## Traffic stop yields 132,000+ ecstasy pills

Princeton RCMP and South Okanagan Traffic Section were conducting a traffic check on Highway 3 at Copper Mountain Road on Thursday, August 21st.

At about 1:00 PM police stopped a 1981 Buick Regal with expired licence plates and a temporary operating permit.

Subsequent investigation and search of the vehicle resulted in police seizing an estimated 132,000 ecstasy pills hidden inside the car.

"Four one-kilogram bags were located under the rear seat," says

Princeton RCMP Detachment Sgt. Gary Macahonic.

"In addition, two hidden compartments were discovered in the car's interior, and inside them we found an additional twenty-nine bags of pills for a total of approximately 33-kilograms of Ecstasy."

One adult male and one adult female, both from Vancouver, have been charged with Possession of a Controlled Substance for the Purpose of Trafficking and will appear in Princeton Provincial Court in November.

# Goldcliff reports more good news from Hedley operation

George W. Sanders, President of Goldcliff Resource Corporation (GCN.TSXV), reported August 20th that the initial 2008 results from the stripped area of the Bonanza Trench on the Company's 100%-owned Panorama Ridge property, which is located near Hedley, have significantly expanded the area of high-grade gold values.

The 2008 Bonanza Trench area gold results are highlighted by values of 5.366 ounces per ton gold (oz/t Au), 3.587 oz/t Au, 3.762 oz/t Au and 3.179 oz/t Au, and complemented by numerous sample values ranging from 0.157 to 0.930 oz/t Au. The samples are cut channels of one metre lengths along an orthogonal surveyed sample-grid that is centered around the 2007 high-grade value of 17.368 oz/t Au (595.55 grams per tonne gold).

Based on 55 sample values collected in a 10 square metre area (2.00 by 5.00 metres), the average gold results are 0.790 ounces per ton gold or 27.088 grams per tonne gold. Contained within the 10 square metre area is a 5 square metre area (2.00 by 2.5 metres) in which the average gold results of the 32 samples collected is 1.341 ounces per ton gold or 45.975 grams per tonne gold.

The 2008 sampling program at the Bonanza Trench location consisted of stripping a large surface expo-

sure about 25 metres in the upslope/downslope direction by about 5 metres across slope. This stripped area was systematically sampled as described above. Both photographs and a video clip of this sampling are available on the Company's website at [www.goldcliff.com](http://www.goldcliff.com).

Based on this sampling to date, the high-grade zone appears to be open in a northerly direction and under overburden beyond the stripped area. This area has now been stripped and additional sampling is currently underway. Diamond drilling continues on the Nordic zone. A drill grid is being spotted in the Bonanza Trench area and drilling is expected to commence in a few weeks once the holes are completed on the Nordic zone.

