Manning Park project protects public safety

To reduce the impacts of the provincial mountain pine beetle infestation, an on-going forest fuel and hazard tree management program is being implemented in E.C. Manning Provincial Park.

Hazard trees are being removed in public areas of the park for visitor safety, and fuel breaks are being established near park boundaries to reduce the risk of wildfire spreading to areas adjacent to the park, as recommended in the Filmon Report.

To reduce hazard tree risks to park visitors, dead and dying pine trees in the Mule Deer Campground and Coldspring Campground and along Highway 3 from the Beaver Pond to Manning Park Resort on the south

side of the highway will be removed starting in mid-February.

BC Parks will be investing approximately \$25,000 to implement this portion of the project.

The Bonnevier Fuel Break project, planned to reduce the wildfire risk to the Eastgate community adjacent to the park, will begin in the third week in February.

The fuel break will be established by removing dead and dying pine trees and other forest fuels, and reducing the forest density near the park boundary in a 140-hectare interface zone.

Reducing the forest density improves wildfire control and reduces the risk of fast-moving

crown fires. Government has invested about \$80,000 to date for planning and creating access to the fuel break.

The Ministry of Forests and Range and the Upper Similkameen Indian Band are also working to decrease fuel loading and increase the size of the fuel break outside of the park.

The Bonnevier Trail from Highway 3 will be closed during these activities to ensure public safety. The trail can be accessed from an alternate point on the Forest Service road above Eastgate on the east side of Bonnevier Creek.

As part of the infestation management program, hazard trees threatening the BC Hydro line on the

north side of Highway 3 will also be removed, starting in early March.

The fuel reduction projects in E.C. Manning Provincial Park are facilitated by a team of specialists, including professional foresters and biologists, First Nations, adjacent landowners, commercial operators and park managers.

The project team includes: the local community through the participation of the Eastgate Fire Protection Society, the Ministry of Forests and Range, Gibson Pass Resort Inc., BC Hydro, the Upper Similkameen Indian Band, the Regional District of Okanagan Similkameen and the Ministry of Environment.

BC Parks is also conducting fuel management activities in other parks in the Okanagan Region, including Fintry Provincial Park, Kalamalka Lake Provincial Park, Ellison Provincial Park and White Lake Grasslands Protected Area.

Protecting public safety with fuel management and wildfire mitigation activities is part of the provincial Mountain Pine Beetle Action

Plan.

Compliance sells CMMC shares

Compliance Energy Corporation ('Compliance' or the 'Company') announced on February 20 that it had sold 1.25 million common shares of Copper Mountain Mining Corporation ('CMMC'), which it was holding for investments purposes, for \$1.25 million.

CMMC is a private BC resource company that owns 100 per cent of Similco Mines Ltd. which holds the mineral claims and crown grants over the 18,000 acre former Similco Copper Mine site.

After the sale, Compliance's remaining ownership in CMMC is

2.75 million shares or approximately 20 per cent. CMMC has now staffed an exploration crew and has two diamond drills working on an initial 21,000 meter drilling program.

The exploration program is designed to confirm and expand upon the reported historical copper resource at the Similco Mine Site. Exploration drilling commenced in the third week of January and is expected to be completed mid way through the second quarter.

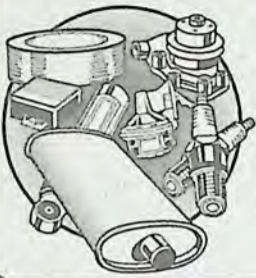

DEVELOPMENT OF A PEST MANAGEMENT PLAN AMENDMENT

The Ministry of Forests and Range has applied to the Ministry of Environment to amend the above plan to include the ground application of aminopyralid (commercial formulation Milestone) and dicamba (commercial formulation Banvel II) to spot-treat invasive plants in the Southern Interior Forest Region, as identified in the above pest management plan. Keremeos and Princeton are within the plan's boundaries.

Plan No. 402-0649-05/10 is in effect until May 9, 2010.

