## Wood stove change out program returns!

If you're in the market for a new wood burning appliance, March is a great month to retire your old, smoke-belcher!

The Great Okanagan Wood Stove Change Out Program returned March 1st for its seventh annual four-week run.

The Regional District Air Quality program gives consumers with older inefficient wood stoves a chance to replace them and receive a 15% discount off the price of a new EPA/CSA emission-approved wood, gas, pellet or electric appliance. Customers purchasing pellet, electric or gas inserts for open-hearth fireplaces receive the same discount.

Cash rebates offered by participating manufacturers, distributors and retailers range from \$100 to \$450 depending on the price of the new replacement appliance. Consumers receive the rebate when they surrender their old stove for recycling. No trade-in is required when purchasing an open-hearth fireplace insert.

Over the past six years, the program has resulted in 783 old wood stoves traded in for new cleaner burning EPA emission-approved appliances. That's reduced smoke particulate by approximately 43 tonnes per year.

Approximately 21% of Okanagan/Similkameen homes

(21,654 residences) have an indoor burning appliance; 86% are inefficient conventional wood stoves or masonry fireplaces. These wood burning appliances release approximately 650 tonnes of smoke particulate into the Okanagan and Similkameen Valley each year.

As a result, wood stove smoke is a major contributor to poor air quality. New certified stoves burn 1/3 less wood and reduce smoke by up to 90% compared with older inefficient stoves.

The Wood Stove Change Out is a clean air program of the Central, North and Okanagan-Similkameen Regional Districts.

To Minimize Pollution from your wood burning appliance please follow these simple steps:

- Firewood should be seasoned by splitting and stacking it at least eight months before it is burned. Your woodpile should be covered in a way that keeps rain and snow off but allows air to circulate through it. Dry seasoned wood burns best!

- Burn only clean, dry wood in your wood stove. Never burn green, wet, painted or treated wood including plywood, pressboard, railway ties

or utility poles. Never burn household garbage in your wood stove or fireplace!

- Burn only small bright fires. Start the fire using small pieces of wood kindling, and keep the fire moderately hot, adding larger pieces of split wood as required. Do not damper down the fire too much, as this will produce a smoky, oxygen-starved fire.

- Watch for signs of incomplete burning such as visible smoke coming from your chimney or long, lazy flames in the firebox. When you see these signs, more air is needed to improve your fire. You must open the dampers to allow additional air into the stove.

- Don't burn on fair or poor air-quality days. Your wood smoke will add significantly to the problem, particularly on days of atmospheric inversions and still winds.

- Buy the right stoves for your needs. The most common mistake is choosing a stove too large for the area to be heated. A stove that is too large for your home will have to be dampered down to maintain a comfortable temperature, thus creating smoke and increasing air pollution.

- Don't burn in moderate temperatures. Save your wood for cold days. When you do use your wood stove or fireplace, keep the fire small and bright and only burn clean, dry wood.

- Don't damper down your fire, as this will produce a smoky, oxygen-starved fire. Ensure that you follow

the manufacturer's instructions for the safe operation and maintenance of your particular stove. Check your chimney frequently for creosote buildup; a common cause of house fires.

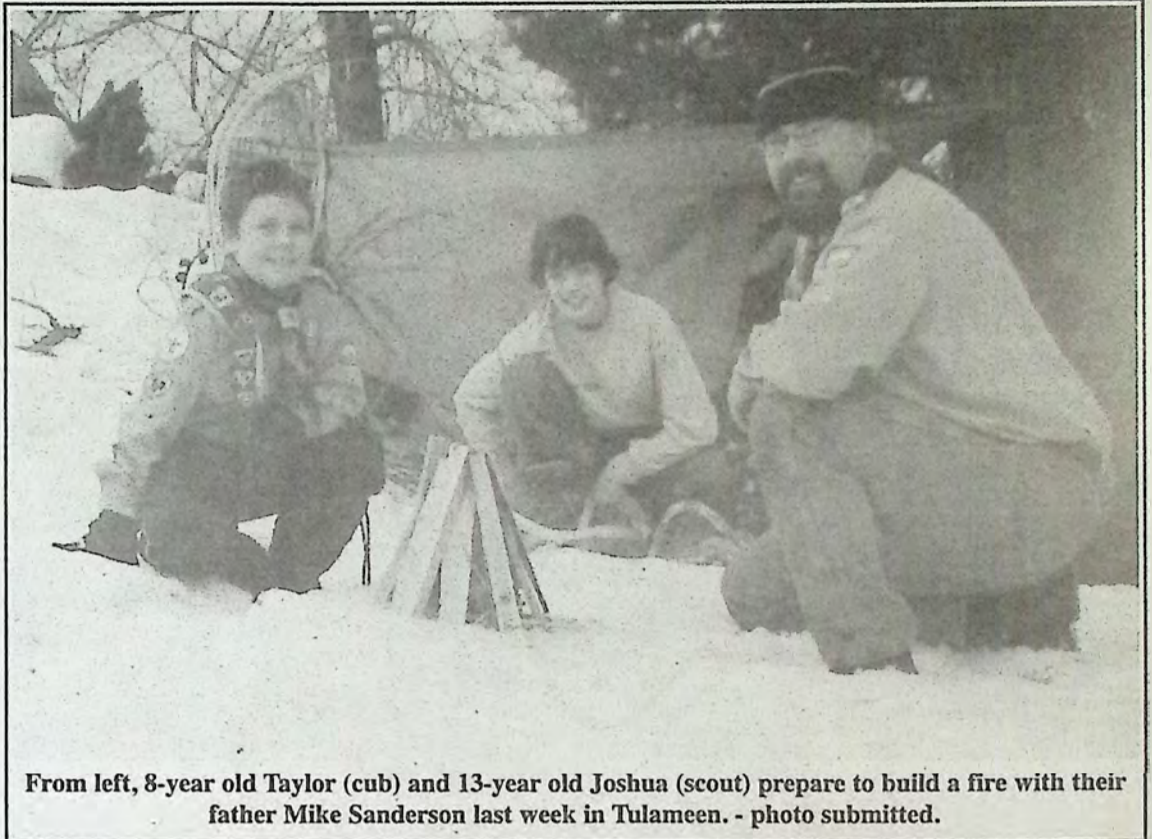

Recently returned to Princeton where he was born and raised, Mike and his wife Rachele with their two boys Taylor and Joshua

