funding.

Two members, Fran Murphy and Nicola Hodgson, have volunteered to run the concession. They are planning ahead for a few variations.

The Fall Fair Association is seek-

ing vendor applications, particularly food vendors who offer something other than hamburgers. Novelty foods would be welcome, such as chili dogs. Vendor units should have self-contained power and insurance.

Crowd learns Coalbed Methane 101

A capacity crowd filled Princeton Legion Hall May 28th for an information meeting hosted by Save Our Similkameen (SOS) and, in the words of moderator Ernie Lawrence, "was created to have invited guests and the public together to learn more about coalbed methane."

Of the ten panelists invited, only four were able to attend (Princeton Mayor Randy McLean, Councillor Jim Manion and guest speakers Karen Campbell and Gillies Wendling). The six who were not in attendance included Councillors Pam Jones, Maria Sadegur and Ray Jarvis, Environment Minister Barry Penner, Energy & Mines Minister Richard Neufeld and Petrobank

Vice President Gregg Smith.

Each were apparently sent invitations to the event by registered mail. While the absence of some of them may have looked suspicious, the News Leader learned that the two Ministers could not attend as they were sitting in Parliament in Victoria, Councillor Ray Jarvis told the News Leader he was not feeling well, Gerri Logan was out of town and Gregg Smith of Petrobank told the News Leader he did not receive his invitation and indicated an interest in attending.

The format for the evening was simple: presentations followed by a question period.

Karen Campbell of the Pembina Institute presented her 'Eight

Questions To Answer Before Coalbed Methane Proceeds in the Similkameen Valley.'

Before getting to the questions she presented a short explanation of what coalbed methane gas exploration is and how it is done. Campbell made the comparison between coalbed methane gas exploration and conventional oil and gas exploration saying the impact on land in the former can be measured in the size of a baseball diamond with the latter leaving more of a football field size impact. She also noted that drilling for coalbed methane gas is toxic and produces toxic waste products stating water removal has become a big issue with an estimated 1.89

million gallons of water (the size of 3.5 Olympic swimming pools) removed before production.

"Petrobank says the gas banks in Princeton are dry so not as much water would be used."

Key points of Campbell's review of oil and gas versus coalbed methane exploration included water disposal issues, the fact that wells must be spaced closer, the average well life is longer (often up to 40 years) and methane migration issues.

As for who gets to use the end product Campbell explained the majority of oil and gas production in Canada is exported to the US. The same for British Columbia continued on Page 27

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Lines Of Credit And Interest Deductibility - Part 2

The hypothetical situation put to the CRA involved a taxpayer who had a personal line of credit with a balance of \$60,000 on January 1. During that month, the taxpayer increased the balance on the line of credit to \$100,000, borrowing the additional \$40,000 to invest in securities (an eligible use). On February 1 the taxpayer made a payment of \$20,000, bringing the balance down to \$80,000, where it stayed throughout the month. Another payment, this time of \$40,000 was made on March 1, bringing the balance down to \$40,000, where it remained throughout the month. The taxpayer suggested to the CRA that his interest deduction for the line of credit for the first three months of the year would look like this:

The issue of accessibility in Princeton

Accessibility is an important issue. It is important not just for those with physical disabilities, and not just for the elderly, but also for the families and people who are friends of the less physically advantaged. There are many reasons to make our community and society more accessible. We have an aging population, people are living longer, live independently longer, and our elderly are more active and demand more of life. Our physically challenged are living more active lives and have reached and are reaching for horizons previously thought impossible. The economic well being of our business community and the overall economy of our town will be improved by becoming more accessible. An investment in accessibility today will pay dividends well into the future.

One year ago, the Princeton Accessibility Awareness Committee challenged Town Council and our Town Administrator to complete a variety of normal, everyday activities while using a wheelchair. Our objective was to raise awareness of accessibility issues and help our local political leaders better appreciate some of the obstacles that the elderly and physically challenged face in Princeton.

Using a follow-up survey of participants, many areas of concern were identified. The challenge for our Committee became how to address these concerns, recognizing that this was a long term project and not all of the issues would be solved immediately, and that many of the problems were beyond the direct influence of our group. So we decided to focus on the issues we could directly impact.

To help address some of these accessibility issues, our Committee applied for, and received, a Measuring Up and Inclusion grant of \$15,000 from the 2010 Legacies Now Fund. Our desire was to provide financial subsidies to assist local organizations and businesses to complete projects that would improve their accessibility. Through the media and local business organizations, we asked for project proposals. As we did not receive many proposals, we began to approach potential accessibility improvement partners, focusing mainly on community groups.

To date we have provided funding to several completed projects including: the purchase and installation of an automatic door opener at the Community Services building; the purchase and installation of an automatic door opener at Mary Anne Court; and the purchase of washroom grab bars for the Family Place.

