Town Council ignores TILMA threat

Princeton Town Council has had several letters regarding the threat of TILMA, but has chosen to "receive and file" which means Council sees no harm in an inter-provincial deal called TILMA. The Council of Canadians, the Canadian Union of Public employ-

ees (CUPE) and the Canadian Centre for Policy Alternatives are fighting TILMA, but you have probably heard little or nothing about it. The reason you have heard so little is due to two factors: 1. the public was not consulted and 2. the major media has treated it as a mat-

ter not worth reporting.

TILMA is the Trade, Investment and Labour Mobility Agreement. It came into effect on April 1 this year, with no fanfare. The agreement's purpose, officially, is to break down all of the economic barriers between Alberta and B.C., although other

provinces can join into the agreement if their governments choose to do so.

On the surface, TILMA looks harmless. However, it strikes a death blow to many areas of democratic decision-making. For example, the agreement limits the powers

of municipalities, regional districts, health boards and school boards to establish regulations according to local desires. Furthermore, if local governments pass bylaws that can be shown to restrict or impair trade, investment or labour mobility, that government can be sued.

There are many regulations imposed by government that could be shown to restrict or impair trade or investment. For example, a school board may adopt a policy of allowing no junk food vending machines in local schools. This would be a restriction of trade. Our government automobile insurance does not permit other automobile insurances, and our cheap medical insurance restricts the ability of other health insurance companies from competing. Building codes, zoning bylaws, water use restrictions, and all sorts of policies may be disputed by corporate entities claiming the playing field is not level.

Government programs and Crown corporations, by their very nature, restrict investment. Could this be why our government wants to sell B.C. Hydro?

When I was a kid growing up in the Peace Country, I spent, like many a farm kid, spare time on the hot summer afternoons playing on the edges of a creek that ran through our property. The creek was surrounded by tall leafy poplars and the cool banks were slick with mud that had been shaped into all manner of slides that ran into the creek. The day and age being what it was, on odd days we would load up the pick up truck with neighbour kids (usually the oldest kid drove, license or no, and heaven help you if anything happened to the truck) and drive the dirt gravel road to the Dugout.

Now, the Dugout wasn't much

more than a pond. A very small pond. It had a dock that always looked as though it was on the verge of collapse, and we always brought a bag of salt to help with the leaches afterwards. It seemed that there were hundreds of such places dotting the landscape as far as a six year old mind could imagine.

When I was an older kid I remember reading Isaac Asimov's fantastical stories about far away worlds, worlds where water was a commodity that wars were fought over, a commodity people died for. He even had a slave planet where the masses were controlled by water rations.

Science Fiction. Never in my life did I imagine that the sale of water would come to pass. Growing up in The Peace, seemed like you couldn't walk thirty feet without falling into a water

hole, creek, or river of some kind. Yet here I am. I am not halfway through my time, and water - something that is necessary for life - has surpassed the cost of gasoline, a commodity that while necessary, is not inimical to existence in the same way. What has not come to pass is the elevation and prioritization of those things that are necessary for our survival as a species and this planet. We are at the phase in human history where we treat water as a commodity, a bargaining chip, only because we seem to fail to grasp the true value. In this time of global warming, with elevated pollution, and drought coupled with ever increasing pollution, clean potable water will be priceless - because we can't live without it. Period. How much would you pay?

The growing concern in Canada over this issue is that when water is

sold even once it becomes a open market commodity and the government cannot stop its sale in the future. Now that we're trading in water, we will never be able to remove water from the global market. This applies to the water from Canada's lakes and rivers, fueling fears over the possible destruction of Canadian ecosystems and water supply - courtesy of NAFTA.

Firstly, this is an issue of control. Who owns all the water and trees on crown land? We do. The public does. Supposedly, these things are commons that are held in trust by the crown for us. Then, we elect politicians who go forth from Ottawa and trade it all away for the sake of a greasy buck (or for nothing at all if it's trade headed south). It's a problem at a federal level, and it's a problem at a municipal level. continued on Page 12

..... continued from Front Page government matter to be resolved at government levels. You would be wrong. You, as a taxpayer, are an investor in B.C. Hydro and other Crown corporations. Your taxes should have given you shares. You are an investor in the

Corporation of the Town of Princeton through your taxes, if you pay taxes to the Town.

What else could be challenged? Government standards on the operation of care residences for the elderly, disabled, or developmentally impaired persons, could be

seen to be too strict and therefore a restriction on a corporation wishing to invest in private care residences. Government regulations that set standards for private schools could be challenged in court as restrictive. Standards set for private surgery or health services could be

challenged.

If you love the environment and want to protect it, you should be concerned. Here are some regulations that, under TILMA, could be taken to court: designation and protection of ecological reserves, environmental assessments of projects

like ski resorts or coal-fired power plants, regulations regarding air pollution, regulations on the use of pesticides or ozone depleting products, regulation of tourism to protect ecologically sensitive areas.

TILMA specifies some areas exempt from coverage by the agreement: water, aboriginal people, energy, forestry and mining. Here are what is not exempt, and could be subject to challenge: health, education, agriculture, tourism, parks, heritage conservation, consumer protection, land use planning. If government loses, the law is struck down.

Local governments can fight back by showing regulations have a "legitimate objective". However, the list of legitimate objectives does not include bylaws to provide recreational areas, or mandates to provide education, nor policies for enhancing the lives of citizens.

The worst effect of TILMA is the reversal of roles between government and corporations. Under our present system, government makes rules the people see as necessary or desirable: Under TILMA, corporate interests define the regulations (or lack thereof) under which they will operate. The power of the people has been given away by the governments of B.C. and Alberta, and there are some other provinces eager to do the same thing. Not only are other Canadians interested in doing away with people power, there is a keen American interest in adding U.S. to the list of those in the agreement.

TILMA does not reach its full power until April 1, 2009, after which no new regulations may be made if they do not comply with TILMA's objectives.

There is only one way to change this future, and that is to get rid of the government that signed the deal and have a new government withdraw from it.

