution from the Town of Princeton," Huycke asked near the end of the presentation.

The request was referred to budget.

## Town sees no problem with subdivision

A plan by Gordon Clifford Kachkowski to subdivide property in East Princeton came before Town Council at their April 3rd meeting.

The Ministry of Transportation was requesting comments from Town Council regarding the proposal.

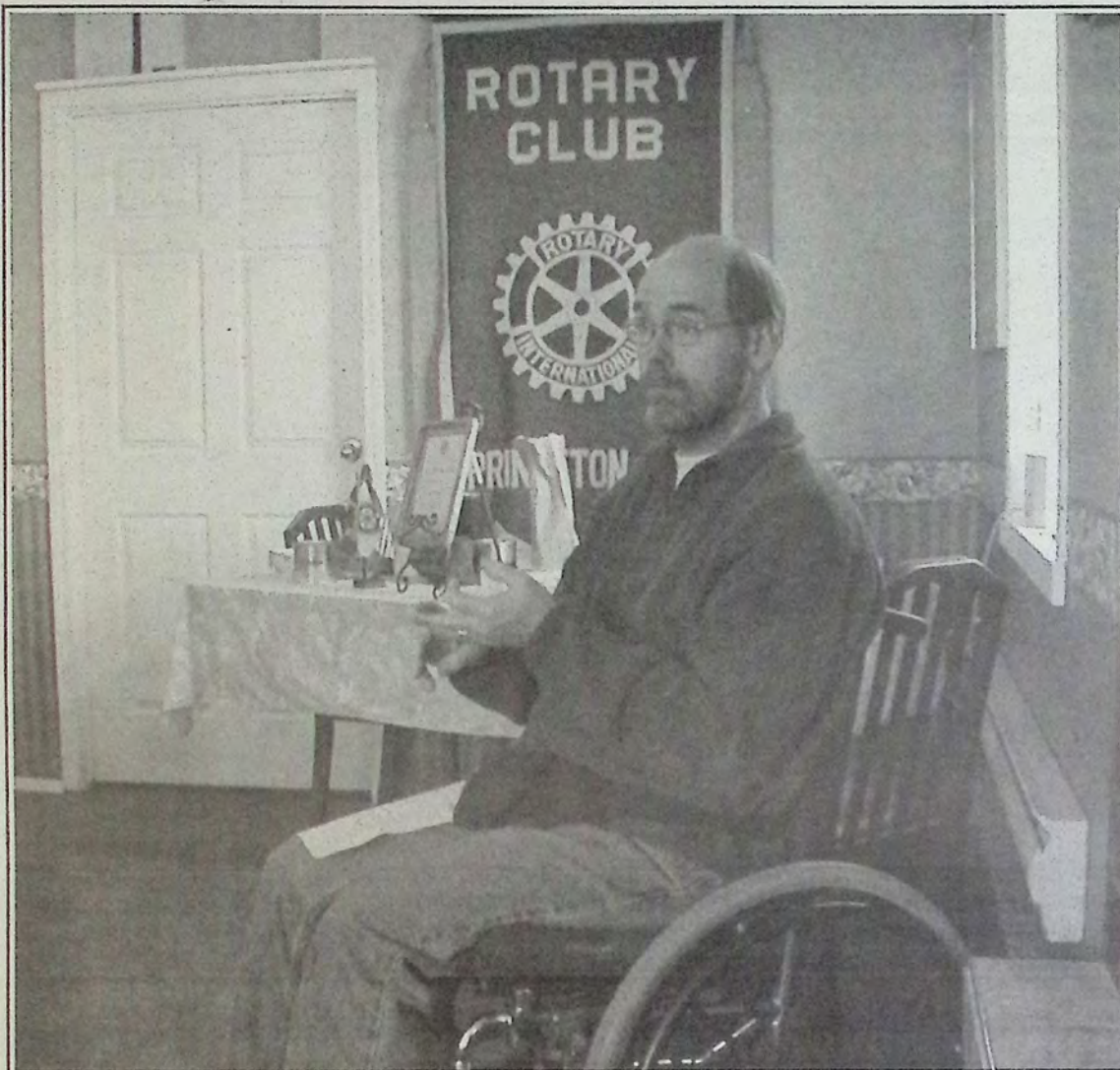
Town of Princeton CAO Patrick

## RDOS introduces open air burning bylaw

The Okanagan and Similkameen Valleys often experience weather systems called inversions. An inversion makes the airshed susceptible to the build up of air contaminants that impact human health, visibility, and the environment. To ensure the Okanagan-Similkameen's air quality is as good as it can be the Regional District Okanagan-Similkameen will implement an Open Air Burning Bylaw to reduce emissions from open burning, and to eliminate the burning of garbage, effective April 15, 2006.

The bylaw is enforced by local volunteer fire departments and applies to the fire protection areas - Kaleden, Naramata, Okanagan Falls, Tulameen, and Willowbrook. A burning permit is required before

burning can take place in these fire protection areas.

Penticton Fire and Rescue Dispatch will administer the Open Air Burning Bylaw process. For more information on how to obtain an Open Air Burning Permit visit [www.rdos.bc.ca](http://www.rdos.bc.ca) and click on Burning Permit.

Property owners that are eligible to burn must confirm that burning is allowed on that day by checking the Venting Index on the Regional District website [www.rdos.bc.ca](http://www.rdos.bc.ca). If you are burning without a permit, you could receive a fine or be charged with the cost of putting out the fire.

The Regional District Waste Management Division have implemented alternative disposal options to help protect the air we all

breathe, while remaining environmentally friendly. The Landfill Yard Waste Drop Off Program allows residential and commercial customers to take yard waste to their local landfill - which is free up to a certain weight.

As well, the Curbside Spring and Fall Yard Waste Program accepts unlimited amounts of yard waste by simply placing in clear bags and/or bundle prunings with string. For 2006 Spring Yard Waste Pickup Weeks please refer to your local Curbside Calendars. ## 8 AM May 13<sup>th</sup> is Krunch Time!

The third annual Keremeos Kruncher 50Km/25Km Run will be held on Saturday, May 13th.

The race is fast approaching and Race Director Moe 'the Eagle' Beaulieu needs your help as a volunteer.

"Jobs include working at Aid Stations from three, four and eight hour shifts - your choice," Beaulieu says.

"Other jobs are assisting Keremeos Search and Rescue - a band of merry men and women, who though their numbers are quite small - are there year after year. Thank you!"

Moe says there's also a need for qualified volunteers.

"We could use first-aiders, a four by four, etc. Come watch these lunatic-fringe athletes compete."

Beaulieu is encouraged by entries already received for next month's race.

