Parents shun trades meeting

Princeton Secondary School hosted a trades information meeting for students and parents on May 2, but nobody attended.

The meeting was set up to advise on career opportunities in the trades.

Principal Bill Lawrence and teacher John Kitts had arranged a presentation which included an excellent interactive DVD offering hands-on exploration of a wide variety of trades, as well as various other sources of information on the future need for trades and technical people.

Retirement of the baby boom generation is imminent and shortages of trades and technical personnel are beginning now. The demand will grow, and students prepared to meet the demand will look forward to secure employment for the rest of their lives.

Remarkable on the lack of interest by parents and students, Kitts said the majority of parents think their children will go on to university. In fact, only 40 percent will complete university education, and will seek employment in other areas.

The trades information meeting will be offered again, probably in October.

Affects development near water

A provincial regulation to protect riparian areas will hit local property owners in the wallet. The legislation forces the Town (and any property owner anywhere in BC) to hire a qualified environmental professional before doing any development on properties within 30 meters (100 feet) of the high water mark on a stream or within 30 meters of the edge of a ravine.

The Town of Princeton is obliged to adopt the regulations.

Although existing properties are "grandfathered", any new building permits issued will depend on a report from a consultant. Developers will be hit hardest, but the ordinary homeowner will feel the pinch if wishing to obtain a building permit. The legislation calls for consultation for the following:

- removal, alteration, disruption or destruction of vegetation
- disturbance of soils
- construction or erection of buildings and structures
- construction of non structural impervious or semi-impervious surfaces
- flood protection works
- construction of roads, trails, docks, wharves and bridges
- provision and maintenance of sewer and water services
- development of drainage systems
- development of utility corridors
- subdivisions of properties as defined in the Local Government Act.

At the May 1 Town Council meeting, the public asked a number of questions pertaining to existing residential or industrial sites in Princeton. The answers indicate changes to properties within the prescribed areas will be affected by the legislation only when new activity occurs, such as alterations to existing structures or changes in the land on which existing structures have been built.

There was some discussion of the number of dwellings and businesses affected by this legislation, and the impact on the Town in providing, for example, replacing a sewer or water system. As Princeton is an "old" community, built on land adjacent to two rivers and Asp (China) Creek, the legislation has an impact on a high percentage of existing properties.

Lali says equity hiring not a priority

"Equity groups - women, Aboriginal people, visible minorities, and persons with disabilities - have seen no potential and little hope for career advancement under the Gordon Campbell Liberals," charged Harry Lali, MLA for Yale-Lillooet and New Democrat Critic for the Public Service Agency.

Lali is calling on Ida Chong, the Minister Responsible for the Public Service Agency, and the Campbell government to recognize that barriers still exist and equity hiring must be made a priority.

"In budget debates I questioned Community Services Minister Ida Chong extensively about the general make-up of public service employees with regard to equity hiring," said Lali.

"The minister had no idea of the make-up of senior staff."

Lali is calling on the government and the minister to do a survey that accurately records and reports the number of women, Aboriginal peo-

ples, visible minorities and persons with disabilities, similar to what the Federal Government does for its public service.

"The Minister of Community Services repeatedly made reference to women making choices, and unwittingly implies that career advancement is not one of their choices," said Lali.

"There are challenges that women, Aboriginal peoples, visible minorities and those with disabilities face in career advancement, and the minister does not understand that."

Lali explained, "that instead of moving forward, this uncaring Liberal government has remained stale for the past 5 years and is going backwards in the case of people with disabilities. The government and the minister have no plan when it comes to addressing these serious concerns in the workplace, and thus, if you are a woman, an Aboriginal, a person with a disability or a member or a visible minor-

ity group you will continue to be discriminated against in public sector hiring by this Liberal government, especially for senior management positions," charged Lali.

"The BC Liberals have no commitment and no plan for ending that discrimination because it is not a priority for them. Ms. Chong and the Campbell government need to commit to British Columbians that it will take the issue of equity hiring seriously and end this discrimination by putting members of these four equity groups on their hiring panels for senior management vacancies," concluded Lali.

"As long as this uncaring Liberal government refuses to acknowledge barriers to public sector advancement for equity groups and continues to exclude equity representation on its senior level hiring panels, the restrictions and the discrimination equity groups still face today will continue to remain in place."

