District gains half million

School trustees and administrators were smiling at the October 3 School Board meeting in Princeton. School District #58 (Nicola-Similkameen) has the final enrollment figures for September 30, 2007, and it is worth \$500,000 more than budget plans. The School Board anticipated a reduction of 85 students. Instead, the district shows a gain of 91 students over projection. These students are worth money to the

district. Approximately \$300,000 of the gain will be spent on the four new teachers the district has had to hire. More may be spent on teacher aids or special education assistants. The remainder will go into programs. John Allison Elementary School has 126 students, including 23 kindergarten pupils. Vermilion Forks Elementary has 171 students and Princeton Secondary has 244 continued on Page 9

New District policies affect students, parents

School District #58 (Nicola-Similkameen) has drafted new policies on smoking, bullying and financial hardship.

Any tobacco use by any person is not permitted on any school district property.

This ban applies to vehicles owned or leased by the School District and is effective 24/7 year round.

Financial hardship

The financial hardship policy refers to fees paid for school "extras". The School Act says a student must attend to school with proper clothing and basic supplies (pencils, pens, notebooks, running shoes) but schools may not charge for workbooks, graphic calculators, or for physical education activities that are part of course requirements. However, schools may request that students do not write in the workbooks and return them at the end of the course, and may request a deposit on the calculators. Students will not be required to pay

fees for basic materials for projects necessary to meet course requirements, such as in woodworking, home economics or art unless those students wish to have better materials than those provided.

Schools may continue to charge for student activity and for optional activities such as travel, grad activities, yearbooks. Student will be required to purchase or rent their own musical instruments.

Bullying

The policy states, "The Board shall

consider any act of bullying and harassment, whether it occurs going to and from school, on school premises, in the vicinity of the school, or at any school-sponsored activity, to be a serious threat to the school environment and to the safety of both students and staff, and shall be dealt with in accordance with the accompanying regulations and the school's discipline policy."

Bullying is described as "a pattern of aggressive behaviour, with negative intent, directed from one child

to another where there is a power imbalance". Sexual harassment of one student by another is prohibited under the Canada Criminal Code. Bullying behaviours can be physical, verbal/emotional and social.

Types of bullying

Examples of physical bullying include punching, hitting, kicking and unwelcome touching. Verbal and emotional bullying may include name-calling, teasing, taunting, racist remarks, sexual

slurs and spreading rumours. Social bullying includes threatening notes or emails and text messages, and exclusion from groups.

Consequences

Complaints of these occurrences will be acted upon and a set of remediation measures or consequences will be planned. Parents will be contacted and requested to meet with school staff to assist in developing a corrective plan. In severe instances, RCMP will be contacted.

Threat training protects students

Students in School District #58 (Nicola-Similkameen) will become safer this year. Assistant Superintendent Wendy Hyer is making plans for Threat Assessment Training for school personnel and local agencies which serve as liaison with schools, such as the Ministry for Children and Families and RCMP.

The training is the result of combined efforts of Lethbridge Community College, the Canadian Centre for Threat Assessment and Trauma Response and the RCMP

Behavioural Sciences Branch (Criminal Profiling Unit). The training has proven successful.

The Centre states, "Serious violence is an evolutionary process - no one just snaps!"

Students are assessed

The training teaches school staff and other people working with youth to recognize the "worrisome behaviours" that could result in school violence.

The training covers identification of potentially violent students, emphasizing that any threat by any

student must be taken seriously by both staff and other students. For example, if a student is heard in the washroom to threaten to hurt or kill another student, this constitutes justification for looking at this student as potentially violent. At that point, a team will go into action to deal with the student, the student's home, and any other factor, such as mental health, that may be a contributing factor.

Often, the troubled student does not seek help, but certain behaviours are actually a cry for help,

and those who are trained will learn to recognize these behaviours and respond to the cry.

No date has been set for the beginning of the training, but Hyer said she will come back to the School Board in six to eight weeks with a training proposal.

