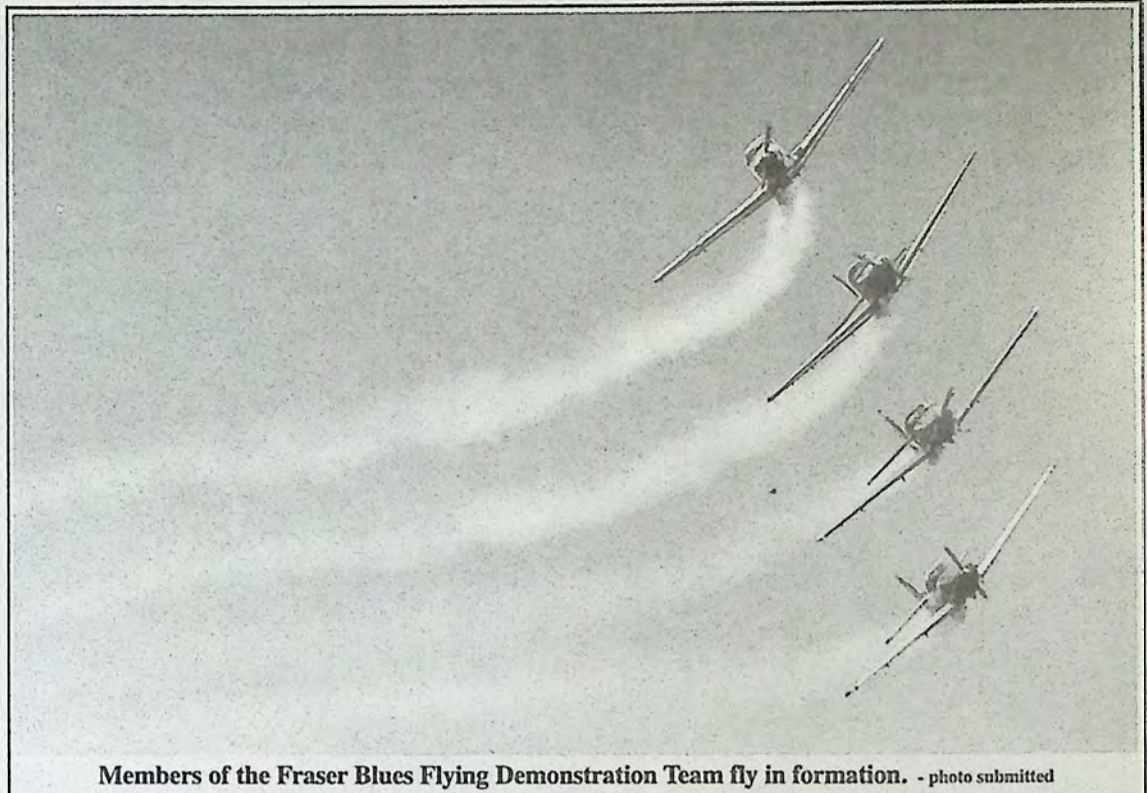

## Flying team comes to town

In 2007 members of the Fraser Blues Flying Demonstration Team arrived in Princeton to discuss the possibility of organizing a show for the Princeton Regional Airport. One year later the Airport Committee and Town of Princeton has invited them to do just that.

On Saturday June 7th come out to the Princeton Regional Airport to

meet the pilots of the Fraser Blues and watch as the team takes to the air over Princeton for two spectacular shows. Not to be confused with the radio-controlled plane operators that put on an annual display in Princeton, these are the real thing – the Fraser Blues team pilot four vintage WW II Navion aircraft.

Leading the team is retired Colonel George Miller who, today, is manager of the Langley airport. For more than 35 years he was a member of the Royal Canadian Air Force, flying F-86 Sabres and CF-104 Starfighters in Europe. He was with Canada's first military aerobatic team, the Golden Hawks and went on to become a team leader of the Canadian Snowbirds.

Flying in the number two position is Guy Miller from Abbotsford. Guy is a former CF-18 Hornet fighter pilot and instructor. He also piloted for Cathay Pacific Airways 747-400 lines and was a simulator instructor.