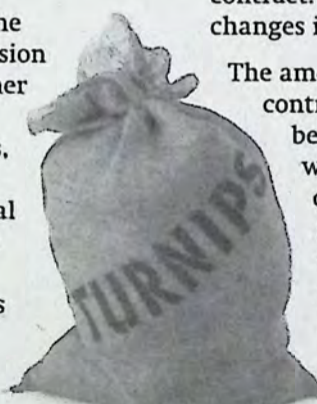
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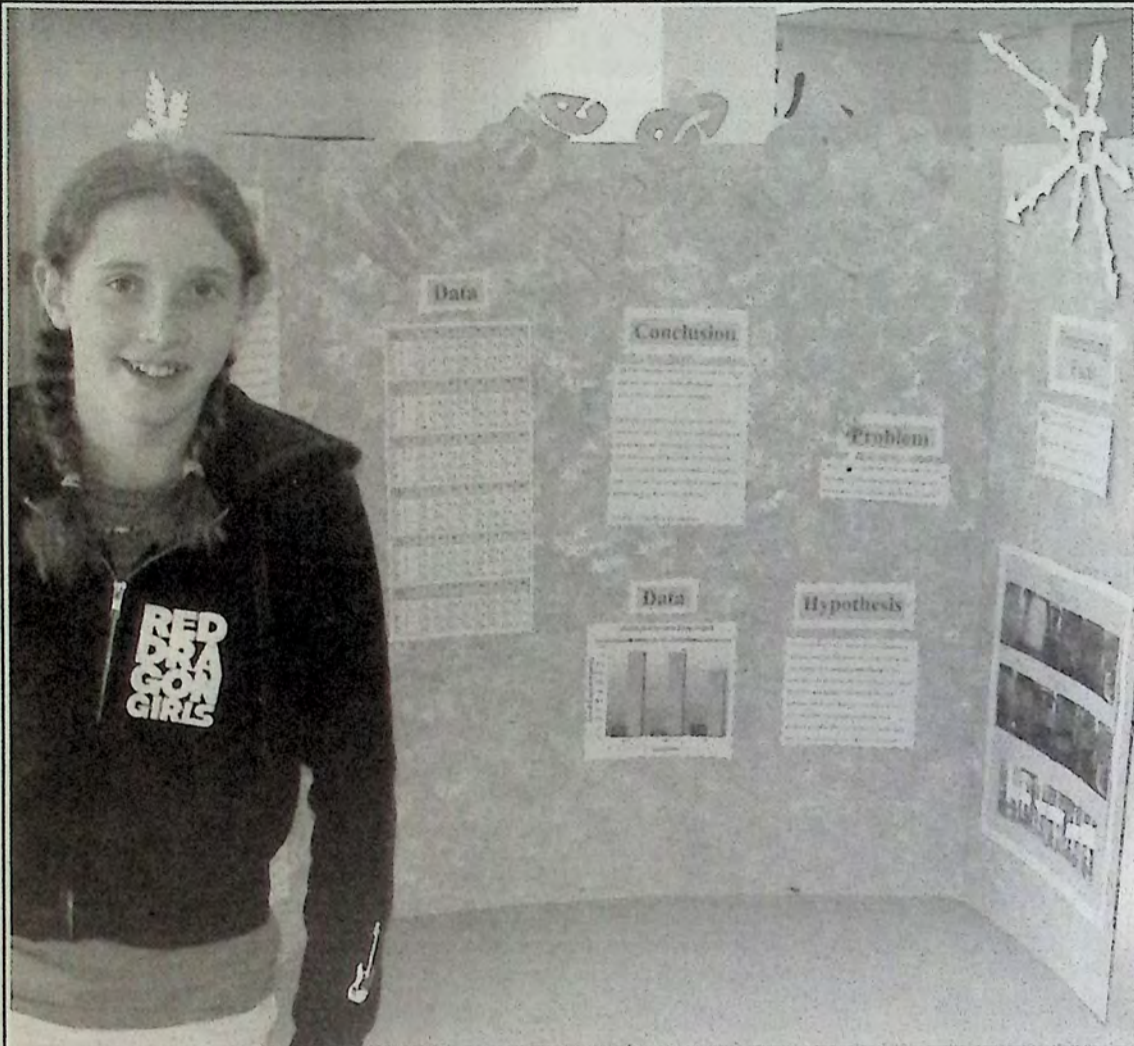

RDOS announces bulky item pickup

It's time for spring cleaning, and your curbside garbage and recycling collection program is ready to help!

The annual curbside bulky item pickup commences April 23rd and runs for three weeks throughout the Regional District Okanagan-Similkameen, the City of Penticton, the Town of Oliver and the Village of Keremeos. This event is extremely popular with residents, and is the only one like it in BC's Southern Interior.

Residents may place two pieces of furniture or appliances at the curb by 7:00 AM Monday for pick-up during their designated week.

As many items as possible will be recycled, including metal appliances, wooden items and mattresses. Items must weigh less than 90kg (200 lb) and no elec-

tronics will be accepted.

In the first week from April 23rd to 28th, trucks will be on the road collecting bulky items from Penticton and its outlying areas, such as Naramata, Kaleden, West Bench and Carmi.

In the following week, from April 30th to May 5th large items will be collected at the curb in Oliver, Rural Oliver, the Cawston area, and Green Mountain Road near Apex.

In the final week from May 7th to 12th, trucks will be collecting bulky items throughout the corridor from Hedley through Keremeos and Olalla to Okanagan Falls and down to Vaseux Lake. For residents who miss this annual collection event however, there's a new alternative that is actually a better choice environmentally. The RDOS has

joined forces with the Regional District of Central Okanagan to sponsor a new website that serves residents of the Okanagan and Similkameen, called www.OkanaganReuses.com.

Items to be given away or sold for a nominal fee can be listed here for free.

Beth Cavers, Solid Waste Management Coordinator for the Regional District Okanagan-Similkameen is delighted with this new option.

"Recycling requires energy to reprocess old materials into new ones," she says.

Reuse is a much better option for the environment as the energy investment is minimal to zero. The new website is just getting going, but Cavers expects the number of online listings to skyrocket as word of the new site gets out.

"It's a great way to get your unwanted stuff to someone who needs it," Cavers says.

Although spring cleaning will still require all the usual scrubbing and organizing, these two services will definitely make the process go much more smoothly.

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

Tips to pack away winter clothing and equipment

(NC) - With the warm weather just ahead, it is time to pack away those bulky Winter sweaters and snow shovels and make way for the gardening equipment, shorts and t-shirts. Winter tools and clothes can take up loads of storage room. However, with organizational suggestions from The Home Depot Canada, storing the 'heavy stuff' is a breeze. Pre-game warm up key to enjoying first round of the season

(NC) - Golf season is just around the corner and whether you're a veteran to the game or stepping up to the tee for the first time, pre-game preparation is the key to a solid - and safe - season-opening round.

