## Top cop reviews summer

RCMP Sgt. Gary Macahonic attended the September 15 meeting of Town Council to report on local policing issues during the summer. Sgt. Macahonic reported a busy summer as always. During July and August, Princeton Detachment received more than 200 calls each month. That number does not include traffic control and accident investigation. Statistics regarding crime inci-

dence show a low rate for the population. Sgt. Macahonic believes the crime rate is going down, despite the recent four break-ins, which he hopes was a criminal passing through. Sgt. Macahonic is concerned about the high speed of tourist vehicles travelling through Princeton. He would like to see better signage, and Council offered to back him up on appeals to the Minister of Transportation.

## Princeton Arts Council looks ahead

Princeton Community Arts Council met September 17 to discuss plans for the coming year. The first item on the agenda was to welcome Dawn Campbell, who received an art bursary from Vermilion Artists. Campbell, age 17, is a student at Princeton Secondary. She displayed some of her work to Arts Council members, who gave many compliments. Campbell's work will be shown to the public later this year. Princeton Concert Society hopes to bring in three concerts this year as well as the Kelowna Ballet, which is booked for April 19, 2009. Nick Mills advised that the museum has had a record number of visitors this year, but may not open next year due to the renovations and expansion of the museum building. Artifacts must be moved and stored while the work is underway. Mills has agreed to remain as Operations Manager until the pro-

ject is complete. Vermilion Forks Field Naturalists has a line-up of excellent guest speakers for the coming year. They meet once a month on the second Tuesday, but they are involved in a number of other activities, such as the Swan Lake conservation project and the annual Christmas bird count. Starting on September 24, Madelon Schouten will teach a bird identification course from 10 :00 AM to 4:00 PM Wednesdays. Princeton's Community Band is healthy and growing. The band has a number of beginner members who will later join the senior band. Performing Arts will present two plays, *Monsters Under the Bed* and *The Prince Who Wouldn't Speak*, on November 21, 22 evenings and an afternoon matinee on November 23. Both plays are presented on each occasion. In late January, Performing Arts will present *You Have the Right to Remain Dead*, an audience participation dinner theatre, in which the audience tries to solve the murder mystery. Vermilion Artists plan a watercolour workshop this fall, and an acrylic workshop in the spring. The group hopes to do a beginner's

watercolour workshop at some point. Potters have had a busy year, and the pottery mural is ready to mount. The Arts Council will pay for mounting and hanging the unique mural in Riverside Centre. The Potters' Guild offers Going to Pot every Thursday afternoon at Riverside Centre. Arts & Culture Week is April 19 - 25, 2009. The Kelowna Ballet will

kick off the week, but Arts Council member groups were asked to consider other activities to take place during the week. The BC Assembly of Arts Councils has a conference May 1 - 3, and two members of Princeton Arts Council will attend. Princeton Traditional Music Society plans some carolling during the Christmas season and three or four concerts between January

and June. They plan to expand the music festival to include a Friday night street dance with live bands, and an increased number of performers. The performers who came this year want to come back. Nick Mills has organized the grant applications and received several at the meeting. Applications must be sent to the BC Arts Council before the end of the month if groups expect a grant.

# Community Futures talks to Council

Community Futures, a business loan foundation established by Regional District 26 years ago, is still strong, and Mary Ellen Heidt and Jaymie Atkinson wanted Town Council to know. They attended the September 15 Council meeting

to review past performance and present activity.

Heidt gave examples of businesses Community Futures has helped in Hedley and Princeton: Upper Similkameen Indian Band received bridge financing and working cap-

ital for the Mascot Mine project, and Princeton Co-Gen received financing for start-up costs. Fifteen new businesses were started in Princeton with assistance from Community Futures self-employment program.

Heidt was quick to advise that Community Futures does not simply hand out money. There is a process of business education starting with the creation of a solid business plan.

In addition, there are a number of workshops each year to help business people, and a peer mentoring program.

Community Futures is involved in economic diversification planning for the region, as well as providing

financing for businesses that would like to expand.

Recent goals include community development in the form of affordable housing, transportation, and a customer service training program in secondary schools that would provide students with a certificate and credits.

Council was very interested in the affordable housing concept, and will follow up with other members of the community.

## Manion praises volunteers

Councillor Jim Manion expressed his appreciation on September 15 as he reported to Town Council on two recent major events.

He began with the Fall Fair, which he said was "awesome". He noted there was something for everyone at the fair, and complimented the people who worked to make it happen.

He noted the Fall Fair had featured one of the best western bands around, quite an achievement for a small fair.

"It was exceptional," he said of the fair.

Princeton Rodeo Club came in for

an equal share of praise for hosting the B.C. bullriding finals.

"I commend them for putting together a good bullriding weekend," Councillor Manion said.

He added some praise for the Taste of Ales event that went on at the same time. He thanked all of the volunteers for their hard work.

Mayor Randy McLean added his praise for the Rodeo Club's efforts.

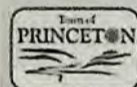
"For a first time, they did very well," Mayor McLean said.