Clive Barratt flies in the number three position. With 65 different aircraft types flown, Clive is a former Canadian Forces instructor pilot, search and rescue pilot and accident investigator. Today, he flies for an airline and lives in Chilliwack.

Flying in the number four position

is Gord Ball, from Abbotsford. Gord is a former CF-104 pilot and retired airline captain. During his career, he flew many aircraft including Huey helicopters, 737s, 727s, DC-8s and DC-10s.

In addition to the Fraser Blues at the air show on Saturday, the Canadian Air Force has confirmed that an F-18 Hornet fighter jet will be attending the air show as well. A versatile, world-class fighter aircraft, the supersonic CF-18 Hornet can engage both ground and aerial targets.

Its twin engines generate enough thrust to lift 24 full-size pick-up trucks off the ground. As the Canadian Air Force's frontline multi-role fighter, the CF-18 is used for air defence, air superiority, tactical support, training, aerobatic demonstration, and aerospace testing and evaluation.

Stop by to meet the Fraser Blues Pilots, watch the Canadian Air Force F-18 Hornet, enjoy a BBQ lunch donated by Billy's Restaurant, visit the weather station and enjoy children's activities throughout the day.

# Community forest agreement application remains on track

The Town of Princeton, Area H of the Regional District Okanagan-Similkameen and the Upper Similkameen Indian Band are pleased to inform the community that progress is being made on the submission of an application to the ministry of Forests and Range for a five year probationary Community Forest Agreement.

The three partners recently met in Hedley to discuss outstanding issues and give guidance to their consultant and working group on

how to work towards the July application deadline.

One of the benefits of a community forest is an allocation of an annual timber supply that is available for logging, the financial proceeds of which will go directly to the three partners, thereby staying in the local area.

The three partners have been working with local licensees Tolko Industries, Stuwix Resources and Weyerhaeuser to identify a forest tenure area that would be suitable to

sustain a 20,000 cubic metre timber allocation.

Community forestry involves the three pillars of sustainable development: social, ecological and economic sustainability. At its core, community forestry is about local control over and enjoyment of the benefits offered by local forest resources. These benefits are both monetary and non-monetary.

On the monetary side, benefits include local employment and economic development. Non-mone-

tary benefits are derived from the many values associated with forests, including ecological (such as the protection of drinking water), cultural, spiritual, medicinal, recreational and aesthetic values.

The public is invited to comment on the application process and the working group will be distributing a questionnaire through post boxes. Please note that if you have requested Canada Post not place 'unaddressed ad mail' in your mailbox you will not receive a questionnaire. If you don't receive a copy of the questionnaire they can be picked up at Town Hall, 169 Bridge Street.

### Backgrounder

In British Columbia community forests are established when the provincial government grants forest management rights to a community as a tenure arrangement, or timber license. The invitation from the Ministry of Forest and Range in July of 2007 to the three partners was based on a tenure arrangement and the ability to forest 20,000 cubic metres of timber annually. Community Forest Licences are long term (usually 25 years), replaceable tenures.

The working group will be scheduling public meetings (June 25 is already scheduled). The objective of the meetings is to share information with the community, facilitate discussions and receive input regarding the management, vision,

values and objectives for the Community Forest. The Government requires that the partners demonstrate that there is a high level of community awareness and strong support for the application from a broad cross-section of the community. In order for the community forest application to be successful the partners need community support and involvement.

The process to supply for a community forest is currently being managed by a working group of the three partners and forestry consultant Rod Willis and with the assistance of the British Columbia Community Forest Association. The working group is guiding the process of developing the application to the Ministry of Forests and Range.

If the partners are successful in acquiring the Community Forest Agreement, the agreement (and license) will be issued to a limited liability partnership corporation of which the Town of Princeton, Regional District Okanagan-Similkameen and Upper Similkameen Indian Band would appoint directors. Over the next couple of months, the corporate structure will be reviewed to determine the best structure for what would become a functioning business immediately upon the issuance of the Community Forest Agreement.