"People are so anxious to get out on the course, they often don't take the time beforehand to properly prepare themselves," says Barry Wallis, on-staff golf professional with Callaway Golf Canada. "Suddenly, a strained muscle or sore back keeps them off the course for weeks afterward."

Before playing your first full round, Wallis suggests hitting the range with a bucket of balls - but just one bucket.

leading off with half wedges, then full wedges, then work your way up from a nine-iron to driver.

Once you've made it to the first tee, be sure to stretch - good advice for every round and not just your first of the year, says Wallis.

Pre-game stretching helps loosen muscles to prepare your body for the task at hand; it improves your driving distance and swing power, and will help to minimize any stiffness you might experience the next day. Here are three easy, on-the-course stretches to get you game ready.

Back Rotation

Standing with your golf club behind your back and across your shoulders, slowly rotate your upper body to one side as far as comfort-

ably able, keeping your hips square and feet flat on the ground. Hold for 10 seconds then slowly rotate in the opposite direction and hold for another 10 seconds. Repeat three to five times.

Trunk Side Bend

Holding your golf club at each end, above your head, slowly lean to one side. Hold for 10 seconds, then slowly lean to the other side and hold for another 10 seconds. Repeat three to five times.

Hip Abduction

Holding onto a golf cart, cross the leg closest to the cart behind you. Keeping your back leg straight, slowly lean hip toward cart. Hold for 10 seconds, switch sides and hold for another 10 seconds. Repeat three to five times. - News Canada

Eat fish, be happy

There is a strange correlation between eating fish and being happy. Medical researchers have discovered that the omega-3 fatty acids in fish counteract other factors which may cause depression.

Omega-3 fatty acids are found not only in fish, but also in flax seed, canola oil, walnuts, avocados, and leafy green vegetables. The highest levels of omega-3 are found in sea fish.

Omega-3 fatty acids are available in supplement form and are often referred to by abbreviations of the variety of omega-3 components: EPA, DHA and ALA. These have a positive effect on the brain.

Higher levels of omega-3 mean lower rates of depression, post-partum depression and seasonal affective disorder (SAD). Researchers have found that depressed people have lower levels of omega-3 fatty acids in their blood and fat.

Medical research has found that adding omega-3 fatty acid supplements along with anti-depression medication shows significant improvement in mood over anti-depression medication on its own.

Fish has always been called "brain food", but medical research backs up that old saying. Omega-3 fatty acids found in marine fish significantly improve brain function when added to the diet of people lacking omega-3. Add marine fish, walnuts, canola oil and leafy greens to your diet for better mood control and happier days.

Judge lays jail on the line

Donavin Costa appeared in Provincial Court in Princeton on April 12 for sentencing on charges to which he had pled guilty in March. Sentencing was delayed in order for a pre-sentence report and a technical suitability report to be prepared (to see if Costa could serve time at his residence).

The first charge on which he was to be sentenced involved threats made to another young man in March 2006.

The second charge was impaired driving, and a charge of flight from a peace officer arose from the same incident on January 13, 2006. During this incident, police saw a

pickup truck speeding on a parking lot. Police activated their emergency lights, following the vehicle, but Costa would not stop. He increased speed as he drove the wrong way up Fenchurch Avenue.

When Costa was finally pulled over, the arresting officer noted a strong smell of alcohol on Costa. The female passenger in Costa's truck was crying "hysterically".

Police took Costa to the RCMP detachment for a breath test, and obtained a reading of .110 blood alcohol.

Crown Counsel asked for jail time as well as a high fine for the 19 year old Princeton man.

Costa's lawyer asked for a chance to avoid jail, saying Costa realizes he must behave in a more grown-up manner.

Judge Hogan was not ready to hand down a lenient sentence. He told Costa many young people believe

nobody goes to jail. The judge said he sends people to jail nearly every day, and assured Costa he would not last "five seconds" in jail.

Judge Hogan was angry that Costa had not bothered to attend an appointment for the technical suitability report.

The judge remarked it was like saying "Please, judge, throw me in jail." Judge Hogan noted Costa has taken no steps to deal with his alcohol and drug problems.

Judge Hogan adjourned sentencing for three months to allow Costa time to provide information for the technical suitability report and to show he was taking action to address the alcohol problem.

"I believe in deeds, not words," Judge Hogan told Costa, saying Costa's actions would tell the judge whether or not Costa wanted to go to jail. He added Costa is prohibited from driving for two years.

Family stress leads to fine

Donald Bettger, of Creston, B.C. appeared in Provincial Court in Princeton on April 12 to plead guilty to a charge of driving without due care and attention under section 144 of the B.C. Motor Vehicle Act.

Bettger was arrested on January 7, 2007, following observation by an RCMP officer doing highway duty. At 10 minutes before midnight, the officer was following two vehicles on Highway 3 east of Princeton. He saw one vehicle pull off on the road to the golf course. The officer pulled into a cul-de-sac road further

down the highway and parked. Shortly after, the car that had pulled off came down the highway. The vehicle stopped abruptly on the side of the highway near the police vehicle. The officer went to speak with the driver and smelled marijuana.

In court, Bettger's counsel said Bettger had family problems at the time and had pulled over due to stress.

Bettger was ordered to pay an \$800 fine with a 15 percent victim fine surcharge.

Trail ends in sentence

Kyle Fraser stood trial in Provincial Court in Princeton on April 12 on a charge of driving while prohibited. Fraser was arrested on October 21, 2006, when police observed him driving a vehicle at the intersection of Highway 5A and Bridge Street. Police observed him drive through the intersection and along the street, then turn into an alley behind a pizza parlour.

The local RCMP officer was aware Fraser had never had a valid driver's licence. In fact, not 24 hours before he was arrested, Fraser had attended court in Kamloops and had been prohibited from driving. In addition, police noted Fraser had been consuming alcohol and issued a 24 hour driving suspension on the spot.

Fraser, who defended himself, said his girlfriend had been driving and had dropped a lighted cigarette which fell under Fraser's seat. They had stopped at the corner of the highway to look for the cigarette,

Fraser said, then he had decided it was not a good place to park, and had driven over to the pizza parlour. He maintained he had told the police why he had driven, but neither of the officers involved could recall anything about a dropped cigarette. The girlfriend and Fraser had split up and she refused to go to court to testify.

