### Small Branch shows how to get job done

Hosting an International Gavel Passing is a huge undertaking by any small branch of the Royal Canadian Legion. Those who do the planning must consider all costs and hope those costs will be covered by earnings during the event.

Princeton's Branch #56 came out well ahead, with some help from the community.

Princeton residents are old hands at loonie auctions. After the Opening Ceremonies and dinner, Bob Wicks turned auctioneer for a loonie auction.

There is some background to the auction prizes. The Legion produced an International Gavel Passing Passport. Local businesses advertised in the passport book, and visitors could have the book signed or stamped at local stores.

In return, local businesses donated a prize for the loonie auction. The donations were generous and the auction earned \$400 for the Legion.

The following afternoon, Ray Davis, a professional auctioneer from Washington, took over the Legion Hall to sell a large number of items of all kinds.

These items were donated by everyone registered for the Gavel Passing event. This auction raised \$1,400.

Besides turning fun into money through the auctions, there were other earnings during the weekend, which defrayed the cost of the many meals provided, from breakfast to dinner.

There were plenty of things to do, the weather was beautiful, and Princeton's Legion came out ahead.

## RCMP kept busy during long weekend

Another Tulameen Days weekend has come to an end. Police estimate between 3,000 and 4,000 people attended the event over August long weekend.

"The Tulameen Community Rec Club should be commended for another successful family function which certainly drew some colourful and interesting characters," says RCMP S/Sgt. Kurt Lozinski.

Additional members were brought in to police this event as well as a number of security officers from Penticton.

"These additional resources certainly played a factor in reducing the problems usually associated with this event. RCMP were kept busy for the entire weekend and it will take members several weeks to catch up on the

paperwork," Lozinski adds.

In three days, the police opened and investigated almost 100 files.

"This does not include the multitude of complaints and investigations that police had to contend with in regards to drinking in public, noisy parties and arguments."

During the weekend the police seized a large quantity of drugs including marijuana, cocaine, hash, mushrooms and ecstasy. In addition one traffic stop yielded two loaded hand guns.

"Individuals from Lower Mainland are facing charges of Possession for the Purpose of Trafficking and Firearm offences. First court appearances are set for October 12th, 2006."

The following is a breakdown of stats for the weekend:

In addition police have received a number of calls from community members residing in Missezula Lake, Allison Lake and Osprey Lake areas regarding unlicensed ATV's driving erratically in those resort areas.

As such police attended and issued approximately \$5,000.00 in fines under the Motor Vehicle Act. Police will continue with this enforcement

for the rest of the summer.

RCMP Detachment Cst. Myrl Stus reports the activity at Missezula Lake resulted in a total of 12 violation tickets for No Insurance being issued (worth \$598.00 each).

"Some drivers were riding ATV's without helmets and most were underage," Stus adds.

Police also wrote violation tickets for open liquor in vehicles and a 24-hour licence suspension at Missezula Lake.

"There were also minors in possession of alcohol and people walking around with open liquor."

Otherwise, Lozinski says the weekend was not as busy as previous years in Tulameen.

"All in all the calls for service appear to be down this year as compared to other years. The RCMP will continue to work closely with the Tulameen Community Club in efforts to control this event with the ultimate goal of removing the trouble makers and making this again a family event," Lozinski states.

Police would like to thank the members of the BC Ambulance services, Tulameen Fire Department, Penticton Security and the local tow-

ing company (ABBA) for their assistance and professional service they provided over the weekend. "These agencies were a tremendous asset to us and their hard work did not go unnoticed."

## Mayor issues public statement

I would like to issue a statement today as a member of the town council elected to serve the best interests of the people of Princeton.

I believe it is my duty to express my concerns about the Compliance Coal fired generating plant proposed for our area. I have spent the last eight months listening, reading and researching what the implications would be for our community and our valley.

We live in the most beautiful valley in the most beautiful province in the world and I believe we have a responsibility to ensure that we pass that inheritance on to those who will come after.

