RCMP issues status report

Princeton RCMP Detachment Sgt. Gary Macahonic says there has been no shortage of activity to keep his office busy.

"Princeton has been and still is a very safe community where there is a lot of trust between neighbours and friends, but there is also the unfortunate fact that there are those still out there victimizing Princeton citizens."

He adds, "In the last couple weeks there has been break and enters in the Princeton area."

Macahonic says two businesses and a downtown residence have been hit by vandals.

"The RCMP have leads in these ongoing investigations but are asking the public that if they have any

information that could help them in solving these or any other crime in our area, please call the RCMP."

Macahonic also says changing weather conditions in recent weeks has resulted in numerous motor vehicle accidents on Highway 3. He says road conditions and some drivers not adjusting their driving habits in poor conditions have been the causes.

"Fortunately there have not been any major injuries but motorists are reminded to slow down and buckle up."

Macahonic also issues this reminder: "Your community is our community and we the RCMP are committed to doing our part in making your town safe."

Adams addresses medical crisis

I feel compelled to respond to the recent articles in the local news regarding the Medical Crisis in Princeton and to the Community Update issued by Interior Health on February 1, 2008.

One article mentioned that we have "a tendency in our community to enlarge our perceived problems." I also believe that we have a tendency to be apathetic and lethargic in addressing problems that have the potential of altering our Towns' ability to survive and thrive.

My desire to bring information forward to the public exists because without community involvement and awareness, we will see a day when our emergency department closes.

I don't need to look far in order to point a finger as we have a system that clearly outlines areas of authority and it is the Interior Health Authority who are respon-

sible for providing medical services in our community. I don't blame the citizens of Princeton, I don't blame the doctors, I don't blame Town Council, I don't blame the Mayor and I don't blame the BC Government.

I hold the managers of the business responsible for bad management of the business.

I have spent ten of the last fifteen years working in the medical arena in Princeton and none of the problems that have led to the current situation have been addressed by our health authority, yet they can continue to be portrayed as a knight in shining armour coming to our defence?

This problem started with regionalization that occurred under the NDP government in 1996. We lost control of our local resources to a 'big brother' scenario and this was done to streamline the system. What has occurred instead of streamlining is the slow but steady deterioration of our medical services and medical infrastructure. As a community Many of us have watched this happen and not reacted.

Regionalization was not the only

factor, following regionalization the BCMA made a rule that provided a benefit to physicians who practiced in under-served communities and penalized those who chose to practice in areas of ample physician supply. This worked well but was soon overturned as it was considered illegal.

Additionally, the IHA has removed all incentives for rural physicians to work in our community. A rural doctor does not practice rural medicine so they can sit behind a desk and write prescriptions.

They practice rural medicine because it requires unique skills in many arenas. Rural physicians are typically driven by their ability to practice 'whole medicine' e. g. deliver you as a baby, they stitch you up as a teenager, they remove your tonsils, they deliver your baby, they council and they help people through their final stages of life.

We no longer have any facilities that would medically attract a rural physician to our community as they have been removed by IHA as 'cost saving' measures. Therefore the only way now to recruit and

retain is through a financial incentive. This incentive has to be considerable to make up for the lack of medical attractants and lack of community amenities available compared to other communities and it has to be long lasting to ensure retention is achieved.

Since I spoke with council, it has been brought to my attention that coverage has now been found to ensure emergency services will remain in place during the month of April.

The individuals making decisions at IHA should come to our community and provide us with accurate information about their plans and the work that they are performing. Instead their recent 'Community Update' states that if you have a question you can call the Penticton Health Centre.

I have done this and although the staff member is pleasant and kind, the answers to the questions posed are not available as it must be referred to the people making the decisions.

For example, it would be helpful for industry to know what plans will be put in place if the emergency department does close e. g.

will the IHA pay for 24-hour, 7 day a week, 365 days a year ambulance and paramedic support that will be required on location at the various industries that operate in and around Princeton?

Will IHA take the liability on for anyone who is injured at their job site? Will these costs fall on the industries active here and lead to their closure?

