Council faces wheelchair challenge

Members of Princeton Town Council, and CAO Robins, will tour downtown Princeton in wheelchairs on May 31. Two local residents, Laurie Quick and Ken Carlson, challenged Council to discover the difficulties faced daily by people in wheelchairs as they attempt to do business in banks, restaurants and other public places. Carlson reminded Council that it is not just people in wheelchairs who have problems accessing local buildings.

He noted the increase in older people using canes and walkers who would face some of the challenges experienced by people in wheelchairs.

May 31 has been proclaimed Accessibility Awareness Day in Princeton. If you see members of Council in wheelchairs on that day, give them some encouragement. They will be accompanied by an assistant (provided by a Community Services volunteer) who will ensure their safety.

Who's moving to the Similkameen, and why?

The Similkameen Valley had double the rate of population growth of the Okanagan during the past five years, most notable in Area H and Area B. Who are the people moving here, and why have they chosen the Similkameen? What will it mean to the valley's economy in the future?

These are the questions posed to Town Council by Economic Development Officer Michael McLaughlin on May 22 as he asked for money to fund a study to answer the questions.

McLaughlin described a new kind of migrant worker, the "amenity" migrant. There is a significant dif-

ference between the ordinary person who moves to a new location for a job. The amenity migrant moves to a new location to enjoy a lifestyle. Often, the amenity migrant comes with money to invest and may bring jobs with him. The Similkameen Valley Planning Society has an opportunity to hire

Dr. Laurence Moss, an expert on the subject of amenity migrants. Dr. Moss is a Canadian currently residing in Spokane, but who will be moving to Canada in the near future. The goal of the study is to find out why people are moving to the Similkameen Valley.

The reasons people move here can

be varied. Perhaps they come for the outdoor recreation opportunities, the climate, the beauty of the environment, or clean air and adequate water supplies. There is plenty of evidence to show that people are migrating to mountain valleys. It is a trend that manifested in the United States and is moving northward. What will it mean for local residents in the future?

The cost of the study is \$40,000. The Planning Society has secured \$16,550 from the Real Estate Foundation of B.C. Realtors want to know the answers. So does Parks Canada, which has contributed \$15,000, and Canadian Parks and Wilderness Society has added \$3,000. McLaughlin asked Council to help make up the \$5,425 shortfall.

Council appeared reluctant to do so, as the budget for this year has been set. Councillors asked McLaughlin if he had requested money from Keremeos Council and all Area Directors. McLaughlin has not yet asked them.

Councillor Jim Manion suggested McLaughlin come back with a cost sharing formula and Council would take another look at it.

Article inspires SFU Dean to write

Given the political dynamics of B.C. public K-12 education that were present in 2003 when I joined the Faculty of Education at Simon Fraser University, it seemed to me that my role should be to move among the stakeholder groups and foster constructive dialogue on education issues. Four years later, my opinion hasn't changed and I continue to knock on doors, invite and attend meetings and comment on media reports regarding our schools. In this spirit I take up the remarks of my colleague, Deputy Minister of Education Emery Dossdall as reported in the May 8th issue of the Similkameen News

Leader.

I think the DM accurately represents the aspirations of the Foundation Skills Assessment program when he closes by stating, "Evidence-based instruction should be the norm in our classrooms." The FSA is one attempt to contribute to this evidence base and during the early years of its implementation, although there were disagreements, it was not a focus of great contention as it is today. What has changed?

For some time the discussions regarding provincial testing were largely held in house among the education stakeholder groups. This internal policy debate, however, has become secondary to a public, mediated one since The

Vancouver Sun began two years ago to give great prominence to the Fraser Institute's elementary school Report Card. What had been a debate among professionals erupted into a major annual media event that colours public perception of our schools. The May 8th article gives no mention of this new dynamic. The FSA debate, however, is no longer internal and has to be seen in this new context. To quote a popular princess, "There were three of us in this marriage, so it was a bit crowded."

Collaboratively, The Sun and the Fraser Institute became the third partner in what had been a push-pull between the Ministry and the professional educator and trustee bodies.

Why is mere newspaper publicity significant? Because the unapproved (by the Ministry) rankings created from FSA data in order to create winners and losers among our schools and to pit public and private schools against one another made a professional policy discussion into a major political issue. In this way the FSA—which, as the DM says, is not intended as a "high stakes test"—was made into a high stakes test by non-professional entities with their own motivations. The Fraser Institute is well known for its "free market" economic ideology as reflected in the school voucher initiative of Milton Friedman. (Some call this point of view "market fundamentalism.")

Aviation historian speaks on Princeton Airport

On June 5 at Riverside Wellness Centre local residents will have an opportunity to learn the history of Princeton Airport.

There are some surprising bits of

history about the local airport. For example, the present location was not the first airfield.

Here are a few footnotes in Princeton's aviation history:

July 1919 - Ernest Hall lands his Curtiss biplane in downtown Princeton and fills up at the gas station before continuing on to Penticton.

April 1929 - Approval was given for the construction of an airfield at Princeton.

May 1929 - William Archibald, Cominco Mine Manager, Trail,

BC, lands his deHavilland Gypsy Moth biplane at the new Princeton airfield on Five Mile Road.

October 1932 - The Federal Government announced plans to build a new airfield at Princeton as part of the Unemployment Relief Scheme using only picks and shovels and wheelbarrows.

