## PXA looks at concession problem

The concession building at Princeton fairgrounds is in need of new countertops. The old hardwood laminate is breaking down. Princeton Exhibition Association (PXA) members looked at three different kinds of countertop finishing materials: arborite, plastic used for cutting boards, and stainless steel. The special plastic is reasonably priced, easy to install and easy to clean. It was the material chosen.

Another problem with the concession stand is finding somebody to

run it as Jody Woodford will no longer be running it with her crew. Finding people to run the concession during events should be up to each user group, PXA members agreed, but concession crews must have taken the Food Safe training.

Persons willing to operate the refreshment garden will also be the responsibility of each user group.

## Few attend second community forum

A total of just fewer than 40 people gathered in Riverside Centre for the second community forum hosted by BC Southern Interior MP Alex Atamanenko on October 9th.

Six of the seven scheduled speakers gave general overviews of what has taken place in their jurisdictions.

Deputy Mayor Pam Jones represented the Town of Princeton.

She indicated the town is currently working on the Official Community Plan (OCP), which should shape the future of the community.

"We need to know what we want to do and what we are going to look like fifteen years from now and twenty years from now. I am very proud of the fact that we are working on this."

Jones says there is work underway on the Industrial Park ("We cannot promote anything that is not

fully developed.") and the Town Square Project.

Yale-Lillooet MLA Harry Lali has been busy since August taking on responsibilities including work related to BC Lottery Corporation; becoming the critic for ICBC, attending the UBCM, examining the TILMA Agreement and supporting a plan to raise minimum wage in British Columbia to ten dollars per hour.

Upper Similkameen Indian Band Manager Philippe Batini says there are two big issues facing Princeton. "Our labour force and our economy."

Batini says the USIB is aggressively expanding its forest operations and continues to forge a solid working relationship with both the Town of Princeton and Area H of the Regional District.

"Our Chief and Council are very dedicated to working on the local economy."

Joyce MacKenzie, Director of Health Services, Interior Health (Princeton-Keremeos) came to Princeton eight months ago and stated she has a keen interest in issues facing rural communities.

She pointed out that Interior Health is committed to keeping Princeton's hospital open but is challenged with providing services with few doctors in the community. "The good news is we will continue to provide services."

MacKenzie says "recruitment and retention" is a major issue and sees a solution revolving around working with the community.

School District 58 (Nicola-Similkameen) School Trustee Dina Slowikowski-Campbell indicated that a lot of teachers in the district are approaching retirement and

pointed out recruitment and retention is also an issue they are facing.

Literacy is another issue of concern and Slowikowski-Campbell says two recent programs, the Princeton Family Centre /Community Kitchen and StrongStart, are in place to address it.

BC Southern Interior MP Alex Atamanenko discussed local and federal activities that he has been involved with.

The Passport Clinic earlier in the day at Princeton Legion processed over 200 applications with other

clinics planned for throughout the riding.

"Our area is one of eleven in the country Passport Canada is looking at to improve services."

Atamanenko has recently moved from being the Canadian Wheat Board critic to the critic for Rural Affairs and touched on the forestry industry, the high dollar, the housing market, tuition fees, childcare and the minimum wage as all issues of concern.

Regional District Director for Area H, Gerri Logan, was unable to attend the forum due to illness.

## Police respond to 'prank'

Princeton RCMP were notified of a collision 2-kilometres east of Princeton early on the morning of Sunday, October 7th.

"A motorist had struck a bale of hay which had been placed in the middle of the travel lane with a pumpkin on it," says Cpl. Joe Houben.

"The bale was strategically placed in the middle of a sharp corner allowing the driver little time to

react."

The vehicle suffered approximately \$1,000 in damage.

"The outcome could have been much worse. If one considers that such acts could cause a driver to lose control of his own vehicle or in attempting to evade the obstacle to move in the oncoming travel lane," Houben adds.

The driver was not identified and police are continuing to investigate

the incident.

"As this act is perceived to be a prank, police take this opportunity to remind parents to discuss these types of actions/pranks with their children/teenagers. In this instance it resulted in damages to personal property."

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### OPEN FIRE RESTRICTIONS LIFTED in Vernon and Penticton Fire Zones

Effective at noon on October 1, 2007, and until further notice, Section 20 (Category 1 open fire), Section 21 (Category 2 open fire) and Section 22 (Category 3 open fire) of the *Wildfire Regulation* is permitted at all elevations throughout the Vernon and Penticton Fire Zones, pursuant to Section 10(1)(a) of the *Wildfire Act*.

