Paramedic says system needs an overhaul

Residents in small communities - like Princeton - are well aware of how continued cuts to services affect their way of life.

Last week another incident made it very clear that something needs to be done about the current state of health care services in Princeton.

Brandon Plunkett, a BC Ambulance paramedic, says inadequacies in the system are putting people at risk.

Plunkett's story begins when his wife went into labour on June 8th. He drove her to Princeton Hospital where a doctor said she'd have to be transported to Pentiction.

A shortage of qualified staff and equipment problems are the main issues with Plunkett. Although his wife did arrive safely in Pentiction and gave birth to a healthy baby boy, Plunkett's frustration with the way the system works has made him lash out at the very source of his income.

The doctor in Princeton determined a lights and sirens transfer was required, but the ambulance

crew that arrived did not have the proper designation to drive with lights and sirens. One member had a 'driver only designation' and not the proper designation to use lights and sirens which meant once behind the wheel, the driver could not use emergency measures to speed up the transfer to Pentiction.

The ambulance crew did eventual switch places and Plunkett's wife was transported with the aid of lights and sirens.

Plunkett also charges faulty equipment risks the safety of patients.

He says that when the stretcher was first loaded into the ambulance, safety clips could not be fastened and a staff member mentioned there was an ongoing problem with them.

"I'm not trying to put blame on any one person," Plunkett says.

"The public needs to be educated on what's going on in their ambulance service."

He adds, "There's a larger issue at play here that needs to be addressed in terms of rural and remote ambulance service."

Racing Days is at the post!

This Canada Day weekend in Princeton will be one you won't want to miss!

Chief Dennis' history on this event dates back to when his great-grandmother rode in the race in Princeton and at the Powwow grounds in Keremeos. Dennis, along with his father, will enlighten us on that historic event.

Then on to the 40th running of

Princeton Racing Days with a post time of 3:00 PM. Racing Days will be officially opened by Mayor Randy McLean and Yale-Lillooet MLA Harry Lali. There will be pari-mutuel betting, a refreshment garden and concession stand on site. There will also be live entertainment in the refreshment garden featuring western music and cowboy poetry.

Admission to Sunflower Downs on race day is free.

Saturday morning, June 28th, brings you the annual Lions Club Pancake Breakfast in Rotary Park starting at 7:00 AM, followed at 10:30 AM by the Lions Club Duck Race. Then at 12 Noon it is back downtown for the annual Rotary Club Racing Days Parade. The parade will run down Vermilion Avenue to Bridge Street, down Bridge Street and over the wooden bridge (over the Tulameen River) and up to Princeton Arena.

From there it's up to Princeton Secondary School at 1:30 PM to witness the crowning of Princeton's Youth Ambassadors.

Evening activities include the Racing Days Dance at Princeton Legion at 7:00 PM. Music is being

provided by the 32nd Avenue Band from Langley.

There are numerous other events taking place Racing Days weekend. There will be a mixed Golf Tournament at Princeton Golf Club. Class reunions and family reunions are also part of the tradition of Racing Days. - submitted

PXA keeps building for future

Princeton Exhibition Association (PXA) members are still working on upgrades to the fairgrounds, racetrack and rodeo facilities. A lot of work has been done this spring, and there is more to do.

DVD's of Princeton's 2007 rodeo and horse races are available at Image Emporium. These will be used for promoting the events and make interesting gift items and souvenirs.

The ATVBC Poker Run takes place this weekend. Look for a parade of ATVs late Friday afternoon. The Poker Run headquarters

is at the fairgrounds, and is for registered members only.

The annual horse racing meet takes place on Friday, June 27, starting with the Klootchman Race at 2:00 PM. This is a traditional race of the Similkameen native people. This is the first running of the race in more than 100 years, and John Bey, President of Princeton Racing Days Association, reports there is a lot of interest in this race. Entry is for women only.

Bey told PXA members at the June 10 meeting that race sponsor-

ships are not coming in the way they did in past years. Local race sponsors contribute to purse money, which attracts race horse owners.

The sponsorships are essential. Without good purses to attract horse registration, and the horse races in turn attract people to Princeton and boost the economy. When horse racing in Princeton was revived in 1965, it was for the purpose of boosting the local economy and it was local business owners who initiated Princeton Racing Days.

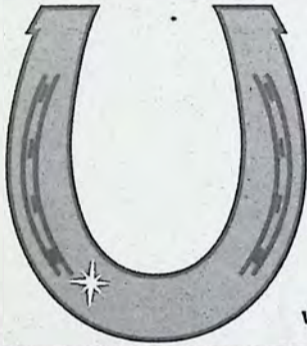

Goldcliff reports more good news

Leonard W. Saleken, Chairman of Goldcliff Resource Corporation (GCN.TSXV) reported last week that the 2007 York-Viking drilling results in the northeast portion of

the York-Viking zone confirm that the gold mineralization is extensive, and that it contains multiple gold horizons.

The assay results for 14 additional 2007 diamond drill holes establish that the York-Viking gold mineralization continues to expand on the company's 100% owned Panorama Ridge property, located near Hedley.

The drilling results are highlighted by 12.00 metres of 1.22 grams per tonne gold containing 4.00 metres of 1.83 grams per tonne gold with a high-grade value of 3.20 grams per tonne gold.