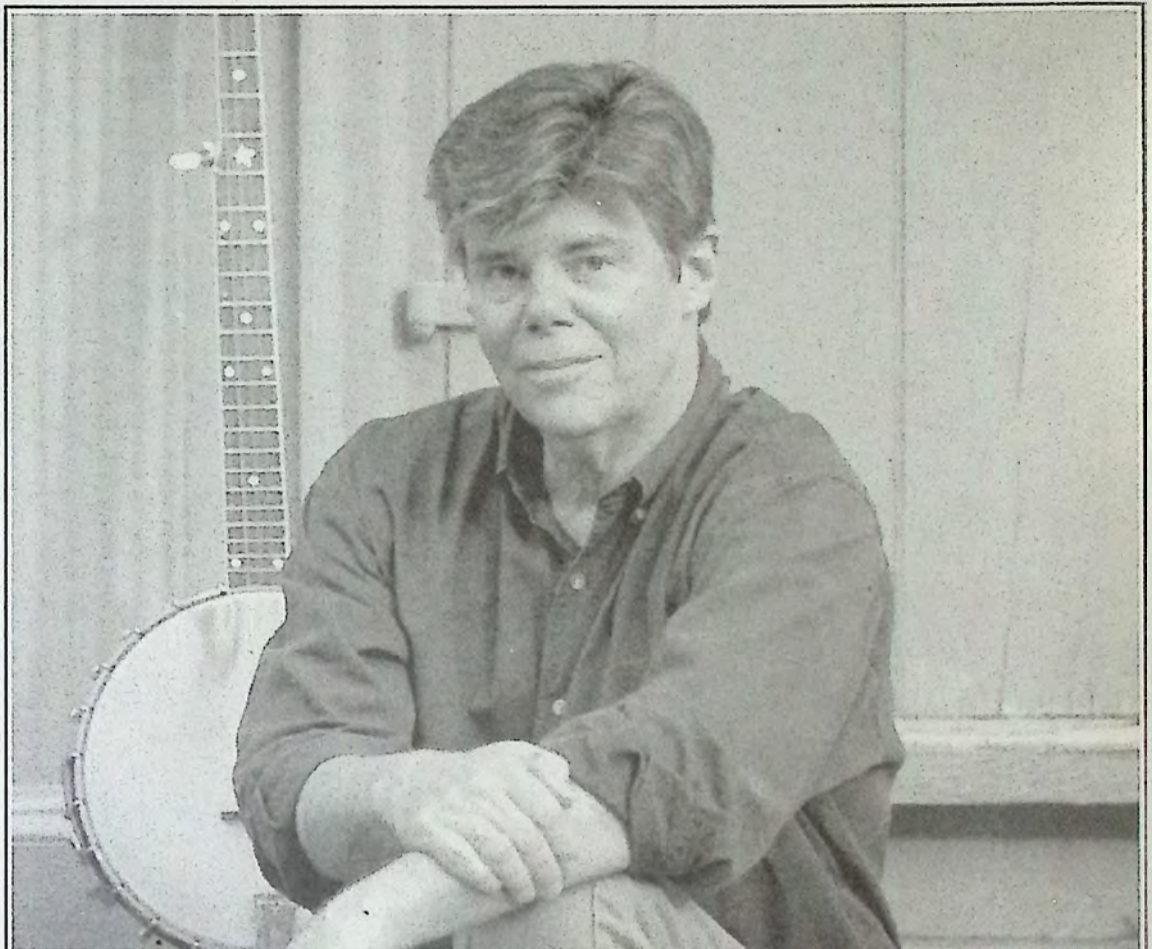

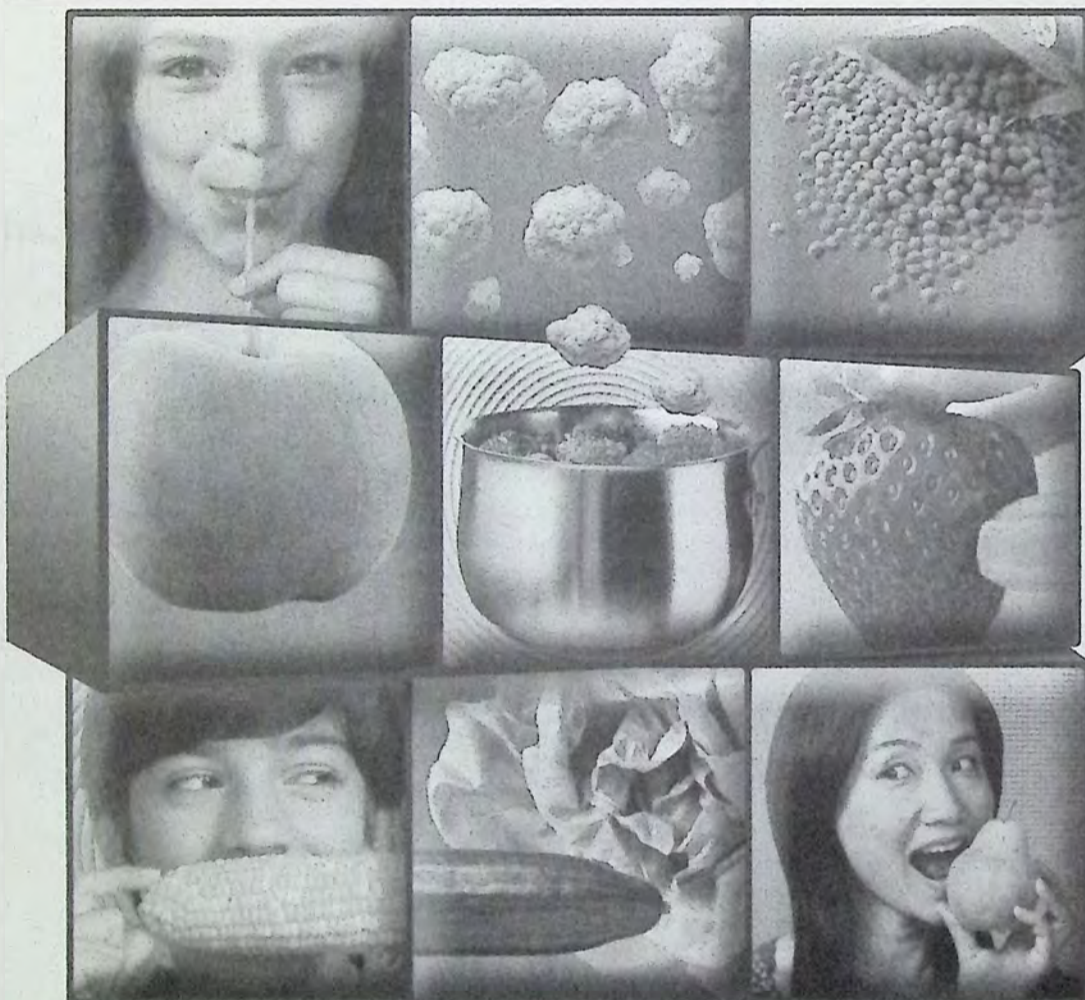

They collected it from Frank Proffitt in 1938 and it became a favourite of the 1960's folk song revival."

Ruebsaat adds, "So if you like banjo and guitar picking together with great old songs wrapped up in a bit of history, come and hear Jeff Warner."

Firemaster asks for Town support

SBC Firemaster wants to expand its operations into biomass energy production.

At the October 1 Town Council meeting, Paul Adams, acting on behalf of Firemaster, appealed to Council to back Firemaster's request to government that the dead timber used for biomass be removed from the Ministry of Forests to the Ministry of Mines and Energy.

The reason for the request is to exempt timber killed by the pine beetle from the softwood lumber agreement jurisdiction to avoid paying the \$12 per cubic metre stumpage tax. This tax deters biomass, pellet and firewood companies as it is not possible to sell these products at a price that will cover costs.

Adams asked Council to consider incentives to encourage people to burn wood in high efficiency pellet stoves or high efficiency wood burning stoves. He described methods used in other communities. Using dead wood for fuel is carbon neutral which means it does not add to the carbon load in the atmosphere.

He pointed out the positive side of using the bug killed timber for biomass, pellets and firewood: these products can utilize dead timber up to 25 years whereas lumber manufacturers can use it only up to five

Mayor looks ahead to water crisis

Princeton is expected to be one of the hard-hit communities as the mountain pine beetle continues destroying local forests. At the October 1 Town Council meeting, Mayor Randy McLean took time to look ahead to what experts say Princeton will experience.