The Penticton and Vernon Fire Zones extend from the United States border south of Osoyoos to Enderby and Mabel Lake in the north. In the east, it extends along the height of land of the Monashee Mountains, to the Big White/Greystokes area. In the west it extends from the Fintry area south to the Ashnola/Elkhart lodge area.

Open fire is defined in three categories. A Category 1 open fire means an open fire that burns piled material no larger than one metre high and one metre wide. This Category 1 open fire ban does not prohibit the use of campfires.

A Category 2 open fire means an open fire that burns piled material no larger than two metres high and three metres wide, or grass over an area less than 0.2 hectares (2000 square metres) in size.

A Category 3 open fire means an open fire that burns material in piles larger than two metres high and three metres wide, windrows, or grass over an area larger than 0.2 hectares (2000 square metres) in size.

The Kamloops Fire Centre extends from the northern border of Wells Gray Park, north of Blue River to the US border in the south, and from the Bridge River Glacier west of Goldbridge to the Monashee Mountains east of Lumby.

## Open air burning season starts

The Open Air Burning Season opens October 15th for residents in the fire protection areas of Naramata, Okanagan Falls, Kaleden, Willowbrook and Tulameen.

Residents who do not have a valid 2007 permit can apply online at [www.rdos.bc.ca](http://www.rdos.bc.ca) click on Burning Permits, or in person at the Regional District office.

Tulameen residents may also apply at their local volunteer fire hall.

Anyone burning without a permit, could receive a fine or be charged with the cost of putting out the fire. Residents are encouraged to report

anyone who is illegally burning by calling Penticton Regional Dispatch at (250) 490-2300 or to report a Wildfire at 1-800-663-5555 or \*5555 from a cellular phone.

There are many other options available to residents for disposing of their yard and wood waste. The fall curbside yard waste collection program is underway and anyone may take advantage of the year-round free yard waste disposal at their local landfills free of charge on loads up to 500 kilograms (1,100 pounds).

While there is no tipping fee on agricultural wood waste all other

separated wood waste, up to 500 kilograms (1,100 pounds), is accepted free of charge at the Campbell Mountain and Okanagan Falls landfills.

Ensure loads are covered when transporting to the landfills. Untarped loads are charged double the regular landfill tipping fee, with a minimum fee of ten dollars.