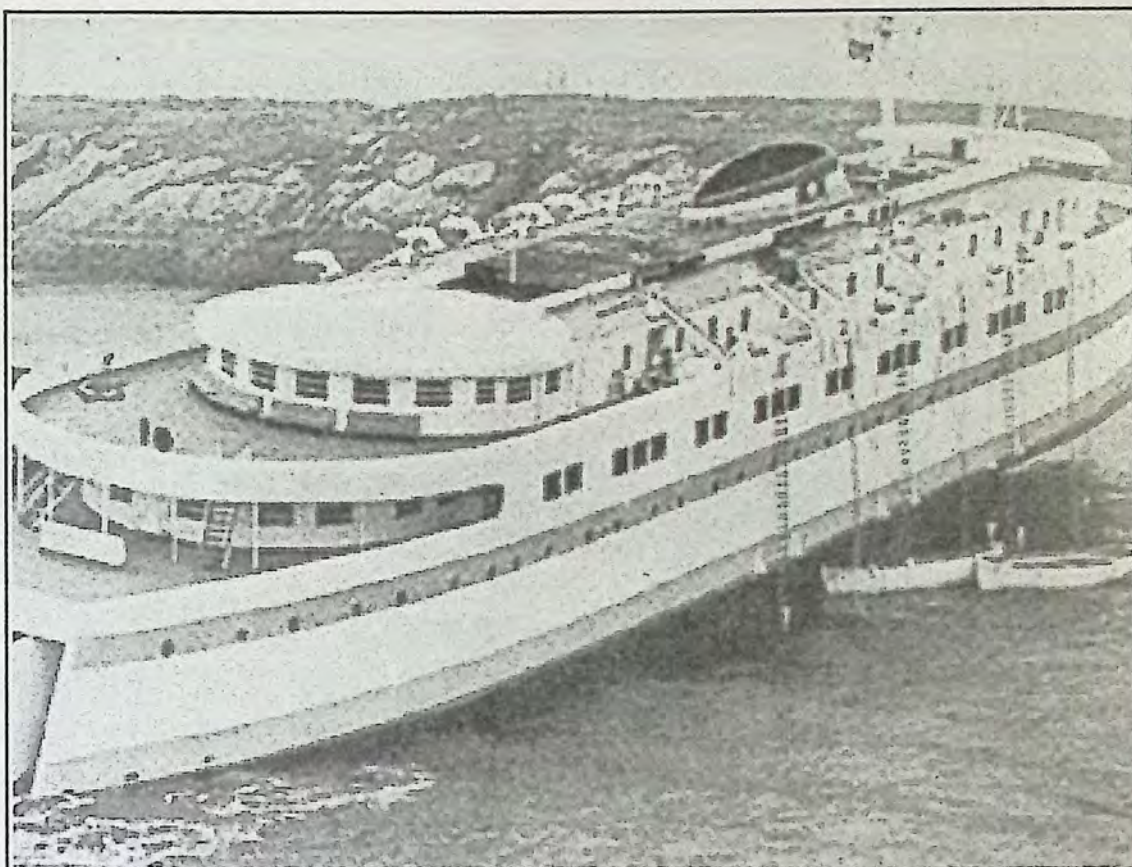

 The Best Place on Earth

**The Beginnings of BC Ferries**  
 INSIGHTS INTO BC'S HISTORY

As far back as 1867 a system of railway bridges had been envisaged as a solution to the transport problems of British Columbia's offshore islands. A water crossing had been proposed for the north end of Vancouver Island where bridges could be built. This plan did not materialize since the rough terrain dictated a more southerly mainland rail route, so that before the advent of rail travel the islands were

entirely dependent on marine transport.

Incorporated in 1889, The Union Steamship Company of British Columbia Ltd. served the coast extensively until the mid 1950's. Together with the Black Ball Line and the Canadian Pacific Railway's Coastal Steamship Service, the Union served the needs of the Province without major upset until the acceleration of post second world war development. The main services to Vancouver Island were then reliant on miniature ocean liners, which became inadequate with the swelling demand for transport of highway vehicles.

The early 1950's saw Union Steamship expand its cargo fleet, but for a number of reasons started losing long-haul passenger traffic and in 1956 Black Ball displaced the Company to serve Bowen Island. Negotiations to increase federal subsidies on Union's routes failed and the Company decided to discontinue passenger services. Their cargo services continued until 1959 when Company assets were sold to competitor Northland Navigation.

