## Council likes 'idle-free' program

Angele Clarke gave Town Council a new goal for keeping our air clean: discourage drivers from allowing their vehicles to idle. Council thinks the "idle free" campaign is excellent.

Clarke showed an example of the signage to be used in locations where engine idling is a problem. Council, and all of the gallery, immediately agreed a sign should be placed at the Post Office.

Clarke exploded some myths about idling.

**Myth** - it takes more gas to stop and restart an engine than it does to

idle it.

**Fact** - 10 seconds of idling uses more gas than turning off the engine and restarting it.

**Myth** - Idling helps the engine warm up.

**Fact** - Today's engines warm up best by slow driving at start.

**Myth** - Idling is better for the engine than turning it on and off.

**Fact** - Today's starters tend to outlast the life of the vehicle. Idling builds up gunk on the pistons.

Council will make arrangements for putting up signs to discourage engine idling.

## Fair entries timetable and rules

Are you planning exhibits for the fair on September 6 and 7? You will need this information!

Exhibits can be brought to the fair between 3:00 PM and 7:00 PM on Thursday, September 4, and from 12 Noon to 7:00 PM on Friday, September 5. People planning to bring livestock should register their exhibits on these days, even though they will not bring the livestock to the fair until Saturday morning.

Note: Thursday is the best day to register non-perishables, such as woodworking, photography and needlework. Perishable items, such as flowers, vegetables and baking, should be entered on Friday. This applies to Junior Fair exhibitors as well as adult exhibitors.

Exhibitors are expected to complete their own entry forms (there is a form in each exhibitor's booklet). Exhibitors will be given a tag for each item. Any entries unrecorded or fees unpaid are not eligible for prizes. Exhibitors may enter only one item per class (e.g. only one jar of strawberry jam). Classes are numbered.

Judging will take place after 7:00 PM Friday, September 5. Decision of the judges is final. During judging, only judges and convenors will be allowed in buildings.

Educational material provided with the exhibit will earn higher rating in most divisions.

Exhibit buildings will be open to the public from 10:00 AM to 5:00 PM on Saturday and from 10:00 AM to 3:00 PM on Sunday.

Exhibits may not be removed before 3:00 PM Sunday. At this time, items donated for the auction will be gathered. The Fair Board will provide stickers to go on exhibits intended for donation for

the auction.

All animals are to be kept under control by the owner. Cages are provided for poultry, but the owner is expected to care for the birds. Exhibitors of rabbits and caveys must provide their own cages. Pens are provided for larger livestock, but the owner is responsible for food and water.

All dogs must be on a leash unless

competing in dog trials. All animal droppings must be disposed of by the owner.

**Livestock and dogs NOT in competition are not to be on the fairgrounds.**

Prize money will be available after 4:00 PM on Saturday, except for those competing in the horseshoe tournament or for any class not judged by that time.

### Town council praises heritage events

Both the Museum Society tea party and the Traditional Music Festival came in for high praise from Town Council. At the August 18 Council meeting, all members of Council congratulated the Museum Society and the Traditional Music Society on the success of their events.

Mayor Randy McLean stated, "These are what small towns have always been about. Take away television and computers, and think

back 30 or 40 years, and this is the real small town."

Another comment was about how great it was to see Princeton residents singing together at the music festival.

Jon Bartlett told Council the performers were delighted with their audience and are eager to come back next year.

They loved the appreciative audience and the way people joined in the fun.

### Council puts town square on hold

The Town Square project was budgeted for \$600,000 but the quotes came in at over \$1 million.

Town Council has cancelled the tender and is looking for alternatives. Council is looking at local

capabilities to bring the project in within the scope of the budget.

The town square, to be called Veterans' Square, was to have gone into construction this summer.

# Copper Mountain Mining Corporation outlines mine plan

Jim O'Rourke, Chief Executive Officer for Copper Mountain Mining Corporation, presented the company's plans to Town Council on August 18. He outlined the plans for a new mine and milling facility to be located on the Copper Mountain side of the Similkameen River.

