Local RCMP report rash of accidents

Princeton RCMP report attending a number of motor vehicle accidents during a seven day period at the end of June. Police say "driver inattention" was the primary cause of many of the accidents.

On June 22nd at 11:00 AM a motorcyclist lost control two kilometres east of Eastgate on Highway 3 where the motorcycle went off the road to the right, striking a tree stump. The rider was air lifted to the Royal Columbian medical facility suffering a fracture along with internal injuries which were not believed to be life threatening.

On June 27th at 6:25 AM a single vehicle roll-over occurred approximately eight kilometres north of Princeton on Highway 5A. The lone occupant and driver suffered minor injuries, he faces a charge of Fail to Maintain Right and was issued a 24 hour driving prohibition.

On June 26th at 1:00 AM a single vehicle collision occurred where the driver lost control of his vehicle and entered the ditch in the Whipsaw Creek area. The lone male occupant/driver, a resident of Abbotsford, did not suffer any injuries but faces a charge of impaired driving.

On June 28th at 4:20 PM a collision occurred on Highway 3 by

Billy's Restaurant where the driver of a Dodge Neon intending to turn north into the parking lot was struck by a westbound Dodge Dakota causing the pick up to roll. Both occupants were transported to the Princeton General Hospital where they were treated for minor injuries.

On June 28th at 10:15 AM a two vehicle collision occurred east of

Manning Park Lodge where a driver of a vehicle intending to slow and turn into Boyd Meadows Monument turn off was struck from behind by another vehicle. A charge of following too close was served on the motorist who caused the collision.

On June 29th at 1:00 PM a motorcycle rider lost control on Old Hedley Road 15-kilometres

east of Princeton. The rider suffered undetermined back injuries and was transported to Princeton General Hospital.

On June 29th at 6:30 PM a two vehicle collision occurred on Tapton Avenue as a motorist was leaving the Ponderosa Motel parking lot. Minor damage occurred with no injuries.

then evaluating that decision," Leiding explains.

During the grad ceremonies, the children performed a number of skits and songs portraying some of the things they learned in DARE this year.

"They were quite funny." Overwaitea Foods and Dairy Queen donated food, drinks and ice cream treats for all the DARE graduates and their family members who attended the ceremonies.

"I think the Dilly Bars were the highlight of the whole event," says Leiding, who added his personal thanks.

"Again, thanks for the opportunity to be involved in these children's lives in this positive way. Thanks again, Princeton."

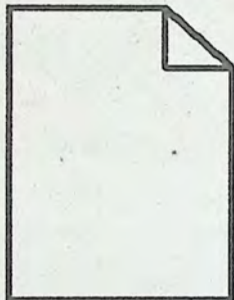

Accident sends many to hospital

On Saturday, June 28th, at approximately 3:00 PM, Keremeos RCMP Detachment, Keremeos Fire Department, and three ambulances attended to a two vehicle collision on Highway 3 at the Ashnola Road turnoff, near the historic Red Bridge. "A family of three were travelling eastbound on Highway 3 to Keremeos when it was struck by another car exiting Ashnola Road," explains Sgt. G. Dickie of

Keremeos RCMP. "The resulting collision sent both vehicles across the highway, one vehicle caught fire but was it put out by motorists prior to the Keremeos Fire Department attending." All three occupants from the eastbound car were taken to hospital by ambulance for evaluation, two of the four occupants from the car that exited on to the highway were also taken to hospital by ambulance.

"The driver of that vehicle was believed to be under the influence of alcohol and samples of his blood were seized at the Penticton Hospital and charges of impaired driving are pending lab analysis of the blood." Both vehicles were totalled and towed from the scene. Luckily, injuries were minor, although two people were admitted overnight for observation. - submitted by RCMP

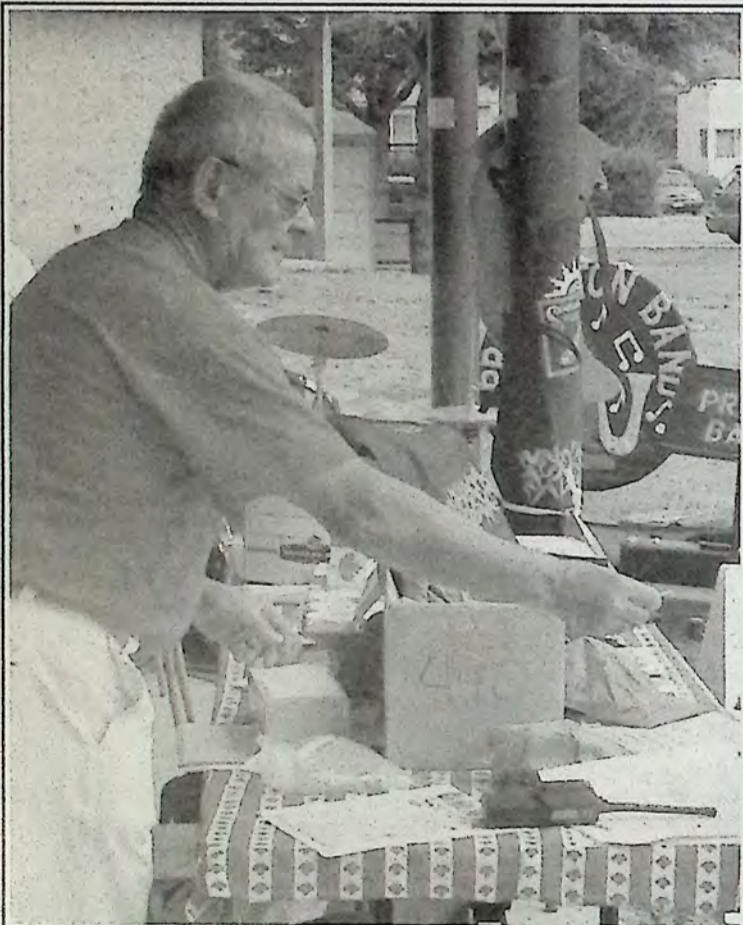
There were two free swim sessions at Keremeos Pool, provided by Pharmasave, and a huge Canada Day Cake from Valu Plus Foods.

