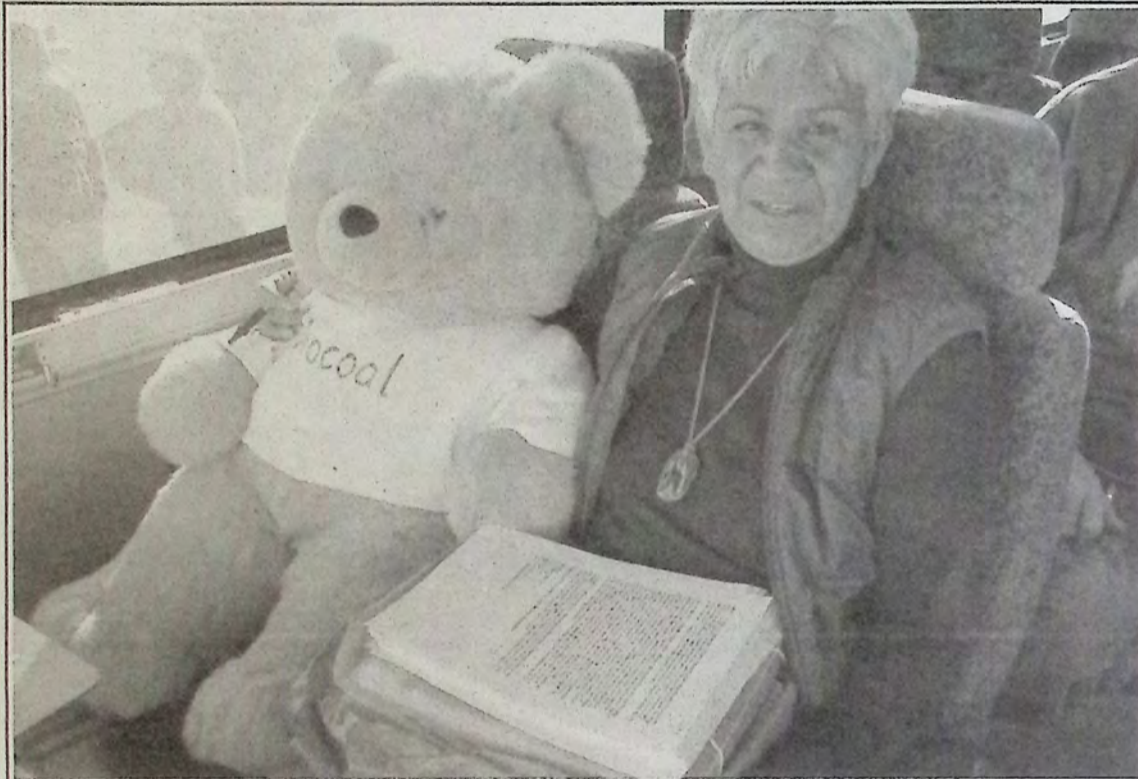

Power plant protest campaign hits Chilliwack

A total of 42 members of Friends of the Similkameen (based in Keremeos) and Save the Okanagan Similkameen (based in Princeton) filled a bus that left Princeton Arena last Thursday afternoon for a scheduled stop at the Chilliwack Constituency office of Environment Minister Barry Penner.

Armed with 1,043 letters of opposition from the Cawston/Keremeos area and an additional 1,700 letters from Princeton and other parts of the province, the group arrived at Penner's office around 3:00 PM to find the doors locked tight.

The News Leader's Brenda Engel reported from the scene, "There's a sign on the door that says 'MLA working in Victoria today.' I tried the door. There's nobody around,

it's locked up tight."

A stage and sound system set up outside Penner's office allowed the bus load to read some of the letters and they were joined by a variety of interested groups in the Chilliwack area supporting the efforts of the Similkameen organizations.

Media outlets from Chilliwack, the Lower Mainland as well as regional and national networks were also on site.

Yale-Lillooet MLA Harry Lali told the News Leader later that afternoon that he was invited but could not attend as he was also in Victoria but stated he fully supports the SOS and Friends of the Similkameen in their fight against coal-fired power generation not only in the valley but in BC as well.

Trio says Alberta's coal plants look good

On November 16, Councillors Ray Jarvis, Pam Jones and Maria Sadegur travelled to Alberta on a fact-finding tour, visiting coal fired power plants. Compliance Energy footed the bill for 14 people seeking information about coal fired electricity generation.

The group saw four plants: Wabamun, Keep Hills, Sundance and Genesse, all of which are located in prime agricultural land and a provincial park.

Wabamun Provincial Park, which includes Wabamun Lake, borders two of the power plants. This is a great sport fishing and bird watch-

ing area. An 18 hole golf course is near the Sundance plant.

Wabamun power plant is the oldest, producing 300 megawatts. Keep Hills produces 800 megawatts, Sundance produces 2,100 megawatts and Genesse produces 1,300 megawatts. Together, they burn 19 million tonnes of coal per year.

Councillor Jones, who gave the report, said the Genesse plant has a bag house to catch particulate matter and a lime process to control sulphur emissions, both of which are planned for the Compliance Energy plant proposed for the

Similkameen Valley. The Alberta coal used is lower quality than will be used by Compliance.

Councillor Jones added that the communities near the power plants experienced increased economic growth with the development of the power plants. Alberta intends to keep three of the plants in operation for the next 40 years.

Wabamun plant, built in 1956, is scheduled for closure in 2010, due to its age. Genesse is a new plant, built in 2005, and has no smoke going up the flue.