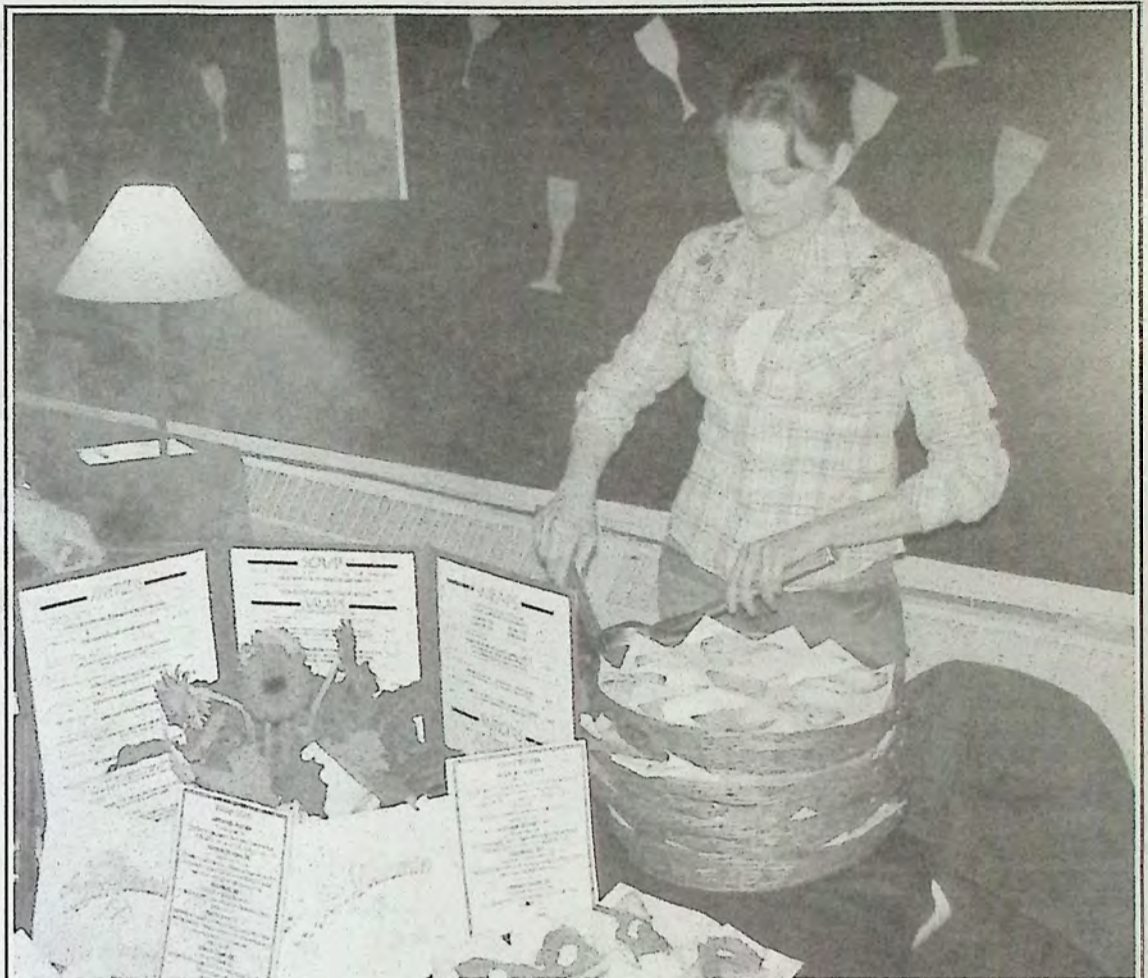

Lali says Liberals have abandoned rural BC

Yale-Lillooet MLA, Harry Lali, slammed the Campbell-Liberals for hypocrisy and mean-heartedness for abandoning Rural British Columbia and the province's working families.

"This Liberal budget is a disaster for the people of Yale-Lillooet and Rural British Columbia," charged Lali.

"There is nothing in the budget to address the myriad of problems facing the people of Rural B.C. including skyrocketing tuition fees, exorbitant heating bills, rising costs of child care, deteriorating aboriginal health, growing homelessness, and no support for seniors' home care. There is nothing in the B.C. Budget for child care to help working families with increasing costs because the Campbell Liberals don't care," continued Lali.

"There is nothing provided by the B.C. Liberals for rural transportation and highways projects such as

Pioneer Road 40, the Big Slide on Highway 12, the Summers Creek Road, Hope-Princeton Highway and the Fraser Canyon Highway #1, or for road maintenance and snow-clearing on the Coquihalla Highway, but the Campbell Government can find billions of dollars to pour into transportation mega-projects in the Lower Mainland."

Lali said, "Once again, the Campbell Liberals continue to discriminate against Rural B.C. by not putting in place and funding a plan to fight the pine beetle infestation devastating the Interior. There is nothing in the Liberal Budget to eliminate surgery wait lists and nothing for helping seniors with rising home care costs in the Interior Health Region, but Mr. Campbell found \$1.1 million to hire more Liberal political hacks in ministers' offices. There is a complete disconnect between the Liberal Throne Speech and the

budget tabled by Finance Minister Carole Taylor," said Lali.

"It is hypocritical on for Liberals to promise the moon on climate change in the Throne Speech and then deliver a budget that does absolutely nothing to address global warming and to address the challenges facing working families today."

Lali said he was disappointed by the government's housing announcement.

"Rather than making a long-term investment in housing for the homeless, this government's solution is to create more shelter beds, which are temporary beds that do not provide the homeless with a place to call their own," said Lali.

"By converting existing social housing to supportive housing units the Campbell Liberals threaten to cut the number of existing affordable housing for low-income families even further."

Who needs a good building?

During question period at the February 19 Town Council meeting, Ed Muckle raised the question

of what Town Council is going to do with the former Highways Maintenance building. This build-

ing is located on the former Argo highways maintenance property which the Town plans to sell for residential development.

Muckle presented Council with a small pamphlet prepared by him and Bob Hart. Photos showed the strong post and beam structure inside the building and shows it can be removed to a new location. The building is very large, and no information was available regarding removal and reconstruction costs.

Muckle told Council the building could be an asset to a number of local groups.

Council will consider the matter.

Lali speaks up for Yale-Lillooet

The failure of Gordon Campbell and the B.C. Liberal government to acknowledge the challenges faced by rural British Columbians demonstrates the government's complete disregard for the citizens of Yale-Lillooet, MLA Harry Lali said in his official response to the Throne Speech.

"The people of British Columbia, especially my constituents, are a lot smarter than the Liberals are trying to give them credit for," said Lali in the Legislature.

Lali used the opportunity to highlight the hypocrisy of the B.C. Liberal government's focus on climate change in the Throne Speech. "This is the same government that wanted to put in dirty coal-fired plants in British Columbia, in Tumbler Ridge and in my constituency of Princeton, and now they're talking about global warming," said Lali.

The Liberal government's failure to sustain the transportation infrastructure in rural B.C. is evidenced by the dangerous conditions Highways 12 and 40. Lali noted that, "We see billions of billions of dollars that are going to be poured into the lower mainland over the next ten years ... But what have they really done for rural British Columbia? Well, they've cut the heart out of the heartlands. It is only when this opposition raises the issues that they're actually willing to put some money in there," continued Lali.

"The situation is repeated all over rural British Columbia, because we can't get any action from this government, whether it's the Summers Creek Road, also known

as the Missezula Lake road, near Princeton, or Highway 12 between Lytton and Lillooet. Merritt to Princeton - finally, after two years of me harping against the Liberal government, they're finally putting some money into there to try to fix it. We've seen a disaster in terms of the highway's maintenance under this Liberal government."

Despite promises to the contrary, the B.C. Liberal government has let down the aboriginal community in rural B.C., noted Lali.

"When I talk to the chiefs and

councils and the aboriginal people in my constituency, they're saying that there may be economic prosperity going on in British Columbia but that they are not getting their fair share of the economic pie."

Lali's focus on the rights of his constituents sends a clear message that he and other members of the New Democrat Official Opposition will continue to fight for the rights of rural British Columbians at the Legislature, which is scheduled to continue sitting until the end of May.

Author asks for support

Chris Weicht, aviation historian, asked Town Council to pay his expenses to come to Princeton to do a presentation on the history of Princeton's airport.