I find no fault with Compliance Coal as a company but a great deal with a provincial government that is even considering allowing outdated processes that are presently being banned in Ontario and around North America. Burning pulverized coal produces a number of different contaminants including mercury which is of particular concern. The Mount Sinai school of medicine research study is one example of the many studies on the dangers of mercury contamination, it shows that even low levels of mercury have been proven to cause severe neurological damage in fetuses and young children.

Compliance Coal and the provincial government have other options, the coal gasification process although initially more expensive, in the long range in terms of medical and environmental health will prove to be far more economic than the older technology. This process which removes nearly all contaminants has been approved by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and is being utilized throughout the world. In Chaplin, Saskatchewan a major mineral firm has announced a coal gasification project that will begin producing power in 2007. This plant will produce near 0 emissions making it .....continued on Page 8

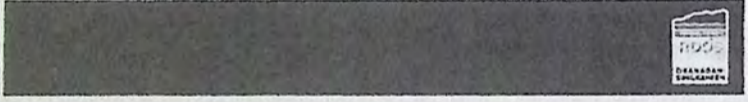

## Town looks ahead with new projects

Town Council has accepted a bid totalling \$74,632.50 for a truck and sander. This will enable the Town to replace a 1983 vehicle, and ensure winter sanding will go on through having two vehicles capable of doing the work.

Another bid, for more than \$7,000, is for irrigation equipment for the lower level of Memorial Park. This area near the swimming pool is not used as much as it could be due to lack of irrigation.

Another project for the future is the development of a park where Tulameen and Similkameen Rivers meet.

This project has been a long time in the making, and is now a project partnered by the Town, Princeton Rotary Club and Vermilion Trails Society.

The Town has applied for rent tenure of the Crown lands, and will hire Brenda Gould, from the Upper Similkameen Indian Band Archaeology Department, to do the preliminary archaeological work required before tenure can be granted.

Councillor Pam Jones commented, "I'm glad we're moving along with this project."

In addition to seeking the Crown land, Council approved an application for a grant of \$21,152 for tourism development, and will apply for a BC Hydro grant to provide lighting along the TransCanada Trail between the two bridges and adjacent to the Crown land to be developed as a park.

## Tragedy struck ten years ago

On August 19, 1996, a cougar attacked and killed Cindy Corlett Parolin as the family headed out for a camping trip.

Her death affected everyone who knew her, and countless people who did not, but were shocked at the way she died.

Cindy and three of her children were on horseback, heading for a campsite west of Tulameen. Her husband, Les, and second son, Bill, were at the campsite. With her were her eldest son, her daughter, and her youngest son, Steve. The cougar attacked Steve, ripping into his scalp.

Cindy and the children dismounted and Cindy began to drive the cougar away. The horses panicked and fled, leaving the riders afoot. Cindy told the two older children to take Steve to the campsite and get help.

She remained behind to fight the cougar. It was a battle she could not win.

She was still alive when Jim Manion found her with the cougar on top of her. He and his dog managed to draw the cougar away, and the cougar was finally shot.

Cindy was awarded Canada's highest civilian award for bravery, the Star of Courage. She had made the ultimate sacrifice for her children.

## Council okays town square bid

Tenders indicate action Town Council is taking toward the future. At the August 8 Town Council meeting, a number of tenders were authorized for action, including plans for a new "Town Square".

Successful bidder for the town square plan is Urban Systems at a cost of \$16,500, over budget projections by \$4,000.

CAO Patrick Robins said the over budget amount will not be a problem due to the \$22,772 gas tax refund received by the municipality at the beginning of this month.

The plan calls for input from the Business Enhancement Association, Chamber of Commerce, the Legion, local residents, Regional District (for mapping) and Town staff.

The plan will address issues such as vehicle circulation, pedestrian safety, access to businesses, parking and uses of the square.

The goal is to form a plan to physically improve the area. Councillor Jim Manion said the plan is a "good step" as it involves the community.

No time line has been established at this point, pending consultation with the project team: Sarah Marsh, Tony Bradwell and Therese Zulinick.

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

## Fire department receives truck

Fire Chief Jordy Bosscha says the new fire truck will make a big difference for the district volunteer firefighters when responding to fire calls and road rescues.