State of the art technology removes 99.9 percent of particu-

late matter. Desulphurization prevents sulphur dioxide from reaching the atmosphere, and carbon dioxide emissions are reduced to 52 percent of standard coal-fired plants. This is the technology Compliance Energy plans to use in Princeton.

Councillor Jones commented on the fact that the Alberta plants produce 4,000 megawatts with no visible environmental impact, and the Princeton plant would be much smaller, producing only 56 megawatts.

Councillors Jones, Sadegur and Jarvis have documents available to

any citizen wishing to review the information themselves, and will be glad to share their experience with any group interested in hearing about the Alberta plants.

Lali slams Environment Minister's answer

Yale-Lillooet MLA Harry Lali accused Environment Minister Barry Penner last week of hypocrisy and misrepresentation for the way he answered a question in the Legislature about a proposed coal-fired energy plant near Princeton.

"I asked Minister Penner why he is supporting dirty coal plants in Princeton while he opposed such plants in his own region," said Lali.

"I also reminded the Minister that the B.C. Liberal Party had received over \$700,000 in donations from the coal industry in the recent past. Mr. Penner's response was to stand up and partially quote from a letter I wrote which he falsely claimed demonstrated my

past support for the proposed Princeton plant," said Lali.

"Nothing could be further from the truth. It was a misrepresentation of the contents of the letter, and the public needs to know about it," said Lali.

"In fact, I wrote the letter in support of the mayors of Princeton and Keremeos, area First Nations and other community leaders who wanted the plans halted until a sufficient body of objective information had been gathered and impacts considered on the potential environmental and human health risks."

Lali continued with, "Instead of responding to these important health, environmental and community concerns Mr. Penner chose to mischaracterize my position. It just

goes to show you what lows the B.C. Liberals will go to in order to mislead the public. If that is our Minister of Environment's approach to environmental prob-

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Watch out for Town tickets

New bylaws being passed by Town Council could see local residents shocked by being issued violation tickets.

Under the regulations of the Community Charter, the Town has the right to establish bylaws enforced by issuing violation tickets. This will become a source of revenue for the Town, as fines are hefty.

Traffic

The first bylaw to be passed concerns traffic, with the minimum fine of not less than \$250. This includes ignoring speed reduction zones near schools and playgrounds, dragging or skidding objects on the street or road, driving on a sidewalk, tethering animals to lamp standards or trees or poles along the sidewalk or using a sleigh, bicycle, roller blades or skateboard on the sidewalk, defacing any structure along the road or street, jaywalking, driving through a crosswalk while a pedestrian is on the crosswalk, littering, and selling goods on the sidewalk or road without a business license from the town.

Parking

Parking violations come under this bylaw, too. You could be fined for parking a vehicle at the road or street side for more than 72 hours, sleeping in a parked vehicle, angle

parking in a vehicle more than 7 meters long, and all of the usual parking regulations such as not parking along a curb painted yellow (watch out you post office sneaky parkers). Further, you cannot park a vehicle at the side of a road or street for the purpose of selling it and you cannot park your trailer on the street.

Dogs

The second new bylaw involves domestic animals. It is a tough piece of legislation and will no doubt yield a lot of revenue until people learn to abide by the law. For example, if your dog poops on the sidewalk and you leave it there, you could be looking at a \$100 fine. If you do not exercise your dog, or if you fail to provide it with shelter, you could pay a fine of \$500. If you take a dog from its home unlawfully, you could be fined \$500. If you are harbouring more than two dogs, you could be fined \$150, and if your dog is a barking fool, you could be fined \$100.

These new bylaws will come into effect at the first Town Council meeting in December. At that time, there may be further new bylaws. When a new bylaw is adopted, citizens may review the regulations and penalties by asking for a copy of the bylaw at Town Hall.

Seniors plead to charge rent

Senior Citizens Branch #30 wants to be able to charge rent fees for use of the Seniors Drop In Centre located on Angela Avenue. At the November 20 Town Council meeting, Councillor Ray Jarvis pled the case, saying use of the hall is now compensated by donations.

Since the building was constructed in 1987, renting the hall was restricted by Town Council. Councillor Jarvis saw no reason why Senior Citizens Branch #30 could not charge rent.

Councillor Maria Sadegur brought up the issue of Senior Citizens

Branch #30 not paying property taxes, noting that the Legion and Elks must pay taxes. This was countered by the argument that the Legion has many revenue generating activities. Councillor Sadegur noted that the Elks do not, but must pay taxes. She further stated Senior Citizens Branch #30 might have to pay taxes in the future, but others on Council said they would not initiate such action.

Council voted in favour of allowing Senior Citizens Branch #30 to charge rent for use of the Drop In Centre.