One of the concerns will be water crises. Mayor McLean said he had learned that 30 percent of the snowpack is absorbed by the forest canopy.

Without the forest in place, runoff will occur at a faster rate and there

years. Council agreed to support the request to government, and to look into incentives to high efficiency wood burning units for homes in Princeton.

will be more water available. This means more high water concerns each spring until the forest grows back.

The second crisis period will be at this time of year. With a faster runoff and more water going downstream, very low levels of water will occur in late summer and autumn.

Mayor McLean stated, "We should have some kind of reservoir on our river. It could produce power as well as assist with irrigation needs."

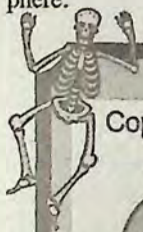

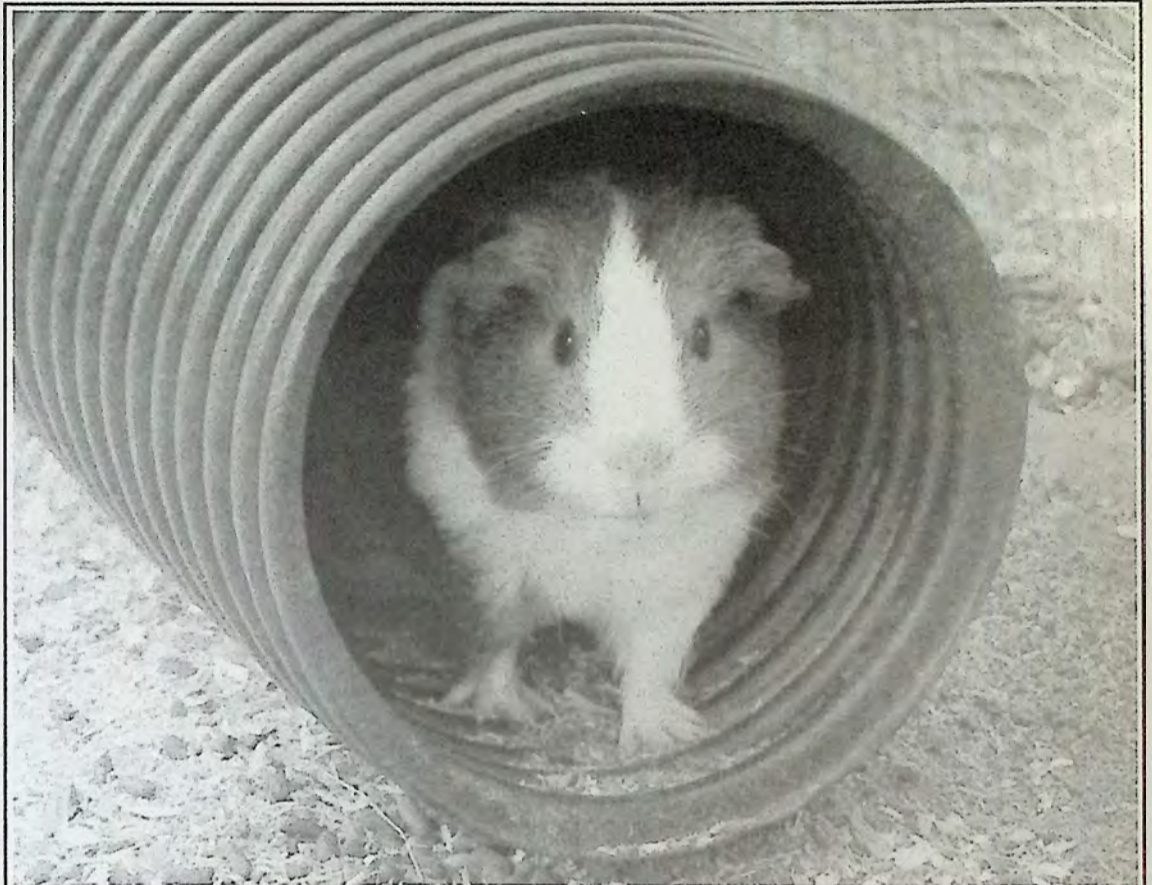

MP hosts 'passport clinics' this week

Alex Atamanenko, Member of Parliament for BC Southern Interior, is hosting passport clinics across the riding to help his constituents get their passports.

"Any Canadian wishing to travel needs to get their passport," said Atamanenko.

"Since the Western Hemisphere Travel Initiative came into affect last January making it mandatory to have a passport to travel to and from the United States by plane, Canadians have found it difficult to get a passport because of the huge backlog. Rural Canadians have found it especially difficult because they are hours away from the nearest Passport Canada office."

Atamanenko has been pushing the Minister responsible for passports to improve the access to passport services for rural Canadians. "These clinics are a great first step. Passport Canada officials will be present at the clinics to answer questions about the application process, review passport applications, and accept completed applications for processing."

Passport Canada has indicated that the processing time for the applications submitted at these clinics will be 20 working days. In addition to the quick processing time, another benefit of these clinics is that the applicant can keep their identification after showing it to the Passport Canada officials.

"These passport clinics are a temporary fix to the growing passport problem. Although, they will help many residents of the BC Southern Interior get their passport in a timely manner, I hope the clinics are a start to improving the Passport Canada services in this area permanently," concluded Atamanenko.

Diagnosing prostate cancer is just too easy

(NC)—Prostate cancer is far easier to diagnose today than it used to be, thanks to a simple blood test, the protein-specific antigen (PSA) test. The problem is, it's too easy. The PSA test is so sensitive, it can pick up even the slightest hint of cancerous cells, many of which may never develop into clinically significant cancer — the kind that endangers lives.

"We've become very good at finding cancer. The problem is, we don't know who's going to need intervention," says Marianne Sadar.

Dr. Sadar, from the University of British Columbia, says some men may be receiving surgery or radiation therapy when they don't need

treatment, and that these treatments can have unpleasant side effects, such as incontinence or impotence. She is receiving support from the Canadian Institutes of Health Research to develop a way to tell which cancer cells will go on to develop into an aggressive form of prostate cancer — and which will lie there, essentially dormant, for the remainder of a man's life.

