## Campbell receives top award

The Governor General's Academic Medal was first awarded in 1873 by the Earl of Dufferin and has since become one of the most prestigious awards that a student in a Canadian educational institution can receive. A Bronze Medal is awarded to the student who achieves the highest average upon graduation from a secondary school. The average includes all Grade 11 and Grade 12 courses as listed on the student's official Transcript of

Grades issued by the Ministry of Education. The average cannot be anticipated, it must be calculated based on the final results after provincial exams. MaryAnn Campbell was presented the Bronze Medal last Thursday by Princeton Secondary School Principal Bill Lawrence. This is not a monetary award. The Academic Medal confirms, in Campbell's own words, that she is "the best of the best."

## Legion Branch 56 passes the torch

This Saturday, September 8, the Royal Canadian Legion of Princeton will spend a day of celebration and an evening of remembrance. Legion members will celebrate the 80th anniversary of the founding of George Pearkes Branch 56, and will cap the day with two public events, the re-dedication of the Cenotaph and the Candlelight Tribute at the Town cemetery. This will be the first time the Princeton branch has done a Candlelight Tribute.

At noon, members will gather at the Legion lounge for Veteran's Appreciation Lunch. Branch 56 has 85 veterans, all of whom are invited to attend. Princeton's MLA will be there, and a member of Town Council, along with numerous BC Legion dignitaries. Premier Campbell has sent a message to be read.

The 80th birthday will be celebrated after the luncheon. A huge cake is being baked and decorated this

week. A few surprises for members are part of the birthday party fun. From 2:30 to 4:30 PM, the usual Saturday afternoon meat draw will be held, and this will be a time to mix and mingle.

A free light supper is planned for 4:30 to 5:30, followed by the re-dedication ceremony at the Cenotaph.

The re-dedication is a public event, and the Legion would like to see the public attend. The ceremony

involves a new brass plaque being placed on the Cenotaph monument. The plaque on the monument now gives a review of those lost in the two great wars of the past century. The new plaque will honour those who have been involved in peace-keeping in so many hot spots around the globe, and will include Viet Nam veterans. Canadian soldiers have lost their lives in peace-keeping missions in Egypt, Cyprus, Bosnia, Rwanda and other areas, as

well as in Afghanistan, where 69 Canadians have died trying to keep the peace. The merchant marines will receive recognition on this plaque for their role in war time.

Buses to the cemetery will be available to the public as well as Legion members right after the re-dedication ceremony. Members of the public are encouraged to participate in the Candlelight Tribute. The public may take a bus or drive to the cemetery.

The tribute represents the passing of the Torch of Remembrance from one generation to another. The Legion will place storm candles on the graves of those who are buried in the Field of Honour, which is a section of the cemetery, but there are many veterans who are buried in other areas of the cemetery. Members of the public who wish to place a candle on any of these veterans' graves are invited to do so. There are plenty of candles.

## How to enter your stuff in the Fair

Many people think about entering something in the fair, but do not know how to do it. It is easy.

If you obtain a prize list booklet, available in several locations in town, you will see a wide array of categories in which people enter exhibits.

Each category shows the entry fee, usually 50 cents per item, and the prize money, which is \$5.00 for first in most categories. Junior Fair entries cost 25 cents and prizes are slightly lower.

You may decide to enter a jar of jelly, a loaf of bread, some flowers,

a woodwork project and some photographs. Here is how you do it.

Each booklet has an entry form on the back page. You fill in the entry form, using the number and name of the class in which you are entering an exhibit. Just follow the numbers in the booklet.

Take your entries to the fairgrounds on Thursday or Friday between 3:00 and 6:00 PM. If you have questions, the registrar will help you. You pay your entry fee, and on Saturday, you can see if you won a prize. Judging is done for most exhibits on Friday evening,

but livestock and poultry will be judged on Saturday.

The booklet will explain the rules. Prize money can be collected on Saturday afternoon.

On Sunday afternoon, at 3:00 PM, you can remove your exhibit and your ribbon. If you do not pick up your things, they will be considered a donation to the auction at the end of the fair.

Top exhibitors will be recognized in each division.

Rogers Foods Ltd. of Armstrong, BC, is sponsoring a special prize for bakers at the Fall Fair. Anyone

entering a loaf of whole wheat bread made with Rogers No Additive Whole Wheat Flour is eligible to win a rosette ribbon and cash prize sponsored by Rogers. First prize is \$10, second is \$6 and third is \$4. The baker must include the Rogers logo from the front of the bag to prove using the Rogers product.