Our Committee is providing full funding to several projects in progress including: the purchase and installation of washroom grab bars at the Chamber of Commerce; the purchase and installation of washroom grab bars at the Skills Center; and the renovation of washrooms at the Senior's Hall to a more wheelchair friendly standard; as well as partial funding to support the renovation of washrooms at Riverside Centre to a wheelchair accessible standard; and the construction of a wheelchair accessible washroom at Legion Branch #56.

Our Committee also approached Ron Harkness of Princeton Plaza with an offer to partially fund the installation of an automatic door opener at People's Pharmacy. Mr.

Harkness was very generous in using only a small portion of the funding we offered, thus freeing funds for other projects.

Our Committee is not responsible for all of the accessibility improvements in Princeton over the past year. For example: Princeton Secondary has renovated a washroom to a more wheelchair friendly standard; improvements have made the washrooms at the Princeton Arena wheelchair accessible; new accessible washrooms at the Princeton Hospital have been constructed; improvements have been made in the location and number of accessible parking spaces; and the sidewalks outside the entrances of the Legion and Young's Variety have been lifted to allow level entry. No doubt there have been changes to accessibility that are not mentioned here. We appreciate all of the changes that have been made to help make Princeton more accessible.

As mentioned, there are many accessibility concerns that our Committee can only try to influence. For example, because of Town Council's wheelchair experience, we think they understand that the sidewalk to street transition areas can be unsafe to all walkers, particularly our less than steady walkers, our elderly, and people who use a wheelchair. We believe the Town will be addressing this and other accessibility issues identified during the wheel-about. Our Committee is working on several other issues including accessibility and safety concerns regarding the pedestrian crossing at Burton Avenue and continued on Page 5

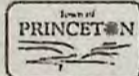

Village Council highlights

Village of Keremeos has forwarded the following highlights from recent meetings of their Village Council.

Public Hearing

A public hearing was held at 7:00 PM on Monday, May 20th to hear from anyone who felt their interest in property would be affected by a zoning amendment for a property at 805-9th Avenue in Keremeos that if passed, would accommodate two new duplex dwellings and a single family dwelling.

Some opposition to the proposed zoning was raised, and included concerns about an increase in traffic, the loss of green space, the

loss of views if the proposed new dwellings are two-storey dwellings, and the perceived reduction in property values in the immediate area as a result of the proposed development.

The developer spoke to the issue and noted that her intention is to build a quality product, that all lots would be landscaped, and that there is a need for the type of housing she intends to provide which is more affordable than some of the other housing developments being built in the Village.

Regular Council Meeting

After the Public Hearing concluded, the Regular Council meeting was convened. Council passed a resolution supporting one passed by the Regional District Okanagan Similkameen to ask the Provincial Government for more funding for the proper operation of the Grist Mill.

Council considered the CAO's report that provided additional information regarding traffic impacts on Veterans Avenue that would be generated by a proposed 12-lot single-family residential subdivision.

The developer has applied to amend the Official Community Plan and Zoning bylaw for prop-

erty at 125 Veterans Avenue to accommodate the subdivision. After considering the conclusion that such a development would not significantly impact traffic, Council referred the OCP and Zoning Amendment Bylaws to a public hearing.

Council had the opportunity to consider third reading of the Zoning Amendment Bylaw that was the subject of the earlier public hearing (805-9th Avenue). Council decided to defer third reading until traffic impacts of the proposed development (two duplexes and a single family dwelling) are obtained.

Council discussed the idea of hosting a Business After Business event. Similkameen Country, the local Chamber of Commerce sponsors this monthly event that brings local area business owners and operators together to share ideas and learn about each others businesses.

Council acknowledged that hosting a Business After Business event would be a positive way to dialogue with the business community, and agreed to obtain more information regarding the workload involved in organizing such an event.

IH advising precautions against mosquito bites

West Nile virus has still not arrived into BC, but Interior Health is reminding residents to take extra precautions against mosquito bites when traveling this summer.

"Last summer was one of the worst we have seen for human West Nile virus cases in Western Canada," says Courtney Zimmerman, Communicable Disease specialist with Interior Health.

There were 320 reported human cases in Alberta, and 1,422 cases reported in Saskatchewan. South of the border, Montana, Idaho, and Oregon reported over 360 combined human cases. Washington State reported 7 equine cases. Four IH residents acquired West Nile Virus infection last summer while traveling outside of BC.

West Nile virus has not yet been detected in any mosquitoes or birds in BC, and there have been no BC-acquired human cases, making it one of the last remaining West Nile virus-free zones in North America. "There is no reason why it won't eventually arrive in BC," says Zimmerman, "and Interior Health will continue through the 2008 summer testing mosquitoes and birds to detect the virus, if and when it arrives. IH residents should get in the routine at home of taking precautions to reduce mosquito bites, and then those habits will protect them while traveling outside of BC this summer."