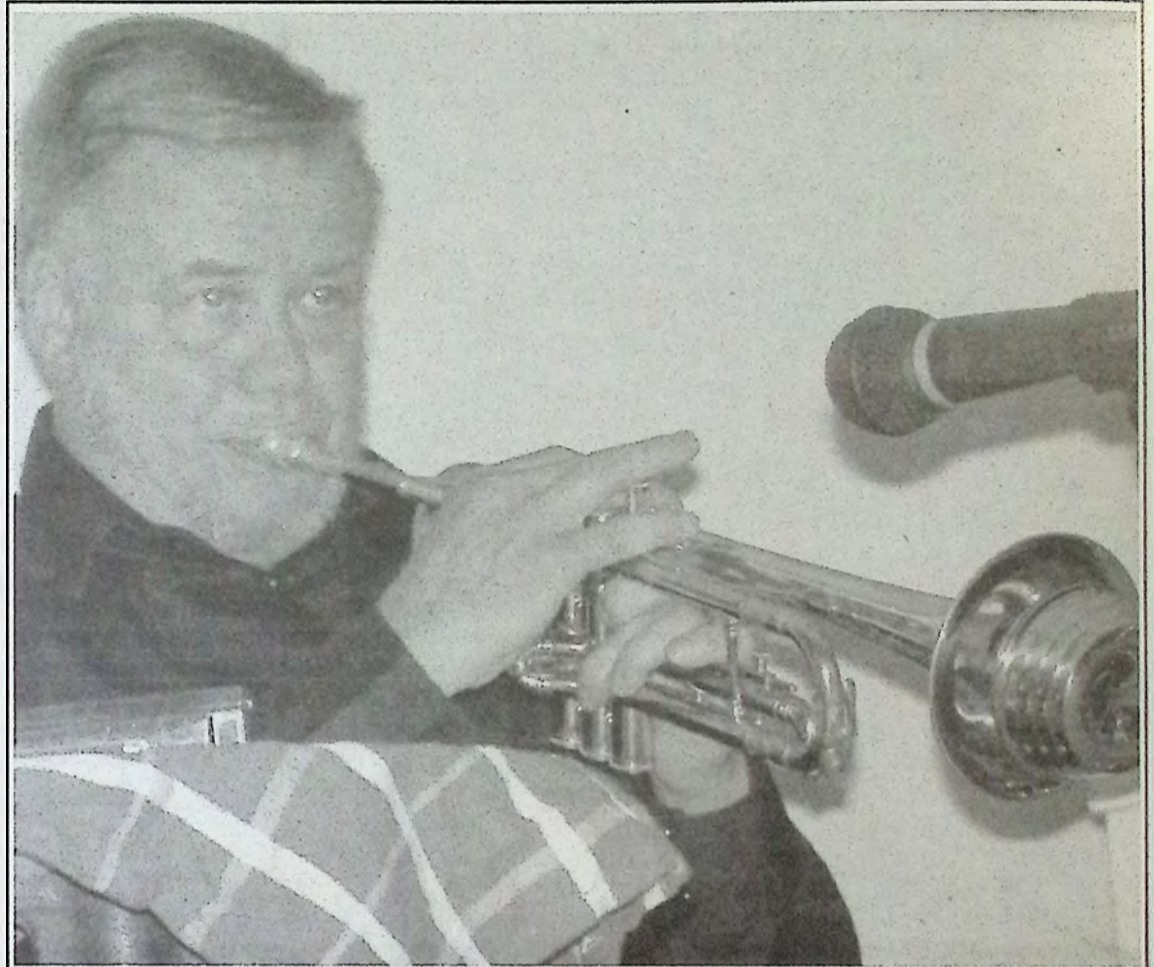
The Bonanza Trench area occurs in the southwest, downslope portion of the York-Viking zone. The York-Viking gold zone is the largest of several gold zones discovered on the Panorama Ridge property. The Panorama Ridge property is located four kilometers east of the historic Nickel Plate-Mascot mines that once produced 2.5 million ounces of gold. The Panorama Ridge property was discovered in 2000 when Goldcliff prospected new logging road outcrops. The property has mine-related infrastructure and is readily

accessed by roads. Goldcliff has identified multiple gold zones that have economic potential.

The Panorama Ridge property

contains a large surface area of gold mineralization related to silica-iron alteration (skarn) in sedimentary rocks from the Hedley

Formation of the Triassic Nicola Group. The gold mineralization is related to the skarn alteration and ..... continued on Page 26

