They now have a name, after spending a considerable amount of time debating the pros and cons of a half dozen suggestions.

The second meeting last Wednesday night at Riverside Centre for the Committee designed to "tell the other side of the story" regarding the Compliance Energy proposed power plant eventually nailed a couple of key points on the agenda.

The group, now known as S.O.S. or Save the Okanagan/Similkameen, has

formed a Steering Committee made up of Brad Hope, Mary Masiel, Murv Baker and John Sandness and a Volunteer Committee of Terry Arnold, Ritta Baker and Doreen Sheaves.

The Steering Committee will be putting together a plan to present "the other side of the story" with the Volunteer Committee gathering support through a phone campaign.

The meeting, chaired by Brad Hope, attracted many more than the first meeting a week before where he explained the purpose of

the group as either "have this (the Compliance project) either stopped or a plant using the best or newest technology."

A lot of discussion from the floor revolved around fears and concerns related to emissions and established government regulations.

Two real estate agents present at the meeting explained the majority of their new clients are from the Lower Mainland who are looking to the Similkameen as a place to live because of the clean air and environment.

Hope says Compliance has not been very cooperative in at least one instance. He told the meeting that Compliance has yet to have responded with assay results from the coal being mined near Blakeburn.

"Every time we have asked, which is twenty or thirty times, it's always a week away but we haven't seen one."

The number of jobs promised by Compliance was also an issue at the meeting where one person stated, "For the sake of 35 or 70 jobs, or whatever, is it worth cont-

amination of the area?"

S. O. S. will make their first public appearance at meetings to come on November 1st (in Princeton) and November 2nd (in Keremeos) with details on times and locations to be announced.

## 2010 refuses funding local initiative

Despite earlier success with a Legacy Now grant to discover what Princeton area wants, Princeton Performing Arts will be going to the community for funding. The 2010 Legacy Now grant began a process resulting in the formation of the performing arts group, and the next step was to build the skills needed by the new group to prepare for long term stability. The application for funding went to the grant committee in June, but the committee rejected the application.

Arts Council President Dawn Johnson made the announcement at the October 18 meeting.

This setback will not stop the fledgling performing arts group. The Arts Council, the Town, and other groups and individuals

pledged money to go with the government funding, and those groups will be asked to honour their pledges.

At the same time, BC Arts Council approved grants to all local Arts Council member groups in response to the annual grant applications submitted in September. Funds will be sent next spring.

In other Arts Council matters, Arts and Culture week will be April 22 to 28, 2007. Arts Council member groups will host an Open House that week.

Vermilion Artists hosted an acrylics workshop on October 21. It will run for two sessions.

A quilting workshop for beginners will take place November 7 and 9 at Riverside Centre.

A Riverside User Group meeting

will take place November 8. Arts Council member groups are invited.

## Council tests air

Town Council has agreed to pay \$1,475 to have an air quality test done on the old fire hall next to the Legion Hall. The old building is used by Communities for Kids and by the Rifle and Revolver Club, who have a firing range at one side of the building.

Communities for Kids wants to

turn their share of the hall into a drop in centre for young parents and their children, but requested the air quality be tested before beginning the drop in centre. They are concerned that emissions from the firearms may contaminate the air in the rest of the building.

Princeton's Royal Canadian Legion is preparing for Remembrance Day services. At the October 16 Town Council meeting, Deputy Mayor Jim Manion signed a proclamation declaring November 5 to 11 "Veterans' Week" in Princeton.

Park and the Town PA system, as well as road closures for the parade and arrangements to lay wreaths.