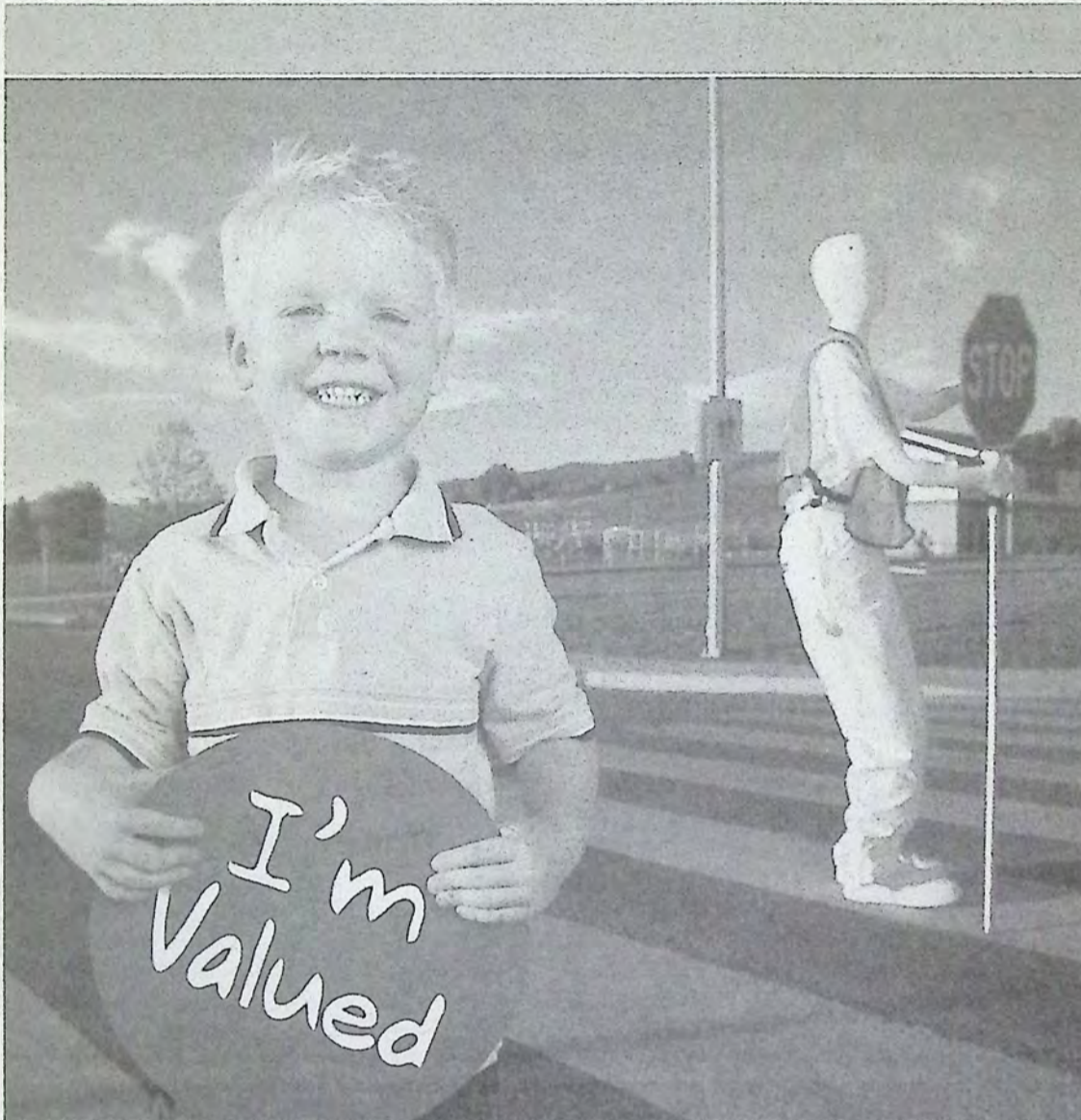
Council plans no smoking signs

Tobacco-free zones marked by signs are in-the-works for Princeton next spring. These signs will say "Tobacco-free zone" and will not allow smoking within 10 meters of public places.

Proposed locations are all playing fields, the arena, all playgrounds, the museum and library, and Princeton Exhibition Association grounds.

This decision is the result of a presentation to Town Council by Jerrilyn Kiely of the Canadian Cancer Society and two Interior Health Authority representatives. Town Council has agreed to share the cost of the signs, an estimated \$400.

A formal announcement is planned for January 21-27, National Non-Smoking Week.




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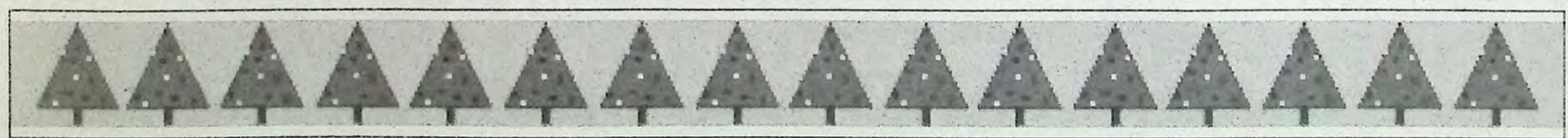


