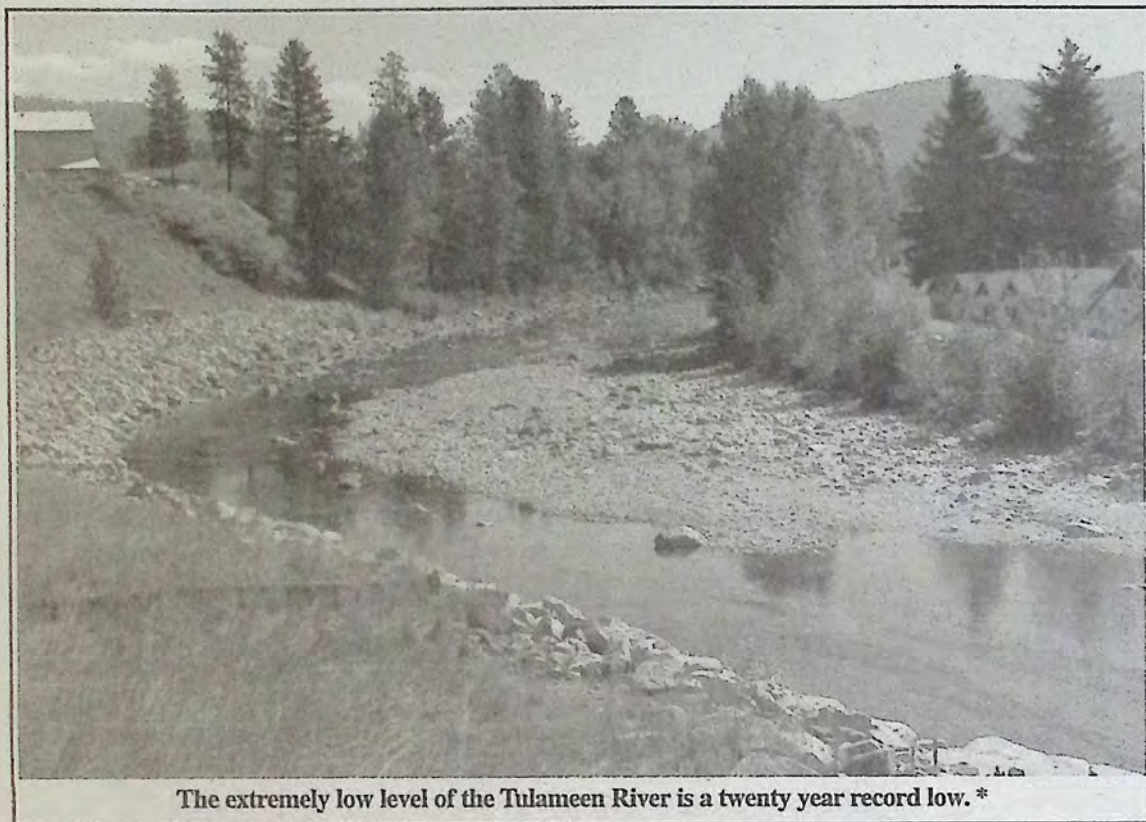

### Compliance says plan will go ahead regardless

Compliance Energy Corporation President/CEO John Tapics has reacted to comments recently made by Princeton Mayor Randy McLean concerning the company's proposed power project.

McLean has publicly stated his opposition to the 56-megawatt coal/biomass (wood residue) power generation plant.

Tapics said last week that McLean's comments won't have any affect on the company's plan to proceed with development of their project.

"Most certainly not, unfortunately Mr. McLean has his facts wrong," Tapics said from his company head office in Vancouver.

"The plant we are proposing for the Similkameen is a wood waste and coal fired power plant that will

have no harmful effect - environmental effect - on the air, water or land in the surrounding area."

The use of coal has been viewed by many who oppose the project as an outdated technology. Others have questioned emission standards focusing on issues related to mercury.

Tapics says the plant, planned to fit into existing infrastructure of the former Similco Mine site located about 15-kilometres from Princeton, is scheduled to be commissioned in July 2010 and will create between 20 and 30 full time jobs.

Compliance says the plant will utilize a solid fuel combustion, fluidized bed and power boiler with condensing steam turbo-generator.

The boiler would be fueled with a mixture of biomass and coal.

## RDOS reports toxic weed has spread locally

Recent sightings of a harmful invasive plant have caught the attention of local weed experts and have prompted quick action. Lisa Scott, Weed Coordinator for the Regional District of Okanagan-Similkameen, has confirmed the occurrence of four new patches of leafy spurge (*Euphorbia esula*) this year in the Princeton area.