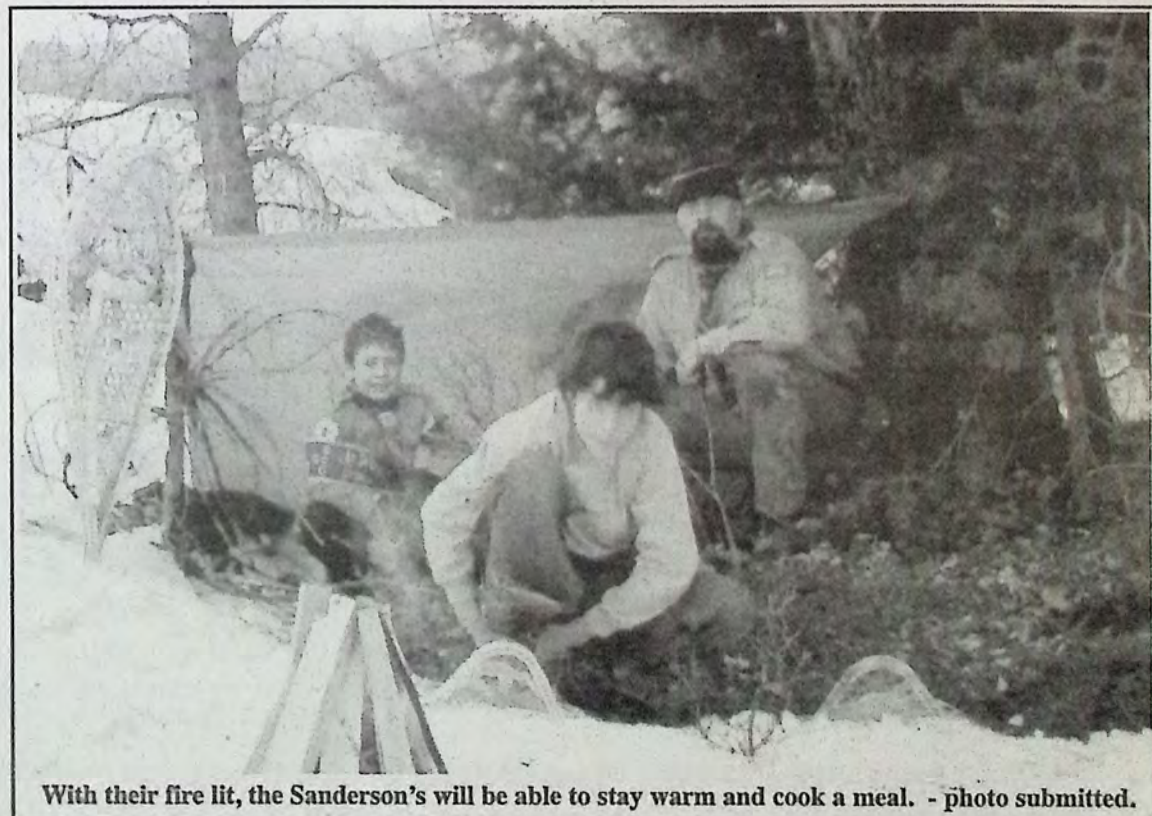
live in Tulameen. Mike is excited to help bring scouting back to Princeton especially this year being the centennial.

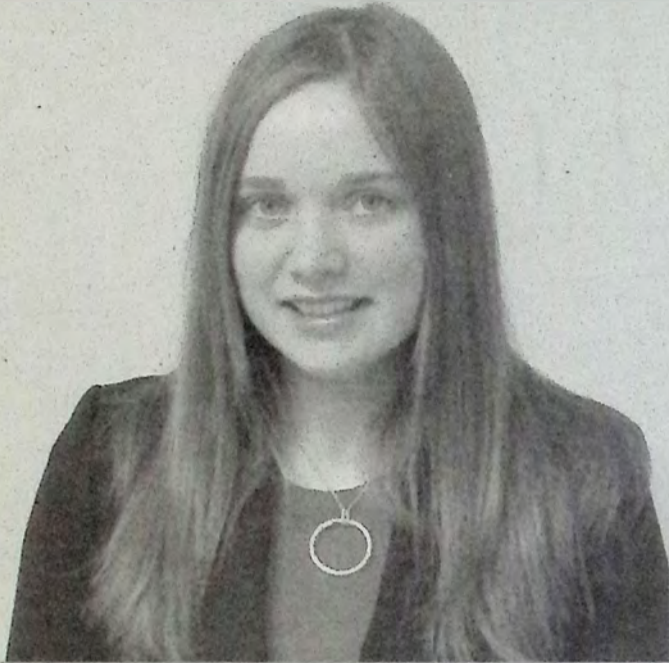

## Town plans airport upgrade

On the recommendation of the Airport Committee, Town Council has agreed to hire Avcon Consulting Ltd. to coordinate a grant application to Transportation Partnerships program.

The provincial government has set aside \$10 million per year for improving airports such as the Princeton airport.

The grant money will be used for surveying, a fuel system, runway lighting, taxiway reflector, ramp floodlights, ramp enlargement, more fencing, and a modular trailer.

Council wants to fast track improvements to the airport but until the money is available, no work will begin.

## Council awards seven year garbage deal

Town Council has awarded a seven year landfill contract to J-R Contracting at a rate of \$158,075 per year.

The Town called for bids on the landfill service and received a number of bids from a variety of companies.

Bids were reviewed on the basis of both qualifications to meet landfill regulations and on cost to the Town.

Bids ranged from nearly \$3 million down to \$149,000 per year on a five year contract.

Most bids were close to \$1 million per year.

The initial bid from J-R Contracting was higher than finally agreed upon, but through negotiations, the Town agreed to extend the contract to seven years if J-R would reduce the cost to the Town.

Over 30,000 Canadians have kidney failure and need dialysis or a transplant to stay alive. There never are enough kidneys to satisfy the demand. March is National Kidney Month in Canada. If you haven't yet filled out an organ donor card, do it today. It could save a life.

It's not recommended that parents give their children under the age of two an antihistamine to help them sleep. The drug, diphenhydramine has been used but new research shows that the drug can actually have a stimulating effect. Talk to your physician if sleep problems continue with your young infant.

### Get into bed to keep fit! Check your mattress health

(NC) - Combining your bed and physical fitness might sound provocative, but it's actually a very simple concept. When we think about our lifestyles and what contributes the most to our fitness levels, we think of regular exercise and good nutrition first. Sadly, we often overlook one of the most important lifestyle elements - proper sleep.

"Whether we're running the Boston Marathon, strolling around the block or even trying to survive a stressful situation at work, our level of physical fitness determines how quickly we can physically and mentally recover from these day-to-day stresses," says Dr. Stacy Irvine, chiropractor, fitness expert on behalf of the Better Sleep Council Canada.