The plan calls for expenditure of \$437 million to develop the mine, with an estimated \$149 million per year in operating costs. The mine will employ 274 people, with an estimated 685 "spin-off" jobs (jobs generated as a result of the mine, but not paid directly by the mine). Wages are planned at an average of \$22 per hour for an annual payroll of \$16 million per year.

O'Rourke gave some of the history of the mine site, which has been mined for 80 years. He said there is no history of acid rock drainage due to the kind of rock found in Copper Mountain. The site is a 6,700 hectare property having 135 Crown grants, 132 mining claims and 14 mining licences. Copper Mountain Mining Corp. bought the property from Princeton Mining last year, and is carrying out a program of drilling and testing. A feasibility study was completed July 28, but the Board of Directors has made no decision to proceed at this point. The company is looking for project financing and construction approval.

The mine itself will amalgamate all three former pits into one "super-pit". The existing tailings site will be used and water will be reclaimed. The rock extracted will be hauled by 13 240 ton trucks, crushed and moved to a SAG mill then into ball mills. Following the

ball mill fine grind process, the dust will go into flotation tanks to separate the metal from the rock. Gold and silver will be extracted along with copper to form what is known as "concentrate". The concentrate will be shipped to Asia, probably Japan, for smelting.

The company will monitor 12 water sampling sites but due to there being no acid rock, no water problems are anticipated. The company will post a \$3.35 million reclamation bond.

The mining operation is expected to last 15 years, but thanks to new

exploration technology used this year, the life of the mine could last longer, depending on copper prices.

O'Rourke asked for Town Council's support for development of the mine, and members of Council enthusiastically endorsed the plan.

# Seniors fear property sale

Princeton residents living in Burr's Trailer Court on Penryn Avenue are afraid of what may happen to their homes. The property is for sale, and it has never been zoned as a mobile home park. The zoning is medium density residential, and a new owner may decide to turn the property to a different use, such as condominium development. Residents could face a future without a place to put their homes.

Residents of Burr Trailer Court brought their fears to Town Council on August 18, asking if Council could assist them in any way to preserve their homes. Most of the residents are senior citizens who have lived in the park for many years.

Speaking on behalf of the manufactured home owners, Julia Gully, of Merritt, explained to Town Council the precarious future these seniors may face. She spoke of her

own experience in the Lower Mainland, where the mobile home park in which she lived was sold and converted to another use. She and other park residents were

forced to move, and had a difficult time finding other parks that would accept them. She moved to Merritt at a cost of \$12,000. She suggested the Town buy it and retain it as an

affordable housing site.

Mayor Randy McLean told the group Council has some options but preferred to discuss the options before making a decision.

# Town plans dyke upgrades

The firm of Kerr Wood Leidal has completed an assessment of dyking along the Tulameen and Similkameen Rivers within Town boundaries. A number of flaws were identified, most of which were concerned with the height of the dykes and the quality of dyke construction.

The dyke assessment for the Tulameen River states, "The existing dyke was constructed out of material that was readily available; however, this material would not be considered appropriate for dyke construction today. The dyke crest along this section is also nar-

row (< 4 m) and the dyke is encroached upon by buildings and roads, which further complicates dyke upgrades."

The assessment recommends raising the level of the dyke as well as widening the dyke, as well as expanding the landside toes of the

dyke wherever possible. The same recommendation applies to the dyke along the Similkameen River.

An application for funding is being made at this time. Until funding is secured, there is no schedule for reconstruction work.

**Village Council issues meeting highlights**

Keremeos Village Council highlights from the August 18th regular council meeting include:

- Council heard from a delegation of residents of the Oasis Mobile Home Park who are concerned about their future in the park. The property is up for sale, and a sale may be more imminent as sewer servicing to the property is scheduled to be available in the upcoming months. Russell Edgington, representing the mobile home residents requested that Council consider instituting a policy that would place relocation assistance requirements on a developer to aid the residents in relocation, should the property get redeveloped.

Mayor Walter Despot noted that the property is currently zoned R-5 (Mobile Home Park) and any new owner wanting to redevelop would have to apply to Council to rezone the property for a different use. Council could place restrictions or conditions on any redevelopment, and is supportive of mobile home parks as part of affordable housing stock in the Village.