Two patches occur in the Swan Lake area, while the other infestations are on road shoulders along Highway 3. While the first detection of leafy spurge in the Princeton area dates back to the early 1990's, this particular invasive plant is fairly limited in distribution with patches typically only a few meters in size.

Until recently, Princeton was thought to be the only municipality in the regional district to support this weed. However, a new

patch in the Penticton area was discovered earlier this summer.

Leafy spurge infests more than five million acres of land in the U.S. and western Canada. It reduces rangeland productivity and plant diversity, degrades wildlife habitat, displaces sensitive species and drastically reduces land values.

If not aggressively managed, this Eurasian import can dominate landscapes ranging from grasslands to riparian areas and open coniferous forests.

This deep-rooted and prolific perennial typically grows to a height of 1 meter (three feet). It reproduces by vegetative regrowth from spreading roots and by the production of large quantities of seeds that are often dispersed by birds, wildlife, humans, and in rivers and streams.

Plants are able to maintain high chain link fence 1.8 meters high to enclose the land on all sides. By the same time and date, the owner must remove all hotel rubble and bring the elevation of the land up to street level.

If the owner does not comply, the Town may do the job and bill the owner. Mayor Randy McLean commented that he had been advised there is a good possibility of dangerous contaminants in the rubble. Arrangements have been made to dispose of the rubble at an appropriate location.

root reserves through an extensive root system, ranging from a massive network of small lateral roots near the soil surface to deep, penetrating taproots that may extend to depths of 3 to 7 meters (9 to 21 feet). This ability to maintain high root reserves permits the plant to recover quickly from physical and most chemical damage.

The stems are thickly clustered and bear narrow, 2.5 to 10 cm (1 to 4 inch) long leaves that are alternately arranged along the stems. The small flowers are yellowish-green, arranged in clusters, and enclosed in yellow-green bracts. It is most easily confused with cypress spurge, also a Eurasian plant. Leafy spurge is much taller with wider leaves that aren't nearly as linear in outline as those of cypress spurge.

When damaged, the leaves and stems of leafy spurge produce a milky latex that is poisonous to some animals and can cause blistering and irritation on skin. The digestive tract is similarly affected when this plant is eaten by some animals. In cattle it causes scours and weakness, but can result in death if copious amounts are consumed.

Cattle usually refuse to eat leafy spurge unless it is a contaminant of hay or when better forage is not available.

If you suspect your property supports leafy spurge, Scott urges caution when handling the plant. "The milky latex can cause irrita-

tion, blotching, blisters, and swelling in sensitive individuals. Therefore, gloves should be worn at all times and eyes should never be rubbed until after hands are thoroughly washed."

Small patches should be carefully dug-out prior to seed production, with removal of as much of the root system as possible. The area should be seeded to perennial grasses to prevent re-establishment of the spurge.

Annual monitoring and re-treatment is imperative to ensure complete removal of the weed.

Where infestations are large, Scott indicates that biological control - the introduction of the plant's natural insect enemies - is the only long-term management strategy. A flea beetle that consumes the shoots and leaf tips of spurge has shown the greatest promise, reducing the weed's vegetative cover by as much as 95%.

The four new patches identified near Princeton this year are being addressed by the Weed Coordinator in cooperation with the provincial government agencies responsible for the manage-

ment of these lands. Residents of Princeton are encouraged to contact Scott if they know of other occurrences of leafy spurge in the area. She can be reached through the Regional District office in Penticton at (250) 492-0237.

### Town orders hotel clean-up

The official document requiring clean-up of the former Princeton Hotel site was recently approved by Town Council. With the Town Community Charter, Council is empowered to require the owner of a building to remove, demolish or bring up to standard any structure is a nuisance or creates an unsafe condition. The Town declared the hotel fire rubble to be a nuisance offensive to the community, and is a significant risk to public health and safety.

The order requires the owner to erect, by 4:30 PM September 26, a

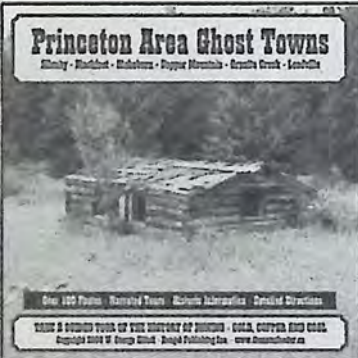

## Jones attends trade tour in China

By the time you read this Councillor Pam Jones will have already landed in China.

It's her first trip there, and the opportunity came about in an unusual manner.

The mayor of Merritt will be attending a trade tour to China and invited Princeton to send a delegate with their contingent, and Councillor Jones was picked to join the tour this week.

"I feel honoured to be asked," Jones stated.

The tour will be at no cost to the Town and the itinerary shows a very active ten days.