"Our bodies repair themselves during deep sleep, so sleep recovery from physical activity is just as important as the activity itself."

Getting the right amount of sleep will allow you to work (and play) to your utmost potential. Consider these tips for a better sleep and fit-

ness regime:

ⓐ A good workout begins the night before. You need a proper night's sleep to get the energy you need to exercise to your full potential the next day.

ⓑ Try to sleep the same amount of time each night - the average adult needs between seven and eight hours of sleep nightly.

ⓒ Normalize your sleep-wake patterns - try going to sleep and waking up at the same time every day, even on weekends.

ⓓ Avoid taking naps in the afternoon or after exercising.

ⓔ Allow yourself time to wind down: avoid strenuous exercise within three hours of bedtime.

ⓕ If your exercise/sport (like late-night hockey) reduces your hours of sleep, make up for that lost time by getting more hours of sleep as soon as possible.

ⓖ Make time for exercise in your busy schedule. Prioritize and incorporate 30 minutes of activity into your personal routine every day,

from walking to gardening; increase your fitness level with physical activity such as a gym workout at least three times per week.

Waking up with aches and pains? It might not be your workout.

"Canadians rely on sports equipment and apparel to help them keep fit, but considering we spend 2,000 hours each year sleeping on our mattress, we shouldn't neglect this important piece of equipment," says Gary Baskerville of the Better Sleep Council Canada.

"A mattress's life span is about eight-to-ten years, but checking it for proper comfort and support twice a year makes sense, especially if your weight or body mass is changing through exercise. Good health starts with a good night's sleep."

## living past 100

### Cut down your diabetes risk

The big health news recently is the escalation in the number of Canadians diagnosed with Type II diabetes, also known as adult onset diabetes. This escalation is not surprising as our major health problem is obesity. Obesity and diabetes go hand in hand.

The first way to avoid diabetes in adults is to lose weight. Avoid sweets, reduce your consumption of meat products, especially those fatty meats such as sausages, pork and lamb. Avoid foods containing a lot of salt. Read food labels carefully. Avoid alcohol.

Some schools of thought recommend avoiding wheat products.

A history of diabetes in your family may be your early warning system telling you to stay slim and fit.

Diabetes is a deadly disease. A person who develops diabetes is at risk of heart and kidney disease. Most amputations in adults are required to prevent the spread of gangrene in diabetic patients.

People think insulin is the answer to diabetes, and it is the only known "sure" treatment. However, it is not a cure for the problem, and in diabetes, prevention is a far better method of dealing with diabetes than developing the disease.

If there is a history of diabetes in your family, naturopaths recommend taking 200 mcg daily of chromium supplement. This does not mean going out and buying a super multi-vitamin compound, because people likely to develop diabetes cannot deal with a lot of Vitamin A nor certain B vitamins. For those families with a history of diabetes, do not eat your broccoli. Diabetics cannot convert beta carotene into Vitamin A. Diabetics should not take L-cysteine or L-cystine. They should take 1,500 mg. of calcium daily.

The other side of preventing adult onset diabetes is keeping fit through exercise. Exercise promotes adequate circulation and removal of toxins from the blood. Diabetes does damage at the cellular level, so keeping the entire body fit is very important and will help to prevent diabetes.

**Seek professional help**

Your public health service can test you regularly for diabetes, and your doctor can give you plenty of advice and support to help you prevent developing diabetes. Do not hesitate to consult these professionals, along with perhaps a naturopath and nutritionist.

**Attitude and life perspective**

Two studies of patients with adult onset diabetes were done in the past couple of years in the United States. These studies were set up to discover whether or not diabetic patients saw life differently from other people. These studies revealed that diabetics have a lot of hostility toward the world at large. One study noted a higher than normal degree of bitterness about events in their lives.

There were no recommendations about how to overcome feelings of bitterness and hostility, but attitude about life may need some changes if you want to avoid diabetes. Looking into your family's attitudes may be a place to start.

Whether you are hostile and bitter, or not, there is no question that maintaining a sensible body weight and staying fit is your first step toward preventing diabetes.

## Atamanenko supports tariff resolution

Apple Dumping by the U.S. into Canada has had a serious impact on our Growers and NDP Agriculture critic, Alex Atamanenko, MP BC Southern Interior - agrees with Joe Sardhina, President of the BC Fruit Growers that the current process for filing trade complaints against Washington for dumping apples into our market is convoluted, inefficient and expensive.

"By the time the facts are put together and the bureaucratic hoops and hurdles are jumped through the damage is done and the industry is brought to its knees."

Sardhina is presenting a resolution

this week at the Canadian Horticultural Councils annual general meeting in Vancouver calling for improved anti-dumping measures.

"I fully support the BC Fruit Growers resolution to monitor U.S. shipments of apples into Canada in order to keep track of the pricing so that an emergency tariff can be applied before Canadian prices fall too low," stated Atamanenko.

"The fact there is no effective measure in place to protect farmers from this sort of dumping has had a devastating economic impact on our growers. The government has

the power to implement a rapid tariff response on U.S. apple dumping into our market but it is important that pressure is applied from a united front in the industry," said the NDP Agriculture Critic.

"The public can also help apply pressure by expressing to the government their support for this proposal by writing a letter or making a phone call on behalf of the fruit growers in their communities," continued Atamanenko.

"A groundswell of support will go a long way in forcing government to act before the income from another harvest is high-jacked by Washington apple growers."

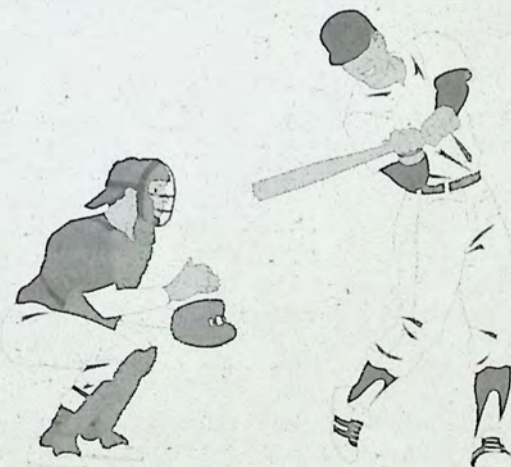

**Trial ends in conviction**

A White Rock man took his impaired driving charge to trial in Provincial Court in Princeton on March 9, maintaining he had not been legally impaired when arrested on May 8, 2005.

David P. Faynor was the subject of a report to police by a Keremeos service station operator. Faynor overshot the pumps when he drove in, then backed up over the curb to align his vehicle with the pump. The attendant believed Faynor had too much too drink.