Town Council supports CYC

Nadine McEwen, representing the Child and Youth Committee (CYC) appeared before Town Council on May 1 to ask for support for a grant application for crystal meth education. CYC hopes to receive a \$10,000 grant under the Union of BC Municipalities Community Response to Crystal Meth program.

McEwen said local secondary school students have expressed the need for classroom counselling on drug use, and CYC had been able to hire Paul Huycke, retired alcohol and drug counsellor, to bring a program to the school during the past few months. This was done with a \$5,500 fund raised through grants from Weyerhaeuser, Princeton Legion, the Hospital Foundation, a private individual and Okanagan Medical Association.

This year, CYC would like to focus on crystal meth, educating not only students, but the public, businesses and RCMP. Some of the money would be used to train local RCMP

how to deal with a crystal meth manufacturing site.

Town Council readily agreed to give a letter of support.

MP says cuts won't help

Alex Atamanenko, Member of Parliament for BC Southern Interior says the Conservative federal budget doesn't do enough for working families to warrant serious consideration for NDP support in Parliament.

"This budget is a lost opportunity for working families," Atamanenko said.

"Instead of investing in new child care spaces, more affordable education, a cleaner environment, a better EI program, the Conservatives want to squander the surplus on more corporate tax cuts."

"After years of seeing working families wait for the services they need and have been promised," said NDP Leader Jack Layton, "the Conservatives aren't delivering for working families either. They're no better than the Liberals."

"This budget will make life harder for ordinary people,"

Atamanenko said. "As a result of this budget, pollution will go up, child care wait lists will get longer, and student debt will get heavier. People in my riding of BC Southern Interior have waited too long for investment in the above areas."

Atamanenko added, "The Conservative Government has given us \$7 Billion in corporate tax cuts, instead of targeting money where it is really needed like seniors, long-term care, the environment or to decrease tuition fees. I am hoping that our Okanagan fruit growers will ultimately see some small benefit from this meagre offering. Now is not the time cut, now is the time to invest."

The MP concluded, "Jack Layton was clear that we needed to see working families priorities addressed in this budget. We aren't seeing that here and I am very disappointed."

Police tax hike set for '07

Local Town residents will pay \$39 more on property taxes next year to cover the cost of policing. Area H residents will pay an added \$34, Area G will pay \$38. Rates are nearly double in other Areas of RDOS. Keremeos will pay \$48. Rates are based on property assessments, in the same manner as school and hospital assessments.

Victoria plans to introduce the required amendments to the Police Act in the spring session of the legislature next year, with legislation effective as of January 1, 2007.

Policing costs will be somewhat offset by grants to regional districts and small communities, as well as traffic fine sharing and increases to the homeowner grant.

Former Keremeos coach honoured

A well-recognized national fast-ball coach and regional scout for the San Diego Padres was honoured last week in Montreal.

Kelly McGiffen, who lives in Okanagan Falls and works at Valley First Credit Union in Penticton, traveled to Montreal to accept a national Aboriginal

Coaching award. McGiffen, who is also the coach of Canada's National Mens Junior team, sticks with keeping players focused at all times.

McGiffen, a Cree First Nation, was born in Ashern, Manitoba and will be best known in the Similkameen Valley as the Coach of the Super Valu/Keremeos IGA 39ers in the 1980's and early 1990's. He traveled with Team Canada to New Zealand two years ago.

McGiffen's interaction with Keremeos youth at that time (when coaching there) developing a team to play competitive mens fastball in the Penticton League turned out to be a success story as even in the following years those same team members went on to win several titles.

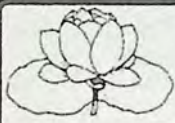

The human body is amazing. Each square inch of skin contains about 200 blood and lymph vessels, 28 motor nerves, 100 oil glands, 650 sweat glands, 13 sense receptors for cold and 78 for heat and 1,300 for touch and 65 hairs. Quite a design!

It was back in 1910 that Dr. Paul Ehrlich discovered an arsenic compound he called Salvarsan that was an effective treatment for syphilis. It was the 606th compound he tried before he had success. It was the recommended treatment until the discovery of penicillin 40 years later. He won the Nobel Prize for this discovery.