"The 2005 race winner Matthew Sessions from Vancouver is again entered this year. His nearest rival last year - the Race Director's son, Logan - who placed second will be here but is opting out of this year's event."

Beaulieu says his son will be participating in races in the Alberta Ultra Series this season.

"The womens 2005 winner and womens course holder, Donna Mazurkewich of Penticon, will again be attending. Mazurkewich is a phenom who has completed twenty Ironman Canadas and many Ultra Marathons."

There's also locals entered in the

races.

"So far locals expected are Heather Henri, Mishak Potash and Steve Crockett of Keremeos. There's already four entries from Revelstoke! They may yet rival the eight or nine entries from one location we generally get from Kelowna."

Beaulieu expects sixty or so runners this year.

"This being Year Three could be the pivotal year. In 2004 there were 51 runners, in 2005 there were 55 runners."

Beaulieu is happy with the steady growth for such a small area, and it's one of the toughest three runs of it's kind in the Pacific Northwest.

"At 8,543 feet of climb in the 50 kilometre course, that can be fairly daunting. There is no pavement to run on but dirt/gravel ranch roads and a few trails."

The run will be capped at 100 runners when that becomes necessary which would translate to roughly three runners per mile.

"This is little, if any, impact on wildlife and ranchers cattle grazing in the area and the runners stay on designated ranch roads and Barcello Canyon Trail and the power line above Fairview Road."

The Race Director/Run Organizer does a complete clean up of the course after the event is completed. The run is also completely sanctioned and insured by BC Athletics, a division of Sports Canada.

Beaulieu also boasts twenty years of experience in organizing running events throughout BC.

"The snow pack is up this year to more normal levels, it seems. This may cause a few wet feet while crossing Barcello Canyon streams but this is no biggie."

Beaulieu also points out there has been tremendous support from volunteers and sponsors to the previous runs and says the events would not be possible without their contributions.

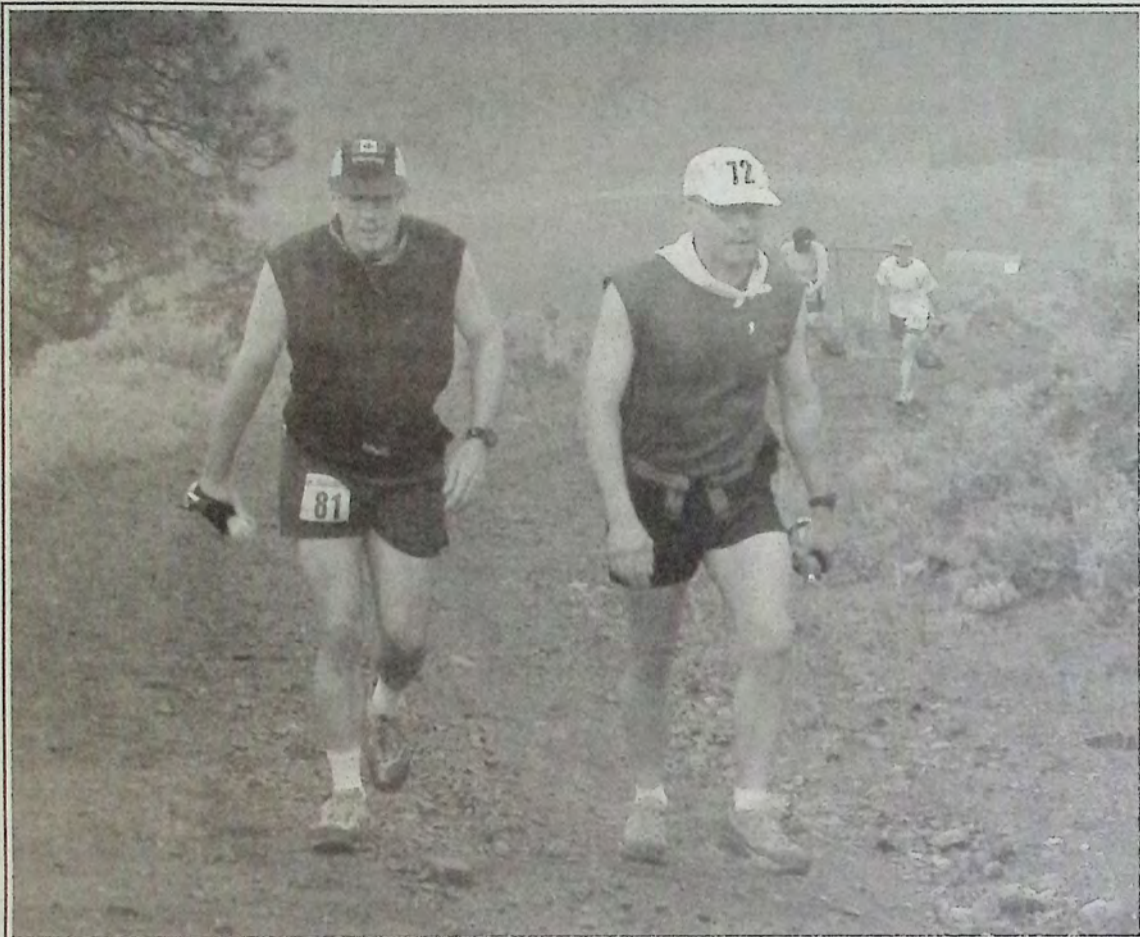

## Use weather to your advantage

Gardening With Anna Bartlett of Don & Anna's Greenhouses, Keremeos

It was so nice to see all you early bird gardeners out this weekend even if the weather was cool. The weather has been quite rainy and overcast lately and for some reason this scares away most gardeners from starting their spring planting. Gardening is definitely weather related and the majority of gardeners prefer to wait until the weather is favorable.

Plants such as Trees, Shrubs, Roses, Perennials, Fruit Trees and Berries on the other hand are much happier planted on a rainy day or if it is slightly overcast. Plants don't go into shock as much when they are planted in a little cooler temperature. Trees especially are much happier if they are planted before leaf development.

Once the leaves open up they are so delicate and transporting them becomes quite a chore especially those that bring open trucks. Leaves and open buds are so susceptible to wind damage if they are transported home in the back of an open vehicle. At Don and Anna's we are quite fussy at how our trees are loaded so they make it home in the best condition. Every once in a while I see a tree standing straight up in the back of an open vehicle going down the road at 100 miles an hour.

I often wonder if they actually produce leaves for the rest of the season. My philosophy is "If your hair moves while standing in the back of an open vehicle then it is too windy for the tree or shrub you are transporting so if you do have to use an open vehicle to transport those trees and shrubs stand with them and tell your driver how fast

he should be driving."