Police located Faynor's vehicle near Bromley Rock, 17 km. east of Princeton on Highway 3. He was pulled over, and police noted signs of impairment.

They took Faynor to the Princeton detachment office and gave him a breath test from

which readings of .200 and .210 were obtained. Police seized bottles of vodka and coolers and 17 cans of beer from Faynor's vehicle.

At this trial, Faynor testified that he had eaten onions which caused him to belch, but police had not seen him belch. He admitted to having had six bottles of beer that day but said he was driving up to standard.

This testimony contradicted statements made to police at the time of his arrest, when he said he had been up most of the night drinking and then drank beer while he was golfing.

Judge Hogan found Faynor guilty of driving while impaired and sentenced him to pay a \$600 fine and serve a one year driving prohibition.

**Local man pleads guilty**

Justin E. Gee appeared in Provincial Court in Princeton on March 8 to plead guilty to driving with more than .08 blood alcohol. Police had observed a vehicle driving too fast on November 18, 2006.

Gee was subsequently arrested and taken for a breath test. Results of the test indicated blood alcohol levels of .140 and .120. Judge Hogan ordered Gee to pay a \$600 fine and prohibited him from driving for one year.

## Judge Hogan acquits White Rock driver

John McIntosh, a 37 year old man from White Rock, B.C., stood trial on March 9 in Provincial Court in Princeton.

He had been charged on March 6, 2005, with having more than .08 alcohol while in care and control of a vehicle.

McIntosh said he had come to Princeton to put diesel fuel into his vehicle. He was too late for one service station, and did not attempt to find another that sold diesel. Instead, he went to a local pub for "refreshment".

A police officer had seen McIntosh walk unsteadily from the Princeton Hotel bar and asked him where he lived. McIntosh said he had a campsite out of town. The police officer warned him it would be unwise to drive in his condition, and went so far as to take him to a local motel. The officer said the motel sign said the office was still open.

McIntosh told the court he had rung the bell at the motel office once or twice, but nobody came. It was a chilly night, and he felt sick, so he walked back to his vehicle and climbed in to go to sleep. He was awakened by the police officer who arrested him.

Testimony from a tow truck driver indicated the seat of the vehicle had been in a reclining position and the steering wheel had been pushed up. The keys were in a console.

Judge Hogan gave McIntosh the benefit of the doubt, and acquitted him.

## Driver goes to jail

During a routine road check in April 2005, police conducted a roadside breath test on Gary Lind, and he failed the test. He was taken to the detachment office for a standard breathalyser test, and subsequently charged with impaired driving.

Lind disputed the charge in Provincial Court in Princeton on March 9.

He said he had had three drinks with his grandfather and father early in the evening, but had gone home to bed around 7:30 p.m. He was awakened by a friend who

asked him to drive a group of friends home from a local pub. As it was after midnight, Lind said he did not believe he would have been impaired so long after having had the drinks.

Judge Hogan was sympathetic to a point, but found him guilty as charged. The 29 year old truck driver had a prior impaired conviction, so was sentenced to the mandatory 14 days in jail, which he will serve at the Princeton RCMP lock-up on weekends beginning in April. His right to drive is revoked for one year.

## Judge gives a break

An 18 year old Hedley woman appeared in Provincial Court in Princeton on March 9 to plead guilty to a charge of common assault. Kaleigh Fairweather had taken the law into her own hands on October 2, 2006, when she went to the home of another young woman to teach her a lesson.

Fairweather and a friend lured Jennifer McKay out of the residence

where she was babysitting and then attacked her, giving her a bloody nose and a number of bruises.

Fairweather and her friend believed McKay was supplying alcohol and drugs to young people. Fairweather had no prior convictions, and was given a one year conditional discharge, along with a reprimand by Judge Hogan. Fairweather is to have no contact with McKay.

## Driver loses license

In Provincial Court in Princeton on March 8, Destry Willis entered a guilty plea to a charge of driving without due care and attention. On July 16, 2006, a witness reported a collision and stated the driver

appeared to be impaired.

The 28 year old Princeton man was ordered to pay a \$600 fine and 15 percent victim fine surcharge. He is prohibited from driving for one year.

## Man agrees to keep peace

As a result of a domestic dispute, Dave Mack, of Princeton, appeared in Provincial Court in Princeton on March 9 on a charge of common assault.

He agreed to settle with a one year peace bond, during which he is to remove himself from the presence of the complainant at her request.