Bosscha says they can respond with just one truck now instead of always heading to an emergency in two vehicles.

Endless fundraisers help the crew keep up to date with new rescue apparatus and in addition to the new fire truck; the department recently acquired air bags.

Over the past year, money has been raised to go towards the purchase of a new Jaws of Life, which should arrive in September.

## Grant enhances child and youth services

The Lower Similkameen Community Services Society in Keremeos will benefit from a \$75,000.00 one-time grant, Children and Family Development Minister Stan Hagen announced last week.

The funding will be used to support research, identify effective service delivery models and produce recommendations for Child and Youth Mental Health Services in communities in the Interior region of the province.

"Our government is committed to providing safe and healthy communities for children and youth in British Columbia," Hagen said.

"Providing research for improving children's health and development is the key purpose of this funding and I hope it will make a valuable difference in their lives."

The research conducted will also provide community agencies with a document for consideration in building quality services for those at risk of or suffering from serious and life impacting mental illness living in rural communities.

"Working as the board and staff do in a small rural community, we are well-situated to undertake this research," said society chairman, Walter Despot.

"We bring an awareness and sen-

sitivity to the unique challenges of service delivery, staff recruitment and retention that would not be present in an agency located in an urban center."

"This contribution is part of our government's Child and Youth Mental Health Plan, the first of its kind in Canada," Hagen said.

"The plan is focused on improving the effectiveness and efficiency of existing services and on significant enhancements to service capacity."

The society will provide a report to the Ministry of Children and Family Development on completion of the research and model recommendations in early 2007.

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## PS Capsule Comments

If you are travelling on a long flight, consider wearing compression stockings during the flight. Wearing stockings reduces leg edema decreasing the risk of deep vein thrombosis and blood clots, which can occur during long flights.

Metabolic syndrome is a group of conditions that can greatly increase your risk of heart attack, stroke and diabetes. The conditions include: Blood pressure above 130/85; elevated fasting blood glucose of over 6; triglyceride levels of over 1.7; HDL ("good cholesterol") less than 1.0; waist circumference over 40" for men and over 35" for women. How are you doing?

Leg cramps can really disturb a good night's sleep. Remedies that have been tried include vitamin E, magnesium and B complex vitamins. Some people say these help. Others say they don't. If you get leg cramps often, try stretching the leg muscles for a few minutes before retiring. This sometimes helps.

If you are considering buying an electric toothbrush, look for ones with heads that rotate one way then the other. These seem to remove plaque more efficiently than those that oscillate from side to side.

It's important that you know about the medications you take. Knowledge is the greatest tool to prevent incorrect or unsafe use of medicines. Remember, there is no such thing as a silly question about drugs. Ask us!

### Don't let ragweed season get the better of you

(NC)-For most people, allergies are a seasonal condition, recurring for several weeks at the same time each year. ### Red clover shown to mimic estrogen

(NC)-When estrogen levels start to decline, a woman can feel very unlike her normal self.

Hot flashes, night sweats, mood swings and irritability are the most common symptoms of menopause, often leading to loss of bone density, fractures, cardiovascular problems and heart disease. Estrogen plays such a vital role in maintaining a woman's health and well being, so the question is why, as early as age 35, would nature purposely deprive the body of them?

Scientific research suggests that nature didn't get it wrong and a big part of the answer may lie in our diet. Isoflavones are found mainly in legumes, such as lentils, split peas, chickpeas, broad beans and soy. Not all legumes contain all four of

the most important isoflavones however. Red clover does and as a result of several successful clinical trials, it is now standardized as a valuable treatment option.

Making your fat cells shrink should be a primary goal in your life if you want to live past 100. You cannot live well if you let your fat cells expand and become aggressive.