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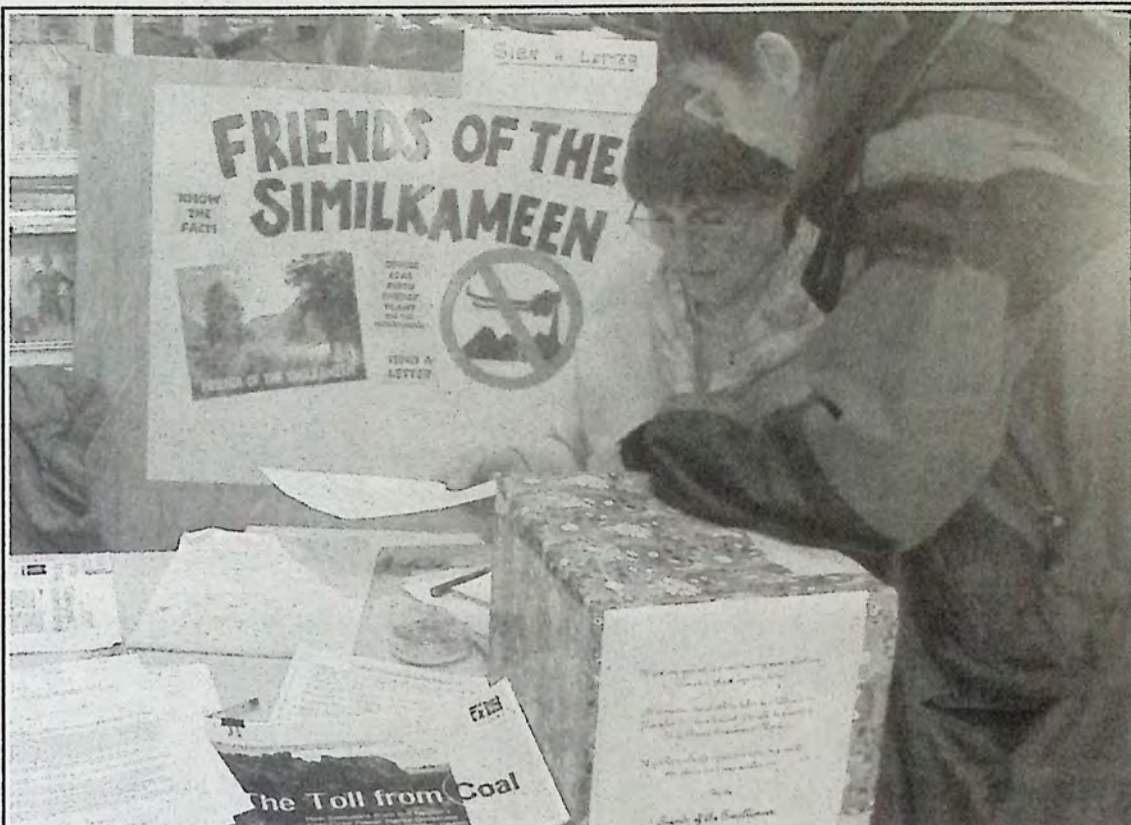

Grist Mill plan continues

In 2002, the Province changed its policies for the operation of Heritage Sites.

The result was that long time manager of the Grist Mill, Heritage Interpretation Services (a.k.a. Cuyler Page), was out and Calgary-based WJ Stelmaschuk was the new manager. After four years of operation, WJS opted out of their management agreement. During their four-year term, visitation declined by 75%.

The Village of Keremeos and the Similkameen Valley Planning Society began an effort to find a way to keep the Grist Mill operating.

Planning Society EDO Michael McLaughlin wrote a proposal for funding from the BC Heritage Branch and \$18,750 was received in mid-October, thanks to the efforts of Keremeos Mayor Walter Despot and Area B and G Directors George Hanson and Joe Nitsch.

McLaughlin assembled a team to do a business case analysis of the Grist Mill. The analysis includes recommendations for programming, gift shop sales and diningroom sales that are necessary to establish the value of the Grist Mill experience and for estimat-

ing revenues. Financial projects for a seven-year period were made.

McLaughlin's team included the Manager of Fort Steele near Cranbrook, former Grist Mill Manager Cuyler Page, a gift shop consultant, restaurant consultant and a building inspector.

The team's report will be sent to the Regional District for review before it goes to Minister for Tourism, Sport and the Arts, Stan Hagan. The hope is that the

Heritage Branch will subsidize operating costs until visitor numbers can be brought back to where they were four years ago.

McLaughlin anticipates it will take seven years to regain 20,000 annual visitors, with Heritage Branch subsidies shrinking to near zero by year seven.

The Grist Mill accounts for over \$1.1 million in direct tourism revenues annually, 25% of the tourism revenues in the Lower Similkameen.

Team recruits from school

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Go wild with the nutritional power of wild blueberries

(NC)When it comes to fighting disease, wild blueberries may be small in size, but scientific research shows they pack a powerful punch of protection.

Wild blueberries are distinct from their cultivated cousin not only because of the unique way they grow, but also due to their amazingly sweet, tangy taste and size. The sweet fruit is balanced by the high acidity, producing the perfect combination of natural flavour and is found in the low-bush of the northern climates of Quebec, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island, deemed "Land of the Wild Blueberries" by the Wild Blueberry Association of North America.

The fruit's small compact size also delivers more berries per pound; more skin per ounce means more health-promoting antioxidants and goodness. Some of the most powerful antioxidants include phytochemicals such as anthocyanins, which are the deep-blue pigments that are highly concentrated in wild blueberries.

Foods high in antioxidants help prevent cellular damage from free radicals, which can offer a defense against heart disease, stroke, some

cancers and brain aging. While antioxidant benefits are impressive on their own, researchers are now exploring whether anti-inflammatory benefits of this small fruit supersede even the highly-touted antioxidant benefits.

James A. Joseph, PhD, USDA Human Nutrition Research Center on Aging in Boston is working with blueberries to examine their potential to help improve motor skills and reverse the short-term memory loss that comes with aging. Joseph believes that deep-blue blueberries may be one of the best age-proofing foods included in one's diet. Along with the brain health benefits of this very powerful food are the potential added benefits of cancer prevention. Only a half-cup of wild blueberries delivers the recommended amount of fruit into one's daily diet.


While research into the antioxidant health benefits of wild blueberries continues, new research is emerging to suggest that the anti-inflammato-

ry benefits of the fruit's flavonoids may even surpass its antioxidant benefits. Even low levels of flavonoids may be sufficient to promote anti-inflammatory processes throughout the body, including the brain.