If you enter art, the public will do the judging.

There will be People's Choice awards for poultry and the scarecrow contest, so you might want to try your hand at judging.

## Sweater Kittens help raise \$5.1 million

During the weekend of August 17th to 19th, a group of 11 women, affectionately known by their friends and supporters as The Sweater Kittens, hit the streets of Vancouver for breast cancer care and research. Hailing from the Okanagan/Similkameen to the Lower Mainland, this group of dedicated women have raised a whopping \$31,237 over the past year with events such as Snow Golf, The Boobie Ball, a clothing drive, a garage sale and a

raffle.

Team Captain, Mardi Hassell (Kelowna), a breast cancer survivor, says "The event itself is amazing and so worthwhile in terms of dollars and what they can buy, but on a more personal level, the support and encouragement that we've received is what life is all about."

Along with Mardi Hassell, the Sweater Kittens, Margo Boyer and Tamara McInnis (Port Coquitlam), Kasia Mikulski, Colleen Laferriere, Steph Hassell, Szilvia Tanu (Surrey), Vickie Marr, Leah Ward, Sandra Gunn (Tulameen), and Jayne Baggott (New Westminster) have already signed up and agreed to walk another 60 kilometres in 2008!

For the 2007 event, the BC Cancer Foundation announced that 2,012 participants raised \$5.1 million in Vancouver's 4th annual Weekend to End Breast Cancer event, a 60 kilometre walk to raise funds for breast cancer research and care at the BC Cancer Agency (BCCA). The fifth annual Weekend to End Breast Cancer benefiting the BC Cancer Foundation is already planned for September 5-7, 2008.

Prior to the launch of The Weekend to End Breast Cancer event in Vancouver, BC Cancer Foundation could only invest less than \$200,000 a year in breast cancer research and programming. Proceeds from The Weekend to End Breast Cancer event have enabled BC Cancer Foundation to invest \$10 million over the last three years in breast cancer initiatives.

"We are extremely grateful and appreciate everyone's involvement in the Weekend as they display what it means to be a hero,"

says Nick Locke, Interim CEO of the BC Cancer Foundation. "Months of planning go into this event with regard to the route and street safety; providing plenty of pit stops for walkers to re-hydrate and refuel; and we've got a great volunteer medical response team on hand at all times to help with blisters, dehydration, or any other medical issues."

Walkers set out early Saturday morning after an uplifting Opening Ceremonies at the UBC Thunderbird Stadium. Hours later, they arrived at a "Tent City" erected at Killarney Park, where they were greeted by hot showers, meals and entertainment. Perhaps a little weary from their 30 kilometre trek the day before, participants had no problem finding the drive to get up early the next morning and continue on the last 30 kilometres to the finish line. Many walked in memory or to support others battling breast cancer.

Hundreds of Volunteers and Crew Members are on hand to provide support over the course of the two day event including meals, water and snack stops, gear transport, portable restrooms, safety on the streets, and comprehensive medical services.

"This multi-day event is for people wanting to do something BOLD in the fight against breast cancer," says Dr. Karen Gelmon, Head of the BC Provincial Breast Tumour Group. "Progress in research needs a sustained commitment over years to combat breast cancer and we are truly grateful for the continued support from so many walkers and donors. The funds raised have allowed us support to otherwise ..... continued on Page 24

**Crews battle Cawston blaze**

Keremeos Volunteer Fire Department were quick to respond to a wildfire that sparked up near Barcello Road in Cawston.

The fire raced up an eastern mountain slope at around 1:30 PM August 27th.

Firefighter and media spokesperson Melanie Bagley says the blaze was moving fast.

"The fire took off fairly quickly and it was about seven hectares in size. The only thing that was threatened at that time was an orchard and the fire was only

about 40 feet away from somebody's orchard."

The Keremeos fire team got help from the Ministry of Forests with an air team sent over from the Fire Command Centre in Penticton and as it turned out, a group training from Abbotsford were also sent to help.

"I think they were actually on a training exercise," Bagley says.

"So rather than being on training they did their training for real."

A Conair tanker attacked the blaze from above while crews knocked it down on ground level.

"Some air tankers came out.

