Museum faces challenges

Consultant Angelique Wood will make a presentation to Town Council on September 17 outlining problems faced by the museum regarding the structure of the building. Repeated incidents related to the structure have caused concern.

Another challenge faced by the Museum Society is the need for new members who have skills related to museum work and the time to devote a few hours a week to projects.

The museum has had some talented, knowledgeable members who worked very hard on behalf of the museum, but for a variety of reasons, are no longer able to do so. Anyone interested in local

history who has experience in setting up displays, or doing office work, photography or computer records would be welcomed with open arms.

The number of visitors this year is down slightly, but catching up. Hansen Lau Travel has brought seven bus loads of tourists to the museum.

Summer student help was excellent and Young Canada Works, a federal program, has made it possible for the museum to hire a student, Kandice Simpson, until Christmas.

The museum will close for winter on October 27, but groups wishing to tour can do so by appointment.

Fall Fair winners take home cash

Princeton's 42nd annual Fall Fair was one of the best in years, and exhibitors in the adult division put their hearts into going after the top prizes. Four of the former top exhibitors were back this year after a couple of years away: Helene Ramsay, Anne Thomas, Mary Mogge and John Sandness. Sandness was the Overall Top Exhibitor, with Helene Ramsay a close second.

Although former winners did very well, there were plenty of newcomers who showed they knew what they were doing. Vince Milligan proved you can grow great peppers and eggplants north of Bromley Rock, and John Noppe took top points in fruit, including his hazelnuts.

The number of exhibitors in the Junior Fair were way down this year, which was odd, as that part of the fair is usually jam-packed with the youngsters' creativity and skills.

Alexia Boyd, eight years old, was top exhibitor for the Junior Fair. Sylvia Bailey, who entered flowers in the fair for the first time last year was top exhibitor in flowers this year, with Mary Mogge a close second.

For the first time in a number of years, there was good competition in locally brewed wines. Marg Eyre took top spot with entries in two classes, but Ben Blanshard, John Corsi, Kim Macahonic and Duane Graves also won ribbons.

John Sandness took top points in the Leisurecraft Division, but there were many excellent exhibits. Total entries in Leisurecraft were down. Perhaps people do not have time for hobbies anymore?

Anne Thomas turned 80 years old this year, and decided she would enter the baking division for one last time. She was top exhibitor in this division, and says she would like to see more young women offering competition. Anne did not win easily, however, as Charlotte Sellers and Helene Ramsay chalked up points nearly as high as Anne's.

Photography was simply outstanding this year. When all of the prizes were awarded, Cheryl Smith came out with the most points despite heavy competition. The photographs on display were excellent this year.

Writing proved more popular this year. Lyn Melnechenko took first in Short Story with John Sandness second. Sandness won a first in Essay. J.D. Howell won a first in Poetry, with Helene Ramsay second and Sue Derksen third.

The People's Choice Art Contest was well worth seeing and choosing a winner. Gail Dickson exhibited the people's favourite, with Lyn Melnechenko's drawing second and another of her drawings in third place.

The special Roger's Foods bread baking contest was won by Charlotte Sellers (first), Carol Ruoss (second) and Anne Thomas (third). These ladies know how to bake bread from scratch.

Laura Haw was far and away the top exhibitor in home canning, scoring 40 points and nobody close to her score. Haw has won this division in the past, and outdid herself

this year. However, she had a lot of competition.

In poultry, a Junior, Tina Elmgren, was the top exhibitor, but just barely ahead of the several other poultry exhibitors. In this division, youth competed with adults, and the young people did very well.

In the Rabbits Division, there were only two exhibitors, both Juniors. Tina Elmgren won a first for Senior buck and Kayla Falk won a first for Senior doe. The rabbits were

judged on quality and met high standards.

The Horseshoe Tournament was well attended and competition was excellent.

4-H events included dog club competitions, small engines, sheep and small livestock, but no report of winners is available at this time. 4-H events were well-attended and there were plenty of exhibitors.

With the passing of the September long weekend, Princeton RCMP can report a very busy summer.