August 1937 - A government survey team selects Princeton as the site of a Radio Range aerial navigation project on a proposed airway from Vancouver to Lethbridge.

August 1938 - Trans Canada Airlines began training its pilots with landing procedures at Princeton and each airfield between Vancouver and Lethbridge.

May 1943 - The Royal Canadian Air Force began using the Princeton airfield for training flights.

The presentation will begin at 7:00 PM. Chris Weicht, who has written a book about the history of airports in B.C., is the keynote speaker.

Weicht's current book, Trans Canada Airway, is the fourth volume in a seven book series on Western Canadian aviation history.

Weicht's research shows that the Canadian Air Board originally conceived a Trans Canada Airway in 1920 as a development of the trans Canada flight from coast to coast.

Princeton's location proved to be essential throughout the decades of development in air travel routes in Western Canada.

Manning Park accident injures driver

Princeton RCMP and South Okanagan Traffic Services attended a single vehicle accident early in the morning of May 23rd.

"The vehicle - described as a late model Chevrolet Impala - left the road in the Mule Deer Provincial Campsite area in Manning Park," says an RCMP news release.

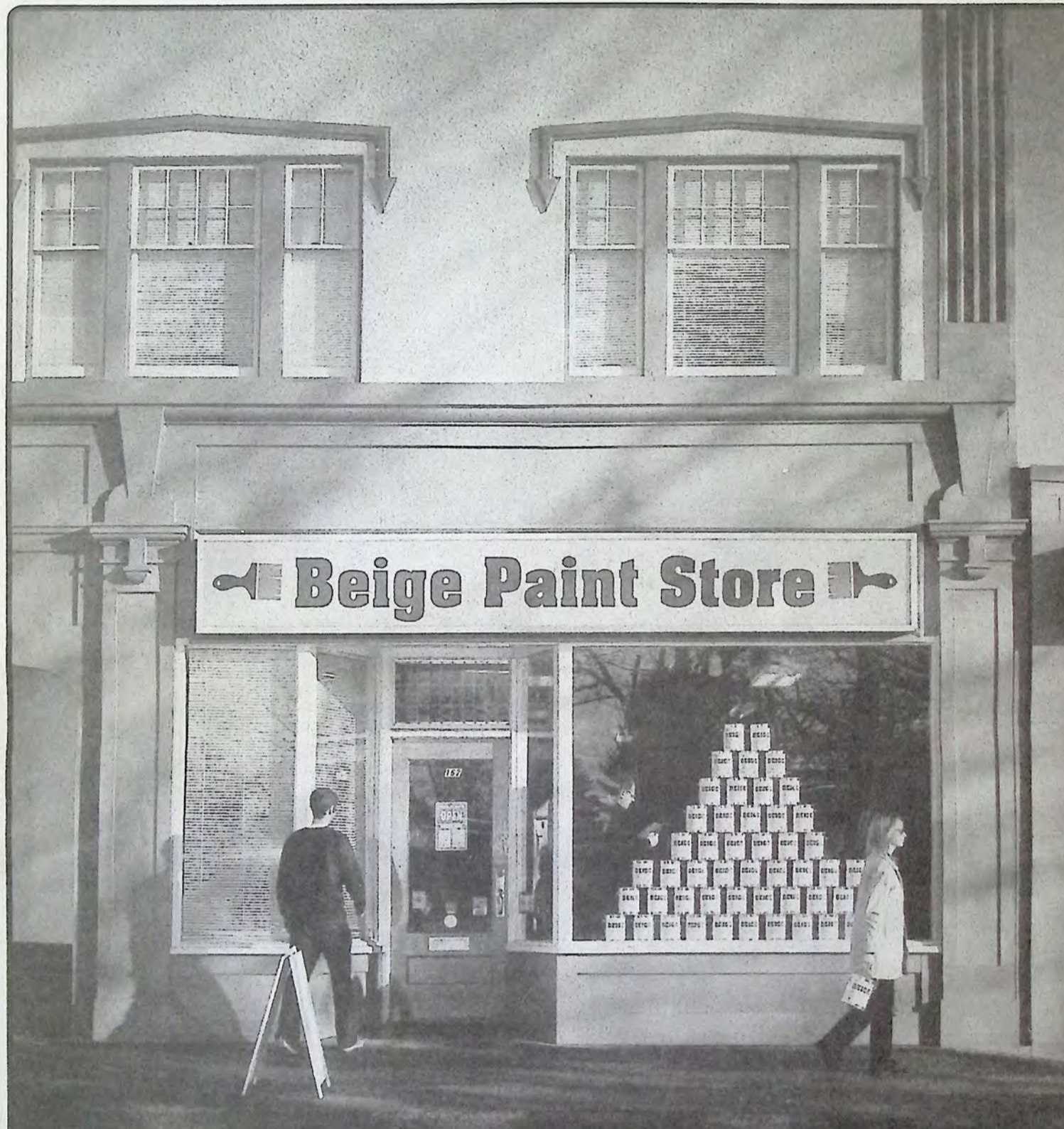
The vehicle ended up in the Similkameen River.

"The male and only occupant managed to escape from the vehicle and was pulled from the river by passersby."

He was transported to Princeton Hospital for treatment and later transported to Kelowna General Hospital where he remains in critical condition.

"This matter is still under investigation by South Okanagan Traffic Services."

No other details have been released.