There was one bomber, a Conair, and two or three fire cat fishers which are smaller aircraft, and a bird dog which is a very small aircraft, which flies around and works out where people are going to drop their retardants and water."

Bagley says the weather conditions were favourable for fighting the fire.

"And also since it wasn't so hot, and there wasn't a lot of wind, it kept the flare ups quite slow."

A total of 14 Keremeos Volunteer Firefighters attended the scene, including three from the high school fire program.

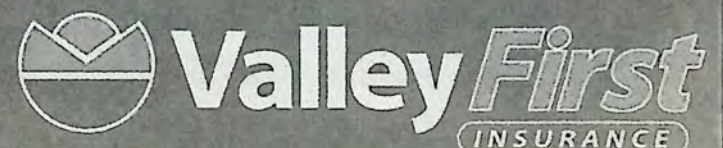

Back pain knows no barriers. If you took a moment to reflect on your activities within the past few weeks, you would likely have a good indication of why your back is 'suddenly' so sore. Your body may have become irritated by repeatedly performing daily functions incorrectly.

Your back consists of tiny bones, called vertebrae, which make up the spine. The spine runs from the base of the skull to the lower back area. It provides your torso support and stability. The spine balances on the pelvic bones (otherwise known as the hip bones). Thus, any movement of the pelvis affects the spine.

Slight changes in how you perform certain daily activities will put less stress on your back and, in return, put less stress on the muscles that support the spine.

Use the following information to help you make changes to the way you use your body throughout the day. If you have severe back pain, please seek medical advice.

**How to sit:**  
- spine straight

**Tips to avoid being workstation wounded**

(NC)—If you work regularly at a computer, guess how many key-strokes you hit each day. The answer — 50,000 to 200,000. That's lots of hours at a desk, repetitive motion, and chances that you'll strain or injure your arm, hand, fingers, shoulder, neck or back.

We don't think of being a desk jockey as a contact sport. Yet improper posture, poor work space design, and physical exertion can lead to nerve, muscle, tendon and ligament damage. In a Microsoft Canada survey, half of respondents had experienced discomfort or pain while using a computer.

How can you avoid being one of the workstation wounded? The Canadian Orthopaedic Foundation offers these tips.

**Start with the right ergonomics.**

- A comfortable chair, large enough to change positions, with adjustable armrests that position elbows near your waist. Angle the back slightly backwards, to reduce strain on the spine and ligaments. You should be able to sit back (no slouching or leaning), and keep your feet flat on the ground or on a foot rest.

- Keyboard at elbow height, with your monitor in front of you, an arm's length away and with the top third at eye level.

- Pick a mouse that feels relatively flat and keep it on the same level as the keyboard.  
- When typing, the best position is 'neutral' — knuckles, wrist and top of forearm in a straight line.

Along with the correct ergonomics, a simple injury prevention strategy is the 20-20 rule — a 20 second break

- feet flat on the floor, or slightly raised

- Try to stand up every 30-40 minutes. Give your neck, shoulders, lower back and legs a stretch before sitting down to work again.

**How not to sit:**

- slouched forward  
- lower back unsupported by the chair

**How to stand:**

- body erect in a comfortable stance  
- feet slightly apart  
- abdominals tight  
- shift your weight from side to side occasionally  
- rest one foot on a stool or rail six inches high.

**How not to stand:**

- in the same position for long periods of time  
- wearing high heels (if you must, remove them every few hours)

**How to lift:**

- feet should be shoulder width apart, one slightly in front of the other  
- squat down directly in front of the object  
- lift using your legs to do most of the work  
- lift first, then turn if necessary  
- ask for help when lifting a heavy

object

**How not to lift:**

- bending over from the waist  
- using your back to lift  
- lifting and turning at the same time  
**How to work out with your back in mind:**

- wear comfortable shoes  
- warm up before performing strenuous activities  
- move your body (back especially) through gentle ranges of motion  
- share your back history with your fitness professional so adjustments can be made to your program  
- try low impact activities like swimming, aqua fitness, or cycling  
- strengthen your abdominal muscles  
- listen to your body . . . if it hurts, don't do it!!

Carrying excess fat in the abdomen weakens the abdominal muscles and creates more stress on the back. A sensible, low fat eating plan and a regular exercise program can help you reduce the amount of fat you are carrying. Losing fat weight should be done gradually and sensibly.

These lifestyle changes should not take the place of those prescribed for you by your physician or physio-therapist.