Judge Hogan decided driving to a new location was not a necessity, and found Fraser guilty of the offense. Fraser was prohibited from driving for a year.

Judge Hogan asked Fraser why he never had a driver's licence, and Fraser said he could never pass the written test because he cannot read well enough. The judge advised him there is a computer program for people who cannot read, and even people who cannot speak or read English can get a driver's licence. He gave Fraser some advice on how to get a licence.

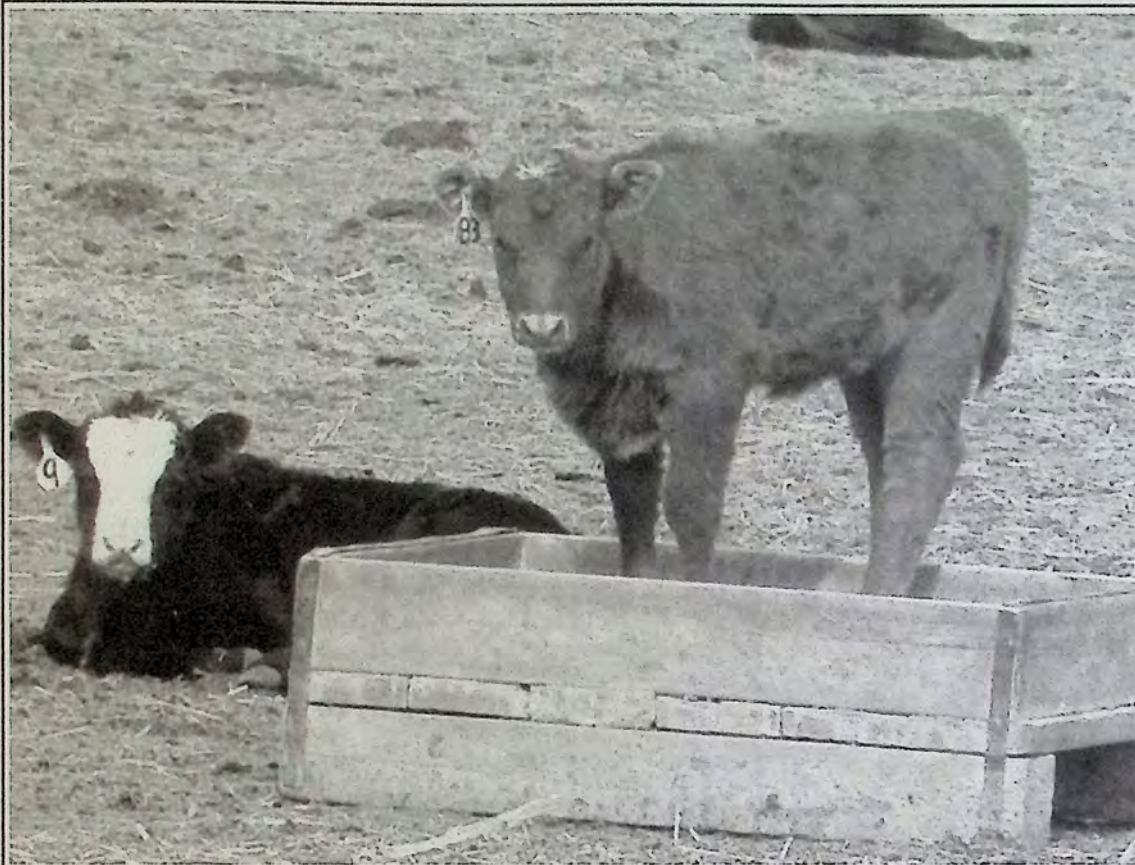

The next meeting of PXA will be held at the fairgrounds office on Tuesday, May 8, at 7:00 p.m.

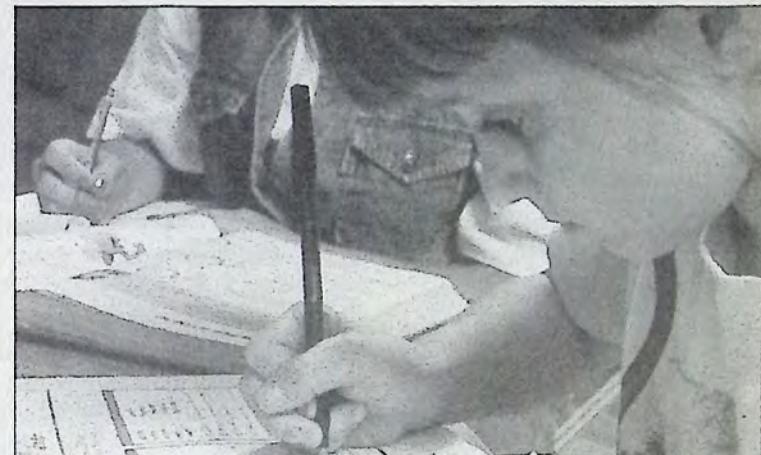
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FSA testing can be harmful to students!

I am concerned that this test will have negative effects on my child's learning, motivation, and self-esteem.