West Nile virus infection is a disease that primarily resides in birds, and can be spread from birds to humans by infected mosquitoes. About 20% of infected people may experience mild to severe flu-like symptoms, and a small number of

people (less than 1% of those infected) may develop a serious neurological disease.

The best protection against West Nile Virus is to avoid mosquito bites, and reduce mosquito breeding areas. Here are some things you can do to protect yourself from West Nile virus:

- Use mosquito repellent - Apply mosquito repellent to areas of exposed skin. Check the product label for instructions on proper use. Repellents containing DEET are safe if the label precautions are followed. DEET-free products are available, but may not provide as long-lasting protection.

- Wear protective clothing - Avoid dark clothing, as it tends to attract mosquitoes. If you are in an area with lots of mosquitoes, wear loose fitting, full-length pants and a long-sleeved shirt to keep mosquitoes from biting. Mosquitoes that can carry WNV are most active at dusk and at dawn. Avoid using floral fragrances such as perfumes, soaps, hair care products, and lotions.

- Install mosquito screens on windows - Consider staying indoors between dawn and dusk and in the early evening.

- Prevent mosquito breeding around your home - Anything that can hold

water is a likely mosquito breeding area. Try to identify and remove these areas on your property. A few things to do include: empty saucers under flowerpots; change water in bird baths twice a week; unclog rain gutters; drain tarps, tires, and other debris where rain water may collect; and install a pump in ornamental ponds or stock them with fish. Stagnant backyard pools can be a big source of mosquitoes and should be maintained regularly to prevent mosquito growth.

The Province of BC conducts a surveillance program for West Nile virus which includes testing of dead birds in the corvid family: crows, ravens, magpies and jays. These birds are more likely than others to die from West Nile virus. It also includes trapping and testing of mosquitoes from numerous sites in the province.

Interior Health traps mosquitoes at 20 sites across the Southern Interior and sends them to the provincial lab for testing. Interior Health also works with local governments in efforts to control mosquito populations and coordinate planning.

The public will be notified when and if the first positive mosquitoes and or birds are found in the province.

Get the most out of food

If you want to live a long, healthy life, you need to go green – green vegetables!

Among the benefits of leafy green vegetables is the power-packed assembly of essential nutrients: magnesium, iron, calcium, folate, Vitamin C, Vitamin B6, and all of the phytochemicals that fight cancer.

Leafy green vegetables are the cheapest protection you can buy, or grow if you are a gardener. The powerhouse greens include spinach, Swiss chard, beet greens, and kale (don't count iceberg lettuce - it has almost none of the valuable nutrients you need).

Those leafy greens help prevent clogged arteries. Most clogged arteries come from having too much homocysteine in the blood. Folate and B6 help keep homocysteine under control. When you eat spinach, Swiss chard and beet greens, you are doing your heart a favour. Spinach is probably the best vegetable for keeping homocysteine under control.

Spinach and beet greens have a lot of potassium and magnesium, minerals that help keep blood pressure down.

A research project in Chile showed that smokers are less likely to get lung cancer if they eat a lot of green vegetables. The carotenoids found in leafy greens help fight off cancer. Dark leafy greens contain carotenoids called lutein, alpha-carotene and beta-carotene.

Leafy greens help prevent macular degeneration, a disorder that causes blindness in the elderly. People who eat greens are 43 percent less likely to have macular degeneration than those who don't eat greens, according to research done in Boston.

Many people suffer from low levels of iron in their blood. Low levels of iron mean the tissues of your body are not receiving enough oxygen, as iron in the blood carries oxygen to the cells. People who need more iron will tire easily. The iron found in greens is not absorbed easily without Vitamin C, so be sure to include something like oranges or strawberries or green peppers in a meal of greens.

While we talk about greens, don't forget broccoli, green onions and parsley. Broccoli is good for preventing a multitude of physical problems. Parsley helps the kidneys, and green onions carry the benefits of mature onions, which are excellent for your health.

If you are a gardener, you know spinach will germinate quickly and be ready to eat in about six weeks after planting. This makes it an ideal vegetable for container gardening if you live in an apartment or just have flower beds. Plant a few seeds every couple of weeks and you can have spinach all summer.

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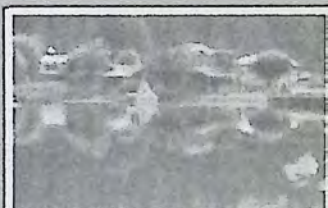

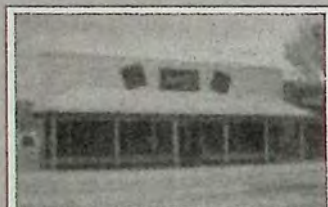

Following the failed attempt by those on the tug *Sea Lion* to take the *Komagata Maru* by force, it was finally decided by the authorities ashore in Vancouver to ask the new Canadian Navy to solve the problem.

The elderly training ship, *HMCS Rainbow* entered Burrard Inlet on July 21st, 1914, and immediately trained its six-inch guns on the *Komagata Maru*.