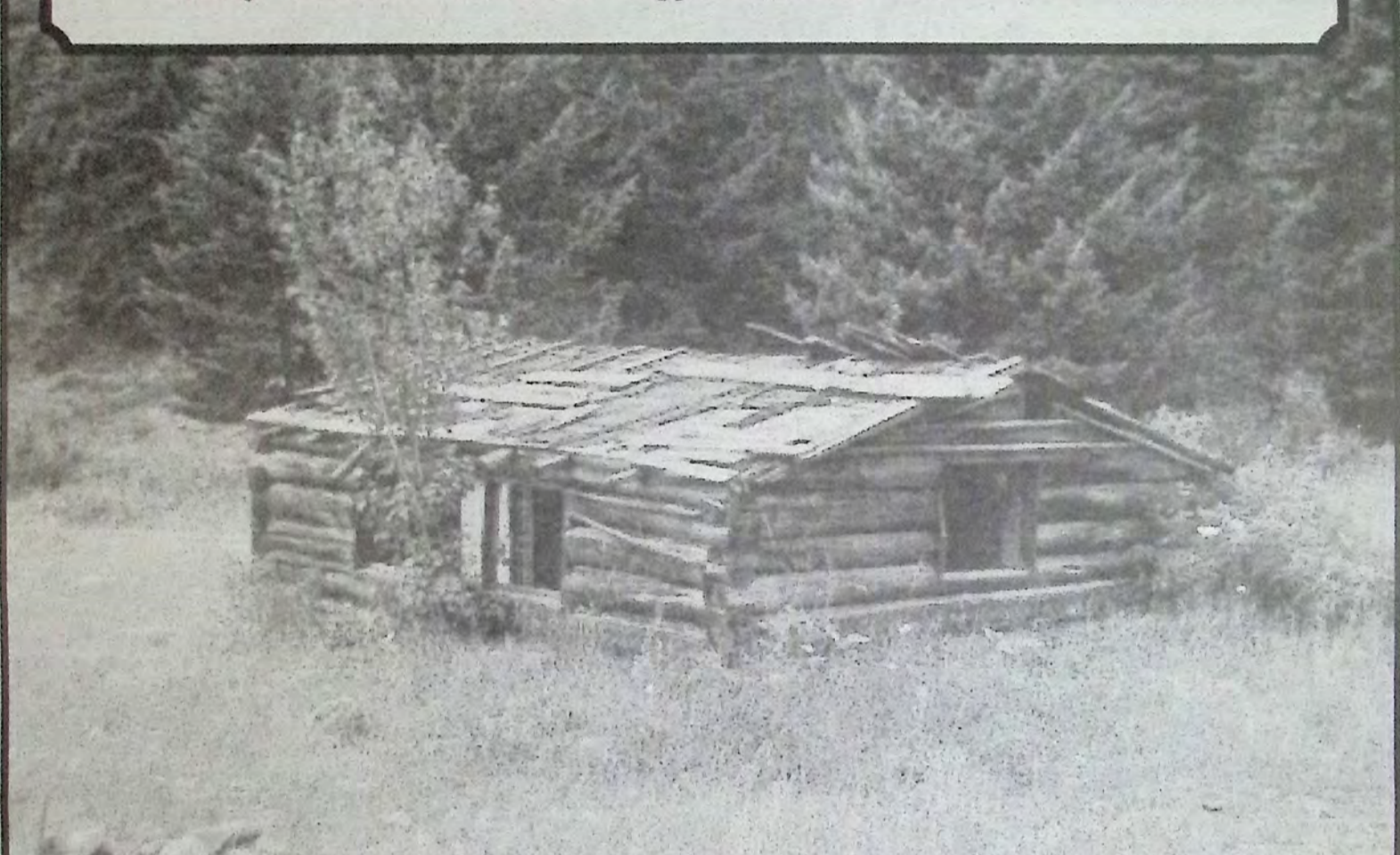

 even more environmentally efficient that the natural gas power plant that it is replacing. The technology is there, if we are going to go down the path of coal fired generating do we not deserve systems as advanced as Chaplin, Saskatchewan?

These are decisions that will profoundly affect our future, and future generations. Can we afford to be

wrong? Viewed 40 years from now, given the technological advances that are taking place, how will our decisions be judged?

At this time there are no coal fired plants in BC, if we insist on going ahead with this coal generating process, one could argue that the negative impact on our tourism and real estate would be offset by the 35 permanent jobs created by this pro-

ject. However is there anyone who would consider jeopardizing our health and the future of our children for any economic development?