Dealing with heat shock

Summer is upon us, and for most of us, this is the favourite time of year. Summer does hold some threats to your health due to extremes of heat, such as the heat wave that hit southern British Columbia at the end of June. Strong sunshine can damage skin. This is well-advertised, but the heat and its hazards are not so well advertised because there are no products to sell to prevent heat exhaustion or heart attack due to heat.

Heat exhaustion can be extremely dangerous for anyone, but it is the very young and the elderly who are most likely to show the effects of heat first. Heat exhaustion symptoms are the result of too little liquid, or inability to sweat enough to cool the body. The symptoms include a pounding headache, nausea, thirst, dizziness and weakness. Heat exhaustion means your vital organs are not getting enough blood. In serious cases, a person with heat exhaustion may have a weak pulse, fatigue, confusion or anxiety.

Heat exhaustion can come from loss of electrolytes, which are minerals that prevent muscle cramps. Mineral drinks, such as Gatorade, are good. If you are sweating a great deal, you may need something salty.

Warning: If you feel very hot, do not gulp down an icy cold drink. You could faint from the shock, or you could experience severe stomach cramps. Sip your cold drink.

Getting out of the heat is a must. Find some shade or a cool spot. Dousing yourself with water is effective, and so is going into cool water. **Warning: If you are feeling very hot and could possibly have heat exhaustion, do not jump into cold water! This can cause shock and possibly lead to heart attack.**

In hot weather, wear loose clothing made of cotton, and wear a wide brimmed hat in the sun. Dress like a Mexican! This way you can avoid a "prickly" heat rash caused by sweat stuck in the pores. A bath or shower can help if a heat rash breaks out.

HEAT STROKE CAN BE FATAL

Heat stroke is a condition which requires immediate medical attention. When the body's internal organs are reaching a dangerously high level, the person has hot red skin, slurred speech, rapid pulse, headache, dilated pupils and perhaps muscle spasms. Cooling the internal organs should be done with cool liquids, and a cold cloth around the neck to cool the blood. Cooling the skin with a cold wet towel can bring down the temperature of the skin, but the most danger arises from the internal organs being too hot. Many athletes have died suddenly from a heart attack brought on by heat stroke.

WATCH YOUR KIDS!

Children under the age of 10, and especially under age 5, require constant monitoring in hot weather. Children can ignore symptoms, or not understand what is happening to them, when heat exhaustion is present. Make sure small children have plenty to drink and have frequent resting times out of the sun. Wading pools are great for toddlers, and so are splash parks. Travelling with children in hot weather can be dangerous for them if they do not have frequent drinks. Follow all of the advice that applies above, and watch your children carefully.