It was agreed by Council that staff would investigate the policy recently adopted by the City of Penticton and bring forward a proposal for Keremeos that would provide some protection for mobile home park residents on lands that have the potential for redevelopment.

- The Mayor presented a 'thank you' plaque provided to the Village by the Soberiders for the continued support they received from Keremeos for their annual event.

- The Mayor asked the public to be diligent about vandalism occurring in the community and reminded people to contact the local RCMP if they see any vandalism taking place anywhere in the Village.

- Council discussed the issue of the pea gravel in Pine Park and reiterated their earlier comments about being asked to change the material because of the complaints of one resident. Interior Health officials have asked that the material be removed and replaced as they are of the opinion that the material is not as impact absorbing as it should be. Council is now deliberating this request based on costs associated with the purchase of new material, material removal,

trucking and replacement.

- A developer proposing an 18-lot residential development applied to have the requirements for underground wiring along 10th Avenue between 4th and 3rd Streets waived due to the high cost of placing the 3-phase 'feeder' line underground. After hearing from the developer and from several local area residents Council denied the variance application.

- Council appointed Joni Heinrich, CAO, and Louise Johnson, Treasurer to act as Chief Election Officer and Deputy Election Officer respectively for the upcoming general local government election.



### Start a long life with lunch

We want our children to live long, healthy lives. To do this, we need to start early with something as simple as a school lunch.

School is about learning, and learning requires energy. A hungry, malnourished child is not a good learner, but many parents fill the child's lunch bag with junk food that does not lead to learning.

A school lunch should be a balanced meal of protein, carbohydrates and plenty of vitamins and minerals. Protein may come from fish, meat and nuts. Peanut butter is protein food. So is cheese. The bread in a sandwich contains carbohydrates. A serving of soup or salad in a lunch can supply vitamins and minerals. Fruit supplies carbohydrates and vitamins.

A good school lunch needs a lot of variety. It should include plenty of food, because children need a lot of food during the day. A child may not eat all of the lunch at lunch hour, but may want a snack at recess.

Lunch beverages should be limited to milk, fruit juice or vegetable juice. Soft drinks and imitation fruit juice should never be part of a school lunch. These create a sugar "high" that leaves the child in a sugar "low" by the end of the day. A cranky child is not learning.

While you prepare school lunches, teach your children the reasons why you include the foods you pack. This way, you can teach them to be healthy for a lifetime.

#### NOTICE OF CONSULTATION OPPORTUNITY

The public and all persons who believe that their interest may be affected by the proposed bylaws can present written submissions to the Regional District. All written submissions are to be addressed to: Consultation Opportunity - Bylaw Repeal and Re-enactment, c/o Regional District Okanagan-Similkameen. No written submissions will be accepted after September 26, 2008 in order to allow inclusion in a written report for the public hearing. This notice is in addition to the upcoming public hearing proposed to be held October 2, 2008. Formal notice of this public hearing will be forthcoming. This consultation opportunity is provided in part to satisfy the requirements of Section 879 of the Local Government Act.

#### PURPOSE OF REPEAL AND RE-ENACTMENT PROCESS AND BYLAWS:

The intent behind the repeal and re-enactment of all Official Community Plan Bylaws, Zoning Bylaws and Rural Land Use Bylaws enacted within the Regional District is in order to make the bylaws more accessible to the general public by facilitating ease of use and to ensure that the policies, guidelines, and regulations contained in the bylaws have been validly enacted and are enforceable.

The process of making the bylaws more accessible to the general public has involved the consolidation of "general regulations" under a single section of the zoning bylaws; the standardization of the general layout applied to the bylaws; the updating of references to Provincial ministries and agencies (many of which have been renamed or reconstituted); the standardization of the layout of the provisions relating to each individual zone; the standardization of how site specific amendments are introduced; the creation of a uniform list of zones (without altering the list of permitted uses in each zone); and, where appropriate, the standardization and update of definitions found in each of the zoning bylaws. Other minor updating and modernizing revisions to the bylaws are so extensive that they cannot all be listed in this notice. The public is encouraged to view or obtain copies of the bylaws at the address or web site set out below.