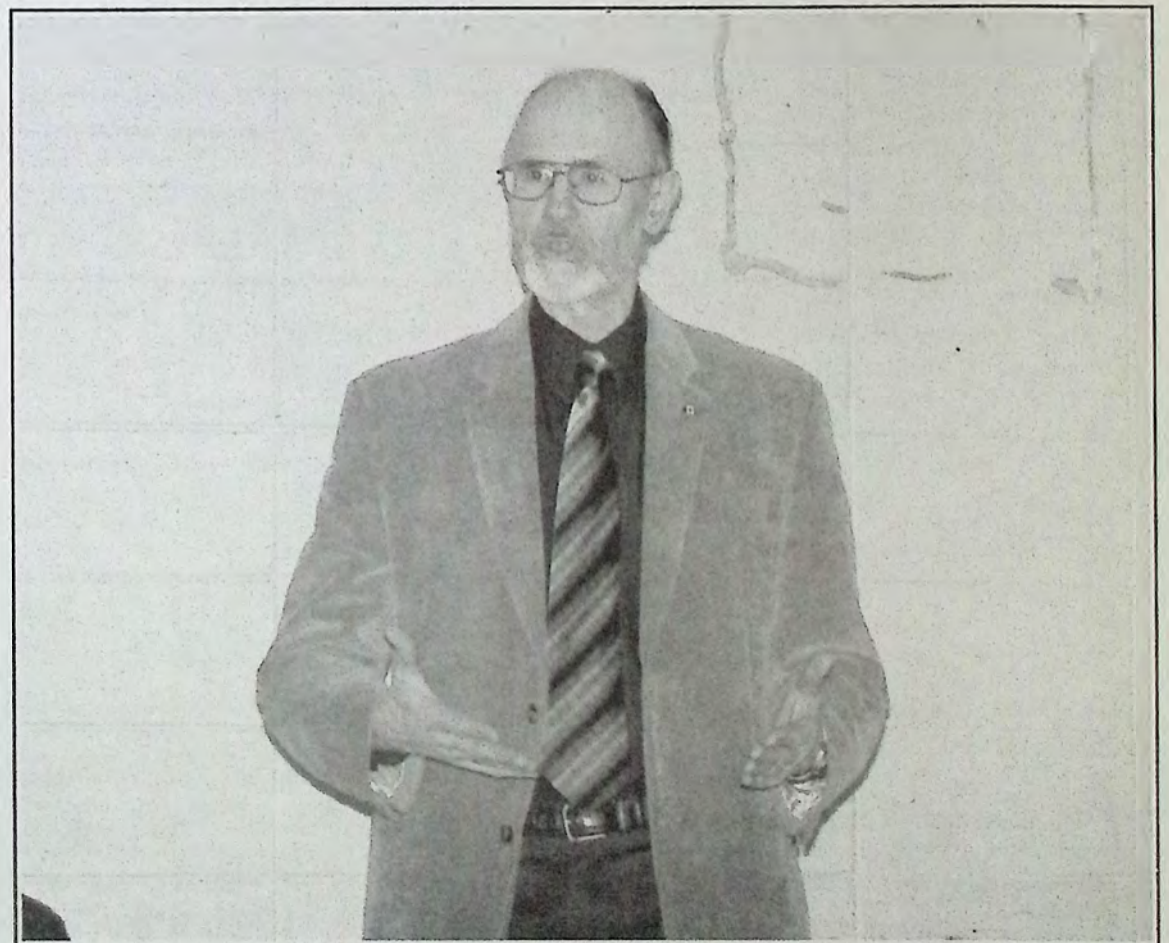

## Skating club installs jumping harness

It started in 2005 when Princeton Skating Club Executive members saw a need for a jumping harness and started raising funds for the apparatus. This will be the first season skaters will be able to use the equipment.

"A jumping harness is a necessity in skating's highly competitive world," says the Club.

"Jumping harnesses can dramatically reduce the learning time for a single and more complicated, double, triple and quad jumps. The Coach is able to direct the take-off curve, keep the skater straight in the air, and keep the skater's back in position upon landing."

Down time due to injury can also be minimized.

"Coaches can instill confidence in the skater's ability to do the difficult jumps and have them avoid practicing mistakes."

The Skating Club was able to offset the expensive harness and installation in Princeton Arena with a successful lottery ticket fundraiser with the cost of the harness covered in the first year and installation fees covered in the second.

Installation of the harness, which

straddles the blue line at the far end of the arena, was designed by a structural engineer and installed by arena staff and Spence Smith of Arcat Welding.

"We are very pleased to have this project completed and would like to thank our supporters in Princeton for purchasing lottery tickets during our last two seasons.

## Local grocer celebrates 35 years

Keremeos area residents have shopped for years for groceries in the same downtown location, at the four-corner set of lights – the only set of lights on the main street.

It's known as Valu Plus Foods now following stints as an IGA Plus and Super Valu. It was in fact a Super Valu store when Jeff and Pat Rowe took it over 35 years ago this month.

Owner Jeff Rowe recalls an IGA franchiser came forward when he was going to construct an expanded Super Valu.

"During that time a Mr. Chuck Candy, who was a CEO for H. Y. Louie, and IGA Stores showed up on the doorstep and said 'Why don't you come to IGA? We'll build you a new store.' And Ron

Peck was the superintendent on the construction job and we built a new store which took almost a full calendar year before we could open and that opened on April 23rd, 1993. We ran it as an IGA for a little over ten years and I found I wasn't nearly as competitive as I wanted to be so I made the decision to become totally independent."

Rowe says when the store shifted from Super Valu to IGA it took a lot of extra hands to get the job done.

"I had my Super Valu 39ers mens ball team helping me and we worked all night and tore all the equipment out. It was loaded on trucks to a buyer and then we loaded all the merchandise that was left over and put it in fruit bins and we had two of Vesper's trail-

ers in my parking lot and we stored all the leftover food."

The Rowes moved to Keremeos from Hope and when they retire, they hope to see the business continue to stay in the family.

"My daughter, Shannon, she's trying to kick me out the back door but I'm here to help her. I hope in the next two or three years to be able to back off a little bit and one person can't run the store, it takes a whole team and we're very, very fortunate that we have a great team. Human resources is my biggest challenge, and so far we've been reasonably successful in keeping what I would refer to as top caliber help."

Rowe has a staff of 32 working for him and says his business has succeeded thanks to a supportive community and dedicated staff.