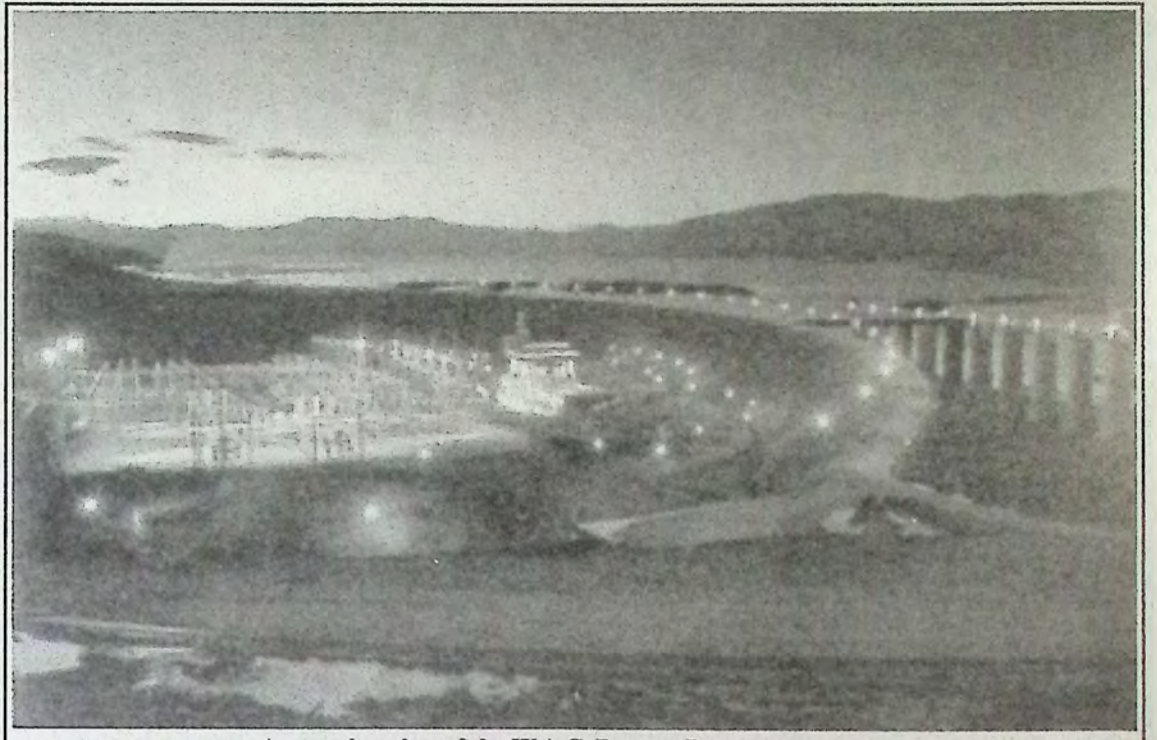

BC 50 YEARS
The Best Place on Earth

The W.A.C. Bennett Dam
INSIGHTS INTO BC'S HISTORY

The W.A.C. Bennett Dam is a large hydroelectric earth fill dam on the Peace River, in Northern British Columbia. The dam is located 12 miles west of Hudson's Hope and 53 miles northwest of Chetwynd and is named after the late former Premier William A. C. Bennett and came online in 1968.

The complex consists of the main earth-filled dam, which holds back Williston Lake, and the underground Gordon M. Shrum Generating Station. It is one of the largest hydroelectric dams in the World.

It was originally conceived by the British Columbia Electric Company (now BC Hydro) under the direction of Dal Grauer. The assets of the private electric utility company were expropriated by the Provincial Government just before construction of the Peace River dam was about to commence.

Dal Grauer quit the Company and was soon followed by his head of operations for the dam project who was now being asked to work under the direction of two political appointees, Gordon Shrum and Robert Bonner.

After the dam was built and the reservoir flooded to create what was the largest man-made lake in the World, the heads of the Provincial Government, Bennett and Williston, named both the dam and the lake after themselves.

Premier Bennett absolved his

Government of all responsibility for the aboriginal inhabitants of the valley, the Tsay Keh Dene, who had been formerly known as the Ingenka band.

Some 125 families were moved from their traditional village site, where they supported themselves by hunting and trapping, to what was supposed to be a model reserve over 100 miles away near the mill town of Mackenzie. The entire band received a total compensation of \$35,000.

The move was a disaster for the Tsay Keh Dene, many of whom spoke no English and over the following two years many drifted away. Some returned to Ingenika Point, a low bluff overlooking the water that now covered their traditional home.

In 1988 minister Stephen Rogers called the conditions that they were living in as "The most primitive I have ever seen." A great many of the Band ended up living shortened lives on the streets of Prince George and Vancouver.

The Tsay Ke Dene finally received additional compensation from the Province in the fall of 2006.

The man born on September 6th, 1900, at Hastings, New Brunswick and who was usually referred to as W.A.C. Bennett, but to many, affectionately or mockingly, was simply "Wacky" Bennett, lived for another eleven years until 1979

when on February 23rd, aged 78, he passed away. The dam bearing his name stands as a lasting monument to a person who, in anyone's book, was an extraordinary man.

He was a hardware store proprietor in Kelowna before becoming the Conservative MLA for the South Okanagan. Bennett then changed sides to become an Independent MLA, before joining the Social Credit League.

When, in 1952, the minority Socred Government first gained power, he defeated Philip Gaglardi for the position of Party Leader and Premier elect on July 15th, 1952 with a majority of one, the voting being 10-9 in his favour.

Creole Grilled Rice Pilaf

(WITH SPICY STEAK)

(NC)—When it's too hot to cook inside, keep the house cool by preparing your entire meal on the grill. Serve with a leafy green salad for a delicious summer supper.

- 1-1/2 lb trimmed, 1-inch (5 cm) thick, top sirloin steaks (about 2 steaks) 750 g
- 1/4 cup honey mustard 50 mL
- 3 cloves garlic, minced
- 1 tsp dried oregano 15 mL
- 1 tsp each paprika, salt and pepper 5 mL
- 4 tsp hot pepper sauce (to taste) 20 mL
- 3 tbsp canola oil (divided) 45 mL
- 1 cup each chopped onion, green pepper and celery 250 mL
- 1 cup U.S. long grain white rice 250 mL
- 1-1/2 cups each chicken broth and seeded, diced tomato 375 mL
- 1/2 cup white wine 125 mL
- 2 bay leaves
- 1/2 cup chopped green onion 125 mL
- 2 tbsp finely chopped 30 mL
- green olives (optional)
- Lemon wedges

Steak: Place steaks on a plate. In a small bowl, blend honey mustard with garlic, oregano, paprika, salt and pepper. Divide mustard mixture in half. Stir the hot pepper sauce and 1 tbsp (15 mL) of the oil into one portion; rub evenly over the steak. Reserve steak at room temperature for 15 minutes. Turn one burner on the grill to medium-high, one to medium setting. Place a foil lasagna pan over the medium burner. Add remaining oil, onion, green pepper and celery to the foil pan. Cook, stirring often, for about 5 minutes. Add rice and remaining mustard mixture; stir to coat each grain of rice. Stir in chicken broth, tomato, white wine and bay leaves. Cover pan with a baking sheet (to act as a lid). Close BBQ lid and cook for 20 minutes, stirring occasionally. Remove pan from the grill and let rest for 5 minutes. Stir in the green onion and olives (if using). Discard bay leaves. Fluff rice with a fork and season with additional hot sauce to taste. Meanwhile, grill steak over the medium-high burner for 6 to 8 minutes per side or until cooked to preferred doneness. Rest for 5 minutes. Slice steak thinly across the grain. Arrange the steak decoratively over the rice. Serve with lemon wedges. Makes 6 servings. Source: www.riceinfo.com