This presentation would highlight the contents of one chapter of the book he is writing about the aviation history of B.C. and the Yukon. Mayor Randy McLean was in

favour of paying the author to make a presentation to Council, but Councillor Jim Manion questioned whether Council should do this.

Councillor Manion said it is customary for a local organization to undertake this kind of project.

Council voted to refer the matter to the Airport Committee.

Shooters want clubhouse

Princeton Fish & Game Club has asked Town Council for permission to construct a building at the rifle range. The proposed building would be a portable unit, and would be used as a clubhouse and classroom.

The club guaranteed there would be no storage of firearms, ammunition or dangerous goods in the

building. The club expressed their intention to make the rifle range site more secure and monitor those using or entering the site.

Town Council said there are a lot of matters to be considered before granting or refusing the proposal. The matter has been referred to staff for further information and discussion.

RDOS wants you to keep glass out of blue bags

All Regional Districts in the Southern Interior, from Enderby in the North to Oliver and the Similkameen Valley in the South, have now changed the way they collect recyclable glass. No longer acceptable in blue bags, glass is being accommodated with separate collections and depots to avoid the contamination of other recyclables with broken glass.

It has recently become apparent however that not all residents in the Okanagan-Similkameen have broken the old habit of putting glass in their blue bags. There are numerous Regional Districts submitting their recyclables to Metro Waste Paper Recovery's Kelowna sorting plant, but those loads originating from the RDOS show a higher level of glass contamination than loads from any other jurisdiction.

Deanne Stephenson, BC Interior Manager for Metro Waste Paper Recovery, says she can see and hear the glass in the loads originating from the Okanagan-Similkameen as they are unloaded on the plant floor. She insists that keeping glass out of blue bags is a necessary step in marketing the paper recovered through the program.

"There are mills in the Pacific Northwest that are refusing to buy

paper from commingled curbside programs like our blue bag program because of the glass contamination," says Stephenson.

"When paper makes up 85% of the recyclables collected and glass is only 1.5% it makes sense to protect the paper."

Most RDOS residents have embraced changes to local programs and have eliminated glass from their blue bags, but unfortunately a little glass contamination goes a long way. Broken shards from a single glass jar can cause an entire load of paper to be rejected. As a result, the contractors collecting blue bags at the curb will be leaving behind any bags containing glass.

"We have been asking that residents place glass in a separate open rigid container on their pick-up days," says Beth Cavers, Solid Waste Management Coordinator for the Regional District Okanagan-Similkameen. For residents of what she calls "South

Contract Areas", that is the area from Okanagan Falls south and west, these collection days occur twice a year in March and September. For residents of RDOS-administered collection routes closer to Penticton, glass may be placed at the curb in a separate container on each regular blue bag recycling day.

"People can look at page four of their curbside calendar for details," she says.

There is good news, however. Reports show that with the introduction of plastics to blue bag recycling in 2006, RDOS residents recycled 63% more material than in 2005. This enormous increase resulted in approval from Stephenson at the sorting plant: "Very impressive!"



Change your diet to cut health risks

(NC) - Dietary advice is offered by everyone from cab drivers to doctors. Each of us has a favoured recipe for good health. The advice from experts at the National Eating Disorder Information Centre may take you by surprise.

Stop dieting. This stark and counter-culture advice comes with a strong pedigree of research to back it up.

Immunity to disease, including cancer, can be harmed by repeatedly losing and gaining weight through dieting, according to researchers at the Fred Hutchinson Cancer Research Center in Seattle.

Promoting weight loss through exercise, dietary restriction (diets) and behaviour change doesn't work. Decades of research as well as the

painful experiences of individuals who have tried it all tells this story.

"But we continue to do more of the same in the hopes that one day that our new, thinner body will 'stick.' We think that being thinner will bring good health, good relationships with loved ones and higher acceptance at school or in the work-place," says Meryll Bear, director of the National Eating Disorder Information Centre which provides information at www.nedic.ca. "But it doesn't."

Dieting brings, not health, but the likelihood of higher body weights, especially for those who diet as children or adolescents.

While the research evidence supporting the dangers of dieting is strong, so is our will to ignore it.

After all, we breathe in with our first breath our cultural ideal of thin and toned bodies.

Negative stereotypes about the character and health of fat people create a climate of fear of fat in individuals of every size, shape and weight. After all, stigma hurts.

And so we diet. We ignore that a healthy weight for each of us is unique, and is largely determined by genetics rather than the fashion page. Ignoring also that while our population is said to be getting fatter by the day, we are also the healthiest population in history.

In the end, says Bear, the best way to cut individual health risks is to live an engaged, active lifestyle, balancing the joys and demands of family, work and play. - News Canada

New hope for cancer patients

There is another good reason for not cutting down the rain forest - it may save lives in the cancer epidemic we are experiencing.

A medical researcher has found a compound from leaves of a tree growing in the Amazon appears to stop cancer in its tracks and then reverse it into remission.

There is no link between the MMR vaccine against measles, mumps, rubella and the rise in autism in children. Canadian researchers at McGill University studied 28,000 children and found no increase in autism in those who had the vaccine and those that hadn't. A Danish study of 500,000 children found the same results.

If you are over 50, you may need to take extra vitamin B-12. Deficiency in older adults has been associated with memory impairment and depression. B-12 injections are available, but often a 500mcg or 1,000mcg tablet taken daily will do the job. Our pharmacists can help you choose the right product.

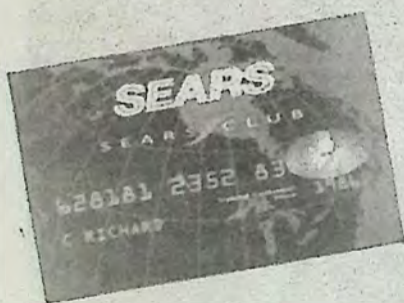

Should tax considerations affect my RRSP investment strategy?

Normally, you will want to choose RRSP investments that maximize your return and stay within your risk tolerance. While equities hold out the promise of higher returns, they are more volatile than bonds or GICs. Most people prefer to hold a larger percentage of equities in their RRSP when they are younger and are willing to take more risks and then gradually convert to more stable, income producing investments as they near retirement.