In the northeast portion of the York-Viking zone, all the drill holes intersected a strong and consistent gold mineralization zone (GMZ), ranging in widths of 30 to 95 metres thick.

Conclusions

The drilling results of the northeast portion in the York-Viking zone confirm that the gold mineralization is extensive and that it contains multiple gold horizons of potential economic grades.

The York-Viking gold zone is the largest of several gold zones discovered on the Panorama Ridge property.

The Panorama Ridge property is located four kilometres east of the historic Nickel Plate-Mascot mines that once produced 2.5 million ounces of gold. The Panorama Ridge property was discovered in 2000 when Goldcliff prospected new logging road outcrops. The property has mine-related infrastructure and is readily accessed by

roads. Goldcliff has identified multiple gold zones that have economic potential.

The Panorama Ridge property contains a large surface area of gold mineralization related to silica-iron alteration (skarn) in sedimentary rocks from the Hedley Formation of the Triassic Nicola Group. The gold mineralization is related to the skarn alteration and occurs over an area of approximately two square kilometres. Contained in the alteration area from northeast to southwest are the Nordic, York-Viking and Tower gold zones. These zones are separate entities occurring over a distance of approximately 1,000 metres. The trenching and drilling have narrowed the gap between the zones.

Eco Tech Laboratory Ltd. of Kamloops, an accredited laboratory, is conducting the sample preparation and analysis. All sample analysis is 30 gram fire assay-A.A. finish for gold and 28 multi-element ICP. The sample stream is subject to check analysis on repeat and re-split samples, and standards to maintain quality control. The drill core gold values are reported as weighted-average gold values in grams per tonne (g/t). The gold values are continuous over the core interval represented.

The assay results from all the 2007 holes have been received and will be reported in an orderly manner. The 2008 exploration work program has been formulated and trenching is planned for early June.

SVPS releases valley survey results - Part 1

Results of a homeowner survey conducted by the Similkameen Valley Planning Society are ready for public release.

Two thousand six hundred randomly selected homes received surveys across the South Okanagan and Similkameen. In the Similkameen, 229 of 700 mailed survey forms were returned. The newly released report focuses on the Similkameen because Okanagan Directors at the Regional District refused twice to fund the project.

The main purpose of the survey was to determine the role in-migrants play in the economy, social life and environmental stewardship of the Valley.

Of particular interest are a group called 'Amenity Migrants.' These are people who have the economic freedom to live anywhere they choose and who base that decision on the quality of natural amenities and a perception of rural and small town charm. Amenity migrants have made large impacts on western communities across the US and Canada.

According to the survey, if you were born here, then you are a rare breed. Only 9% of Similkameen residents were born here and lived their whole lives here. Another 5% were born here, left, and later returned. The remaining 86% moved here. Sixty percent of residents are amenity migrants, 20% are economic migrants and 6% came here for other

reasons.

The pace of in-migration is important, because a rapid pace can be disruptive.

In-migration to the Similkameen has been slow and steady, about keeping pace with population growth in the Thompson-Okanagan Development Region. Amenity-led migration has increased since 1995

and more so since 2000. The pace of economic-led migration - people moving to employment - has slowed with only 25% moving here since 1995. Almost half of in-migrants have been here for more than twelve years.

These results tell us that the Similkameen is attracting people motivated by lifestyle issues at an

increasing rate. Since a boom between 1980 and 1995, people seeking employment or starting a business has declined. The even pace of in-migration back to the 70s means the population growth has not been highly visible.

Many 'new comers' have been here for decades and have been assimilated into the Similkameen culture.

SVPS Economic Development Officer Michael McLaughlin speculates that the modest pace of in-migration is not disruptive and may contribute to social and cultural cohesion in the Valley.

Fundraising initiatives included sales of homemade craft items, a flea market sale (at the Lions Club sponsored flea market), and door-to-door canvassing. Except for a few

short breaks to eat and catch their breath, the Princeton Pacers remained on the track the entire evening.

The team would like to say a huge 'Thank You' to the Princeton Lions Club, Ed Alexandre, Shirley Haker, the businesses and residents of

Princeton, and fellow credit union employees, for their tremendous generosity and support, and look forward to next year's event.

Last year the deer enjoyed them as much as we did. Isn't that the way?