Following the flight to Shanghai, delegates will attend the 2nd North East China Expo on September 2nd.

The next day will see an Expo Seminar and meeting.

Delegates will then bus to Baishan for two days spent at the Mineral Water Festival, Seminar and Meeting.

Mayor Randy McLean has instructed Councillor Jones to return with a full report of trade potential for Princeton.

There will be some sightseeing, including visits to the Great Wall of China, Ming Tombs, Tiananmen Square, the Forbidden City, the Temple of Heaven and a tour of Hutong (the unique Beijing Alley).

When Jones discussed her trip at the August 21st Town Council meeting, it was suggested that she should take some of the "Princeton

The fact that organic growing does not involve pesticides or herbicides has made produce grown this way more desirable by many.

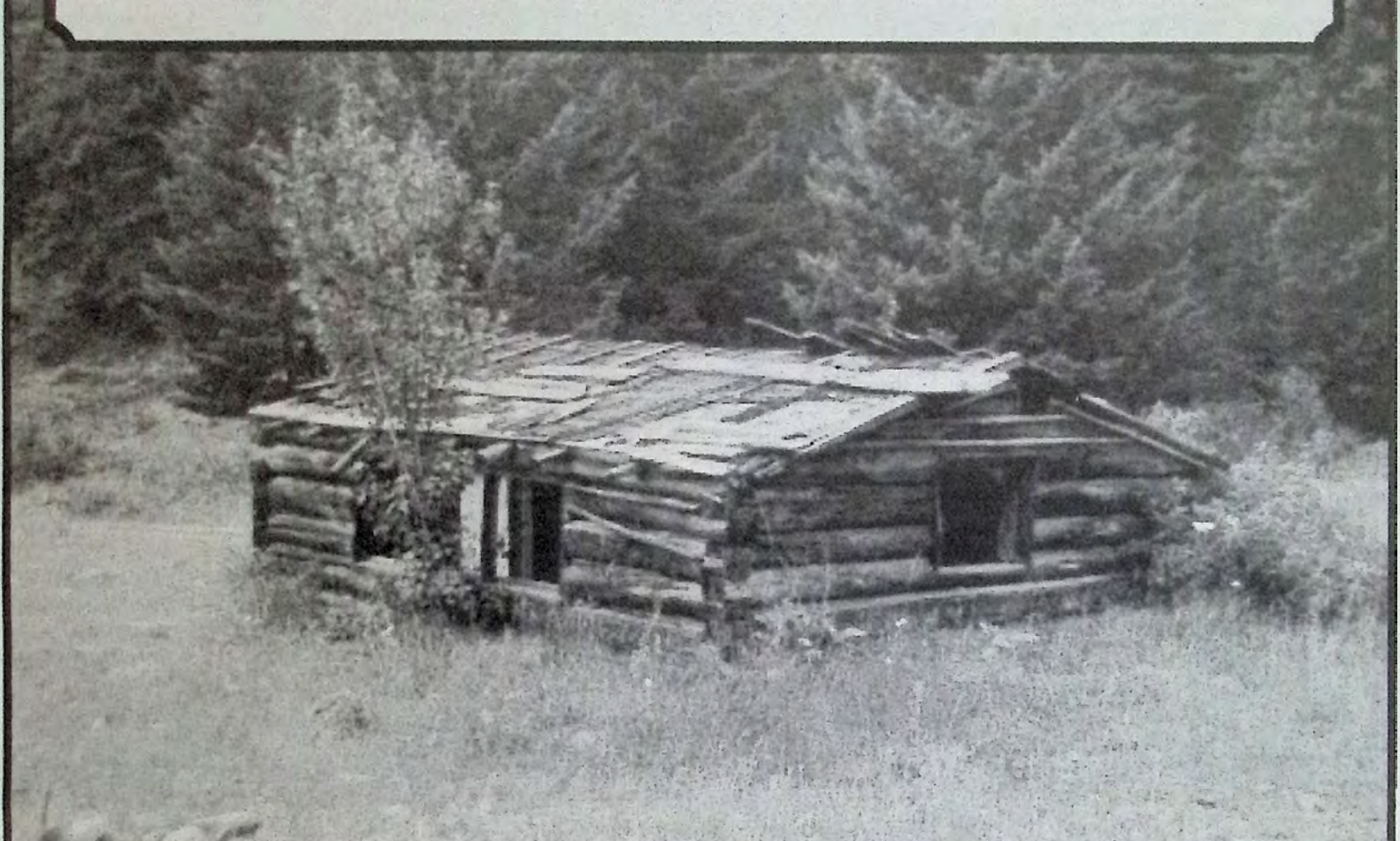

## How to make healthy fun!

(NC) - As most parents know, kids love to turn any eating occasion into an active experience. Parents usually have a "don't play with your food" rule at mealtimes, but to keep kids occupied until their next meal parents can try relaxing this rule at snack time. Let kids try their hand at constructing their own snacks. Not only will this keep them busy for a while, they are also more likely to sample whatever nutritious foods they're tinkering with.