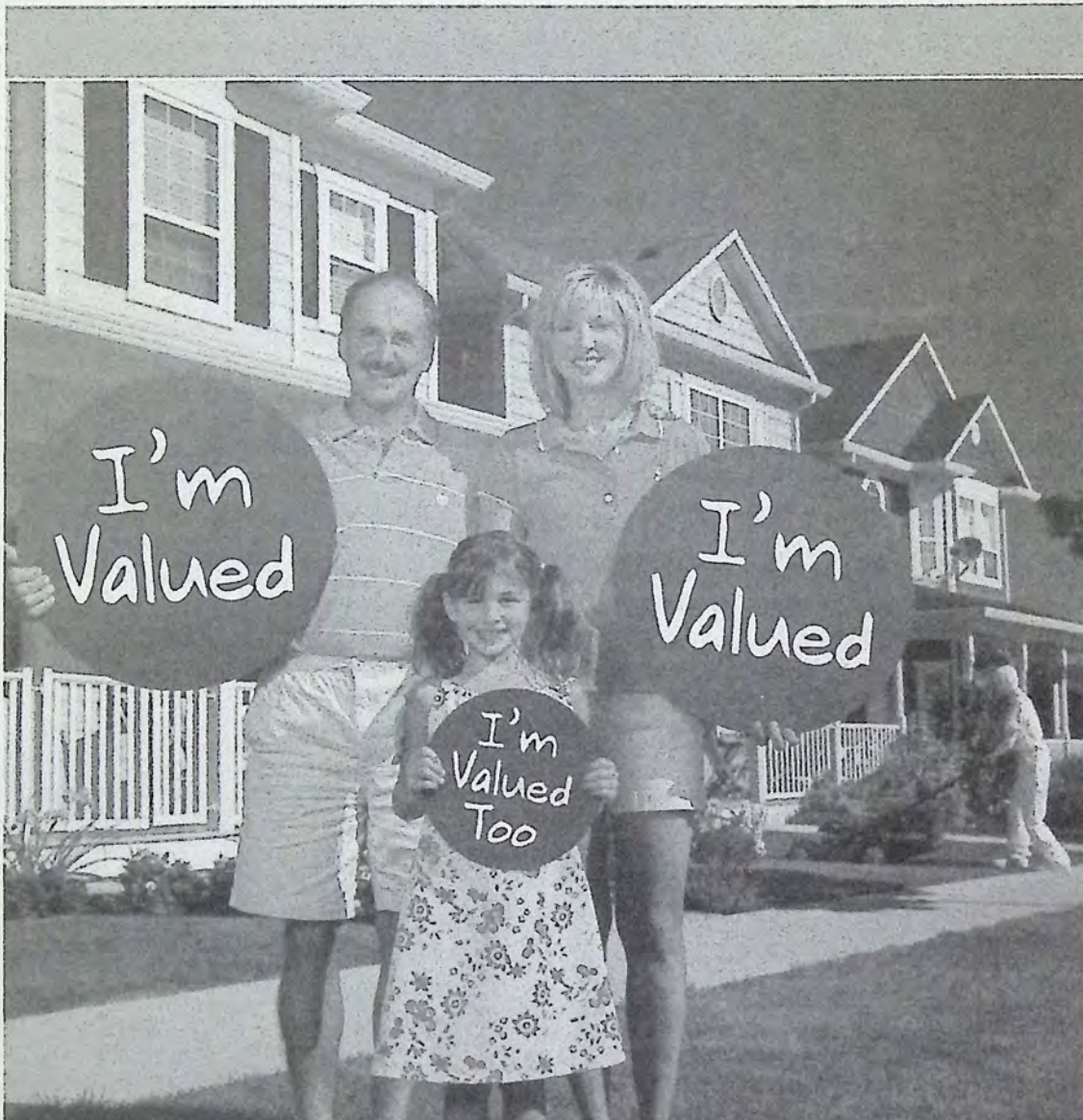

## Council backs museum funding

For the next three years, Princeton and District Museum & Archives will receive an annual \$20,000 grant to cover the cost of an operations manager. The first grant for the position came in 2006. At the October 16 Town Council meeting, Council voted to continue the grant

for three years, beginning January 1, 2007.

The Museum Society requested a large sign be erected on the museum grounds, and removal of the ore cart on Bridge Street to the museum grounds. Council agreed to both requests.

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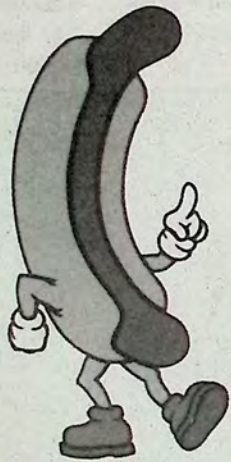

## Atamanenko calls cuts to museums 'a slap in the face'

Alex Atamanenko, Member of Parliament for BC Southern Interior - is appalled at the recent federal government cuts to the Museum Assistance Program (MAP).

"The Conservatives campaigned on a promise to support Canadian museums and have broken that promise," stated Atamanenko.

"The museums and heritage centres in the riding of BC Southern Interior play an important role contributing to local economies through tourism and culture. They should be supported, not ridiculed," said Atamanenko.

"The government has singled out the already overstretched Museums Assistance Program, cutting it by more than half to \$4.63 million, which will have an effect on local museums. This is a slap in the face to our rural communities," declared Atamanenko.

"These cuts are deep and far reaching," said Atamanenko.

"The recently opened Touchstones Museum of Art & History in Nelson was planning a big collections analysis and was hoping to tap into MAP funding. The museums in Grand Forks and Oliver were also planning to apply for funding. As part of an expansion plan for a joint under-taking for a new facility, the Trail Historical Society was

hoping to apply next year. In light of these cuts, how will this now be possible?" said Atamanenko.

"To add insult to injury, the government has also cut the Summer Career Placement Program by \$55 million, which is a critically important program to rural museums," noted Atamanenko.

"My staff has phoned many museums in the riding and are being told this cut will hit the smaller museums the hardest. The program helps understaffed museums hire students during prime summer hours," explained Atamanenko.

"These cuts will severely affect the number of hours and programs our rural museums operate. Some may even have to close for part of the summer."

Atamanenko noted that the economy will not suffer but the loss of these jobs will make even more difficult to retain young people in our rural communities.

"MAP funding hasn't been increased since the 1970s and museums are already stretched to their limits. Our local curators, museum boards and volunteers do a fantastic job of maintaining and building local collections and enriching the fabric of our Canadian and communities history and identity," observed Atamanenko.

"These cuts together, mean serious trouble. I dare any member of the Harper government to go to their local museum board and tell the volunteers and overworked staff that they are inefficient and wasteful," challenged Atamanenko.

"I will be working hard with my federal caucus colleagues to get the Conservative government to either reverse or mitigate the affects of these cuts on rural communities," concluded Atamanenko.

He urges constituents to write Minister Bev Oda with their concerns and noted that the Federal NDP Heritage Critic, Charlie Angus had a petition that could be downloaded from [www.charlieangus.ca](http://www.charlieangus.ca).

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When taking your bedtime medications, it's important to take them with a lot of water and not lie down for five minutes afterwards. It's important that the medication get right down into the stomach and not halfway down which could cause irritation and possible interruption of sleep.

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**Dispelling myths about the common cold**

(NC)-According to Health Canada, cold and flu season runs from November to April. However, many physicians report increases in visits from patients as early as October. "Many people who are experiencing cold symptoms visit their doctor's office hoping to receive a quick cure," says Toronto-based family physician Dr. Susan Brunt. "With all that we know today about the common cold, it's surprising that so many misconceptions continue to surface."

Find out the facts so that you can protect your household:

**MYTH:** Cold weather can cause a cold.

**FACT:** While the stress of being cold or wet can lower your immunity and perhaps make you more

susceptible to a cold, weather or temperature conditions alone do not cause a cold.

**MYTH:** Kissing can spread colds.

**FACT:** Very few or no cold viruses are in saliva; fluid from the nose or eyes carries the virus.

**MYTH:** I should avoid showering if I have a cold.

**FACT:** A warm shower can actually help dissolve mucus in the upper and lower airways.

**MYTH:** Antibiotics can help cure a cold.

**FACT:** Antibiotics are only effective against bacterial infections, not viral infections. Therefore, they can't 'cure' a cold or flu.