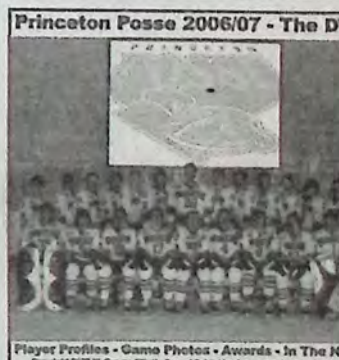

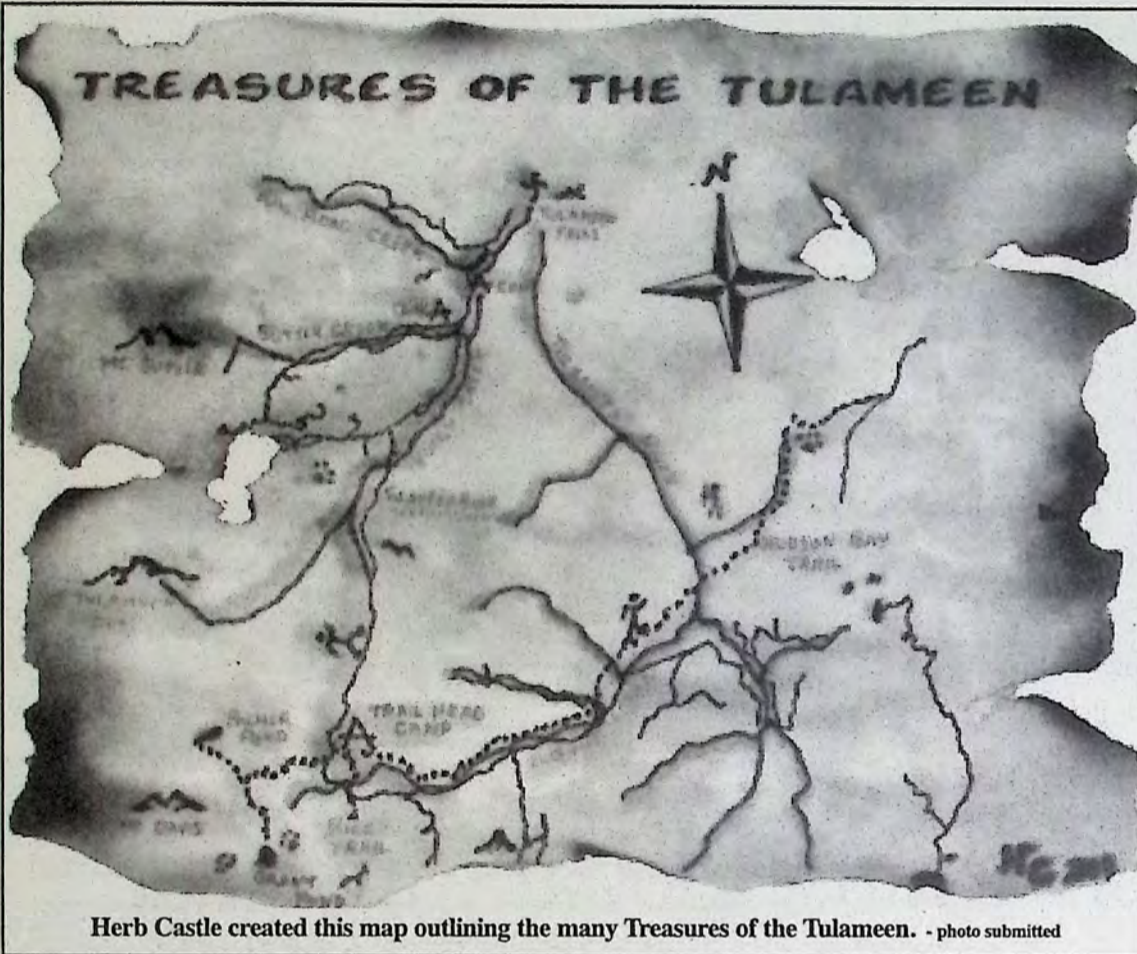

Treasures of the Tulameen

Honour the past, experience the present on July 26th, 2008

"Here they can relive history and most important live as part of nature rather than apart from her" - Harley Hatfield, Okanagan Historical Society, Volume 40, 1976

The beginning...

I have been asked how I became involved in the Treasures of the Tulameen project. To answer that question I will have to take you back. My love of the area began long before I was involved in preservation or helping develop the area for recreational use. I have been visiting this region for many years. Many local families have been exploring and enjoying this area since the early seventies. There is something special about the Tulameen area that speaks to my heart. It draws me back, time and again. It revives and rejuvenates me. One of my friends jokes that when I finally leave this world a helicopter will have to be hired to spread my ashes. I have such a list of beloved places on which I would like my remains to be spread that she says only a helicopter could get the job done in a reasonable amount of time. Given my passion for the area it was inevitable that I would become involved.

...the name...