This was the first appearance of an RCN ship in Vancouver and on July 23rd, exactly two months after she had arrived the *Komagata Maru* was forced to leave the City.

Some twenty of its passengers who already had resident status had been allowed to disembark, but more than 300 others had to return.

The incident raised tensions among members of Vancouver's Sikh community. Some had a particular dislike for Yorkshire-born William Hopkinson, a local immigration official.

He had once served on the Calcutta Police Force and had an affinity for Indian Languages, speaking Hindi fluently and also getting by in Punjabi.

Hopkinson had come to Vancouver in 1907 and was hired by the Canadian Government as an immigration inspector and inter-

preter, in addition he was charged with monitoring the activities of East Indian extremists' living in British Columbia and to develop a network of pro-British informants. Hopkinson also apparently disguised himself as a Sikh named Narain Singh to gather additional information - he had been one of the men aboard the *Sea Lion*.

On October 14th, 1914, a man called Mewa Singh - a supporter of India's independence movement - shot Hopkinson to death at the Provincial Courthouse in Vancouver.

Mewa would be hanged January 11th, 1915 for the murder. A hall in Ross Street Sikh Gurdwara was subsequently named after him.

The *Komagata Maru* arrived in Calcutta on September 26th. Upon entry into the harbour, the ship was forced to stop by a British gunboat and the passengers were placed under guard.

The ship was then diverted approximately 17 miles to Budge Budge, where the British intended to put the group on a train bound for Punjab.

The passengers wanted to stay in Calcutta, but were forced to return to Budge Budge and reboard the ship.

The passengers protested, with some refusing to reboard the *Komagata Maru*, where-upon the

police opened fire, killing twenty and wounding nine others. This incident became known as the Budge Budge Riot.

The organizer of the original voyage to Vancouver, Gurdit Singh, managed to escape and lived in hiding until 1922, when he was urged by Mahatma Gandhi to give himself up as a true patriot. He duly did so and was promptly imprisoned for five years.

In April of this year, Dr. Ruby Dhalla, MP for Brampton-Springdale, tabled a motion in Ottawa that called upon the Canadian Government to apologize to the individuals and families that had been impacted by the *Komagata Maru* incident. On May 12th, 2008, the Conservative Government concurred and publicly apologized to the Indo-Canadian community for the affair.

Last week, on Friday, May 23rd, 2008, the 94th anniversary of the event which many had called 'a stain on Canadian values,' BC politicians also voted to offer an apology for the treatment of the passengers aboard the *Komagata Maru* and who had been denied entry to Canada after arriving at Vancouver harbour.

Finally, the Canadian Government is reportedly planning to give \$2.5-million in grants for a *Komagata Maru* memorial.