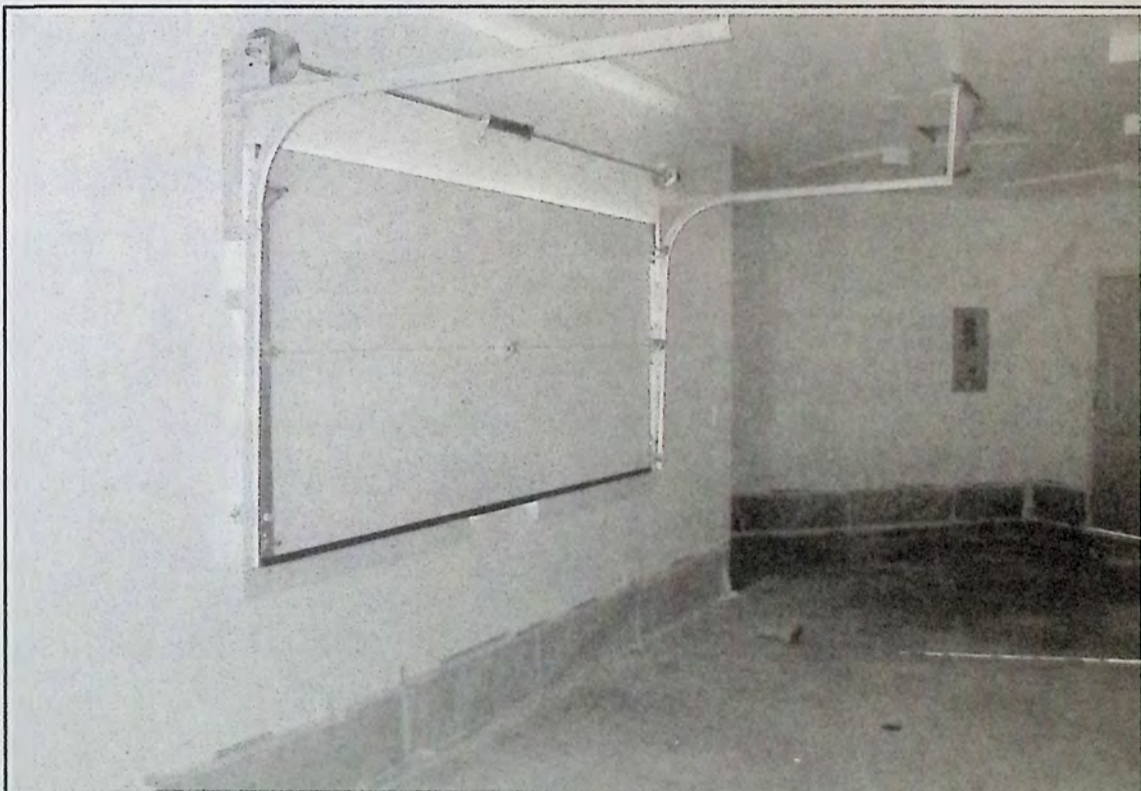

2008 GENERAL LOCAL ELECTION

### ADVANCE ELECTOR REGISTRATION

Are you eligible to vote at the November elections for Mayor and Council?  
Is your name on the current list of electors?

If you are not sure you can find out by calling or visiting the Town Hall Office, 169 Bridge Street, Princeton, BC, (250) 295-3135. The office is open from 8:30 AM to 4:30 PM Monday to Friday (excluding holidays).

Advance elector registrations will be accepted at the Town of Princeton office until September 23, 2008. With the exception of registrations on voting days, elector registrations will not be accepted during the period September 23, 2008 to November 14, 2008.

### ELECTOR QUALIFICATIONS

#### RESIDENT ELECTORS:

- age 18 or older; and
- a Canadian citizen; and
- a resident of British Columbia for at least 6 months immediately before the day of registration; and
- a resident of the Town of Princeton for at least 30 days immediately before the day of registration; and
- not disqualified by any enactment from voting in an election or otherwise disqualified by law.

#### NON-RESIDENT PROPERTY ELECTORS:

- age 18 or older; and
- a Canadian citizen; and
- a resident of British Columbia for at least 6 months immediately before the day of registration; and
- a registered owner of real property in the Town of Princeton for at least 30 days immediately before the day of registration; and
- not entitled to register as a resident elector; and
- not disqualified by any enactment from voting in an election or otherwise disqualified by law; and
- if there is more than one registered owner of the property, only one of those individuals may, with the written consent of the majority of the owners, register as a non-resident property elector.

### LIST OF REGISTERED ELECTORS

Beginning September 30, 2008 until the close of general voting for the election on November 15, 2008, a copy of the list of registered electors will be available for public viewing, at the Town Hall office in Princeton, during regular office hours, Monday to Friday, excluding statutory holidays. An elector may request that their address or other information about them be omitted from or obscured on the list of electors.

### OBJECTION TO REGISTRATION OF AN ELECTOR

An objection to the registration of a person whose name appears on the list of registered electors may be made in accordance with the *Local Government Act* before 4:00 PM on October 10, 2008. An objection must be in writing and may only be made by a person entitled to be registered as an elector of the Town of Princeton and can only be made on the basis that the person whose name appears has died or is not qualified to be registered as an elector of the Town of Princeton.