Princeton residents may be interested to know that a speed watch was conducted on Highway 3 on the September 3rd holiday Monday that included a vehicle count of westbound traffic.

In a two-hour period, over 3,500 vehicles passed by the radar speed advisory.

During the summer, highways in and around Princeton were very

busy. RCMP responded to numerous accidents ranging from minor fender benders to fatality accidents. Many of these accident investigations evolved into impaired driving investigations and charges.

Once again, it has been made very evident that alcohol and vehicles do not mix.

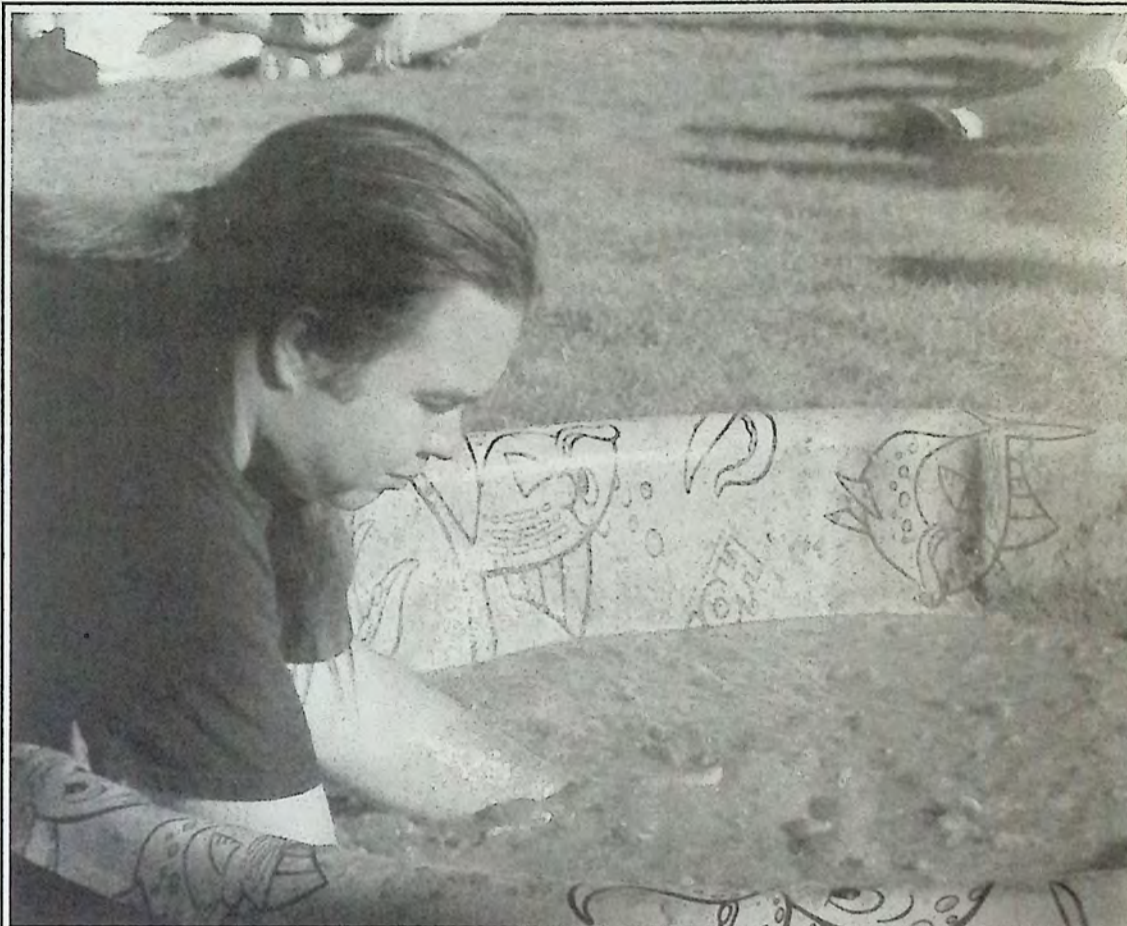

Recognizing the symptoms of ADHD

(NC)—Kim Priestman will never forget the day her daughter Holly, then 5, threw a temper tantrum at the grocery store after Kim had asked her to stay by her side.