Tax can, however, play a part in your investment decisions if you have investments inside and outside of your RRSP. Remember that income earned and capital gains realized in your RRSP are not taxed until they are withdrawn from your plan, usually after you retire. Therefore, from a tax point of view, there is a bias to hold income producing investments such as GICs inside your RRSP as the interest income will be fully taxed if they are held outside of your RRSP. Similarly, it makes sense to hold investments that produce capital gains outside of your RRSP as tax only has to be paid on 50% of the gain.

You can break down your investment decisions from a tax perspective even further. Capital gains are only taxed when they are realized (that is, when you sell your investment). If you invest in stocks that you expect to sell in the short-term outside of your RRSP, capital gains will be realized that will be taxable, reducing the funds you have to invest. However, if you invest in stocks that you expect to hold for several years, any capital gains that accrue will not be subject to tax until you sell. Therefore, from a tax perspective, it makes sense to hold stocks that are short-term holds in your RRSP, where the tax on capital gains will be deferred, and to hold stocks that are long-term holds outside of your RRSP.

Keep in mind that tax advantages can sometimes conflict with other objectives for your RRSP investments. Although it may make sense to invest in stocks that are short-term holds in your RRSP, these investments usually are more risky and may conflict with your objective to have stable investments in your RRSP. In addition, if you incur losses on investments held in your RRSP, the losses will not be tax deductible - they will reduce the size of your RRSP that will be available to you in your retirement.

Your primary concern in choosing investments for your RRSP should be to maximize your return while staying within your risk tolerance. 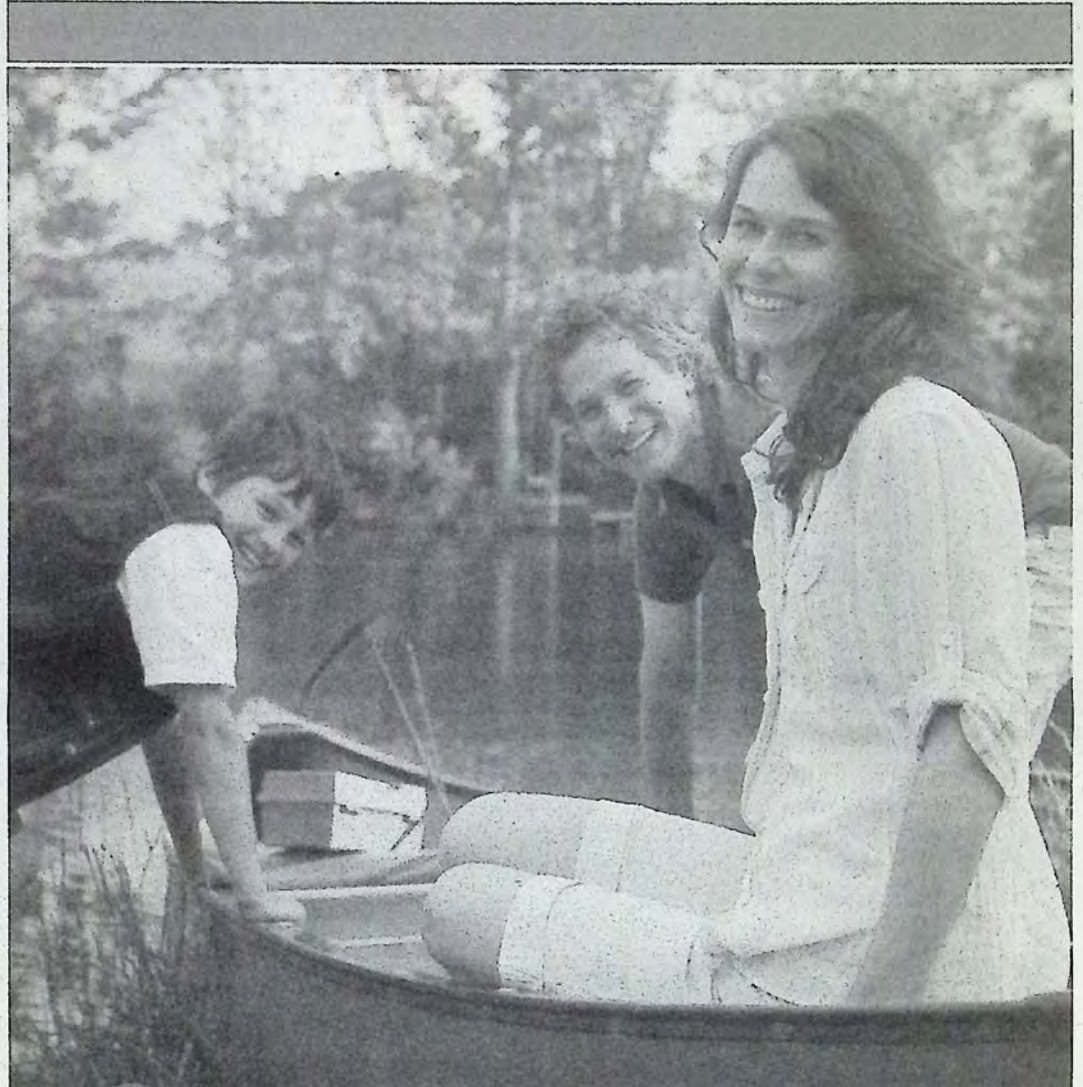

These young men displayed great poise, maturity, ease and enthusiasm in their interactions with their 'fans' throughout the year and showed up in full force on Valentine's morning.