# Overcoming exercise barriers

(NC)—Being active and implementing an exercise program can help people with arthritis take charge of their disease. For the 4.5 million Canadians with arthritis, however, getting fit can be difficult. Pain, fatigue, lack of motivation and simply getting started are the biggest challenges.

If you have arthritis, here are some tips from The Arthritis Society that can make the first steps to an exercise plan a bit easier.

1. Start slowly. Take on an exercise routine that is manageable for you. By starting small and increasing intensity over time, you can gain

motivation by achieving realistic results.

2. Set a goal for yourself to stay focused on what you want to achieve and to inspire you when you hit barriers.

3. Find a friend or work-out buddy who is able to exercise at the same intensity level as you are.

4. Reward yourself when you reach intermediate goals.

5. Schedule work-outs ahead of time for the week or month, helping you make them part of your routine.

6. Exercise regularly, but adjust your program if you are in too much pain.

7. Make stretching and range of

motion exercises a part of your exercise program.

8. Journal your progress; keeping track of your exercises can help you understand and change patterns of pain.

9. Take acetaminophen before you exercise.

10. Invest in shoes that are comfortable and provide support for your feet.

# Modify your home to help manage arthritis

(NC)—If you have arthritis, slight modifications to your home can help you manage daily activities. The Arthritis Society has put together a list of improvements you can make to different rooms to accommodate your needs.

### In the Bathroom

- A raised toilet seat can make it easier to sit down and stand up.
- A grab bar and non-skid bath mat in your shower or bathtub provide support while standing.
- Changing the faucets on your sink, shower and bathtub to a lever design allows you to turn water on and off, and adjust temperature easily.
- An adjustable hand-held shower head provides the option of showering in a standing or sitting position, whichever is more comfortable for you.
- A slide bench or shower chair can be used to sit while in the shower.
- An occupational therapist can explain the benefits of a walk in shower or a cut-away tub.

**In the Kitchen**

- Items should be stored no higher than the shoulders and no lower than the waist for an easy and more comfortable reach.
- An adjustable perching stool with a back and arms allows you to sit while working at the kitchen counter.
- A trolley helps you transport meals and dishes between your kitchen and dining area to minimize trips and heavy lifting.
- Changing your kitchen faucet to a lever makes turning water on and off, and changing temperature eas-

ier.

- Electronic appliances and kitchen supplies with bigger grips can help you complete tasks with greater ease.

### In your Living Room

- Couch and chair cushions with firm foam, or furniture elevated at the base help when standing up and sitting down.
- A chair that is firm, comfortable and the right height for you enables you to get in and out easily.
- Scatter rugs are a tripping hazard, so should be secured or removed.
- Hand railings installed on both sides of every staircase make for an easy grasp when going up and down.
- Night lights in poorly lit or dark areas allow you to watch your step as you move around your home.
- Remote controls and telephones with big buttons reduce stress on

small finger joints.

### Outside of your Home

- Sensor lights are useful so that you can see where you are going and avoid hazards if you are coming and going when it's dark.
- Railings on both sides of your entrance steps provide support when climbing or descending stairs.
- If the entrance steps are too far apart in height, half-steps can be put in place using concrete blocks to make the steps closer for an easier climb.
- Some people with arthritis benefit from the installation of a ramp. An occupational therapist and an experienced contractor should be consulted.

### Peerless pears for health

Pears are a wonderful fruit. They keep well, and the season for pears lasts for three months. They are excellent when eaten fresh, and good when preserved.

Pears contain lignin, an insoluble fibre that helps clear cholesterol out of your system because it prevents the cholesterol from being absorbed. This fibre helps prevent constipation and cleans the system. To remove food "junk" that may have collected overnight, eat a pear. Always eat fresh pears with the skin on, as the skin contains the most fibre.

Pears contain a lot of pectin, just like apples do. This is a soluble fibre which binds to cholesterol, causing it to be removed from your intestinal system. In addition, pectin is good for your heart.

Pears are one of the few fruits that help build bones. Pears contain boron which helps keep bones strong. Boron helps prevent loss of calcium in older people. Boron is also good for the brain, improving memory, alertness and attention.