By encouraging your child to assemble his or her own snacks, you just may be sparking a lifelong interest in cooking - or the arts! The important thing is to provide kids with choices when it comes to snacking. If all the choices are reasonably nutritious ones, then everybody's happy: kids get to choose their snacks, and parents get to ensure that they are eating healthfully.

By keeping this in mind, parents will find that it is possible to make fruits, vegetables, lean protein, low fat dairy products and whole grains appealing to kids. Here are some favorite tried and true methods for making kids shout, 'hooray for healthy foods!'

- Give kids a paper plate to use as a 'canvas' and encourage them to make 'pictures' using carrot and celery sticks, cucumber and bell pepper slices, sugar snap peas and cherry tomatoes served with a batch of nutritious hummus, bean dip or salsa.

- Set out five or six bowls containing various trail mix ingredients - a combination of nuts, fruits and cereals that can be mixed according to kids' individual tastes. Encourage kids to name their trail mix concoctions and set them up with brown bags and crayons/markers to create colourful packaging.

- Equip kids with a few slices of bread, lunchmeat and cheese, and a couple of miniature cookie cutters to make tiny, whimsically shaped sandwiches.

- Mix and match a variety of different flavours of a 100% fruit snack like Sun-Rype Fruit to Go Squiggles and encourage kids to use their imagination to come up with different uses for the funny-shaped fruit snacks (always choose 100% fruit snacks over sugar-based candy snacks).

- Use half an English muffin, a whole pita or a tortilla as a pizza crust and let kids smear on tomato sauce, sprinkle low fat mozzarella cheese, and top with chopped vegetables and a little bit of lean meat if desired. Heat for a few minutes in the toaster oven or microwave, and then cut the pizza into teeny-tiny triangles for extra kid-appeal.

- Put out a selection of melon balls, berries, pineapple chunks, and cubed peaches, pears or apples along with some frilled toothpicks or thin pretzels (for younger kids) and encourage kids to make their very own fruit kabobs.

## Is it time to clean out your medicine cabinet?

(NC) - We know we should keep medicines stored properly, but when it comes to ensuring safety and quality, vitamin and mineral supplements also need to be stored correctly. According to a recent Leger health survey, more than one in three Canadians admitted that they had not cleaned out their medicine cabinets in the last year. The good news is that the start of a new season is the perfect time to do so. And with that in mind, here are a few general tips for safely storing daily multivitamins:

1. Always keep the cap on bottles and keep vitamins at room temperature.
2. Avoid areas with high humidity, such as bathrooms.
3. Protect multivitamins from direct sunlight.
4. Read the label to make sure the expiry date hasn't passed. Expired multivitamins can lose some of their effectiveness.
5. Just as with unused or expired medicines, multivitamins should be disposed of properly by returning them to your local pharmacy for safe disposal.
6. Store multivitamins away from children.
7. Reduce clutter in your medicine cabinet. One high-quality daily multivitamin, such as Centrum, which contains the vitamins and minerals your body needs everyday, can replace individual bottles of sin-

gle supplements.

## living past 100

### Are you really obese or just plump?

A lot of obese people do not think they are obese. They believe they are just a little plump, or slightly overweight. Here's a simple method of finding out whether you fit into the obese category. Measure your waistline.

**MEN:** your waistline is located halfway between the top of your hip bone and the bottom of your rib. It is NOT necessarily located where your belt is located. Make sure you take the measurement in the right place! Yes, it must include your belly!

If you are a man of average height (5 foot 9 inches) and your waistline measures 40 inches or more, you are obese.

If you are a female of average height, and your waistline is 35 inches or more, you are obese. If you are shorter than average (less than 5 foot 5 inches) and your waistline is more than 35 inches, you are grossly obese and need to lose weight immediately. If you are a taller woman, you can add a couple of inches to your waistline before you are into obesity.

There are a few other tests you can take, especially if you are a man. If you cannot bend over and touch your toes because your belly is too large, or if your belly hangs over your belt, or if your pants are shaped like a funnel, you are obese.

For a woman, if you cannot cross your legs, you are too fat. If you want to wear shorts but they ride up because your thighs rub together, you are too fat.

#### The danger zone for fat

Where you carry your fat is highly significant. If you are shaped like a pear, with most of your fat below your waistline, your fat is not as dangerous as if you are shaped like an apple, with your fat between your breastbone and your navel. The apple shape is a heart attack waiting to happen.