She and her colleagues have found some novel sequences (genes) associated with an aggressive form of prostate cancer in a laboratory model. They are testing whether the presence of these sequences in a man's prostate cancer can predict how aggressive his disease will be.

As a first step, they are looking at clinical samples of prostate cancer to see if there is a link between these sequences and men whose prostate cancer turned out to be an aggressive recurrent form of the disease. If so, they can then look for the sequences in men whose PSA test comes back positive to help determine who needs intervention. They then want to develop a non-invasive blood or urine test that can be easily applied.

"That's our dream," she says. "We want to be able to pick out those men who will develop clinically significant disease. Because right now, we have to treat everyone."

How is heart disease different in women?

Heart disease, also known as cardiovascular disease, refers to diseases of the blood vessels and heart. Heart disease is the leading cause of death among Canadian women. However, there are many ways to keep your heart healthy and to reduce your risk of heart disease.

Years ago it was thought that heart disease was the same for women and men. Today we know that there are unique factors in women:

- Symptoms of a heart attack can be different for women. They may include fatigue, nausea, or pain in the shoulder, neck, or stomach, rather than the typical chest pain and shortness of breath.

- Heart disease more often affects women later in life than men. Nonetheless, younger women who have heart disease often do less well than men because it can be unrecognized by both the woman and her doctor.

- Women often delay going to the doctor, or fail to seek treatment altogether.

- Women are often treated less aggressively than men, and women's symptoms may be dismissed as related to anxiety or emotions.

- Women are more likely than men to die after a first heart attack.

- Standard testing (angiogram) may not pick up heart disease in women due to differences in the formation of plaque. In women, plaque may form more smoothly against the artery walls, whereas in men it clumps up and is more apparent with testing. In addition, in some women the plaque buildup may be in the small vessels of the coronary arteries, which cannot be seen by the angiogram.

- Women have been under-represented in the studies used to set the

standards for detection and treatment of heart disease.

- Women are more affected by stress, which is one of the common risk factors for heart disease. Stress causes the arteries to go into spasm and can trigger a heart attack. Women today have increased responsibilities— managing careers and taking care of the family and the home—and often put the needs of others ahead of their needs.

Group revives singing tradition

"Wassail, wassail all over the town. Our bowl it is white and our ale it is brown."

So sang revelers in Britain for hundreds of years as they toasted the Christmas season with good ale. They often begged from door to door, singing songs that wished the host good health or teased him

if he didn't give generously.

The Princeton Traditional Music Society plans to revive this wassail tradition of seasonal door-to-door singing in Princeton by starting a group called "The Princeton Waits."

PTMS Vice President Rika Ruebsaat describes it this way, "Imagine yourself in a group of singers, standing on someone's doorstep, cheeks rosy from the crisp air, your voice and your ears filled with the strains of singing. Suddenly the door opens and a smiling host invites you in for a hot chocolate or, better still, a cup of mulled wine. In exchange, you continue singing inside and perhaps the host joins in too!"

Society Secretary-Treasurer Jon Bartlett adds, "Historically the word, 'waits' has several meanings. It could mean a band of musicians employed by a town to play in parades and other official functions. It can also refer to a street musician, and to a band of carolers. Sometimes it was even used to refer to the songs sung by the carolers. Common to all these mean-

ings is the idea of singing outdoors, and so the 'Princeton Waits' is a band of Princeton carolers singing outdoors in Princeton."

At the inaugural meeting of the Princeton Waits, Bartlett and Ruebsaat will teach some of the songs that will be sung on the wassailing rounds.

"These songs have been around for generations," says Ruebsaat, "and were learned orally. Some of them, such as 'The Holly and the Ivy' have Christian content. Others are about the turning of the year and probably date from pre-Christian times. If this sounds like your cup of tea (or mulled wine), come and join us!"

"The point of all this," says Bartlett, "is to have a good time singing together. Anyone can join - we won't have auditions. All you need is enthusiasm."

The first meeting of the Princeton Waits takes place on Tuesday, October 16th at 7:00 PM at the Bartlett-Ruebsaat home located at 154 Halliford Avenue (the former Community Services building).