I commend our local council for their recent work on the medical crisis and I commend the community on assisting as they can. I commend the IHA for putting a recruitment package together and the work they are doing in upgrading paramedic skills. I commend the work being done to provide a primary health care centre at the hospital.

These are good things but they are not good enough. This situation has been a long time coming and no foresight by management has led to where we are today.

I will not watch, wait and cross my fingers as lives are put at risk. It is my kids, my business and my future that I am standing up for and I don't believe that waiting quietly is the answer.



Committee sends report

Our February 5th meeting saw the forming of the Committee as follows — Temporary Chairperson Sylvia Bailey, Vice Chair shared by Tina Krause and Bob Hart, Secretary Nora Sutton and it included ten other Chair Members. Three of those other members are Town Council Members Ray Jarvis, Pam Jones and Jim Manion.

Low cost housing strategies that are already in place and in the "works" in Vernon, Armstrong, Invermere and Fernie were introduced.

Town Council members discussed some strong possibilities of partnering with the Committee that will be explored.

"Relaxed rules" for legal basement suites and carriage houses over garages were discussed.

Concern for fire and safety regulations in existing rental units was discussed. A Town Council member said that it is the responsibility of the Province to investigate com-

plaints and enforce those codes.

Town Council asked "what funds can we leverage from grants." Sylvia Bailey and Bob Hart will look into acquiring the Canadian Subsidies CD. (We now have it in hand.)

Ralph Weatherbee, who was representing Marvin Carlson (the owner of the Burton Street cabins), spoke about the seniors' SAFER grant (SAFER reimburses between 35% and 90% of the difference between 30% of your total income and your rent, up to a limit of \$610 for rent if your annual income is below \$15,000.) Weatherbee also said that Carlson, is willing to renovate the cabins to accommodate seniors and that there is a vacant lot on the property where there is room to build a three story complex.

Town Council suggested that we look into the costs of renovating existing buildings rather than building new ones. They also said

that if anyone was interested in building they could contact the Council members who were at this meeting.

Letters to present to Mayor and Council were discussed and to be ratified at the next meeting.

From the February 13th meeting — Three new members were in attendance. Letters that had been drafted were discussed and ratified. One will be sent immediately asking Town Council to implement a policy prohibiting strata to own if the vacancy rate for rentals is below 4%.

Another letter will be reworded and sent next week.

A report was given by Nora Sutton on her discussions with local realtors.

People seriously trying to find low income housing please call 295-3099. If you do this we can try to help you in the short term and also get the number of people in need so we can work on long term solutions also.

- Anna Brook volunteered to take phone calls from anyone who is looking for low cost rental housing. If you will call her at 295-3099 between 6:00 and 8:00 PM she will take your name, phone number and what kind of housing you need and how much you can afford to pay. This information will be passed on to the local realtors. It will be up to you to have your references, etc. in place if the realtors call you to tell you they have a place that fits your needs.

You should still be looking in the newspapers, etc. on your own as well, because not all rentals go through the realtors.


NOTICE OF TREE REMOVAL

RDOS introduces smoke reduction program

Improper burning and burning of prohibited materials contributes significantly to air pollution in the valley.

Now, thanks to funding through the federally and provincially funded Agriculture Environment Initiatives, the RDOS is introducing the 'Best Management Practices for Wood Waste Disposal' pilot program to assist farmers and orchardists in the South Okanagan/Similkameen in helping us all breathe a little easier. The pilot end date is June 30, 2008.

The focus of the program is to conduct trials and provide information and guidelines on best management practices for agricultural wood waste disposal. Information will be provided indicating how to reduce pollutants from improper burning, and which materials are prohibited from burning. Monies from this pro-

gram will also be used to produce a film clip to be made available to agriculturalists. A report and template will be available to other communities outside the RDOS once the pilot project is complete.

The program is free to all agriculturalists in the South Okanagan/Similkameen and outlines voluntary actions that help create more environmentally aware farming practices. It is aimed at providing all segments of the agriculture industry with a solid understanding of the environments needs as well as communicating the important role agriculture has in conservation and environmental issues.