I sell eighty percent of my perennials while they are blooming, which is the absolute worst time to be planting them. Perennials that are just coming out of the ground transplant much better. Speaking of Perennials, Laurie Avery an avid gardener just west of our place across the Red Bridge is always on the search for new perennials especially for shade. Laurie asked me if I had any new hosta's for her shady part of her garden because over the years she has created a lot of shade with her huge mature trees.

"What varieties of Hosta's have you got so far Laurie?" was my comment.

She showed me a type written list with over 70 varieties of Hosta's that she has collected over the years. Most of these Hosta's were started here.

Hosta's are mainly grown for their foliage variations and of course the shade. As a small garden centre owner I can not afford to have every variety of perennial on the market, therefore I change varieties on a yearly basis and offer around 400 different varieties each year.

Heuchera or Coral Bells for instance is another plant that loves the shade and is used mainly for it's foliage color. Heuchera has become extremely popular over the years and every year seems to be adding

several new varieties. A few interesting varieties of Heuchera's this year include a variety called Lime Rickey, which is frosted lime green ruffled leaves, Peach Melba, with it's blinding orange-red foliage and Black Beauty, which is the deepest burgundy black color.

Heucherella's or Foamy Bells is another plant so close to Heuchera's that you can hardly tell them apart. This plant loves partial shade areas and their leaves are very striking in fact one variety is called Strike it Rich, and another called Stoplight, has bright yellow leaves with a bold red center. Both of these are a show piece without the blooms.

By the way both of these do extremely well in full sun also. There are so many plants that can handle shade and sun.

Some early blooming plants for shady borders includes a Brunnera or Siberian Bugloss called Jack Frost with it's stunning huge silver foiled with green veined heart-shaped foliage with petite blue forget-me-not like clusters of flowers. Trollius or Globe Flower is another gorgeous early blooming shade lover which does just as well in full sun.

For all of you that are tired of the overcast gloomy days, the sun will be out shortly and we'll be complaining about the heat.

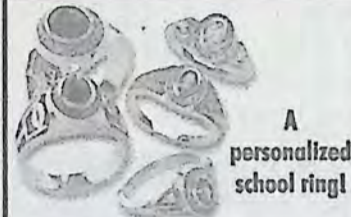

### Common myths about cardiovascular disease

**MYTH:** I don't need to worry about developing cardiovascular disease because I follow a healthy diet and I am physically active.

- Even if you exercise and eat right, you could still be at risk for developing cardiovascular disease. Although being physically active and following a well-balanced diet are important, you may have other risk factors that increase your overall risk for cardiovascular disease. These could include smoking, alcohol drinking, diabetes, and even mild-to-moderately elevated blood pressure and cholesterol.

**MYTH:** Cardiovascular disease already runs in my family so there really is nothing I can do to prevent it from developing.

- While it is true that you cannot control genetics, you may have other risk

factors that can be controlled. These might include diabetes, extra weight, cholesterol, elevated blood pressure levels, and smoking.

By managing these risk factors, you can help lower your overall risk of developing cardiovascular disease. Also, most heart attacks and strokes are preventable if treatment is focused on all risk factors.

**MYTH:** Lifestyle changes, such as exercise, a proper diet and stopping smoking, are enough to lower the risk of developing cardiovascular disease. I don't need medicine.

- Only your doctor can say whether or not you need medicine to help lower your risk of developing cardiovascular disease.

While eating right and exercising are important, these lifestyle changes alone may not be enough to help

manage cardiovascular disease risk factors. That is why you should talk to your doctor to make sure you are doing everything possible to prevent developing cardiovascular disease.

**MYTH:** When I reach my cholesterol and blood pressure goals, I no longer need to worry about developing cardiovascular disease and can even stop taking medicine.

Unfortunately, high cholesterol and blood pressure cannot be cured - they can only be controlled through lifestyle changes and, for many, drug treatment. So, when you have reached the treatment targets for cholesterol, blood pressure, and other cardiovascular disease risk factors, you must continue to eat right, get regular exercise, and take your medication as directed by your doctor.

### Does rheumatoid arthritis control your day-to-day life?

(NC)-Imagine not being able to sleep because of pain so severe it keeps you tossing the entire night. During the day, you can barely focus on the simplest tasks, your concentration is gone and just thinking about what you could accomplish if you had a reprieve from the agony leaves you down and depressed.

Catherine Hofstetter, diagnosed with rheumatoid arthritis at only 36, knows exactly what this feels like. She has suffered with RA for over 13 years and it has affected every aspect of her life. "For a normal person, you get up, get showered, dressed, grab some breakfast and head out the door. With RA you have to think about everything you do from the moment you open your eyes." Daily activities most of us take for granted, such as walking a short distance, opening a jar of coffee or sleeping through the night are made much more difficult by the severe pain, limited range of motion and overwhelming fatigue (even after a good night's sleep) caused by RA.

Despite the common belief that rheumatoid arthritis (RA) only affects

the elderly, the truth is that it can strike anyone. RA is a painful and debilitating joint disease that can target someone as young as twenty and affects one in 100 Canadians and three times as many women than men. It is a chronic, auto-immune disease whereby the body's immune system attempts to destroy its own tissues. Studies show that ten years after onset, more than 50 per cent of RA patients are severely disabled; after 15 years, a startling 60 per cent are unable to work.

For Hofstetter, years of trying to relieve RA symptoms left her discouraged, frustrated and in constant pain. "I tried RA medications like NSAIDS (non-steroidal anti-inflammatory products) and DMARDS (disease modifying anti-rheumatic drugs) but they didn't work for me," says Hofstetter, who finally found relief after treatment with a biological product. "There is no way to describe it other than my life has changed drastically since being on a biologic - I get to sleep easier, I stay asleep longer and actually, from time to time, I even

wake up feeling refreshed!" she explains.

According to the Arthritis Society, there are four main treatment options for RA sufferers to improve a patient's quality of life: NSAIDS, such as over-the-counter pain relievers; DMARDS, such as methotrexate; corticosteroids; and newer biological treatments that are prescribed to treat moderate to severe RA in those who have had limited success with more conventional treatments. There are several biological products currently approved by Health Canada to treat RA and this new class of treatment offers encouragement and hope for individuals like Catherine Hofstetter.

Not all medications, including biologicals, are created equal. They differ in terms of how they are administered and how they work. The best person to speak to about treatment for RA is a rheumatologist who can discuss the various treatment options.

Dr. Anthony Russell of the Heritage Medical Research Centre in Edmonton says, "Physicians are paying more attention to issues such as the sleeplessness, fatigue and pain in RA patients - recognizing that quality of life is front and centre." And because RA is a chronic condition, medications that offer safe, effective and sustainable improvement are the subject of great interest to RA sufferers, their families and the medical community.