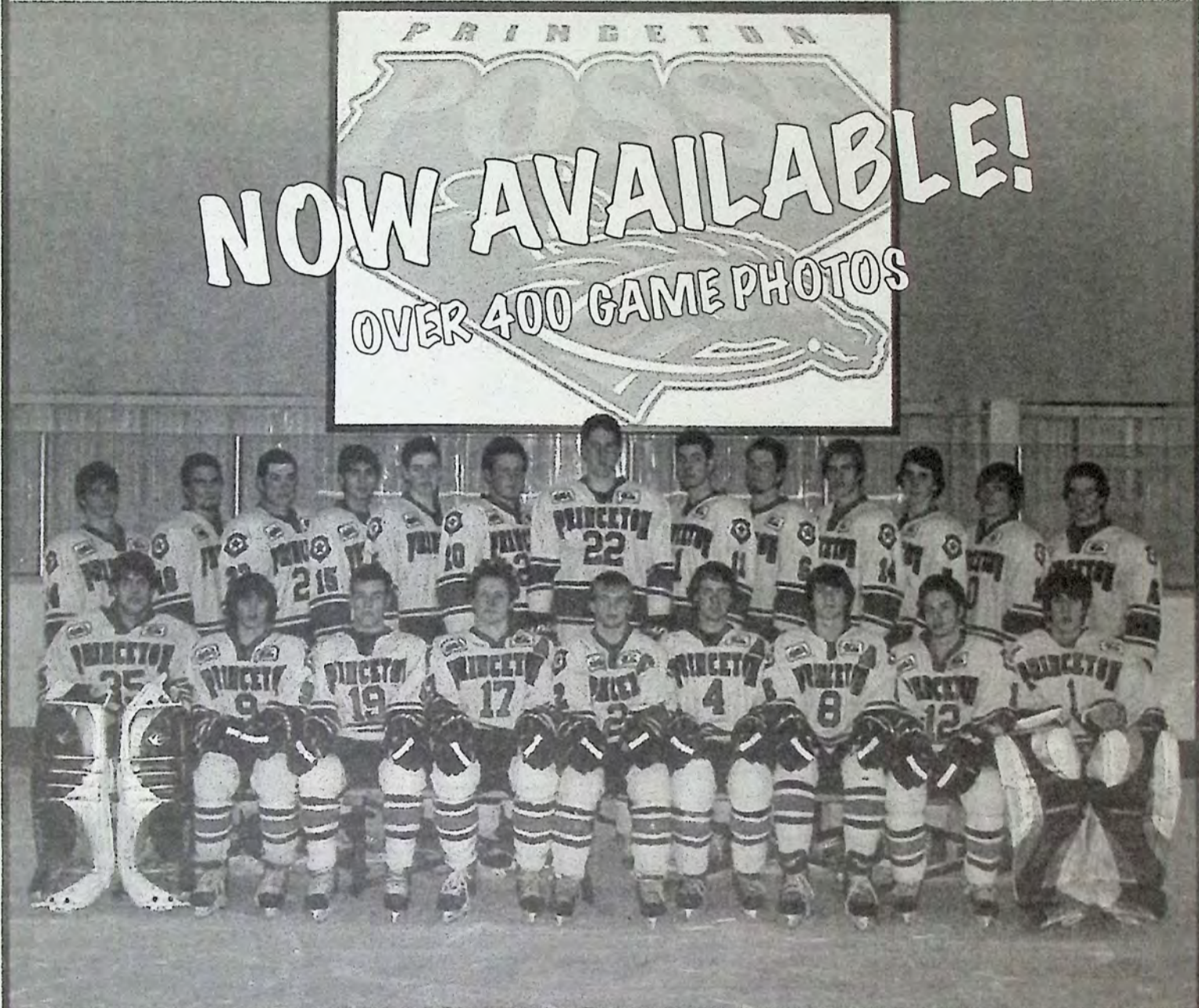

### White Turkey Chili

- 1 lb ground TURKEY (500 g)
- 1 Tbsp vegetable oil (15 ml)
- 1 medium onion, chopped
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 2 tsp chili powder (10 ml)
- 1 tsp dried oregano (5 ml)
- 1/4 tsp cayenne pepper (1 ml)
- 1/2 EACH green and red pepper, chopped
- 3/4 cup turkey or chicken broth (175 ml)
- 1 can (540 ml/19 oz) white kidney beans, drained and rinsed
- 1/2 cup shredded mozzarella cheese (125 ml)
- 1/2 cup low-fat sour cream (125 ml)
- 2 tbsp fresh parsley, chopped (25 ml)

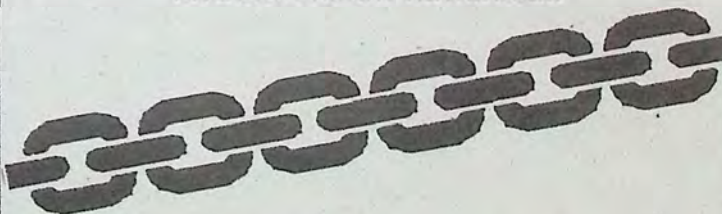

There are more but you get the idea - and in the words of that great rock 'n' roller (Jerry Lee Lewis to be exact) there's a whole lotta shakin' goin' on!

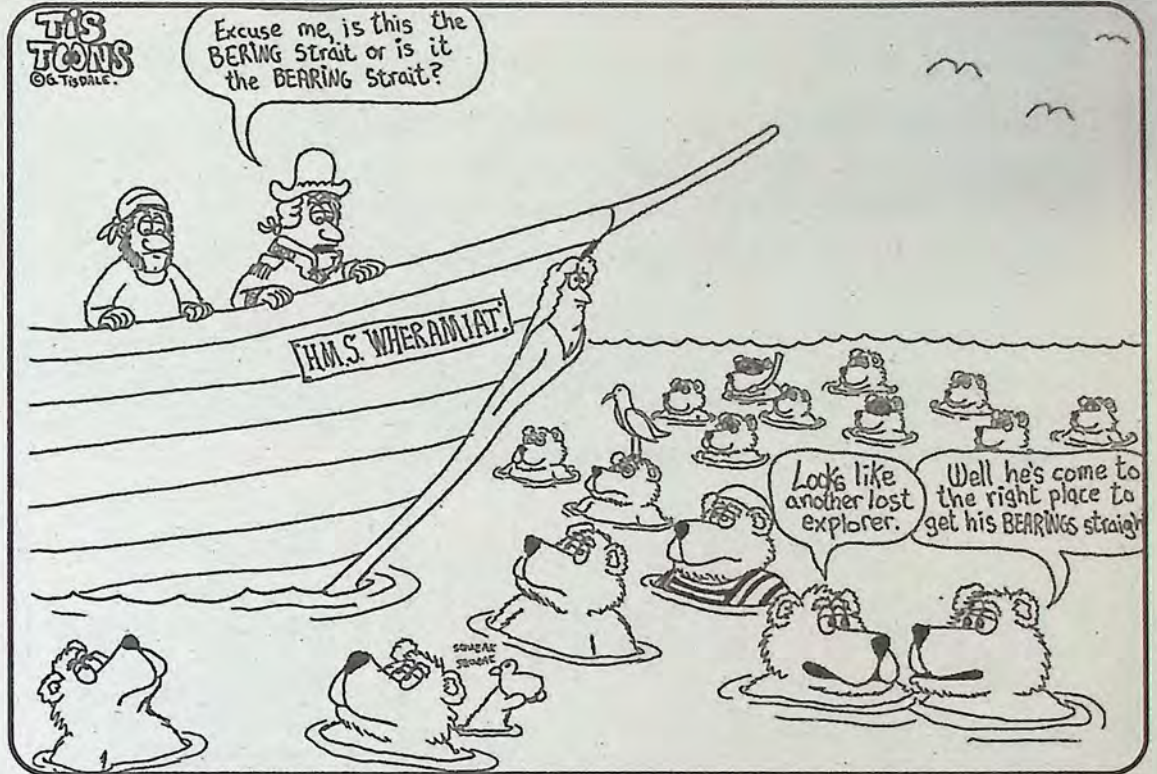

### Reader looks at early childhood programs

To The Editor;

A strong start it ain't! Early childhood programs and services in BC a vast wasteland.

"Up to 80 Strong Start Centers will open in underutilized school spaces over the next year" - Speech from the Throne, February 13th, 2007.

The simultaneous announcement of the expansion of the BC Liberals much-vaunted early childhood initiative, erroneously labeled 'Strong Start,' and the sharp cutbacks in the established provincial network of Child Care Resource and Referral centers for young children in the same Throne Speech, highlights the disarray and confusion around the provincial government's approach to a crucial area of public policy in this province.