**MYTH:** Cleaning surfaces with soap and water is enough to kill germs and viruses.

**FACT:** Cleaning with soap and

water only removes dirt. Using a disinfectant like Lysol Disinfectant Spray can kill 99.9% of germs as well as the flu virus and the Rhinovirus - the leading cause of the common cold.

Most healthy adults with a cold will be able to infect others one day before symptoms develop and up to five days after becoming sick, so remember to cover your mouth and nose when coughing or sneezing to protect those around you. "Cold and flu viruses can live on surfaces for up to 48 hours, so adding surface disinfection to your regular hygiene program is a great step towards prevention," adds Dr. Brunt.

**Bug busters: Getting results from head lice treatments**

(NC)-The picture that comes to mind when the words 'head lice' are uttered is undeniably creepy - crawling, pesky bugs invading the heads of innocent children. Despite this, a recent Decima Research survey of more than 1,000 Canadian parents found that nearly 70 per cent were not aware that common medicated head lice treatments they have used on themselves or their children are insecticide-based.

"People don't seem to understand most traditional medicated topical treatments include insecticides," said Denis Villeneuve, a pharmacist in Quebec City. "The survey results also show that 90 per cent of respondents would prefer to use a non-insecticide product if it was as effective or more effective than current alternatives."

According to the Canadian Paediatric Society, while absorption is minimal, small amounts of insecticide can be absorbed through the skin on the scalp during treatment, so care should be taken to avoid unnecessary exposure, and, where indicated, to minimize skin contact beyond the scalp.

After years of relying on insecticide-based treatment, parents this year will have a new option.

Called Resultz, it is an effective head lice treatment that does not contain traditional insecticides, and is colorless and odorless. With an active ingredient commonly found in many day-to-day cosmetics, Resultz works by dissolving the wax that covers the outside of head lice, which dehydrates the lice and causes them to die.

"In clinical studies, Resultz has proven to be a highly effective option to use in getting rid of head lice," says Dr. Nalini Kaul, a Winnipeg-based clinical researcher. "It is colorless and odorless, easy to apply and works well. With resistance to head lice treatments reported around the world, it is important to have a new option. Resultz acts by a mechanical process, therefore lice are unlikely to develop resistance."

Resistance means that, through genetic mutation, the lice have found a way to survive a treatment that was formerly effective. In fact, head lice resistance to insecticides is a worldwide phenomenon. Closest to home in the United States, head lice have developed the ability to survive treatment with older, over-the-counter topical treatments containing the active ingredient permethrin. Resistance to treatments based on other topical insecticides - pyrethrin and lindane - is also documented abroad.

"I look at it this way - people have been making the switch to pesticide-free lawn care over the past several years," said Ann Douglas, one of Canada's leading parenting authors and a mother of four. "For parents, considering if a head lice treatment is based on an insecticide or not may be even more of a consideration."

**This is the season for flu**

Late autumn in Canada marks the beginning of flu season. Older people dread this time of year, as older folks tend to be hit harder by the flu virus. Here are some steps you can take to avoid a really bad case of flu.

First, **take your Vitamin C** morning, noon and night. Vitamin C keeps viruses under control. You may encounter the flu virus anywhere, but if you are well fortified with Vitamin C, you could fight the virus at first contact. Second, make sure you have plenty of real aspirin on hand, if you are able to take this medicine. Better known as ASA, **this medicine is hell on wheels** in combatting a virus infection. If you feel a cold coming on, take the aspirin with coffee to enhance the action of the aspirin.

Third, **take your Vitamin D** (cod liver or halibut liver oil) every day. Make sure you are replacing sunshine with this vitamin.

Fourth, **clean your house** well with any household disinfectant, and clean it frequently. Door knobs, faucet handles and flush handles should be cleaned often. This advice goes along with the importance of washing your hands frequently.

Finally, **keep blueberries in your freezer**. When you feel flu or cold symptoms coming on, take a cup of frozen blueberries, put them in the blender with a little hot water, blend, and drink. Repeat three times a day. Blueberries are an important way to fight flu in Sweden, where blueberry juice is sold for that purpose.

## Rubble removal hits snag

First, it was the failure of the insurance company to begin the clean-up after the Princeton Hotel fire. Town Council set a September 26 deadline, after which the Town would begin to clear the site. Now, nobody can say when the Town can go ahead with removal of the rubble.

"We have a number of different hoops to jump through," said Deputy Mayor Jim Manion at the October 16 Town Council meeting. "We started to do the job, but we got a complaint."

Town Council is frustrated by the delays in removing the rubble. The most recent stumbling block is the need for an environmental assessment.

The assessment is required to discover whether there are contaminants such as asbestos and chemicals in the rubble.

Council has had to deal with two different environmental monitoring agencies with different criteria. This has caused another delay in eradicating the downtown eyesore.

## Posse weathers the Storm

Princeton Posse played host to Kamloops Storm last Friday night in what will likely be remembered as a benchmark in Posse history.

It took 44-minutes and 59-seconds before either team managed to break the scoreless tie they started with.

It's hard to say why the game remained scoreless after two periods. It may have been because the Posse was playing a so-so game, or that Kamloops was on an off night or that the league was testing more new officials.

Both teams were making plays and shooting pucks but when the shots on goal are of the solid 'right on the numbers' variety that gets the job done in the CFL, it doesn't work on scoring goals when the pesky goalie keeps getting in the way.

Add to that the odd nose-thumbing hand signal Kamloops Coach Bryant Perrier would fire off to his goalie every now and again and the scoreless first two periods make slightly more sense.

It wasn't until 12:17 of the second period that many of the fans realized there was a hockey game going on in Princeton Arena. That was when Anthony Leardo was given a 2-minute charging penalty. The crowd erupted in a chorus of boo's. Probably because the call came on the heels of some heavy pressure on the Posse net where Kamloops wrestled with the little black thing and Princeton's goalie Tanner Sheridan conducted a short clinic on how to save pucks and keep that little black thing out of the net and under control.