While other shoppers looked on, Holly's agitation and aggression escalated into all-out rebellion. It took a full 15 minutes for Kim to get Holly, struggling and screaming, back to the car.

At the time, Kim thought Holly was just being a kid. But when the tantrums got worse and Holly started getting into trouble at school because she couldn't sit through class, Kim decided it was time to see a doctor.

Holly, now 11, was diagnosed with attention deficit hyperactivity disorder (ADHD), a biological brain-based condition characterized by hyperactive or impulsive behaviours and attention-deficit problems.

"I had no idea that the problems Holly was experiencing were a result of ADHD. It got to the point where I couldn't take her to the grocery store or to people's homes because I was afraid she would get bored and have a tantrum. I had to plan everything so that she was occupied all of the time," recalls Kim.

Today, Holly has gained control of her symptoms. "Since seeing our doctor and learning to manage her ADHD, Holly is doing so much better."

Approximately five to 12 per cent of school-aged children are affected by ADHD, making it one of the most common conditions of childhood and adolescence. If not effectively treated, ADHD may lead to impairments in life activities and behaviour, academic difficulties and emotional and social problems. Symptoms can start during infancy and typically begin before the age of seven even though the condition may not be diagnosed until later.

Symptoms of attention deficit hyperactivity disorder include:

Inattention – Is your child easily distracted by irrelevant sights and sounds? Does your child fail to pay

attention to details, make careless mistakes and skip from one uncompleted activity to another?

Hyperactivity – Does your child always seem to be on-the-go or constantly in motion? Is it difficult for him/her to sit still in class or while eating dinner? Does he/she squirm or fidget?

Impulsivity – Does your child often act without thinking, have difficulty waiting for things or taking his/her turn? Does he/she often blurt out inappropriate comments or display emotions without restraint?

Not all children who display these symptoms have ADHD, but if your

child's symptoms consistently and negatively impact at least two of the following areas: performance in school, social relationships, behaviour at home and behaviour in the community, it may be time to speak to his or her doctor.

Only a qualified doctor can make a diagnosis of ADHD, based on a thorough clinical evaluation. The good news is that there are treatments that can help children with ADHD reach their true potential; your child's physician can tell you more about the options available. Eat this cancer fighter

Researchers have found that those people who eat a lot of foods rich in beta-carotene tend not to get cancer. Beta-carotene is especially useful in preventing lung and stomach cancers. Half a cup of cooked carrots gives you more beta-carotene than the daily dose recommended by nutritionists. When Granny said carrots are good for your eyes, she was right. During World War II, pilots were fed large amounts of carrots to keep their vision keen. People who have problems with night vision definitely need more carrots in their daily diet. Increased amounts of dietary beta-carotene have been shown to help prevent the formation of cataracts, another major vision problem among older people.

Cook your carrots

Carrots are more nutritious when cooked than when eaten raw. Because carrots are high fibre food, the fibre traps the beta-carotene. Cooking releases it. Just don't over-cook the carrots.

When you boil carrots, some of the nutrients go into the water. Steamed carrots are better, but you could use the water from cooking the carrots by putting it into a sauce or gravy.

Carrots need a little fat in the meal to help your body absorb the beta-carotene.

Protect your carrots

Always trim off the tops of carrots before storing them. The tops will suck nutrients from the root in an effort to stay alive. The root stays alive better, for up to four months in a refrigerator, if the top is removed and the carrot is scrubbed clean.

Carrots in baked treats

Carrots are a great addition to cakes, cookies and muffins. For healthier baked goods, add grated carrot.