Dr. Russell was a lead investigator in a recent study presented to the American College of Rheumatology meeting last year, which evaluated the combination of methotrexate and a newer biologic treatment, abatacept (Orencia), recently approved by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) in the United States for patients who have had only limited success with methotrexate alone. Dr. Russell suggests that the addition of this new type of biological drug, which works differently than other treatments, can be very effective and provide significant and relatively long-lasting improvement with continued use. Abatacept is currently under review by Health Canada. - News Canada

## living past 100

### Coffee vs. soda: pick coffee

After all of the bad things we've heard about coffee, along comes some good news. A longterm study done by nurses in Boston changed the picture for women with high blood pressure. The study looked at 33,000 women who had high blood pressure. Caffeine appeared to increase high blood pressure, but when the statistics were changed to indicate those who drank coffee and those who drank soda products, the results were striking. The more coffee women drank, up to six cups a day, the risk of high blood pressure decreased!

When the study looked at women who drank caffeine in soda pop, the risk of high blood pressure increased with every beverage consumed. Sugarless sodas were only slightly less risky.

The study concluded there is something other than caffeine in sodas that causes an increase in risk of developing high blood pressure.

The study made no references to the increased risk of osteoporosis in women who consume caffeine. As the study dealt with women only, no specific conclusions could be drawn in regard to men's consumption of coffee, but logic says men would likely react the same way.

This summer, perhaps an iced coffee might make more sense than a cold soda. Here's another good word about coffee: researchers in Saskatchewan discovered that a combination of liquor and coffee can prevent stroke damage. If you suspect a stroke has just occurred, how about offering an Irish coffee as the first line of defense?

## Rodeo Club asks town for funding

Princeton Rodeo Club asked the Town of Princeton for some financial help at the April 3rd Town Council meeting.

In a letter by Club Secretary Carol Ruoss work at the Rodeo Grounds were outlined. "We have put new pens in the back, built cowboy platforms behind the bucking chutes and we are also planning on building a V. I. P. building on the

North side of the Rodeo Arena."

The request was for \$2,500. Rodeo Club President Stan Thompson attended the Town Council meeting to speak to the request.

This May's Rodeo is the fifth in a series of five where the Town of Princeton committed to funding a decreasing annual amount in the first five years, with this year's grant totaling \$1,000. The additional \$1,500 would go towards the improvements being made to the facility.

"I always hope that the rodeo

would be self-sustaining and I had hoped that this would have been the year," Thompson told Town Council.

Councillor Jim Manion made the motion to grant the money, sidestepping from the budget process. Councillor Ray Jarvis seconded the move.

Mayor Randy McLean cautioned Council to be careful when granting money outside of the budget process but made an exception.

"I don't believe delaying anything that's going to help us, like the rodeo, can be fruitful."

## Town plans to finish RC runway

A letter from Princeton RC Model Flying Club requested help from the Town of Princeton to finish facilities at the Princeton Airport.

The matter was discussed at the April 3rd meeting of Town Council. In his letter, George White explained that if the model airplane runway and parking lot were completed properly it could benefit the community.

"We will then have a place that other flyers will want to come to and spend money in the town and fly at our field."

The request was specifically for

the Town of Princeton to provide gravel and a loader to extend the model airstrip and to finish a parking area. White told Town Council he had a commitment from a local contractor to help with the project. To date, loads of wood chips have been used to fill holes and complete a subsurface on the approximately 280-foot by 30-foot strip. White says it needs about ten loads of gravel.

Councillor Ray Jarvis made a motion to provide up to \$400.00 in labour and equipment to finish the current project. Councillor Pam Jones seconded the motion.