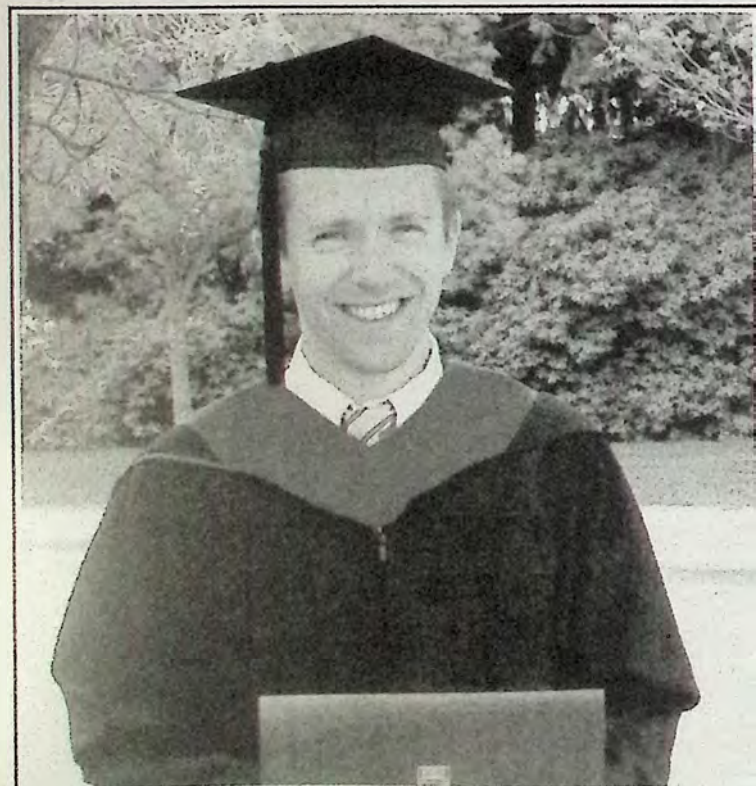

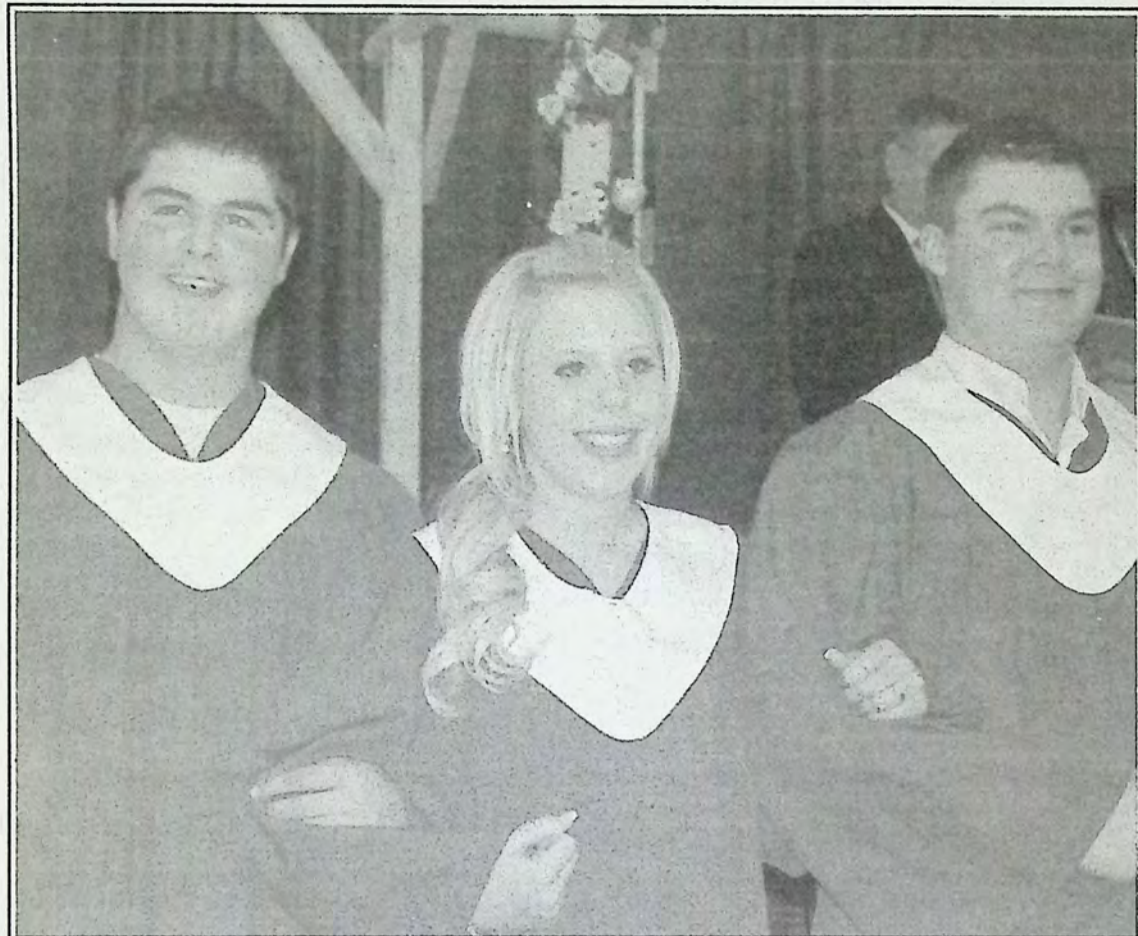

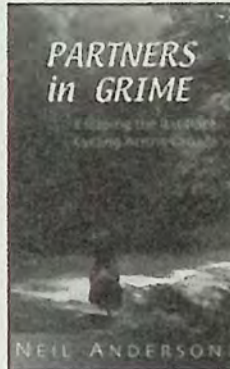

BBQ Bag Biryani

(NC)—A flavourful complement to grilled chicken, pork or seafood, this recipe will make you wonder why you've never cooked rice on the grill before!

- 2 cups chicken or vegetable broth (500 mL)
- 1 cup U.S. long grain white rice (250mL)
- 1 cup each chopped onion and tomato (250 mL)
- 1/2 cup golden raisins (125 mL)
- 1/2 cup 35% whipping cream (125 mL)
- 3 tbsp cubed butter, cold (45 mL)
- 3 cloves garlic, minced
- 4 tsp mild Indian curry paste (20 mL)
- 1 tbsp minced ginger (15 mL)
- 2 tsp turmeric (10 mL)
- 1 tsp each ground coriander and cinnamon (5 mL)
- 1/2 tsp each ground cardamom, salt and pepper (2 mL)
- 1/4 cup toasted chopped walnuts (optional) 50 mL
- 2 tbsp chopped cilantro (optional) 30 mL