Students and Taxes - New for 2006

In the 2006 federal budget, the Conservative government introduced several proposals of particular interest to students:

Textbook Tax Credit - Tax relief is finally here for the cost of textbooks to post-secondary students in the form of a non-refundable tax credit. This credit will be in addition to the existing education tax credit referred to above. The textbook tax credit will be calculated based on \$65 for each month the student qualifies for the full-time education tax credit and \$20 for each month the student qualifies for the part-time education tax credit. Similar to the existing tuition and education non-refundable tax credits, the unused amounts can be transferred to a spouse or common-law partner, parent or grandparent, or carried forward to a future year.

Tax Credit for Public Transit Passes - Students who travel by public transit to attend classes will be happy to learn that the cost for all individuals for monthly, or longer duration, public transit passes will now qualify for a non-refundable tax credit. This credit will apply in respect of the portion of transit costs related to travel on or after July 1, 2006 and will be claimable in respect of costs incurred by the individual, the individual's spouse or common-law partner and the individual's dependent children that are under 19 years of age.

Scholarship and Bursary Income - Previously, the first \$3,000 of scholarship, fellowship or bursary income received by a taxpayer in a taxation year with respect to post-secondary education or occupational training was not included in income. For 2006 and subsequent years, this income will now be completely exempt from tax.

Students should always consider filing a tax return - there can be benefits! Contact your BDO advisor if you have any questions about students and taxes.

Princeton added one more goal at 12:55 when Brenden Stephen took a pass out front from Wade Masch and popped it into the top of the net.

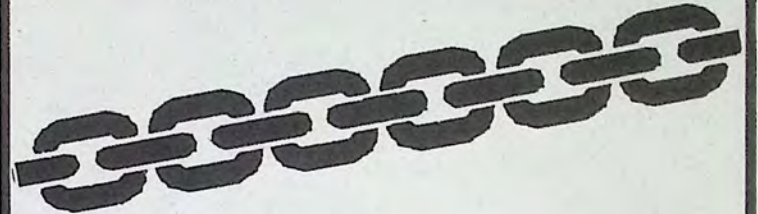
Scott Ramsay received an assist on the play.

(NC)—Invite all the kids — it's a party in the kitchen. These delicious and nutritious veggie "confetti" muffins can be enjoyed anytime, no special occasion required.

Ingredients (Makes 1 dozen regular muffins or 30 mini-muffins)

- 1 1/2 cups (375 mL) all-purpose flour
- 1/4 cup (50 mL) rolled oats
- 1 tablespoon (15 mL) sugar
- 2 teaspoons (10 mL) baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon (2 mL) each, chili powder and salt
- 1/2 cup (125 mL) shredded sharp cheddar cheese
- 1/4 cup (50 mL) each diced celery, red pepper, green pepper and shredded carrot
- 1 green onion, minced
- 1 egg, beaten
- 3/4 cup (175 mL) milk
- 1/2 cup (125 mL) plain low fat yogurt or light sour cream
- 1/3 cup (75 mL) vegetable oil

In a bowl stir together flour, oats, sugar, baking powder, seasonings, cheese and vegetables. In another bowl, stir egg, milk, yogurt and oil together until well mixed. Add to flour mixture; stir until dry ingredients are moistened. Spoon into paper-lined muffin pans. For mini muffins, bake in preheated 400° F oven for 12-15 minutes. 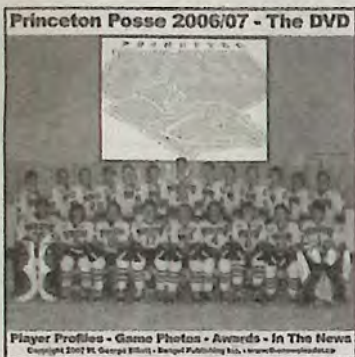

Reader takes a look at program

To The Editor:

Initiatives to date are fragmentary and insubstantial baby-sitting services masquerading as genuine early childhood provincial initiatives arrive in Vancouver schools this fall. Two Vancouver elementary schools (Moberly and Selkirk), are slated this month (in association with local neighbourhood organizations) to host so called 'Strong Start' provincial pre-school programs.