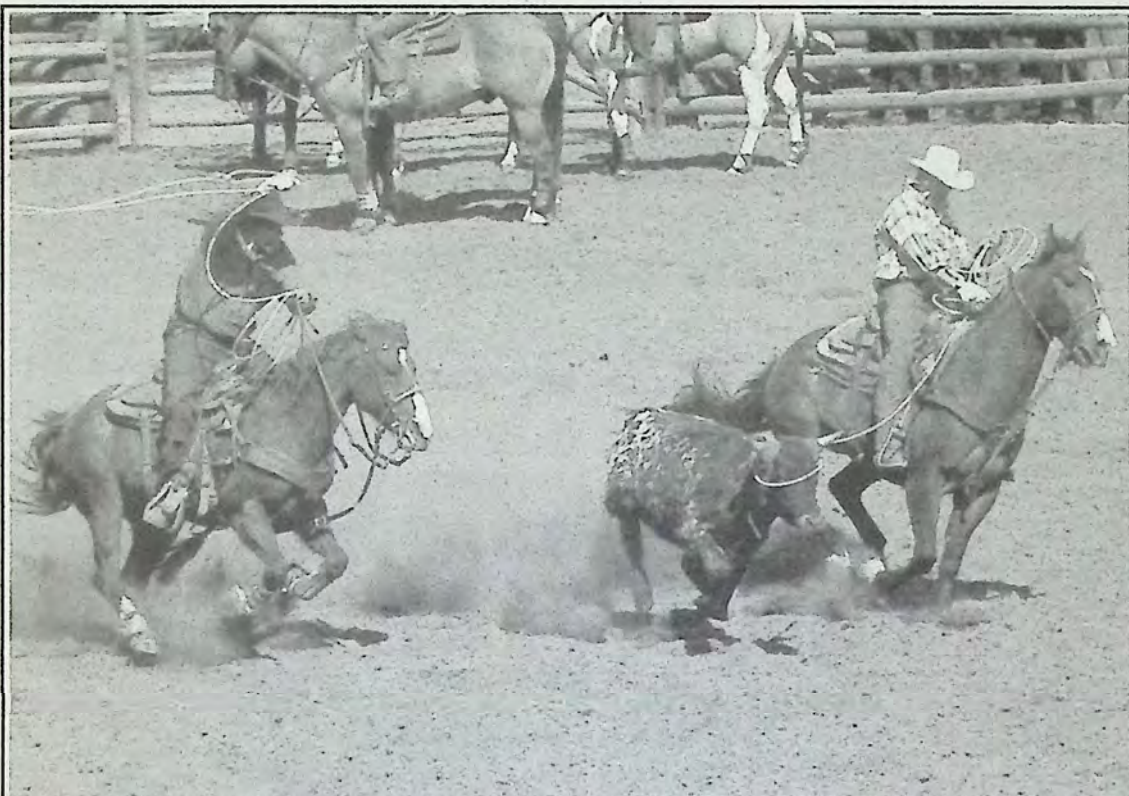
I understand that the ministry provides instructions to principals on how to exempt students from the FSA tests if they receive a letter from parents requesting that their child be exempted.

 OUR municipal level. You see, it doesn't matter whether it's a dam or coalbed methane drilling, (the latest tap-dancers to waltz through our municipal doors). It isn't a question of whether you are environmentally minded or not, it's a question of economics, power, and control. Do you think when the Americans want more water or hydro power they will be nice and fair about it, that due diligence will take its course? I don't. Why? Because there is nothing in our history of trade with that country which demonstrates fair play in any of these areas. Should we feel safe when corporations have the power to tell-off federal governments; meanwhile, give reassurance that public process and consultation will take its course? I don't. Why? Because they have already engaged the USIB as a backdoor to secure negotiations.

Secondly, this is an issue of foresight. The sooner we go ahead and start playing around with the development of water and resources, the sooner we invite ownership and control that will have little, if anything, to do with us.

We won't be able to police it to ensure proper ecological standards are being met; we won't financially profit from it. If we profited properly from these deals, we would be in better shape, both as a province and a country.

Canada is one of the few developed nations that is a net exporter of energy. In fact, we export all of the United States hydroelectric imports. That's 100% of hydroelectric power imported to the U.S., and we supply all of it. (Jean Charest noted in his address to the American Assembly that the U.S. is also dependent on Canada for oil, much of its natural gas, and 1/3 of its uranium).

One of the most controversial sections of the Canada - U.S. Free Trade Agreement of 1988 was a promise that Canada would never

charge the United States more for energy than fellow Canadians. The difference being of course, we have to pay our power bills. Where as our southern neighbours seem to have the ability to say 'naw, maybe next year.' When the utilities corporations of our country, combined with both our provincial and federal governments, go screaming to the WTO, the biggest regulatory body for trade in the world, the WTO, like any parent sorting out a dispute says, 'Now, now Sam, be a good chap and pay up.'

The chastised neighbour stands there, nods the head, and then proceeds to do exactly as he pleases, as though the conversation never happened.

The Trade Agreement creates a single North American energy market which guarantees access to the supply and development of energy resources to and from both countries. Sounds harmless right? Except, well except that while Canada gives the United States open market access to energy reserves, the United States limits Canada's supply of same. The Agreement also gives the United States access to Canada's vast hydroelectric resources. In the future, it could be contemplated that Yukon's hydroelectric resources could be tapped. However, the Yukon will not be able to export energy at a higher

price to the Americans than to Yukoners. (See Canada - United States Free Trade Agreement.) I honestly sometimes wonder if my nine year old niece couldn't have brokered a better deal. It would have had the added benefit of being polished off with fairy dust sparkles and chocolate cake.

Now, I don't consider myself a protectionist. Trade, is necessary - at a Federal level, Provincial level and Municipal level. I do, however, like to see fair play. It would be nice, if just once, our governing bodies could find the heart and knackers to make a trade deal where we didn't get shafted. If at the end of the day, we didn't have to go and whine to the WTO, or end up beholdin' because, for once, we weren't stupid enough to get involved in the first place.

We lose our say in these deals. I, for one, would rather play 'keep away' for a little while longer at least another generation. What's the hurry?

We obviously haven't learned any lessons from the agreements we've made, because we don't seem to be getting any better at it. We are currently facing a collapse in the forest industry, the likes of which we have never seen. Really, we only have one bargaining chip left.

So again, I ask you how much would you pay? And what are we willing to do to protect it?

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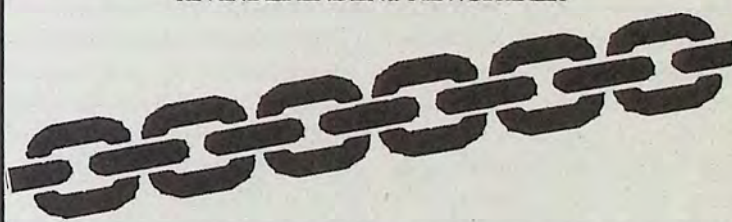

Easy Mushroom Pate

Preparation Time: 5 minutes. Cooking Time: 12 minutes.

This thick mixture of finely chopped mushrooms cooked in butter with herbs is wonderful spread on thin plain or toasted baguette slices. For variety spread the toasts with chevre or cream cheese and top with pate.