Preheat grill to medium. In a medium sized bowl, stir broth with rice, onion, tomato, raisins, cream, butter, garlic, curry paste, ginger, turmeric, coriander, cinnamon, cardamom, salt and pepper until well combined. Place a grill bag on a baking sheet. Spoon mixture into grill bag. Crimp the open end securely closed. Smooth to distribute the ingredients evenly. Slide bag off the baking sheet onto the barbecue grate. Cook, lid down, for 10 minutes. Carefully flip the grill bag over; continue to grill, lid closed, for an additional 10 minutes. Slide grill bag back onto the baking sheet; let rest for 5 minutes. Wearing oven mitts, carefully cut open grill bag. Spoon rice onto a serving platter. Garnish with walnuts and cilantro. 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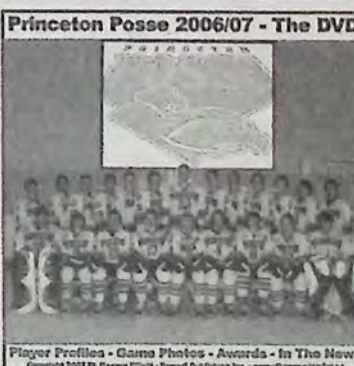

Special guest speaker was Scott Musgrove, who took a light-heart-

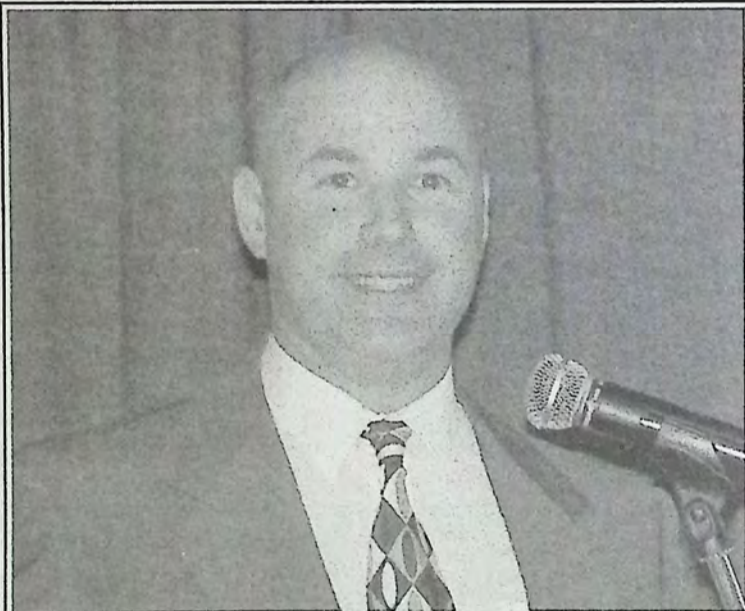
ed approach to giving some 'pearls of wisdom.' He said it all boiled down to loving one another and caring, and quoted a Beatles song: *All You Need Is Love.*

One tyranny is the same as another

The people who left their homelands to migrate to North America were often escaping some kind of tyranny. The Irish and Scots were escaping the tyranny of the English who took over their lands and forced them into poverty. Many, like the Puritans, were escaping the tyranny of the state religion. All of these people had an idea about freedom. The personal freedom to choose their own destinies was a motivating factor in how they lived their lives. Eventually, people who called themselves Americans started a new nation to rebel against the economic tyranny of England.

More than 200 years have passed since the Americans began that fight for freedom, and yet we have become witnesses to the breakdown of another tyranny spawned in America. I am referring to the breakaway group of Latter Day Saints operating under the tyranny of Warren Jeffs. Unfortunately, a branch of that group has been established in British Columbia, in a town called Bountiful.

A self-proclaimed "prophet" started this colony of people who believed a man should be allowed to have more than one wife. On the surface, freedom of religion seemed to be the guiding principle, and the authorities left these prophets and their people alone, even though they were breaking the law which forbids polygamy. Few people on the outside of the polygamist group understood that this "religious" group was really an excuse for a few men to become tyrants over hundreds of men, women and children. Any group is a tyranny which denies freedom of the followers to choose where they will live, how they will dress, who they will marry, and how their children will be educated. With so much revealed, we now see the prophet and his key men as obsessed with the sexual exploitation of women and children.

Having personal freedom allows us to be who we are. I am not suggesting we should be without laws. On the contrary, I believe laws are essential to maintain peace between people, because laws should prevent us from doing harm to one another. In a free society, any law enacted should be for the purpose of keeping us safe. This was what was missing from the religious colony run by Warren Jeffs. The people had no freedom to choose, and they were not safe. This is typical of any tyranny.

Any religion can be used to subjugate people. In fact, in the majority of the world's religions, past or present, subjugation of the masses is part and parcel of the way the religious leaders maintain their positions. Persuasion may be used to convert a person to the belief system, but force, coercion, manipulation and many forms of punishment are used to control the group which has been converted. Those who find flaws in the leaders or the beliefs may be killed, exiled, imprisoned or tortured to prevent any others from openly thinking for themselves.