The Official Community Plan, Zoning and Rural Land Use Bylaws currently enacted by the Regional District contain provisions that may be or are invalid on the basis that they have no legal authority or were enacted with a procedural defect in the final adoption process. In particular, the Regional District has determined that a number of amendments bylaws to the current Official Community Plan, Zoning and Rural Land Use Bylaws, while having been the subject of sufficient public hearing processes, were deficient in the final process (i. e., the amendment bylaws did not receive necessary provincial approvals). The process of ensuring that the policies, guidelines, and regulations contained in the bylaws have been validly enacted and are enforceable has involved the Regional District reviewing the bylaws and deleting provisions having no legal authority and ensuring that the procedure followed by the Regional District in the adoption of the revised bylaws is correct.

Due to legislative changes enacted in 2001, the Rural Land Use Bylaws currently found in Electoral Area 'F' (Okanagan Lake West/West Bench) and Electoral Area 'H' (Princeton Rural) cannot be carried forward and will be replaced with consistent Official Community Plan and Zoning Bylaws.

### The 9 O'Clock Gun INSIGHTS INTO BC'S HISTORY

It's been hit by lightning, plugged with rocks, short circuited, silenced by work stoppages and even stolen, but Vancouver's famed Nine O'Clock Gun has boomed out the time of day from its home in Stanley Park for over 100 years.

The gun is a 12 pound muzzle-loaded naval cannon which was cast at Woolwich, England in 1816. The crests of King George III and Henry Phipps, 1st Earl of Mulgrave, Master-General of the Ordnance at the time of the casting, are on the barrel.

About 1894 it was brought to Stanley Park by the Department of Marine and Fisheries to warn fishermen of the 18:00 Sunday close of

fishing. It was fired for the first time in Stanley Park on October 15, 1895 at noon.

The 21:00 firing was later established as a time signal for the general population and to allow the chronometers of ships in Port to be accurately set.

Before the cannon was installed, the Brockton Point lighthouse keeper, one William D. Jones, daily at the prescribed hour used to detonate a stick of dynamite over the water!

The cannon was more than 70 years old before it ever got to Vancouver. What had it been doing all that time?

Nobody seems to know, but there is a suggestion that it saw service

in India. What is known for certain is that in 1856 the British Government gave 16 cannons to the "Provinces of Canada", Confederation was still 11 years away.

After a long trip around the Horn, at least three of those cannons got to the Pacific Coast and two of them ended up flanking the entrance to the legislative building in Victoria, these were melted down in 1940 as part of the World War II effort. The third and surviving cannon is indeed the Nine O'Clock Gun.

The cannon eventually had an electronic trigger installed and is nowadays activated from the harbor master's perch on top of a building situated near Canada Place.

The 9 O'Clock Gun has been silent on at least four occasions; once during World War II, in 1969 when it was stolen and held by UBC Engineering students until a "Ransom" was donated to BC Children's Hospital, in 2007 during a work stoppage and in 2008 when UBC Engineering students painted it red.