Pears may appear unappealing at first glance, as they are picked green. As the pears are stored at room temperature, they complete their ripening, turning soft on the inside. At this point, they turn colour, and are at their delicious best.

Bartlett pears are ready now, and can be refrigerated to last longer. These pears preserve well. Anjou pears are a later variety, sometimes called a winter pear.

Pears can be grated and added to cereal for breakfast, or mixed into a pancake. Pears can be made into sauce, which goes great with turkey or pork. Not only do pears keep you healthy, but they can make you prettier. Run a pear through a blender with a few green grapes and apply as a facial. For best results, leave it on for at least 10 minutes, wash off with lukewarm water, then rub pure avocado oil into the skin.

#### NOTICE OF CONSULTATION OPPORTUNITY

The public and all persons who believe that their interest may be affected by the proposed bylaws can present written submissions to the Regional District. All written submissions are to be addressed to: Consultation Opportunity - Bylaw Repeal and Re-enactment, c/o Regional District Okanagan-Similkameen. No written submissions will be accepted after September 26, 2008 in order to allow inclusion in a written report for the public hearing. This notice is in addition to the upcoming public hearing proposed to be held October 2, 2008. Formal notice of this public hearing will be forthcoming. This consultation opportunity is provided in part to satisfy the requirements of Section 879 of the Local Government Act.

#### PURPOSE OF REPEAL AND RE-ENACTMENT PROCESS AND BYLAWS:

The intent behind the repeal and re-enactment of all Official Community Plan Bylaws, Zoning Bylaws and Rural Land Use Bylaws enacted within the Regional District is in order to make the bylaws more accessible to the general public by facilitating ease of use and to ensure that the policies, guidelines, and regulations contained in the bylaws have been validly enacted and are enforceable.

The process of making the bylaws more accessible to the general public has involved the consolidation of "general regulations" under a single section of the zoning bylaws; the standardization of the general layout applied to the bylaws; the updating of references to Provincial ministries and agencies (many of which have been renamed or reconstituted); the standardization of the layout of the provisions relating to each individual zone; the standardization of how site specific amendments are introduced; the creation of a uniform list of zones (without altering the list of permitted uses in each zone); and, where appropriate, the standardization and update of definitions found in each of the zoning bylaws. Other minor updating and modernizing revisions to the bylaws are so extensive that they cannot all be listed in this notice. The public is encouraged to view or obtain copies of the bylaws at the address or web site set out below.

The Official Community Plan, Zoning and Rural Land Use Bylaws currently enacted by the Regional District contain provisions that may be or are invalid on the basis that they have no legal authority or were enacted with a procedural defect in the final adoption process. In particular, the Regional District has determined that a number of amendments bylaws to the current Official Community Plan, Zoning and Rural Land Use Bylaws, while having been the subject of sufficient public hearing processes, were deficient in the final process (i. e., the amendment bylaws did not receive necessary provincial approvals). The process of ensuring that the policies, guidelines, and regulations contained in the bylaws have been validly enacted and are enforceable has involved the Regional District reviewing the bylaws and deleting provisions having no legal authority and ensuring that the procedure followed by the Regional District in the adoption of the revised bylaws is correct.

Due to legislative changes enacted in 2001, the Rural Land Use Bylaws currently found in Electoral Area 'F' (Okanagan Lake West/West Bench) and Electoral Area 'H' (Princeton Rural) cannot be carried forward and will be replaced with consistent Official Community Plan and Zoning Bylaws.

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### The Vancouver Sun

INSIGHTS INTO BC'S HISTORY

First appearing as a daily newspaper on February 12th 1912, The Vancouver Sun was published just around the corner from its at the time rival The Province, but the story has its roots back further with the stubbornness and determination of one Louis Denison Taylor.

Working in Revelstoke in 1896 L.D., as he was known, answered an advertisement placed in a Victoria newspaper to run a new daily, The Vancouver Daily Province, by one Hewitt Bostock who wanted to provide competition for the two daily newspapers already operating in Vancouver, The World and The News Advertiser.

After seven years in the job L. D. got restless and began looking for a better opportunity. At that time, The World was the leading evening newspaper in Vancouver and the news was out that it was for sale. In 1905, with others, he bought the paper.