With 5:16 left in the period The Storm's team captain Jacob Young tripped Princeton's Kyle L'Arrivee at centre ice. The crowd voiced their displeasure with the stunt which was followed by L'Arrivee getting cross-checked from behind by the Storm's Justin Giroyx.

The officials took a few moments to sort things out and eventually issued Young 2-minutes for tripping and Giroyx a 10-minute misconduct. The fans were still not happy, but the misconduct helped calm them down a bit.

With three minutes left in the period Princeton came alive and pelted the Storm goalie with shot after shot but by the time the clock ran out, the game was still scoreless.

The third period was when the game actually started as both teams played reasonably good hockey. It was interesting to note that when the Posse gels, it's magical. There was only a little magic in this game, but when it appeared, it was spectacular.

The scoreless tie was broken at 4:59 by Kamloops when Posse net-minder Tanner Sheridan was beat on the stick side.

Another cheap shot from behind sent the Storm's Justin Giroyx to the showers with a game misconduct which pleased the crowd.

Princeton tied the game at 10:36 after three players in front of the Storm goal kept slapping at rebounds until one went in.

The goal was credited to Liam Darragh with assists from Alex Young and Brandon Spiller.

Princeton's go ahead goal came at 15:22 when Brett Van Ripper took the rebound from in front of the goal and flipped it over the Storm goalie. Assists went to Drew Knowles and Sean Carr.

A shoving match in front of the Posse goal with 4:14 to play saw Princeton goalie Tanner Sheridan defend his territory.

One Kamloops player was called for slashing while Sheridan was assessed 5-minutes for roughing and a game misconduct which sent him out of the game.

The crowd was not happy although Princeton kept the puck in play for the rest of the period and preserved the 2-1 win.

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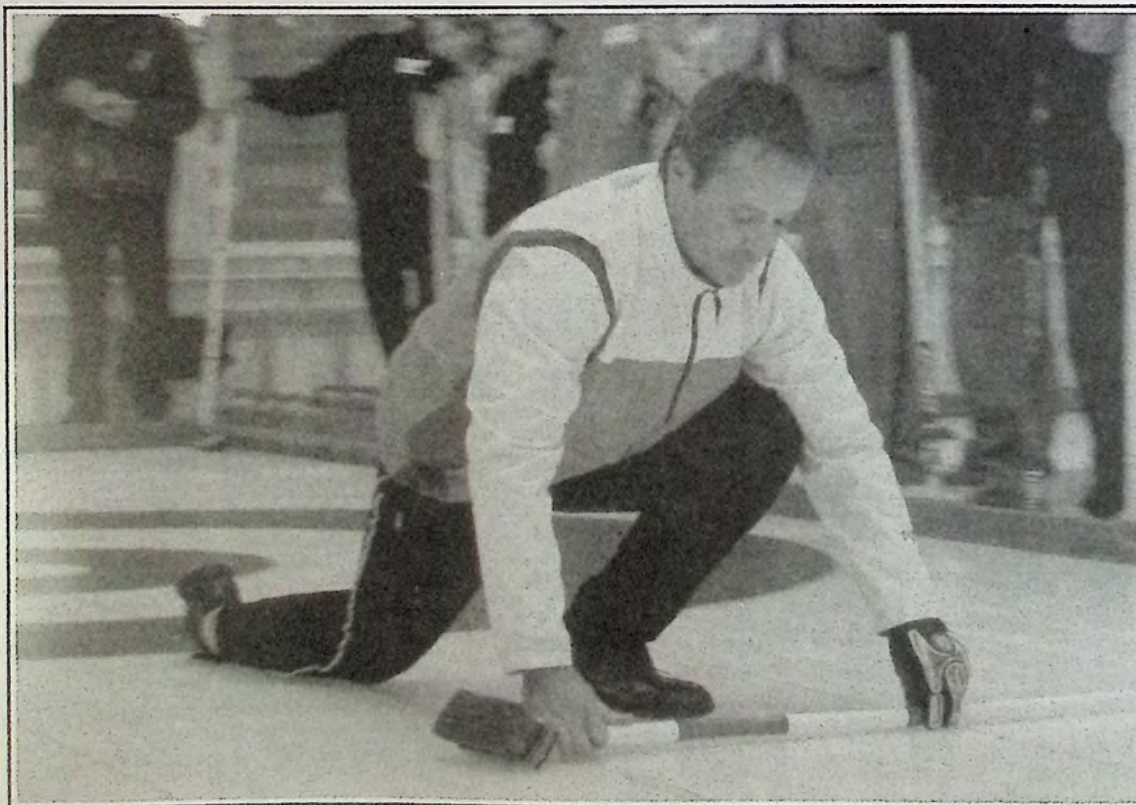