Ingredients:

- 3 tbsp. butter (45 mL)
- 1 medium onion, finely chopped
- 1 lb. fresh Mushrooms, finely chopped (500g)
- 2 large cloves garlic, minced
- 2 tbsp light soya or tamari sauce (25 mL)
- 1/4 tsp ground black pepper (1 mL)
- 1/2 tsp dried thyme - optional (2 mL)

Method: In large skillet melt butter over medium heat; saute onion for 1-2 minutes just to soften. Add mushrooms saute 4-5 minutes or until liquid is released; reduce heat to low and add garlic, soya sauce, pepper and thyme if using. Continue to cook, stirring often until thickened, about 5 minutes. Serve at room temperature to spread on thin baguette slices. Makes 2 cups (500 mL). TIP: Finely chop vegetables in food processor to save time. Use any mixture of mushrooms and it is also a good way to use up stems from mushroom caps other than Shiitake stems.

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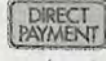

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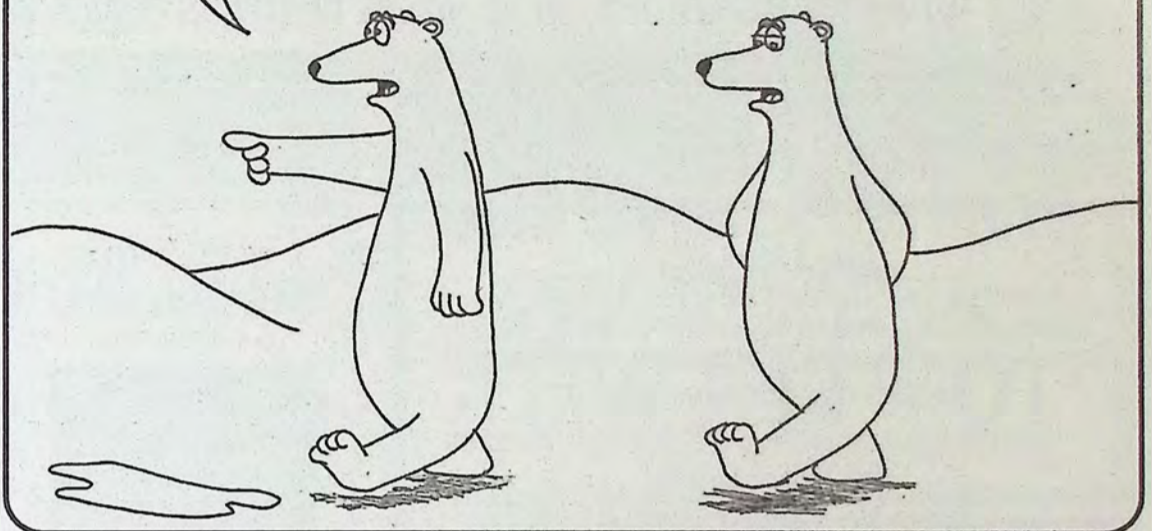

Pippin sheds light on problem

To The Editor;

There has been a lot of talk recently about compact fluorescent lights (CFLs) and their increased efficiency over incandescent light bulbs. Australia has banned the conventional light bulb, California is considering doing the same.

Here in Canada, NDP M.P. Paul Dewar has introduced an amendment to the Clean Air Act to ban light bulbs. The intentions are good, to reduce electrical consumption. CFLs are up to 4 times more efficient than regular light bulbs.

Fluorescent lighting is a good choice for illuminating a factory or warehouse where a lot of light is needed over a large area. For living areas in a home, I think people should have a choice. Fluorescent light is a harsh light which is hardly warm and cozy. It makes people look like Keith Richards of the Rolling Stones after a rough night.

If you read the packaging on the CFL, it says that they are not to be used with such energy saving devices as dimmers, timers and photocells. What the packaging doesn't say is that each CFL contains 5 mg of mercury.

This highly toxic substance will likely be released into the environment somewhere along the way from your living room to the landfill. If Mr. Dewar wants to promote CFL use, then a more positive approach is needed. Start by eliminating sales tax on CFLs. Work with manufacturers to develop a mercury recovery and recycling program.

Subsidize the purchase of CFLs or tax light bulbs. Give people a choice. This is still a free country, right?

One of the prime movers behind the worldwide Ban the Bulb cause is Phillips, one of the largest manufacturers of CFLs. Not to be left behind, G.E. has announced that by 2010 it will

have an incandescent light bulb that is 2-4 times as efficient as today's light bulb.

The Law of Unintended Consequences applies to this situation. Ban light bulbs in one state or province and people will drive to buy them somewhere else. The current situation is too important for half-baked solutions. We need to move away from the use of fossil fuels as quickly as possible. Polls show that people are ready to make sacrifices for the sake of the planet's future. If people are going to make changes they need to know that what they do will make a real difference. A CFL powered by a fossil fuel burning power plant makes no sense.

Conservation is important, but to deal effectively with the global climate change problem will require creative, positive, initiatives to produce more power. On the North Coast, Syncwave will be installing power resonators that convert waves into electricity.

Here in the Valley, Murv Baker is working on setting up a cooperative to produce wind power. Government can help by encouraging these types of projects.

Thomas Edison invented the light bulb after trying 6,000 potential filaments. Before we throw Mr. Edison's most useful invention on the scrap heap of history some thought is required. Let's not jump on the first bandwagon that rolls by claiming to solve our problems with a stroke of the pen.

Sharing economies does not work

Last week I talked about SPP, the Security and Prosperity Partnership between Canada, Mexico and the United States. I suggested trade unions should be especially concerned. I haven't heard trade unions kicking up a fuss, and I wonder why.

The proposal for "deep integration" of North America's national economies is just another step beyond NAFTA. The SPP is manned by CEOs of major corporations based in North America. These are the people who are deciding the fates of three nations and most politicians are going along for the ride (maybe based on corporate contributions to campaign funds?).

NAFTA was supposed to have brought us prosperity. Those of us who opposed signing the trade agreement were considered short-sighted and mentally blighted. NAFTA promised us better trade, more jobs and a higher standard of living for all of us. What has happened, really?

Let's take a look at the past 10 years. First, if it were not for our exports of oil, gas and minerals to the U.S., our level of trade would actually be far lower than it is. NAFTA promised us a bigger share of the U.S. trade, but that hasn't happened.

Yes, a lot of new jobs have been created but wage growth has not improved. Furthermore, 40 percent of jobs created in 2002 were part-time, and 17 percent were self-employment. Out of 560,000 new jobs, 57 percent had little security and stability.