People make all kinds of excuses for being obese, but very few people have a genuine medical problem that prevents them from losing weight. Most of us eat far more than we need, and we put on fat as a result. Your need for food is based on your size and your level of activity. If you are obese, chances are you are not active enough and eat too much.

Often, people believe they are eating very little, but they cannot lose weight. The answer to the weight gain problem may not be how much but rather too much of a particular food. For example, if your blood type is O, you will put on weight from meats, but if your blood type is A, you will put on weight from starchy foods such as bread, cereals and potatoes.

Regardless of blood type, if you do not burn off calories through work and exercise, you are going to have to stop eating fat-producing foods and switch to vegetables and fruit, and nothing else, and that would be most unhealthy. Exercise is the best route to good health and weight loss.

# Compliance CEO speaks out

Letter to the Editor,

I would like to respond to recent articles in the local papers from Mr. McLean regarding our proposed 56 megawatt wood waste/coal fired power plant to be located at the old Similco Minesite.

Notwithstanding the fact that Mr. McLean has spent the last eight months researching what the implications of Compliance's project would be for the Town of Princeton, he simply has the facts wrong.

In the first instance he depicts the technology that Compliance is proposing as an outdated process that burns pulverized coal. This is incorrect.

We are not proposing to build a pulverized coal plant. We are proposing to use a circulating fluidized bed boiler.

This modern clean coal technology allows for lower emissions than traditional pulverized coal technology and provides the flexibility to burn wood waste. In addition, we plan to install control equipment that will ensure that our air emissions meet or are better than the limits required by the regulating authorities.

Ash produced by combusting wood and coal will be sold for use by the cement and other industries. Any remaining ash will be either utilized in the land reclamation program at Similco or placed in a land fill and covered.

In 2005, after considerable research, the Canadian Council of Ministers of the Environment

established new limits for mercury emissions from coal fired power plants.

I am sure that they did not take their responsibility lightly and had public health at the forefront of their thinking when they established these limits. Emissions from our plant will meet or be better than these limits.

There will be no harmful effects to air, land or water from this project.

In his most recent letter to the editor, Mr. McLean indicated that a major mineral firm has announced a coal gasification project [near Chaplin, Saskatchewan] that will begin producing power in 2007. This too is incorrect. The project he is referring to, which is being developed by SaskPower and the Saskatchewan government, is actually only in a feasibility study phase.

Please refer to the SaskPower news release dated August 17, 2006 located at <http://www.gov.sk.ca/newsrel/releases/2006/08/17-605.html> to obtain the facts about this feasibility study.

While coal gasification holds some hope for future power generation in certain locations, it largely remains a demonstration technology that needs to be proven commercially and economically. SaskPower is not building a plant that will be producing power in 2007. It is studying the viability of constructing a 450 megawatt plant that will only produce 300 megawatts of power for public consumption.

The remaining 150 megawatts of power will be utilized on site to allow production and separation of carbon dioxide and compress it for injection into the oilfields in southern Saskatchewan. One hundred and fifty megawatts is sufficient power to supply a city with 120,000 people.

At this time gasification for power

generation is unfortunately very inefficient and very costly.

Even if gasification were commercially viable, it could not be utilized in a location like Princeton. Princeton does not have the geology (like the oilfields of Southern Saskatchewan) required to capture the carbon dioxide when it is pumped underground nor does it have an oil industry nor a market that is willing to purchase carbon dioxide.

In February 2006, Compliance volunteered to proceed through a full environmental assessment process.

In July, the terms of reference or table of contents for our application for an Environmental Assessment Certificate were reviewed by a Technical Working Group made up of technical experts and professionals from government.

These terms of reference were also advertised locally and available to the public for review.

The provincial Environmental Assessment Office is currently finalizing our terms of reference based on input from the public and the Technical Working Group. The target date for submission of our Application is November. The public will have an opportunity to provide additional comments on our Application at that time. All I ask is that you base your comments on fact.

I want to thank all those residents in Princeton and surrounding area who have been supportive of our project.

We will continue to develop it in an environmentally responsible manner. In the meantime, please feel free to drop by our store front office at 244 Bridge Street to share your opinions. Our staff would welcome a visit.