### Turkey, Broccoli and Rice Bake

- 1 cup/250 mL fresh broccoli, chopped

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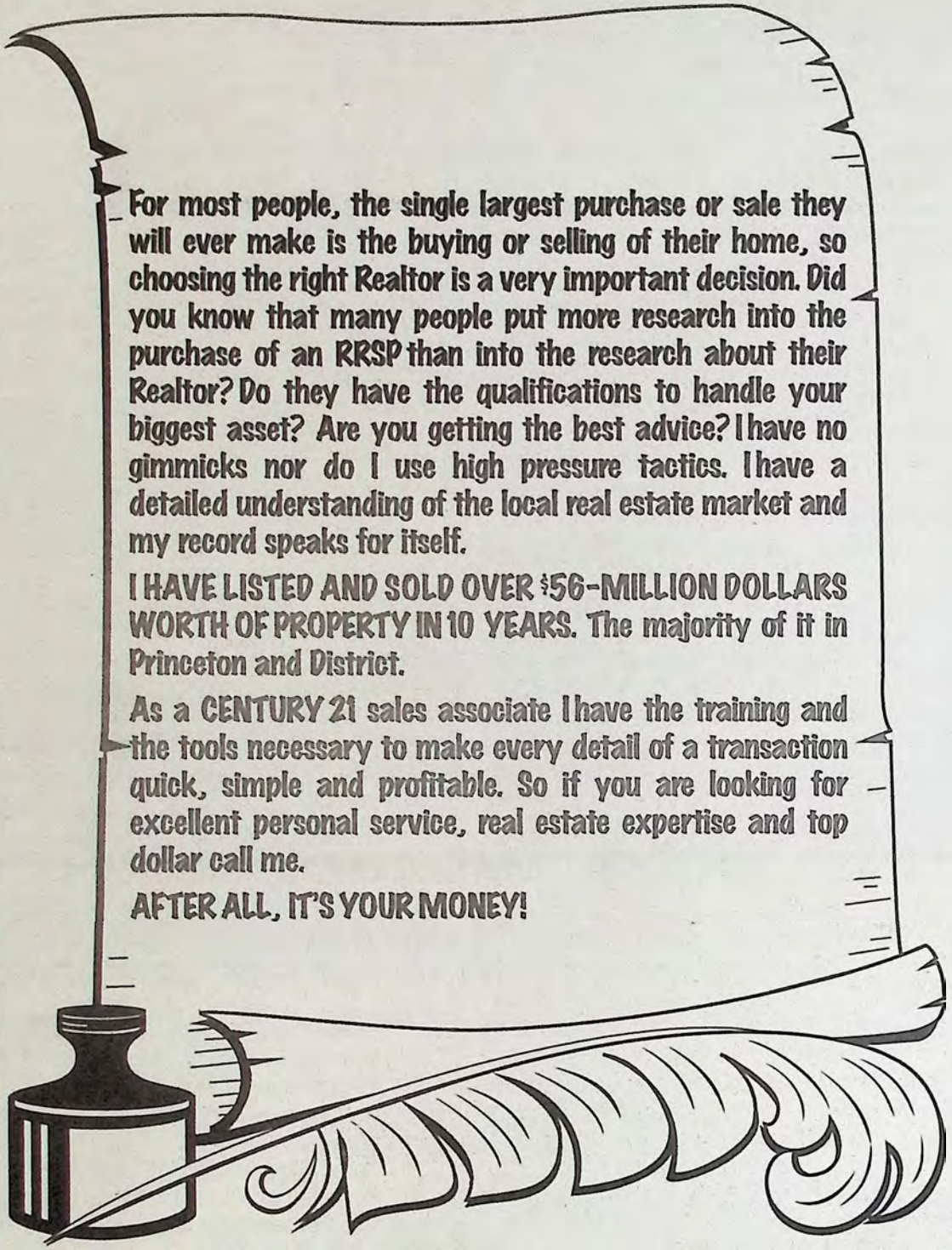

We left England on April fool's day 1791 in two vessels: Discovery about 340 tons and the smaller Chatham, carrying 180 souls in all. Many of us were experienced seamen but had little idea of the distances we would have to sail. South we headed down the coast of Africa and east around the Cape of Good Hope then due east for many weeks to the southwest coast of Australia. Here we explored and mapped before continuing south east onto New Zealand and further east across the Pacific. It was a full year before we made landfall in California and proceeded north up the coast mapping the gaps in Captain Cook's original charts that he had been unable to complete because of the ferocious on shore storms. We entered the Strait of Juan de Fuca in June 1792 at (point- overpraise) and started extensive and detailed explorations by anchoring the large ships in a bay as the center point and sailing out in small boats along each shore following and charting its course. Some such ventures like (flat faced dog-et) Sound and Burrard Inlet took many weeks away from the main ship. We camped on shore at night often meeting generally friendly natives with huge long dug out canoes. In this manner, over 3 years, much of the north west of the continent was mapped and named all the way north to the Cook Inlet near (ship's metal hook-uld) Alaska. The Inside passage was charted from (sweet wine-robust) to Prince Rupert and (van- roof - u) Island was determined to be an Island with a land area as big as Belgium. When the weather forced us south we wintered in Hawaii and the Captain became very friendly with many chiefs. In the winter of 1794 he persuaded several to cede their lands to Great Britain. We returned home via Cape Horn completing our world circumnavigation in October 1795 with only 5 men lost.

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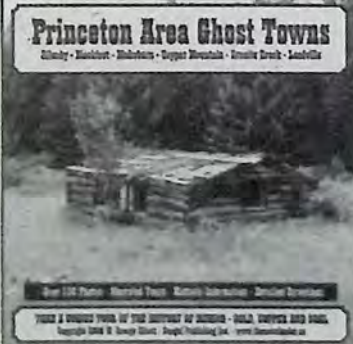

## What was government thinking?

The Arar case has raised a lot of questions about how our government and our security people handle Canadian citizens in a crisis. Maher Arar, and others, were sent to a foreign country where they were tortured. These Canadians had done nothing wrong, they were simply of the wrong ethnic origins after the attack on the World Trade Towers.

When the Arar case first hit the news, I asked, "How dare the Americans send a Canadian anywhere but to Canada?"

Now we know our own government agencies had a hand in sending people to be tortured and mistreated, and I believe every Canadian citizen should be angry at such persecution of citizens. The proper role of our agencies should be the protection of ALL Canadians at ALL times. We have a justice system to address wrongs done by citizens, but it proceeds on solid evidence, not ethnic origin, or so we expect.

Our system of citizen's rights is based on our ideas of the freedom of the individual to live in peace in a lawful environment. There are enough crooks around to prey on law-abiding citizens without government "security" agencies, or foreign governments, adding to the problem.

The Arar case is a clear lesson in what prejudice is all about. The word "prejudice" means to pre-judge another person without reasonable grounds. Arar was pre-judged due to ethnic origin, while his actual citizenship was ignored.

I might point out that there is a certain prejudice in a certain foreign nation about Canadian citizenship.

They believe anybody can be a Canadian citizen at the drop of a hat, and therefore all of us are suspect.

Many people have experienced prejudice on a day to day basis, either because they are of a certain skin colour, a certain religion or even because they are poor. This kind of prejudice is so ordinary we tend to ignore it, but it is at the root of miscarriages of

justice such as the Arar case.