As we age, a general increase in inflammation throughout the body contributes to the degenerative processes that characterize aging. Since inflammation and oxidative stress are closely linked processes in disease and aging, the fact that blueberry flavonoids appear to possess both antioxidant and anti-inflammatory properties is extremely exciting.

Current studies by scientist Dr. Wilhelmina Kalt at the Atlantic Food and Horticultural Research Centre in Kentville, Nova Scotia are underway, exploring cardio protection by blueberry flavonoids and the absorption of blueberry anthocyanins in the body.

Here's another advantage for those who exercise regularly. If you are physically active, you will be less likely to develop depression. If you are already depressed, then physical exercise can help. So if you don't already exercise regularly, try it! Regularly means at least 30 minutes three times per week.

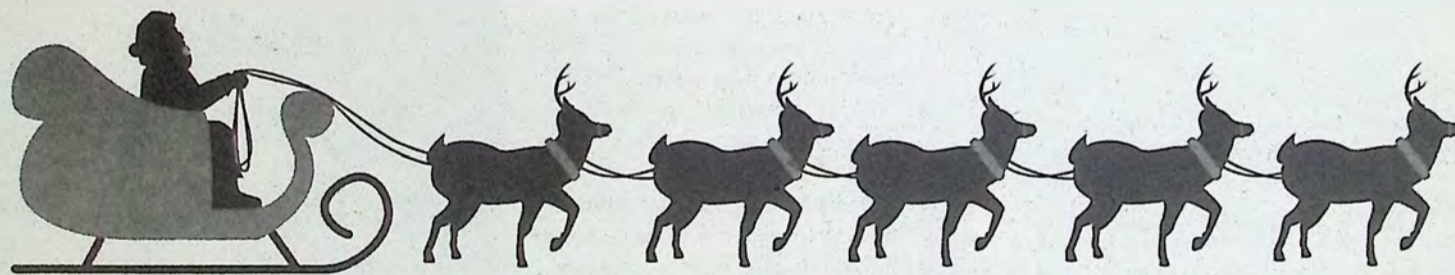
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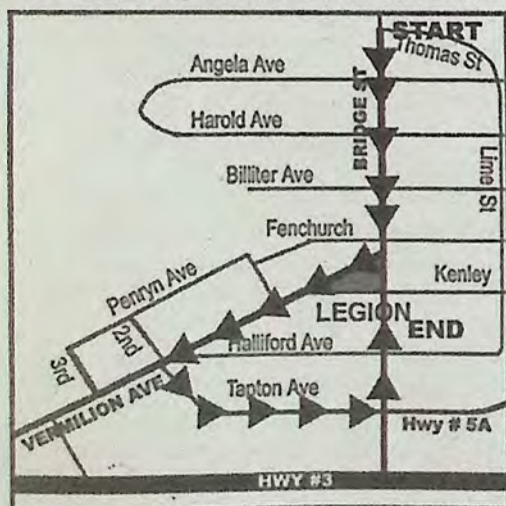

The Vermilion Artists have become very well known in the Princeton area over the years, with many pieces on display throughout the many local businesses. The Vermilion Artists group has also been known for bringing many extensive art workshops into the community for the use of the local artisans.

The most recent workshop was the Sandra Albo acrylics workshop that took place on October 21st and November 4th. Under Albo's expert instruction, the group of painters were taught the properties of acrylic paint, the types of brushes used and some basic history behind the art of acrylic painting.

On Day Two of the workshop, everyone who attended brought in some examples of their work for Albo to appraise and give constructive criticism on. The students of the class found this to be very helpful and many took her advice to heart and made improvements to their pieces.

For some of the artists, the workshop was a way to get people out and motivated to paint as well as having the opportunity to see what everyone else is doing and draw some inspiration from what they were seeing around them.

For others, this was their first time working in the acrylic medium and it was interesting to watch the different artists applying their learned techniques from other mediums to the canvas with Acrylics.

Combining the two sessions of painting, each artist did between one and four finished paintings while others brought works from home to finish or make adjustments to.

The Sandra Albo Acrylics workshop was a complete success and the Vermilion Artists are currently planning a Watercolour workshop in March 2007 with Barb Hoffer from Okanagan Falls.













The change in location to the Riverside Wellness Centre has been a bonus to the group because of the spatial difference which aids the artists in putting on these workshops.

For the past two years, members of Communities for Kids have been discussing how to bring a Family Centre to Princeton. The community kitchen will be a place where parents, and parents expecting a child, can learn how to prepare nutritious meals for a family, and for an expected family. The community kitchen is not to be confused with any organi-

zation offering charity meals. The community kitchen will be part of the family supportive programs to be held in the Family Centre.

The Family Centre concept has wide support within the community. Why have a Family Centre?

Beatrice Bibby, a Communities for Kids member, says, "It's not easy to raise kids these days."

The Family Centre will provide information and help to parents who want to do the best job they can of raising their children.

"The Family Centre idea is to give

support to families to raise happy, healthy children," Bibby told the News Leader.

The facility to be used needs a lot of work to make it a warm, inviting environment, and to offer a modern kitchen. The application is for \$35,000, but this will not be enough. Communities for Kids will be going to the community for kitchen appliances, furniture and things like comforters on which to lay visiting infants and toddlers. More information about the Family Centre will be made available in the near future.