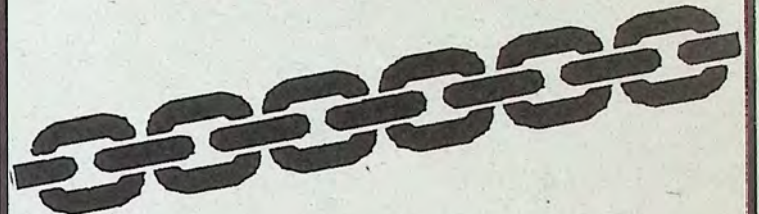

It was a windy March morning in the year 1500. The fleet of 13 ships with 1500 men onboard left our home port city of Lisbon 39°N/9°W, in the Country called (Harbor of your girl). Enjoying fair winds we paralleled the coast of Africa then put into port at The Cape Verde Islands for fresh water and supplies. 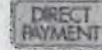

### It's a low mercury day

It's been such a long time since we took a ride in our time machine that we spent part of the weekend cleaning it up and wiping off the dust, running tests and finally firing up the plutonium reserves so we could propel ourselves into the future.

Since we hadn't used the time machine for well over a year, we only had enough plutonium for a short round trip and decided to visit the Compliance Energy Wood/Coal Generating Plant in the year 2015.

The trip was quick and smooth and the view was actually quite spectacular. Once we landed at the Compliance Generating Plant, we were stunned to learn that there had been so many changes to our home town and surrounding area.

The Similkameen was not the way we remembered it before we took off in August 2006. The forests were all dead, victims of a mutated version of the mountain pine beetle that had evolved into a bionic bug/monster that mowed down the Cascade Range as if it were someone's lawn. The hills and mountains all around the valley were bare and brown.

We were met at the Compliance Energy Gift Shop, just outside the power plant, which was not located at the former Similco Mine site, but on what was once Crown Land a short distance upstream from there. The Gift Shop carried hundreds of items, from fridge magnets to coffee mugs - all of which glowed in the dark!

Compliance had become the major employer after the forests shut down and had created a total of 450 jobs!

A large neon sign outside the plant glowed an eerie green with five foot high letters announcing "Low Mercury Day" and in smaller letters below that the statement: "Accident free for 15 days."

We also learned the energy plant was meeting most of the standards it said it would back in the planning stages in 2006 and actually exceeded a few.

The population of Princeton had ballooned to 25,000 and in 2010, instead of changing back to Vermilion Forks, then Mayor John Babiak changed the name of Princeton to Compliance.

The town (now a city) looked so very different. There were all-weather sports facilities in every neighbourhood, a community centre - complete with indoor pool - on what was once the Third Bench for 'Upper City' folks and another one where Weyerhaeuser used to be for the rest of the community. The complex included ball diamonds, soccer fields and another 19-hole golf course.

Sport fishing in Compliance (formerly Similkameen) River was attracting fishermen from around the world hoping to hook one of the famous three-eyed fresh water salmon reintroduced to the watershed in 2009 with mutations occurring every two seasons!

What we saw on the trip was far from what we had expected. We could not believe how much our valley had changed in only a few years.

We had to get back to the controversial year 2006 quickly!

### Should it be non-Compliance?

To The Editor;

It's time to give credit where credit is due. Several months ago, I challenged the Town Council and the Regional District of Okanagan-Similkameen (RDOS) to stand up for the Similkameen Valley and say 'no' to the proposed coal-fired power plant. Now, I would like to acknowledge those who have done their research and arrived at a logical conclusion. First off, Mayor Randy McLean, who just happens to be my father.

A couple weeks ago Mayor McLean wrote "I have spent the last eight months listening, reading, and researching what the implications would be for our community and our valley," concluding, "I find no fault with Compliance Coal as a company but a great deal with a provincial government that is even considering allowing outdated technology that is banned in Ontario and around North America. Burning pulverized coal produces a number of different contaminants including mercury which is of particular concern." Mayor McLean also made a passionate plea, asking "Is there anyone who would consider jeopardizing our health and the future of our children for any economic development? Can we afford to be wrong?"

Meanwhile, it seems the RDOS is poised to publicly condemn the coal-fired power plant and ask the Union of British Columbia Municipalities (UBCM) to lobby the provincial government to place a moratorium on coal-fired power. Similkameen Valley EDO

Michael McLaughlin seems to be wholeheartedly against it, and Keremeos Mayor Walter Despot has questioned the need, asking "Why are we getting into something where other jurisdictions are getting out?" In addition, two environmental organizations, Wildsight and The Pembina Institute have joined the battle, along with local activist leader Brad Hope, who has expressed concern over "the air pollutants and toxic mercury emissions from dirty coal." This group of thoughtful and committed individuals who have boldly expressed their dismay with this project deserve a lot of praise for showing leadership and vision on a very controversial issue.

Others have seen the cracks in Compliance's argument, and have started to ask how the development can be stopped. George Hanson, Similkameen Valley Planning Society Chair, recently asked Compliance Energy CEO John Tapics, "If the land isn't rezoned, will local government be respected and will the application die?" To which Mr. Tapics responded there are two obstacles to overcome, one is the Environmental Assessment Certification, and the other is rezoning. If these two obstacles cannot be overcome, Mr. Tapics admitted, the project can't proceed.