In response to uproar from the child care community Linda Reid, Minister of State for Child Care, in a recent back-pedaling email message to resource and referral programs promised to reinstate part of the funding. But \$5 million is still being cut and lay offs of workers and center closures are still going ahead in parts of the province.

Additional cuts for child care operating funding will force operators to raise parent fees and a cap on capital funding for new spaces guarantees that families will languish on wait lists for existing spaces.

Given the conflicting announcements by various ministers over the past three years, the recent disbanding of the interministerial sub committee on early childhood, the

fragmented, ad hoc approach to the use of federal funds awarded last year by Ottawa, the slashing of funding to provincial resource centers that helped families find childcare spaces and the current jurisdictional split between Tom Christensen's Ministry of Children and Family Development, Linda Reid's Ministry of State for Child Care and Shirley Bond's Ministry of Education we now find ourselves in early childhood disarray.

By comparison with jurisdictions in Britain and France and, closer to home, in Quebec and Ontario it is no exaggeration to say that given three decades of research and practice in this area, when it comes to planning and implementing a comprehensive continuum of quality care and learning programs and initiatives in early childhood BC is close to being in the Dark Ages.

It is ironic that the self same speech from the throne that boasted about the progress in working for pre-schoolers and about making BC "the most literate jurisdiction in North America" pointedly contained the following statement: "It is widely recognized that early learning experiences and development play a major role in the child's later academic success. Currently, approximately 25 per cent of children (in BC) are not ready to learn when they enter kindergarten."

The launch last year of pilot 'Strong Start' programs of which there are 15 currently in operation, according to Susan Kennedy, the provincial coordinator, who works

out of the ministry of education, is off to a good start.

However, closer examination of these programs, of which there is little or no information on the ministry's web site, and no written evaluation available, indicates that they are simply 3 hour drop in programs for parents or care givers and as Ms. Kennedy was at pains to stress they are "not pre school or child care programs."

While there are many models for early childhood programs in existence, 'Strong Start,' modeled on a Toronto School Board program, should be viewed as merely a marginal intervention in the comprehensive early childhood continuum needed in BC. This was forcefully underlined by the hundreds of angry child care protesters in front of the legislature in Victoria when the House resumed sitting.

And school boards, or rather newly-named boards of education will, under an upcoming 'expanded mandate,' be responsible for 'Strong Start' programs if they avail themselves of the measly \$20,000 in funding (with \$30,000 in start-up funding). According to Ms. Kennedy no decision on ongoing funding has been established, so school boards beware!

The 'excessive demands' placed on some of these 'Strong Start' centers, as noted by Ms. Kennedy, highlights the current crisis in child care in BC. This essential component of any worthwhile, quality, early childhood program, was forcefully rejected by the BC Liberals during their first mandate

# New trend: people abandon city life

A growing trend in the United States is people moving from metropolitan areas to rural areas and small towns. This is a move for safety, and realtors are saying it was the attack on the World Trade Towers on September 11, 2001, that started people thinking about a move to a safer environment.

Cities are better targets for terrorists. Centers of business and transportation, with high population, ensure terrorists the highest level of impact from a bomb or missile, or any other form of attack. Rural areas, with their small towns, do not present the same kind of target, and people will see this as "safe" in comparison.

It is an interesting trend in relocation, and a trend recommended 20 years ago by environmentalists studying the impact of cities on air, water and soil quality. Sociologists went along eagerly with the environmentalists, saying the small town environment is socially healthier than the city environment.

The B.C. government, under Bill Vander Zalm, agreed with the reduction of city size on the basis that it is less costly to government due to reductions in need for urban transit, water supply, and welfare.

There are sectors of our society who did not want to hear that news due to a vested interest in city growth. These are large retailers, businesses supplying services, and city councils. The notion of reduction of city size never really caught on 20 years ago.

What really counts is what people do, not what studies say they ought to do. If people choose to move out of the city, the city can do nothing to stop them.

What do families find when they leave the city?

First, they find cleaner air due to less traffic. Then they find more outdoor recreational activities are close at hand. Due to a big reduction in commuting time, they have more time at home with the family, more time to spend making friends and participating in community activities.

They find they earn less money, but houses cost less, and taxes are lower. They may earn less, but they need less.

For families with children, there are added bonuses. Schools are often eager for more students and the youngsters have more opportunity to participate in sports activities which were out of the family's price range in the city.

For retired couples, there are different social advantages in moving from the city.

First, the city home can be sold at a much higher price than the small town house commands, leaving money in the bank for greater security or for travelling.

Second, older folk may not have to drive through congested traffic to go shopping or to visit a physician or clinic.

No place is totally safe, but there are distinct advantages to living in a small town or rural area. The crime rate is generally very low, because everybody knows everybody, at least to see them. The reduction in traffic means less likelihood of being involved in a collision while commuting.

Rural areas and small towns were abandoned for the city many years ago. Perhaps we will see the trend reversed in the future. If we do, we shall see people living in a healthier environment.

It was a great article, half a page in length, and a large - and I must say great - picture of me in my uniform leaning against my ambulance and smiling. My peers were making comments about the article and about me in the article and sometimes just about me all day long. I was too say, at the least, pleased with the article and purchased 750 copies of the paper, not really, but I did purchase a few.

It was the day after the paper came out that my partner and I responded a call to an apartment block where a lady was having some abdominal problems. I was that attendant and so I took her vital signs as my partner readied the stretcher for transport to the hospital. Just as we were about to move her from the couch to our stretcher, she said that she was going to be sick. Looking for something handy for her to throw up in and no container was in sight and wanting to protect the carpet, my partner grabbed a newspaper that was close by. The year went by very quickly and my supervisor called me into his office and told me that the contest had been dropped due to funding.