With one in four of the kindergarten students in BC lacking school readiness thus running the serious risk of falling behind (as confirmed in the provincial government's spring speech from the throne), the best that Victoria has to offer is a partial support service mislabelled 'Strong Start.'

This fall, 80 Strong Start programs will be available in elementary schools across the province. Placed there by the ministry of education under the supervision of local school boards - to lend these initiatives a semblance of educational credibility - the superficial nature of these 3-hour, drop-in centres are Victoria's answers to what has now emerged as a serious concern in our overall kindergarten to 12 educational infrastructure. Stay at home parents or grandparents must accompany their three or four year olds to these centres during the day thereby excluding the children of many working parents.

At the start of the current school year an estimated 8,500 (of the projected 35,000) kindergarten students entering our public schools will lack readiness for regular schooling.

Experienced kindergarten teachers will tell you that many of these students have a limited vocabulary, a poor understanding of colours, letters, numbers, sizes and shapes and are often far

behind many of their peers. The attainment gap widens as they advance into intermediate grades.

What is BC doing about this?

Despite the provincial hoopla (and the setting up of a separate early learning branch in the ministry), current efforts in this province are at best fragmentary as witness the following: book hand-outs to the parents of preschoolers; a total absence of Victoria - sponsored junior kindergarten classes for disadvantaged four year olds; extremely limited and discriminatory access (only ESL and special needs kids accepted) to all-day kindergarten for five year olds; plus the ongoing and deepening crisis in day care spaces. Contrast the following early childhood programs in provincial, national and international jurisdictions with BC's faltering efforts:

SURE START (UK)

This decade-old British initiative for disadvantaged three year olds and up is designed to develop potential in the pre-school years. A Department of Education spokesperson in England recently summed up the British initiative this way:

"Closing the attainment gap between different groups of (pre school) children is a massive priority for us. We are working hard to provide support such as catch up lessons, one-to-one tuition, and wrap around support for children and families - for example, the Sure Start program."

BEST START (ONTARIO)

In 2004 the provincial government in Ontario launched Best Start which provides full-day kindergarten and child care for 250,000 pre schoolers in that province. Full-day kindergarten and child care for all four and five year olds replaced part time programs with

early childhood educators working closely with teachers as a team to prepare kids for the rigours of the regular classroom teachers.

JOUER C'EST MAGIQUE (QUEBEC)

Launched in 1997, the Quebec child care system has at times been hailed (as progressive) and criticized (as too expensive) across Canada. For many early childhood educators, however, it is viewed as the gold standard and "a tremendous development in social policy" according to Larry De Po director at the McGill University Child Care Centre. The province has developed and implemented a curriculum called Jouer c'est magique which focuses on learning through play with a very strong emphasis on college training for early childhood educators.

HEAD START (USA)

Launched in 1965 as a summer program, this internationally recognized program promotes school readiness for disadvantaged students through enhancing the social and cognitive development of pre schoolers. Impressive longitudinal studies highlight the educational importance of early and sustained intervention plus the substantial long-term savings accruing to the state as a result.

By comparison with any of the aforementioned provincial, national, or international initiatives BC's early childhood programs lag far behind.

Given the contemporary needs of young families in this province, BC needs a full spectrum of choices that include universally accessible full time programs, part-time care, developmentally appropriate pre school initiatives and not just drop in centers.

Is our punishment too harsh?

In recent months, while attending provincial court in Princeton, I have heard remarks suggesting our impaired driving punishments are too harsh. I know it is harsh, and I remember how it became so harsh.

A person convicted of impaired driving under Canada's Criminal Code loses his/her driving privileges for one year, and pays a fine. In addition, because impaired driving is a federal crime, he/she may not travel outside Canada (the other guys won't let criminals in). Yes, that is harsh punishment. Is it too harsh?

I remember when the impaired driving law was a lot less harsh. The fine was lower, and all a driver did was pay the fine. It did not really bother most drivers, and was kind of a joke. Then the law was changed, and the driver lost his/her licence for three months. Due to the lack of real effect, the law was changed and the convicted driver paid a fine and lost the licence for six months. That was still not enough to have real impact on driver behaviour, so now we have a one year driving prohibition and a big fine.