RDOS asks you to recycle your plant pots

Although Spring seems to have sprung a little later this year, RDOS residents are catching up now that the danger of frost is finally past.

There were line-ups at local nurseries over the recent long weekend with many people purchasing their annual bedding plants, perennials, vegetables, herbs, shrubs and trees.

Now that all plastics except styrofoam are accepted in local Blue Bag and Blue Box Recycling programs, RDOS staff would like to remind everyone to recycle those

plastic plant pots if they're not going to be reused.

RDOS Solid Waste Management Coordinator, Beth Cavers has received many enquiries about recycling garden pots in recent weeks.

"Just make sure they're rinsed clean of dirt," she says.

Unfortunately, the plastic tags that identify the plants cannot be recycled.

"Those little tags are too small for workers to pick up off a moving conveyor while wearing gloves," says Cavers.

"Plant tags must be put into regular garbage instead."

The curbside recycling of plastics has been embraced by residents of the RDOS, City of Penticton, Town of Oliver and Village of Keremeos. They are delighted to be able to recycle items such as yogurt containers, shampoo bottles and plastic bags.

"We've had an extremely positive response to this curbside program change," enthuses Cavers.

"So don't forget to recycle your rinsed plant pots now, too!"

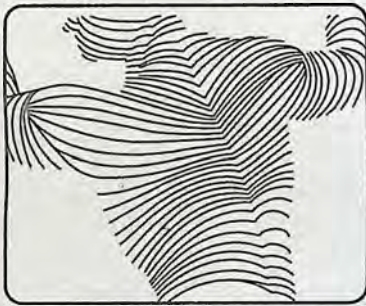

The word compliance was used to indicate how well people take their medications according to their doctors' orders. Today we use the word adherence. But whatever word is used, the bottom-line is this: Take your medications the way your doctor orders them.

It's a good idea to keep a medication diary. It's like a journal history of your medications, when they started, side effects, if any, that you experienced, and whether the medication achieved the results for which it was prescribed.

Look for exercise wherever you are. Park farther away from the door in a shopping mall. Take the stairs instead of the elevator. Walk to the corner store instead of driving.

Taking ibuprofen with low-dose ASA (used for stroke prevention) is not a good idea. The ibuprofen does interact to reduce the anticoagulant effect of the ASA.

Hepatitis C - How is it transmitted?

Most people with hepatitis C contracted it through either a contaminated blood transfusion or product (plasma, gammaglobulin, etc.) or by sharing contaminated needles.

Thanks to HCV testing with modern methods, the risk of acquiring hepatitis C from blood transfusion is now less than 1%.

The other people who acquire hepatitis C include health care and laboratory workers that may get stuck with an infected needle or instrument, people receiving medical/dental procedures, people undergoing hemodialysis, body piercing, sharing razors, toothbrushes, nail clippers or people who have had tattoos or manicures that were performed with poorly sterilized equipment.

statistics for transmission from mother to child are around 5%.

Cases of hepatitis C with no evidence of exposure through blood transfusions, needlesticks or needle sharing are called sporadic. How these individuals became infected is unknown.

Forty percent of all cases of hepatitis C were contracted through unknown means by people who are in no current risk category.

What this means is that we are all at risk for contracting hepatitis C.

1. The virus is in the blood of an infected person.

2. Hepatitis C can be spread by using something with infected blood on it such as:

- razors, nail clippers or scissors,

- tooth brushes and water pics, - tattoo or body piercing needles, - illicit IV drug needles and paraphernalia (cottons, spoons, etc.), - tampons or sanitary napkins.

3. The virus must enter through a break in the skin or mucous membrane.

How HCV is NOT transmitted

1. The hepatitis C virus is NOT airborne.

- 2. It is NOT spread by: - sneezing and coughing, - holding hands, - kissing (unless there is deep-kissing and open sores present), - using the same toilet, - eating food prepared by someone with HCV, - holding a child in your arms, - swimming in the same pool.

Tips on shopping for safety

(NC) - In the time it takes to shop for a few basic items, you can create an emergency preparedness kit that will help you cope during an emergency and will make you and your family safer.

Public Safety and Emergency Preparedness Canada is encouraging Canadians to either buy or build a kit using these guidelines:

A basic kit should have drinking water and food that won't spoil for three days per person, a manual can opener, flashlight and batteries, candles and matches or a lighter, battery-powered or wind-up radio (and extra batteries) and a first aid kit.

Other items to consider include prescription medications, infant formula, special equipment for people with disabilities, extra keys for your car and house, cash in smaller bills or travellers cheques and change for payphones. The kit should also include a copy of your emergency plan, which can be made at www.getprepared.ca.

Extra supplies for each member of the family could include a change of clothes and footwear, sleeping bags and blankets, a whistle to attract attention, garbage bags, toilet

paper, safety gloves, basic tools, a small camping stove and fuel, and extra water for cooking and cleaning.

Car kits are a good idea if an emergency strikes while you're on the road. Make sure it has energy bars, water, blankets, extra clothing and shoes, candles in deep cans with matches, a first aid kit, warning light or flares, shovel, scraper and snowbrush, jumper cables, sand, salt or kitty litter for traction, tow ropes, a whistle, a fire extinguisher, road maps and a flashlight.

Special supplies for children and seniors are critical in your kit. As Les Johnson, Director of Client Services, St. John Ambulance says, "Many of the things we take for granted such as drug stores and bank machines might be closed in

an emergency so it's vital to have a back-up plan just in case." Make a note of any special medical conditions, medical history, medications and special needs that first responders could see at a glance. It's also a good idea to have photos of family members in the kit in case they become lost or separated from you.