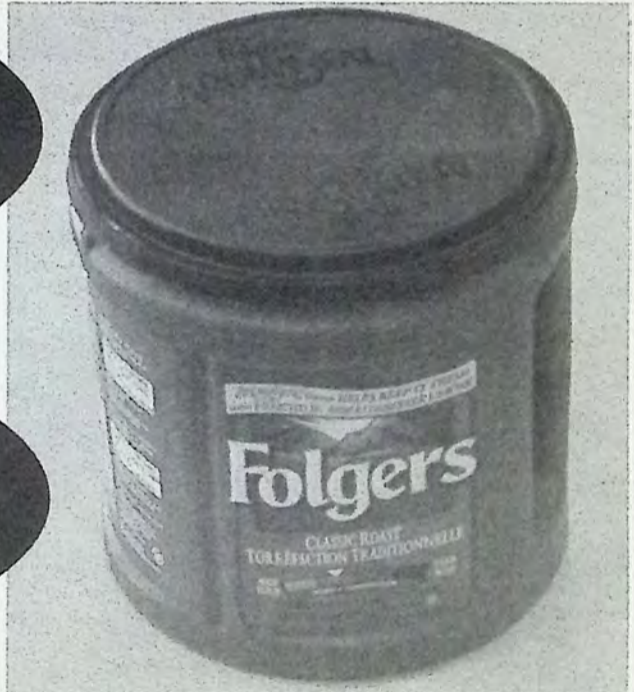

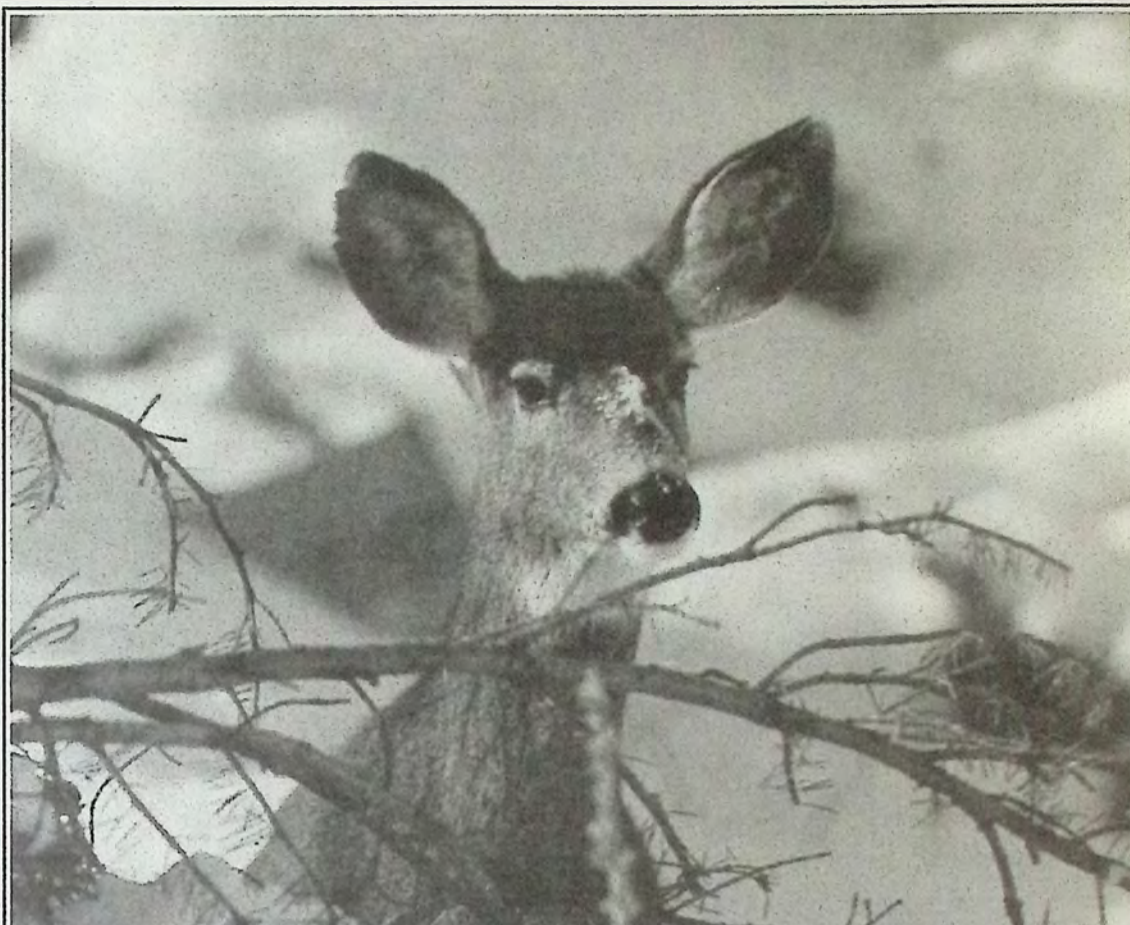

**Town awards camp contract**

Town Council publicly announced the awarding of the Municipal Campsite Contract at the April 3rd meeting.

A total of four tenders were submitted with Katherine and Darcy Wasylenchuk winning the contract based on their start up costs of \$1,100 and bid of 40% of gross revenue.

The other tenders came from Allan C. Lambe Sr. who wanted a site reserved for his motor home and placed a bid for 30% of gross revenues, the pair of Dahlseide/Wilson who wanted a guarantee of \$3,000 a month or 50% of gross revenue - whichever was greater - and Greg Davenport who said his start-up costs amounted to \$1,000 and bid for 36% of gross revenues.

Councillor Pam Jones made the motion to accept the tender submitted by the Wasylenchuk's. Councillor Maria Sadegur seconded the motion.