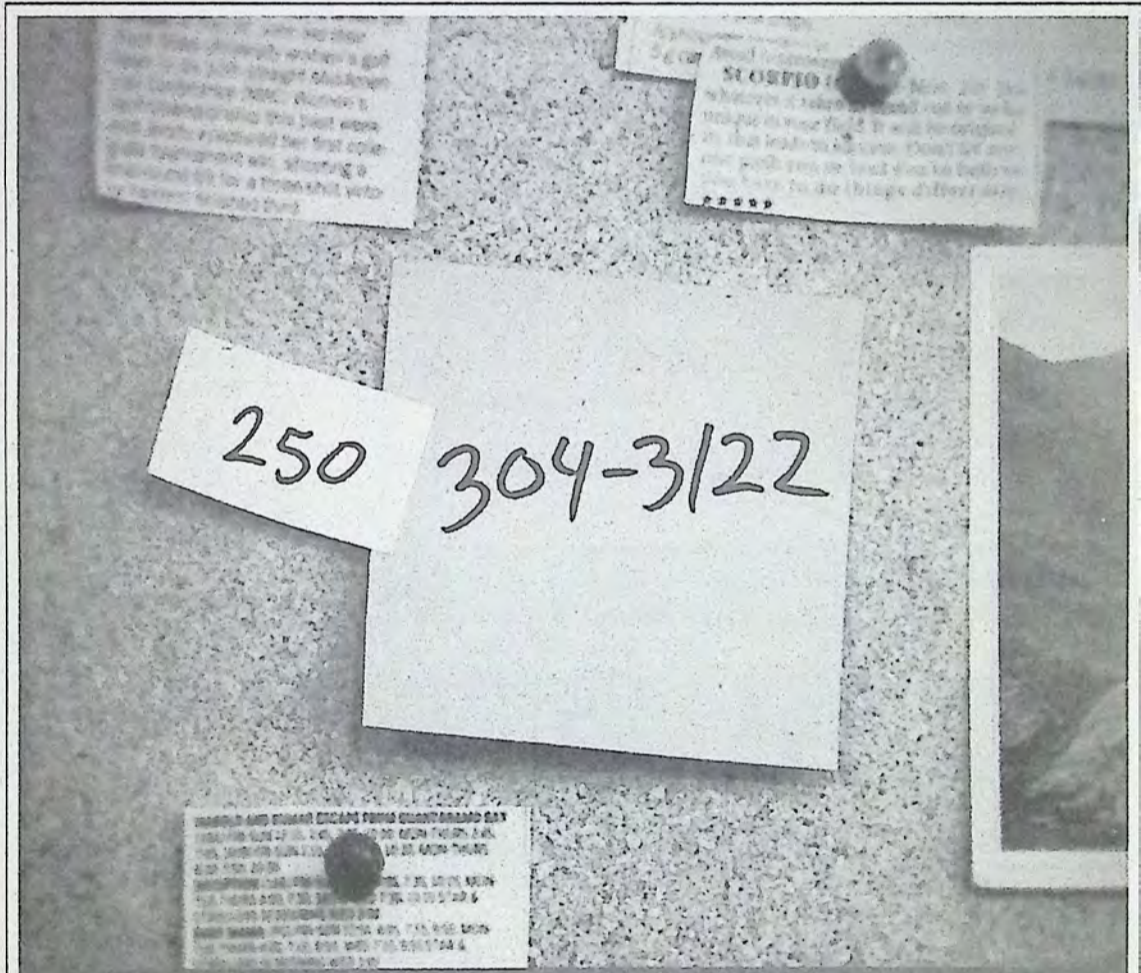

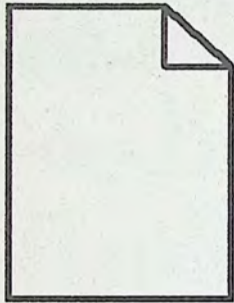

The mystery of osteoarthritis

The most common form of arthritis is osteoarthritis. If you look it up in any medical reference book, you will be told that this painful disorder is the result of aging, of wear and tear on the joints. You will read that osteoarthritis is about the breakdown of cartilage resulting in friction and eventual deforming of the bones in the joints. This is the condition resulting in knee and hip joint replacements. Arthritis is not curable.

Although osteoarthritis is described as a disease of aging, not every old person has the condition. This fact, alone, should encourage researchers to look more deeply into why some people develop the condition and others do not. Another key factor in who has it and who does not is the fact that women with osteoarthritis outnumber men three to one. Osteoarthritis seems to develop during the years coinciding with menopause, which may be a clue to why women outnumber men.

There is no race entirely free of osteoarthritis, but there does appear to be a genetic link. The people of Iceland, who have long been a genetically isolated group, have the highest incidence of osteoarthritis in the world.

The treatment of osteoarthritis consists primarily of prescribing anti-inflammatory drugs and painkillers. Naturopathic treatments include daily consumption of primrose oil or Omega 3 fish oils. Multivitamins are recommended along with silicon extract (horsetail), calcium and magnesium.

Naturopaths suggest persons suffering from osteoarthritis should avoid foods from the nightshade family of plants: peppers, eggplant, tomatoes and potatoes, as these foods appear to increase pain in the muscles. Some naturopaths recommend the avoidance of iron supplements, believed to cause swelling and joint destruction. There is a distinct relationship between osteoarthritis and diet. Patients suffering from osteoarthritis need more protein and folic acid. Eggs, onions and garlic are recommended because the sulfur content helps remove metals from the body. Free form amino acids are often recommended as these help repair tissue damage.

There are many forms of arthritis, and there are many forms of treatment for the various kinds of arthritis, but osteoarthritis has persistently defied any sort of cure, and appears to be lumped together with other so-called diseases of aging. We hear continually of new treatments for the condition, and research continues to reveal new information about the condition. One of the clearest messages is that people in their forties, particularly women in their forties, should pay close attention to joint problems and seek treatment early. Staying slim, eating a sensible diet, and taking a multivitamin and calcium will help ward off the condition or prevent it from becoming too severe.

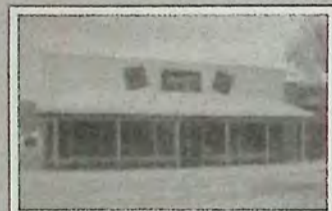

B. C. Sugar INSIGHTS INTO BC'S HISTORY

Roger's sugar refinery has been on Vancouver's waterfront for more than a hundred years. It had its beginning way back in 1881 when 15 year old Ben Rogers was working in E. J. Gray's Sugar Refinery in New Orleans where Ben's father, Sam, was the plant superintendent.