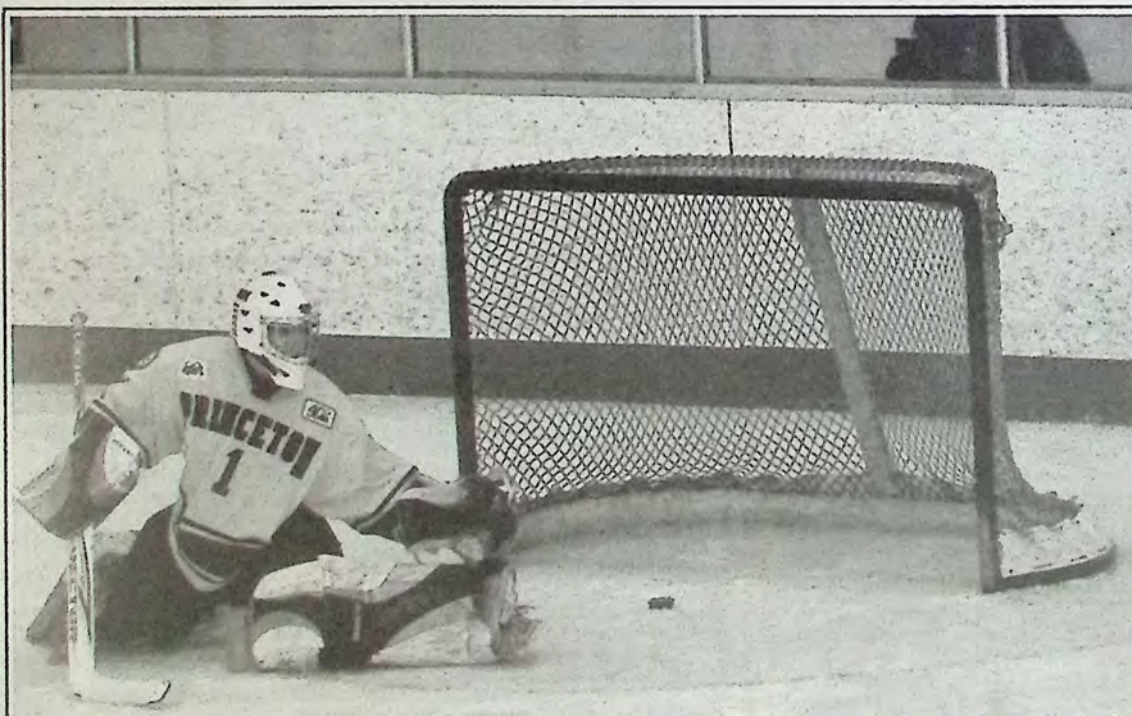
Their hockey skills are impressive and we all wish them well as they pursue their dreams of successful

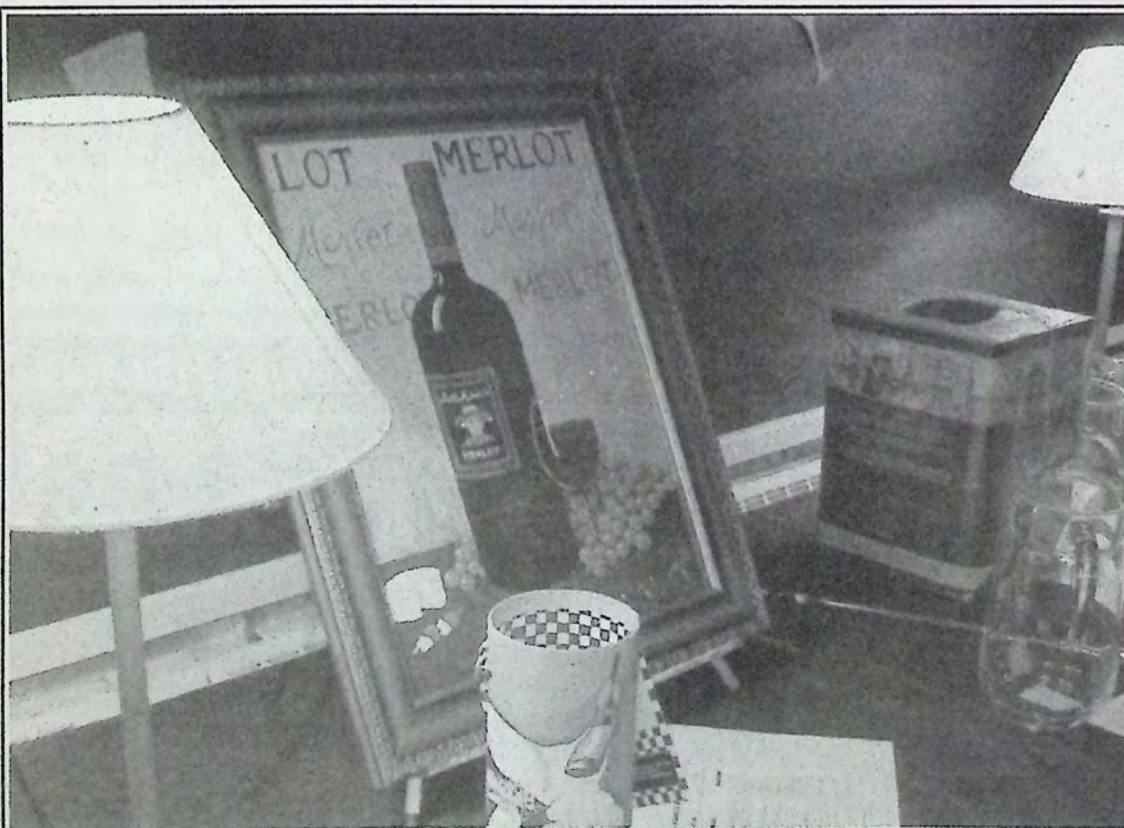

The murder of our 4 crewmen by the Maori savages had left us very cautious about going ashore. We headed north along the coast until the land ended at a point that the Captain named Cape Maria van Diemen. Just off the point was a group of small islands he named (3 crowned men) Islands, 34°09'S/172°08'E. Here we looked for water. North east in calm open seas we sailed for many days while the temperature steadily increased and we consumed our fresh water supplies. After 3 long weeks we sighted the tropical islands of (grasping tool-s+a) which we found were blessed with an abundance of fresh water, fruit, fish and friendly natives. In this paradise we rested and re-supplied. Then we headed north west for home pushed by the south east trade winds. Passing the Fiji Islands we almost ran aground on a low lying coral reef. We sailed north of the Solomon Islands and New Ireland eventually turning south west past (New-old coin) into the Moluccas, the home of the spice islands. These islands with clear turquoise waters, volcanic mountain tops and sand beaches backed with lush vegetation offered inviting harbors but often risky anchorage. Many a bay hid sandbars and sharp coral reefs that could slice open the hull of a wooden ship. Carefully wending our way around (anti-toxin-u+a), depth sounding most of the time we sailed through the (groupa) Sea then south of the Celebes turned west past Bali. Continuing along the north shore of Java we arrived home in Jakarta ten months from departure.