You can protect your family in an emergency just by following these simple steps, and creating your own emergency plan. You could have the whole thing wrapped up in under an hour. Researchers in Scotland looked at the obesity problem from a new angle and found a startling correlation between obesity and the chemicals in our food.

First, they noted that people today eat less but there is far more obesity than in the early 20th century. Natural weight control mechanisms in our bodies are no longer functioning effectively. They looked for the answers and found them in our food and in our environment.

Pesticides make their way into our foods, and food packaging adds to the problem.

Our brains control our weight, and hormones from plastics may be disrupting our brains' ability to control weight.

These plastic chemicals mimic estrogen, and cause more fat cells and cells with a bigger capacity for storing fat. The plastics that do this are found in coating on metal cans, in food storage containers, plastic baby bottles, and returnable containers for juice, milk and water. As well, these chemicals are found in microwave ovenware and plastic eating utensils.

These researchers believe that screening out these contaminants may stop a lot of weight gain. This would mean not using plastics in microwave ovens, not purchasing food stored in plastics, and eating organic foods.

Perhaps more crucial to the next generation is refusal to feed babies from plastic bottles, and refusing to purchase water, juice or milk in plastic bottles.

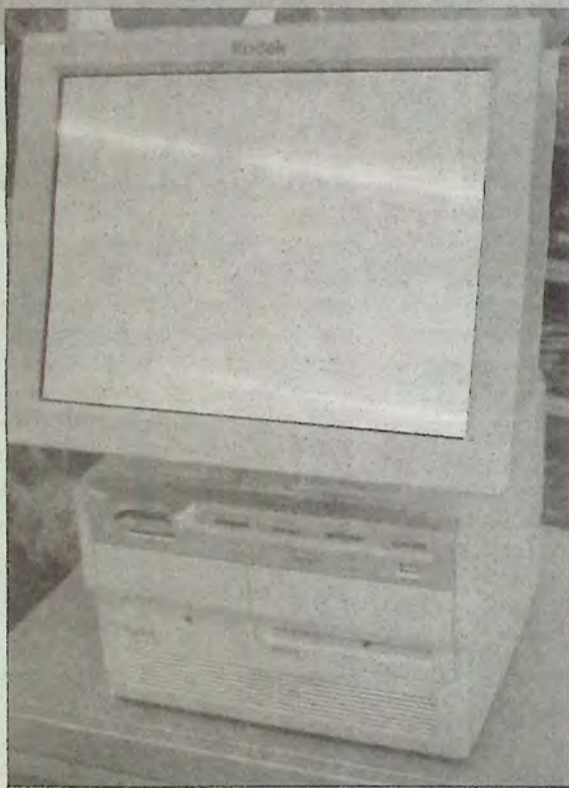

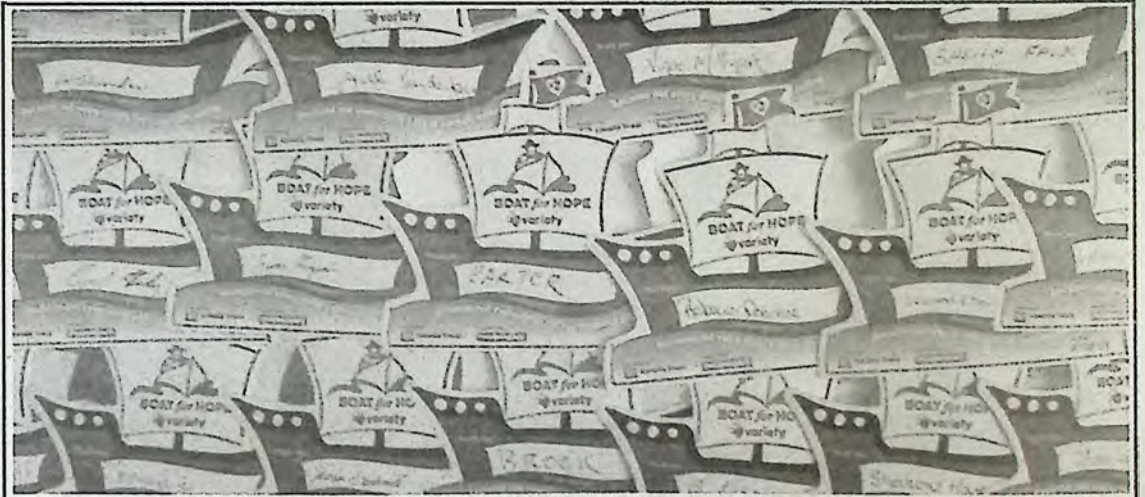

SFU Dean writes to us about FSA's

The Sun, although Canwest's stated mission is to "inform, enlighten, and entertain," is a for-profit enterprise and the Report Card issue is said to be the newspaper's second largest selling one of the year. Personally, I prefer to entrust our children's interests with the Ministry, the BCTF, our school principals, superintendents, and trustees, even though they have to debate their way to a working consensus. I allege theirs is an honest, professional debate with student welfare, not economic or political gain at its heart.