Many people with eye conditions like glaucoma have to instill as many as four different eye drops. The order of the eye drops is of lesser importance than the time between applications. Ten minutes between drops is ideal. As to order, a solution should be instilled first, a shakeable suspension second and a gel third.

Alcohol is the leading cause of preventable birth defects. Complete abstinence of alcohol while pregnant is the safest policy.

Have you checked your medicine cabinet for old drugs lately? Check for expired drugs, discoloured tablets, old eye drops, liquids or ointments. Bring them to your pharmacist for safe disposal.

Sun-kissed: living with psoriasis

(NC)—When shorts are being pulled out of closets and swimming pools are opening up, most Canadians are rejoicing. Summer is upon us.

But, enjoying the warm weather comes at a price for the nearly one million Canadians with psoriasis (pronounced 'sore-EYE-ah-sis'). Canadians with psoriasis often avoid summer clothing and water activities due to the appearance of their skin.

Psoriasis occurs when faulty signals in the immune system cause skin cells to grow too quickly every three to four days instead of the usual 30-day cycle. Extra skin cells build-up on the skin's surface.

They then form red, flaky and scaly patches that are often itchy and uncomfortable. Unfortunately, psoriasis is highly visible and can appear anywhere on the body — and most commonly on the joints, limbs and scalp.

"Too many people with psoriasis feel they have to cover-up their condition," says dermatologist Dr. Norman Wasel.

"Rather than feeling the warm sun and gentle breezes on bare skin,

many of my patients are hiding in pants and long sleeve shirts because they are embarrassed about their condition."

Tips that can make summer more fun, and more tolerable, for psoriasis-sensitive skin:

Avoid sunburns — Moderate sun exposure can actually help psoriasis symptoms, but skin trauma such as sunburns can be a trigger for psoriasis. So limit your time in the sun, apply SPF 30 sunscreen faithfully, and enjoy the sun responsibly.

Be careful about combining sunlight and medication — Psoriasis sufferers should consult their doctors about sun exposure, particularly if they have been undergoing phototherapy. Some of the medications used in phototherapy may increase the sensitivity of the skin to sunlight, resulting in painful sunburns, or even an increased risk of skin cancer.

Moisturize! — Being in the sun all day can dry your skin. The use of a good-quality emollient in a cream form will keep skin moist, reduce itching and cracking, and soothe scaly plaques.

Wear loose, light, comfortable

clothing — Tight, ill-fitting clothing or shoes can irritate skin and aggravate psoriasis symptoms. Choose cool, loose clothing in soft natural fibers, such as cotton, and comfortable shoes or sandals loose enough to accommodate minor foot swelling in hot weather.

Talk to your doctor about new treatment options — There are many different treatments for psoriasis. A new class of treatments are available that work with the body to treat the condition and keep the symptoms at bay. One of the newest therapies is called Raptiva and unlike conventional therapies it can be administered at home and will offer continuous control of psoriasis symptoms.

Be sensible about nutrition, alcohol and smoking — Remember that a healthy lifestyle is important to keep your psoriasis symptoms under control. So eat sensibly, limit your intake of alcohol, and try to quit smoking. Your body, and your psoriasis, will be better for it!

Gasping for air? Don't compromise your quality of life

(NC)—According to a national survey, more than half of the 2.5 million Canadians living with asthma make compromises every day because of their disease.

They experience symptoms which are unnecessary, such as wheezing

and coughing, that hinder their day-to-day activities. Whether it's missing work or having to visit the hospital emergency room, people with uncontrolled asthma make compromises that they mistakenly see as inevitable.

"Compromises do not result from negligence or ignorance, but rather a complex set of behaviours," says Dr. David Aboussafy, PhD, clinical psychologist at the University of British Columbia and vice-president, BC Psychological Association. "One of the biggest factors of compromising behaviour is the generally low expectations held by asthma sufferers regarding the level of control possible with their disease. Low expectations feed into a multitude of attitudes and behaviours that ultimately impact quality of life."

Other reasons why people with asthma make compromises include misconceptions about asthma, anxiety about the disease or treatments, a sense of helplessness or psychological fatigue. Such compromises impact asthma sufferers' ability to manage asthma effectively.