"Do a different task, get up and move around, doing neck, shoulder, elbow, and wrist stretches," says Dr. Stewart Wright of the division of orthopaedic surgery, at Toronto's Sunnybrook Health Sciences Centre.

Pay attention to pain, aches, numbness or tingling. If breaks and re-positioning your work area don't help, talk to your doctor.

"Repetitive motion injuries happen over time, so a minor strain today could eventually become chronic," says Angelique Berg, executive director of the Canadian Orthopaedic Foundation. "Make daily, preventative measures part of your job to stay pain-free at work."

**living past 100****Eat more pears**

You will hear a lot of promotion of blueberries and broccoli, but nothing about pears. When it comes to good food for older folk, pears should top the list.

Pears contain a type of dietary fibre that helps lower cholesterol. This fibre is called lignin, and lignin traps the cholesterol before it can be absorbed through the intestine.

Because pears contain this type of fibre, they are excellent as a laxative. The fibre in pears soaks up a lot of water, which prevents constipation and protects against colon cancer.

That is not the end of the good news about pears. This fruit contains another fibre called pectin, just like in apples. Pectin dissolves in the intestine, forming a gel-like coating, and this binds with cholesterol. In addition, pectin helps clear blood vessels of a build-up of fat.

For best effect, eat two pears a day.

Pears protect against osteoporosis because they contain boron, which helps bones stay strong. There are few dietary sources of boron, so eat those pears to prevent loss of calcium.

The boron in pears is good for your brain, too. Boron deficiency mimics all the signals of mental aging — poor memory, poor perception and limited attention span. Eating pears can improve memory, perception and attention.

When you eat a pear, eat the skin, too. Do not cut away the skin of a pear. Whenever possible, eat fresh raw pears. Canned pears are not bad if packed in light syrup, but the best benefits come from fresh pears.

If you have an abundance of pears, you can make pear sauce. Simply core the pears, cook until soft, mash thoroughly, then can the sauce. Pear sauce is great on its own and very good as a condiment with turkey.

## Mammography fundraiser continues

The fundraising campaign for the new Digital Stereotactic Mammography Machine to detect breast cancer, located at the Penticton Regional Hospital is just \$200,000 short of the \$1-million goal.

The SOSMF - South Okanagan Similkameen Medical Foundation is asking people to dig a bit deeper into their pockets to make this dream a reality. If all of the funds are raised by December 31, 2007 the machine will be ordered and may be fully operational by June 1, 2008.

Ken Jaggard, Chair of the South Okanagan Similkameen Medical Foundation is deeply proud of this campaign, "because it is state of the art and exactly what our citizens deserve; the best medical equipment possible to detect breast cancer and it is available for everyone living in the South Okanagan and Similkameen region."

However, as one of our donors stated recently, "as much as we would like to be helping these worthwhile causes, these days, cash is tight! With rising electrical costs, housing prices and the worst has to be; the rising cost of gasoline, if you live on a fixed income, how can you possibly help your favourite charities and make a difference in our community?"

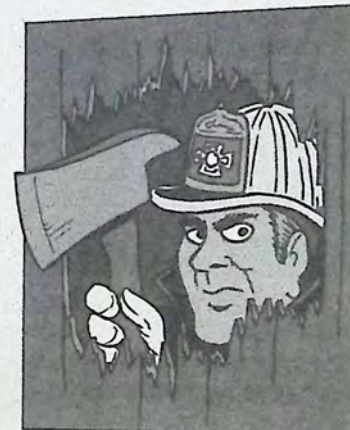

**Vacation Properties and Capital Gains -  
Remember To Track Your Costs**

As most Canadians know, the capital gain that you may realize when you sell your home is exempt from tax. Under our tax rules, a family unit (generally you, your spouse and your minor children) can exempt a gain from one residence only (before 1982, each taxpayer in a family could exempt one property that they own).

If you or your family unit owns more than one property, this means that some tax will be payable on the gain from one property when it is sold. Often, tax is paid on the sale of the property with the lower value (on the assumption that the gain is lower on that property) and this property is often the vacation property.

So, because the gain on your vacation home may be taxable in the future, it is important to keep track of the cost to acquire the property - both at the time of purchase and for any improvements made. The higher your documented cost, the lower the gain when you sell. So, be sure to track these costs and keep receipts. And, remember to keep in mind that some items may be difficult to categorize in terms of an expense versus an improvement. Unlike normal tax planning for income calculations, you'll want to justify (within reason) as many expenditures as you can as improvements as opposed to operating costs.