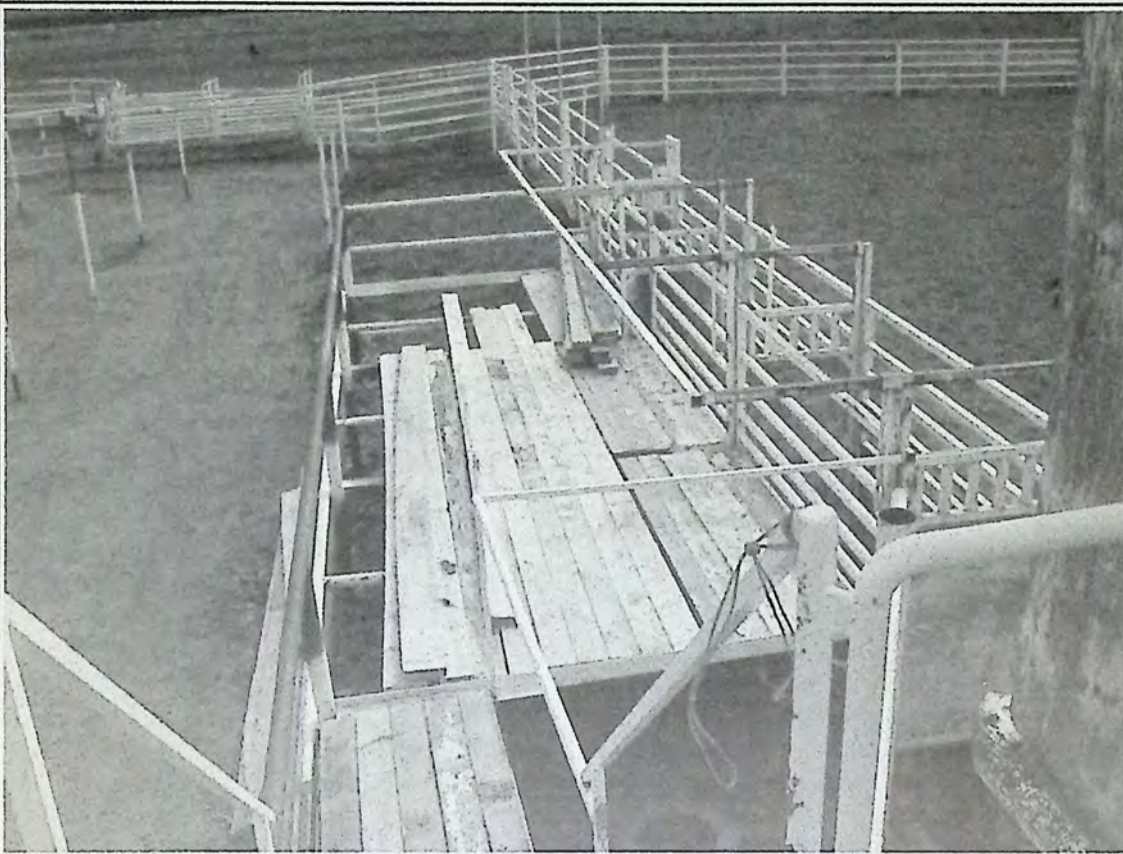

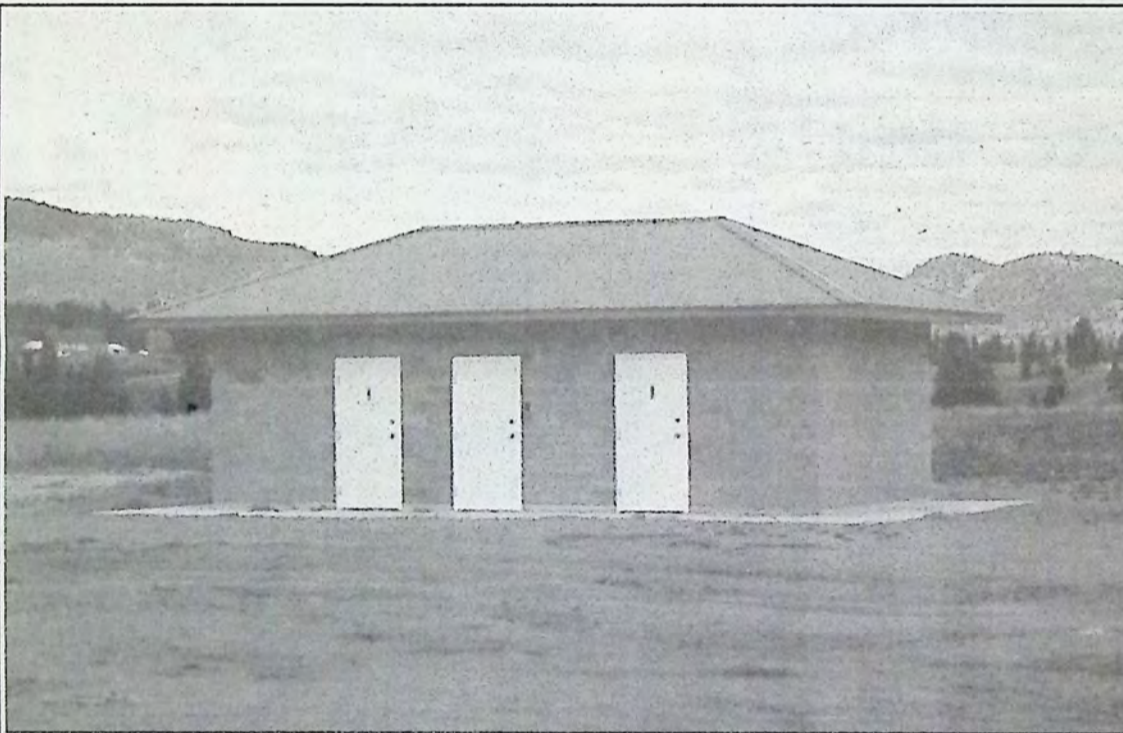

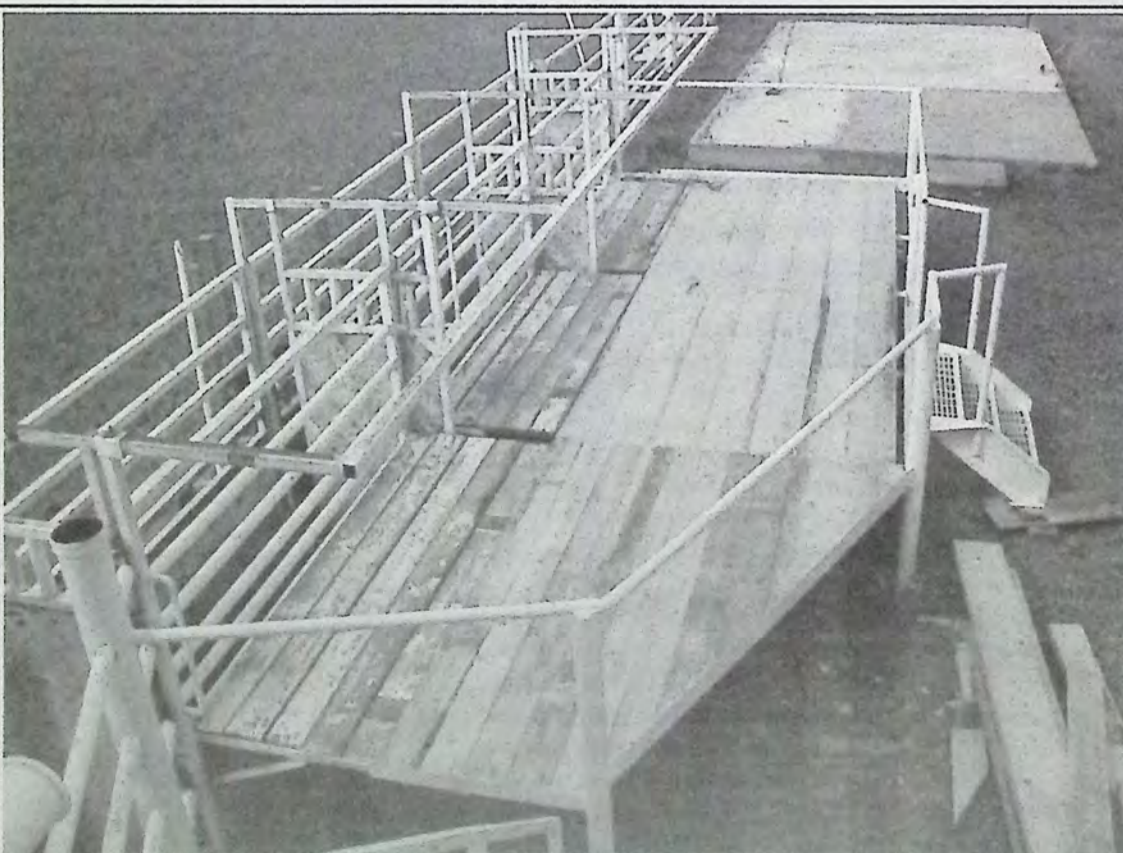

It's a bit of a reach, but the attempt to have slot machines - or at least some sort of gaming activity - in addition to the pari-mutual wagering during Racing Days and beyond is worth looking at for a number of reasons.

Although we aren't really fond of the idea of slot machines at Sunflower Downs, the potential revenue they could generate makes us think we need to examine the possibilities.

Suppose there was a 'betting window' of a few months each year that you could go out to the Princeton Fairgrounds and drop a few coins in the machines. Over the course of a season of this activity (don't forget the high traffic times when events are being held at the site) there could be quite a bit of money collected.

Depending on the split to the Government and other regulatory bodies (BCLC, etc.) the take for the Town of Princeton could make things like a community centre and major infrastructure improvements that much closer to reality.

In addition, the revenue generated through the Sunflower Downs Casino could mean major improvements to the town wouldn't cost local taxpayers.

For example, say a few hundred thousand dollars were collected through 100 machines over one season. The formula we're going to use is \$35.00 per machine, per day for a 120 day period. That's a total of \$420,000 pumped into the machines. Shave 50% of that off (for easy figuring) to cover splits and payouts and there's still \$210,000 in revenue and that's us just low-balling it.

The Town of Princeton would then have a few bucks to leverage against matching grant programs and things would be built and the town would grow and the average taxpayer wouldn't have to spend a dime on it - unless they entered the Sunflower Downs Casino.