Soon after becoming president of the company, his father was seriously injured in an accident at the refinery and died in 1883. Ben gave up the idea of going to university and

left New Orleans at the age of 18 and went to work at a sugar refinery in New York.

On a visit to Montreal, Ben learnt of the completion of the CPR and its western terminus at a small place called Vancouver. He already had dreams and plans for a refinery of his own and soon realized that Vancouver was right across the water from Manila in the Philippines which at the time was the source of most of Canada's

sugar.

Rogers went to Montreal to put his plans before William Van Horne, president of the CPR. He had pledges of \$50,000.00 worth of backing from his employer and other supporters, but no capital of his own; all he had was a dream.

On that day with Van Horne was another of the railways directors, R. B. Angus, who sat through the entire interview without saying a word. But the next day Rogers learnt that both Van Horne and Angus would take shares and Angus had interested the other directors.

BC Sugar was incorporated March 26th, 1890, its president Benjamin Tingley Rogers. He was aged 24.

Before the refinery was built Rogers wanted concessions from the city - a bonus of \$40,000.00, free water for ten years and no taxes for 15. Vancouver was young and eager to expand and this was the first major business to locate to the city not connected to the fishing and logging industries. The 182 white male landowners and white male tenants living on property valued at more than \$300.00 who voted approved it 174 to 8. The bonus approved was \$30,000.00 given in the form of free land which the city considered to be part of the arrangement.

Ben Rogers died in 1918, aged just 52, but he would have been surely pleased with the success of the company today. It's the largest sugar refinery in Canada producing granulated, icing, brown and cube sugars, besides sugar which is made into syrup.

Local man loses driver's licence

Timothy A. Shopshire stood trial on June 12 on a charge of driving with over .08 mg. of alcohol in his blood on March 7, 2006.

The arresting officer testified that he had been doing random road checks all evening and had seen Shopshire's vehicle at 2:00 AM on Highway 3, and recognized it as Shopshire's vehicle. The officer said he had received an anonymous tip the previous week identifying Shopshire as a driver who frequently consumed alcohol and drove his vehicle.

The officer said Shopshire had pulled off Highway 3 onto Bridge Street then turned into Tapton Avenue. The officer had followed and pulled him over.

While talking to Shopshire, the

officer said he smelled liquor on Shopshire's breath and made a demand for a roadside breath sample. Shopshire failed the test. He was taken to the detachment for a breath analysis which indicated a .10 alcohol level.

Defense Counsel Stan Turner argued that Shopshire's right as a citizen had been violated, as the Charter of Rights section 9 prohibits arbitrary detention of a citizen. He submitted case law to back up his argument.

Crown Counsel Michael Welsh argued that peace officers have the right to detain motorists under the B.C. Motor Vehicle Act to check for valid Driver's licences, seatbelt use, vehicle mechanical safety and driver sobriety. He submitted case

law to back his argument.

Judge Berdette had a lot of case law to read, and postponed her decision to the following day. She found Shopshire guilty as charged, and sentenced him to pay a \$600 fine and prohibited him from driving for one year.

Women plead guilty

A 32 year old Princeton woman appeared in Provincial Court in Princeton on June 12 to plead guilty to a charge of driving while impaired. Sherri-Lyn Robinson was arrested on March 7 when an RCMP officer saw her turning from Highway 3 onto Bridge Street with what he described as jerky steering.

The officer noted the smell of

liquor on her breath, and administered a roadside test, which she failed. She later failed a breath analysis. Robinson was ordered to pay a \$600 fine and is prohibited from driving for one year.

Rachel Tanchak, age 28, entered a guilty plea to a charge of driving without due care and attention on January 11. She was ordered to pay a \$600 fine.

NOTICE

All BC Teachers Certified Under the Independent School Act Require a New Criminal Record Check by September 30, 2008

Recent changes to the BC Criminal Records Review Act require that all teachers certified under the Independent School Act provide a criminal record check authorization directly to the BC Inspector of Independent Schools, rather than providing a criminal record check authorization to the individual teacher's employer.

All applicants and currently certified teachers are required to provide the Inspector of Independent Schools with a criminal record check authorization by September 30, 2008, regardless of whether the teacher's employer has recently received a criminal record check. Upon completion of the criminal record check, the Inspector will issue new certificates of qualification.

The criminal record check authorization and certificate renewal should be completed as soon as possible, preferably before the end of the current school year (June 30, 2008). Please note that failure to provide the Inspector with an authorization by September 30, 2008 will result in a suspension of the teaching certificate.

Please note that this regulation does not apply to BCCIT certified teachers who are teaching in Independent schools.

Locals celebrate planting of 6 billionth tree in BC

Last week (June 5th) treeplanters, nursery workers and forestry contractors celebrated the planting of the province's six billionth tree by planting thousands of seedlings simultaneously across BC.

The coordinated plant involved an estimated 6,000 workers and represents a milestone in one of the province's lesser-known mega projects; four decades of reforestation covering six million hectares of logged and denuded land.

Undertaken in earnest since the '70s by a hard-working collection of seasonal workers and independent contractors planting trees has not only been the foundation of the province's forest management program, it has become a rite of passage for many young workers and a vocation for seasoned veterans.