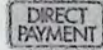

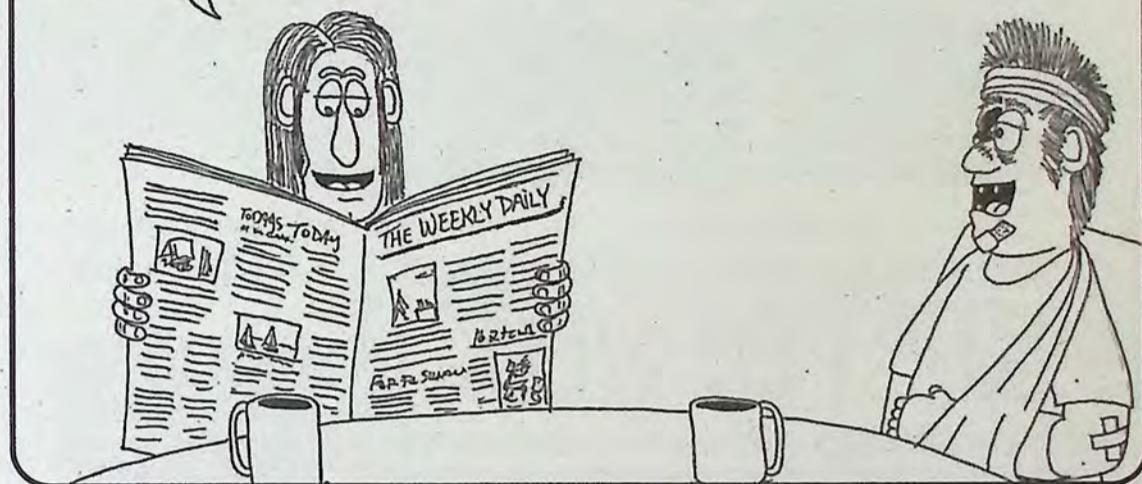

MP discusses passport issue

Dear Editor,

Just in case there is some misunderstanding in regard to passports, please allow me to state that this is a non-partisan issue which crosses all political boundaries. Many of my Conservative colleagues have also voiced their concerns on this matter.

As you know, the Auditor General, Sheila Fraser recently stated that Passport Canada offices had no contingency plans set up to deal with the volume of passport applications. My office receives 30 to 40 phone calls a day from people who need help.

In most cases, the applicant has met all the application requirements including the deadlines. However, according to Passport

Canada it now takes an additional 25 working days over and above the standard 20 days to process a passport.

The prolonged processing time is not the issue that needs to be addressed; the crux of the matter is that the residents of BC Interior must have accessible access to a processing passport office without having to travel to Vancouver or Calgary which for most involves an 8 to 10 hour drive through mountain passes.

My staff, as in most MP's offices, are doing all they possibly can to assist those in need. They communicate on a daily basis with the overworked Passport Canada officials trying to obtain the status of applications, have applications transferred back to the applicant or to the Vancouver or Calgary Regional Passport office.

This is no easy task, as in most cases, the applications have been received by Passport Canada, but

unfortunately locating the applications proves to be a difficult task due to the thousands of applications they are receiving on a daily basis. This influx of work will not ebb, especially once the US Government institutes that passports will be required for all border crossings including driving.

I and other MP's from all parties are advocating for regional offices to be opened in the BC Interior. This would help alleviate some of the pressure that the Vancouver and Calgary offices are experiencing. It would mean that my constituents would not have to drive to Vancouver to have a passport expedited.

This initiative, which has been supported by my caucus members as well as my Conservative colleagues, is justified. No further explanation is necessary.

Once again, we revise our history

What are we? Where did we originate? Did we really descend from the trees about two million years ago?

These are questions being answered by researchers every day. Some researchers dig into DNA, others dig into the ground.

Once in awhile, I read a book that expands the boundaries of what I have been taught is true. A friend who reads a great deal, shares with me a keen interest in myth-busting facts. Recently he loaned a book to me which puts certain areas of my early education into the trash heap. I am not one to defend what I used to think was true, as I have nothing of my ego invested in what I formerly believed, but if you are the kind of person who finds it hard to accept new information, please do not read any further. If you do, do not assume I am prepared to argue this material, as I will just refer you to the book, *Uriel's Machine*, written by Christopher Knight and Robert Lomas.

The first thing I learned was that I share 98 percent of my DNA with African apes. The second thing I learned is that this does not mean much. We humans share some DNA markers with nearly every creature on the planet. I learned that humans and Neanderthals do not have the same origins and were a completely different species according to DNA. We do not know why they did not become the dominant species, as their brains were larger than ours, but it may be an indication that they used their brains even less than we use ours and suffered the consequences. To make matters even more interesting, we humans all share a common original mother, according to our mitochondrial DNA, which is passed unchanged from mother to child.

When I was in secondary school, I learned that civilization originated in the Middle East and spread out from there, leading to the explosion of technology in Egypt. I learned that some of my ancestors, who come from northern Europe and the British Isles, were barbarians when Sumer and Egypt were building great cities. Wrong!

Uriel's Machine tells us quite clear-

ly that the great Stone Age sites in Wales, Scotland, and Ireland were constructed as astronomical observatories 4,000 years before the Sumerians began to construct Ur and 4,500 years before Egyptians began to build pyramids. The book goes on to theorize, according to a number of old books, that it was the scientific communities of northern Europe and the British Isles who taught their science to the Sumerians and the Egyptians! The old documents used come from Qumran's Dead Sea Scrolls and ancient histories pertaining to knights Templar and the Freemasons of Scotland.

Although *Uriel's Machine* is not an easy book to read because it braids together so many different threads of history, the subsequent rope of fact is entirely plausible. The threads come together to show us

our perception of history was seriously flawed.