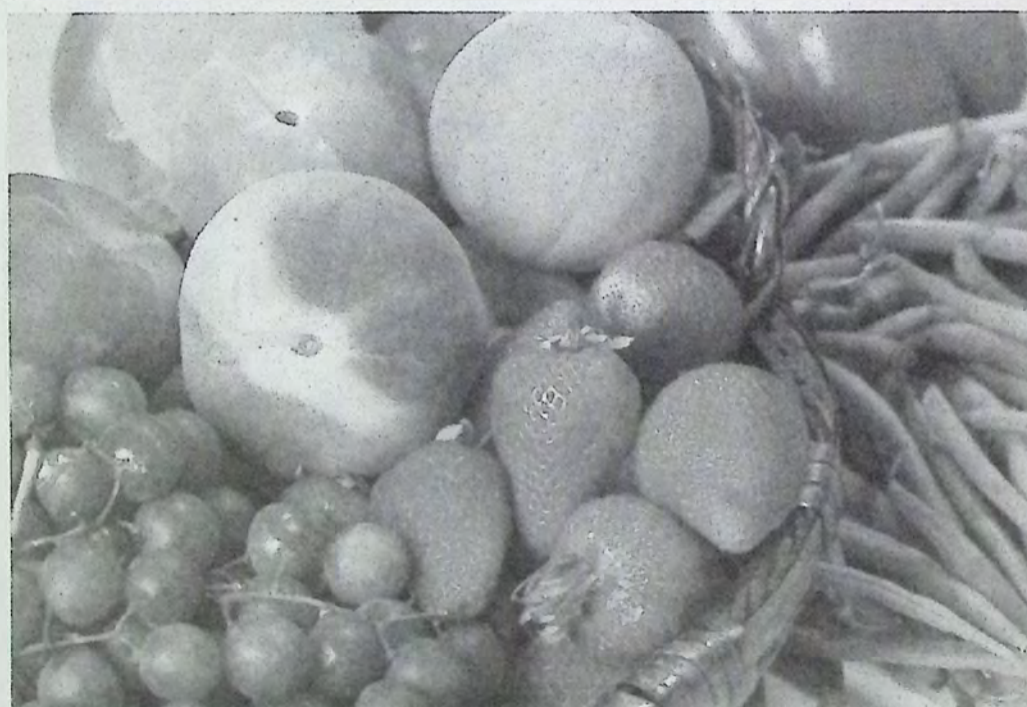

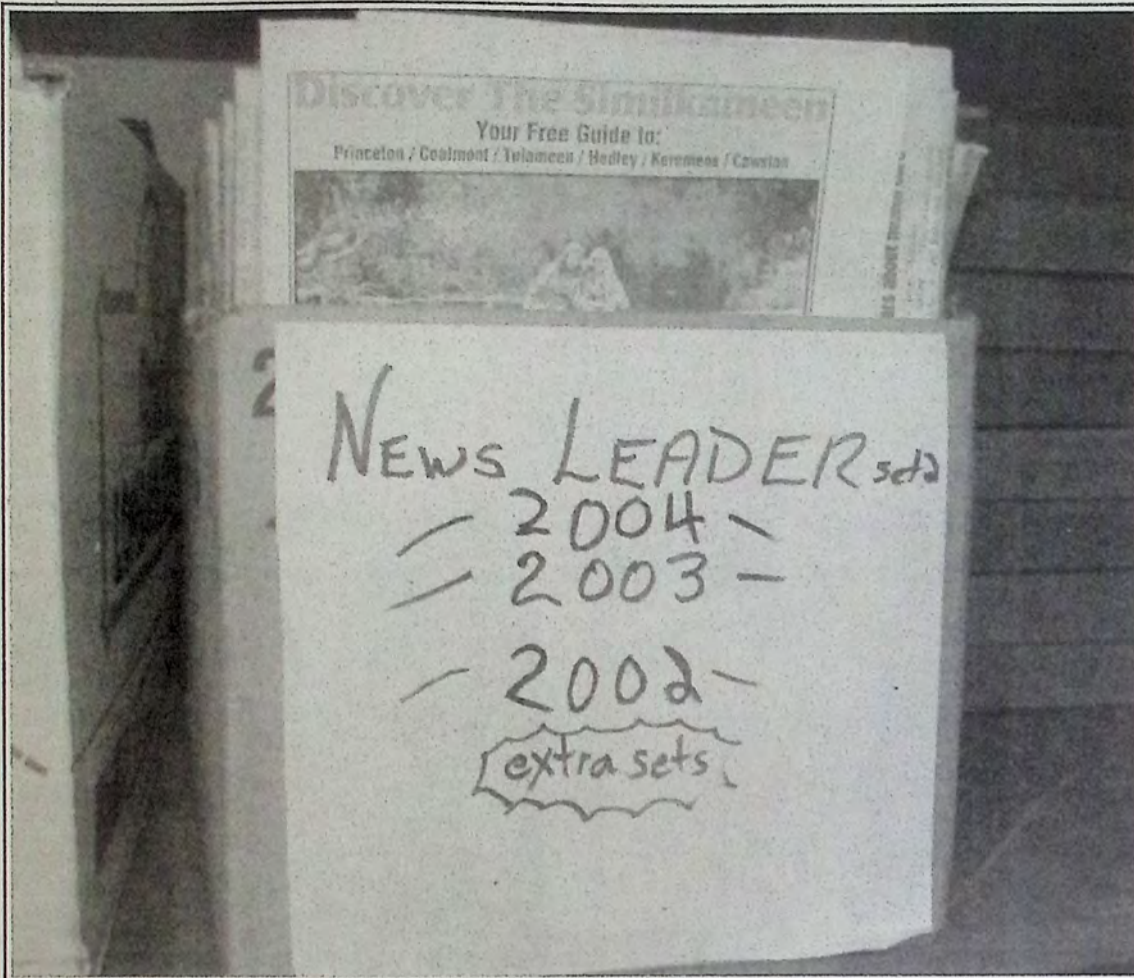

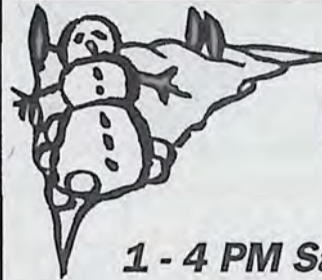

Benefits Of Filing A Tax Return - Part 3

CLAIM A CREDIT FOR STUDENT LOAD INTEREST PAID - Individuals who have graduated and have started paying interest on their student loans for post-secondary education made to them under the Canada Student Loans Act, the Canada Student Financial Assistance Act, or similar provincial or territorial government laws can claim an amount for the interest they, or a related person, paid in the year (plus any carry forward amounts not previously claimed) on loans as a non-refundable tax credit. If the graduate does not wish to claim the interest amounts on the return for the year they are paid, they can carry them forward and apply them on their return for any of the next five years. It is beneficial to carry forward the interest if the individual does not have sufficient tax payable to use the credit in the year the interest is paid.

Registered Education Savings Plan (RESP)

Some students may fund part of their post-secondary education through payments received from an RESP. The student won't be taxed on the amount that was originally contributed to the RESP (as these contributions were made with after-tax dollars); they will, however, be taxed on income that was earned in the plan and on any amounts contributed by the government (i. e. Canadian Education Savings Grants or Canadian Learning Bonds). When income is reported on the tax return, there will likely be little or no tax to pay after the claims for personal, tuition and education tax credits.

Lifelong Learning Plan (LLP)

Individuals who have worked and have accumulated savings in their RRSP may decide to go back to school. The Lifelong Learning Plan (LLP) allows such individuals to use amounts from an RRSP to finance their own post-secondary education or full-time training or that of their spouse or common-law partner. Under this plan, an individual may withdraw a maximum of \$20,000 from their RRSP (with an annual limit of \$10,000) to use to fund their education. These withdrawals must be repaid into the RRSP according to the timetable set by the government or they will be included income.

Council reports on conference

Mayor Randy McLean and Councillor Ray Jarvis attended the annual convention of the Union of B.C. Municipalities. This convention offers a number of workshops and conferences on subjects of interest to municipalities, and offers opportunities to speak with provincial government ministers. Councillor Jarvis attended a workshop on working with First Nations. He said he did not learn anything from it as Princeton has done everything recommended at the workshop.