The key test is whether the expenditure maintained or returned the property to its original condition, or the expenditure made the property better than it was previously.

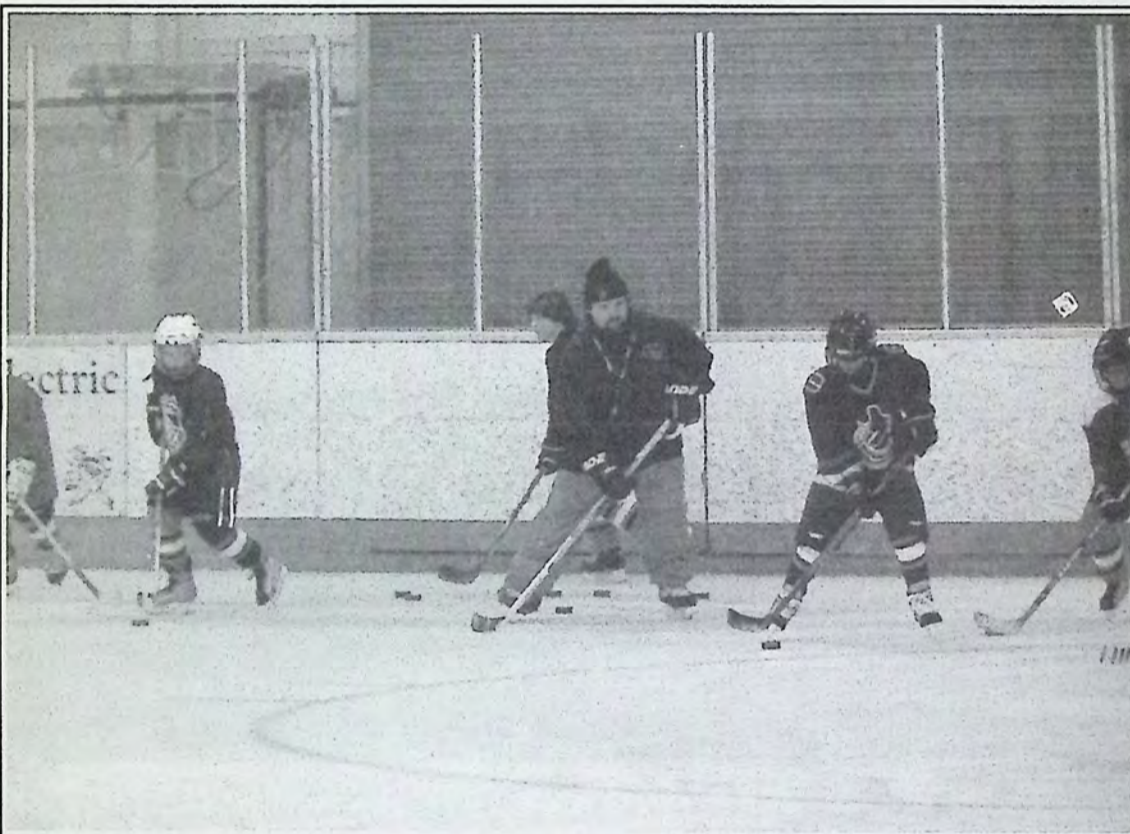

### When history becomes history

We never thought we'd see the day when Princeton Museum would become the butt of jokes – the punch line to a more serious problem.

Maybe you've heard a few of them already.

What do you get when you put a dehumidifier in the basement of the Princeton Museum? A few litres of water and the satisfaction of preserving precious documents for one more day.

What's it mean when the alarm goes off at Princeton Museum? The basement's probably flooded – again.

Which has more cracks - the pavement on Old Hedley Road or the basement walls of Princeton Museum? It depends on who's asking.

There's no doubt the place where most of Princeton's history is stored needs some work. The Society and volunteers who baby-sit the collection of historic artifacts, documents, and rare items that connect the community to its past have done the best they can with what they have.

Now it's time for an overhaul.

A road trip a week ago along Old Hedley Road helped us connect with the past and the pioneers who were responsible for the early development of the region.