However, an international group of asthma experts suggest that with appropriate care people may be able to control their disease well enough to prevent most attacks. If you have asthma, the first step toward aiming for a symptom-free life is to speak to your doctor about available treatments. Greater asthma control may be achieved if both patients and their doctors have higher expectations.

Managing asthma on a daily rather than on a crisis basis could allow many patients to regain those important elements of their lives that they may have compromised on in the past. Take a walk in the park

You've heard it 100 times: walking is good for you. How much? How far? Why bother?

Walking is one of those essential exercises the human body is meant to perform. Walking is more than just exercise - walking creates health in a dozen ways.

Let's start with a really bad disease - colon cancer. Walking can prevent colon cancer because it keeps the lymphatic system working. In fact, until you move, your lymphatic system plugs along at a rate comparable to a snail. When you walk, the system goes into real motion, clearing toxins from your body.

Walking improves your immune system through a complex interchange of many different factors. All exercise improves the immune system, but walking is the easiest to do.

Walking can prevent many muscular diseases, including circulatory and heart problems. The reason is that walking exercises the entire body and keeps the muscles strong. This is where the old adage "use it or lose it" is most noticeable. If you aren't using your muscles, they lose strength.

We hear a lot these days about osteoporosis. Bone loss can be prevented through regular walking. There is a signal passed through your body when your foot impacts the floor. That signal tells your body to build up bone mass. The more frequently your foot impacts the floor (or ground or sidewalk), the more often your body gets the signal to preserve bone.

Ask anybody who has been forced to lie in bed a long time, and they will tell you they are weak when they first begin to walk. Experiments done in a study which forced people to lie in bed for a month showed they not only lost strength, they lost bone mass. Astronauts working in zero gravity lost bone mass rapidly, even though they were moving around a lot. The reason for bone loss: they were not walking.

No exercise can replace the benefits of walking. Now that the weather is good, create a walking habit. Take a walk once a day every day for 21 days, and it will be a healthy habit.

Walkers live longer and better lives than sitters.

Town council shares financial plan

Although only 13 people attended the first ever public budget information meeting hosted by Town Council last Tuesday night, they learned a lot about what it takes to run a small community.

"We welcome you to the first time we've ever done this," said Deputy Mayor Jim Manion. "It's also new to us, and hopefully information to you."

CAO Patrick Robins added, "This is new, so there's no real rules of engagement here."

He went on to explain that the Town of Princeton is obligated to prepare a financial plan annually as a result of directives straight from the Community Charter. The financial plan becomes a bylaw and the Charter required the bylaw receive three readings from Town Council and final adoption by May 15th of each year.

The financial plan is made up of three different funds: the Operating Fund, Water Fund and Sewer Fund. The Operating Fund Revenues/Expenditures for 2006 amount to \$2,818,580 – up from \$2,019,050 from 2005. Reasons for the increase included property taxes from new inventory (new construction), a 3.5% property tax increase, an estimated \$10,000 in building permits, industrial land sales (estimated at \$125,000), Provincial Planning Grants (\$39,000), a Federal Gas Tax Revenue sharing grant (\$45,000), tourism funding (\$21,000), a Western Economic Diversification grant (\$26,700) and monies from prior years surplus appropriations (\$200,000) and from the land reserve (\$237,000) and airport reserve (\$16,000).

Some of the expenditures for 2006 include an Official Community Plan (OCP) update and town planning costs (\$59,000), recruitment costs (\$15,000), retirement costs (\$30,000), occupational health and safety (\$8,000), Fire Hall maintenance (\$5,000), an expanded Grant-In-Aid program (\$25,500), Fleet maintenance (\$17,800), website development (\$16,000), Industrial Park and East Princeton water planning (\$29,000), Industrial Park land purchase (\$281,370),

equipment purchases (\$30,000), the paving program (\$134,000), Parks (\$21,000), Personnel (\$20,000), Arena upgrade (\$75,000) and Land sale contribution to Park reserve (\$125,000).

Calling the Financial Plan a living document, Robins went on to outline the Sewer Fund details, which had total revenue and expenditures for 2006 of \$223,262, up from \$184,600 in 2005. The revenue change included a prior year surplus of \$37,000 with expenditure changes of the Culbertson Lift Station (\$25,000) and sewer effluent pump (\$12,634).