The Similkameen New Leader suggested if citizens wish to stop to the coal-fired power plant, to "Put the pressure on the Regional District to deny the rezoning application Compliance will even-

tually file. If the former Similco Mine site is not rezoned for the Compliance project, even after they pass the Environmental Assessment, the project is dead."

There is a fork in the road. On one hand, we have Compliance Energy waiting to invest capital and provide 35 new jobs. However, these economic benefits pale in comparison to the detrimental effects of mercury and other harsh emissions from coal-fired power generation. On the other hand, an exciting opportunity awaits us. Currently, the federal and provincial governments are looking at the possibility of establishing a new national park reserve in the South Okanagan - Similkameen.

A national park could provide numerous economic benefits. Parks Canada has a start-up budget of \$20 million for the proposed park as well as an annual operations and maintenance budget of \$2.4 million. In BC, for every dollar spent by Parks Canada for existing national parks, there have been over \$9 generated by visitors in direct and spin-off expenditures. Dr. John and Mary Theberge, wildlife ecologists in Oliver have written "The South Okanagan - Similkameen is a special place with a distinctive beauty. The people live here value the mountainsides of grass, park-like ponderosa forests, and alpine tundra brushes. With such ecosystem variety, no wonder the South Okanagan - Similkameen is a biodiversity hotspot."

The 6:00 o'clock news reported that the hotel in my home town of Princeton had burned to the ground. The anchor person said, A lot of history has gone up in smoke, referring to the age of the hotel and that some dignitaries had stayed there during it's heyday. His comments were not a slight exaggeration; the hotel was part of my history as well. I grew up in Princeton and the hotel was always there, I got my first haircut there from Minute Mike Beattie when I was five. I went to the restaurant run by the Corsi family, I ordered a chocolate milkshake, but I over looked the fact that I had no money, I was six. It was in that same hotel that I drank my first beer in a pub, I was underage. It was in that same pub where I was fired by Tommy Lindsay (the main bartender) from my first job as a new bartender because I was still underage. So the news anchor person was very correct when he said that a lot of history went up in smoke when the old hotel burned down. It was like erasing...DELETE.

I usually go for an early morning walk when I am in Princeton visiting my mom. I remember once when I walked across the silver bridge and up to the arena, the shop I rented from Johnny Bey for my welding business back in the early 70s, the building was gone. DELETE. Across the street was the log house we rented from George Smythe after my dad died in the late 60s, it was gone, burned to the ground. DELETE. I continued down and crossed the bridge back into town walking up Bridge Street past the old pool hall and café my mom and dad had once owned just a couple of blocks from the remains of the old hotel. Down one of the side streets from the hotel was a house we rented from Phillip Sarich, but it too was gone, DELETE.

I continued up the block and looked behind the Commerce Bank, where the old Caruso house once stood. Lots of history there, but it too was gone, a victim of another fire. DELETE. I continued my walk up to the bench by the hospital; the hospital where I was born and where my dad died thirteen years later. It too was gone. DELETE. I walked up to the second bench and then the third bench and then turned down the highway and began to walk back into town. I walked by the old school grounds, where I had started school in grade one and 12 years later stood in for my graduation picture. I had missed the last semester of school due to a Christmas party that lasted until June of the following year. I eventually graduated 14 years later, in a smoke filled room over the liquor store in Dawson City, Yukon, I finished my GED. My school was gone, it had also burned to the ground. DELETE.

I turned down Vermilion Avenue and walked by the small Pentecostal church. Every day, at least everyday that I went to school for those 12 years, I walked by this little building, on the outside above the door painted on the wall was a quote, By Grace You Are Saved By Faith, Eph. 2:8. Years ago, this is where I met Jesus and my life changed. On my walk through town that day there were many more memories that came to mind, many of which was not very proud. As I grew up, I had done many things that were wrong, I knew they were wrong when I did them, long before I went to church, and in doing some of these things I hurt quite a few people.

My wife and I walked into that little church in the 1976 and allowed God to remove all our sins. There was the original that sin that we are all born with, (a guy named Adam and his wife Eve disobeyed God in the garden of Eden, they ate some fruit they were told forbidden to eat and the apple has had a bad rap ever since). And then add to this, my own collection of sins, which were many and varied, and with one prayer of repentance, God forgave me for all my sin. DELETE. Gone! Like the buildings that were gone leaving only vacant lots to rebuild on; in an instant God had changed my life from one that was separated from Him, to one that was connected, I was, a new creation, old things have passed away and behold all things have become new, (2 Corinthians 5:17). The reason this was possible is that Jesus Christ took my sins upon Himself on the Cross. He pointed out that he did not consider the downside of the proposed cola plant to be anywhere near enough of a detriment to have me speak against it. I have received mostly positive comments on my statement, yet I am aware that there are definitely two sides to this debate.