## Lali says Liberals are out of touch with rural BC

The BC Liberals are continuing to botch the implementation of the new Meat Industry Regulation (MIR) by throwing misinformation into the mix, says Yale-Lillooet NDP MLA Harry Lali.

In a recent media interview BC Liberal MLA Val Roddick gave radio listeners the wrong information when she was quoted as saying: "Right now you can buy (meat) right from the farm. It is just that you can't resell. You can certainly go and buy right now from a local farm, what these regulations mean is that you cannot resell to a restaurant or a store."

According to Lali, "This is just another example of how out of touch the Campbell Liberals are with Rural British Columbia. The radio show had to air a subsequent segment in order to clear up the

mass confusion generated by Roddick's misinformation."

Lali adds, "Under the Campbell government's current legislation selling meat without government inspection at the farm gate is illegal, and this major gaffe by the BC Liberal MLA only intensifies the chaos generated by the government's mishandling of the issue."

Lali says, "When Val Roddick, the BC Liberal Parliamentary Secretary for Agricultural Planning, who herself is involved in agribusiness, shows confusion around her own government's legislation, it is clear that something is massively wrong with the way the Meat Industry Regulation has been mishandled by this uncaring Liberal Government."

## Your will may be the most important document you will write

(NC)—Did you know that many Canadians mistakenly believe that having a will is not a priority? Nothing could be further from the truth. In fact, a will is probably the most important document you will ever write.

If you die without a will, the province in which you live will decide how to distribute your estate. And if you have children who are minors, the provincial government (through the Public Trustee) will decide who will raise and care for them. Children might be taken into public custody until guardians are

identified. The provincial government has its own common and impersonal formulas for the distribution of your estate. Some money or assets may end up going to places and persons you may have not intended. For example, under these laws, each child would receive a proportion of the Estate created by a pre-established formula. So a son or daughter who was already well-established, completed university and had their own home and a secure income, might end up receiving the same amount as another child with very different needs.

As well, without a will there could be no special gifts to your lifelong friend, or a bequest to your favourite community or non-profit organization such as a health charity or a group like Amnesty International. In sum, no concerns for your thoughts on the size of any bequests to anyone would be addressed without a proper will.

**Avoid Family Disputes** - Having a proper will also goes a long way to preventing family tiffs. A current study showed that one in five Canadians has experienced family disputes over inheritances. It is likely many of these

involved circumstances where there was no will. With a properly-written will the guesswork is eliminated, and the family is clear on your intentions. The emotional turmoil which is natural at such a time can be greatly reduced by having made your wishes clear in a written will.

**Avoid Unnecessary Delays and Costs** - Another compelling reason to have a will is to save money. Many people mistakenly think their estates are too small to warrant having a will, but the contrary is true.

The smaller the estate, the greater the need to have things settled quickly. Without a will, a person's affairs are managed by provincial authorities, who often have hundreds of files to attend to, which could cause unnecessary delays and extra costs. There are many reasons why people never get around to writing a will, including the belief that it is costly — a common misconception, and it doesn't have to be. ### Grapes keep your heart healthy

Grapes and grape juice are good for your heart, protect against stroke and high blood pressure, and help prevent cholesterol from sticking to your arteries. That is great news for everyone who likes grapes and grape juice, but there is one warning: the darker red the grape, the better it is for you. The same applies to grape juice.

Grape juice is good for you, but not as good as eating fresh grapes. The protective elements of grapes, called flavonoids, are in the skin and pulp of the grape. They are antioxidants, even better than Vitamin C or E. There is much less of the good stuff in grape juice, but it is still there.

Grape juice is less expensive if you buy frozen concentrate and add your own water. If you look on the label of ready-to-drink grape juice, you are likely to see "made from concentrate". Why not make your own juice from concentrate? Juice boxes with straws are popular drinks for children, especially in lunch kits. You can buy plastic drink containers that are reusable and cut the cost of lunch juice over time. The trick is getting the kids to bring the containers home again! Dark red wine is another story. In the process of fermentation, the flavonoids migrate into the liquid, making dark red wine very good for you, in small doses. However, NEVER give children wine, as the alcohol has other adverse effects.

When you buy grape juice, buy the real thing. Take time to read the label to ensure you are getting 100 percent juice, not one of those grape flavoured drinks. When you buy grapes, go for the red grapes. The white grapes are good for you, too, but you will need to eat three times more of them to gain the health benefits.