In the past, the largest problems confronting producers when attempting to properly dispose of wood waste were the inconvenience and the expense involved. This resulted in improper burning of wood waste and improper dis-

posal of prohibited materials such as treated fence posts.

The RDOS now has the ability to pilot solutions to these problems. Pilot options consist of a portable chipper available for full tree and prunings. Additionally, the program will offer a variety of other wood waste disposal options such as mulching, salvaging, hauling to landfills, and trench or air curtain burning technologies.

To get more information on how you may participate in the 'Best Management Practices for Wood Waste Disposal' pilot program, please contact Air Quality staff at the Regional District Okanagan Similkameen at (250) 490-4212. All sectors of the agriculture industry are invited to participate.

The RDOS 'Best Management Practices for Wood Waste Disposal' program wishes to acknowledge the \$74,202, representing 80% of the project cost, received from the Agriculture Environment Initiatives, joint initiatives of Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada, the British Columbia Ministry of Agriculture and Lands and the Investment Agriculture Foundation of British Columbia and the BC Agriculture Council.

News Leader launches new website

This week Bengel Publishing Inc., which owns and operates the Similkameen News Leader, adds another website to its internet division.

The website, www.frameyourpets.com, has to do with pet photography and through a series of e-mails sent to subscribers at regular intervals teaches short and simple tips to taking better pet photos.

What makes the site stand out is the lessons contained within the 'Paws 'n' Claws Pet Photo Guide' are taught by the pets themselves.

"I had the concept for the Frame Your Pets website in place about a month ago but needed to find a way to make it unique," says News Leader Owner/Publisher George Elliott.

"I was thinking along the lines of 'you can teach an old dog new tricks' then decided to flip it completely around by putting the pets in the place of teaching the lessons, which are called tricks."

The website is sub-titled with the line: Where Humans Learn Tricks! Eddie the Dalmatian is the main character in the program and is assisted by Magnum the Cat. A third member of the program is Yogi the Australian Shepherd/Border Collie cross who both Eddie and Magnum talk about along with their own experiences as they teach the photo tips.

"The animals are actually pets owned by my wife, Brenda and I, so I gave them human traits – such as the ability to speak – and used them in the program, tweaking their personalities which shows up in the dialogue part of the Frame Your Pets program," Elliott

explains.

"So for example, one of the 'tricks' is about trying not to use your camera flash near your pet. Eddie and Magnum discuss the details on why it may not be such a good idea. But there is an exception. Magnum doesn't seem bothered by the flash, however, Yogi is a bit scared of it and has a habit of shying away from me when I get too close to her with the camera. The pets use this real-life experience to teach a lesson and do so in a factual but fun and friendly way."

Subscribing to the 13-part Paws 'n' Claws Pet Photo Guide is free. A sign-up request form is located at the Frame Your Pets website: www.frameyourpets.com.

Once signed up, subscribers will also have access to Eddie the Dalmatian's blog where they will find photos and stories and will also be able to post their own.

"I thought that if Eddie was going to be the main focus of the program he should have his own blog for him to communicate with the many new friends he's going to make which also means – and this part actually cracks me up – he has his very own e-mail address," Elliott adds.

"I hope it doesn't go to his head as I'm already considering making him the central character for another website project."

Elliott says the Frame Your Pets program will be advertised online in a variety of locations with pet owners being the primary target market.

"If you own a pet, you'll probably understand the program better and see the humour in the packaging of the product."

Going back to the basics to save your money

You gotta have heart

February is Heart Month. If you want to live a long healthy life, you must have a healthy heart. Yes, there are a lot of things medicine and surgery can do for heart problems these days, but no doctor can cure you of bad habits.

There are plenty of things you can do for your heart. In fact, you can even reverse some heart damage by living in a heart-friendly manner.