In many religious sects, increasing the number of members is a key feature of the group, and constitutes another facet of the tyranny. For example, both Islam and Christianity originated from Judaism. It is against Judaic practice to attempt to convert any gentile to their religious belief, yet both Christians and Muslims try very hard to convert others to their beliefs. The larger the group, the more power the leaders have.

The Warren Jeffs compound is far from the first example of home-grown religious tyranny. The Jonestown massacre was the

result of cultism originating in the United States. The Waco, Texas, incident was another example. The part that always amazes me is how these fanatical leaders find followers! Are there so many people out there who would willingly give up their personal freedom? Are there so many people unwilling to think for themselves?

In the Warren Jeffs compound, one can hardly blame the younger folk for not thinking for themselves. They were educated in the compound and actually feared the outside world because they were taught that everybody outside their sect is evil. Of course, that is one of the oldest tricks in the religious tyranny handbook: tell the followers that everybody else is evil. Thousands of women were burned as witches (evil) for not conforming to the dictates of the Church of Rome, or the Puritan leaders.

Tyrannies can be political, academic, corporate, or religious. All it takes is somebody desperate for power over others to lead, persuade, coerce or otherwise dominate a few who can see some personal benefit from the association. Then they persuade more to follow and sometimes they can persuade an entire nation, such as occurred in Russia when the masses adopted the Communist belief system.

Isn't there a message somewhere that says, "Beware of false prophets"? Isn't that a warning to think for one's self, look for proof, don't be a sucker for a fast sales pitch? Isn't that a warning to all of us to question everything about every person who claims to be a prophet, or a religious leader, or a leader of any kind? I bet Warren Jeffs did not preach that message!

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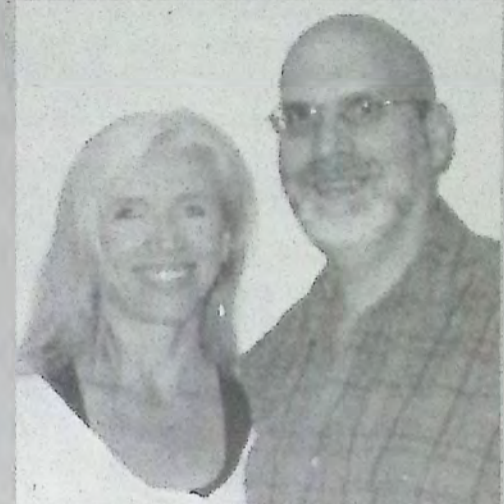

School Board covers full agenda

How parents can complain

School District #58 has adopted two methods for parents to complain if they think their child has been treated unfairly. A complaint, or an appeal, may be launched if a student has been suspended or otherwise disciplined, and parents feel such discipline was unfair or unduly harsh.

The initial complaint requires a parent to go directly to the person responsible for the decision and attempt to reach an understanding. Failing this, a parent may begin the appeal procedure. Parents may request the complaint or appeal procedure information from a trustee or an administrator.

School Board defines election process

Under the BC School Act, school boards have a number of options as to how an election may be conducted. At the final public meeting of this school year, in Princeton, the Board of School Trustees for School District #58, gave three readings to an election bylaw. The terms of the bylaw will apply to both general elections and by-elections.

Princeton will elect three trustees. The minimum number of nominators is two. One advance poll will

be held 10 days before the election date. The Chief Election Officer will designate the location, date and voting hours for the advance poll and the general election. One scrutineer per candidate will be allowed for each ballot box in use.

Nomination documents will be posted on the district website until 30 days after the election. Campaign financing disclosure documents may be posted for one year.

School Board looks ahead to job loss

School trustees and administrators for Princeton and Merritt are part of a committee looking at potential forest industry job loss in the future. The disastrous escalation of beetle killed timber is expected to result in loss of forest industry jobs in the next few years. The school district will work at providing retraining opportunities for displaced forest industry workers. Funding is expected to be available through Western Diversification.

Board reviews hiring techniques

Trustees of School District #58 had a brief lesson in the newest method of selecting new teachers and other employees.

It is based on behaviour. Assistant Superintendent Wendy Hyer took

trustees step by step through techniques she had given administrators in a recent workshop.

Work standards topped the list of what to look for in prospective teachers, things like reliable preparation of lesson plans, and student records. Class management was important, along with interpersonal skills and the ability to work with others as a team.

The techniques are used by 70 percent of corporations. What the employer really wants to know is how the prospective employee will behave when hired.