The more we think about it, the more we like how such a plan could help more than just the infrastructure. Non-profit organizations could benefit from the Casino as well. If each group in town that goes to Council for an annual grant were told their annual grant allotment could be doubled or tripled as a result of revenue coming through the slots, how do you think that would be received?

Maybe the plan to develop a first class entertainment facility at Sunflower Downs - complete with Casino - isn't such a bad idea after all.

Would you support such a plan if it could help our community?

### Former principal/trustee speaks out

Dear Editor:

What are we doing to rebuild physical education programs in BC schools and not just 'equipment inventories?' And what in the blue blazes are we doing to regular classroom teachers in our elementary schools in relation this program?

Reading education minister, Shirley Bond's recent announcement about providing long overdue cash for the shockingly battered and scarce physical education equipment in schools, and the minister's accompanying announcement to provide "teacher training for classroom-activity bins and healthy-eating learning materials" for regular elementary classroom teachers, one marvels at how out of touch this minister and her department is with ongoing everyday life and instructional programs in our elementary schools.

The last time I looked regular

classroom teachers in elementary schools were responsible, in varying degrees, for teaching: Language Arts, Mathematics, Social Studies, Art, Science, Music, Core French, Social Responsibility, Computer Ed, anti Racism and Homophobia programs and of course Physical Education.

Contrast Bond's glib statements with the awareness and concern of Charles Clarke, the former British Minister of Education, when he introduced that country's new physical education and coaching program two years ago by stating "we are very anxious that more burdens would not be placed on (regular) teachers and on the British curriculum."

Bond and her bureaucrats in their new announcement have once again chosen to ignore the unanimous recommendation of the British Columbia School Trustee Association (BCSTA)

that in order to provide "quality K-12 physical education programs" we need "qualified physical education specialists" in all of our schools.

Instead Victoria is piling on added responsibilities for umpteen programs and services with no end in sight. Three-ringed binders, directives, guidelines and folders flow like an endless river to regular classroom teachers. Need a physical education teacher in your school?

Forget about it.

Here's another three-ringed binder with perhaps some in-service, if you are lucky.

Lastly, physical education in BC schools over the past four years has taken a battering thanks to underfunding and the layoff of over 2,500 teachers, placing added responsibility on remaining staff.

Next to school-librarians, physical education teachers in many schools and in many school districts are now a vanishing breed.

The health and well-being of more than a half million children in our schools deserves top priority as alarm bells ring about the sharp increase in childhood obesity and Type 2 diabetes.

It's time to dispense with public relations initiatives and introduce a serious, substantial, and comprehensive physical education program to meet the changing needs of BC children.

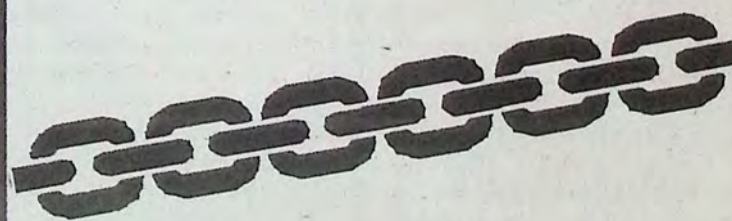
Shirley Bond's recent announcement is not even in this ballpark.

# Please! Our language is English!

As I listen to broadcasters and read newspapers or signs, I am often annoyed by people's lack of ability to use correct grammar or to enunciate correctly.

Let me give you one example: nuclear. This word is pronounced Noo-klee-are. Even President Bush mispronounces it, as if it were Noo-kew-ler. This is a common error.

When it comes to writing, I note people seem to suffer a lot of confusion about where to put an apostrophe. The rule on this is very simple: use an apostrophe when denoting possession, but not in a possessive pronoun. I admit you have to know what a possessive pronoun is, so here are the ones causing the most problems: ours, hers, his, theirs, yours. Note: no apostrophes.

You put an apostrophe to signal a letter is missing. We say "you're" in place of "you are", but I often see "your" (a possessive pronoun) used in place of "you're", as in one advertisement that said, "Your going to love this!" What the writer should have written was "You're going to love this!"

Part of the problem with "your" and "you're" is that people pronounce them the same. In fact, "your" is pronounced as "yor" and "you're" is pronounced "yoor" to rhyme with "poor".

The other problem with apostrophes is in plurals. There is never an apostrophe in a plural. We say "doors, windows, desks, chairs" and so on. These are simple plurals. No apostrophe is required.

The confusion comes from the need for an apostrophe when we are indicating possession, as in "I am going to Bill's house" or "That is Susy's jacket." We are showing the ownership of something by somebody, so we need the apostrophe. In other languages, a direct translation would be "I am going to the house of Bill" or "That is the jacket of Susy". We try to make it simpler, then confuse everybody with an apostrophe.

I find writers are often confused as to when to use a capital. Recently, I read a letter in which nearly every noun was capitalized. It was awkward reading, believe me. The rule for putting a capital letter on a

word is as follows: if the word is a proper noun, such as a person's name, or the name of a corporation, or a person's title, use a capital first letter. Often, I read Provincial Government, when it should be "provincial government". If you are specifying which government, you might say "Conservative provincial government". When it comes to titles, remember this rule: Elizabeth is queen, but we call her Queen Elizabeth. When a title is used in front of a person's name, the title is capitalized because it is part of the name. Brand names, such as Dairy Queen, are capitalized because they are names.

There are common mispronunciations in the broadcast industry. For example, Tuesday becomes "Tewsday" or, worse still, "Chewsday". "Toosday" is the correct pronunciation.

I have heard broadcasters say "Febyouary" when the correct pronunciation is "Febroary".

Advertisers are especially prone to pronouncing "luxurious" as "lugzurious".

One of the worst mispronunciations I have heard is "financhewal" instead of "financial".

Another common practice I find annoying is the use of "fun" as an adjective, such as "it was a fun event". The word "fun" is a noun. This means you are not supposed to put it in front of another noun. Of course, as an English-speaking person, you are supposed to know what a noun is. In the example I gave, "event" is the noun. With a suitable adjective, we might say "It was an enjoyable event" or "It was a delightful event" or "It was an exciting event".

Listening to an Australian or New

Zealander butcher the English language drives me up the wall. In their language, "ay" becomes "I", as in "day" becoming "die". To add to the confusion of listening to an Australian speak, they drop the letter "r" at the end of their words, just like so many of the real English do, and pronounce "aw" as "oh". It is like listening to a foreign language, in my opinion, but they think they are speaking English. Recently, I gave up trying to watch an Aussie movie as I could not understand half of what they were saying.

