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Police report rash of break-ins

Princeton RCMP have responded to a number of break and enters along the Princeton-Summerland corridor during the past few weeks. The suspect(s) are forcing their way into the homes and stealing a variety of items including stereos, alcohol, tools, etc. A number of these break-ins are occurring during the daytime when the home owners are away.

It is believed that the suspects are using a vehicle and in some cases traveling along the KVR to access homes.


Police are reminding home owners to secure their homes when away and to install audio alarms to alert neighbors of intruders. Home owners along this corridor are encouraged to be more attentive and aware of their surroundings and to advise the police of any suspicious activity or people in the area.

Police also advise recording property via video or photographs and to engrave drivers license numbers on valuables. This is so when items are recovered it is easier for police to identify owners and return property.

In all instances police are requesting that people obtain the license plate numbers on all suspicious vehicles, description of the suspect(s) and a direction of travel if possible.

If you do see something that is suspicious police are requesting you call 911 immediately to report it.

Horse racing takes place at 2:00 PM at Sunflower Downs (hosted by Princeton Racing Days Association) with a Mens/Ladies Fastball Tournament at Memorial Park.

Saturday, July 1st will see a continuation of the Mixed Golf Tournament, Art Show and Fastball Tournament.

Other events include the Lions Club Pancake Breakfast and Duck Race at Rotary Park, a Canada Day Celebration (hosted by Princeton Recreation Commission), Rotary Parade at 12 Noon, a free Concert featuring the Kettle Valley Brakemen at the Museum at 1:00 PM followed by a Street Dance on Vermilion Avenue at 6:00 PM. There's also Free Swimming at Centennial Pool from 2:00 to 4:00 PM.

Sunday, July 2nd will see the conclusion of the Mixed Golf Tournament and Mens/Ladies Fastball Tournament.

Other events planned for the weekend include School Reunions and the popular Rotary Club Similkameen Cup Sweepstakes tickets, which will be sold during the week prior to Friday's horse races.

Mayor, Manion oppose policy

Mayor Randy McLean and Councillor Jim Manion found themselves on the short side of a vote on mobile home park redevelopment policy.

The policy motion had been deferred to June 19 for consideration. The policy deals with the prospect of redevelopment of any mobile home park rezoning request.

The issue is one dealt with in many communities where mobile home park owners have chosen to redevelop the land for single or multi-family housing developments. Owners leasing land in the park then have to relocate. Sometimes they can find no mobile home park

to relocate to, and others may have problems moving an old mobile home that is not CSA approved.

The policy presented to Council goes a step beyond the provincial legislation, which calls for 12 months notice of intent to redevelop, plus return of a year's pad rentals.

Council debated the merits of a relocation assistance program for mobile home park tenants. Mayor McLean and Councillor Manion opposed a section of the program which says it may call for arranging and paying for disposal of mobile homes, payment for tenants' mobile homes, offering discounts on redevelopment housing

units, and advice on options for relocating.

Mayor McLean and Councillor Manion said adoption of the policy would severely limit any redevelopment plans and possibly discourage any investor from considering such a plan. At the end of the meeting, during Question Period, local business owner Ed Muckle gave Council his opinion that the policy would not do the Town any good.

Councillors Ray Jarvis, Pam Jones and Maria Sadegur voted in favour of the policy. Councillor Jarvis said it was "fair to both sides" while the Mayor and Councillor Manion asked that their negative votes be recorded.

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

Rodents can be deadly

A recent death in southern British Columbia has raised concerns again about the rodent population. A young man died from hantavirus, believed to have been contracted from deer mice.

Hantavirus is deadly. The first identified cases of the killer strain of hantavirus occurred two decades ago in Arizona, killing three young Navajo athletes. The virus infects so rapidly that most victims die in three days. It is rare for anyone to survive the infection.

The first death to occur in B.C. was in May, 1994, in the Kamloops area.

Rodents are carriers of the disease. The rodent population includes not only mice, but marmots, squirrels, chipmunks, pack rats, and many other species. One death was attributed to contact with raccoons.