There is a lesson here. It seems the law must be harsh or drivers pay no attention. Some pay no attention even now, and we still have impaired driving convictions in our courts on a regular basis.

What is even worse, we have convictions of people who were driving while prohibited. Some were even drunk while driving after their licences were lifted.

What does this tell us? Most people will say the lesson here is that alcoholics will not stop drinking for anything, but I would disagree that alcohol is the problem. The law does not forbid the consumption of alcohol, it condemns driving while impaired by alcohol. The decision to have a few beers is not against the law. The decision to have a few and then drive is what leads to criminal charges.

Going out for a few with your friends is quite acceptable, but if you take your vehicle with you, you show your intention to drive, and risk injuring or killing yourself and/or others.

I have spoken with traffic police

who tell me how frequently they stop a vehicle on the Hope-Princeton highway and the driver has a case of beer up front with him along with a few empties and one on the go. Those drivers left the Lower Mainland with an intent to drink and drive.

There are other younger drivers who may be under the legal limit for alcohol, but they have added marijuana to the mix.

I don't want them on the highway. I have family and friends who use our highways, and I want them safe and alive. That is why we have our laws and punishments for impaired driving.

Is the punishment too harsh for being convicted of impaired driving? I don't believe it is.

When I think of the number of people who have died as a result of drunk driving, either their own or some other person's, I tend to see drunk driving as attempted homicide.

Even if a driver does not kill anybody while driving impaired, the

potential is there. Drunk driving is something like being a sniper above a crowd of people: fire the bullets and if you don't kill anybody, that's great, but if you do, isn't that what you intended to do?

You can't fire bullets into a crowd without the potential of killing somebody, and you can't be a drunk driver without the potential of killing somebody. If you arm the rifle and fire the bullet and miss, it is still attempted homicide. What should the punishment be for such an attempt?

A sniper, even if he did not kill anyone, would go to prison and would undergo rigorous psychiatric examination as well as a number of other tests to see if he was in his right mind. If released, he would be on parole for at least a year.

Using the comparison, I believe impaired drivers in Canada get off pretty lightly. What do you think? Should they go to prison and have their heads examined?

Princeton Court News briefs

Judge orders big fine

Andrew Kovacs, age 44, of Princeton, appeared in Provincial Court on September 14 to plead guilty to a charge of driving without due care and attention under the BC Motor Vehicle Act. He was apprehended when a police officer noted he was driving at 50 kmph. on Bridge Street. Kovacs had been drinking prior to being arrested. He was ordered to pay a \$1,000 fine.

Judge restricts driving

Kenneth Burke, of Coalmont, was

in Provincial Court in Princeton on September 14 to plead guilty to a charge of driving without due care and attention. He had been arrested after his vehicle left the road and went into the brush along Coalmont Road. When arrested, he had been drinking, but stated a vehicle had forced him off the road.

Burke was ordered to pay a \$1,000 fine and his driving privileges have been restricted to 7:00 AM to 7:00 PM for the purpose of going to work on his mining claims.

Judge orders jail for breach

Roland Meier appeared in Provincial Court in Princeton on September 14 to plead guilty to two charges of shoplifting and one of breach of probation. Meier had stolen candy from Fields Store and DVDs from Overwaitea in Princeton. He was ordered to pay a \$100 fine for the candy theft and \$150 for the movie theft.

Meier had been serving a probation in May when he failed to attend alcohol abuse counselling. He was given another appointment for counselling, but did not attend. Judge G. Sinclair ordered seven days in jail, commencing immediately.

Young man gets break

Tyler Towe, a 22 year old Lower Mainland man, appeared in Provincial Court in Princeton on September 14 to plead guilty to a charge of possession of a controlled substance. Towe's vehicle had been stopped by police for speeding. During questioning at the roadside, the police officer noted the smell of marijuana and saw marijuana on the floor of the vehicle. Towe had no prior convictions.