People might say I am being picky, but I fear we will be increasingly separated if we allow English to develop into dialects. In nations where dialects developed, students are now learning an accepted pronunciation understood by all people in the nation, and dialects are considered "poor language". In the world of broadcasting, the way Canadians (and Americans from the border states) speak is considered the best form of English for broadcast purposes, as it is understood by the majority of English-speaking people. This is not snobbery, merely practicality, as there is no real communication if we cannot understand what others say.

In my view, speaking and writing English properly is an essential skill in today's world. In our native American history, tribes had a special language of signs and words which constituted a "trail" language. They could visit, trade, and negotiate with this trail language even when they did not speak each other's language. Today, English has become the world's "trail language". Those of us raised in an English-speaking nation should be masters of our language, not its butchers.

## Discovery of ashes adds to investigation

In what RCMP are calling an "ongoing investigation into fraudulent activity" another piece of the puzzle surrounding the former Princeton-Similkameen Funeral Services has surfaced, thanks to Babs Williams of Princeton.

Williams buried what she believed to be her late husband's cremated ashes - following his death on June 3, 2002 - in a plot at Princeton Cemetery.

Then last week she received a call from an employee of the current funeral home company servicing Princeton - and not RCMP, as had been reported in other media - which Williams at first thought was a prank.

"I got a phone call from a woman who said, 'We have your husband's ashes and we're wondering what you would like us to do with

them.'"

As part of the investigation into the previous funeral home business, which lost its licence to operate in 2004, RCMP discovered a total of almost 60 unclaimed remains at the facility, now a vacant building on Bridge Street.

Police are appealing to the public in hopes that family members will come and claim the packages.

The box that Williams had buried was exhumed last week and police couldn't determine whose ashes were in the box because the metal disk required by law to be placed in an urn with the ashes was missing.

Williams also told the News Leader - in great detail - that the final resting place of what was supposed to be her late husband's ashes was not even close to the condition it was in when she original placed

the ashes there.

Princeton-Similkameen Funeral Services was first licensed in September 1995 and closed March 15, 2004. Cst. Annie Linteau of Kelowna RCMP says police have been investigating alleged "fraudulent bookkeeping" at the funeral home for several months.

Local residents have also shared similar stories with the News Leader in recent months about issues concerning financial concerns that occurred at the funeral home.

Linteau says details could not be revealed as to not affect the investigation but did say charges could be laid.

As for Ed's remains, which Williams said were verified by the requisite metal disk, she's not sure what she'll do with them once RCMP release them later this week.

"He probably won't leave the property," she said.

She also told the News Leader she probably would not be returning them to Princeton Cemetery.

She also expressed concern for the family members connected to the ashes that were originally believed to be Ed's and hoped they could be returned to the correct family.

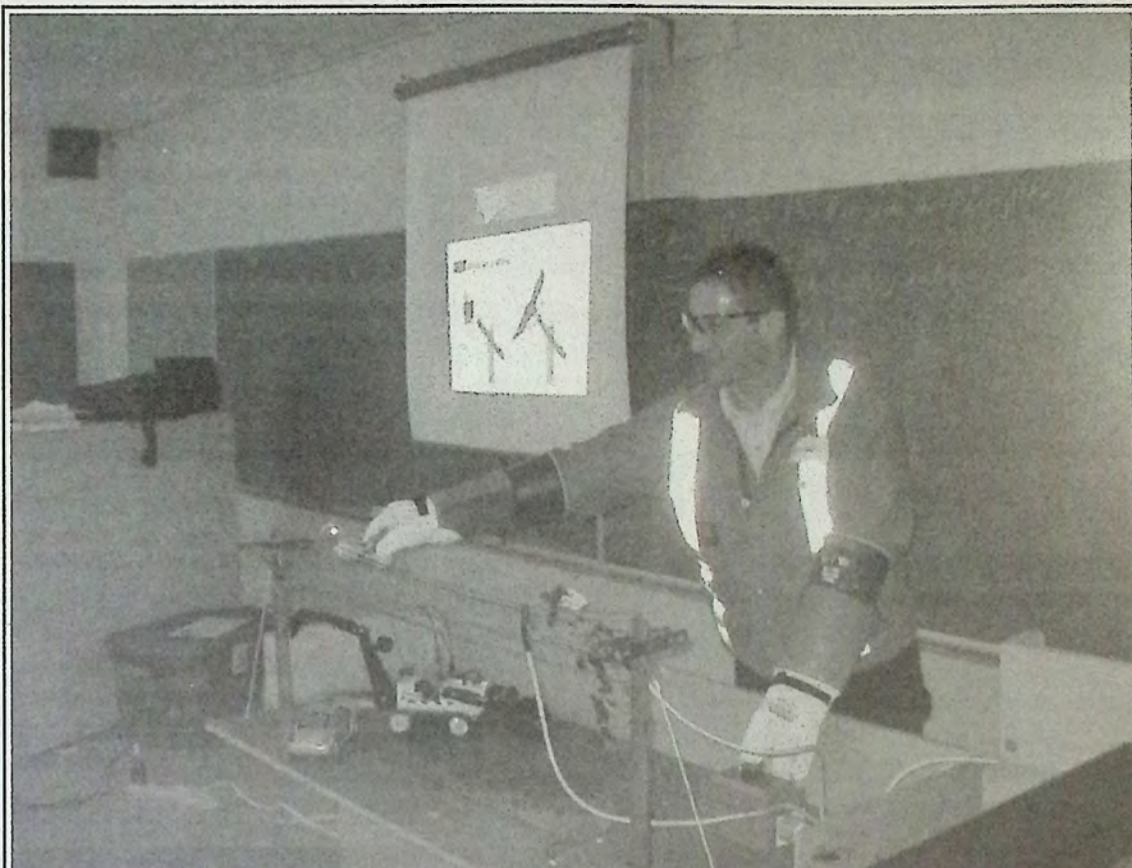

## Council signs proclamations

Town Council signed two proclamations at their April 3rd meeting.

One was to designate the week of April 24th to 30th as Pitch-In Canada Week.

The Proclamation reads in part: "Whereas hundreds of thousands of Canadians show their concern for the environment and their communities each year by participating in Pitch-In Canada projects to refuse, reuse, recycle and properly dispose of waste; clean up and rejuvenate local neighbourhoods, green spaces, ravines, waterways and illegal dump sites; restore habitats; and to establish composting and recycling projects;

And whereas Pitch-In Canada, a national, community-based, organization comprised of eco-action and community volunteers, believes that maintaining a quality environment and encouraging civic pride is everyone's responsibility;

And whereas Pitch-in Canada encourages voluntary action to:

keep communities clean and beautiful and restore and maintain a healthy environment."

The second document signed at the meeting proclaimed May 12th as Fibromyalgia and Chronic Fatigue Syndrome Awareness Day.