Prevention is the key. It is not enough to simply avoid rodents. People must avoid contact with rodent feces and urine, especially in confined spaces.

Rodents may be trapped and their bodies burned (trap and all - do not touch the rodent or the trap) and any area with rodent droppings must be aired and then disinfected. **DO NOT FEED RODENTS!**

Some people think rodents such as squirrels, chipmunks and marmots are "cute" and will feed them seeds, nuts and crumbs. This encourages not only initial contact with the rodents, but encourages the rodents to return time and again, increasing the likelihood of rodent droppings on your property and perhaps in your outbuildings and home as the rodents become confident.

The consequences could be fatal to you and your family. Imagine a small child playing on the lawn where an infected rodent has urinated! That child could be dead in a day or two.

Any area infested with rodents should be avoided and every effort should be made to eradicate the rodent population in locations where contact with humans is likely to occur.

Property owner faces zone problem

A property on Tipton Avenue is for sale, but one of the owners has written to Town Council complaining about the difficulties they are encountering due to zoning problems. The owners have a buyer, who would like to build a four-plex or duplex on the two adjacent lots. Zoning and parking requirements forestall the sale, as the property is zoned Commercial. The owners claim they asked Council for a variance and Council would not agree.

Town Council dealt with the matter at the June 19 meeting, saying they never have received a request

for a variance.

That block of Tipton Avenue has had one business location among residential properties for many years, and is designated Commercial in the Official Community Plan.

The property in question has an old house on it which would be removed.

Mayor Randy McLean asked Council whether it made sense for new residential buildings to be constructed on that street. If a variance was granted, it would likely tie up commercial development on that street for the next 50 years.

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


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Cherylee Highway, PACE Program Coordinator/Instructor Saskatoon Campus of Saskatchewan Indian Institute of Technologies, presented an in depth presentation on crystal meth at the Community Forum hosted in Hedley on June 15th.

Group hosts crystal meth forum

The growing problem of crystal meth use and production was explored at the Hedley Community Forum June 15th.

The forum, hosted by the Keremeos based South Similkameen Anti-Crystal Meth Initiative in cooperation with Upper Similkameen Indian Band and RCMP, featured a presentation by Cherylee Highway.

Highway is the PACE Program Coordinator/Instructor at the Saskatoon Campus of the Saskatchewan Indian Institute of Technologies. She explained PACE stood for Prevention, Awareness and Community Education.

"It's not about intervention and it's not about treatment as we are not there yet."

Her presentation was titled, 'Protecting our Communities Against Crystal Meth' and contained graphic slides to hammer home a variety of points related to crystal meth.

The basic dynamics of the drug were reviewed and crystal meth was described as a stimulant drug which affects the central nervous system. This changes the way a user thinks and behaves.

The different forms of crystal meth were also discussed. It comes in a powder form, rock-like chunks, a peanut butter-like spread, a crystal, capsules, tablets and pills.

"The form depends on the production of the meth."

Slang terms used to identify crystal meth in 'user circles' are many and vary.

"In every different location we've visited, they have a different term. One town has a term and another town will use another," Highway said. According to Princeton RCMP Sgt. Kurt Lozinski, who was one of the guest speakers at the forum, the slang terms currently used in the Similkameen for crystal

meth are 'sideways' and 'jib' but those may change.

"Packaging is very attractively designed to market to a youth market," Highway pointed out, "Different packaging makes a statement."

There are a number of methods to use crystal meth and they include smoking, injecting, ingesting and snorting.

"It can rev our heart rate 300%," Highway said, "We're talking a long-term high at a very high rate. It's cheap and it's a long high. That's why it's attractive to young people."

Highs have been recorded as lasting from 12 to 36 hours from a \$5.00 'baggie' of crystal meth.

"We've heard of 21 days for one person not sleeping while on the drug."

As you can imagine, that kind of abuse takes its toll on the user. "Seven years is the average life span of a meth user," Highway said, "Ten years is extraordinary."

If that wasn't scary enough, the presentation showed images of the human brain of a healthy person compared to one of a meth user. Meth use created 'holes' or non-functioning parts of the brain and reduces the size of the brain.