Black Ball and Canadian Pacific's ferry services were also in difficulty. In 1958 both Companies' employees struck for more pay. The BC cabinet invoked the Civil Defence Act which allowed the Province to take possession of and use the property and undertakings of Black Ball for such periods as might appear necessary. As Canadian Pacific's services were under the jurisdiction of the Federal Government in their case it was decided not to intervene.

Black Ball employees struck again and ignored an injunction to return to work. Furthermore, in 1959

Canadian Pacific withdrew its night steamers on the Vancouver/Victoria run and reduced its winter service.

The Provincial government then decided that a reliable and regular service needed to be created so on July 18th, 1958, Premier Bennett announced the government's intention of creating a ferry service. The first two ferries, M.V. Sidney and M.V. Tsawwassen were built and launched by the end of 1959. Construction also began on the terminals at Tsawwassen (including a 3 kilometre causeway into deep water) and Swartz Bay.

BC Ferries began transporting vehicles and passengers between Swartz Bay and Tsawwassen on June 15th, 1960. The fleet and service grew with the purchase of four ferries and assets of Gulf Island Ferries for approximately \$250,000 in September of 1961. In November of that year, Black Ball Ferries was bought by the Government for just under seven million dollars and the ships and terminals were turned over to BC Ferries.

Shortly after Black Ball turned their ships over, it is reported in the BC Ferries Archives the two things that don't mix are fog and the lack of radar! Black Ball had previously leased the radar unit for their ship the Chinook II so when BC Ferries refused to make the payment the leasing company removed it. Travelling, minus the radar, in thick fog her Captain mistook how close to land she was and approaching Nanaimo ran the vessel up onto Snake Island. A few cars were slightly damaged, no one was hurt and the Chinook was floated off with minor damage at the next high tide.

While parking, a beautiful Mountain Bluebird landed on a bare branch giving its soft melodious call. Nearby the female flitted in and out of some clumps of grasses hunting bugs. We see them so often, but it is always a thrill to see the birds again looking like bits of blue sky.

As the group set off lots of wildflowers were seen, the Balsamroot were beginning to show their bright yellow flowers, Western Spring-beauty, Springgold, a few Yellowbells and the delicate Fring-cups welcomed us to the trail.

In the trees some soft calls announced the presence of Pygmy Nuthatch, the 'wicka, wicka' calls of the Northern Flicker and other twitterings called attention to the birdlife. The weather tended to be variable and a brisk wind from the north urged us on.

The nest, used for many years by

a pair of Great-horned Owls was no longer to be found; no evidence of any rebuilding. These owls are masters of the taking over of nests from other species, usually Redtail Hawks.

An unusual purple-flowered plant caught the groups attention, photographs were taken and it was later identified as a Dwarf Waterleaf, also known as Ball-head Waterleaf.

Large birds soaring overhead were identified as a Golden Eagle and a Redtail Hawk. Two smaller raptors examining holes in a dead tree were American Kestrels.

A stop at Wayne Lake which this year has a lot of water, yielded many other birds; Greenwinged, Blue-winged and Cinnamon Teal, a party of Ring-necked Ducks, a sprightly Ruddy Duck, Barrows Golden-eye and many Yellow-rumped Warblers were identified. A total of 23 bird species were checked off and another five heard but not seen. The variable weather did keep bird activity down somewhat. - submitted by Madelon Schouten