First Nations people have experienced extreme prejudice from government agencies and they can tell you this is nothing new. It is a wrong that has continued far too long.

We pay the RCMP and CSIS to protect Canadian citizens, not to persecute them. I believe those two agencies must be held accountable when Canadian citizens are summarily deported for torture in a foreign country. If they are not held accountable, then every one of us is at risk.

Imagine attempting to cross the border to go to Washington and being arrested and shipped to Syria for "questioning". Would you expect your government to

take immediate action to bring you home? Of course. You would not expect your government to say it was all right, but it appears that is what happened to Arar and others.

I will not go so far as to condemn the entire system that allowed this to happen. There is another side to it: we have a mechanism in our system to hold the system accountable when it goes haywire. We can try to right the wrong. This is part of what makes us different from other systems. In some countries, the police and security forces do as they please without any restrictions, and without any need to account for the innocent people they harm.

## Running For Your Life.

It was January. I was feeling like I needed to find a way to redeem myself from the sin of gluttony during the Christmas season. I used to run in my younger years, of course it was for survival and at that time and fear was the motivator. I am much older now and there is a lot more of me to propel down the road and so I knew I needed to have some help. I signed up with a local gym, paid my money and met with my trainer. I told her that I used to run, she probably thought, sure and we used to have clean air long ago too. She was very helpful and started me on a program.

The program included exercise and a regular disciplined routine. These were of the very issues that caused me to leave running those many eons ago. I am great at starting things, in my youth, then it was mostly fights and fires, but today it seems to be in every part of my life. I did agree to the program and began walking and running and strength training and we set a goal. I would enter the Times Colonist 10 K run in Victoria, at the end of April, a short three months away. I settled into my routine and was doing well for the first month, and then I began to find other things to do instead of walking and running and strength training. These other things included; eating, sleeping and reading, none of which helped with my program.

I am so thankful for the two internal motivators that most of us have within us, guilt and shame. I would feel both of these and I would get my runners on and go for a walk or drop into the gym and surprisingly I would feel better after the exercise. I maintained this rugged routine until the end of April. Finally the day arrived; my wife and I booked a hotel in Victoria, for the night before the race day and for a couple of days after. I thought I would need a place to convalesce after running the 10 K.

The night before the big day we had to pick up our race packets. I went and received a T-Shirt, a map and some instructions for the race and a computer tracking device that I was to clip to my shoe. I forgot to tell you I had to buy new running shorts, (new to me because I never had running shorts before) and new running shoes. These running shoes were not like the canvas runners that I used to buy for three dollars a pair when I was a kid, no sir, these were computer designed running shoes and cost almost as much as my new Honda. When I finally found the pair I liked, (they felt like slippers when I put them on), I knew I could do the race with these super shoes. I signed the mortgage papers for the shoes and left the store. Back to the race packet. The tracking device would indicate when I crossed the start line and when I crossed the finished line. When they gave me my tracking device, they said, (speaking very loudly and slowly moving their lips as if I were old or hard of hearing) there was a little button on the device I could activate, in case I fell and couldn't get up.

Race day came and I had thought of many good reasons to cancel. Things like, maybe I have the measles, or someone in the crowd might have a cold or no one would miss me if I didn't show up. But, I got up, got dressed, put my new shoes on and had a coffee with my wife. I walked to the holding area for the 8,000 plus runners and found my place, it was in the 70 minutes and more group. I was happy they never put the actual time it would take me to complete this run. I stood in the crowd and thought, if I place Velcro all over my body, I could just get in the middle of the crowd and someone would be sure to bump into me and then I would be taken around the whole course attached to them.

I started off and crossed the start line. I never experienced shin splints that painful and with such a quick onset in my life. The mortgaged shoes now felt like ski boots and the crowd was moving forward like a subway train unloading in Moscow, everyone heading in one direction and trying to pass everyone in front of them. I watched as moms with kids in strollers passed me. I thought, just 9.8 kms more to go. It was about the 4 or 5 km when the pain went away from my legs and I actually began to enjoy the race. I kept an eye out for the paramedics, I wasn't sure if I was watching them or they were watching me, hoping I might add to their call volume this year. About the 6 km, I began to run, not far mind you, but I did run and the ski boots were no longer attached to my feet, the slippers had returned. The rest of the race went well, I was excited at the finish line, I had made it. Just as I crossed the line, my name was called out and the medi-vac helicopter that had been tracking me flew off in another direction. I had completed the course, run the race. My time was 94 minutes and 14 seconds; I came in 6,641st out of 8,162 participants. I was pumped.

Life is a race. The Apostle Paul likens it to an Olympic athlete in training. You've all been to the stadium and seen the athletes race. Everyone runs; one wins. Run to win. All good athletes train hard. They do it for a gold medal that tarnishes and fades. You're after one that's gold eternally. (1 Corinthians 9:24-25). I never won first place in the Times-Colonist 10K, for me to finish the race was to win. In life, to finish well, you need a good trainer. I had a great trainer for my TC 10K run. But, my life Trainer is Jesus Christ and I am excited knowing that when I set over that line between life and death, the finish line for all of us, I will hear my name called out one more time. Think about it, everyone will cross that line, who is your life Trainer?

# Reader discusses school fees

Re: School Fee Confusion - Easy Solution

The B.C. Supreme Court, in a landmark decision on September 29, struck down the widespread practice of charging fees for the official education program in B.C. schools.

Since the decision, there has been widespread confusion about 'school fees' and fear that the court's decision will harm our children's education due to the loss of these revenues. As a lifelong educator, and the person who brought this court action against this discriminatory and illegal policy of charging fees, I want to clear up the confusion and fear.

The court's decision is simple: anything and everything that is required for any children's course (including electives), between Kindergarten and Grade 12, is free. So there can be no course fees, no instrument rentals, and no charges for calculators, text books, equipment, necessary materials, etc.