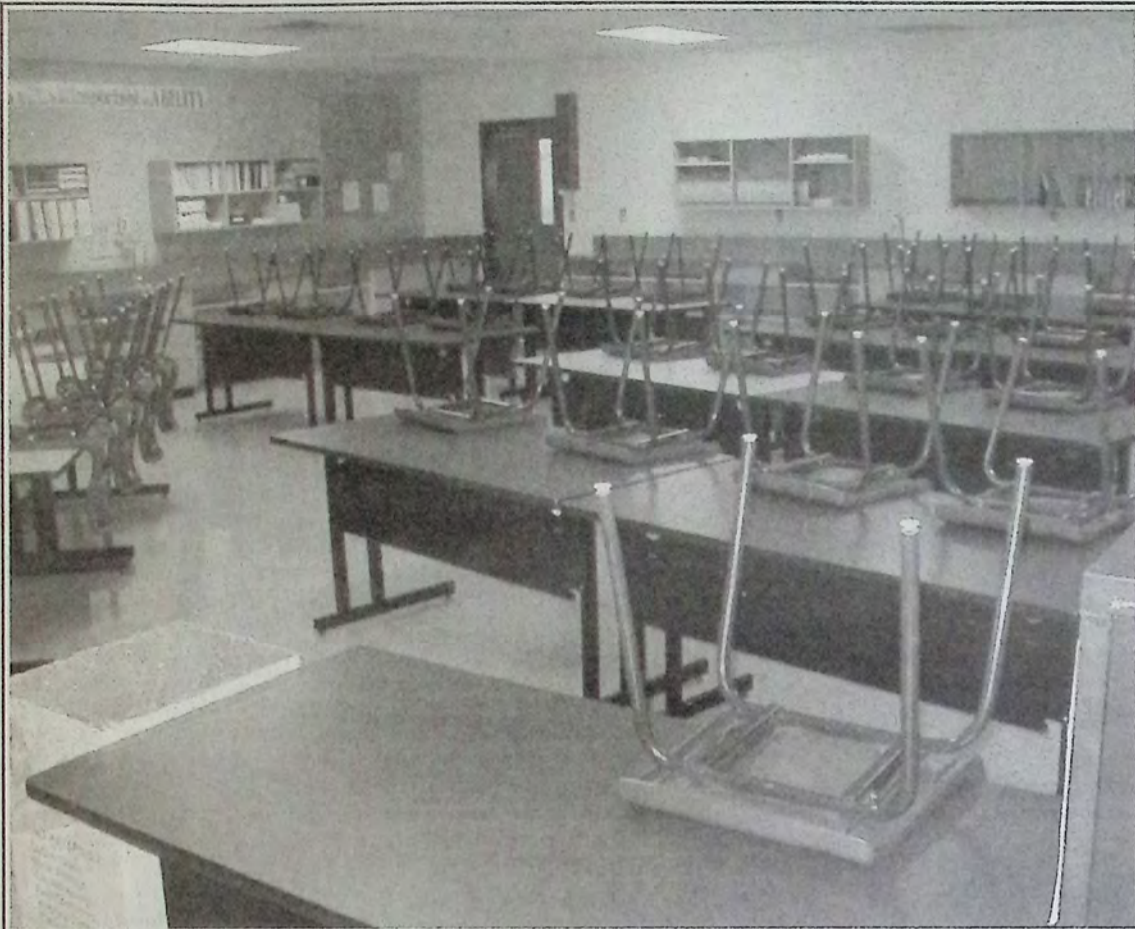
After the 1969 theft, the cannon was surrounded by a stone and metal enclosure. The gun was restored and a new pavilion built in 1986 as a centennial gift to the City from Ebco Industries, Chester Millar, First Generation Capital and the Hudson's Bay Company.

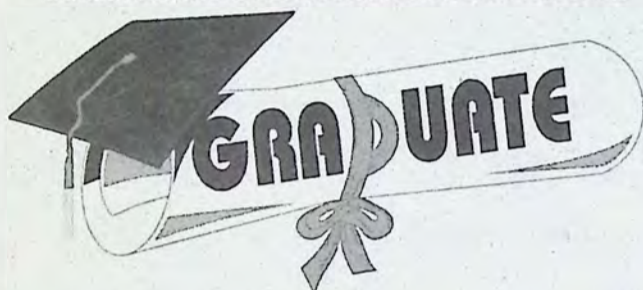

Welcome to the new school year! After a restful summer that went by very quickly we are excited to get back to working with our students.

child's own closet to determine what they have and what they actually need - rather than just shopping blindly - can be a huge money-saver.

Once you've figured out what you have, figure out what you need. Create your shopping list as soon as possible so you can stock up on school supplies and other necessities as they go on sale over the course of the summer.

If your kids are a bit older, why not give them a budget to work with?

Maybe they want to spend \$150 on pair of jeans in the store, but if they only have a budget of \$175 for clothes, they'll start to realize that they have to prioritize and make good choices with their cash. Letting your child choose where to splurge and where to save will provide the child with a sense of autonomy, maturity, and a great life skill.