Local celebrations were organized by Princeton area planting contractor Chris Akehurst of

Akehurst and Giltrap and included a tour of reforested land in the Princeton region attended by a number of local dignitaries.

The Western Silvicultural Contractors' Association (WSCA) assisted in the province-wide celebration. The WSCA says that by drawing attention to the six billionth tree milestone they can also raise awareness of the industry's readiness to undertake a vastly expanded reforestation and restoration program. The silviculture sector can also provide skilled stand tenders, surveyors, fire fighting and prescribed burn crews many of them underemployed at the moment.

It also comprises a major forest seedling nursery sector capable today of producing double the number of trees being grown annually for the province's current planting program.

In spite of the 12 million hectares

of beetle-attacked forest across the province tree planting activities are expected to drop to their lowest level in 20 years in 2009. The WSCA is lobbying governments at all levels to act boldly now to mitigate the environmental consequences of the beetle plague through prompt reforestation and eco-system restoration.

Treeplanting/Silviculture Facts - there are an estimated 6,000 seasonal tree planters in BC - another 1,200 workers brush, space and tend stands - during 2003 fire fighting contractors provided 1,700 fire fighters - during the May to June peak, trees are planted at a rate of 120 per second across BC

- the most seedlings planted in BC in one year is 298 million (in 1989) - studies of treeplanting work suggest planters exert themselves at levels comparable to elite athletes in training.

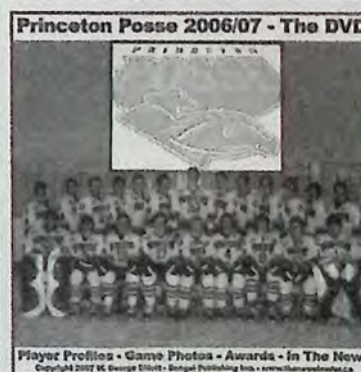

Peanut Power Balls

(NC)—Instead of taking store-bought energy bars on your next hike – try these. They taste great, transport beautifully without crumbling and are a lot less expensive when you make them yourself.

Prep time: 15 minutes, Cook time: 3 minutes, Refrigeration time: 30 minutes, Makes 20

Ingredients:

- 2 cups granola 500 mL
- 1/3 cup chopped peanuts 75 mL
- 1/4 cup each dried cranberries and raisins 50 mL
- 1/4 cup wheat germ or ground flax 50mL
- 2 tbsp each pumpkin seeds and shredded coconut 30 mL
- 1/2 cup honey 125 mL
- 1/2 cup peanut butter 125 mL

Directions:

1. In a large bowl, stir granola with peanuts, cranberries, raisins, wheat germ, pumpkin seeds and coconut. In a small saucepan bring honey to the boil. Boil vigorously for approximately 30 seconds then whisk in peanut butter. Add to granola mixture and stir to combine.
2. While mixture is warm, form into 1 1/2-inch (3.5 cm) balls. Refrigerate until firm. Store in an airtight container up to two weeks. Twist balls in waxed paper for perfect portability.

I'm Shocked

I'm actually a little more than shocked.

Possibly I'm stunned.

I would never have guessed I was one of 'them' and now I know I'm not sure what to do about it.

The Similkameen Valley Planning Society (SVPS) just released some of the results gathered from a recent survey they conducted. The point of the survey was to 'determine the role in-migrants play in the economy, social life and environmental stewardship of the valley.'

Mine happened to be one of the 2,600 randomly selected addresses in the South Okanagan and Similkameen to receive a survey, which I promptly filled out and sent back.

Who knew I was one of 'them' before I filled out the survey? I know I didn't.

Interesting data from the survey reveals only 9% of Similkameen residents were born here and have lived their whole lives here. Another 5% were born in the Valley, moved away and then moved back.

Here's the interesting part for me: the remaining 86% moved here from somewhere else.

Since I moved here in 1986 for work, that makes me an economic migrant.

I'm not alone in my being one of 'them' as out of the 86% of us who moved to the Similkameen from elsewhere, 20% of us are economic migrants.

In my case, I worked for someone else for the first 18 years then I bought a business and have contributed to the local economy by employing others for the past 4.5 years.

I hope that makes me a good economic migrant.

The survey results also show that the Similkameen Valley is 'attracting people motivated by lifestyle issues at an increasing rate.'

That fact does not surprise me as I think I sort of already knew that from discussions I've had with realtors' about what it is about the Similkameen that has created such an interest in the real estate market.

I'm not very sure at this point what the SVPS survey data will be used for, but it does confirm for me that there's something very special about our Valley. But I already knew that.

What I didn't know was 86% of us came here from somewhere else. I was aware of the fact that a lot of us came here from elsewhere, but would never have imagined it was such a high percentage.

The reason why it probably isn't all that noticeable is that the pace of 'in-migration' has been slow allowing for myself and the rest of 'them' to slowly blend in with the rest of you.

A lot of us have even taken leadership roles within the community as if it was our own all along. This is not a bad thing as I think it enhances the Valley overall.

So I have to ask, are you one of 'them' or are you one of us?