Finally there is the issue of validity and the DM makes the case for the FSA's usefulness at appraising student achievement in the B.C. curriculum as a step in improving instruction. SFU's visiting professor, David Berliner, a leading educational psychologist, has written about this matter in his new book *Collateral Damage* (Harvard Education Press). He enumerates four types of validity and here's how, in my view, the FSA stacks up in terms of this analysis once the third player entered the marriage! Content validity (that is the relation of the FSA to the B.C. curriculum) remains unchanged; the FSA

appears to be rooted in the curriculum but functioning at a general enough level that its clear relationship to improvement of instruction may be a difficult case to make. Construct validity, or the "underlying characteristics" that the FSA measures, is corrupted by the media making the assessment into high stakes testing. Since the FSA is used for school rankings, as well as instructional improvement, test prepping and test taking skills have increasingly become the constructs being tested. Rather than the test serving the curriculum, the curriculum is manipulated to serve the test. Because of the superficial analysis of the Fraser/Sun data presentation (unlike other models such as that of the C.D. Howe Institute), the influence of socio-economic status on FSA outcomes is left unconsidered. Criterion validity asks what the tests are predicting about future academic achievement and the FSA was designed to have a role along with teacher tests and other assessments in making this judgment. Through the Fraser/Sun intervention the FSA is given far disproportionate weight and a misleading aura of precision in this regard. Consequential validity speaks to the decisions made in

light of test scores. Once again, as the non-educators at the Fraser Institute and The Vancouver Sun forcefully took center stage in this debate, the FSA began to influence real estate purchases, the migration of children from school to school, public perception of school performance, and parental reaction to testing. We have witnessed a movement of "parental nullification" of testing by parents who withhold their children from the process as a way of protesting the consequences of the Fraser/Sun's misuse of the data.

The "third person" has for the moment changed the landscape of testing in B.C. We cannot ignore the impact on the FSA dialogue of a highly publicized and unscientific use of its data. It is likely that the Fraser/Sun Report Card is having a detrimental impact on at least three of the four types of validity. Educators hope that we can get back to an honest and grounded debate on evaluation issues that results in ongoing, meaningful school renewal and not an American-style testing mania that narrows the curriculum and urges "one size fits all" schools. The impact of the FSA, originally intended to inform parents and educators and to promote considered school choice and reform, is being corrupted. The de facto results, if unchecked, will include less variation in school experiences and a flight from progressive educational change. These results will also include moving schooling toward preparation for testing rather than effective preparation for life in our society. You don't have to look far to see it happening elsewhere.

Students and Income Tax

As the School year is ending and students leave post secondary institutions or you are preparing to attend a post secondary institution in the fall you should inform Canada Revenue Agency of your new address as soon as possible.

What should you do if you move?

Keeping CRA informed will ensure that you keep receiving any GST/HST credit, Universal Child Care Benefit payments and Canada Child Tax Benefit payments to which you may be entitled. Otherwise, your payments may stop, whether you receive them by cheque or by direct deposit.

You can keep your information updated on line if you have a User ID and password to access the My Account online services on the CRA website. This is a useful tool for inquiring on all of your information with CRA. If you do not have access to the CRS website you can inform CRA of any change in address by phone or fax or mail. Make sure you sign any correspondence sent to CRA and include your social insurance number, your new address, and the date of your move. If you are writing for other people, including your spouse or common law partner, include their social insurance numbers, and have each of them sign the letter authorizing the change to his or her records.

You can also authorize a representative (such as your accountant, father, mother, or spouse or common-law partner) to get information on your tax matters and submit or provide information on your behalf. Only after we are satisfied that you have authorized us to do so either through My Account on the CRA Web site or in writing.

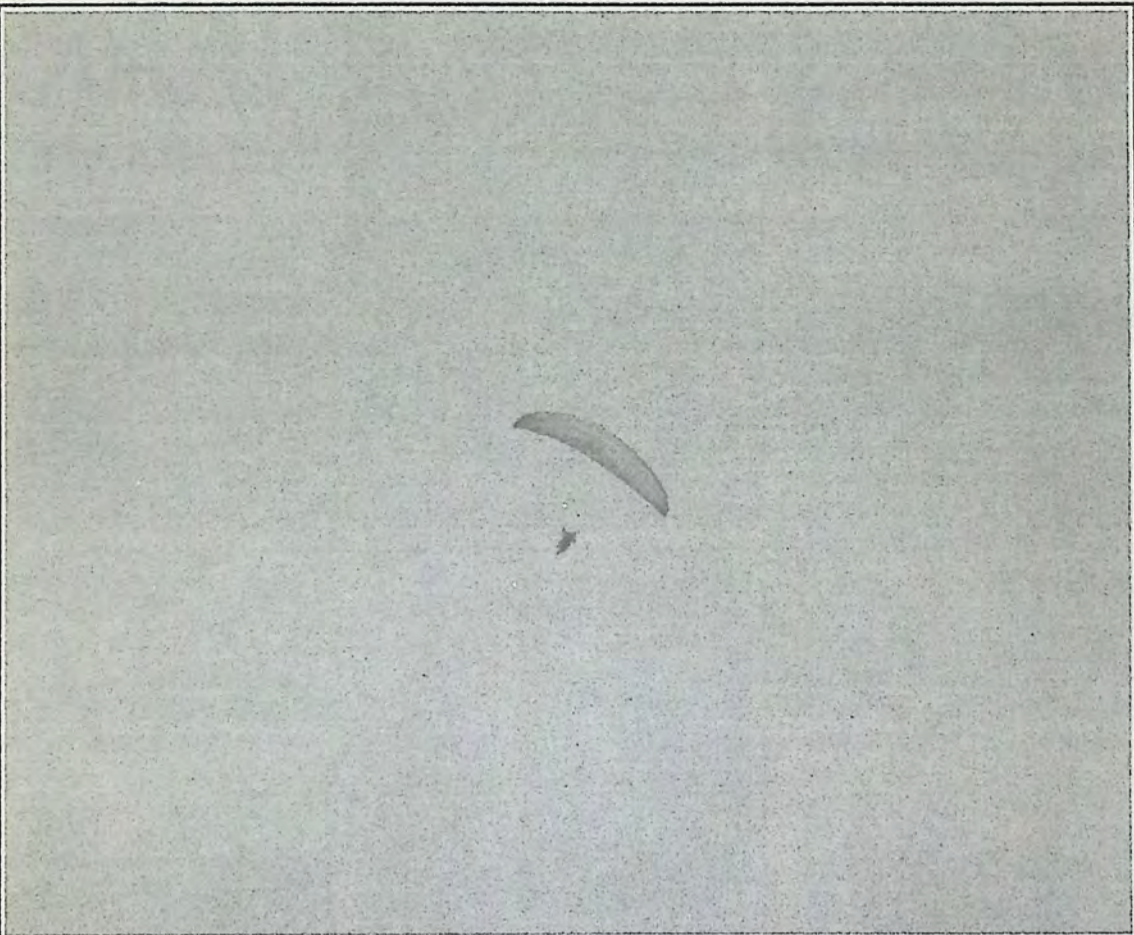
Your authorization will stay in effect until it is cancelled by you, it reaches the expiry date you choose, or on notification of your death. For more information or to authorize a representative, see Form T1013.