## Three local swimmers compete at Provincials

Over 1,500 athletes and 200 coaches from across BC, Washington State and Yukon competed in the BC Provincial Championship Swim Meet held in Trail from August 14th to August 17th.

The meet is the largest annual sprint meet in Canada. Amongst the athletes were three members of the Princeton Kokanee Summer Swim Club.

Taylor Carmichael competed in the Division 3 girls (ages 10 1/2 to 12) 50-metre Butterfly, 50-metre Backstroke and the Regional Medley Relay Team. In the fly Carmichael achieved a personal best time and a club record with a time of 38.95-seconds, placing 20th overall.

After a very close race, the team placed second and won the Silver Medal. Carmichael contributed to the team by swimming the lead leg in the backstroke with a personal best time and also breaking the club record with a time of 37.41-seconds.

Mark Cimbaro competed in the Division 6 Boys (ages 15 and 16) 50-metre Freestyle. Cimbaro swam an amazing personal best time of 33.42-seconds placing 24th overall. He improved on his previous personal best by more than 1.3-seconds.

Denis Gutierrez-Ogrinc, the Kokanee Summer Swim Club Head Coach, competed in the Division 7

Boys (ages 17 to 19) 100-metre breaststroke, as well as in the Regional Medley Relay. Gutierrez-Ogrinc swam the breaststroke in 1:29.23, placing 13th overall. His relay team finished 5th.

With the Provincials now complete, the competitive season for Kokanee Summer Swim Club is done for another year.

Planning will begin right away to

help make next years season as successful as this one.



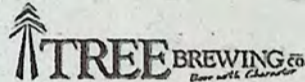

# Roasted Red Pepper & Feta Dip

(NC)—Around this time of year, you can't help but find deliciously fresh, local red peppers in the market. They're inexpensive, plentiful and provide the avid cook with endless recipe possibilities. Here is just one of the many recipes you'll find on [www.homebasics.ca](http://www.homebasics.ca) <<http://www.homebasics.ca>> for the season's best peppers.

### Roasted Red Pepper and Feta Dip

- 2 sweet red peppers
- 1/2 cup Hellmann's Real Mayonnaise
- 1/4 lb feta cheese, cubed
- 1/4 tsp black pepper

On a cookie sheet lined with aluminum foil, broil peppers, turning frequently, about 20 minutes or until skin is blackened and blistered; wrap in foil and let stand 10 minutes.

Remove peppers from foil; peel and cut into chunks, discarding seeds and membranes. In food processor or blender, purée pepper chunks. Add mayonnaise, feta cheese and pepper; process until smooth. Cover and refrigerate until ready to use.

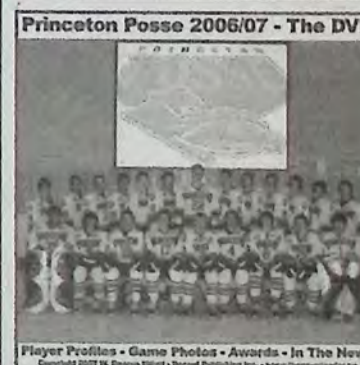

I made a mistake on Sunday.

A huge mistake.

I decided, for some unknown reason, it would be good for my health to walk from our house to somewhere downtown.

I'm not sure why I thought it was such a good idea, but I did.