The Water Fund revenue and expenditures totaled \$368,050, down considerably from \$530,800 last year. The change was attributed to the postponement of the Deerview Water System Upgrade.

Deputy Mayor Manion summed up the process with an observation, "We are a fairly progressive council. We are going to do our best to be accountable to the community, with your input hopefully we'll make less mistakes."

Manion went on to make an important point.

"They say transparent. I don't like the word transparent because that means invisible we are trying to be accountable."

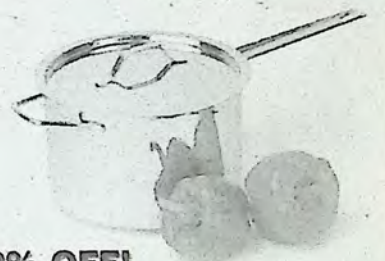

and a 2003 Proof Set of Canadian coins - valued at \$83.95 - for being chosen the winner in the local contest.

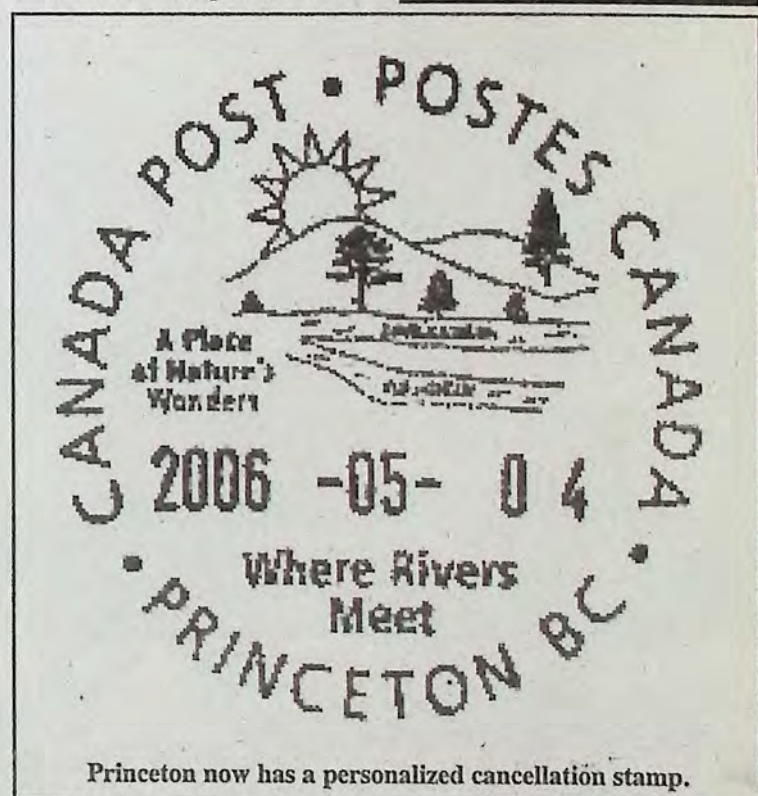
Phillion, who lived in the area between 1979 and 1993, moved away then came back to Princeton in 1999.

Chili Lime Turkey with Fresh Salsa

Salsa:

- 1 cup fresh tomatoes, seeded & drained (250 ml)
- 2 tbsp red onion, minced (30 ml)
- 2 tbsp cilantro, chopped (30 ml)
- 2 tsp lime juice (10 ml)
- 1 tsp jalapeno pepper, minced (5 ml)
- salt and pepper, to taste

Chili-Lime Turkey:

- 1 lb turkey scallopini (500 g)
- 1 tbsp lime juice (15 ml)
- 2 tsp chili powder (10 ml)
- 1 tsp dried oregano (5 ml)
- 1/2 tsp ground black pepper (2 ml)
- 1/4 tsp salt (1 ml)
- fresh lime wedges

In a medium bowl, combine tomatoes, onion, cilantro, lime juice, jalapeno and salt and pepper; set aside. Place turkey on plate; sprinkle on both sides with lime juice. In a large plastic bag, combine chili powder, oregano, pepper and salt; shake well. Add turkey scallopini to bag, seal and toss to coat well. On lightly greased grill or barbecue, over medium-high heat, cook turkey for 3 to 5 minutes per side. Serve with salsa and lime wedges. Serves 4.