## Judge orders jail

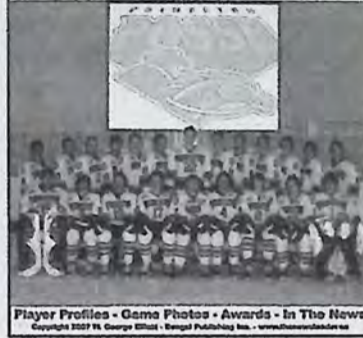

# POM Turkey and Brie Panini

(NC)—Time to table: 5 minutes prep, 5 minutes cooking - Makes: 8 servings

- 1/2 cup arils from 1 POM Wonderful Pomegranate
- 8 slices Italian or other sturdy type bread
- 8 thin slices smoked turkey (1 ounce each)
- 8 ounces brie cheese cut into 8 slices
- 16 fresh basil leaves
- 1/4 cup unsweetened apple sauce
- 2 tablespoons olive oil for toasting bread

1. Score 1 fresh pomegranate and place in a bowl of water. Break open the pomegranate underwater to free the arils (seed sacs). The arils will sink to the bottom of the bowl and the membrane will float to the top. Sieve and put the arils in a separate bowl. Reserve 1/2 cup of the arils from fruit and set aside. (Refrigerate or freeze remaining arils for another use.) 2. Heat a griddle or heavy skillet over medium-high heat. 3. Brush one side of each bread slice with olive oil; place four of the bread slices in skillet oil side down. 4. Brown until golden, about one to two minutes, over medium high heat. 5. Remove skillet from the heat and remove the bread slices from skillet. Place bread slices on a flat working surface and set aside. 6. Mix applesauce with 1/2 cup arils and divide onto the soft side of the bread just removed from skillet. 7. Place brie, basil and turkey on top of applesauce and cover with remaining bread slices, oil side up. Fasten with toothpicks if necessary. 8. Return skillet to the heat and add the sandwiches soft side down. Press second heavy pan on sandwiches to flatten them. Cook until bottom side is golden brown and cheese is soft. 9. Cut into halves and serve warm.

# Where do we stop private ownership?

We, in the Similkameen Valley, live in a desert environment. We would see the desert more clearly if it were not for our rivers. We are blessed with an abundance of water.

What if we had to pay for every drop of water we use? How many of us could afford to bathe, grow gardens, or lawns? How many farms would we have?

Some might say it would depend on how much the water cost. I believe the big question should be this: why should we give anybody the right to own our water supply?

I have nothing against people buying bottled water to carry in the car on a trip. Personally, I just fill a bottle from our tap because I know how much Town Council spends to make sure our water is safe to drink. Some people distrust tap water, and that suits a lot of water supply companies and even more water purification companies.

There are companies that want to buy bulk water from Canada. There is a big danger in this. The minute we start selling bulk water, we are admitting that somebody can own water. You cannot sell what you do not own, and so far, Canada has not allowed the sale of bulk water. Therefore, nobody owns Canada's water. You can own the right to extract water from a particular source, but you cannot own the water itself.

A document titled North American Future 2025 Project leaked to the Council of Canadians indicates secret discussions are underway to facilitate selling bulk water to the U.S.A. and Mexico. The movement of water south of the border includes diverting water from Canada to the U.S.A. This is all part of the ongoing secret discussions called the North American Security and Prosperity Partnership (SPP). In short, the Canadian government somehow got the idea that the government owns our water and can sell it.

In 2004, former Ontario premier Mike Harris was willing to sell 4.5 million litres per day of Tay

River water to a Swiss-based transnational corporation. Imagine selling that much water, every day, to have it shipped somewhere else, where it would likely be sold again at a profit. The Council of Canadians was successful in alerting the public and public outcry put a stop to the transaction. (Ultimately, the public put a stop to Mike Harris' political career, too.)

Public outcry prevented a similar venture in Quebec the same year.

People (businesses) want to buy bulk water. They see a chance to make money. Last year, a Kamloops businessman applied to the BC government for a licence to drain one million gallons of water a day from Adams Lake to export to the Middle East. Can you imagine what the removal of 365 million gallons per year from Adams Lake might do to the salmon, to say nothing of the rest of the environment dependent on that water? The

Council of Canadians and the Sierra Club of BC put a stop to that deal.

The Council of Canadians is working toward having Ottawa declare water a human right and outlaw bulk water sales. Why should we do that?