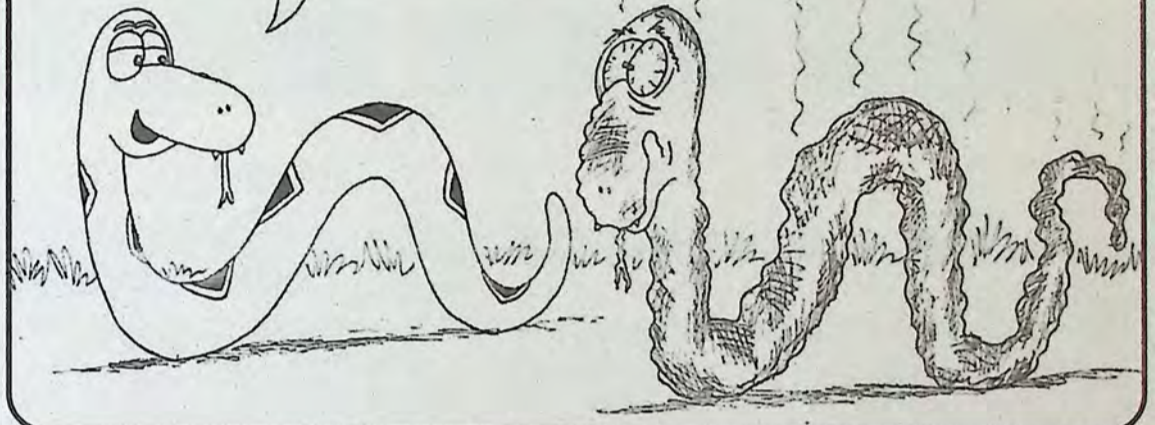

# Teach children to find happiness

Everybody wants to be happy. A lot of people believe they will be happy if they find love, or money, or power. Many people believe they will find happiness through religion or through competing and winning. These are false beliefs on the road to real happiness. We need to teach our children how to find real happiness.

I am sure that many of you are saying to yourselves, right now, "Dawn Johnson is crazy!"

Most of us are so sure we can find happiness only by altering our physical circumstances in some

way, but this is not true.

Many years ago, a group of psychologists, world-wide, decided they were spending too much time and effort trying to fix people who were unhappy, confused, and leading messy lives. These psychologists realized they had no guidelines to define real happiness and no methods to teach people how to become happy. The psychologists embarked on a study of happy people to find out how happy people achieved happiness.

A number of books were written about the findings of the study. One of the best was written by Mihaly Csikszentmihalyi. The book is titled *Flow: The Psychology of Optimal Experience*.

The book gives many examples of people who live happy lives. These happy people are not necessarily wealthy, nor famous, nor even well-educated. The examples come from all over the world and many of these happy people surprised the psychologists by the simplicity of their lives.

What psychologist learned is this: people who set goals and achieve them are happiest. Happy people

set goals, develop skills to achieve the goals, focus their attention on what they are doing, and enjoy the process of reaching their goals. This is what we need to teach our children (and maybe ourselves?)

I am at an age where most people visualize sitting back and just living on their retirement income. Society believes people my age should have achieved their life goals and, if not, it's too late to pursue them. No wonder so many old people are unhappy!

I still set goals, and I derive pleasure from achieving them. Every year, I have a list of things I want to achieve that year, and I derive pleasure from what I achieve. These are personal goals, and I am in charge of achieving them. This is part of the secret of happiness, too. Having somebody else set a goal for you is not the way to happiness. The goal has to be personal and self-motivated.

Teach your children how to find happiness. Teach them to achieve. Encourage them to become the creators of their own happiness, and praise them for their achievements. This is probably the greatest gift you can give them.

## Property sale worries tenant

To The Editor,

You don't know how close you came to seeing my name in the obituary column of the newspaper. Thanks to a good neighbour, she came over.

Because of the threat of losing my home, I have been quite ill as well as others in the park.

The trailer park, behind the Fire Hall on Penryn Avenue, was put up for sale.

How little we knew what was involved, it wasn't the trailer park for sale, but the land.

We are all stunned.

Some owners of trailers have been here since 1973, 1978 and I have been here for 24 years. The rug - so to speak - was pulled from under us. We lose everything, our homes and our investments. Under the Manufactured Home Park Tenancy Act we would get twelve months notice to vacate. We would, of course, be paying rent during these twelve months if we stay the twelve months.

Out we go with nowhere to live. We can't get a mortgage because we are too old even if we had the money, which we don't.

There is no affordable rentable housing in Princeton. We can put our names in for Vermillion Court but in the meantime, where do we live?

Princeton has six mobile home parks. Stop and think if owners sell the land where these homes are situated, where will you go? The mobiles are too old to be moved, they will have to be destroyed.