The paper got fatter and fatter and in 1910 was able to boast, due in great part to the real estate boom of the time, that it carried the largest amount of display advertising of

any daily newspaper in North America.

Taylor entered politics and still holds the record of length of time in office as the Mayor of Vancouver.

About this time L. D. made a fatal error, he knew the paper needed a new plant, but his decision about its size was to lead to financial disaster, it was too big!

The World Building was constructed 17 storeys high and for two years it was the tallest building in the British Empire, but in a reversal of his good fortune in buying The World just before a real estate boom, Taylor witnessed his new premises sitting largely empty because of an economic slump. In 1915 Taylor lost control of the newspaper and building.

In 1924, The Vancouver Sun bought The Vancouver World (that had been in financial difficulties for some time) and promptly moved their new acquisition across the street into their own premises.

The World Building was sold and for thirteen years it was occupied by Beakins, a Seattle moving Company and a huge sign promptly went up on the roof; The Beakins

Building had joined the Vancouver skyline. But fate still had a card to play.

In March 1937, a fire destroyed The Sun's business and editorial offices.

The newspaper promptly moved back across the street, buying the building where The World had previously been published.

It was accordingly renamed The Sun Tower, a name it retains to this day.

As a cost cutting measure, in 1958 The Sun and The Province newspapers joined to create the Pacific Press. First the papers merged their mechanical and financial departments, but on December 27th, 1965, they vacated the Sun Tower and moved into the Pacific Press building in Granville Street.

The papers moved to Granville Square in 1997.

Today the Pacific Newspaper Group is a division of CanWest Media Publications Inc, which in turn is affiliated with the CanWest Global Communications Company.

In readership, The Vancouver Sun is second only to The Province in British Columbia.

I'll even give you a tip on how to get attention to the issue during your election campaign.

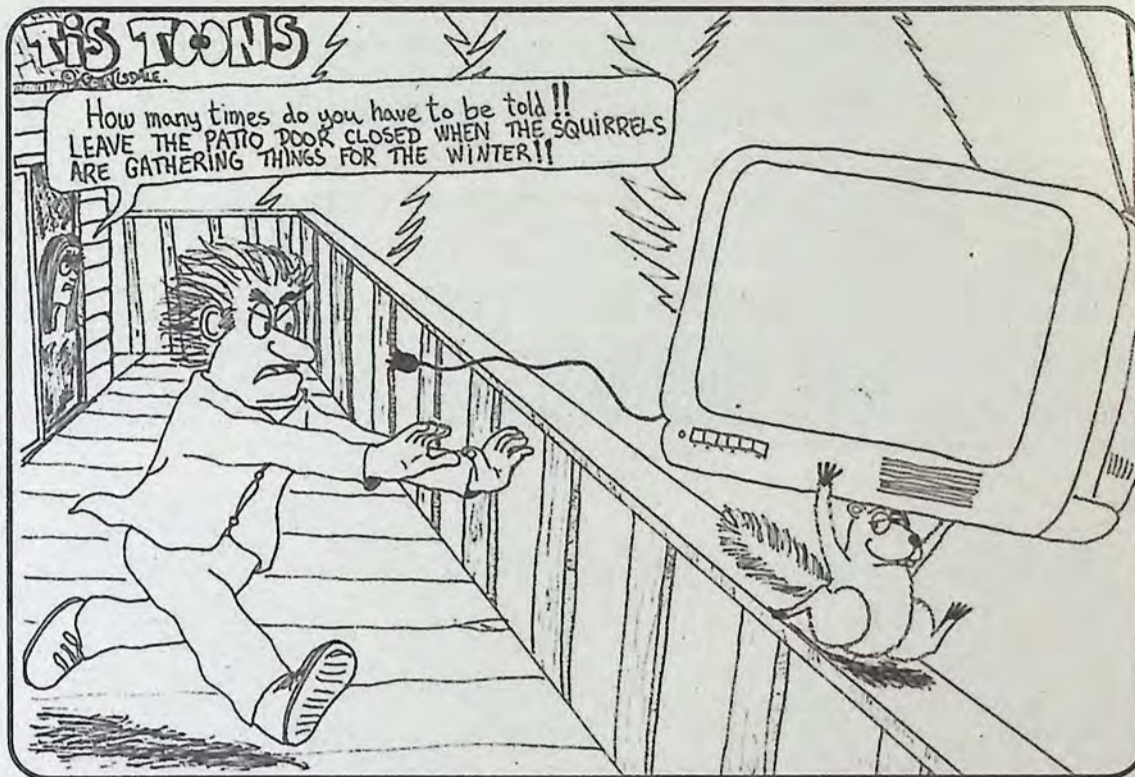
Stage a photo-op with someone in either a wheelchair or a cane/walker trying to access the pedestrian control button on one of those ridiculous raised islands.