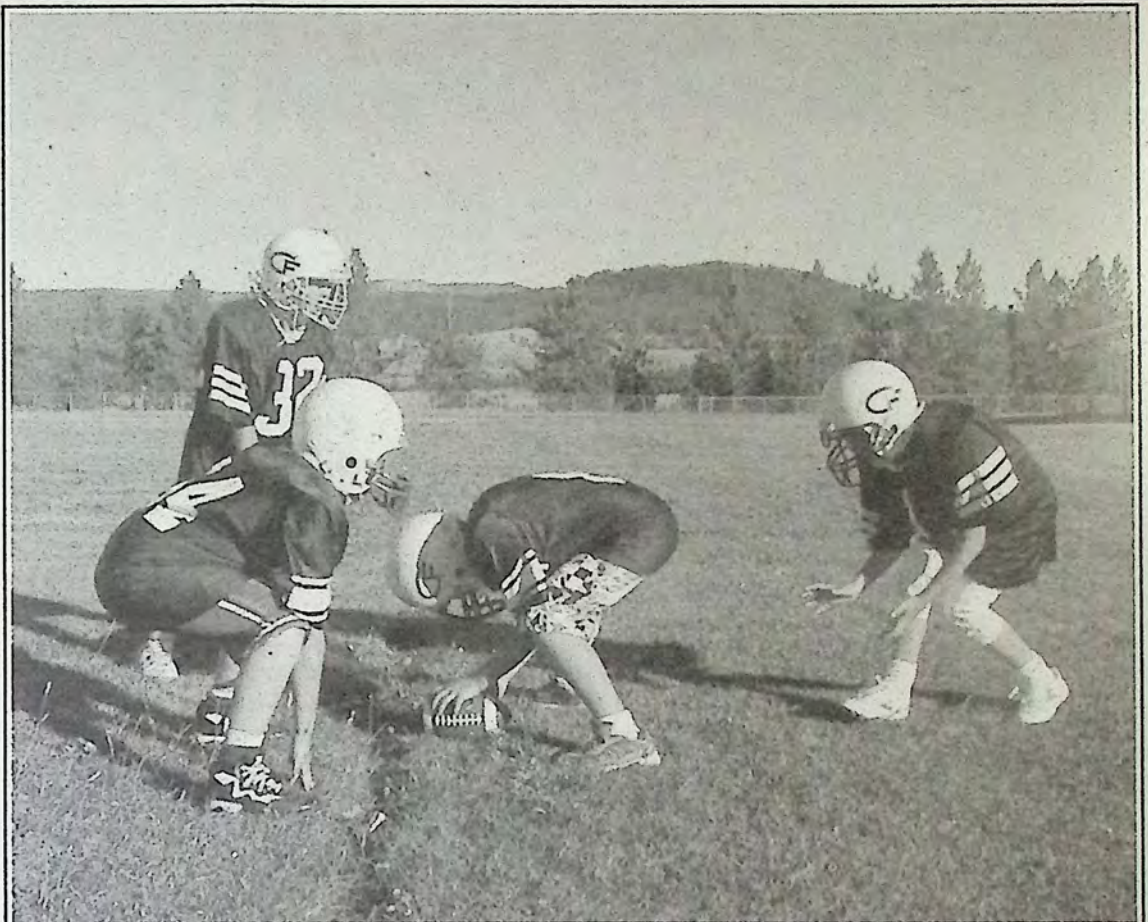

Question: Does everyone have to pay the 1% tax when you buy a property?

First let's look at what the tax actually is. This is a Property Transfer Tax. The key word here is "Transfer." A transfer would include, for an example, parents adding their son or daughter to the title of their home. It would also include adding a new spouse or partner to your title.

There is one possible exception. It is called the First Time Home Buyer exemption. In order to qualify all of the following must apply.

- a Canadian citizen or permanent resident as determined by Immigration Canada,
- a person who has resided in British Columbia for 12 consecutive months immediately prior to the date of registration or transfer, or who has filed two income tax returns as a BC resident within the last six years,
- a person who has never, at anytime held interest in a principle residence anywhere in the world, and,
- a person who has not previously received an FTHB exemption or refund.

..... continued from Page 22 and by Stephen Harper's Conservatives with the latter's \$100 a month cheque to pre school parents—called a housekeeping allowance by some critics — in lieu of child care. It seems that there are clear ideological bases for these rejections.

But what about pre-school education programs in this province with one in four kids arriving in BC schools, by the ministry of education's own admission, ill-prepared for formal schooling?

We are truly looking at a vast wasteland.

Thousands of kids by the time they arrive in Grade 1 with their variations in oral language, vocabulary and comprehension so great that it is difficult for classroom teachers to narrow the gap between children who are more or less ready to learn in a formal setting.

Compare BC with the early childhood infrastructure in Ontario for the past decade where carefully researched and proven programs for 4 and 5 year old pre-schoolers

with an emphasis on literacy and numeracy are now an integral part of the public school system in that province.

BC, with the highest child poverty rate in Canada, currently does not have a single pre-kindergarten class for 4 year olds in our public schools funded directly by Victoria.

Yet both the research and practice strongly supports structured and developmentally appropriate intervention for poor kids, and indeed for all other kids, at this key juncture in their early lives.

The continuation of limited and discriminatory admission to all-day kindergarten programs (only ESL, First Nations and special needs children are funded) is also an affront to equality of educational opportunity.

And handing out books to preschoolers and developing parent guides while welcome in themselves do not an early childhood program make. Neither does the recent, one-off, grant of \$12 million to the BC School Trustees

Association for promotion of pre school programs by school boards constitute a substantial initiative.

Unwilling to make a major, comprehensive, and long term investment in early childhood education programs, the fragmented and sometimes overlapping policies of two separate ministries under the BC Liberals undermines the future of thousands of children about to enter our public schools.

In his recently released and excellent book on early childhood education entitled, 'Building Blocks,' subtitled: Making Children Successful in the Early Years of School, researcher Gene Maeroff of Columbia University notes that his impressions, "formed over decades of observation in classrooms, that students may have a lifetime of troubles awaiting them if schools don't get it right at the beginning."

BC has yet to get it right at the beginning.

**Claim your medical expenses on the return of the spouse with lower net income**

You should claim the total medical expenses for both you and your spouse or common-law partner on one tax return. You can claim the medical expenses on either spouse's tax return. If both spouses have taxable income, it is usually better to claim the medical expenses on the return with the lower net income. This is because the lesser of \$1,844 (federal, for 2005) or 3% of net income is deducted from the medical expenses to determine the amount to be used for the tax credit. However, if the lower income spouse does not have enough tax payable to offset the medical expense tax credit, it may be beneficial to move the expenses to the higher income spouse.

Tax Tip: Claim all medical expenses on the tax return of one spouse.

Allowable medical expenses include, but are not limited to, eyeglass frames and lenses and contact lenses prescribed by a medical practitioner.

Premiums paid to a private health services plan, such as extended health benefits or a dental plan, other than those fees paid by an employer. Fees paid for a provincial health care plan do not qualify. If a person is self-employed, the premiums paid for a private health services plan can be deducted from self-employment income, instead of being claimed as a medical expense. This would result in greater (or at least equal) tax savings.

Premiums paid for medical coverage during trips out of the country.