Judge Sinclair opted to give Towe an absolute discharge, but warned

the young man "marijuana is illegal whether you agree or not" and cautioned him to avoid ruining his life by possessing the drug in the future.

Drugs lead to probation

Maria Slonimer, age 35, of Nelson appeared in Provincial Court in Princeton on September 13 to plead guilty to a charge of possession of a controlled substance. Slonimer was arrested in Princeton area when stopped for speeding. The police officer noted a strong smell of marijuana in the vehicle and a subsequent search revealed four grams of marijuana and 17 tabs of Ecstasy.

Slonimer was given a conditional discharge with a six month probation, with counselling, and must do 10 hours of unpaid community service work.

Woman pleads on driving charge

In Provincial Court on September 13, Nicolah Hodgson, of Princeton, pled guilty to driving with over .08 mg. of blood alcohol under Section 244 of the BC Motor Vehicle Act. She was apprehended when a police officer in a parked police vehicle noticed what he believed was an attempt by an oncoming driver to avoid him. He followed the vehicle and pulled it over.

Hodgson failed the breath test and was charged. She was ordered to pay a \$600 fine and will serve a one year BC driving prohibition.

Elder may not drive

An older Princeton resident, 68 year old Robert Zimmerman, appeared in Provincial Court in Princeton to plead guilty to an impaired driving charge. He had been apprehended in Penticton on July 1.

Zimmerman must pay a \$600 fine and serve a one year driving prohibition.

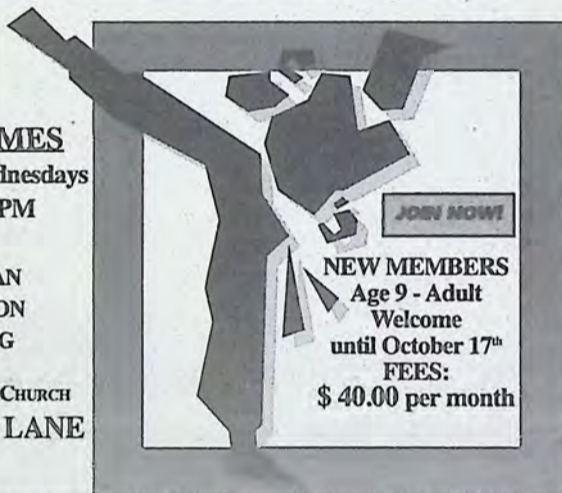

The Potter's Guild has 12 members who are planning a group project which will involve the public. They will meet on October 2 at Riverside Centre to brainstorm an idea.

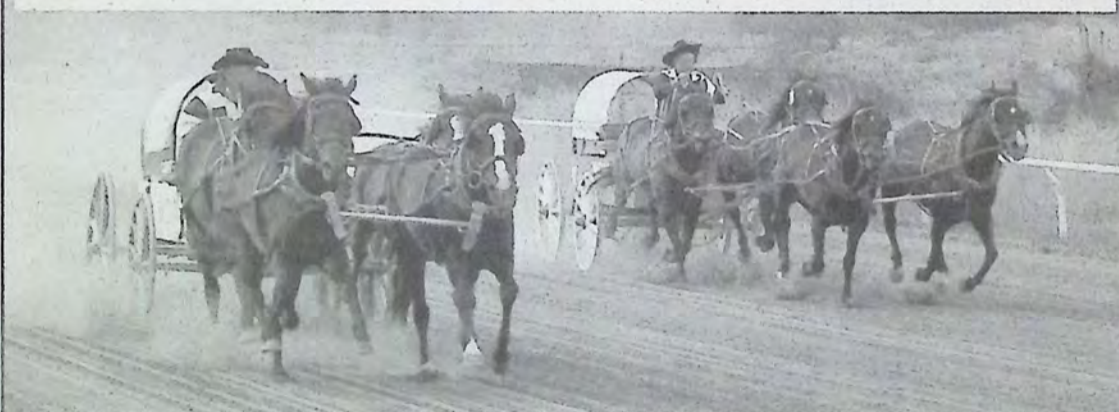
Norma Kraetor gave a report of Garden Club activities during the past year.