As well, if something is not required for course completion, or if it is for an extra curricular activity, students cannot be required to participate or pay a fee. Any charge requested to participate in such optional activities penalizes economically disadvantaged children and these fees should also be immediately discontinued, on moral grounds.

The B.C. government is riding a one billion dollar surplus and can easily afford to increase the Ministry of Education's budget by one percent to make up the school fees shortfall.

This simple 1% solution would compensate for all lost and illegal school fees.

Let us all call on the Premier and Minister of Education to uphold the quality of our children's education

with the "One Percent Solution" so our kids do not suffer because the illegal practice of charging fees has been stopped.

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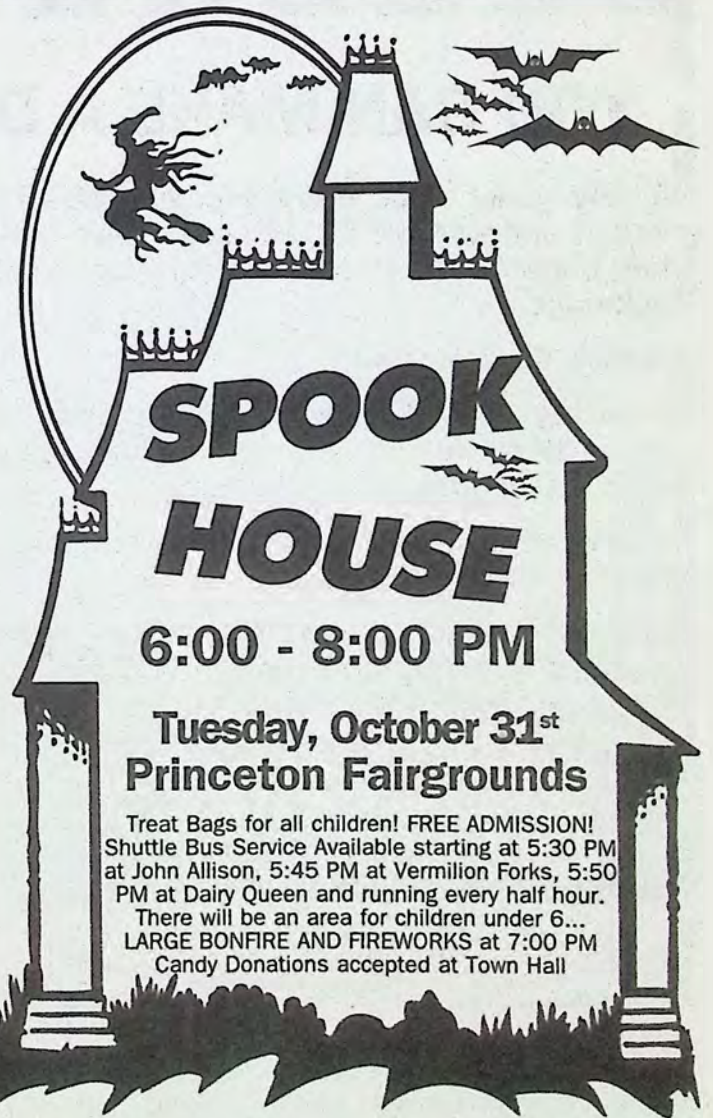

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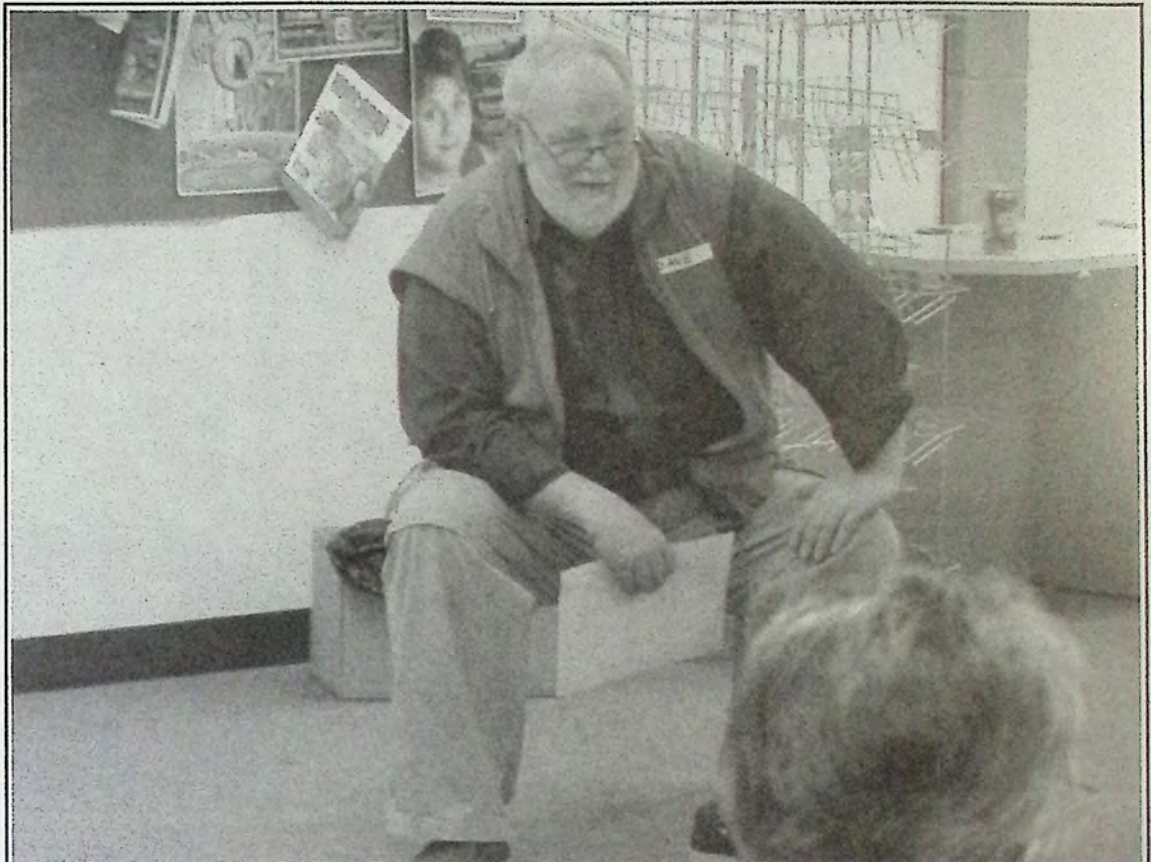

At the Open House on November 2nd, the public will have a chance to review the preliminary concept

plans and comment on how they might be enhanced, refined or changed. The concept plans are preliminary plans only and have been prepared for the Open House.