The first thing you can do is exercise. Walking and dancing are good for your heart. Swimming, bicycling, rowing, hiking and cross-country skiing are good exercises for the heart. The key to keeping your heart healthy is to do these exercises daily for at minimum of 15 minutes, and better still, for 30 minutes. Warm up first: stretch, do some deep breathing, for about 10 minutes before you begin. For most people, a 30 minute walk is the favoured exercise, because it can be done at the individual's convenience. Some people, who cannot leave home because of duties in the home, may prefer dancing. Mothers with young children may like this option, and they can have the kids join in the fun.

The second thing you can do is eat real foods, not processed or refined foods. Eat whole grains, vegetables, fruits, and beans. Stay away from soft drinks, cake, candies, and processed meats. Avoid fatty foods (which can include foods made with margarine, shortening and foods cooked in fat, such as French fired potatoes).

Keep homocysteine levels low with three B vitamins — folic acid, B6 and B12. High levels of homocysteine are a good indicator of heart attack.

Eat fish twice a week, or take an omega 3 supplement. Vitamin E and magnesium are good for your heart, and so is garlic.

In some areas of the world, including most of British Columbia, there is a shortage of selenium, a trace mineral needed for strong, healthy muscles. Selenium has long been used in China to prevent heart deterioration due to muscle fatigue. This is a good supplement for a variety of reasons, including improving skin, and fighting viruses.

Have your blood pressure checked regularly. High blood pressure is an indication something is not working right. Your doctor can have you take a blood test, or ask about family history that may be an indicator of particular problems related to high blood pressure. Heart disease is often detected through discovering why a patient has high blood pressure.

There is something about loving others and being loved that is very good for a healthy heart. Be the kind of person who loves, even if the only love you give and get is from your dog. People who have loving pets, and who love their pets, live longer. Maybe that is why the "heart" is a symbol for love.







The rise and fall of Capt. George Vancouver
INSIGHTS INTO BC'S HISTORY

by Nick Mills, Princeton Museum & Archives

George Vancouver was born in Kings Lynn, Norfolk, England, the sixth child of John Gasper van Couverden and Bridget Bernes.

Vancouver joined the Royal Navy at an early age and when 15, as a young midshipman, he traveled to the Pacific aboard HMS Resolution, on Captain James Cook's second round the world voyage (1772-1775). He also accompanied Cook on his third voyage (1776-1779), this time aboard Resolution's sister ship, HMS Discovery. Upon his return to Britain in 1779, Vancouver was commissioned as a lieutenant and as a protégé of James Cook for the next twelve years his star continued to rise.

Following the crisis of the Great Spanish Armament when Spain and Britain came close to war over the ownership of Nookta Sound and which brought to a close by the signing of the first Nookta Convention, Vancouver was given command of Discovery to take possession of Nookta Sound and survey the coastline.

Vancouver entered the Strait of Juan de Fuca, between what is now Vancouver Island and Washington State mainland, on April 29th, 1792. His orders included a survey of every bay and outlet, all the way to Alaska.

On June 13th, 1792, he was the first European to enter Burrard Inlet, the main harbor area of present day Vancouver and named it after his English friend Sir Harry Burrard. Over the next nine days Vancouver surveyed Howe Sound and Jervis Inlet, before returning to Point Grey - now the present day site of UBC - on June 22nd, 1792, his 35th birthday.

At Point Grey he unexpectedly encountered a Spanish expedition

led by Dionisio Alcala Galiano and Cayetano Valdes y Flores and was, to use his own word, "mortified" to learn they already had a crude chart of the area prepared by another Spanish expedition the year before. For three weeks they cooperatively explored the Georgia Strait before going their separate ways.


After the summer surveying season ended in August, Vancouver went to Nookta, then the regions most important harbor, where he was to take possession of any British buildings or lands returned by the Spanish. The Spanish commander, Bodega y Quadra, was very cordial and he and Vancouver exchanged the maps they had made, but no agreement was reached and they decided to wait

for further instructions. At this time they decided to name the large island on which Nookta was located as Quadra and Vancouver's Island. Years later as Spanish influence declined the name was shortened simply to Vancouver Island.

In 1794, Vancouver first went to Cook Inlet, the northern most point of his exploration, and from there followed the coast south to Baranov Island, which he had visited the year before. He then set sail for England by way of Cape Horn, returning in September 1795, thus completing a circumnavigation of the globe.