Where does the name 'Treasures' come from? To be honest, I am not sure. It appeared on a draft brochure I was preparing as I became immersed in project details. I typed the name as a

working title without giving it much thought. The inspiration: my love of the area. It was full of treasures from waterfalls to pristine mountain ponds. The name stuck despite initial misgivings. The more research and work I did on the project the more obvious it became that 'treasures' was the perfect description. "Tulameen" was derived from the native band "Zu'tsamEn" or "Red Paint Band." The red paint refers to a red ochre rock that is found on the banks of the river closer to Princeton.

...the beauty...

I cannot describe the beauty or mystique of this area. It must be experienced. I encourage locals and visitors to get out and explore the area. We are fortunate to live surrounded by such natural beauty. The official opening is a way to challenge people to investigate this breathtaking area and take a guided hike to Palmer Pond and witness its wonder.

The best example I can give of Tulameen's natural beauty and history combining to create magic is the following:

I was working on the Treasures of the Tulameen project with Sharon Anderson near Horse Guard Camp. Horse Guard Camp is located below a sheer rock bluff wall on a dramatic bend of the Tulameen River. After working in the area most of the day we began hiking back to base camp. As we departed, Sharon remarked wistfully, "If you listen carefully you can almost hear

Blackeyes. I keep expecting to see him walking over the next rise."

History

The Treasures of the Tulameen project became a distant possibility in June 2005 when the responsibility for managing recreation sites and trails was transferred from the Ministry of Forests and Range (MFR) to the Ministry of Tourism, Sport & the Arts (MOTSA) as part of a government initiative to integrate the various tourism and recreation programs in British Columbia. Since its inception as a new ministry, MOTSA has developed many programs linking tourism and recreation setting the stage for the 'Treasures' project.

A network of designated government recreation trails already existed in this area but needed a little tender loving care. Some of these trails needed mapping and minor work. Others needed to be relocated as it had been years since anyone had used or maintained them. This is when I became officially involved, in the summer of 2005. Ed Abels, MOTSA Recreation Officer announced a new contract to locate and map these recreation trails. I was thrilled to be awarded the contract. After I had completed the commitment, Ed and I sat down and evaluated the trails and their attributes. A combination of the historical significance, the existing recreational camping sites and the natural attractions continued on Page 16

BC is taking action against global warming.

Many parts of BC have been warming at a rate that is twice the global average. It isn't hard to see the impact that climate change has already had on our province: the mountain pine beetle epidemic, the storms that devastated Stanley Park, the floods of 2007, the loss of water supply to over 900,000 people in 2006, the wildfires of 2003 and the depletion of our glaciers.

These effects of global warming have already taken a heavy toll on our economy, our natural resources and people's homes and livelihoods. It's clear that it's hurting our province. It's time for all of us to take action.

- 11 of the last 12 years were among the warmest ever since 1850.
- Over the last century, BC has lost up to 50 per cent of its snow packs, and glaciers have melted away.
- Warm winters have created the mountain pine beetle epidemic.
- 80 per cent of our pine forests will be "red and dead" by 2013.

How you can benefit from BC's carbon tax shift.

On July 1, 2008 a carbon tax on fossil fuel emissions was introduced. What this means to you is 2.34 cents per litre added to your cost of gas. In BC, 36% of all greenhouse gas emissions come from transportation. It's estimated that BC's carbon tax will save up to 3 million tonnes of CO² emissions annually; this is equal to taking nearly 790,000 cars off the road each year.

With even small adjustments you can reduce your fuel usage. In fact, most drivers can offset their carbon tax with one less fill-up per year.

By law, every penny of the carbon tax must be used to cut other taxes.

In fact, over the next 3 years, over \$1.8 billion will be returned to individuals and businesses in reduced taxes.

You choose, you save.

- If you drive only 5% less a year, you can typically save twice what you will pay in carbon tax over the next two years.
- If you drive a Ford Ranger 30,000 Km per year, you can save \$535 on fuel by driving 10% less. That's over five times more in savings than the \$84 you would otherwise pay this year in carbon tax.
- If you are buying a new car or truck, you can save up to \$4,000 this year in sales tax by choosing a fuel-efficient vehicle.
- Trade-in your old vehicle for a cleaner one and you can save up to \$2,000 or more under the expanded province-wide "Scrap-it" program.
- Keeping your car or truck tuned up and your tires properly inflated can save you \$200 a year in fuel costs.



Income taxes decreased on July 1st.

New tax relief is a key part of the carbon tax shift. On July 1st, 2008 provincial income taxes were reduced. On July 1st, 2009 they will be reduced again. While pollution will cost more, income will be taxed less and take-home pay will grow. Lower income earners will be eligible for an additional tax credit and every woman, man and child in BC will receive a \$100 cheque from the Climate Action Dividend.

Businesses will also see their income taxes cut over the next few years to become the lowest in Canada. As well, other new measures will provide new sales tax exemptions, financial incentives and cash rebates to reward "carbon smart" choices. These are all in an effort to conserve energy, reduce waste, increase fuel efficiency and promote cleaner transportation.

- British Columbia has the lowest personal income taxes in Canada at every level up to \$111,000.
- New tax cuts will save most families between \$100 and \$400 this year, net of the carbon tax, even if they do nothing to reduce their emissions.
- A single parent earning \$30,000 per year, with one child, will typically save \$285 net of their carbon tax this year and will save \$196 net next year.
- Since 2001, over 100 tax cuts have been introduced in British Columbia.
- All taxpayers earning over \$30,000 a year have had their provincial income taxes reduced by at least 30-37%.
- Low income taxpayers earning under \$20,000 a year have had a 75% tax cut since 2001.
- Provincial income taxes were eliminated completely for everyone earning under \$15,500 a year; 250,000 more citizens now pay no provincial income taxes at all.