The Canadian Centre for Policy Alternatives studied the impact of free trade and concluded that free trade does away with unionized, steady, well-paid jobs and replaces them with temporary, non-unionized and largely part-time jobs. This has an impact on our economy that many people do not see. Look more closely: young people cannot buy a house on a temporary or minimum wage job. Young people raising families cannot afford much more than the rent and groceries. This lack of discretionary spending money impacts every business.

Since the free trade agreement,

the middle class of Canada, the U.S. and Mexico has shrunk, and poverty has grown. The U.S. lost more jobs since free trade than during the Depression, and while Mexico gained a lot of jobs, the level of pay could be described as "starvation wages". The real value of Mexico's minimum wage has dropped 18 percent.

Why is this happening? May I suggest it is because corporations have grown too large? Could it be because corporations are deciding how society should be run, and they decide in favour of their own bottom line?

Corporations are set up like old feudal domains. There is the top brass, then some overseers, and then the peasants doing all of the work. The top brass lives extremely well, the overseers are comfortable, and the peasants live hand to mouth. The goal of most

corporations is to get the most work out of the peasants at the least cost.

While using the feudal example to compare with the corporation today, I have missed one critical element of feudalism that disappeared with the Industrial Age: the social bond. Feudal lords had an agreement with their peasants: they would protect the peasants. Corporations do not agree to protect their employees. In fact, corporations rely increasingly on government to protect their employees, to provide health care, pensions, welfare, education and all kinds of social services. So why are corporations allowed so much freedom to do as they please, even to the point of telling government how to set up the Security and Prosperity Partnership of North America?

I don't buy it and I don't trust it.

I remember wanting to fit in, you know be accepted. I guess I might have had a bit of an inferiority complex when I was younger. It seemed to be reinforced when I was in school; you know when they pick teams for the PE classes, I was picked last. I was a zero when it came to sports, any sport. I thought, a good chew of snuff would hit the spot right now, so I took a wad of good old Wintergreen Copenhagen, placed it under my tongue, making sure there was enough so my bottom lip protruded beyond my nose. I bent down to pick up a five inch, twenty foot long, aluminum main line sprinkler pipe, and swallowed the whole wad of tobacco.

My world changed instantly, I saw things that were not there, I was so sick that I threw up things that I had eaten on my fifth birthday. I fell into the alfalfa and laid there while the world turned around me at a thousand miles an hour. Eventually I got up, changed my sprinkler pipes and swore off tobacco forever. I had tried to be cool, but couldn't make it trying to follow the tobacco road. Life is like that for many of us. We want to be accepted and we will do almost anything to find that experience. The Apostle John wrote, For God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son, that WHOSEVER believes in Him shall not perish but have everlasting life. I can almost here some of you now, But, but, that is not for me, so butt out on the excuses and accept His acceptance of you. You have worth, value and purpose. You do not have to be cool or do anything cool to receive His acceptance, just ask.

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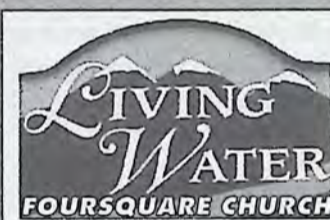

Our Economy

Economic Diversification - Part 1

This is a third in a series of articles about the Similkameen economy. In the last one I examined the structure of our economy. I highlighted forestry and agriculture as the number one and two industries and pointed out that dependence on resource-based industries (forestry, mining) is linked by StatsCanada to economic decline. We need to maintain and, if possible, grow our resource-based industries, but we need to diversify our economy so that we are not as susceptible to fluctuations in commodity prices or the loss of a single employer, no matter how large.

Diversification means having a mixture of economic sectors operating in an economy. When some sectors are down, others are up. Community income and employment tend to be steady, as opposed to fluctuating. Diverse economies are more robust, too, because there is a wide base of talents and skills in a community and many of the services needed by businesses are present in the community.

So, how does a community (or a region such as the Similkameen) diversify its economy? If I had a sure-fire answer to that, I would be rich. There is no formula, no set of actions, that guarantee success. However, there are things that can be done that improve the opportunity for economic diversification.

A starting point is to recognize that success breeds success. An entrepreneurial (healthy) business community attracts investment. A second fundamental is that about 80% of job creation in Canada comes from business expansions and 20% from new businesses.

These two facts strongly suggest that strengthening and building the existing business community is the starting point for economic growth (getting bigger), development (getting better) and diversification (getting securer). A standard economic devel-

opment formula is that 60% of effort should be directed to 'business retention,' which means strengthening existing commerce and industry. Twenty percent of effort should go to attracting new business investment and 20% should go to assisting community non-profit organizations.

Economic diversification will happen as the economy grows. As an economy grows it creates a demand for a wider range of services and more of them. We must travel to Penticton or Kelowna for many services, because we do not have sufficient people and businesses to warrant their presence. Likewise, business growth generates the need for more goods and, when the need is great enough, suppliers move in.

Economic growth is one way to stimulate diversification. What can a community do to stimulate growth? What can an economic development agency do?

The business community can help themselves by working together to make the community a good place to do business. That means investing in the look of the community, principally storefronts. They can work together in many ways, including lobbying Council, capacity building, shared marketing and purchasing, sending shoppers to other stores. Perhaps most importantly, they can improve the quality of service they provide for customers. All of this takes investment, but there is no growth without investment. Building the business community is primarily the job of the Chamber of Commerce. That is why I regard the Chamber as the second most important community organization, after local government.

Residents can help diversify their local economy by shopping at home. I cannot emphasize how important this is. That dollar that leaves town could have been in the hands of five, ten, 20 local residents. You spend a dollar at Store X; Store X pays the

dollar to an employee who spends it at Store Y. Store Y spends the dollar on a local electrician. The electrician spends it on wire at Store Z. Store Z spends it on a new sign for its storefront. The sign-maker spends it a Store X. Store X increases its stock selection because revenues are up. More local residents shop at Store X because of improved selection. Spend a dollar in your local economy and it comes back to your pocket. Spend it elsewhere and it is a lost new employee, lost store improvement, lost source of economic diversification.

What can I do as your EDO to grow and diversify the local economy? I can assist the Chamber of Commerce to increase the capacity of the business community in ways I listed above. Economic growth is increased when local government, the business community (Chamber) and Economic Development work together. I can assist with marketing the community, provide business planning assistance, spot and report business growth opportunities and work with the private and non-profit sectors to make the Similkameen a desirable place to live.