Board approves agency for student insurance

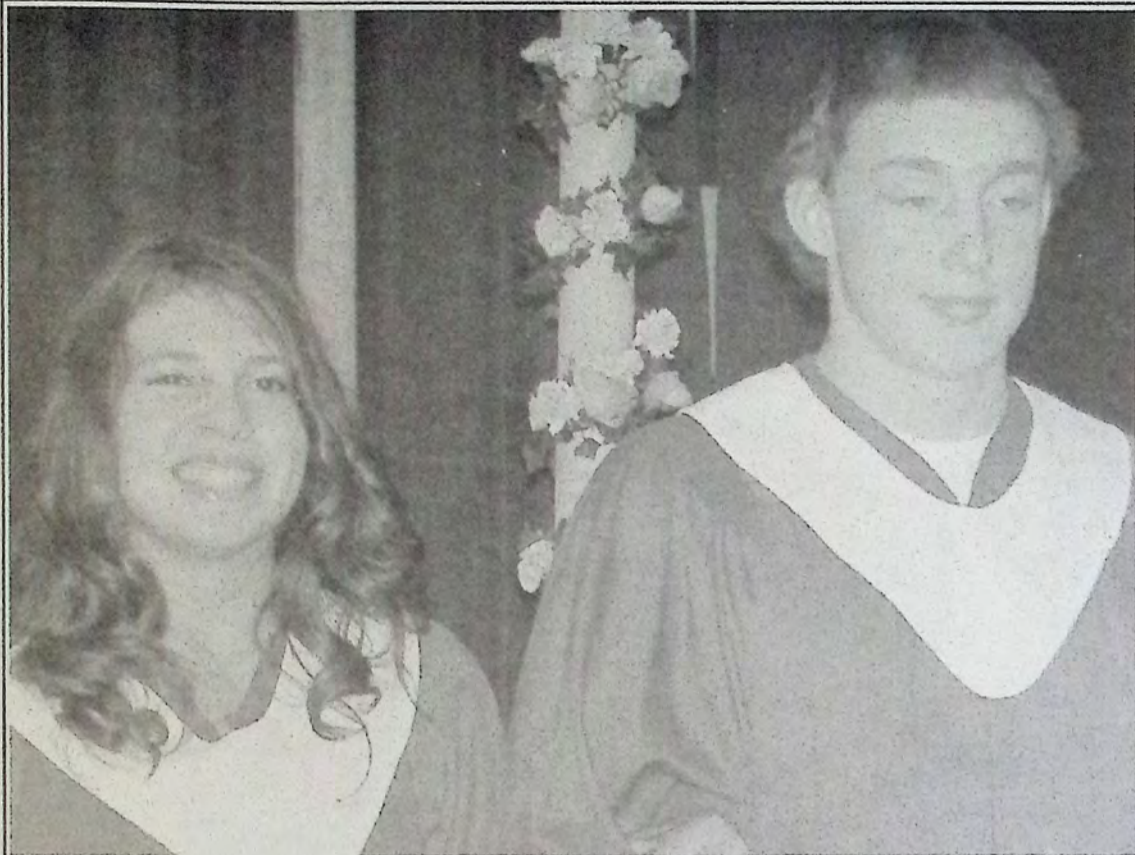

The 2008-09 school calendar was approved at the school board public meeting held in Princeton May 28. Schools will open September 2 from 10:00 AM to noon for registration.

Schools will close for statutory holidays, and the last day of school for 2008 will be December 19. After the Christmas break, schools will re-open January 5, 2009. Spring break will be from March 16 through March 20. Schools will be closed for Easter weekend, April 10 through-April 13. Schools will close June 26.

The 'Eight Questions' were:
Will coalbed methane change the landscape?

Campbell says, yes it will with well pads, roads, compressors and pipelines in a province where environmental assessments are not required.

Will coalbed methane change my community?

Campbell again says yes. She says there will be an impact on property values and well setbacks are currently "as near as 80 metres from homes."

How many wells will there be?

Campbell answered with, "We don't know" then added there is currently no limit to the number of wells that can be drilled, but gov-

ernment regulations may be a factor in well spacing.

Will my drinking water be safe?

Again, Campbell offered a 'we don't know' saying methane gas can migrate along coal seams and said there were cases where landowners had tap water they could set on fire.

Will the law protect our water?

Another 'we don't know' although Campbell did say there were government regulation coming that would affect where water had to be reinjected, it is a costly measure she thought many gas companies may not want to do.

What toxics will be used and how will they be disposed of?

"There's a lot of uncertainty to this industry," Campbell said with her 'we don't know' answer.

"Oil and gas production is a toxic process and companies are not required to truck waste off site or fence from wildlife."

Will the government take care of you?

"Don't count on it," says Campbell.

The final question was *Money Talks. Is it worth the price?* This final question was aimed at landowners who may be working on surface lease agreements. Campbell's answer was 'it's up to you' and pointed out that there has been no set standard for lease agreements and information available revealed a huge range.

Gilles Wendling of GW Solutions gave his presentation 'Aquifers and Groundwater in the Princeton Area' which was followed by a question period.

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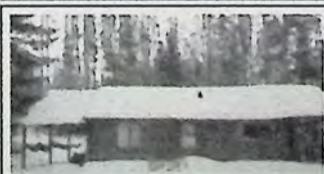
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