### Regional District Okanagan-Similkameen

#### Official Community Plan and Zoning Bylaw Electoral Areas 'A', 'C', 'D', 'E', 'F', 'G', and 'H'

This is a bylaw repeal and re-enactment process for all Official Community Plan, Zoning and Rural Land Use Bylaws currently enacted within the Regional District

**NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING:**

**PURPOSE:**

The intent behind the repeal and re-enactment of all Official Community Plan Bylaws, Zoning Bylaws and Rural Land Use Bylaws enacted within the Regional District is in order to make the bylaws more accessible to the general public by facilitating ease of use and to ensure that the policies, guidelines, and regulations contained in the bylaws have been validly enacted and are enforceable.

The process of making the bylaws more accessible to the general public has involved the consolidation of "general regulations" under a single section of the zoning bylaws; the standardization of the general layout applied to the bylaws; the updating of references to Provincial ministries and agencies (many of which have been renamed or reconstituted); the standardization of the layout of the provisions relating to each individual zone; the standardization of how site specific amendments are introduced; the creation of a uniform list of zones (without altering the list of permitted uses in each zone); and, where appropriate, the standardization and update of definitions found in each of the zoning bylaws. Other minor updating and modernizing revisions to the bylaws are so extensive that they cannot all be listed in this notice. The public is encouraged to view or obtain copies of the bylaws at the address or web site set out below.

The Official Community Plan, Zoning and Rural Land Use Bylaws currently enacted by the Regional District contain provisions that may be or are invalid on the basis that they have no legal authority or were enacted with a procedural defect in the final adoption process. In particular, the Regional District has determined that a number of amendment bylaws to the current Official Community Plan, Zoning and Rural Land Use Bylaws, while having been the subject of sufficient public hearing processes, were deficient in the final adoption process (i.e., the amendment bylaws did not receive necessary provincial approvals). The process of ensuring that the policies, guidelines, and regulations contained in the bylaws have been validly enacted and are enforceable has involved the Regional District reviewing the bylaws and deleting provisions having no legal authority and ensuring that the procedure followed by the Regional District in the adoption of the revised bylaws.

Due to legislative changes enacted in 2001, the Rural Land Use Bylaws currently found in Electoral Area 'F' (Okanagan Lake West/West Bench) and Electoral Area 'H' (Princeton Rural) cannot be carried forward and will be replaced with consistent Official Community Plan and Zoning Bylaws.

- Bylaw No. 2453, 2008 Electoral Area 'C' Zoning Bylaw;

1. Tune in to moderation with portion sizes: use the portion sizes in Eating Well with Canada's Food Guide ([www.healthcanada.gc.ca/foodguide](http://www.healthcanada.gc.ca/foodguide))

**Tips on how to manage arthritis**

(NC)—What do you do if you are just diagnosed with arthritis? Arthritis can have a major impact on how you live your life and deal with everyday tasks. Making small changes to the way you do things can make a big difference.

Here are some tips from The Arthritis Society to help you address pain and conserve energy. **Relieve stress on affected joints** Pay attention to your pain – it can be the result of daily life stresses on affected joints. Strong muscles protect your joints from the stresses of movement. A physiotherapist can recommend exercises to strengthen specific muscles and can develop an activity plan to improve your joint health.

**Rethink your daily tasks** Try to minimize the effort you exert when completing certain tasks. You may need to find creative alternatives. For example, change door knobs to levers so they are easier to handle and use a cart to push items

to help you cut back without cutting out any of the food groups. When serving meals and dining out, choose smaller portions to prevent you from overeating. Over time, this approach will help you maintain a healthy body weight and avoid weight gain, thereby reducing stress on your joints.

2. Energize yourself with healthy eating to reduce the fatigue often experienced by people with arthritis. Eating the right variety of foods can help people with arthritis maintain the energy they require to continue doing

rather than carrying them.

**Conserve energy**

As you tackle your daily routine, take note of how your body feels. Then, plan ahead by spreading out heavy jobs over several days and completing lighter tasks in between. Use the time of the day when you feel the most energy for the more difficult tasks. Taking rests often between jobs will help you conserve energy as well.

**Be light on your hands whenever possible**

Avoid gripping too tightly and be sure to hold handles of different tools and supplies with the palms of your hands. Extra pressure on your fingers can be painful.

3. Set manageable, healthy eating goals with no more than one or two new habits per month. You'll be more successful in the long run if you make gradual changes. As an example, if you're aiming to lose weight, try using smaller plates or try portioning foods away from the table to change your eating habits. Use EATracker at [www.dietitians.ca/eatracker](http://www.dietitians.ca/eatracker) to assess your current intake and to set realistic goals.

4. Plan your meals in advance. Grocery shopping is much easier when you make a shopping list from a menu plan. Planning also supports your efforts to enjoy your favorite treats in moderation. What you eat regularly is what matters most to your overall health and weight management.

5. Avoid trying to make up for unhealthy eating habits with vitamins and minerals. Food is what gives you energy and nutrients. There are times, however, when supplements are needed to promote health. Consult a registered dietitian or your family doctor about your need for additional supplements.