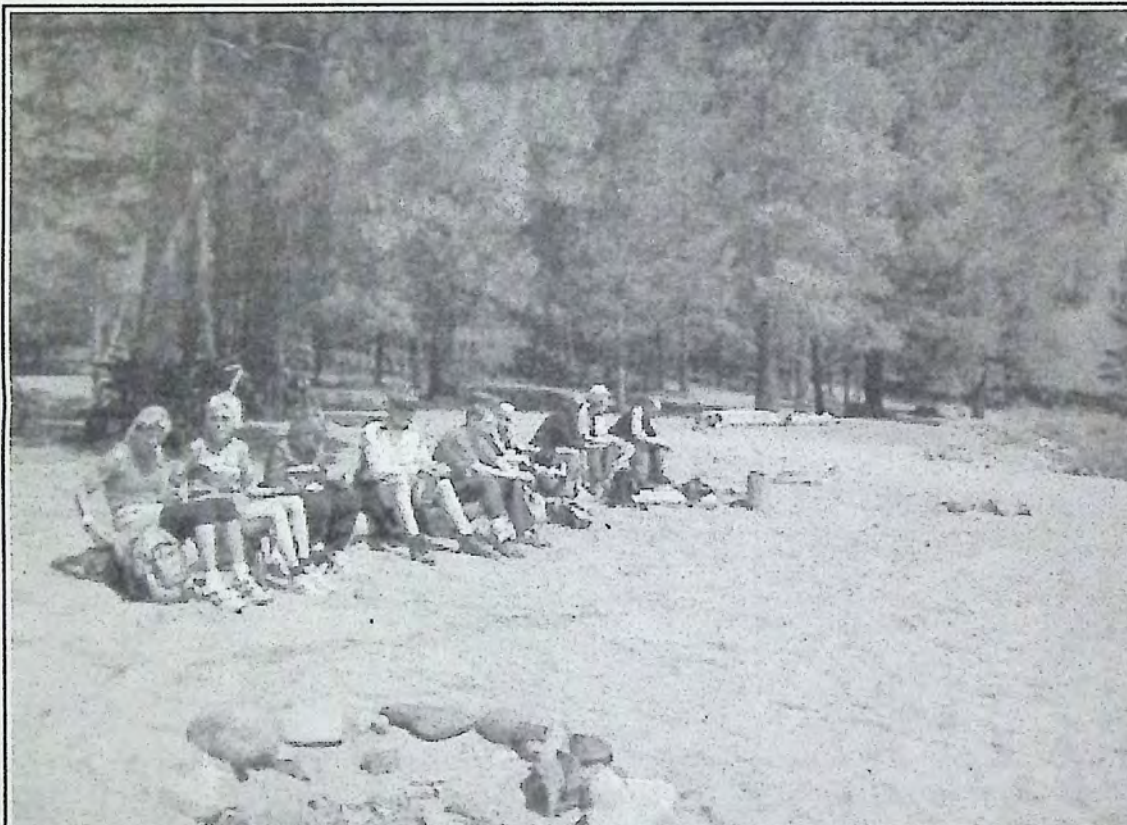

# Cranberry Mint Sparkler

- 1 1/2 cups (375 mL) lightly packed fresh mint leaves, washed and dried
- 3 lemons (approx.)
- 1/3 cup (75 mL) liquid honey
- 1 bottle (1.89 L) Ocean Spray 100 % Juice Blend-Cranberry

### Let's discuss coalbed methane

Editor:

A community meeting on May 28th will be considering the environmental and social impacts of any proposal to extract coalbed methane in this area. We have much to consider. The environmental footprint of extraction of gas from coal deposits is much larger than that of conventional natural gas extraction.

First, vast quantities of water must be extracted from coal deposits in order to allow recoverable gas to be displaced, and this water, along with accompanying salts, hydrocarbons and minerals must be held or disposed of.

Secondly, each developed well is low yield, and in order to efficiently extract gas reserves, multiple wells are required, each with its own infrastructure of roads, pipelines, powerlines and compressors.

Water produced from gas extraction is a primary concern. It seems likely that this water may come from fairly superficial sources in this area. Coal seams will be subject to fracturing by injection of fluids, solids and chemicals to allow for more low-pressure pathways for water flow and recovery and, eventually, for gas flow.

Nobody knows what this process does to the water table supplying existing wells, but it seems more than coincidental that some domestic wells disappear or become contaminated at the same time that there is nearby gas exploration or drilling activity. The extracted water may be relatively pure or may contain quantities of salts, metals (some of them toxic)

and hydrocarbons (some of them toxic and mutagenic).

Incredibly, the BC Environmental Management Act still allows the streambed or watercourse disposal of these produced waters, which is the cheapest option. The expensive option, which is re-injection into a suitable deeper ground formation, removes this large volume of water from the aquifer. The void left in the superficial coal layer by removal of water and gas simply fills again with water from elsewhere in the aquifer, aided by the new pathways created by the fracturing process.