And that is what I consider this situation we are in to be, a debate, not a controversy, not a confrontation, not a reason to think any the less of anyone for the way they feel but a debate so that the residents of this valley can educate themselves enough to make an intelligent choice.

For nearly a year this community has received presentations and information from Compliance Coal expanding on the details of their proposal, they have a man who is available nearly every day as well as a storefront

presence.

The point of my previous statement is that I have attended the presentations and had meetings with company executives, I have talked with Ministry of Environment staff, I have read endless articles on coal fired plants, talked to metallurgical engineers and discussed at great length with my fellow directors on the RDOS board. My conclusion was that this proposed technology presented more than enough dangers to my constituents to warrant a call for a more advanced process.

If you think this flies in the face of everything I represent, you're right, I am judged as a mayor by the industry we attract, as a private businessman I welcome industry, it guarantees my business more revenue, and for years I have been working with councils to build a business park that would attract industries.

THERE IS NO REASONABLE EXPLANATION FOR MY DECISION TO DEMAND A BETTER PROCESS IF IT ISN'T MY CONCERN FOR THE WELFARE OF THE PEOPLE I REPRESENT.

There is no point in including in a letter about my decision a reference to the

Greenpeace party or Dr. David Suzuki, or a supposed adversity to chopping down trees, I hunt, I fish, I drive skidoos and quads and my family made its living logging and although I admire some directions the greens are taking I am certainly not on their VIP list. 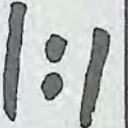

### Claiming Capital Losses On Your Income Tax

Tax Planning - Tax

If you're looking to claim capital losses on your income tax, there are some very important rules and guidelines to follow.

For example, allowable capital losses (half of the total loss) can only be used to offset taxable capital gains. If total losses for the year are greater than total gains, the excess cannot be applied against other taxable income. Net capital losses can only be applied against taxable capital gains in any of the three previous years, or they can be carried forward indefinitely. However, superficial losses and capital losses arising on transfers to a registered plan may not be applied against capital gains.

When you sell or transfer securities to your self-directed RRSP, RRIF, or a spousal RRSP, gains must be recognized, but losses are deemed to be nil. Losses incurred within a registered plan provide no benefit to you for tax purposes.

Superficial losses cannot be deducted against gains. A superficial loss occurs when securities are sold at a loss and the same or 'identical' securities are purchased during the period beginning 30 days before the sale and ending 30 days after the sale by an 'affiliated party' and that affiliated party still holds those securities 30 days after the loss.

An 'affiliate party' refers to the taxpayer, his or her spouse, or a corporation controlled directly or indirectly by the taxpayer. The denied loss is instead added to the cost base of the affiliated party.

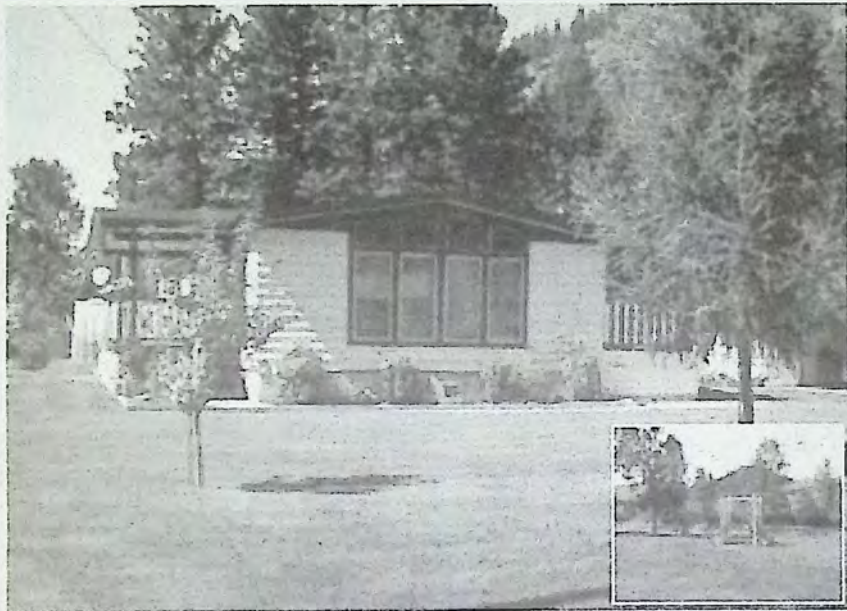