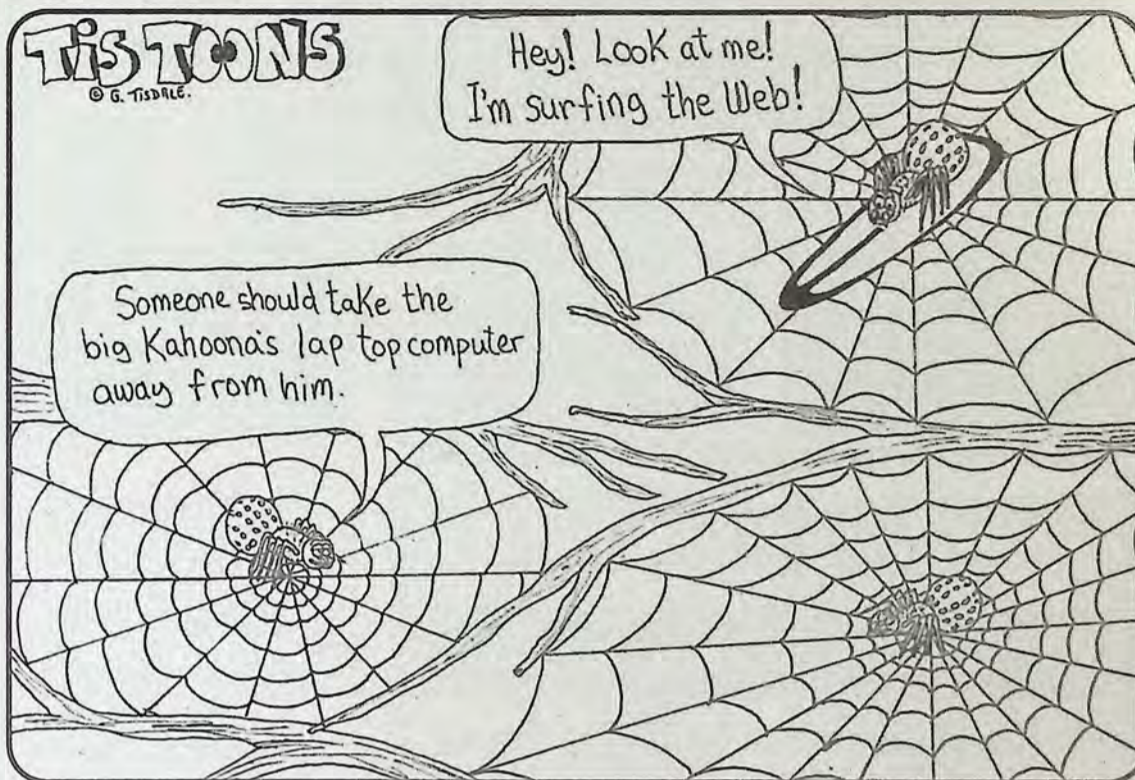

A message from Gerri Logan

To the residents of Princeton and Area H;

Four years ago the Calgary company Petrobank drilled a test well just outside of Princeton to see what deposits of coalbed methane lay below our valley. At that time Petrobank gave at least two information sessions and the Ministry of Energy and Mines, Ministry of Environment and the Oil and Gas Commission paid us a visit to tell us of the safety of the drilling process. Much information was presented about the new regulations that have been imposed by the BC government and how we would never experience the horrors of Powder River in Wyoming. The Princeton Naturalists were concerned however and brought in guest speakers, one of which was Karen Campbell, then of West Coast Environmental Law. But there was not much of a fuss made and Petrobank drilled their test well and went back to Calgary to process the results. It was our hope at the time that they would not find it financially feasible to continue any test drilling but here we are four years later and Petrobank is on the eve of drilling two more wells in our area.

Four years ago we were told that leases can be sold to companies like Petrobank and they are within their rights to conduct exploration and drill test wells on your property. It would simply not be within the local government's power to be able to forbid a company from accessing

Crown and/or private lands. In other words, to some extent it was out of our hands. Whereas we may not have the ability to legislate the safety of our valley, we do believe that a majority of our residents will carry enough weight to protest and protect our homes. However, there are a few things to consider before we take any steps. We have to listen to our entire community, not just to a select group of people. We have to have our facts straight and this has not been an easy job as myths and facts about Coalbed Methane abound. However, both Mayor McLean and I cannot comprehend why we as a community should welcome the possibility of residents' water systems being threatened and 200 to 250 wells with adjoining pipelines scattered across our beautiful valley for the 2 to 3 jobs that may be created. We do not know for sure that Coalbed Methane will not have some detrimental effect on our valley and at this point we are not exactly sure who to turn to to give us some assurances that we will be untouched by drilling and extraction. No one wants to believe Petrobank; some do not believe the Oil and Gas Commission; others the Ministry of Energy and Mines, while others dismiss the claims made by some people that our entire water system will be polluted and decimated by the drilling.

It has become a battle of words, myths, fragile facts and finger

pointing. This must not be how we fight out battles. There are opposing sides on this issue but what must come to the fore front is what is good for our valley. This is surely something we can all agree on.

So here is what we are doing right at the present. We have invited Petrobank to come back to town and we are in the process of selecting other experts that can debate the topic of Coalbed Methane with them. We are hoping to have questions and answers from the public as well. This will be a moderated session and will not be affiliated with any group.