Let me summarize what I have said here. The largest part of economic growth and diversification is driven by existing business and industry. Growth results in diversification. Growth requires investment, entrepreneurship and cooperation, consumer support, and a planned approach by business, local government and the economic development agency.

Next time I am going to write about attracting new business investment. I don't think you will be surprised that I will begin by saying that the best way to attract business investment is to have a thriving business community.

So, spend your dollars at home. Insist on good service in return.

What Is The Due Date For A Personal Income Tax Return?

Personal income tax returns are due by April 30th, as is any amount owing. Penalties and interest may be charged for late returns or late payments.

Self-employed individuals have until June 15th to file their personal tax returns, but any amounts owing must still be paid by April 30th.

When the filing due date falls on Saturday or Sunday or a public holiday, tax returns received by Canada Revenue Agency or postmarked by midnight on the next business day will be considered to have been filed on time. Many CRA offices stay open until midnight on the filing due date to accept returns.

Tax Tip: Always file your tax return on time!

What If I Can't Afford To Pay The Tax I Owe?

Even if you can't afford to pay the income tax that you owe, you should file your tax return by the annual deadline in order to avoid any late-filing penalties. The late filing penalty is 5% of the balance owing, plus 1% of the balance owing for each full month that your return is late, to a maximum of 12 months (that would be a total penalty of 17% of the balance owing). If you have incurred late-filing penalties in any of the three preceding taxation years, the penalties could be even higher.

After you file your tax return, you will be sent an assessment notice from CRA which shows the balance of tax owing. After the payments deadline, interest will accrue on this balance at the CRA prescribed rate of interest, compounded daily. The current interest rates can be found on the CRA Prescribed Interest Rates page of their website. You can communicate with CRA to set up a payment schedule for the taxes owing.

Tarswell shares more on FSAs

To The Editor;

The best assessment for learning takes place in a classroom context with assessment tools that match the curriculum that has been taught.

Sometimes it is useful to administer a standardized diagnostic test to an individual student to help diagnose learning needs. However, the use of standardized tests like Foundation Skills Assessments (FSAs) administered across a grade, school or district does not help teachers teach or students learn.

The research is clear; assessment that provides descriptive feedback is more effective than assessment that provides evaluation feedback, such as a mark. (Bangert-Downs et al., 1991; Black and Williams,

1998; Crooks, 2001; Turnstall and Gipps, 1996)

Research has also shown that large-scale testing can have negative effects on student motivation and learning. (Harlen and Erich, 2002)

Large scale assessments do not provide teachers with new information about their students' learning. The pressure to improve scores on standardized achievement tests shifts the attention of teachers, students, and parents to test results and away from learning. The administration of these tests is seriously eroding instructional time and narrowing the curriculum. The money spent is being taken from things that could help students learn.

It's time to stop the loss of instructional time to testing. Student learning should be supported with a variety of classroom assessment methods that are integrated with instruction.

Increasingly, parents are withdrawing their children from Foundation Skills Assessments by writing letters to their child's principal asking that their child be withdrawn from the Foundation Skills Assessment.

Weyerhaeuser has rented the curling rink for many years. It is important to the success of tree planting that the seedlings be kept in a temperature controlled environment prior to planting.

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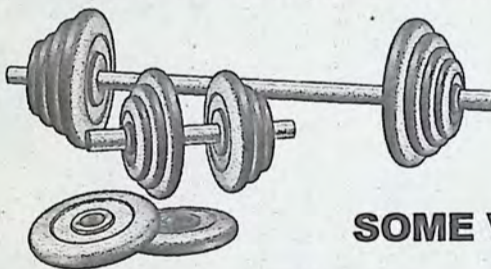

Coalmont man stands trial

Kenneth Burke, of Coalmont, stood trial in Provincial Court in Princeton on April 13 disputing a charge of refusing to give a breath sample.

During Tulameen Days, on July 30, 2005, a couple witnessed an accident in which Burke lost control of his pickup truck on a gentle curve two kilometres west of Tulameen. The truck left the highway and went down an embankment into some bushes. Burke was not injured other than a small abrasion and bump on the head.

Judge warns about violence

A female youth appeared in court in Princeton on April 12 to plead guilty to the assault of another young woman. It was a first offence, but the conditional discharge Judge Hogan ordered came with a lot of conditions and some warnings about the consequences of future violent behaviour. He told her she had acted like a "thug".

Judge Hogan warned her that a criminal record would mean she could never get a job that required her to be bondable, she could not cross into the U.S.A., and could not be a volunteer at a school. If the young woman complies with the conditions she will have no criminal record.

Witnesses stated their opinion that Burke had been consuming alcohol. He was taken to Princeton detachment office where he attempted a few shallow breaths but did not give a proper sample.

The trial went on into the after-

noon but, after a brief recess, Burke pled guilty to a lesser charge of driving without due care and attention under section 144-1a of the B.C. Motor Vehicle Act. His sentencing is remanded to September 13, 2007.

Judge orders probation, fines

In a court appearance in Princeton on April 13, Donavin Costa of Princeton pled guilty to a charge of possession of a controlled substance. He was ordered to serve a six month probation with the usual conditions and specifically to abstain from using illicit drugs and to seek employment. He must pay a \$300 fine.

In Provincial Court in Princeton on April 12, Darrell Leochko, of Princeton, entered a guilty plea to an impaired driving charge. On February 25, 2007, police stopped Leochko in a roadblock on Old Hedley Road. Leochko had attended a hockey dance prior to being stopped.

Police noted a strong smell of liquor and signs of impairment. As police dealt with him, Leochko used strong threatening language and was uncooperative. His breath tests showed a high level of impairment at .240 and .220 blood alcohol.

Judge Hogan ordered Leochko to pay a \$1,000 fine and prohibited him from driving anywhere in Canada for one year.

Teri Nasz appeared in Provincial Court in Princeton on April 12 to plead guilty to an impaired driving charge. Police had stopped her after seeing her vehicle swerving as she drove onto Highway 3. She exhibited signs of impairment.

When Nasz was taken to the detachment for a breath test, police obtained readings of .190. Nasz was ordered to pay a \$600 fine and is prohibited from driving for one year.

In Provincial Court in Princeton on April 12, Norman Stewart, of Princeton, pled guilty to an impaired driving charge. He was arrested on January 11, 2007, when police found him in his vehicle in a ditch. The officer noted indications of impairment.

Judge Hogan ordered Stewart to pay a \$600 fine and prohibited him from driving for one year.