Please drop by the Riverside Wellness Centre between 4:00 PM and 7:00 PM and discuss ideas with fellow residents and provide feedback to the preliminary plans. Town Council, staff and consultants will be there to answer your questions.

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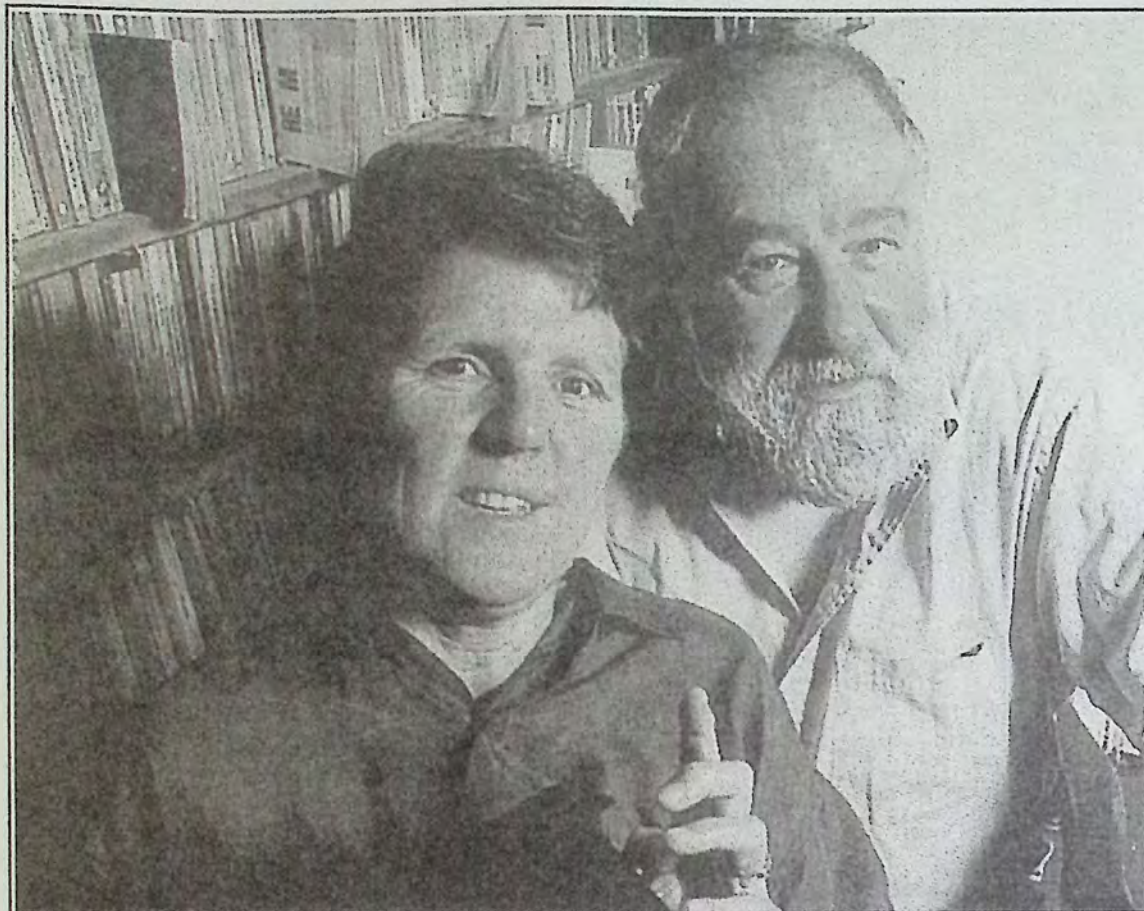

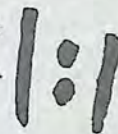

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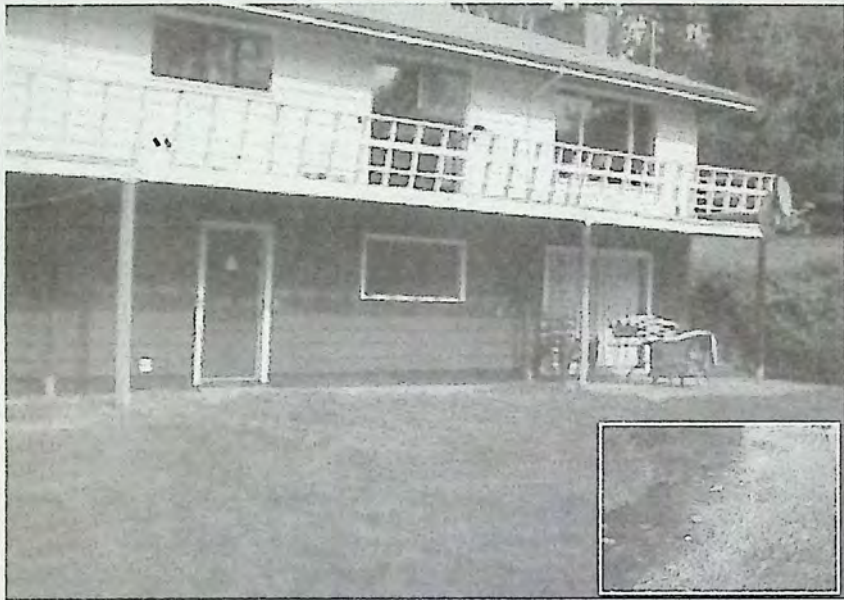