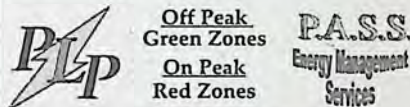

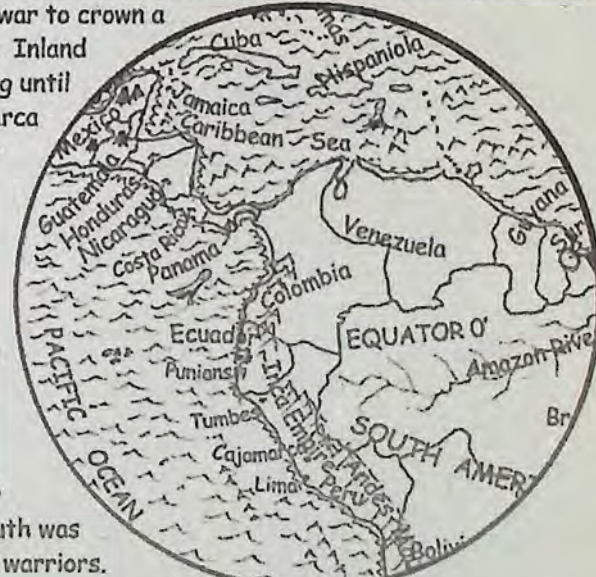

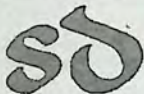

Do you really care at all?

The public Budget Information meeting last week attracted a total of 13 people. We had actually expected standing room only space at the meeting, which lasted just over an hour.

Where were the rest of the interested taxpayers last Tuesday night?

Well, for those of you who did not attend, we're going to tell you the good news from the Budget Information meeting.

Princeton Town Council is doing a pretty good job of being open, accessible and honest about how and where they are spending your tax dollars. It's the first time we can remember in the past twenty years so much effort has been put into keeping residents informed about their spending habits.

They also seem quite willing to accept criticism, direction and plenty of input from the people they are working for at Town Hall (that would be us - Princeton residents!).

There is also a lot of indications that the current Town Council intends to be remembered in the future as the 'Group of Five' that put Princeton on the map.

It's not as if the purse strings have been loosened, it's just that Town Council seems to have a desire to bulldoze Princeton into the future for our fair share of grant monies, public and private development and a whole lot more.

It was a pretty impressive show.

The bottom line shows the Town of Princeton operating fund has increased from just over \$2-million in 2005 to just over \$2.8-million in 2006. There are a lot of factors involved in the increase, but according to Town Council, the changes will be good and won't cost us much at all.

In fact, in some cases, residential property taxes have gone DOWN!

If you are a member of a non-profit organization that has asked Town Council for a 'Grant In Aid' you'll be pleased to note that they have decided to super-size the Grant In Aid fund. In 2005 they gave out \$89,000 in support of local non-profits. That jumps to \$115,000 in 2006 which tells us a whole lot more than anything else in the Budget document.

The increase tells us that the current Town Council firmly supports the efforts of the volunteer moment in and around our community. For a change we have a Town Council not afraid to put their money where their mouths are...instead of just a public thank you and a pat on the back, Town Council has chosen to 'buck up' and give local organizations something they really can get some mileage out of - grant money.

Overall, we liked what we heard at last week's public Budget Information meeting.

Deputy Mayor Jim Manion probably said it best when he pointed out it was a step in making Town Council more transparent, "I don't like the word transparent because that means invisible." Manion said Council wants to be viewed as accountable.

We think they are on their way to achieving that goal.