Transportation service costs, where the taxpayer has to travel at least 40 km to the location where the required medical services are provided, as long as substantially equivalent medical services are not available in the taxpayers locality. If the taxpayer has been certified by a medical practitioner to be incapable of traveling without the assistance of an attendant, then the transportation service costs of the attendant may also be claimed. If the taxpayer has to travel at least 80 km for the medical services, then reasonable travel expenses (meals, lodging, vehicle expenses) may also be claimed. The travel costs can be calculated by keeping all receipts, or by using the CRA meal expense allowance and vehicle cost per kilometre amounts. See the CRA webpage on travel expenses.

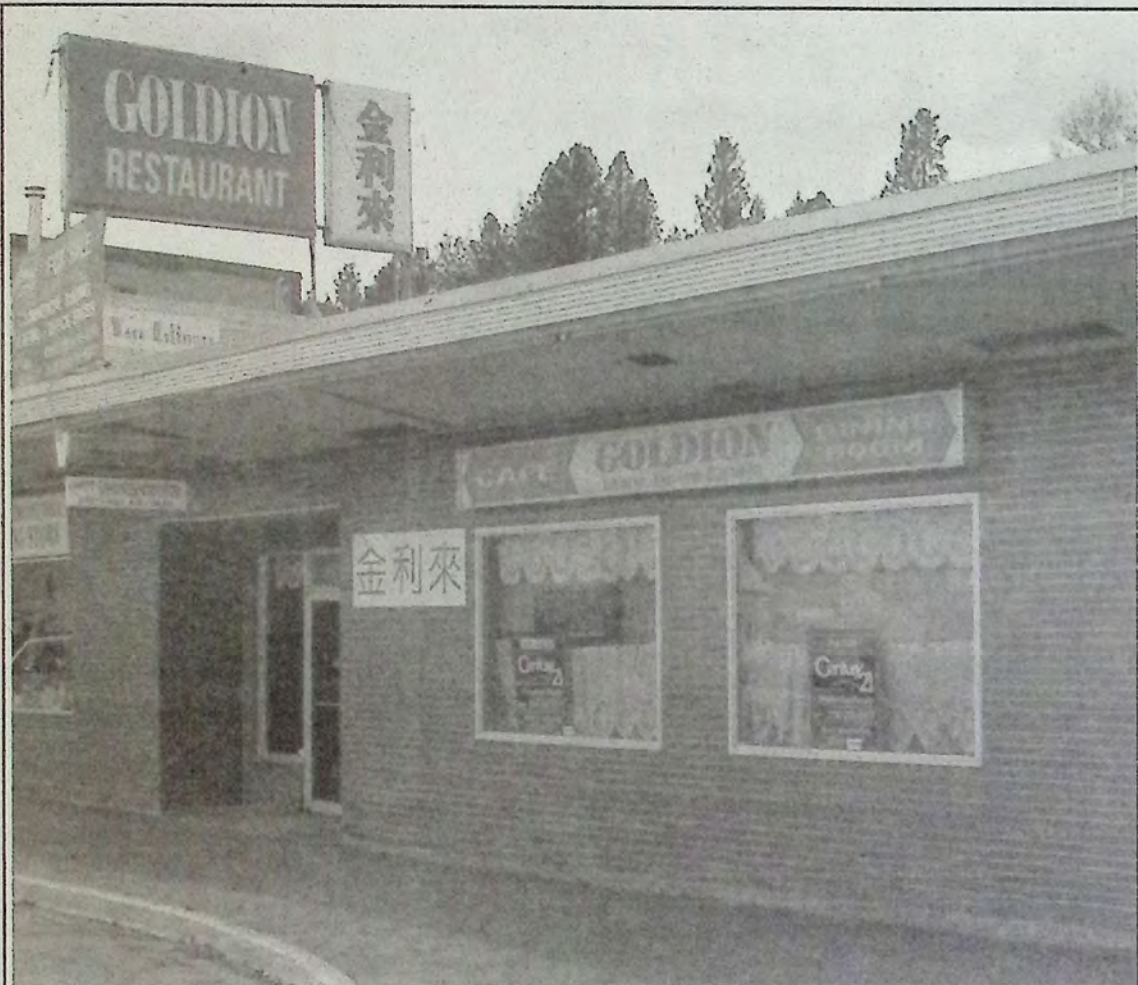

## Town buys former restaurant

The Town of Princeton has purchased the former Goldion Restaurant as part of a plan to expand cultural services for Princeton residents. The \$270,000 property located at 107 Vermilion Avenue currently houses the Crisis Assistance store and H & R Block. These tenants will remain in place. The restaurant section will be renovated for an expanded library at an estimated cost of \$350,000. The Regional Library will rent the space from the Town.

In making the announcement at

the March 5 Town Council meeting, Mayor Randy McLean said, "This is a super location. It lends itself to the upgrading of our downtown."

This remark referred to ongoing plans to re-align Vermilion Avenue and create a new "town square" concept.

When the new library is established, the present library space will become part of Princeton Museum.

Mayor McLean stated, "I believe Princeton Museum is the anchor of

our tourism."

Mayor McLean thanked Councillor Maria Sadegur for her "relentless search" for accommodation of an expanded library to facilitate a museum expansion.

The renovations at 107 Vermilion Avenue are scheduled to begin in 2008 with relocation of the library in late 2008 or early 2009. In 2008, Princeton Museum will mark its fiftieth anniversary, says Nick Mills, museum operations manager. He sees a busy couple of years ahead.

## Museum announces plans

Following on the news that the Regional Library's Princeton Branch is to relocate to a new site Princeton and District Museum and Archives Society can reveal their proposed plans for an expanded and improved facility.

When the Library moves premises it is proposed that long overdue renovations be carried out on the complete Museum/Library building. This will include electrical, heating and air-conditioning, flooring, washrooms including disabled facilities, and a staff room.

The internal general layout will be altered to include several major new innovations.

These will include sections dedicated to the Natural History, First Nations, an Underground Mine and a special room where fluorescent minerals of the Pollard Collection will feature.

In addition a new research room will be available for visitors to study requested archival material and have direct computer access

to the Museums own data bases such as those relating to historic dates in Princeton's History, Cemetery records and records of Princeton residents dating back to 1900.

In preparing the new and detailed displays help and guidance will be sought from other area organizations, such as the Upper Similkameen Indian Band, to ensure accurate material and information is used.

Part of the reorganization of the Museum will include the upgrading of the Stable Block, including

the restoration of the electricity supply, to enable a feature on Transport in Princeton over the years. This will be centered on the historic Welby stagecoach, but will also include the story of the two railways, the Kettle Valley (CP) and the Vancouver, Victoria and Eastern (GN) and their influence in Princeton's development.

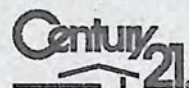
Overall costs for building renovations and alterations, together with new and improved display facilities will be in the region of \$300,000.