### To cross the highway...or not

Dear George/Editor;

As with all gambling, be careful when playing Highway Bingo, because the House will always win. And to lose carries a very high price. Highway Bingo is not a game, but sadly, many of us have no choice but to play it, and the criminal part of Highway Bingo is that the risks can be greatly reduced, but often 'gov-

ernment' will not act to reduce these risks until there is a tragedy.

Of course, at Highway 3 and Burton, as described in your recent Editorial, there is a pedestrian activated crossing light. But as you discovered, many motorists ignore this light. I suggest to you that only a full red-amber-green traffic signal, with the appropriate advance warning

lights will reduce the risk to a more reasonable level, and even at that it is only reducing the risk, not eliminating it.

In my casual observations at this crossing, I have seen too many vehicles, including semi trucks, traveling down the hill at such a rate of speed they could not stop at the pedestrian light even if they were so inclined. I have also noticed too many people who press the activation button and patiently wait for the traffic to stop...and then press the button and wait again, perhaps a little less patiently.

As for me, I use a wheelchair, so pressing the button is not an option because the curbing makes it inaccessible.

Highway 3 cuts through our community and it is not unreasonable that pedestrians need to cross it. The pedestrian light at Burton is the only marked crossing and it creates a false sense of security for everyone, especially for our children as they are often less aware of the dangers of the road. The Department of Transportation is responsible for the installation of an effective traffic light system. Let us hope that we can get the system we need and deserve without a tragedy. 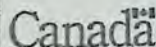

# Do we appreciate what we have?

Talking with a friend one day last week, we compared stories of our forefathers in England.

Both of us had heard stories of these English people being in trouble for "poaching" from the lands belonging to the nobility of the area.

My great-grandfather was out of work with a family to feed, and he snared rabbits on the lord's property and was thrown in jail for poaching.

This is not our idea of poaching, and there was certainly no shortage of rabbits, nor any need to

conserve them. Still, the rabbits, like the land, belonged to his lordship, and the poor could starve.

When my grandfather moved his family to the United States, one of the things that impressed him most was the free access to game and whatever else was available for food.

He didn't need anybody's permission to shoot a deer for food, hook a fish in a stream, or to gather wild plums or berries. The abundance of the land was available to all.

Things have changed since that time. We now need permits to shoot animals for food, and we are allowed to hunt only in certain seasons.

We need a licence to fish and we can fish only at certain times in certain places. However, the game animals and fish belong to all of us, not to some landowner who can have us jailed.

Further, we are not allowed to starve. We have welfare systems in place.

In England, up to the time of the Industrial Revolution, most families were self-sufficient through raising a few sheep and chickens,

and having a garden.

This was due to common lands, known as the "commons". When the commons were abolished and became private property, families were forced to rely on working for wages to survive. The poor became much poorer and much more vulnerable to economic change.

Today, we have Crown lands and parks and conservation laws, and while the poor are not allowed to starve, we have food banks and homeless people. Have we forgotten some of the lessons our forefathers learned?

We need to appreciate the importance of common lands. In some places, such as Jamaica, there are no common lands and no right to hunt.

With hunting season approaching, there will be people who see it as a bad thing, but hunting, fishing, picking berries and foraging for food is our right, if we abide by the law and do not abuse the privilege. Let's appreciate what we have.

If some hunter should happen to reduce the local population of deer, I will really appreciate that.