Councillor Jarvis did learn a great deal about how to apply for grants and where grants are available for

municipalities, and brought back a lot of contacts for Council. As well, he learned about how other small towns solve problems and brought back a lot of ideas.

Both Mayor McLean and Councillor Jarvis received encouragement from the Minister of Tourism on the concept of developing China Ridge as a "mini resort" for both winter and summer use. The minister was enthusiastic over the heritage park concept.

Both members of Princeton Council spoke to the Minister of Health about a grant to create a helipad at Princeton Hospital.

There is adequate space on the hospital grounds.

Mayor McLean said he told the minister that if the government was going to reduce hospitals in rural areas then the least they could do is provide good ambulance and emergency health services.

The final comment on the convention was a complaint from Mayor McLean that it cost far too much. He suggested it is time to go to locations outside downtown Vancouver and Victoria, as the savings would be better spent in the municipalities than spending it on expensive hotel and convention costs.

Whipsaw Trail earns designation

BF Goodrich Tires has added the Whipsaw Trail, west of Princeton, to its Outstanding Trails program. The trail's uniqueness, terrain type and user enthusiasm were cited as reasons for its addition.

A group from BFG will visit the trail later this year, and will liaise with the Rover-Landers of BC 4x4 club.

The recognition places Whipsaw Trail on BF Goodrich Tires 'Top Six Outstanding Trails in North America' listing.

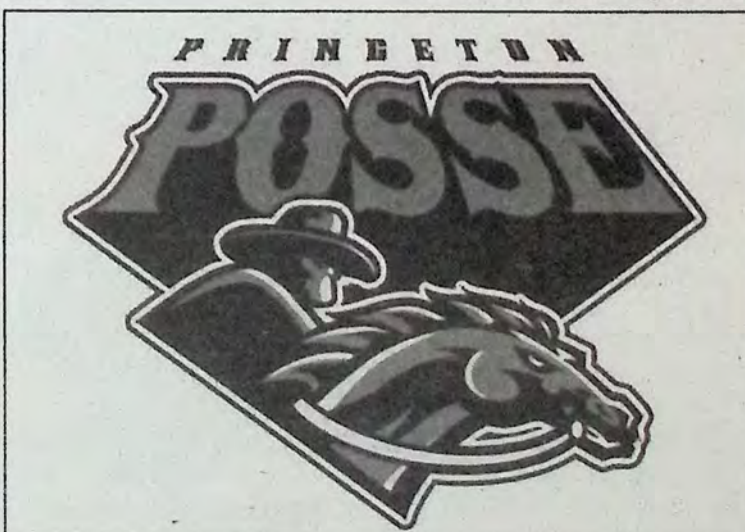
Under the umbrella of the 4WDABC, the Rover-Landers have entered into an agreement with the province to maintain the Lodestone Lake recreation site. The club also makes regular runs

on the trail to erect and maintain signage, clean up garbage, and promote Tread Lightly practices.