Nobody knows how quickly the water table will be depleted or contaminated, and any studies done on water quality and quantity are done by people hired by industry, not by government. There will be no time for the recommended 3 year lead time for water table study and evaluation prior to development of the resource. There will be no time to reflect upon whether a modest boost to the economy is a good tradeoff for a vanishing water table at a time when a warmer climate may make water more valuable than fuel.

Efficient and profitable extraction of coalbed methane requires a high density of wells, sometimes exceeding 1 every 80 acres. The Oil and Gas Commission, which oversees permitting, grants licenses on a well-by-well basis without consideration given to the impact of the required infrastructure on wildlife, agriculture, vegetation and social structures. The well site and operations can be developed

on private land without landowner consent.

Before wells become profitable they can be subject to occasional venting with atmospheric release of methane, which contributes 20-fold more to climate change than does carbon dioxide. Early production wells are also subject to flaring of non-economic quantities of gas, again contributing to ongoing climate change. Wells in production will need pumps for water and compressors for delivery to the pipeline system or storage. Resulting noise is disruptive to both people and wildlife.

The Oil and Gas Commission bears responsibility for regulation of the industry in BC. Recently, a new Oil and Gas Activities Act has been tabled; however it seems that BC is determined to trail far behind other jurisdictions in terms of both regulation and enforcement. The Commission is largely dependent on funding from the industry which it regulates through charges for permits and other services.

Funding is less difficult if the industry prospers, therefore there is less incentive to close down operations for gross infractions. A system of self-audited rules is probably insufficient to keep the oil and gas industry in line. Two-thirds of the inspections done in 2004 revealed breach of regulations. Actual enforcement seems to go to other government departments, with any fines going to general revenue. This is not a good recipe for a well-regulated industry.

# What happened to us?

Sometimes, two things that seem totally unrelated will come together in my mind and create a new way of looking at my world. This occurred recently after reading a book by Eckhart Tolle called *The New Earth*. Those of you who watch the Oprah show will recognize this, as Oprah has been touting this new earth movement on her show. Curiosity and receiving the book as a gift led me to the kind of circular thinking that engaged my mind.

Tolle's book is about creating a new earth by losing our fear, greed and ego. First, I want to say I do not believe greed is anything more than a kind of fearfulness. People become greedy when they fear they will not have enough of something. This fear seems almost instinctive. It seems we have to teach our children to share and to be generous. With some people, the lesson is never learned.

Second, I do not believe losing ego is healthy. Ego is what gives personal identity, ambition, determination, kindness. Ego is what each of us develops to inform the internal "me" as to what is expected of "me". A person with no ego may be in need of a lot of mental health counselling.

In my view, the worst kind of ego is the smallest ego, the ego that cannot see beyond "me" and what I need or want. The expanded ego informs the "me" that I am one with the world around me. When we say a person has a big ego, what we mean is that this person sees the world only from a limited point of view, the view of his or her own needs.

There is nothing wrong with the idea of creating a new earth, and having people give more and share more with each other. If we could have a new earth of peace and pros-

perity for every person, I would work very hard to help it come into existence. At the same time, I see this concept as great for people like you and me, who eat well, living in affluence, have universal health care, unemployment benefits, Workers Compensation and Old Age Security.

Try selling the "new earth" idea to a starving person in Darfur, or a leper in India, or an unhealthy person in the United States. Try selling the idea of "no fear, no greed, no ego" to a homeless person who has chilblains from the cold. Try selling the idea to a survivor of the Burma storm who has lost everything, including family.

Living without fear is possible only when basic needs are met not only for today, but for years to come. Tolle lives in Vancouver, in a nation which tries to look after its people (I know, a lot fall through the cracks!). We have little to fear, really. The things we complain about are really petty when compared with a survivor of the Burma storm.

All of this led me to think of 50,000 year old footprints fossilized in volcanic ash in Africa. Our mitochondrial DNA proves all of us human beings came from Africa, and archaeologists believe we began to migrate from Africa 50,000 years ago. The footprints in the ashes were footprints like those of modern man. I know fossilized bones of a female human named Lucy were found in the Great Rift Valley of Africa, and were one million years old, but these were not considered evidence of a "modern" human, so I start my speculation 50,000 years ago. What happened to us in all those thousands of years?