I learned, in my youth, that the Druids were some kind of "dark" priests practicing wizardry. Now I learn that Druids were the descendants of those early scientists who build the astronomical observatories found in Ireland, the Orkneys, Wales and Normandy. The wizardry of the Druids was no more than keeping track of the equinoxes, solstices, and plane of the ecliptic. However, all of these so-called ancient barbarians knew, through their science, that the earth was a sphere. They devised a measurement on the ground to coincide with the movement of the sun through the year. The ancestors of the Druids build Stonehenge and other megalithic constructions, not for weird religious rites or sacrifices, but to predict eclipses, measure

space and measure time. They had what is known as a "megalithic yard" of measurement comparable to our present metre, and they used it as linear measurements in the construction of their buildings.

Uriel's Machine tells us how the Knights Templar dug into the foundation of the old temple of Jerusalem during the Crusades and brought out the secret information hidden there. This information was taken to Scotland and eventually housed in the church of Rosslyn which is a replica of the Jerusalem temple. These secrets formed the basis of the teachings of the Freemasons of Scotland.

This is an amazing book to read, and a lot of it will go against the grain of what many Christians have learned about the meaning of passages in the Old Testament and Revelations. One of the statements made by a scholar quoted in the book says all the ancient priests were scientists, and the main occupation of the priests was to advise people on the right time to plant, when to expect the days to grow longer or shorter, and even when to procreate. The other function of priests was to instruct other priests in the knowledge required to predict seasons, eclipses, Venus returns (every 40 years) and to understand

the relationship between space, time and distance.

There is enough recorded history to justify saying that the motive for the Romans to have been so dedicated to eradicating Druids was to remove their power. Their knowledge would undermine the power of the belief of Romans in their gods.

The Celtic people adopted Christianity quite readily, but for more than 1,000 years, it was their own unique brand of Christianity. They simply absorbed Jesus into their ancient practices and beliefs, and continued to celebrate their annual festivals, adding Christ to the mix. This proved threatening to the Pope, and more effort was made to completely convert the Celtic people into politically correct Christianity. The old beliefs were eventually forgotten, but thanks to the prolific writers of Ireland and Wales, and thanks to those who took care to preserve their writings, enough documentation exists to show the links between various sets of knowledge. We owe a great debt to those Celts and to the Freemasons for preserving knowledge that was not politically correct nor acceptable to either the Christians or the Jews of the Middle Ages.

How To Shear Sheep - New

Someone once said, You can do anything that you put your mind to. I am living proof that this is true. Another mighty wise saying following closely on its heels is that Practice makes perfect. Why anyone might want to put his mind to shearing sheep may be a question that only a hobby farmer would be able to answer. I am keen to share my how-to experiences for any readers that may wish to shear their sheep or those who are thinking of taking up home barbering. Like any hobby, the preparation, the actual procedure and the clean up are of great interest to anyone wishing to become a shearer of sheep.

First, I recommend that you start early in the morning. This will give you most daylight possible to accomplish your task. Your sheep will be awake already as they begin to eat when the sun comes up. Next, you should gather the sheep into a portable holding pen. This makes catching the sheep a lot easier, especially after they see what you are about to do to them. I recommend that you wear old clothes because of the lanolin oil that is found in the wool and the dirt that is found in the sheep pen. You will also need some specialized equipment. Sheep shears are now electric and so you need lots of money to buy them, (or a good neighbour who will lend his clippers) and a long extension cord. When you have secured the clippers, lay a piece of canvas or plywood on the ground where you are going to shear. Place within your reach lubricating oil for the clippers, antiseptic spray for those nasty cuts and nicks that happen when you are beginning, and a couple of plastic bags to put the wool in after you are done.

Next enter the sheep holding pen and be prepared to get some exercise. After running and falling down for what seems like a long time, take one of the mobile pen gates and move it toward the sheep. Thus, penning one or two sheep in a smaller area, making them easier to catch. You should then reach out and grab one of the sheep by the front leg and the back leg at the same time and pull toward yourself. This will cause the sheep to lose its balance and fall to the ground. Immediately you will imitate the sheep and fall to the ground as well. You now have two options: you can either move the plywood to where you are, or drag the sheep over to where you had originally planned to shear it. Lay the sheep on its side and, with lots of help, hold it down as you begin to gather your equipment. Starting at the neck, begin to cut the wool in a downward motion, taking care not to cut too deep. If you pull the skin of the sheep taut, the clippers will actually glide over their skin, leaving about an eighth of an inch of wool on the animal. This skill will probably take about 40 years to perfect and until then your sheep will look like they have been shorn with a high power vacuum cleaner that just pulled pieces of wool out here and there. Every half hour you should lubricate the clippers and allow them to cool down. Shearing one side of the sheep may be accomplished in as little time as forty-five to fifty minutes, thus, completing the shearing of your first sheep within the two hour mark. Of course we are told that the world record for shearing a sheep stands around 40 to 50 seconds, but don't be discouraged as we all have to start somewhere. When you have shorn both sides, it is a good time to give your sheep worm medicine, followed by vitamin shots and if necessary trim their hooves. The main reason for doing these extra things now is that after you let the sheep go, you probably won't get near it for at least a month or more. Finally, when the sheep is standing and seems unsure of its surroundings, be very careful not to laugh out loud when you see the job you have done. Sheep can be very sensitive and you might do well to remember the first haircut given you by your uncle with his new clippers when you were young and unable to defend yourself. The area where you accomplished this wonderful skill will now need to be cleaned up. Place the wool into a plastic bag, and then give it to someone who will use it for spinning and knitting. Clean and oil the clippers and place them in their original box. Wash all other utensils in warm soapy water and take a garden hose and wash off the plywood or canvas. Place all tools and materials in the garage or shed and then return to your house where you should run a hot bath, unplug the phone, and then fall asleep in the tub for the next two hours. I realize that my instructions only covered the shearing of one sheep. After reading how it is done, you may ask, why would you want to shear sheep when it is so time consuming? The answer is simple. Economics. A hobby farmer who shears his own sheep can save the cost of a professional sheep shearer who would charge from two to five dollars a head for shearing. When you consider the average hobby farmer with a flock of seven sheep you could save upwards of fourteen to thirty five dollars a year. This of course is excluding the experience and closeness of working with the sheep which the novice Shepherd thrives on. The real reason for sharing this how-to sheep shearing procedure is to let you experience the fun that people can have who wish to do things that they are not good at, or have never done before, and to see that they can enjoy themselves while doing so. In the Psalm 23, David explains that the Lord is our Shepherd, The LORD is my shepherd, I shall not be in want. He makes me lie down in green pastures, He leads me beside quiet waters. He restores my soul. He guides me in paths of righteousness for His name's sake. Even though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil, for you are with me; your rod and your staff, they comfort me. You prepare a table before me in the presence of my enemies. You anoint my head with oil; my cup overflows. Surely goodness and love will follow me all the days of my life, and I will dwell in the house of the LORD forever. I am so glad that David never mentions the Shepherd shearing the sheep, but I am sure that He would do it quite different from me.