Several years ago, Bechtel Corporation bought the rights to all of the water in Bolivia from the Bolivian government. The citizens had to pay a steep price for every litre of water they used, even if they took it from a nearby stream, or saved rainwater. Eventually, the citizens went on the rampage and demanded the law be changed so every citizen is entitled to have water and that no individual or corporate entity could own the water.

Water is life. Water, like air and sunshine, wind and snow, appear to belong to all of us. I believe these things should belong to all of us. I wonder whether other countries would like to import our snow? If somebody owned

all of our water, would they therefore own all of our snow and hail? I bet they never thought of the problems involved in preventing snow from melting and thereby giving us water. On the other hand, maybe they did and would charge us so much per square foot of snow that fell on our property? It boggles the mind.

The fact that Canada can consider selling water as if it were the same as shoes or lumber is because Canada has no water policy. There are companies that deliver water and charge for it, such as the Corporation of the Town of Princeton, but those entities do not claim to own the

water. The Town of Princeton does not tell us we cannot drink water from the river or save rain-water. We are not charged for the water itself, just for the wells, pumps, reservoir, electricity and pipes that deliver the water to our homes.

There is a big difference between owning the water and owning the delivery system. Who told our government in Ottawa or the provinces that they "own" the water? Who said they could sell it? We're all paying for the delivery system, but the water should belong to all of us. I believe every one of us needs to tell our governments our water is not for sale.

### Connecting Big In A Small Town

I really like living in small towns. There is something about a small town that allows you to connect with the people who make up that small town. Like when we lived in Dawson City, Yukon.

Dawson City is 350 miles north of Whitehorse, it is not the end of the world, but you can see it from there. It was a town of 600 people and 1,400 sled dogs. When we lived there the summer the population would triple with all the tourists that came to Dawson from all over the world. I remember when I joined the local fire department, I asked the crew what they did when the temperature is 60 below and they fought a fire. I learned that winter, one team puts the fire out on one side of the building that is burning and the other team throws wood on the fire to keep everyone warm.

Being such a small town, there was not a dry cleaners, a funeral home or a flower shop and most businesses close down for the winter. I remember my wife going to get her hair cut in the fall one year. She came home with a real short hair cut, I mean about an inch long. When I asked her why she got it cut so short, she said the hair dresser was leaving for the winter and wouldn't be back until spring, so she was cutting everyone's hair the same.

Dawson has grown in the last few years to a population of about 2,000 year round residents and 3,500 sled dogs. The town still can boast some very unique things. One tour company offers a summer package consisting of 3 days and no nights. Parents need to be careful not to tell their kids that they do not have to come home until it is dark, or they won't see them from June until September.

In the winter it is a good place for relationships, the Bible says, don't let the sun set on your anger, in Dawson you can get along for at least 8 months and then sun comes up again. I think it was Phyllis Diller who said, Don't let the sun go down on your wrath, stay up and fight.

Ganges, Salt Spring Island. Here is another unique small town, at least when we lived there it was. I remember going to the hospital one morning for tests. I got there at eight o'clock and there was no one in the building except me and the receptionist. I went and told her that I was there for some tests and she said, take a number. Now this is a small hospital, in a small town on a small island and there is no one else in the hospital that morning.

I looked around and sure enough there was a ticket dispenser on the wall. I went over took a number, it was number three, and I went and sat down. I just sat down and the receptionist called out, number three, I looked around and said, that's me. I always have wondered what they did with the other two.

Somewhere in Alberta. A friend of mine had been working in the Yukon with me on construction many years ago and he accidentally spit his two false front teeth into the Yukon River at the Miles Canyon. He left the Yukon that day and went to get a new set of teeth in Edmonton, Alberta, about a 30 hour drive south. He was in a bit of a hurry and was traveling Yukon style passed a small community in northern Alberta, when he was pulled over for speeding. The traffic cop gave him a ticket and as a parting suggestion to my friend, after looking at the Yukon license plates on the pick-up truck said, I want to tell you son, that we don't drive like that, here in Canada. My friend wanted to smile, but remembered, he had no front teeth.

It was being brought up in a small town that helped me develop trust and friendships. The church is like a small town, different people from all walks of life, all ages and everyone has something to share to make your life more meaningful and valuable. The Bible says that we should not forsake the assembling of ourselves together. (Hebrews 10:25) If you haven't visited a church in the last while, make some plans to explore a new kind of small town. Your community has many different churches to choose from.