If I were doing a report card on the progress of the human race, I would have to list us as slow learners. After 50,000 years, we are still doing poorly. We do not seem to be able to grasp the lessons we should

have learned. I cannot blame our lack of progress on inability to write our history and pass our lessons on to future generations. Six thousand years ago, in Sumer, we humans were writing our history. The ancient Egyptians and Israelites wrote their history, and we can still read it today. Why have we done so poorly? Why are we still so afraid?

There is an old saying that tells us if we do not learn from history, we are doomed to repeat it, and there is plenty of evidence that we are doomed. Archaeologists tell us of great civilizations that rose thousands of years ago, and then fell. Sometimes it was government corruption (that hasn't ended) and sometimes it was religious fanaticism (still going on), and sometimes it was invasion by less advanced people.

I watched a documentary about pre-Incan people who tortured prisoners, drank their blood, and poured blood on some religious icon. Later in history, Aztecs were cutting the hearts out of sacrificial humans. In 1940, the Nazis began sacrificing people to a political ideal. Russia did the same thing in 1917. I tell you, our species is incredibly slow learners!

I would love to live in a world where every nation cared for its people as well as we Canadians care for each other. We are not the only nation to do this. The majority of British Commonwealth nations do this, along with Scandinavian nations, and some European Union nations. I remember when Sweden implemented universal health care. Predictions were that Sweden would go broke in a decade. In fact, Sweden has done just the opposite: its economy has grown to become a world player. Canada has not gone broke, nor have England and Australia. There is a lesson to be learned from these successes, too. Considering how slowly we learn, are we going to learn this lesson?

**2008 Automobile Deduction Limits and Expense Benefit Rates for Business - Part 2**  
 The Honourable Jim Flaherty, Minister of Finance, announced the automobile expense deduction limits and the prescribed rates for the automobile operating expense benefit that will apply in 2008.  
 Specifically:  
 - The limit on the deduction of tax-exempt allowances paid by employers to employees using their personal vehicle for business purposes for 2008 will be increased by 2 cents to 52 cents per kilometre for the first 5,000 kilometres driven and 46 cents for each additional kilometre. The allowance amounts reflect the key cost components of owning and operating an automobile, such as depreciation, financing, insurance, maintenance and fuel costs.  
 - The general prescribed rate used to determine the taxable benefit relating to the personal portion of automobile operating expenses paid by employers for 2008 will increase by 2 cents to 24 cents per kilometre. For taxpayers employed principally in selling or leasing automobiles, the prescribed rate will increase by 2 cents to 21 cents per kilometre. The amount of the benefit reflects the costs of operating an automobile. The additional benefit of having an employer-provided vehicle available for personal use (i. e., the automobile standby charge) is calculated separately and is also included in the employee's income.

**Slovenia and Nordic Skiing**

The Slovene Ski Team inherits one of the oldest competitive ski traditions in Central Europe. One of their main training areas is Planica/Ratece which sports the world's largest ski flying hill, and hosts regular World Cup jumping.

Marko Gracer is the long-time Head Coach and Team Leader of

the Slovene ski team, and will be leading the team in the 2009 pre-Olympics, as well as at the 2010 Olympics. Marko has visited Princeton before, and Nata'a Laëen, Matej Sokliè and Peter Klofutar have all trained in the Princeton area in previous years, as have Ale Dolhar and Marjan Zagorek. Slovenia and Princeton have a long unofficial history of athletic association!

It is impossible to say at this stage just who will be on the 2010 Slovene Olympic Team - Trials will be in the early winter of 2009.

But the athletes who will be coming to Princeton will be world-class skiers with a chance at top-ten finishes and a long history of solid success. The team will be on the China Ridge trails regularly, and plans are afoot for at least one afternoon to ski with Princeton-area skiers; moreover, all skiers are invited to come ski with the Team! Princeton will show the Slovenes what Canadian hospitality is all about, and send the team on to the Olympics well-rested, well-trained, and ready to do their best. We'll be watching them!

**More Will Follow!**

Stay tuned! There is a great deal of work to be done in preparation, but Princeton is on the road to significant participation in the 2010 Olympics.