I am not against the sale of the land, it's the way the little guy is getting treated that I oppose. There are several ways to work this matter out. For example, the town could buy the land and leave it as is, where they would collect the pad rental, and it would remain as a mobile home Park.

Or, because these manufactured homes are too old to be moved, if land developers were to buy, then I suggest a proper buy-out at fair market value, none of this owners paying us 12 months pad rent, and also anyone who lives in that Court be the first to have their names on the list for whatever development

were to go in there. These units are not just shacks, they have all been heavily invested to and are our homes.

You don't have to be a senior to be displaced. It can happen to anyone, you see, the almighty dollar comes first.

P.S. In case anyone wonders why I would like my voice to be heard in this is, I am speaking for my mother, the Late Rolly Regimbal, who worked so hard all of her life here in Princeton, paid her taxes (still does) and raised 5 kids here.

Mum has a mobile home in this park, which I've tried to sell in order to pay off her RRAP loan with the government for 10 months now only to have prospective buyers turned down. Now I know why.

Our town must have the foresight to protect the vulnerable MHO by putting into place legislation that provides appropriate payment for

our homes should parks be sold to developers.

A developer should also be obliged to find either adequate space for us, or offer us first purchase rights on whatever is being built on the land.

As long as government collects property tax on our manufactured homes, we should still be entitled to more protection than condo leases!

I have to wonder about the residents who live on the hill above the park. Do they know about incoming construction? There is a road and a walkway up there, and I fear this hill is too unstable for development.

These seniors have been contributing to the economy when we were still in diapers, now it's our turn to reciprocate.

occurs over an area of approximately two square kilometres. Contained in the alteration area from northeast to southwest are the Nordic, York-Viking and Tower gold zones. These zones are separate entities occurring over a distance of approximately 1,000 metres. The trenching and drilling have narrowed the gap between the zones.

Eco Tech Laboratory Ltd. of Kamloops, B.C., a subsidiary of Alex Stewart Group Ltd., an accredited laboratory, is conducting the sample preparation and analysis. All sample analysis is 30 gram fire assay-A.A. finish for gold and 35 multi-element ICPMS. The sample stream is subject to check analysis on repeat and re-split samples, and standards to maintain quality control.

## Airport to host tenth annual jet rally

The Princeton R/C Jet Fliers will celebrate a milestone later this month.

They are in the process of finalizing plans for their tenth annual Jet Rally at Princeton Airport.

"We have jet turbine model airplane pilots come from quite a distance to fly at this wonderful site," says event organizer Bart Ramsay.

"Pilots have come from as far east as Manitoba and south from Washington State and many stay at Princeton area hotels or set up camp around the flying area."

The event, being run under the

Model Aeronautics Association of Canada (MAAC), is set for the September 12th weekend.

"We will start setting up on Thursday, September 11th and the last day will be Sunday, September 14th," Ramsay says.

"The first day of normal flying will be on the Friday with Saturday being the main day. Many fliers have to leave fairly early on the Sunday in order to get home for work on Monday."

### Financial Tips For Post-Secondary Students

If you're a university or college student, you're probably already back on campus. This year, in addition to all the courses you may be taking, how about trying to master some financial lessons too.


Of course, many students already have at least one foot in the "real world" because they're not just taking classes; they're also working many hours a week to help pay for school, rent and living expenses. - Don't overuse credit cards. Credit card marketers aggressively target students, so you'll need to be vigilant about all the offers that will bombard you. - Keep track of your student loans. Once you start repaying your loans, do whatever you can to stay on track with your payments.
- Never stop looking for financial aid. The aid package you may have received in your first year on campus doesn't have to be the final word on financial assistance. For example, some universities may offer scholarships based on post-secondary academic achievement and/or real-world experience. Study your institution's scholarships and be aggressive in going after them.
- Estimate your future income. You may not know exactly what you want to do when you graduate, but if you have a career path in mind, try to learn what sort of salary you can expect during your first few years after your days as a student end. Once you have a realistic idea of how much you're going to earn, you may have the motivation you need to avoid bad financial practices, such as accumulating big debts.

Life after high school should be a learning experience - in many ways. And if some of the knowledge you obtain during your post-secondary years can help you develop sound financial habits, so much the better.