We hiked a portion of the Dewdney Trail, which dates back to the 1860's. The section we explored was easy to access and for a moment we imagined what the trip would have been like for the traders, miners and others who used the route as the only way through the Similkameen Valley.

We marveled at trees discovered along the way that were blown down in a recent windstorm that were no less than 200 years old. We tried to imagine the landscape and what the area would have been like in the early 1800's.

We visited pictographs and discovered others we had not seen before. These were markings left behind by First Nations people traveling the area long before the Dewdney Trail happened. We tried to imagine what the area would have been like in the 1700's and before.

Then we realized how lucky we were to be living in a place where the Museum has all this information and so much more either displayed or warehoused in boxes and file cabinets constantly in danger of destruction only because of the condition of their present home.

We tried to imagine the history of the area becoming history.

It sent us back to a time when history was passed down from family to family and generation to generation in the only way it could be kept alive without damage – through verbal communication.

You'd think with all the technology at our disposal in the present day that finding a way to preserve the local history would be easier than figuring out how to power another dehumidifier in the Museum basement without tripping a breaker.

Or tripping over a bucket of water.

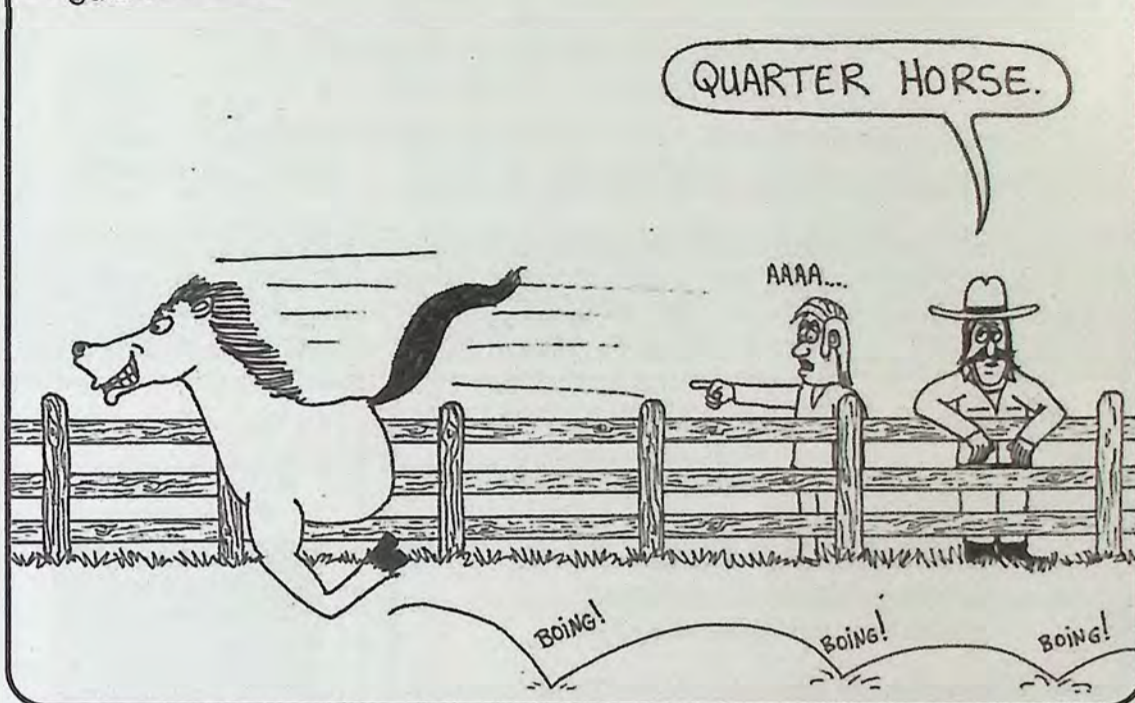

### Merritt man hits his target

To The Editor;

Stephen Harper refuses to acknowledge the slaughter of civilians that has become standard fair in the American run 'Canadian' mission in Afghanistan; instead he hides behind the most dishonest of propaganda.

Mr. Harper, like Paul Martin before him and more recently the delinquent government of Alberta, is using Canada's troops as a political shield. # People spoke out against SPP

The North America Security and Prosperity Partnership, SPP, brought together in April representatives of government from Canada and Mexico as well as outspoken individuals. The Council of Canadians, a non-partisan organization of Canadian citizens, hosted the conference in Ottawa.