The people of Princeton made it clear that they did not welcome coalbed methane extraction near their community in 2004. There does not seem to have been an outpouring of support for the same proposal in 2008, but it seems that the wheels of development are in motion again.

We are not adequately protected by Provincial regulation. Regional District has been silent. Town Council seems to be waiting for something.

Many other communities in BC

have opposed this process with success. If we continue to consume their fossil fuels and do nothing, the industry will respond to our demands and extract the product in our back yard.

If we insulate our houses, reduce demand, and lobby to preserve our community and our environment, they may just go away again. Perhaps if we continue to make the right energy choices in the future they might never come back.

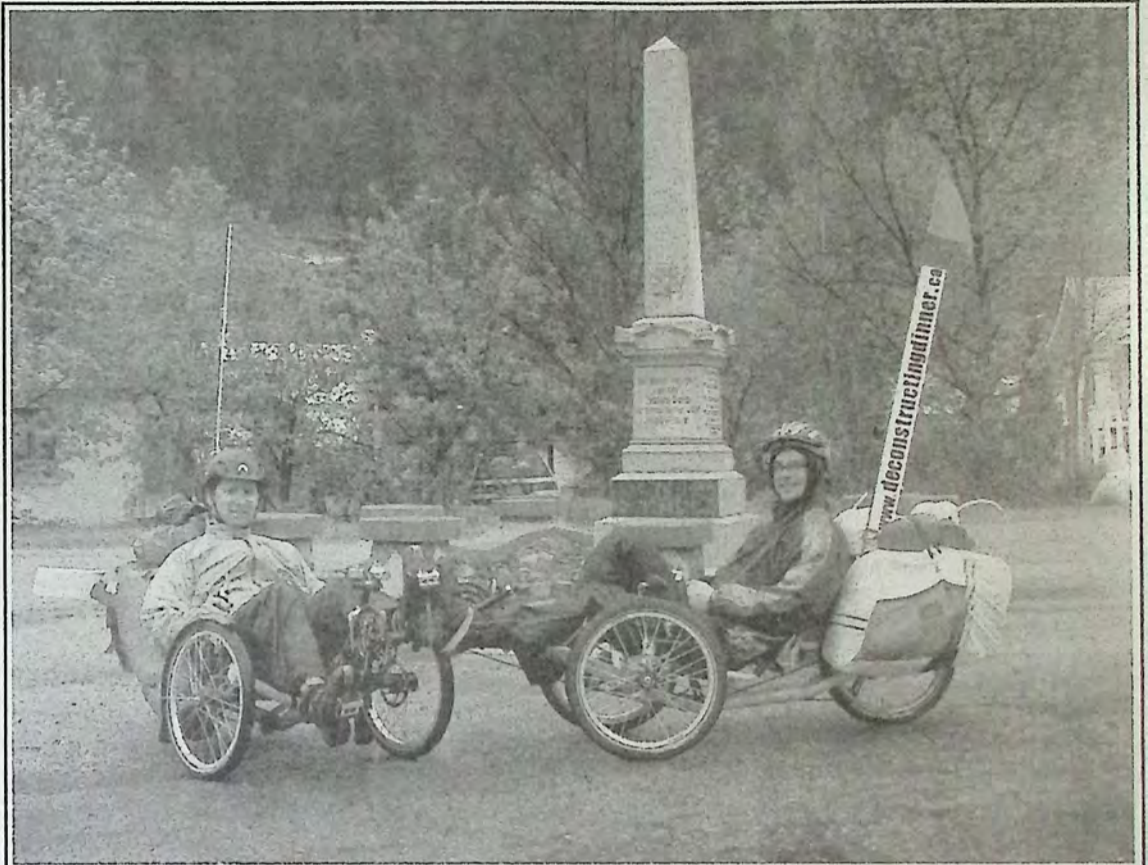

Back on the road they went, heading out to Hedley to join an informal supper club of cooks who like to share food. The group of four planned a menu including duck stew, a Manitoban Indian wild rice casserole, home made bannock, quail a lorange, asparagus, Jerusalem artichoke, Saskatoon berry pie and a selection of wines from St. Laszlo and Forbidden Fruit wineries.

The two were billeted in Hedley that night before starting out the next day during one of the Similkameen rainstorms that regularly occur at this time of year!