It's time to lead on climate change.

Together, we can meet BC's new legal target to reduce our provincial greenhouse gas emissions by 33% over the next 12 years. It won't be easy and it will oblige us all to change. But, we can achieve that target in ways that will save us energy, time and money, while also improving our air, water quality, and stimulating innovation, investment and job creation.

We can't wait for others to tackle global warming. Waiting for others to act is not a solution, it's just an avoidance of our responsibility. Unless we act today, it will be our children and their families who will pay the biggest price.

The time has come to act – to reduce our own emissions and lighten our carbon footprint. That is what BC's new carbon-tax shift is all about.

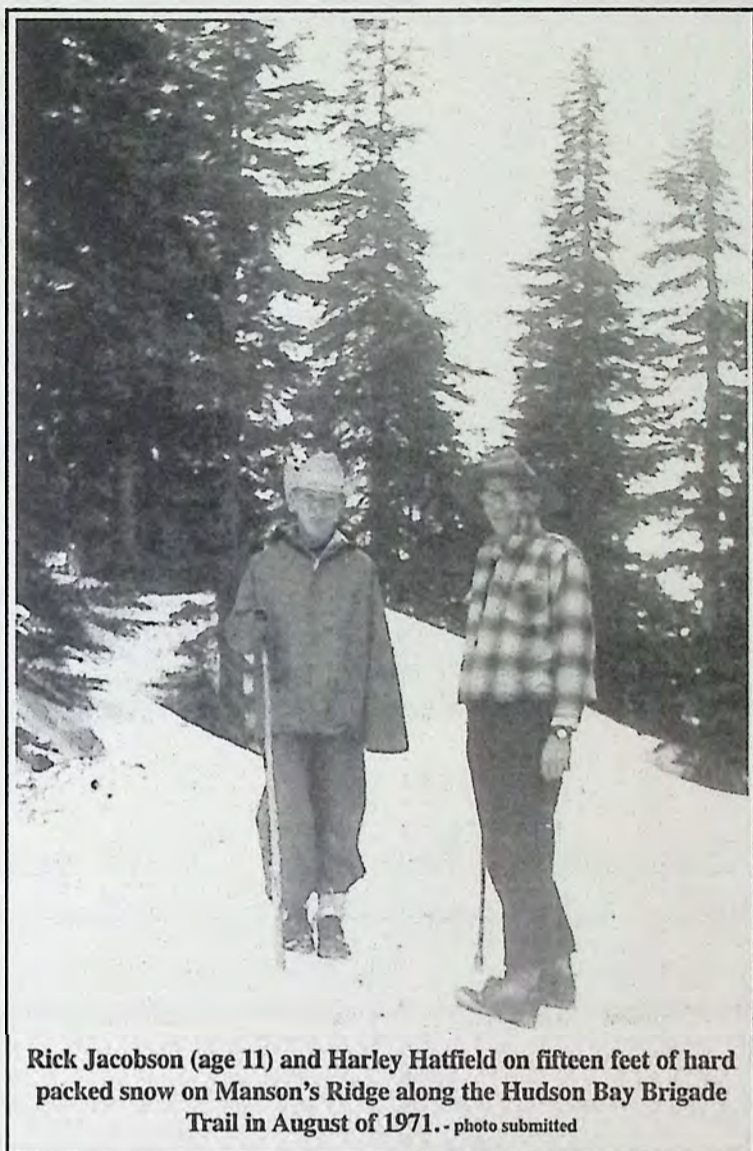

..... continued from Page 13 along the Tulameen River made the area unique. There was enormous potential for both local and out of town tourist activities. The growing demand for tourist activities that promote active lifestyles while minimizing environmental impact was a perfect fit for the area. From a historical perspective our initiative to revitalize and enhance tourism and recreation in this area was well timed. Our project coincided with the planned celebrations for the 150th birthdays of British Columbia in 2008 and Princeton in 2010.

The Treasures of the Tulameen trails were the first overland routes to the interior that carried supplies inland and furs back to the coast. The passages through the mountains were first established to access the traditional hunting grounds of the Similkameen Aboriginal people. Blackeyes, the "Headman" of the tribe, frequented the area and led the first white men through the rugged country. The Hudson Bay Company used the established paths as the main commerce routes in British Columbia from 1846-1861. Most of this area is still pristine and allows people the opportunity to experience nature in an undisturbed setting while retracing the routes used by their forefathers.

These trails were preserved

through the efforts and foresight of many people and organizations. If not for their interest and dedication to locate, identify, and document the trails we would not be aware of them today. In the summers of 1937 and 1938, Podunk Davis, a long time Princeton area trapper and prospector, accompanied by John C. Goodfellow, retraced sections of the Hudson Bay Company route around Lodestone Lake and Horseguard Camp.

Throughout the 1960s and 70s a group of dedicated and enthusiastic people from the Okanagan Similkameen Parks Society and the Okanagan Historical Society located and mapped these important routes. Subsequently they managed to convince the government that in order to protect the trails they must be declared Heritage Trails. Clearing of these trails was done with the help of many Boy Scouts. Some local Boy Scouts were Terry Wright and Rick Jacobson who traveled sixty miles on foot from Jacobson Lake to Hope in August of 1971. Terry was a reluctant participant but went along 'because someone thought it was a good idea.' Rick Jacobson was the youngest of the group of twenty-nine and was commended for carrying his pack the entire trip without a complaint.