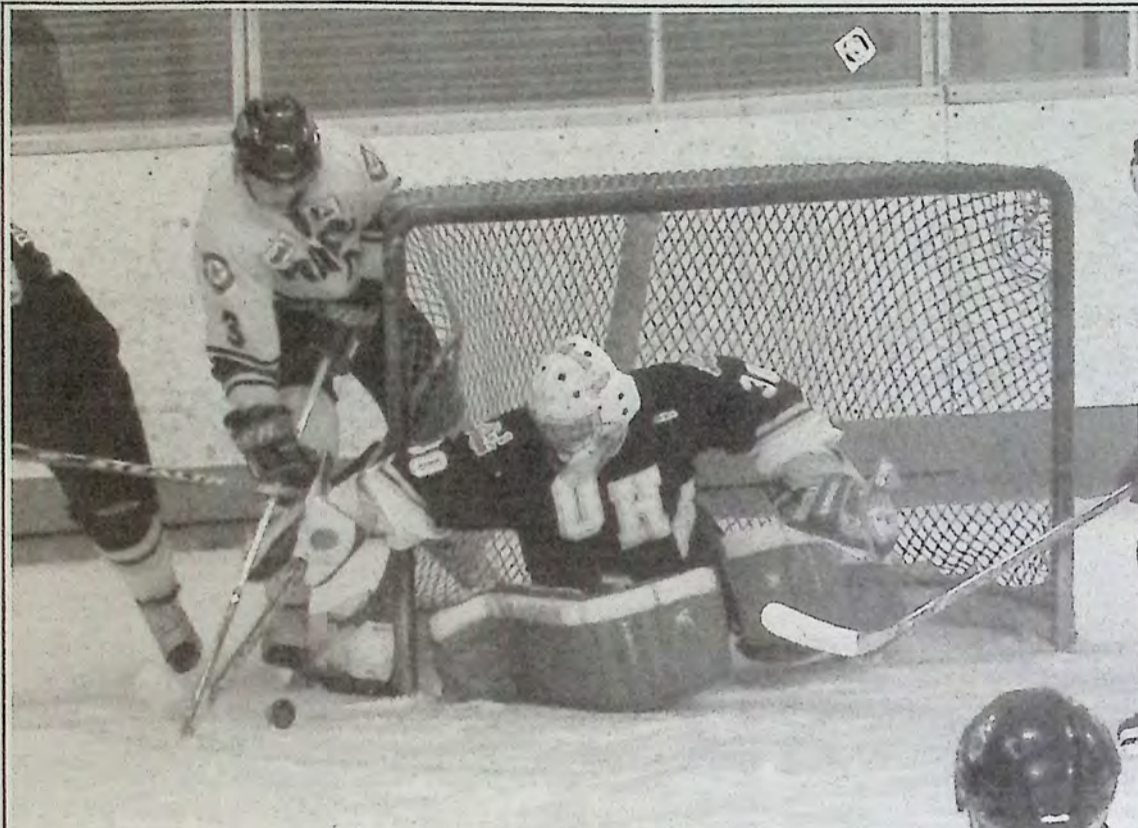

Princeton had many opportunities during the rest of the period to

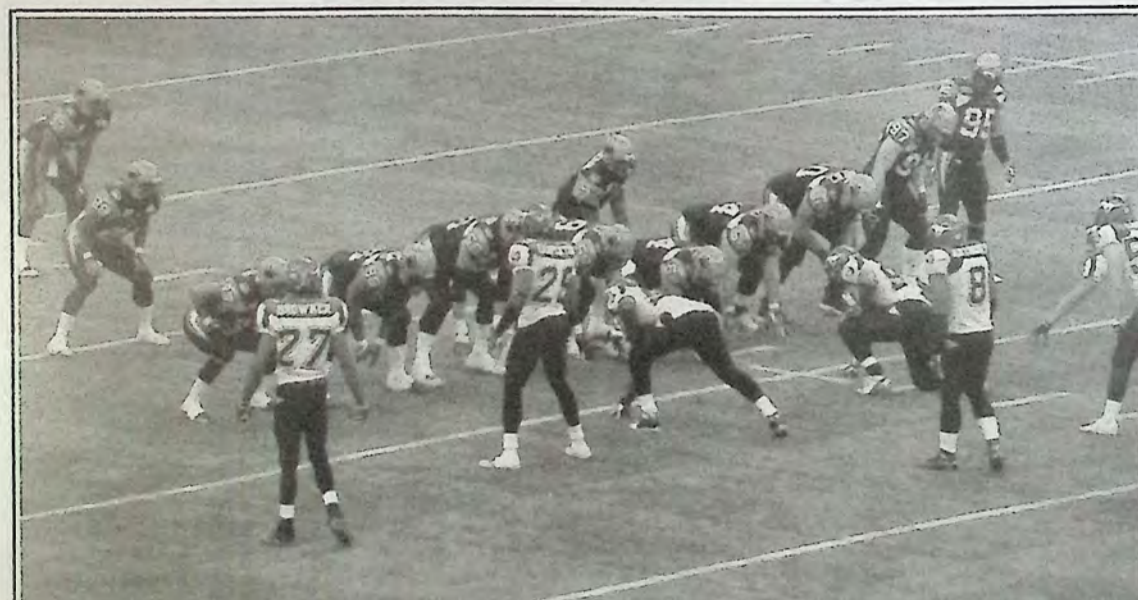
score, firing 17 shots on goal, and should have had at least two more goals if it wasn't for the incredible saves made by Summerland's net-minder.

After 15 minutes we drive 50 kilometres back home after we filled up at the Fas Gas. Damage is about \$80 including gas, junk food, apples and cherries...and all this because? Right - we have not a single pile of pumpkins in this town. A tiny investment as a town to attract literally thousands of people.

Taking action in rural communities

I have talked about the problems rural communities face with centralized health care, and I noted the reduction in rural MLAs as planned by the commission on electoral boundaries. I pointed out that we, the rural dwellers of this province, are also the producers of real wealth in this province. There has been, for many years, an unfair division of money in B.C. Most of the money raised to keep our economy alive comes from forestry, agriculture, fishing, mining, electric power generation and natural gas comes from the rural areas of B.C. Most of the money returned to taxpayers in the form of services and development is spent in the urban areas of the Lower Mainland. The 2010 Olympics are just another example of "we earn it, they benefit from it".

I thought about this at some length off and on during the past few weeks, because I am furious that anybody would consider reducing the number of MLAs who speak for rural communities. One day, while mulling over what we could do about it, I thought of what the French would do.

I spent one year living on the France-Belgium border. From that experience, I learned the French have no patience with bungling governments. They act and they act fast. You might say they are the "fast draw" experts when it comes to arousing opposition to government plans. The French go on strike.

When the French decide to strike, they do so without warning and they do it nationwide. Suppose the dairy farmers are angry at some new government regulation about quotas and marketing. Their answer is simple. The flow of milk to the cities stops. It's like they're saying, "Regulate this!"

"C'est Le Greve" (It's the strike) was an expression I learned fast. No trains today? C'est Le Greve. No mail today? C'est Le Greve. No bread today? C'est Le Greve.

I am not speaking of employees striking against an employer. I am talking only of the nationwide

strikes in protest against some government action.

I do not know how the French organize so fast, but they do it, and it takes French politicians very little time to get the message.

At first, the nationwide strikes in opposition to government decisions bothered me, but I learned to shrug and say "C'est Le Greve" and carry on with life just like the French do. In fact, I learned to go one step further and say "C'est Le Greve" with a grin. One of the reasons was that the strike usually lasted no more than a few days. French politicians are smarter than ours. They do not need anybody to tell them to back off fast.

I thought it would be great if the producers in rural communities could join together and have a province-wide strike to protest reduction of MLAs. What if the miners would not mine, the truckers would not carry goods to the city, the ranchers would not ship beef and the egg producers would not ship eggs, nor the dairies ship milk? What if the loggers refused to deliver logs to the mills, and the fishers refused to fish? What if the Okanagan and Similkameen and Kootenay fruit and vegetable producers

refused to ship their produce?

The reason French producers' strikes lasted so short a time was because, after three days with no milk (or trains or mail or whatever) every citizen was screaming at the government.

In comparison, Canadian producers are really very unorganized except in the mining and forest industry sectors. The other problem is that people do not communicate well between groups. For example, suppose the BC Cattlemen's Association wanted a strike to oppose something the government was doing, and wanted support from other raw materials and agricultural producers. How long would it take to organize such a strike?

The other thing rural communities have in their favour if they should ever get off their butts and organize a real protest is that all important highways and railways go through rural B.C. Close the highways and railways and refuse to ship anything to Vancouver or Victoria and those cities would soon learn how vulnerable they are when no raw materials come in and no goods go out.

So far, the forest industry workers are the best organized. In 1994, to protest extreme environ-

mental legislation, they formed cavalcades of logging trucks and took them to Victoria. That city had never seen anything like it. It was a peaceful protest.

All the loggers did was park their rigs all over downtown Victoria and then gather on the Parliament lawns. Try driving around a city chock full of logging trucks. Were the people of Victoria happy? Were the politicians happy? No, but it got their

attention and they began to back off.

From the view of politicians in our two major urban areas, B.C.'s rural population is a bunch of rednecks who do not have sense enough to move to a city. It is only when confronted by the muscle of rural communities that these urbanites pay attention. I wish we had a few more firebrands to lead our politicians to better sense.