As Gov. Jim Risch of Idaho states: "Idaho is in a unique position because we don't have any coal fired generating power plants...While I promote economic development throughout the state the health implications of mercury emissions from coal fired power plants far outweigh any economic benefits."

On an issue as important as this we must research and investigate and become aware of the long term implications and then let our voices be heard or we will endure this development whether or not it is in our best interest.

# Cougar kills are not rare

Every year, in August, I remember the death of my friend, Cindy Corlett Parolin. I will never forget the shock of going into work and dealing with the hot news story of the week. Reporters from everywhere were clamouring for the news.

For me, it was more than a news story, it was a tragic loss of a woman I had known for many years. Cindy had many friends in the community, and she had as many who admired and respected her courage in all kinds of situations.

Most people who heard the news were shocked that a cougar would kill. This was not the big shock for me. I had heard stories of cougar attacking humans from the time I was a child. My father, who spent part of his youth in Nanaimo, talked about people avoiding walking the beaches and roads alone because cougars roamed the area. They killed a number of early Vancouver Island settlers. What really annoyed and disgusted me was that Disney Productions brought out a movie about "nice" cougars, totally ignoring the truth. Conservation officers who have been on the job awhile can tell you the dangers of the Disney approach to wildlife, and when Cindy was killed, I heard a certain amount of that kind of sympathy and idealization of the so-called noble wild animals.

**We are not alone**

Thanks to our reader, Vi Jenner, I was drawn to read a story in Reader's Digest about Boulder, Colorado, where deer in the city and its suburbs led to cougars prowling the town and residential areas. Finally, a teenage boy who was practicing his running was killed and dragged away by a cougar. Nobody saw this, and he was presumed "missing". Nobody thought of a cougar attack, as the boy was doing laps around the school grounds. When his remains were found, where the cougar had dragged it, those at the scene were under surveillance by a cougar protecting his kill. The cougar was openly aggressive and was soon destroyed.

**Big cats kill**

We can think of cougar attacks as isolated rare instances, but to do so would ignore this fact: big cats kill

people. Any African will tell you lions will kill people. Any resident of south India will tell you tigers will kill people. Anyone living in Central America and Brazil will tell you jaguars will kill people. These people will tell you big cats do not kill merely on chance encounters. Big cats will hunt people.

Cyclists in California's Sierra mountains learned this the hard way. A cyclist disappeared on a well-used trail. His bicycle was found on the trail, but no cyclist. Days later, a group was biking on the trail, and the lead cyclist was attacked by a cougar. The others came to his rescue as he fought with the cat. As they chased the cat into the bushes, they made a grim discovery, the remains of the missing cyclist.

**Deer led to cougars**

The residents of Boulder, Colorado, had been divided about the deer living in the city and suburbs. Some people liked having the deer around, and had no concerns about cougars. When cougar attacks began, they were on pets as well as on deer. What a lot of residents did not understand was that cougars want

meat, and they will hunt it whenever they can find prey. House pets and people are easier prey than deer.

After the death of the teenager, Boulder residents demanded removal of the deer, knowing the cougar population would follow the deer into town. In fact, a cougar was seen in downtown Boulder. Wildlife authorities had been reluctant to take action, until somebody was killed. Finally, they acted.

**What about Princeton?**

I have heard out-of-town people laugh at Princeton residents complaining about deer in town. Would they laugh at complaints about cougars in town? The big cats will hunt where they can find prey. They do not have to be starving or demented. Big cats do what big cats do: they hunt meat.

**Feed deer at your own risk**

I have a message for those people who like to feed deer: remember you are setting the stage to make yourself the next wildlife meal. Be sensible. Chase the deer away. I have a message for all local hunters: the only place I like deer near me is on my dinner plate. All donations will be gratefully accepted.

The Princeton Ground Search & Rescue Society, with financial help from Weyerhaeuser, took delivery of their ATV/Snowmobile Rescue Boggans last week.

PGSAR applied for funding through the Weyerhaeuser Corporate Giving - Canada Program and received a cheque for \$5,000.00 towards the purchase of the much needed equipment.