"It's damage to the brain."

Meth is able to penetrate the brain within three seconds of use.

The production of crystal meth was also discussed. "It's very important to know what's going into it," Highway said.

The ingredients are many, but are mostly what would be considered toxic and poisonous chemicals that would not normally be injected by the average, normal person.

Some meth labs have also been known to recycle human urine to extract the remaining traces of meth that have gone through a users system. 'Choosing meth is choosing poison' was the clear message.

The production of crystal meth was discussed.

"It's not easy to make but it's easy to get the ingredients." Meth labs are often portable and easy to store or move or hide.

A total of 65% of meth labs have children in them and are highly flammable, highly explosive and extremely toxic. The production of meth produces a lot of waste. A single kilogram of meth produces seven kilograms of waste.

"We believe healthy individuals come from healthy families living in healthy communities," Highway stated.

How large a problem is crystal meth? According to Highway, "Alcohol is number one with marijuana creeping close behind. Meth is down the line as drug of choice, but it is a huge concern."

Princeton RCMP Sgt. Kurt Lozinski put the problem into perspective, "I've got to tell you crystal meth scares me. I've been a police officer for fifteen years and I've never seen anything like it."


He says there are no labs in Princeton at this point and feels it may be because meth is easy to get in the Similkameen. He did state the number of users in Princeton has increased 300% from 3 users three years ago and totals 30 at the present time. Lozinski added that meth has attracted any age.

"As young as eight in Princeton has tried meth with the oldest being 60."

Lozinski also emphasized the connection between meth and other drugs and addictions.

"Alcohol and marijuana are gateway drugs to everything else. You don't normally start with meth but it is definitely down the road."

The presentation included a short question period and organizers indicated a desire to host additional forums in the future.

Town year end looks good

The Town of Princeton year end financial statements were made public at the June 19 Council meeting. Commenting on Princeton's position, CAO Patrick Robins said Princeton is in better shape than many municipalities. The Town has no longterm debt and can cover all of its obligations.

The current financial statement is the most comprehensive and

detailed report submitted to the public to date, including even recommendations by the auditors to tighten accountability at the municipal campground and the landfill operation.

Net financial assets total nearly \$5 million, while non-financial assets, such as real estate, equipment and supplies total an estimated \$12.5 million.

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

The SPF (Sun Protection Factor) is a number used to measure sun protection ability in sunscreen lotions. It's a measure of how much sun radiation will produce skin redness on skin protected by sunscreen compared to skin that is not. A lotion with an SPF of 15 blocks 93% and a lotion with an SPF of 30 blocks 97%. Use at least lotion with an SPF of at least 15.

Talking about sun exposure, don't forget to protect your eyes during the sunny days of summer. Use sunglasses that block at least 95% of UVB rays and 60% of UVA rays. This type of eye protection can reduce your risk of cataracts.

Many people take antioxidant vitamins and minerals like vitamins C and E and the mineral selenium. They feel it protects them against disease and feel it lowers the risk of cancer. However, don't take these products if you are being treated for cancer with drugs or radiation. You may not get the full effect of the therapy.

Partly Fact. People who have darker pigmentation have a greater protection from the sun's damaging UV exposure compared to those with fair skin. However, the level of protection varies significantly. Having a tan provides an SPF of about two. Therefore, even pigmented skin can be damaged from exposure to UV rays. Public Comment Invited on the Environmental Assessment of the Proposed Princeton Power Project Terms of Reference

The B.C. Environmental Assessment Office (EAO) invites the public to comment on the draft Terms of Reference (TOR) for the Princeton Power Project (Project).

Compliance Power Corporation (Proponent) is proposing to construct and operate a 56 megawatt (MW) wood residue and coal power generating plant at the former Similco mine site located 14 km south of Princeton. This proposed Project would have a steam turbo generator, modern circulating fluidized bed boiler, air emissions control system, condenser and cooling system, water treatment and discharge system, substation and utilize existing mine infrastructure and buildings.