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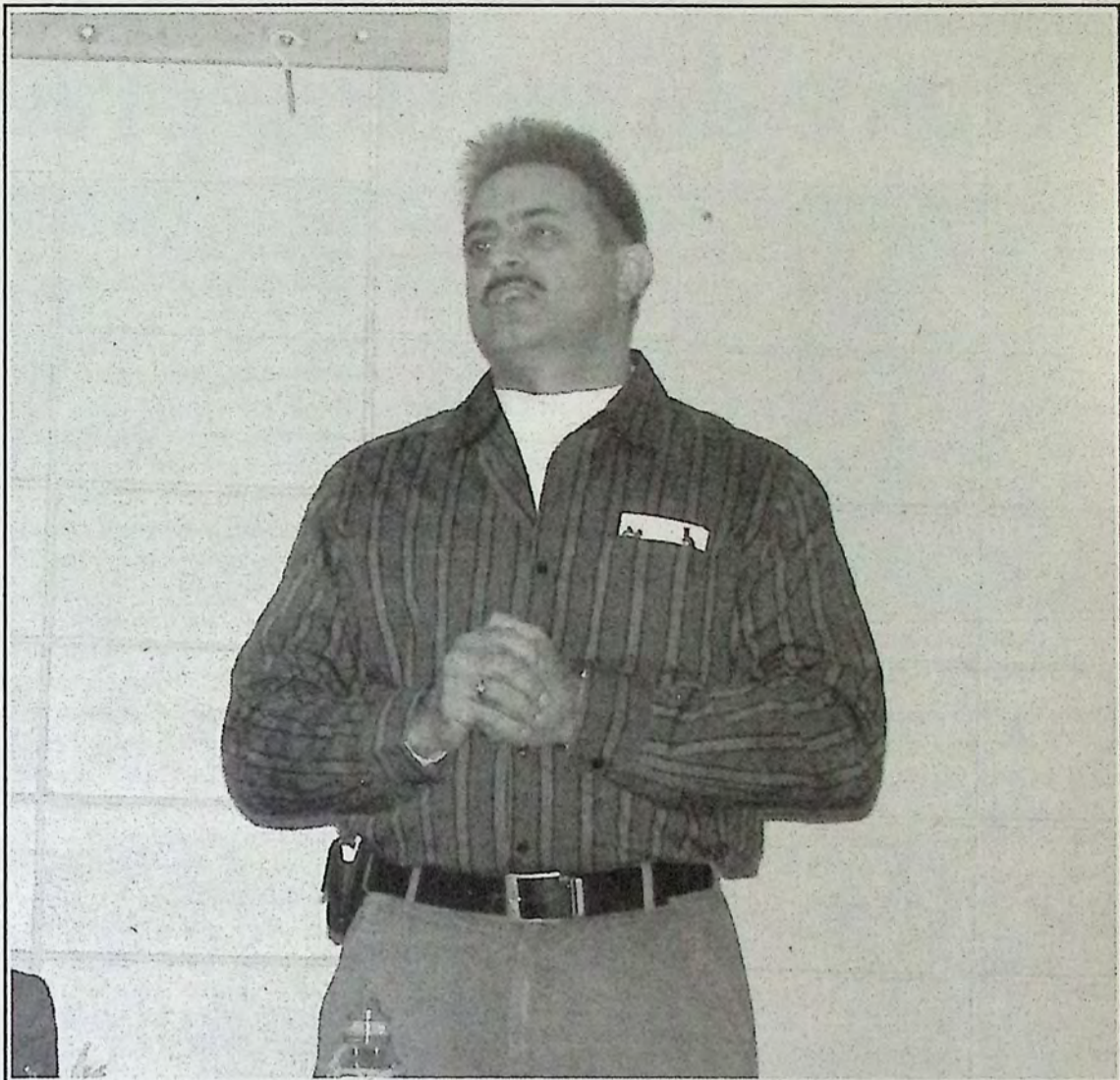

On Wednesday, October 9th Alex Atamanenko, MP for BC Southern Interior, visited the child and caregiver Drop In at the Princeton Family Place in Kenley Hall.

Princeton Childcare Services Society operates the Family Place and Renee Hartwell is the Drop In Coordinator. Hartwell explained to Atamanenko that the Drop In is open Monday, Wednesday and Thursday from 11:00 AM to 2:00 PM.

She said, "The Drop In offers families with children 0 to 6 an opportunity to do arts and crafts, prepare and share nutritious foods and socialize with other young families. The program for the children is based on loosely structured play which encourages socialization and the development of creativity."

Atamanenko had an opportunity to observe the children enjoying independent and small group play while their caregivers watched and visited.