"The Rescue Boggans will allow PGSAR members to safely transport injured persons from the back-country all year round."

The Boggans will also give the team the ability to transport gear and supplies to advanced camps, adding to their value.

Members volunteer their time to, and respond to, missing person

requests and rescues from the RCMP, BC Ambulance Service back country carry outs, and any PEP emergency requests by the Town of Princeton, RDOS, or mutual aid requests anywhere else in the Province.

"Thanks again to Weyerhaeuser for supporting the Princeton Ground Search and Rescue team," Rorvik adds.

## Weyerhaeuser donates to local search and rescue organizations

Weyerhaeuser announced donations totalling \$10,000.00 to Princeton-based community organizations dedicated to saving lives and protecting the safety of rescue workers and patients at the scene of accidents.

The Princeton & District Highway Extrication Society (PDHES) will receive \$5,000.00 to purchase necessary equipment and fund training costs.

The PDHES provides training for highway extrication volunteers to

help rescue people injured or trapped in motor vehicle accidents and other emergency incidents in the Princeton area. In 2005, the Society responded to 55 calls, rescued 17 people and treated another 50 patients at roadside.

"Without the support of community-minded corporations like Weyerhaeuser, it would be impossible for us to operate," said Peter Hardinger, President, Princeton Highway Extrication Society.

"We are a small group of volun-

teers with no dedicated funding and we depend on volunteer efforts and donations to provide rescue services on the highways and roads around Princeton. We extricate trapped patients from wrecked cars with the Jaws of Life and rescue people from steep embankments," said Hardinger.

"Weyerhaeuser's donation represents one third of our annual operating costs and will let us repair, improve and upgrade our equipment and training," he added.

The Princeton Ground Search & Rescue (PGSAR) will also receive \$5,000.00 to purchase a Rescue Boggan that will be used in searches and evacuations.

The PGSAR works with all key provincial and local safety agencies to search for missing and unaccountable persons in addition to responding to natural disaster calls such as floods, fire evacuations and mudslide searches.

"These donations are an extension of the culture in our operations where safety is our first priority," said Rob Marshall, Princeton Timberlands Manager.

"These local organizations are doing superb front-line work to help people in times of great distress and we are very proud to be associated with them," said Marshall.

## Health Region dumps septic systems on Town

As of August 1, Interior Health will no longer provide an inspector of septic systems.

The decision was made arbitrarily, without consultation with municipalities.

At the August 8 Town Council meeting, CAO Patrick Robins described the IH move as "ill advised".

When a permit is granted, and a system installed or altered, it must be inspected and approved. The Town has nobody qualified to do the inspection and sign the approval.

The inspector must be hired from

outside the community and the costs will be borne by the property owner.

The arbitrary downloading will affect several properties in Princeton which have septic systems.

Prior to construction of home additions, pools, garages or other outbuildings, or construction of a new home on an existing system, plans must be submitted to the building inspector for approval of the modifications.

The plans must be reviewed by a person qualified as a Private Inspector.

On November 11, 2004, RCMP were called to a local restaurant at the request of a Victims Assistant Officer. A mother was having difficulty accessing her child. The child was in the care of his father, who appeared reluctant to return the child to his mother's custody.

The RCMP officer approached the father, Glen Glowinski, who was belligerent toward the officer. Sgt. Kurt Lozinski, Officer in Charge of Princeton Detachment, attended and attempted to cool down the sit-

uation. Glowinski gave the child to the mother, but continued to be difficult. When Glowinski opened the door to his van while talking to police, Sgt. Lozinski closed it and Glowinski shoved the officer. He was arrested and charged with assault of a police officer.

Glowinski appeared in Provincial Court in Princeton on August 10, 2006. Glowinski is a 57 year old realtor who lives in Victoria, B.C.

His lawyer pointed out that Glowinski had lived 20 years in

Princeton and had a good record of contributing to the community. His lawyer argued it was really a very minor incident and asked for an absolute discharge.

Judge Hogan agreed, with the condition that Glowinski write a letter of apology to Sgt. Lozinski.