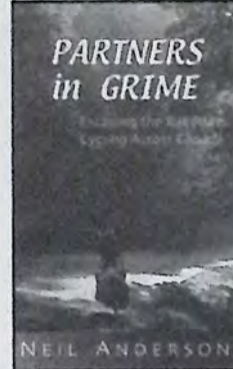

Posse Head Coach Dale 'Duner' Hladun is also confident that the strength his team has will muscle it

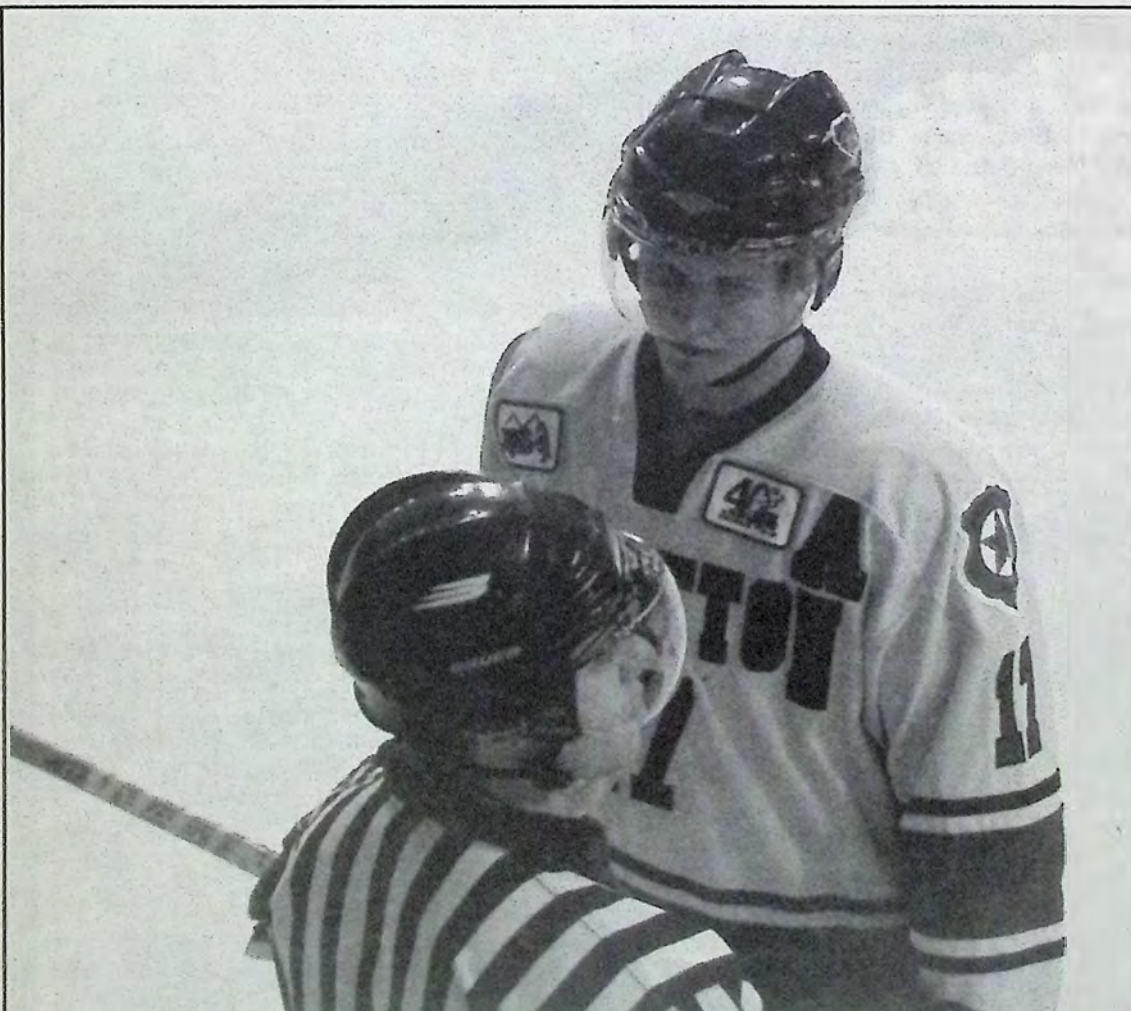
out of the bottom of the standings and into play-off position.

Five days south, off of Cape (end of stairs) we encountered 5 hostile well manned Basque ships but managed to see them off after exchanging cannon fire. On, south past Cape Verde and onto Sierre Leone took only one month.

Here the captain's pirate nature served us well and we captured a Portuguese merchant ship and plundered several coastal towns to stock our vessels making ready for our south south west voyage over the equator and through the unpredictable Doldrums. The Atlantic crossing was uneventful except for the constant and oppressive heat and we eased south along the coast of Brazil past Rio. We spent Christmas in Patagonia at a long beautiful harbor that the captain named Port Desire after our flag ship. By early January we had found the Straits of Magellan and began a difficult 7 week storm-pounded passage through to the (father-see-if-I-see) Ocean. We sailed north in gentle weather and were able to make repairs to The Desire and The Content but had to burn The Hugh Gallant. We sacked many Spanish ports along the coast of (feels cold) and heard rumors of a Spanish treasure ship due to arrive soon. we coasted north from (bean town) towards Mexico until in November, we spotted the ship and attacked. They put up a good fight and a fierce six hour battle in rolling swells took place before we got close enough to swarm her and claim our booty. Our holds, already well filled, would only hold 40 of the 500 tons of goods found on the galleon and the captain ordered the vessel and remaining goods burned. So, overburdened, our two vessels attempted to wallow west across the Pacific, through Indonesia, across the Indian Ocean around the Cape of (best expectations) then north. Eventually only The Desire, holds still full of treasure, made it safely home to Plymouth on September 10th. 1588.