The fall from grace of Captain George Vancouver began immediately upon his return home.

The politically well-connected naturalist Archibald Menzies, who had accompanied Vancouver as the ship's surgeon, complained that his servant had been pressed into service during a shipboard emergency; sailing master Joseph Whidbey had a competing claim for pay as the expedition astronomer; and Thomas Pitt, 2nd Baron Camelford, whom Vancouver had disciplined for numerous infections and eventually sent home in disgrace, challenged him to a duel! Vancouver was attacked in the newspapers and assaulted on the street by Pitt; his career was effectively at an end.

One of Britain's greatest navigators, Vancouver died in obscurity in 1798 at the age of 40, less than three years after completing his voyage. Today his modest grave

lies in St Peter's Churchyard, Petersham, Surrey, England.

As a footnote, Vancouver's navigational achievements were many, but he failed to discover the most important rivers on the Pacific coast, missing both the Fraser and Columbia rivers, in addition to the Skeena River near Prince Rupert in Northern British Columbia.

While it is difficult to understand how Vancouver missed the Fraser River, much of the river's delta was subject to flooding which prevented the Captain from spotting any of its great channels when, in 1792, he sailed the entire shoreline from Point Roberts to Point Grey. It is ironic that the Spanish who had preceded him in 1791 had also missed the Fraser River, although they knew from its muddy plume that there was a major river located near by.

Dial for dope operator goes to jail

Patrick M. Yaple appeared for sentencing in Provincial Court in Princeton on February 14, after entering guilty pleas to the following charges: possession of illegal substance for the purpose of trafficking, knowingly possessing a prohibited weapon without a licence, possession of a firearm while prohibited, and possession of counterfeit money.

A pre-sentence report had been prepared for the court.

Information presented to the court

Man pleads, Judge rejects

Lucas J. Holman wanted to plead guilty, but Judge Smith would not accept his guilty plea. Holman appeared in Provincial Court in Princeton on February 14 to plead guilty to a charge of possession of stolen property, breach of probation and charges of failing to appear in court when summoned. The charges had been waived from Calgary.

Holman told Judge Smith the co-accused in the stolen property charge had told police Holman

by Crown Counsel described an interesting dial-a-dope operation. On December 1, 2004, local RCMP received a tip that a Princeton man could be contacted at a certain phone number and he would deliver cocaine to the caller at an arranged location. Sgt. K. Lozinski followed up the tip by making a call to that number, and the deal was made. Delivery was to take place in the parking lot of a local grocery store where Yaple was working at the time.

had nothing to do with the crime. As to the charges of failing to appear in court, Holman said he had not known he was supposed to attend.

Judge Smith said he could not accept guilty pleas just so Holman could dispose of the charges. An innocent man is not allowed to be convicted of a crime for the sake of convenience. Judge Smith ordered the case file returned to Calgary where Holman will have to deal with it in April.

The tipster had identified the vehicle the drug peddler was driving, and said the drug peddler lived at a location along Highway 3. Police stopped the vehicle on its way into Princeton, and apprehended Yaple. He was very cooperative, even showing police where to find the cocaine when they could not locate it.

In a subsequent search of Yaple's residence, police found a loaded handgun for which Yaple had no licence, and in fact was under a 10-year weapons prohibition. There were two bogus bills found, which Yaple said he had received as payment for a prior drug deal.

Yaple admitted to being the middleman for an "unknown" drug supplier. He said he had gone into the business to make extra money to pay child support, as Family Maintenance had taken all of his money from his bank account and left him broke.

Crown Counsel asked for jail time, but Yaple's defense lawyer asked for a conditional sentence, giving as reasons Yaple's cooperation with police, and the very small amount of cocaine found.

Judge Smith said an aggravating factor was the possession of a handgun when Yaple was prohibited, and the pre-sentence report indicated Yaple tried to justify his crime.

"He doesn't quite get it," Judge Smith noted.

Although it was Yaple's first drug offense, and he was cooperative, Judge Smith did not think a conditional sentence would deter Yaple or others like him.