Locating and clearing the trails was a laborious endeavor as

described by Eric Jacobson of Princeton. He spent many years searching the area with his good friend Harley Hatfield of Pentiction along with many other volunteers from various parts of the province. Harley even went as far as England to gather information from the Hudson Bay Company Archives. Harley Hatfield was rewarded for his dedication to the locating and re-marking of these historic trails with a Heritage Canada Award. Mr. Bob Harris, member of the North Shore Hikers and the Vancouver Natural History Society, described by Harley as 'mapmaker par excellence,' sketched and produced all the maps. Mr. Harris, an engineer by profession, served with the Royal Engineers but was a historian at heart. In more recent years, many horsemen and women have volunteered their time and efforts to maintain sections of these trails.

Uniting the past with the present brought about the creation of the "Treasures of the Tulameen" concept. Ed Abel's commitment to this project went well above his obligations as Recreation Officer for this area. Working with Ed on this project has given me a whole new appreciation for the area that I once hiked solely for personal enjoyment. Long time local residents have provided a wealth of historical information. For example, Eric Jacobson and Danny Rice were instrumental in confirming places and names of the past. Their stories and recollections, as well as their devotion to the restoration of the trail are admirable. I am grateful to these people for helping ensure the preservation of accurate historical details and for sharing their remarkable stories.

On July 26th, 2008, focus will be on this area rich in history and abundant natural beauty. The public will gather for a celebration. The ceremony will honour the pioneers of this province and the Treasures of the Tulameen, an area many have dedicated to preserve and protect for present and future generations. Rationing the donations

One of the things I've noticed most of us business owners have in common in Princeton is the flood of requests we get for donations.

It slows down every now and then, but on the average week we get asked for some sort of contribution to a worthy cause probably once every other day. The requests come in e-mail, over the phone through the fax machine, through personal contact on the street and through the front door. As much as I'd like to help each and every cause, it's impossible so I've had to ration my donations.

I'm also aware of the fact I'm not the only business owner in town doing this.

Don't get me wrong, we do what we can in many different ways, but sometimes it feels as if all we are doing is giving and not receiving.

Typically we give ALL non-profit groups a cut in the advertising, which, in many cases, we can tell is appreciated greatly. Other times we aren't so sure.

For example, one group once appealed to us for free advertising for an event they were hosting that they were charging a healthy fee for tickets. We understand the concept of fundraising, but after we gave the group our standard advertising discount (25% off, if you really must know) they expected us to purchase tickets at full price.

I think I was more insulted than anything else, but I got over it.

By contrast, another group invites us to two of their annual events, feeds us, makes sure we have a wonderful social experience with their group and includes us as much as they can in the other events they host. They know we're going to talk about them in the paper, so it's probably worth it to them to do what they do, which we also appreciate.

And they are a fun bunch of volunteers to be around, which takes the 'work' part out of the equation.

Overall I don't mind the flood of requests. What gets me is the ones that don't remember our name, forget to thank us, get upset when we say no or assume we are just going to fall over ourselves to help because they happen to represent Group X.

Helpful Hint: Someone else was already here an hour ago telling me the same thing about Group Y and someone else will be here tomorrow to tell me the same thing about Group Z.

I should clarify, some of these are groups from out of town trying to take a chunk out of an already small piece of the pie and take it out of the Valley. The majority of local groups have a better handle on the community and understand all business owners are getting hit up for something on a regular basis.

Some have actually figured out some business owners talk to each other about these things. And sometimes their timing is just off.

The other side of the coin is that if it wasn't for the generosity of local businesses, many of these groups could not continue to function nor could they afford to host their annual events.

Something to consider the next time someone says in a meeting it's time to canvass businesses for more donations.

Cash and Carbon Tax: A dumb idea

My husband and I have received \$100 each from the government. Along with the cash was a letter telling us this was a way to encourage us to reduce our carbon impact on the planet.

This is one of the dumbest ideas to come along in a long time. At our house, we use those power-saving light bulbs, drive a fuel efficient car, use as little natural gas as possible (to save money) and we recycle everything we can. We are earth-conscious people.

For people like us, and probably for the majority of British Columbians, reducing our carbon impact any further would mean going to solar power. That would do more for the planet than anything else we could do right now.

I believe our provincial government and our federal government could do a lot more with our tax dollars than doling out \$100 to each of us.

What can we do with \$100 to reduce our carbon? Could we buy a new furnace to run on electricity?

No.

I cannot think of one effective thing we could do that would reduce our carbon output with only \$100 to spend.

I do not believe our government really wants to reduce the carbon in our atmosphere. If reducing carbon was the goal, they would have established a fund to help us turn to solar powered homes.

Let's say two million British Columbians receive \$100 each every year. This creates a fund of \$200,000,000 per year to assist homeowners to convert to solar power.

At a rate of \$40,000 per home, the government could assist 5,000 homeowners per year. I believe a reduction of gas or oil heating by 5,000 homes per year would make a significant decrease in carbon emissions. At the same time, the solar powered homes would feed

back into the electrical power grid and bring revenue to power-hungry cities south of the border.

Dumb idea for the north

Residents of our northern territories are already complaining about the carbon tax, asserting it is a dumb idea for the north.