## Driver loses licence

Jacqueline Haarer was driving through Manning Park on June 8, 2006, when she was stopped by RCMP. She was under a suspension issued by the Motor Vehicle Branch and her car was impounded. Haarer had a record of traffic violations from the past.

In Provincial Court in Princeton on August 10, she was ordered to pay a \$500 fine, a \$75 victim fine surcharge and lost her licence to drive for six months.

The driving suspension did not come under the Canada Criminal Code and was handled differently from a licence suspension violation such as impaired drivers receive.

August 11, 2006.

Darren Woodward was apprehended in a routine highway check on July 23, 2005. When he was stopped, RCMP officers spoke to him. Through the open window of his vehicle, they detected the scent of marijuana. Woodward admitted to having a few marijuana cigarettes, but a subsequent search found not only the cigarettes, but a vial of hash oil, some hashish, 750 grams of marijuana in baggies, and more marijuana in Mason jars.

Woodward entered a guilty plea and said he was on his way to Calgary and was taking the drugs there to share with a friend.

Judge Hogan ordered Woodward to serve six months of house arrest with a curfew, and is not to consume any alcohol or illegal drugs, nor to attend any pub, bar or liquor store. He was issued a 10 year firearms prohibition and ordered to pay a \$600 fine.

Woodward will serve his sentence in Calgary.