The proposed Project is subject to review under British Columbia's *Environmental Assessment Act*, S.B.C. 2002, c.43. The purpose of the draft TOR is to identify the information that the Proponent must include in the application for an environmental assessment certificate.

The 21-day public comment period will begin on July 4, 2006 and end on July 25, 2006. Form letters, petitions or other submissions that only state a position for or against a given project cannot generally be considered by EAO. Written comments received by Tuesday, July 25, 2006 will be considered. After taking public comments into consideration, EAO will finalize the TOR and issue them to Compliance Power Corporation. 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

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

Our last game Saturday, pitted us against the District Champs from Rutland.


Their pitcher was very fast and very wild. We definitely took our lumps in this one, on the scoreboard and in the batters box. Sunday morning we played

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


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



As a result the paved portion of the road to Osprey Lake remains a patchwork of fresh pavement several hundred feet in length, here and there, and several thousand potholes which continue to deepen and expand.

Now, as is customary on my part, I often take this road to Summerland. About 40 K of it is unpaved, but I find the trip interesting as I drive through the pristine wilderness of our countryside. That is, until yesterday when I had to fight my way through the worst road conditions yet to be experienced in this Province.

I had to keep my eyes glued to the road so as not to destroy my vehicle in potholes, washboards, loose gravel and whatever else. Worse yet, when one reaches Thirsk Lake, one is faced with the rusting hulk of an abandoned vehicle which now has been vandalized and rendered useless by apparent thievery.

I have faced this condition only once in my life. That was in Africa, in Zaire to be more pre-

cise. (now the Republic of the Congo).


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

Communities For Kids announces funding

Communities for Kids, in partnership with Success By 6®, has been allocated funding to support early childhood development (ECD) in the South Okanagan-Similkameen. Communities for Kids will award a portion of these funds to community groups that submit successful applications for projects that promote the optimum health and development of children aged 0-6. Two application deadlines have been established; August 31st, 2006, and February 28th, 2007.

Since its inception in 2002, Communities for Kids (a Children First initiative) has worked to support ECD in our region by facilitating collaboration and information sharing among service providers and families.

Communities for Kids is a non-profit, community based coalition of ECD service providers and partners. Its work is guided by a steering committee and conducted by a project coordinator, two community facilitators and an administrative assistant.

A key objective of Communities for Kids is to build community capacity and sustainability to support ECD. One way this is achieved is to establish and facilitate "Community Tables".

A Table is a volunteer group who come together to identify their community's ECD needs and then

develop and implement a plan to address those needs.

There are Communities for Kids/Success By 6® Community Tables in Summerland, Okanagan Falls, Oliver, Osoyoos, Keremeos and Princeton. The Communities for Kids coalition continues to work toward establishing Tables in other South Okanagan-Similkameen communities.

In 2005, Communities for Kids was excited to form a partnership with Success By 6® and Understanding the Early Years.

Success By 6® is a provincial partnership between the Government of BC (Ministry of Children and Family Development), the United Ways of BC, and the Credit Unions of BC. The province's 19 Success By 6® initiatives work to establish and enhance community capacity to support and promote ECD.

One way this is done is to provide funds to support community based ECD projects. Understanding the Early Years is a federally funded research initiative that gathers data to guide and inform community based responses to ECD needs. This unique partnership strengthens the Communities for Kids coalition and creates more opportunities for advancing ECD initiatives in the South Okanagan-Similkameen.

Communities for Kids plans to use some of their Success By 6® funds to promote awareness and enhance understanding of the importance of the early years in the region by establishing a website and other communication tools.

Communities for Kids believes that effective partnerships between community groups can build community capacity and promote sustainability of ECD initiatives. As such, individual agencies, societies, or community groups that apply for funding must demonstrate the collaborative nature of their project.

Eligible projects must support ECD in at least one of the following developmental areas:

- physical health and well being,
- social competence,
- emotional maturity,
- language and cognitive development,
- communications and general knowledge.

Funds will not be awarded to support maintenance of existing services, programs, or operating costs of established agencies, societies or other ECD service organizations.