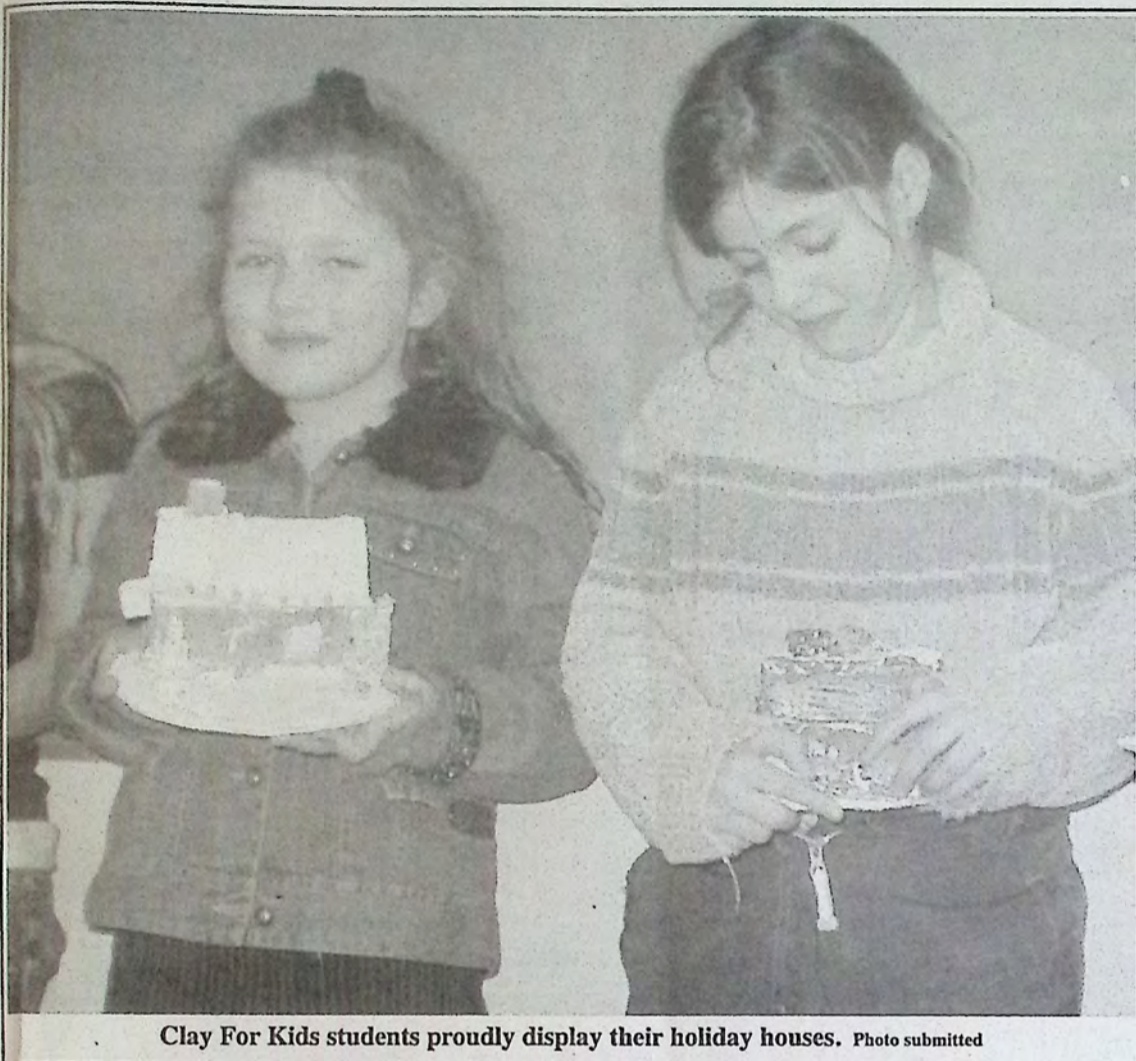