As soon as a suitable date is arrived at for both representatives there will be an open meeting for all of the residents of Princeton and area and we encourage everyone to attend no matter how you feel about Coalbed Methane. Princeton, this is a matter that needs to be addressed by enough people so that both Mayor McLean, his council and I can stand up and say that we have heard from you and are prepared to stand by what we have heard and speak out loud and clearly.

Both Mayor McLean and I will also be asking the Chair of the Regional District to have this on the next meeting's agenda for discussion as well so that all politicians in the Okanagan-Similkameen can be informed about the challenges that we could be facing.

I want art that lasts

It seems everybody is going to digital photos these days. I have received CDs and prints of digital photos, but I know they won't last a long time, so I try to have them put on proper photo paper to keep them for posterity. Dear to me and my family are the photos taken of our ancestors. Some of these photos are nearing 150 years old. The museum has equally old photos on file, and if you were lucky enough to receive one of the Government Agent calendars, you will see prints made from BC Archives photos taken 150 years ago.

In our valley museums, in private collections and in the tribute room of Mascot Mines Tours in Hedley, photos from the history of the Similkameen are displayed or on file. We do not know how long these photos will last, but they are doing well so far.

All of these photos involve some kind of technology. I am impressed by the lifespan of non-technological paintings done hundreds of years ago. The ceiling of the Sistine Chapel is a good example of art that has lived 500 years. When I visited the Louvre, in Paris, I saw hundreds of paintings more than 100 years old. In the Musée de Beaux Arts in Paris, I saw paintings done before canvas, some more than 500 years old.

The Louvre paintings that impressed me most were the paintings done by David, huge paintings showing Napoleon and his retinue. These are a valuable record of what Napoleon looked like, the important people in his life, and how they dressed. The detail was amazing. Other paintings provide a record of what buildings.

In western United States, paintings done by Charles Russell served the same purpose. C.M. Russell's paintings are as famous in the west as Renoir's are in Europe. Russell painted the life of

pioneer days with an eye for such detail that cowboys could recognize their saddles or the brand on a horse. His paintings are a record of cowboys, Indians, stagecoaches, wildlife, and settlers' wagons heading into the west. Like Old Masters' paintings, Russell's are priceless. Most are preserved in the C.M. Russell Gallery in Great Falls, Montana.

Russell's paintings were contemporary with early photography, but they are more valuable than photos taken at the time because Russell's paintings are in colour, while the early photos are black and white.

What we call "art" is often history. The carvings and statues of ancient Rome, Greece, Mexico, Peru, India, China, and almost everywhere tell us something about the people: what they looked like, what they wore, what they believed in, and what they valued. I remember going to a 2,100 year old village that had risen from the Mediterranean Sea during an earthquake. The Roman mosaic floors depicted aspects of

Painters, potters and sculptors are underrated. Often, these artists underrate their work, forgetting the importance of art in recording history. They focus on the "art" rather than the historic record of people, places, clothing, architecture, and the machines we use in daily life.

I think it is a great pity modern artists do not focus their efforts on our life and times. These will pass into history, and there will be photos, but we do not know how long those photos will last and whether the colours will remain true.

Digital copies will fade, and will there be a machine 100 years from now to show us what is on today's CDs? Maybe we should think about the long term?

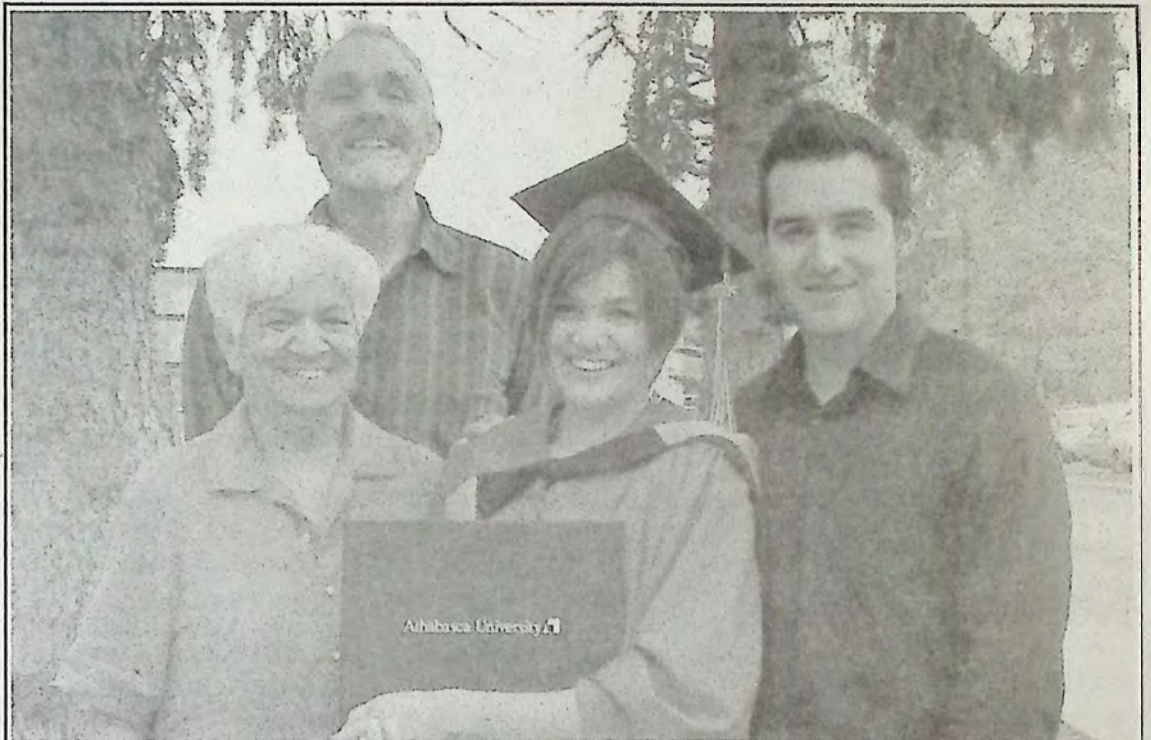

The News Leader has three more blogs, again specifically targeted to address a particular interest or demographic.