Residents of the territories no longer live in igloos and burn whale oil, but Ottawa has not noticed this change. Residents of the territories are oil and gas dependent, and this will hurt them a lot.

What do the residents of the northern territories want? They want the government to help them develop solar power systems to heat their homes, or provide some other system (whale oil is out: we're trying to save whales).

What should we be promoting?

Solar power is not the only option for reducing carbon emissions from our homes.

We could be building different kinds of homes, such as cordwood, compacted earth, and straw bale homes, which are more energy efficient. Just try to get a building permit! These kinds of homes are not included in most building code books, and everybody must adhere to the local building codes.

We could have programs to retrofit for better insulation. This

would cost more than \$100, but would be a better way to spend tax dollars if you really want to save the planet.

Nobody wants to talk about stopping air travel, but airplanes put carbon directly into our atmosphere in the most blatant way. Why not make air travel so expensive that people go back to railroads and ships, which are more energy efficient?

The city syndrome

I watch a Vancouver channel every morning, and news broadcasts are regularly interrupted for an update on traffic. I see thousands of cars converging on the city for the day's work. Taxing those people makes good sense, in my opinion, unless they do not have the option of taking any other form of transportation.


Why are there so many cars on the highway in the Lower Mainland? Could the government look a lot more closely at cities and find out what incentive could take the vehicles off the streets?

I invite all of you to share your ideas on creative, sensible ways to reduce carbon emissions for our planet, except for one: do not say electric cars.

Do you know how much pollution takes place to manufacture one automobile?

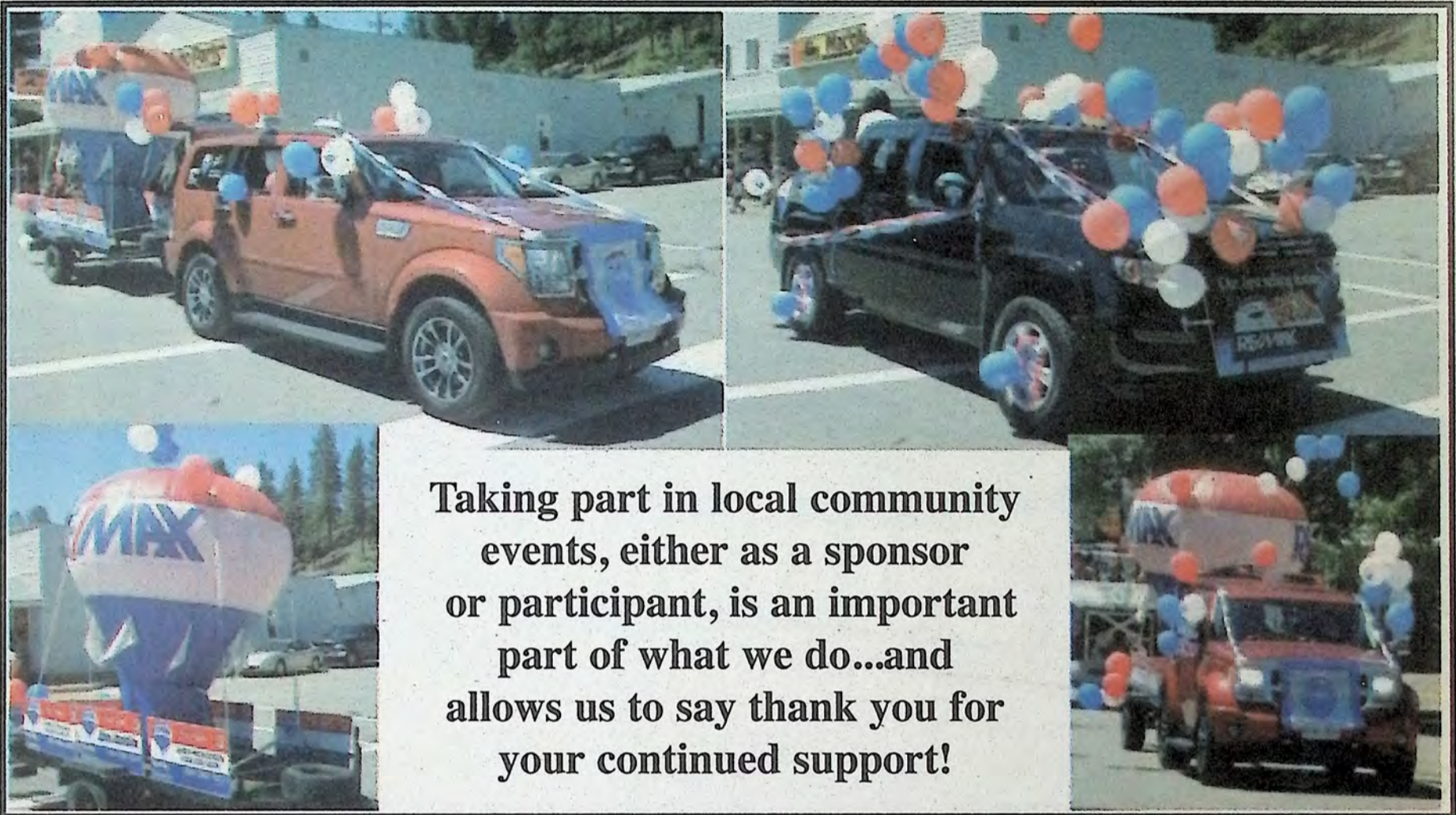