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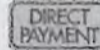

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The letters just keep pouring in about the coal-fired power issue

Editor:

Recently, Compliance Power received a letter signed by 68 people requesting funding for an independent scientific analysis of our proposed wood-waste/coal energy project near Princeton. Given that no contact information was provided from the authors of this letter, we would like the opportunity to respond through your newspaper.

We appreciate that, in asking for funding, it is agreed that we should all allow science to guide the decision-making process.

Compliance Power has already begun the process of undergoing an independent assessment of the proposed project through the British Columbia Environmental Assessment (EA) process. We volunteered to go through this process on the advice of the BC Minister of Environment and affected local governments.

The Environmental Assessment (EA) Office is the independent government agency that oversees the EA procedure. It ensures that proper consideration is given to the environmental and socio-economic impacts of proposed projects. It is the duty of the EA Office to audit and analyze the provided scientific assessments.

Compliance Power has engaged a variety of independent firms with the required expertise to assess the impact of our project on the air, water, land, and vegetation of the region, including public health and community benefits. At this point, data gathering and analysis is nearly complete. It is expected that this work will be submitted to the EA Office in December. When the EA Office is satisfied that the application has met its standards, the report and accompanying scientific data will be available for public examination and discussion.

A Technical Working Group has been established to advise the EA Office of potential concerns. Area residents will gain confidence in the objectivity of the EA Office to know that local and regional government representatives as well as First Nations and government agency technical staff have been invited to participate in this group.

Proposals submitted to the EA office often fail to be approved. Primarily, this is because the likely effects of projects are not satisfactorily addressed. While projects are sometimes opposed by those with political or philosophical objections, most have accepted the science upon which the EA process is based.

Compliance Power believes that the proposed power project has been unfairly represented by many of its critics. We regret not addressing these concerns earlier, but we want to convince you with quality scientific analysis. We are convinced that we have chosen the right technology, and that we will more than meet government air emission standards and community acceptance. We remain confident that the project will have no measurable impact on air quality in

the Princeton/Similkameen Valley area. However, we have always wished to have the latest and best air modeling and air quality assessment data before saying so. We are proud to say that this assessment will be included in the forthcoming EA application report.

Finally, at a recent public meeting, the issue of meeting the proposed emission standards on an ongoing basis was raised. To provide additional assurance that the plant will continue to meet or exceed standards, we would be prepared to discuss funding for an appropriate local group to be involved in the professional and independent monitoring of the plants emissions.

To further address your concerns, I would be prepared to meet with your group for a longer and more detailed discussion at a mutually acceptable date in the near future.

Friends of the Similkameen and SOS would like to take this opportunity to clarify some erroneous information given on a CHBC television interview last week by Councilor Sadegur on her return from a tour of Alberta coal plants as a guest of Compliance Energy. Because of the inaccuracy of that information and because Councilor Sadegur was introduced as a Princeton Town Councilor we unfortunately feel compelled do this publicly.

1) In the interview Councilor Sadegur stated that the coal plant she visited produced "NO EMISSIONS" that it was "99% pure". That is of course, totally absurd. Even the coal industry does not make that claim and Compliance Energy has not, at least publicly, made that claim. Compliance has in fact admitted they will not sequester any CO2. Just the green house gas emissions alone from this plant will be hundreds of thousands of tons. There are gasification plants in existence that are far superior to the technology that Compliance is proposing however there are none in Alberta.

2) Councilor Sadegur was asked by CHBC about the concern Princeton residents have about mercury, her reply was, "There's mercury....if you go into the hills right now you'll find mercury in the land. Has it hurt anyone? Not that I can see". As Councilor Sadegur points out there is mercury in rocks and other substances although much more in coal, but, does anyone not realize that it is the burning of coal that releases it into the atmosphere? It is what goes up the stack not what stays buried in the ground. Compliance will be required to capture all but 15% of that mercury, however when burning hundreds of thousands of tons of coal that 15% adds up to a very large number. Does Councilor Sadegur know what that number will be? Unlike Councilor Sadegur, the Governor of Idaho Jim Risch is able to see the harm. Like B.C. there are no coal-fired plants in Idaho and Gov. Risch has stated "There are companies that have tried to build coal-fired facilities in Idaho and will continue to try While I promote economic development throughout the state, the health implications of mercury emissions from coal-fired power plants far outweigh any economic benefits".

More on coal power plant

Dear Editor,

I am a teacher in the Abbotsford School District. During the early 1980s I was living in Salmon Arm, BC and was a member of the Hat Creek Coalition, a group that was opposed to the then-proposed Hat Creek Coal-fired Thermal-Electric Project. My role, as a former employee of the Federal Department of Fisheries and International Pacific Salmon Fisheries Commission, was to research the effect of the proposal on the environment and fish stocks in the area. I still have this information.

The Princeton project is similar to the now defunct Hat Creek proposal and the recently-scraped Sumas 2 Energy project.