"Our Health and Safety News Blog is about health and safety issues, our Generation 50 News Blog is about issues and concerns of interest to seniors and our Home and Garden Blog deals with matters related to home improvement, gardening and those sorts of subjects."

Elliott has also aligned himself with affiliate advertising sites that offer online sales of products that would be of interest to viewers of each blog site.

"For example, if you visit the pet-related sites, you'll find advertising from online businesses that sell pet items. If you visit the Home and Garden blog you'll find advertising for businesses that cater to that market."

Of the nine blogs he currently manages Elliott has a couple favourites.

"I would have to say there's three I like spending most of my time online at and they would be the two pet ones and the front page one. NDP launches summer food for thought tour

NDP Leader Jack Layton announced last week the NDP's summer Food for Thought tour led by NDP Agriculture critic Alex Atamanenko (BC Southern Interior). The tour will explore emerging food security issues in Canada.

Atamanenko will be traveling

across Canada to listen to concerns Canadians have about food production and the best ways to enhance food security; locally and internationally.

"We must regain control of our food system because its important to define clearly what food sovereignty, fair trade and the use of

genetically modified food really means to our collective well-being," said Atamanenko.

"I will be traveling across Canada to share ideas about the concerns Canadians have about food production and the best way to develop a national food policy that will enhance food sovereignty and secu-

city, locally and internationally."

The NDP has been fighting Conservative plans to dismantle the Canadian Wheat Board and have been leading the fight to ensure that Canada's highly successful supply managed (SM) dairy and poultry sectors is not undermined during trade negotiations at the WTO.

Atamanenko has also been working to prevent any further genetically modified seeds and trees from taking root in Canada. According to Atamanenko, the topic of food security came up a number of times during the Standing Committee on Agriculture's cross-country hearings last year.

Man pleads guilty

Michael S. Manderson, formerly of Hedley, appeared in Provincial Court in Princeton on June 13 to enter a guilty plea to an impaired driving charge. He was to have stood trial, but changed his plea. He was to be sentenced in Penticton on June 16. He faces an additional charge of personation to gain advantage. This matter will be dealt with in Penticton where Manderson currently resides.

Booze problem leads to Court

Charalabos Bouzakis appeared in Provincial Court in Princeton on June 12 to plead guilty to refusing to give a breath sample and failure

to appear for his trial on April 13, 2007.

Bouzakis was apprehended by RCMP on August 11, 2005, and was scheduled to go to trial on April 13 and October 12 of 2007. He did not appear on either date.

Bouzakis testified to having no clear memory of where he had been on those dates and why he had not attended for his trials. He admitted he had been either in custody or in a detox center. He told Judge Berdette he is a severe alcoholic.

His mother testified that she believed he had been in custody on one of the trial dates, as she had

gone to the North Vancouver courthouse to pick him up. She had no idea what he was doing on the other date, except to say he was either in jail or in a detox center.

The 35 year old Vancouver resident was ordered to pay a \$600 fine and prohibited from driving for one year, and was fined \$75 for failing to appear for trial.

MP writes Prime Minister Harper

Dear Prime Minister Harper:

I write today to add my voice to the 47 civil society organizations in Canada that are demanding that you support the African proposal for a global moratorium on the release of genetically engineered (GE) trees. Your efforts to stop this moratorium from being established at such an important international agreement as the United Nations Convention on Biological Diversity, which is now meeting in Bonn, Germany, are not going unnoticed and are the cause of great concern.

It is unthinkable that under your direction Canada is bent on stopping the moratorium that so many countries want to achieve. There is growing list of countries in support of a moratorium which already includes all the African countries, Switzerland, Bolivia, Cuba, St Lucia, Ecuador, Malaysia, Indonesia, Russia and Algeria. Canadians expect that Canada will also be on that list.

It is imperative that you recognize the extreme risk of irreversible contamination posed by this technolo-

gy, especially when studies have shown that pollen and seeds from trees in the southeast U.S. can travel for more than 1,200 km into eastern Canada. Any release of GE trees, engineered with the unnatural traits that are being planned by the biotech industry, including those to service the biofuel industry, pose a serious threat to Canada's forests and the forests of the world. Without action today we will undoubtedly create an intergenerational problem for our children and grandchildren. Have we not already burdened them with enough environmental problems to clean up?

Therefore, I strongly urge you to cease and desist from your attempts to thwart yet another international agreement for no other purpose than to fall in line with the demands of multinational corporate interests seeking profit.

I respectfully insist that you only support an agreement that leads to nothing short of a strong and binding moratorium on the release of GE trees anywhere in the world.