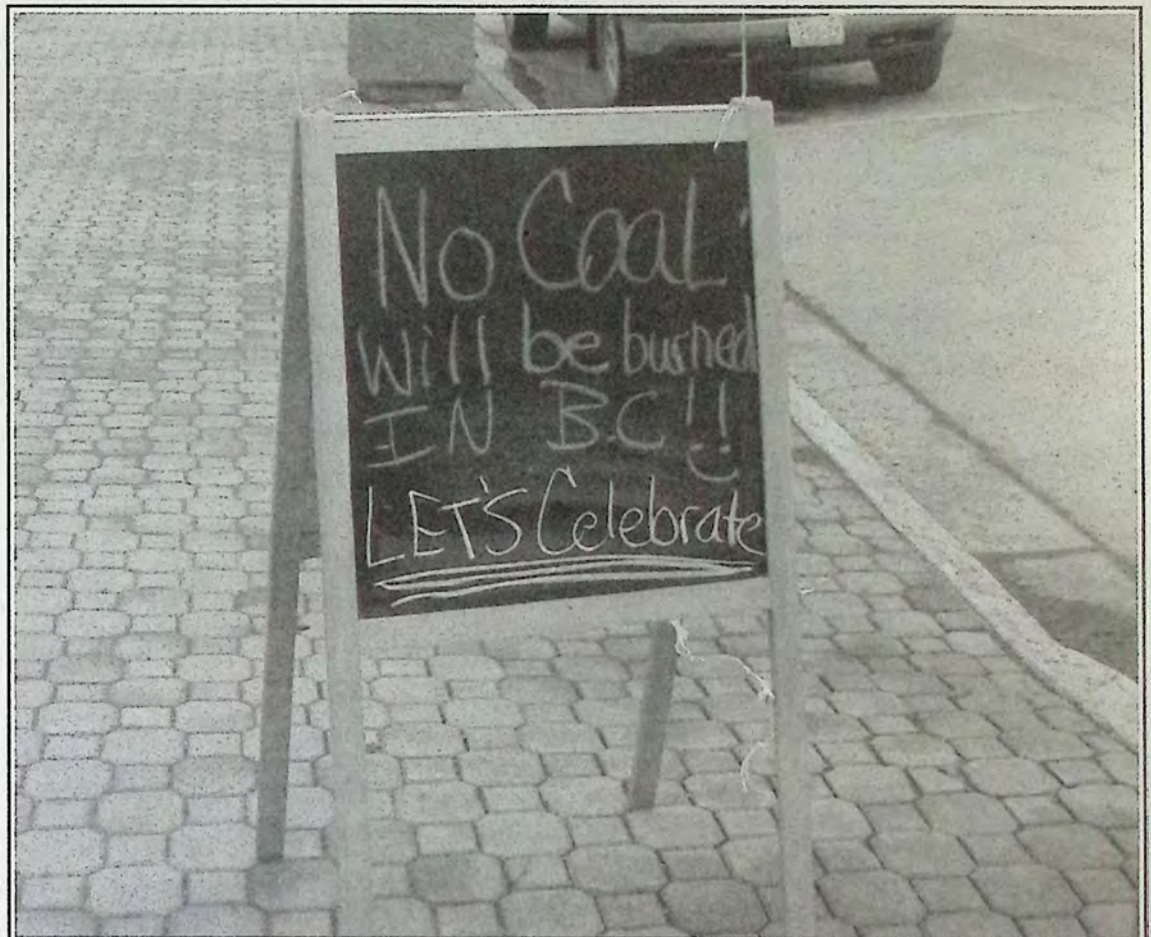

To The Editor,

On February 14, the Victoria Times Colonist wrote, The speech appeared to spell the death knell for coal-fired electricity projects by saying that, effective immediately, B.C. will become the first jurisdiction in North America to require 100 per cent carbon sequestration for any coal-fired project.

The BC Liberals also promised that all electricity produced in BC will be required to have net zero greenhouse gas emissions by 2016.

Last week, our MLA Harry Lali claimed victory for the Similkameen, stating that, Together, the Similkameen Valley residents and the NDP opposition were able to highlight the destruction of dirty coal plants.

Indeed, the death of coal-fired power in Princeton is a welcome relief and a huge victory.

However, as quick as Harry Lali was to claim credit for himself and the NDP, let us not forget the complete story of coal fired power in Princeton.

As early as 2005, Brad and June Hope, along with other local citizens started raising their concerns about coal fired power generation and coalbed methane projects in the Similkameen Valley, followed by repeated calls from the Green Party of BC and the Green Party of

Canada. Together, the issue of the magnitude of the coal plant (then a suspicious 49 MW) was raised, which forced Compliance Energy to delay development by agreeing to a provincial environmental assessment.

However, the battle really didn't get started until Mayor Randy McLean came out swinging against coal power.

Soon, a large group of citizens took on Goliath. This battle started not with Harry Lali and the NDP, who were nowhere to be found at the time and with no particular opinion on coal-fired power.

It was Mayor Randy McLean and Councillor Jim Manion, along with local citizens Brad Hope, John Bosomworth, John Henry, Dan Pippin, Ernie Lawrence, and many more. It was the Friends of the Similkameen and Save Our Similkameen. Not to mention, Keremeos Mayor Walter Despot, the doctors of Princeton, and countless others.

As the Similkameen News Leader pointed out, small towns have loud voices and can make a difference.

So don't be fooled when the NDP and the Liberals claim victory. It was the citizens. It was a Mayor with integrity. It was a community coming together.