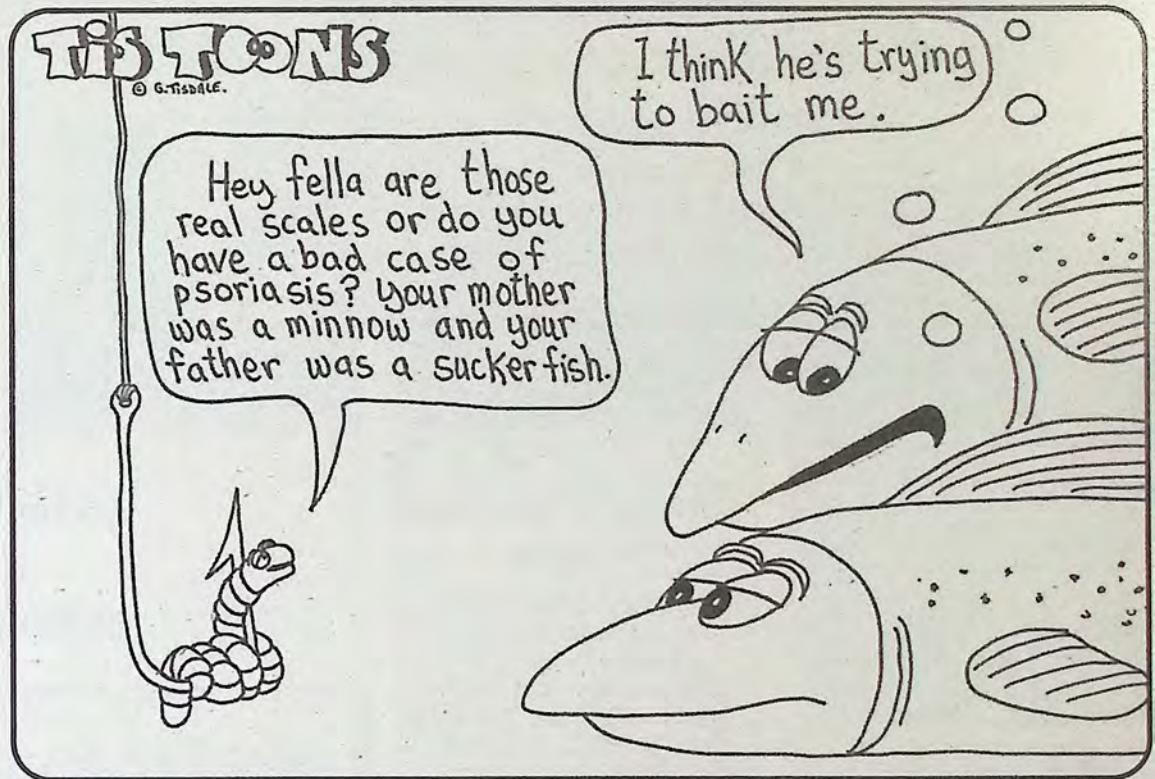

More on the 2006 Census issue

To The Editor;

Canadians are still suffering the aftermath of the Federal Liberals antics. We can, however, use the Census Forms that are being distributed to send the biggest protest to Ottawa.

There is a rapidly growing campaign across this Nation by an Organization called "COUNT ME OUT" by Vive la Canada who promote the boycott of the 2006 Canadian census for a very good reason.

As suggested, we can each send a letter of protest with the Census form in the envelope provided for our use. Statistics Canada has opened a whole kettle of worms which needs to squirm right back to them.

While it is billing itself to the world as a leader in gathering and sorting information, it appears that Stats Canada did not have the expertise to develop the necessary software and hardware to conduct the Census and defends the contract given to Lockheed Martin and its Canadian subsidiary.

Here lies the crux of the protest because they are the worlds largest defence contractor in the U.S. for making weapons of mass destruction and is leading the development of the Ballistic Missile Defense System which Canadians have rightly opposed and rejected.

Here is our chance to voice our concerns to the Politicians and object to this company that benefits from the Iraq war rather than by supporting them with Canadian Taxpayers money.

The NDP is the only political party that has called the Canadian

Government to task over the Lockheed Martin census contract. Bill Blakie, M.P., continued to question the Liberal Government even after the contract was real.

Prior to the last election, NDP Dick Proctor, M.P. for Pollisor had a motion before the House calling for the cancellation of that census contract. With our new area NDP Representative we need to be ensured that he and the Federal NDP Party continue to stand up for Canadians in this matter.

Our Municipal Council in Princeton should also be concerned with our loss of Sovereignty, Privacy and Confidentiality issues relating to the illegality of the census and cease to promote it to please Stats Canada/USA.