Yaple, age 51, was ordered to serve nine months in jail for possession of a firearm while prohibited, along with the following concurrent sentences: six months for possession of an illegal weapon, five months for trafficking, and two months for possession of counterfeit money.

Yaple's firearms are forfeited, and he is under a lifetime firearms prohibition, disallowing him from possessing any guns, crossbows or explosives. A DNA sample was ordered.

Judge orders high fine

On July 30, 2005, John Sullivan was not driving well and nearly hit a police vehicle. Sullivan stopped, then fled the scene.

On February 14, Sullivan appeared in Provincial Court in Princeton to enter a guilty plea to

an impaired driving charge. Although he had no prior record for impaired, because of the circumstances of the case, Judge Smith ordered Sullivan to pay a \$1,000 fine. He is prohibited from driving for one year.

Man pleads guilty

On February 14, in Provincial Court in Princeton, Shaun A. Erskine entered a guilty plea to an impaired driving charge. Police had apprehended Erskine after being alerted by a report of a possi-

ble impaired driver.

Erskine had no prior convictions for impaired driving, so was fined \$600 and his driving privileges are prohibited for one year, the minimum sentence.

Camp cook pleads guilty

In Provincial Court in Princeton on February 14th Kevin Reinhardt, formerly of Princeton and now a camp cook, admitted his guilt to a charge of common assault and a charge or breach of

recognizance.

As Reinhardt is working in an isolated location, his lawyer asked that a pre-sentence report be prepared and sentencing take place on May 8, 2008.





Mayerthorpe is a lesson for all

Did you watch the special film that aired on February 10 called "Mayerthorpe"?

I watched it, and was pleased to see it, not because of the shootings, but because of the background the film gives to the kind of person police had been dealing with for more than 10 years before the killings.

I call these "killings" because they appeared to be a deliberate assassination. The killer had hidden guns and was playing some kind of demented cat and mouse game with police and local residents. He had, during the course of his life, 44 charges against him, but only 14 convictions, and served a mere two years and eight months behind bars. There was some indication he had threatened witnesses to prevent convictions.

I saw the film as an eye-opener for a lot of people who may not be familiar with police work in small towns. The film shows how hard police will work to put a criminal behind bars, and how threats and intimidation by a bullying crook can stand in the way.

Meticulous police work is required to obtain any kind of conviction in our courts these days. Even with the right police work, if nobody will testify against a criminal, then a conviction becomes impossible. Sometimes, even when a witness will testify, a judge sees no need to give more than a minimum sentence.

The killer was a convicted child molester who, after serving his sentence, went back to his home town and began trying to lure boys into his clutches. In one instance, the killer was thwarted by police, and had the nerve to tell the police officer to mind his

own business!

What happened in Mayerthorpe could happen in any small town. RCMP officers are well aware of the potential for any kind of investigation to go sour. Investigating a grow op out on a back road can be dangerous. Most people growing marijuana are highly protective of their product, and highly suspicious of their customers and their dealers.

Consequently, most growers are armed and somewhat dangerous. However, any armed criminal is dangerous.

Events such as the killings in Mayerthorpe serve to remind us that it is the law that gives us freedom. Without the law enforcement officers to ensure our freedom, we live in fear of being bullied by every two-bit criminal who decides the law stands in the way of his having what he wants. Laws are what makes it possible to live in a community peaceably.

The killer in Mayerthorpe was like a two year old who wants what he wants and thinks any interference is cause for a temper

tantrum. Put that mentality together with a full-grown body and a rack of guns, and you have big trouble. When what a man wants is the opportunity to molest children and sell drugs, without anybody complaining, then you have a Mayerthorpe.

There are many situations in small towns and in cities in which certain individuals choose to ignore the law, or feel that police officers should just look the other way, or who feel the police are "picking on me". Good behaviour rarely attracts any police attention.

Our police force is far too busy doing the job of keeping the peace to be bothered with picking on anybody who is behaving well. At the same time, bad behaviour is going to focus law enforcement attention on a person, and the killer in Mayerthorpe racked up enough bad behaviour to justify police attention for quite some time.