Summer Beet Salad with Almonds & Chives

Makes 4 servings.

Ingredients:

- 1 1/2 pounds beets - red, yellow, the candy-stripped Chioggia, or a mixture
- 1/4 cup slivered almonds, roasted
- 2 tbsp. extra-virgin olive oil
- 1 tbsp. minced fresh chives, plus a few whole chives for garnish
- 1 tsp. fresh lemon juice
- 1/8 tsp. kosher salt or sea salt- 2 oz. feta or goat cheese, crumbled

Preparation:

Place beets in a medium pot and cover with water. Cover, bring to a boil and cook 15 to 25 minutes, until a beet is easily pierced with a fork. Drain, let cool, and use a pairing knife and fingers to slide off skins. Cut beets into bite-sized pieces and place in a large salad bowl. Add almonds, olive oil, chives, lemon juice and salt, and toss gently. Sprinkle with feta, lay whole chives across salad as garnish and serve.

How would we have known?

Dawn's column on the following page made me think back to my own High School days, which followed a generation after Dawn's.

I went to school in Kelowna. By the time I reached Grade 10, there was only one school in the area that went beyond that, which was KSS - Kelowna Secondary School.

As we came near the end of Grade 10 - in 1976 - we learned that our school, KLO, was going to expand to include Grades 11 and 12 and that there was such a population explosion that another school (OKM) was going to be built. The bad news was that we would be entering into 'shifts' as both school populations shared the KLO building. Being a KLO student meant the early morning shift, which I recall seemed to go by pretty quick. I know I didn't mind that classes ended earlier than 3:00 PM.

What I remember most about my final two years of schooling was how unprepared we were becoming for our entry into the 'real' world. And it wasn't our fault.

One of my most vivid memories of Grade 12 happened in Biology class. Our teacher was a university teacher who took on the challenge of teaching senior high classes to students going to a school that was just expanding into senior high classes.

I can't remember the exact experiment but I do recall one day the class was unable to perform the lesson plan for that day as the school expanded without being fully equipped for the new courses. The teacher told us to read about the experiment in our text books and 'pretend' we had done it as it was impossible to do without the proper equipment.

It wasn't the only class a lot of us in the very first Grad Class of KLO (1978!) had to 'fake' or skipped or received a passing grade just for attending.

And I don't feel ripped off or cheated because of it. The semester system was great as it allowed some of us a 'second chance' if we didn't pass a course the first time. In Grade 12 I was repeating English 11 in the first semester. Counsellors advised me against it, but I got through and actually sailed through English 12 in the second semester.

Mind you, those same Counsellors advised against my wishes to enter the field of Media, starting with Radio.

Based on where our society is now, there was nothing in 1978 that could have prepared us for what we met when we finally stepped out into the 'real' world.

I agree with Dawn that even in my final years in high school most of us had no idea what skills we'd need. In fact, out of the 75 or 76 of us in my Grad Class, a very small percentage of us had any clue what we wanted to do once we graduated.

Would I have done anything differently? Probably not other than paying a little more attention to English when I was in Grade 11 and I realized years ago I should have taken typing. I never would have thought EVERY DAY of my working life would include an up close and personal relationship with a typewriter or keyboard.

But you know, even in the mid-1970's typing class was viewed as more geared to young women who may enter the clerical field so it wouldn't have been a choice on the top of my list of 'electives' for my final few years of schooling.

Yep, I feel like a dinosaur all of a sudden.

There's no doubt the system was flawed when I was in school and probably always had some flaws, but for anyone to be able to navigate through twelve years of brain expanding exercise and come out of the end of it smarter and at least somewhat prepared for real life adventures (rent, income tax, job hunting, marriage, divorce, children, etc.) something good has happened.