There is considerable information on the Internet on this disconcerting subject but for those without a computer, or who feel they can't write a letter, please attach a copy of this letter, sign it and mail it with your census form. Talk to your friends and neighbours to inform them about the "Count Me Out" national campaign by Vivelecanada.ca.

In April 2003 the Liberal Government permitted Stats Canada's Census Test. Viva le Canada called attention to the national media and encouraged people to take action and boycott that illegal census.

Across this country people refused to fill out the census forms. There were over 3,000 e-mails sent to M.P. Alan Rock who was the Industry Minister, asking that our census information NOT be given to this Military contractor.

What assurance do we have that the Canadian census information won't end up in the hands of the U.S. Government under the U.S. Patriot Act and given to the 'Homeland Security' in Canada and USA?

Why should we fully trust Lockheed Martin Co. that has frequently been marred by bribery, corruption and Human Rights abuses?

You have every right to not fill out the census forms online but demand a printed Canada Census form if you must co-operate for a head count.

No matter how good the plans for a community response, you must be prepared to help yourself and loved ones and neighbours when disaster strikes. Emergency service personnel cannot help everyone at once. You should be prepared to see to your basic needs for at least 72 hours.

What dangers could you face where you live?

In the Similkameen, it could be a flood, wildfire, landslide, chemical spill from a tanker truck, or an earthquake causing all of the above. You might have to leave your home in a hurry.

Even if you don't have to leave your home, you should have an emergency kit in an easily accessible location, like the hall closet. It should contain a first aid kit, spare prescription drugs, hearing aid batteries, batteries for a small radio, water, flashlight (check batteries often), matches and lighter, camping knife, can opener and garbage bags. You should also have rope, duct tape, and a space blanket. You can add food items, toothbrushes, razors, etc. according to your needs.

The single most lifesaving thing you can do is to be PREPARED.

Council justifies rate hike

Despite a complaint about the proposed rate hike for people using the municipal campground, Town Council gave final reading to a bylaw determining the new rates. CAO Patrick Robins had reviewed past accounts of the campground, and found the site either broke

even or was subsidized by local taxpayers. Capital improvements are required at the site, but there is no revenue to cover added costs. At \$22 per day (\$18 for seniors) as the top rate, Council decided the new rates are comparable to other campground fees.

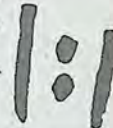

Financial Designations: What Do They Mean?

"CFP, FCSI, FMA" - you see these designations in investment correspondence all the time but do you know what they mean? There are so many financial designations used by so many financial professionals nowadays, that you might be confused about what they signify. To shed some light, I've included a list of the most common designations you're likely to hear of in the financial industry with a brief explanation about each one.

(FCSI) Fellow of the Canadian Securities Institute: The FCSI designation is awarded by the Canadian Securities Institute (CSI). To obtain the FCSI designation, students need a minimum of five years experience in the financial services industry and to have completed various designations and courses including the Partners, Directors and Senior Officers Exam. Representing "individual integrity and unrivaled professionalism," the FCSI designation is reserved for financial services professionals who have "met the most exacting standards for industry experience, advanced education and solid endorsement from their peers and superiors." The FCSI designation is recognized as the highest honour in the financial services industry, according to the Canadian Securities Institute. (CFA) Chartered Financial Analyst: This designation is held primarily by institutional money managers and stock analysts. The CFA is issued upon passing exams administered by the US-based Association for Investment Management and research (AIMR).

(FMA) Financial Management Advisor: A designation awarded by the Canadian Securities Institute, the FMA program delivers advanced financial planning and wealth management skills to its recipients. FMA graduates are able to service affluent clients who demand sophisticated wealth management strategies.

(CFP) Certified Financial Planner: The CFP is an internationally recognized designation awarded in Canada by the Financial Planners Standards Council (FPSC). CFP professionals must meet the FPSC's standards in education, experience, examination and ethics. CFP professionals must also get 30 hours of continuing education every year and agree to abide by the CFP code of ethics to renew their right to use the designation.

(CIM) Canadian Investment Manager: Achieving the Canadian Investment Manager (CIM) designation prepares its graduates with the skills and proficiency to become registered as a discretionary portfolio manager in Canada. This course concentrates on advanced investment strategies, and teaches advanced techniques to evaluate portfolio performance. I hope this information is helpful.