Not Tough Enough To Smoke

I remember wanting to fit in, you know be accepted. I guess I might have had a bit of an inferiority complex when I was younger. It seemed to be reinforced when I was in school; you know when they pick teams for the PE classes, I was picked last. I was a zero when it came to sports, any sport. So how do you look cool if you are sports ability depleted? You smoke. Who knew then that smoking would cause other problems, it was more important to look cool than grow old. Anyway, my first experience with tobacco was when I was about seven or so. My dad had a plumbing company and we got into some half inch copper pipe, flattened one end and added an elbow and filled the elbow with some tobacco that we found locked in the glove box in, the locked truck of one of my dad's employees. After all, a can of snuff in the pocket of your snap button shirt looked as cool as a pack of cigarettes in that same pocket. Well, I remember having supper at the ranch and having to go down after supper and change the sprinkler pipes. I thought, a good chew of snuff would hit the spot right now, so I took a wad of good old Wintergreen Copenhagen, placed it under my tongue, making sure there was enough so my bottom lip protruded beyond my nose. I bent down to pick up a five inch, twenty foot long, aluminum main line sprinkler pipe, and swallowed the whole wad of tobacco.

My world changed instantly, I saw things that were not there, I was so sick that I threw up things that I had eaten on my fifth birthday. I fell into the alfalfa and laid there while the world turned around me at a thousand miles an hour. Eventually I got up, changed my sprinkler pipes and swore off tobacco forever. I had tried to be cool, but couldn't make it trying to follow the tobacco road. Life is like that for many of us. We want to be accepted and we will do almost anything to find that experience. The Apostle John wrote, For God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son, that WHOSEVER believes in Him shall not perish but have everlasting life. I can almost here some of you now, But, but, that is not for me, so butt out on the excuses and accept His acceptance of you. You have worth, value and purpose. You do not have to be cool or do anything cool to receive His acceptance, just ask.

Town approves tax exemptions

Town Council has given three readings to a bylaw to exempt certain properties from municipal property tax. The list is extensive. It includes nine church properties, Senior Citizens properties, hospital and health properties, seniors' housing, seven recreational properties, the old fire hall, the museum/library property, Masonic lodge building, the provincial government building, Town property and the Chamber of Commerce building.

District continues fight

School trustees have been fighting against GST for years, and are no further ahead, but are continuing the fight. School activities are charged GST for such things as hot dog sales. School districts must pay GST on purchases but get back only 68 percent. What trustees

want is a total exemption from GST.

At the October 3 school board meeting, Trustee Gordon Swann introduced a motion asking for support for the private members bill to be introduced by MP Alex Atamanenko. The motion passed.

Town closes road

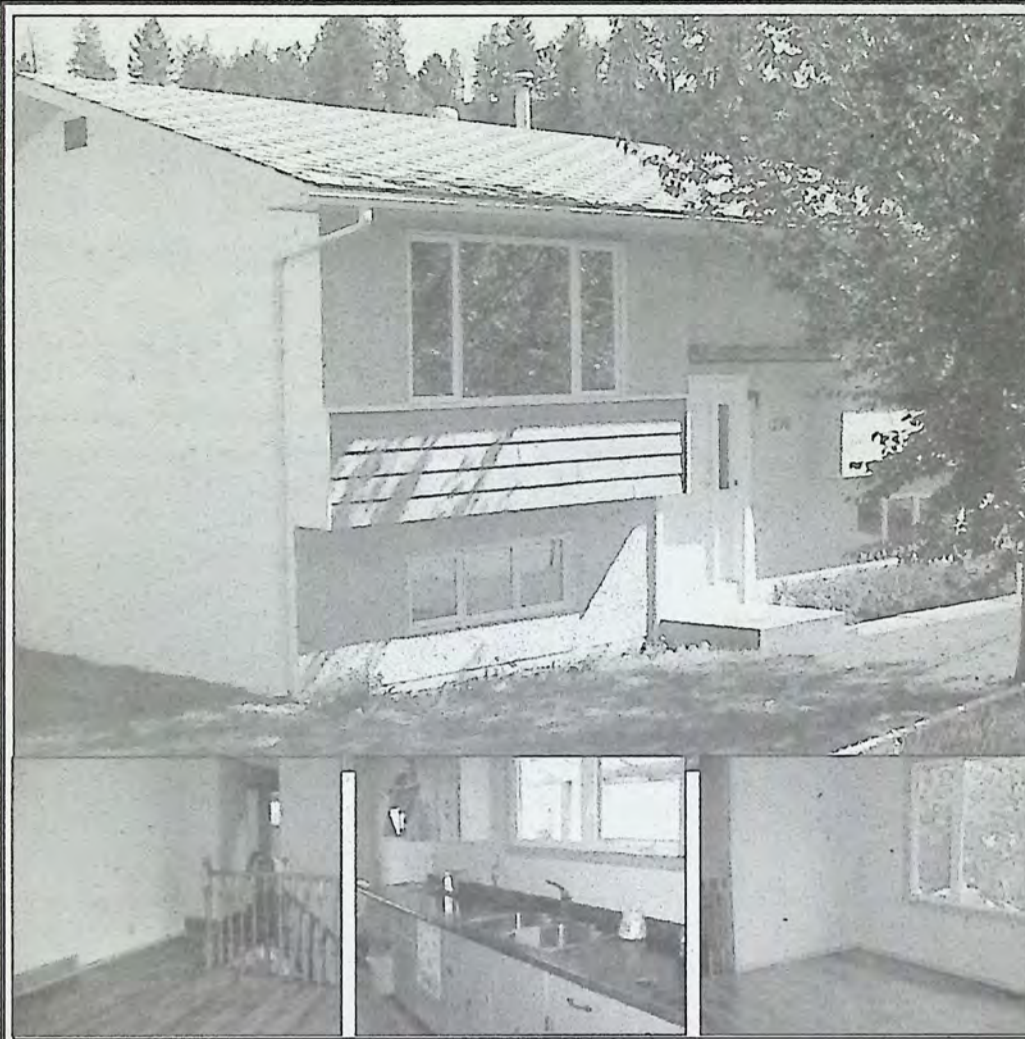