Congratulations, Grads. You've made it this far.

The ride is just beginning.

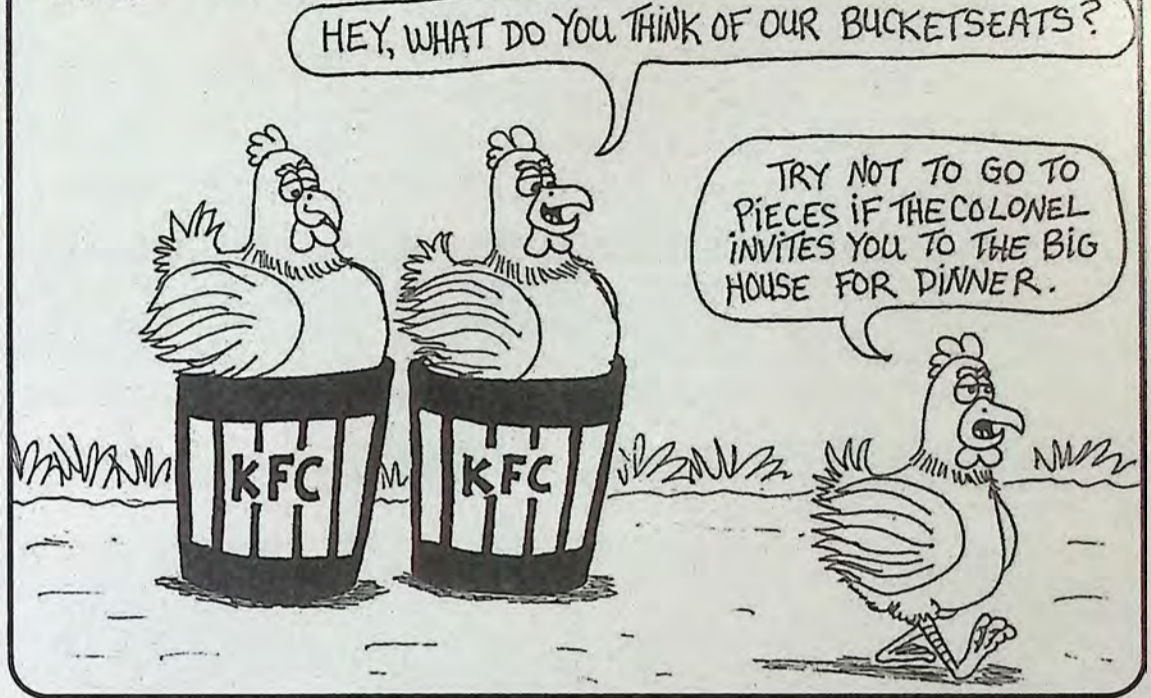

Green turns on McLaughlin

The Editor:

Two weeks ago, both local newspapers carried an article about the economy of the Similkameen Valley written by our communal Economic Development Officer, Michael McLaughlin. For me, this article conveyed a most discouraging message for the Valley in general, and Princeton in particular.

McLaughlin, quite correctly, points out that the resource based sector of the economy is shrinking and along with it, the opportunities for resource based secondary industry. He also, quite correctly, notes that industry agglomerates, a fancy way of saying they form clusters, largely for access to resources and convenience of services they communally require. Once you have a sufficient successful core, other industries are attracted and the circle of participation can be expected to grow.

McLaughlin now appears to recognize that Princeton has no existing industrial core to facilitate agglomeration. Drawing industry to Princeton will be a hard sell, he suggests, one to be handled with careful strategy and shrewdness! We need to be astute and cunning to attract business? Strange choice of words! Perhaps enthusiastic and accommodating would be better!

Not long ago we were offered the chance to agglomerate services around a very big local project, but no, we did not want Compliance Energy! Well, that ship has sailed. We need to move on. Unfortunately, McLaughlin appears to have low regard for the natural resource sector and manufacturing. He favours the service industry as the way of the future. McLaughlin

suggests that the service industry is the rising economic star. He also hints that one of the growing income sources in Canada is non-employment income from public and private pensions and investments income earned by retired people like me. We older folks, thanks to our growing numbers, are being presented as an economic opportunity; a pleasant change from being seen as a drag on the system.

He concludes his article by asking, What are we going to chase, the shrinking market or the growing market? Good question! Here is how I see it!

By definition, the service industry does not produce goods. It services those who do, and serves the public. The service sector is huge, thanks to the increasing complexity of doing business, and a growing population in need of ever-broadening help and advice. It includes retail and wholesale sales; health care and social assistance, accommodations and food services; professional, scientific and technical services; educational services; finance, insurance and real estate; transportation and warehousing; information, culture and recreation; public administration and defense; business, building and other support service; and other various forms of management. The largest employer within services is wholesale and retail trade, followed by health care and social assistance, and accommodation and food services. Among these, accommodation and food services are the lowest paid at \$12.69 on average, so please, stop pinning your hopes on seasonal

tourism.

McLaughlin claims that six areas of the service industry have higher average earnings than the manufacturing sector, again probably true. It is not hard to imagine that many of these service providers earn far more than a mere manufacturing working stiff; but how is that relevant for Princeton? We, no doubt, have a few people from all these service areas among us - and we certainly have more than our share of folks with non-employment income. I fail to see how our service industry and our pensioners can lead Princeton to prosperity. Unfortunately, the service industry agglomerates just like the manufacturing industry. The more people a community has, the more services it can support. Penticton, though not highly industrialized, has the critical population mass to support a large array of services. Princeton, on the other hand, must manage with the bare necessities.