The problem with the Princeton proposal in a nutshell is:

The West Coast cordillera is made up of primarily granite rock formation and coniferous acid soils. These rock and soil formations have literally no ability to neutralize the acid rain that will be produced by such a project. The acid will return to the ground in the Princeton area and areas further east (ie. Penticton, Osoyoos, etc) of the project that will be affected when the prevailing winds carry the acid formations to these areas. The acid builds up in the snow-pack during the winter, then is flushed into neighboring lakes, streams and rivulets during the "spring thaw," causing "acid shock" which raises the pH to a significant acidic level, thereby killing small organisms in these streams and eventually larger life

forms which feed on the smaller organisms.

The second problem is that there will be a significant amount of air pollution that will also be carried east by prevailing winds to affect the "Sunny Okanagan." Resort areas in the Penticton and Osoyoos area will likely receive a negative impact from the Princeton Thermal-Electric Plant.

The main question is: what is the projected amount of emissions from the Princeton Project? If the estimated amount of emissions is

known, we can have an idea about the detrimental impact of the project. Also, will industry be attracted to this area to utilize some of this power, and will some of this industry have a detrimental impact on the environment?

This project needs to be thoroughly analyzed by a public hearing. We need to put this information before the people who will be affected by the project as soon as possible.

Local readers write to Penner

Mr. Penner when I heard of this project I too could hardly believe anyone would think of putting a coal fired generator at the head of our val-

ley or anywhere in our beautiful province. And even harder to understand, is that, it is our own BC Government along with BC Hydro that is not only supporting this project but has also encouraged it. What happened to "Certainly the BC government and BC Hydro wouldn't think to do that?" Am I to reason that because this is not in the Honourable Barry Penner's back yard it makes it okay to pollute other peoples back yards? We are in favour of expanded power generation within British Columbia, but not at the expense of human health and deterioration air quality."

Honourable Barry Penner I totally agree with your above statement. You say that the government spent scarce tax dollars to protect our environment. The question I have is after spending these dollars to protect the environment of British Columbia why are you and the B.C. government encouraging Coal Fired Generators when they pollute almost 3 times as much as the SE2 project? You then say the govern-

ment is pro-business, but not at any cost. And I must admit that our government is very pro-business and that is a good thing. It's the (but not at any cost) that has me befuddled. It seems to me that by endorsing coal fired generators you are going against your own statement (but not at the expense of human health and deteriorating air quality). One final question, how can you in all honesty say no to the SE2 project who's pollution would of been about 66% less, and yes to the proposed coal fired generator that's to be located in the Similkameen valley? I believe that the SE2 project did not include mercury in its toxic waste, where we all know that coal fired generators do. Hedley reader writes Premier

I am writing to let you know that I strongly oppose Compliance Energy Corporation's proposed coal fired power plant near Princeton, BC and the Wapiti Power Development Project at Tumbler Ridge. I have attended several meetings about the Princeton project, spoken with many different people who have much knowledge on the subject, and have written articles in regards to this issue.
In the Similkameen Valley, myself, my family, friends, neighbors, business owners, town councils, mayors, teachers, realtors, newspaper publishers, physicians, ranchers, farmers, retirees and First Nations (except for one Band) are grouping together in the cause to stop this plant from being built. Tremendous amounts of information are being well researched regarding the burning of coal and its detrimental effects on the environment and the health of all living beings. The use of coal for power is outdated, dangerous, and it is downright irresponsible that it is even being considered as an energy source when there are much safer alternatives available for producing electricity. Many thousands of people from around this valley, the Okanagan region, British Columbia, Canada, and worldwide know that the burning of coal is far from being a clean source of power generation, as it is has been touted by the Minister of Energy.

Every coal mine has waste coal which is not saleable and so must be disposed of in some way. Compliance Energy hopes to get rid of their refuse by burning it in our valley. It's a way to economically and viably get rid of their waste coal and get very rich doing it, but all at the cost of this region's health.

The few jobs it will create is a joke in comparison to the damaging tradeoff of burning scrap coal. On top of that, the air and noise pollution that will come from trucking all of that coal to the Similco site, and of trucking the wood waste Compliance says it plans on burning along with the coal (to help reduce emissions) will be tremendous. It will take a lot of fuel to run those trucks back and forth.

In your government's 2002 Energy Plan, BC Hydro has been transformed from a Crown corporation that has generated publicly-owned electricity to a purchaser of energy from the private sector. This swift move prevents BC Hydro from building new generation assets. In its Open Call for Power 2006, BC Hydro awarded 30-year contracts for two coal fired generation plants to be built in the province (the first such plants ever) in order to provide

"firm" power.

However, BC already has substantial firm power capacity in place in the form of dams, therefore the need to burn coal is unnecessary. The old policy in which BC Hydro generated its own power worked very well because it allowed ratepayers to enjoy the second lowest electricity prices in North America.

Now, under the new plan BC Hydro will buy its future electrical energy from private power developers and revenues will come right out of the ratepayers pockets and go into the pockets of those private energy companies. So happy those corporations shall be.

Instead of incentives to promote energy efficiency, your government has chosen to subsidize companies who make record profits from what should be a public resource. Not only that but from outdated, unrenewable sources. Why, why, why, Mr. Campbell? The almighty dollar; we all know that's why.

Under the banner of Bill 75 with its questionable title of "The Significant Projects Streamlining Act", and the recently passed Bill 30 which further restricts local municipalities approval of any independent power projects in their jurisdiction, your government can now sail smoothly

on into any project they see fit without public consultations. Your Cabinet ministers who are supposed to be advocates for the people of this province obviously have no respect for the people's opinions. Mr. Neufeld's bullish style and double-speak nonsense have made him look like an ass, and Barry Penner's major flip-flop on pollution-belching power plants have us wondering what he's really made of.