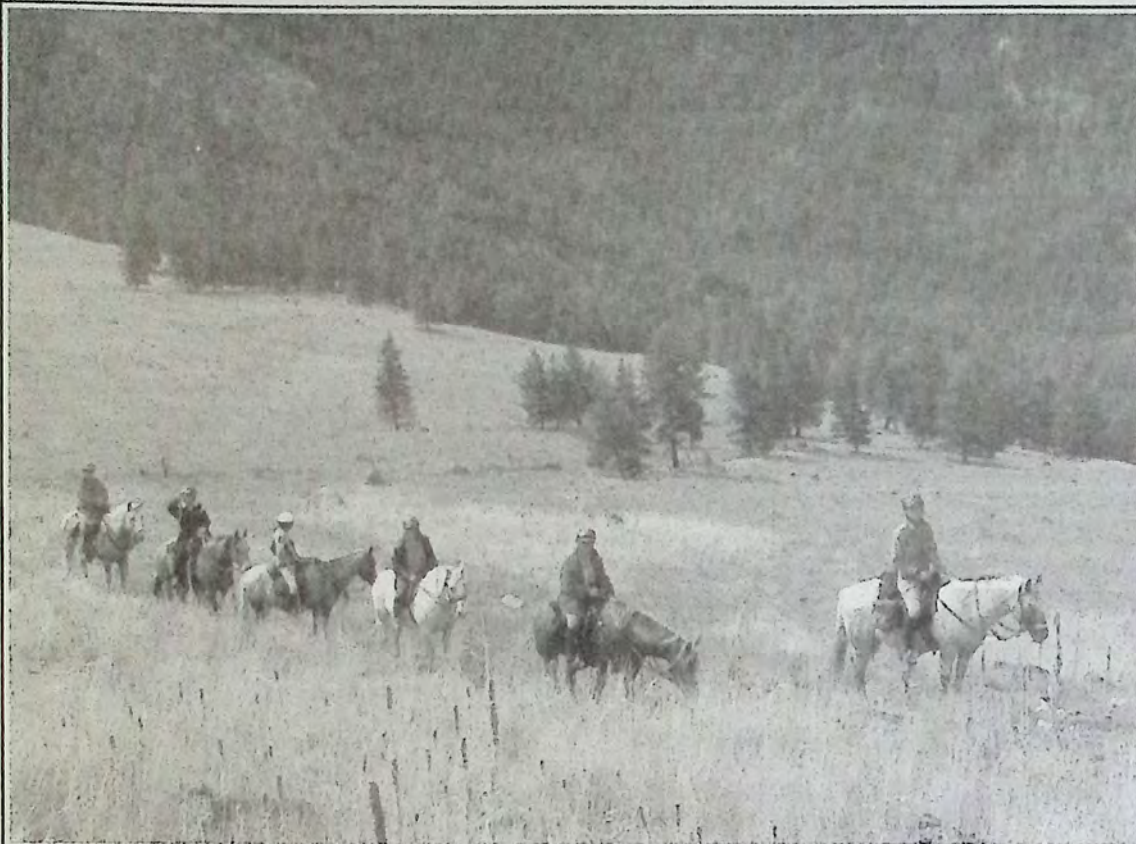

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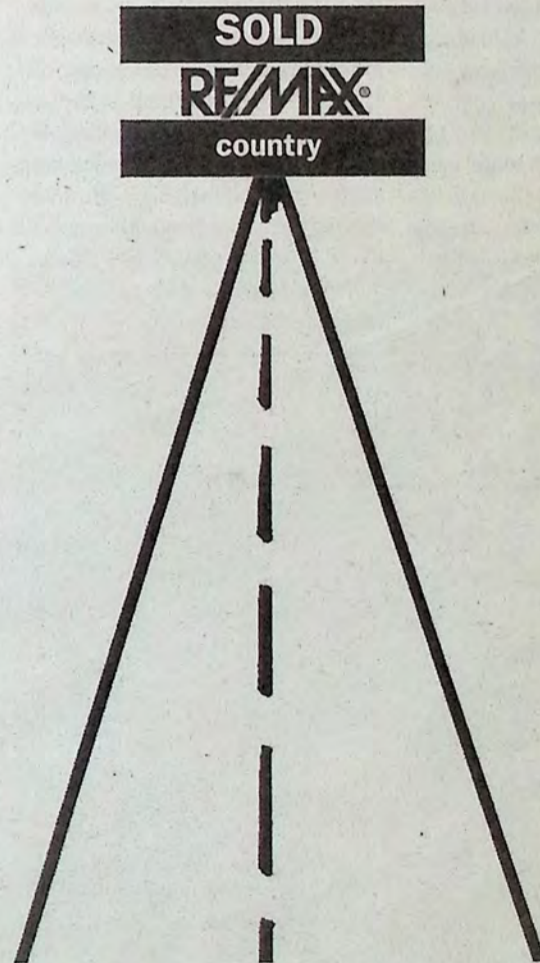
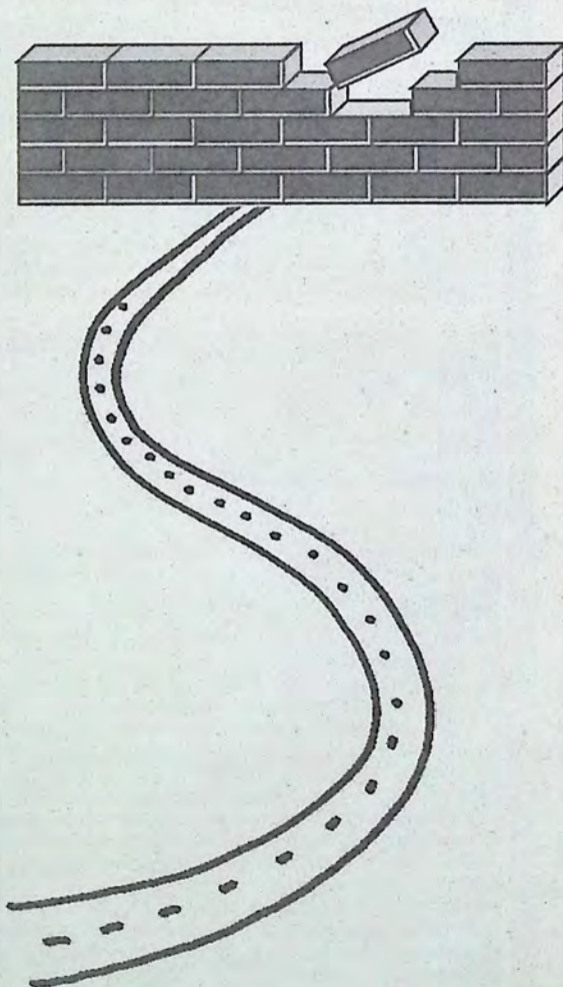


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