I can not agree that Princeton should ignore its natural resources as a base for future development. While employment in the resource industries has declined through technological efficiencies, our resources and their trade still underlies the creation of true productivity. If there were no goods there would be little need for services. I have heard it said that an economy can not prosper by selling hamburgers to each other. That is not really true. By the time you bite into that hamburger its production has passed repeatedly through many sectors of both, the goods and services industries, all taking profit along the way. continued on Page 26

What they don't tell the Grads

On graduation day, every speaker has words of congratulations and advice for students leaving secondary school. Those words are fine, but there are a whole lot of things they don't tell the grads. I don't blame the speakers. The grads aren't listening anyway. They are too excited about themselves and their parties.

I have attended countless graduation ceremonies during my lifetime, and they all blend together in a haze of beautiful young faces and the everlasting hype of the "big day". It is a big day. Going from kindergarten through Grade 12 is a long journey in learning and life experience. Unfortunately, it is not a big preparation for anything but the lifelong learning curve.

I am old, but I'm still learning. I believe this is the crux of what the speakers don't tell the grads: you don't get a break from learning. Life itself is about learning, and then learning more.

When I started school at the end of World War II, nobody could have told me what would happen in my future. The advice they gave me, and their expectations of what I would do, were all wrong. Unfortunately, I believed some of what they told me. Fortunately, I paid little attention to a whole lot more that they told me.

When I look back, I realize I had no preparation really for the life I was to lead. One of the smartest things I did was to learn French. I made a lot of use of it when I lived in Europe. However, nobody told me I could have used lessons in German and Italian, and who would have guessed knowing Japanese might have been an advantage for my class?

Another smart thing I did was learn the basics of typing. Nobody knew then that much of our lives

were going to be about using a computer keyboard, but that is where I'm at today.

When I was a grad, people seemed to think life was predictable. We expected to go to work at some kind of job, get married, have kids, buy a house, and get old by the age of 50. We expected to earn enough to buy all of the usual household equipment to furnish a home, and buy a car as well. We expected to be able to afford to fill the gas tank.

We had no idea how much our environment would change in the years to come. We had no idea we would live through the Cold War, the Cuban Missile Crisis, the Kennedy assassinations, and sundry other major events. We had no idea that our generation would launch the civil rights movement, or rebel against going to war in Viet Nam, or that so many of us who married with the certainty it would last forever would experience divorce.

When I graduated from high school, Princeton did not even have television. We had no idea our local movie theatre would close down because we could watch movies at home.

We had no idea we would have to educate our children about drug abuse. In fact, most of us did not

drink much alcohol, and we had a "dry" grad, and enjoyed it.

We did not know about credit cards and lines of credit on your bank account, and that proved to be a challenge for many of us.

We really do not know what to tell young people about what to expect, do we?

When I think of all of the plans I made, I realize those plans were based on life as we knew it at the time, and so was the advice we received.

The best advice anybody gave me was this: work hard, be honest, live life with a whole heart. What they didn't tell me was that I would never be able to rest on what I knew, because knowledge is growing by leaps and bounds, and a lot of things I thought I knew for sure turned out to be misinformation.

I believe I would tell young people today: do not expect to go through life without being ready to learn more and more just to stay even in the workplace. Expect to have to change life goals at a moment's notice.

It would be nice to have a crystal ball and be able to predict the future for our grads, but we cannot. The best we can do is wish for them that they become the best people they can be no matter what life throws at them.

One Big Happy Family

There is a story about a guy who was shipwrecked on a desert island, and after 20 years he was finally rescued. As they loaded his stuff into the rescue boat, he showed the captain his house that he had built and then said, see the building up on the hill? That's the church I go to. The captain said as they left the island as he looked up on the other side of the hill, where the rescued man's church was and asked him, what is that building on the other side of the hill? The man said, Oh, that's the church I used to go to.

I remember when I was living in a small community, talking to someone about going to church. The comment made to me was, Why are there so many churches if there is only one God? In trying to explain my perspective as to why there are so many churches, I mentioned that I did agree this was confusing, but many churches believe fundamentally the same way and it really did not matter what church you went to as long as it was a bible-believing church that emphasized that Jesus Christ came to earth to die for your sins.

The timing was great for my side.

But, in all fairness to his question, what is it about the church? The way I read it in the Bible, Jesus only established one church. The saying is only true when the only money entering the local economy goes to the very lowest wage earners in the ranks of services.
In spite of McLaughlin's apparent misgivings, I agree with Monty Raine that Town Council needs set a firm time line for development of the industrial park. Other than ecotourism, I can not imagine what novel money making service McLaughlin hopes to attract to Princeton.

If such possibilities are real, we should hear about specifics. Promoting Princeton as a retirement

haven seems quite unnecessary since this is already the largest demographic group we attract.
There is no real reason to favor one of these economic drivers over another, as McLaughlin appears to suggest. They are not at odds! We may not have a focus for industrial agglomeration at this point, but if we can not offer a home for light industry; we never will have one! The industrial park, promoted with pride and enthusiasm, is still our best hope for economic security - but you can not sell a product if you don't believe it!