Ladysmith is a prime example, Clinton and Coquitlam as well. If you read The Province awhile back look what happened to them. They lost their mobile homes out of the blue - the land was sold.

The owners of the parks get the

honey (and so does the realtor) and the developers reap the benefit of new apartment buildings and homes worth over \$300,000.

The mobile home owners are mostly seniors who thought they were able to live their lives peacefully, knowing they had a little money to enjoy.

No, think again.

You have lost everything, home and security. The Minister of Housing has no compassion for them, the attitude being: Buyer Beware.

Princeton mobile home owners, don't be too complacent. Look into whatever agreements you have with your park. Money speaks louder than words and with the possibility of the mine opening here in 2010, with 240 men being hired to work there, where will they find homes? Valuable land sits where your mobiles are.

Our little group have had one briefing with Town Council to let them know of our plight, but without support from the residents of Princeton, we have an uphill battle to save or get fair value for our homes.

Don't let us down, we need your support in body not just verbal.

*Build a sense of teamwork:* Have kids do more than just learn about issues. Encourage them to get involved. Organizing a fundraiser around something like providing clean water in Africa is a great way to get your students together and integrates learning in a fun and meaningful way.

**What supplies do they really need?**

(NC)—Crayons, backpacks, highlighters, computers, new clothes—the list goes on. With back to school advertising seeming to start as soon as the previous school year ends, it's hard for parents to decide exactly what a child needs to learn and perform well at school. How often have you bought something your child really 'needed' at school only to find it in the back of the closet a week later? To find out what items children truly need to learn, we talked to Bruce Herzog, CEO of Christian Children's Fund of Canada, an international children's organization that helps provide school supplies to children in some of the most difficult environments.

"When your classroom is outside under a tree and you come from a family that has trouble putting food on the table, it gives some real perspective about what items are essential to help children learn," said Herzog.

Here are some tips learned to help you choose your back to school purchases:

- Determine needs vs. wants. Kids often say they 'need' something, but are they really expressing a want? Look critically at what resource your child requests. In the case of children in poor communities, Herzog says Christian Children's Fund of Canada's focus is on supplying \$15 school kits with pencils pens, erasers and notebooks.
- Look for items with multiple

was easy, "I felt the site was on the cusp of really taking off. If I hadn't given it a shot, I think I would have regretted it the rest of my life."

So with the company's first employee, Derek rented a small unairconditioned office in downtown Toronto. "I was definitely bootstrapping the business, but years of being a student entrepreneur had prepared me for that. I was passionate about what I was doing. That's the key."

That was three years ago. RedFlagDeals.com has since moved to a much larger office and now has twelve employees in Toronto and Montreal. Szeto offers the following advice for budding student entrepreneurs: "When you're in university, you're surrounded by new ideas and people from every walk of life. Absorb it all and take advantage of everything around you. Opportunities are everywhere."

Has Szeto considered going back to university for a post graduate degree? "Well," he says with a smile, "if I ever sell the company, maybe I'll go back and get an MBA and start another business while I'm there."

In some cases, Herzog says giving children a small erasable blackboard and chalk to do equations and record answers makes more sense than giving a piece of paper that will only be used once. Look for school supplies that can be reused. It is good for your wallet, and the environment.

- Focus on food. Herzog says we often focus on the things kids have in their hands, and not what they need to make their brains work

best. Providing kids with nutritious food is a key part of Christian Children's Fund of Canada's mandate, and something parents here should consider as well. Remember, it's easier to concentrate when a stomach isn't growling and easier to learn when you have the necessary vitamins.

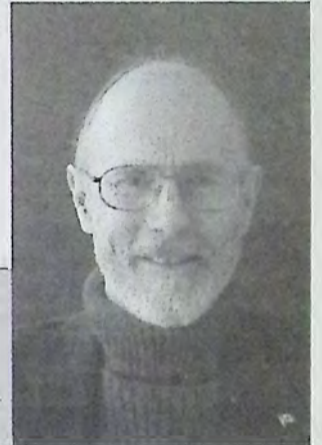