The film "Mayerthorpe" leaves us with plenty to think about, and a lot of lessons to be learned and re-learned.





Goldcliff sends trenching update

Leonard W. Saleken, Chairman of Goldcliff Resource Corporation (GCN.TSXV) is pleased to summarize the results from the surface trenching of the 2007 exploration program on the Company's 100%-owned Panorama Ridge property near Hedley.

The trenching results on the York-Viking and Nordic zones are very encouraging and indicate that the zones remain open for gold mineralization expansion. The two most important highlights are the significant expansion of the area of gold mineralization at the Nordic Zone and the discovery of the Bonanza Trench at the York-Viking Zone. The Bonanza Trench (previously reported) contains Nickel Plate-style high-grade gold values of 5.65 and 17.37 ounce gold per short ton (194 and 525 gram gold per tonne) over 2.50 metres.

Nordic Zone
Containing 0.56 g/t gold over 69.80 metres of gold mineralized zone

(GMZ)-with 31.50 metres reporting 1.01 g/t gold--the area of gold mineralization has been significantly expanded at the Nordic Zone with trench SP164.

The significance of SP164 is its location and its gold values. SP164 expands the mineralization by 175 metres to the southwest and uphill from the Nordic. The Nordic and York-Viking showings are approximately 400 metres apart. This trench demonstrates that mineralization is midway between the showings. The SP164 trench is cut in a northwest direction across the GMZ trend.

The Nordic Zone contains gold values averaging 1.30 to 2.32 g/t with higher grades ranging to 26.50 g/t.

York-Viking Zone

The Bonanza Trench, which was excavated at the south western end of the York-Viking zone, has multi-ounce, high-grade gold results. This trench is located upslope from

a trench that contained 1.12 g/t gold over 8.00 metres (with no high-grade). The Bonanza Trench contains 34.40 metres averaging 26.50 gold g/t with a higher-grade intercept of 5.00 metres containing 180.53 g/t gold.

The high-grade intercepted is 1.00 metre of 596.00 g/t gold or 17.368 ounces/short ton gold (oz/st). The Bonanza Trench is located in the south western corner of the York-Viking zone.

Containing 26 metres of 0.21 g/t gold, trench 152 confirms the presences of the GMZ along the south eastern edge of the York-Viking zone. The GMZ corresponds with a northwest trench located several metres down slope that contains 13.00 metres of 1.24 g/t gold.

To the west and southwest of the Tower zone, two weakly mineralized trenches confirm that the zone is offset to the southeast.

The Panorama Ridge property contains a large surface area of gold mineralization related to silica-iron alteration (skarn) in sedimentary rocks from the Hedley Formation of the Triassic Nicola Group. The gold mineralization is related to the skarn alteration and occurs over an area of approximately two square kilometres. Contained in the alteration area from northeast to southwest are the Nordic, York-Viking and Tower gold zones. These zones

are separate entities occurring over a distance of approximately 1,000 metres. The 2007 trenching has narrowed the gap between the zones, as demonstrated by trench SP164.

The Bonanza Trench was the most significant gold discovery of 2007. The trench gold values of 5.65 and 17.37 ounce gold per short ton confirms that Nickel Plate-style high-grade gold values occur at Panorama Ridge.

For 2008, more trenching is

planned along with completing the 10,000-metre diamond drill program remaining from the 2007 drilling. The 2007 core has been cut and sampled and is in the laboratory for assay. The assay results will be disclosed on a continuing basis as received. The drilling for the remainder of the program is expected to resume in early spring, as conditions permit.



I must honestly say that I have never experienced such professional and compassionate care as I received from the ambulance attendants, Dr. Adams, the nurses and x-ray technician at the Princeton Hospital.

It amazes me how, under the current circumstances and with just a skeleton crew, the staff could maintain such an efficient and empathetic ER. I sensed no bitterness even though I am sure the staff must be overworked and feel under appreciated for their efforts. How can anyone even consider closing such a fabulous hospital as the Princeton Hospital? 