Hartwell pointed out that the Drop In is equally beneficial for the caregivers as they share ideas and information in a comfortable, relaxed setting.

Hartwell informed the visiting MP that attendance at the Drop In has exceeded her expectations. An average of nine children and six caregivers attend each session with the number of participants increasing each week.

"All caregivers in Princeton and District with children 0 to 6 are

invited to drop in and join the fun at Princeton Family Centre."

Atamanenko complimented Hartwell on her successful work at the Drop In. He vowed he would inform Princeton Childcare Services Society if federal government grants become available for family centres and/or community kitchens.

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### What Is A Tax Credit

Although there is a substantial difference between a tax credit and a tax deduction, it is easy to get the two confused.

Items that are deductible reduce your taxable income, with the actual amount of tax saved depending on your personal tax rate.

If you are in the highest tax bracket, the deduction is generally worth anywhere from 39 to 49 cents on the dollar (depending on your province of residence).

If you are in the lowest bracket, it is generally worth around 25 cents on the dollar (again, this will differ depending on your province of residence).

If you have no taxable income, a deduction may not save you any tax at all.

A tax credit, on the other hand, is a deduction from tax owing. Provided the credit can be used, each taxpayer receives the same tax relief from a tax credit, regardless of his or her particular tax bracket.

On World Teachers' Day we celebrate our accomplishments and the quality work done by teachers everyday in their classrooms.

In acknowledgement of World Teachers' Day a donation has been made by the Princeton District Teachers' Union on behalf of Princeton teachers to the Princeton Family Place.

Princeton Family Place occurred on Wednesday, August 8th. The Family Place is located in Kenley Hall across from the cenotaph and includes a family drop in/community kitchen. The family drop in for children 0 to 6 and their parent/caregiver is held every Monday, Wednesday and Thursday from 11:00 AM to 2:00 PM.

The family drop in uses the community kitchen to prepare a nutritious snack each day and lunch one day a week. Future plans include using the Family Place to enhance present programs for families of young children and to provide new programs related to healthy eating.

Princeton Family Place provides an opportunity for children to informally socialize and parents to acquire knowledge and skills from one another and from childcare professionals.

Communities for Kids and Princeton Childcare Services Society have established a joint committee of volunteers to oversee the development of the Family Place. Penny Schreckenber, program coordinator for Princeton Childcare Services Society, supervises the Family Place and Renee Hartwell is the facilitator of the drop in.

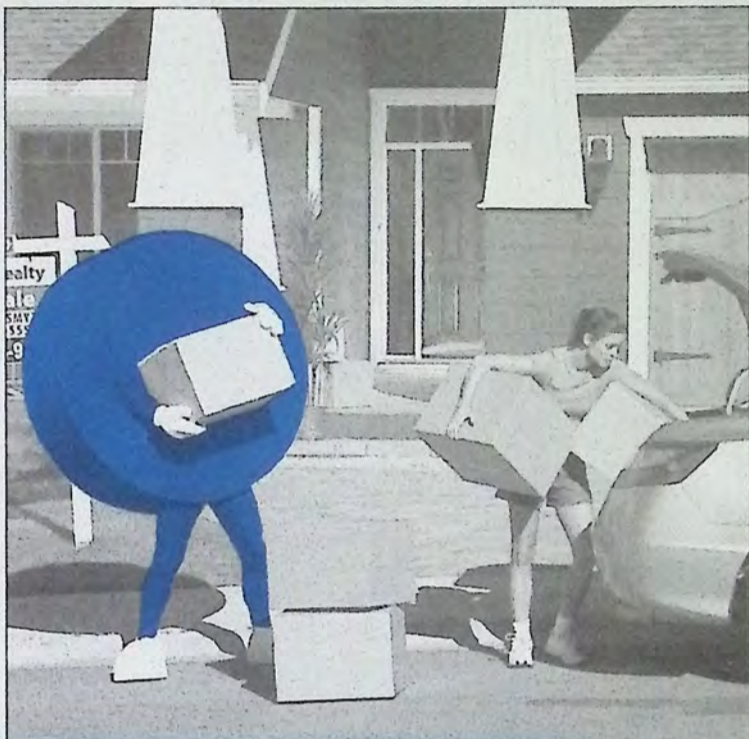

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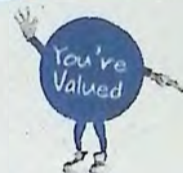


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## Princeton Court News