There were no representatives from the Liberals, the Conservatives, nor the Bloc Quebecois. Only the New Democrats and the Green Party were interested in discussing a partnership that would change the political face of North America and have consequences for Canadian citizenship and Canadian sovereignty.

Elizabeth May, leader of the Green Party, told the conference that SPP is an "attack on our core identity and on our sovereignty by stealth". She went on to say SPP is a fork in the road for Canadian society - whether we are going to pursue traditional Canadian values internationally, or whether we are going to become part of Fortress North America, a large gated community where U.S. security forces will guard the perimeter".

A Mexican, José Antonio Almazan, represented the Partido de la Revolution Democratica (Democratic Revolution Party). He stated, "The SPP is not an alliance, it's a relationship of subordination. In the context of the constitutional and legal framework of Mexico, we consider it to be a semi-colonial arrangement, insofar as it implies even more of a loss of our sovereignty as a nation."

Almazan said there is growing opposition to SPP in Mexico in parliamentary and congressional circles and among civil society activists.

Peter Julian, speaking for the New Democrats, began by stating NAFTA has failed. He said NAFTA did not bring more prosperity and employment to Canada, nor more exports, and the idea that it did so is based on myth. He said the only people benefitting from NAFTA are corporate lawyers and CEO's. Julian attend the conference armed with economic facts. Since NAFTA, the poorest

Canadian families have lost the equivalent of one month's wages. Quoting the Canadian Centre for Policy Alternatives, working class and middle-income Canadians lost the equivalent of two weeks of income, while the wealthiest Canadians saw their real income climb by 20 percent.

Julian took a shot at the federal government, saying the reason they are keeping SPP negotiations under wraps is that they would lose in any public debate.

Of course, the upshot of the conference was to have all of the citizens of Canada well-informed about the SPP negotiations, and some sort of public and parliamentary debate going on. This is not happening. Deals are being made behind closed doors, and our government will not discuss it in parliament, even when asked to do so by the New Democrats.

What I have written here may be news to a lot of our readers. Those of us who are members of the Council of Canadians are able to keep abreast of what is going on. A reporter for the Ottawa Citizen attended the conference but slanted his report by describing the Council of Canadians as leaning to the left. (In other words, anybody who questions what deals our government might be making is likely a person opposed to capitalism?) I am pleased that the Mexicans are

raising opposition to SPP. I wish there was stronger opposition from citizens of all three of the nations involved in these secret meetings. What is happening to our democracies that CEO's of major corporations and bureaucrats can be put in charge of making deals that will affect every citizen in North America, but we citizens are not entitled to know what kind of deals they are making?

A lot of people died to protect our democracies, and we now have a situation in which the leaders of those democracies are violating the basic principle of democratic process, that the citizenry is a participant in decision-making. It is an outrage that these matters are not openly discussed in parliament. It is an outrage that the ruling party in Ottawa dares to keep the negotiations secret even to other parties in the House of Commons.

I wonder what Canadians will do about this. In Quebec, at Montebello, the leaders met in secret two weeks ago and the news reports of demonstrations against the meeting made fun of the protesters. It looks like the major media do not want to discuss what is really going on in Canada. Who is buying off the media? Good reporting would call for at least some discussion of issues being addressed by the protesters.

Even if I really trusted every

politician and every CEO involved in SPP, the fact that the meetings are secret and the deals being made are secret makes me suspicious.

What we need is public discussion and parliamentary debate, and it is not happening. That scares me. Does it scare you?

Years later my bald head didn't show any dents from the Polaris, although there were a few imperfections but nothing significant stood out. I am grateful for that today as my hair seems to be leaving my head at a rapid rate and soon it will fetch absolutely nothing on the fund raising market. There is an African proverb that says, It takes a village to raise a child and I am a product of my village. Len, did the right thing, I needed a swat on the behind more than I needed ice cream. Many people have helped shape and mold me and many others from our village of Princeton. To everyone that has had a part in the lives of the people in Princeton, thank you. Some didn't physical shape me but instead prayed for me. Prayer shapes lives. Before my dad died, the Baptist minister at that time, Rev. Tom Walker went up and visited him in the hospital and introduced my dad to Jesus Christ. I am not sure, but I like to believe that my dad prayed for me and my family the two short weeks before he died. There is a Scripture in Acts 16:31, that encourages my thoughts, Believe in the Lord Jesus, and you shall be saved, you and your household.