6. Start your day with breakfast, eat balanced meals regularly and have healthy snacks in between. You should be eating every three to four hours and snacking wisely.

7. Listen to your body. Eat when you are hungry and stop before you get too full to help you from eating more food than you need and to prevent weight gain.

Eating well and staying active can help to decrease the risk of chronic diseases, such as arthritis. By incorporating these tips you will be able to maintain a healthy lifestyle and stay energized. **Sleep and live longer**

Lack of sleep is related to all sorts of ailments, but most North Americans pay no attention to all of the warnings about losing sleep. We are not talking about insomnia, we are talking about just not sleeping long enough every night.

The third cause of lack of sleep is easy to cure: turn off the television set. Go to bed early.

There is one more cause of lack of sufficient sleep: having a new baby or a sick family member, but these can be very short term problems.

Learn to relax and appreciate being relaxed, sleep longer, and live longer.

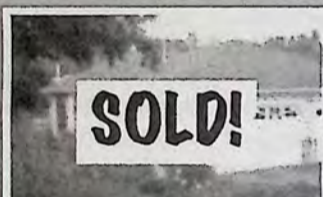

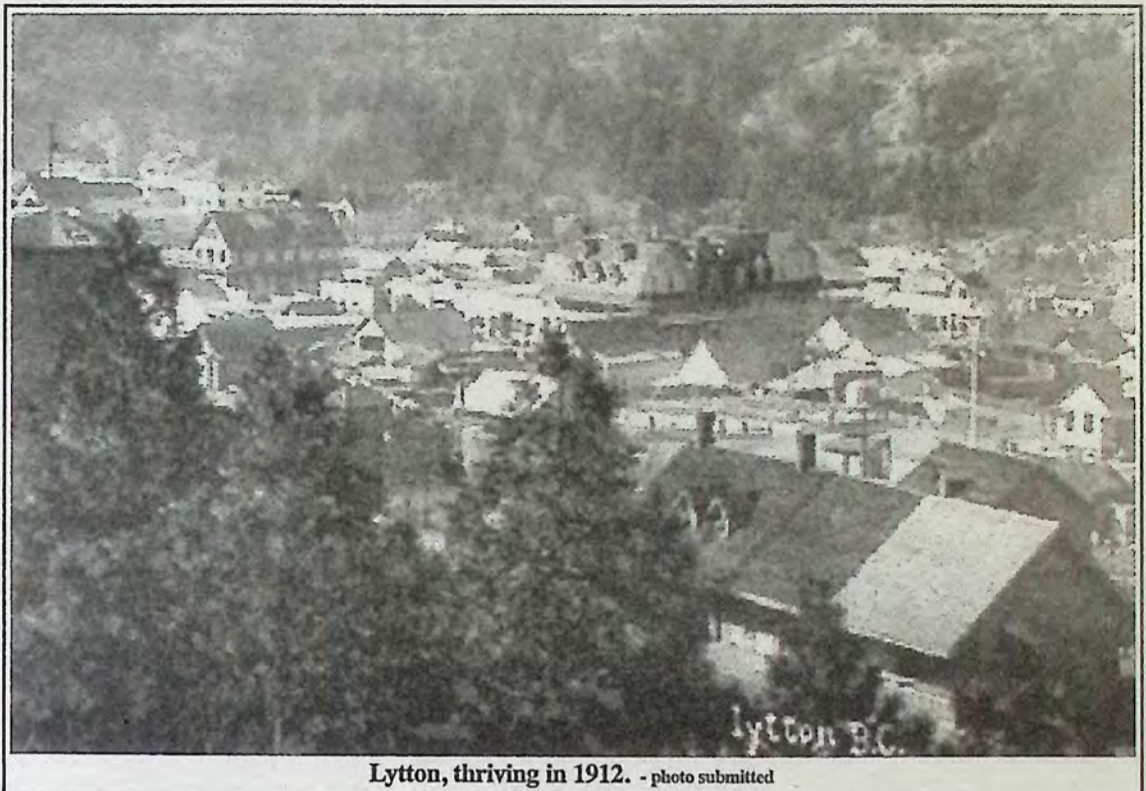

**Lytton**  
INSIGHTS INTO BC'S HISTORY

The forks where the Thompson and Fraser rivers meet changed radically in 1858 when gold was discovered on the Thompson River, about 10 miles above the confluence. Thousands of miners worked their way up the Fraser River and within a few years the whole area was booming.

Governor James Douglas named the Township that sprang up there after his superior in England, Bulwer-Lytton, who was the Secretary of State to the Colonies in the Government of Lord Derby

Edward Bulwer-Lytton was an English novelist, poet, playwright and politician. Lord Lytton was a popular writer of his day who coined such phrases as "The great unwashed", "Pursuit of the mighty dollar", "The pen is mightier than the sword", and the infamous opening line "It was a dark and stormy night". The most famous of his novels was The Last Days of Pompeii.

Edward Bulwer-Lytton, 1st Barron Lytton, passed away in 1873 at the age of 69 without ever visiting the small BC town that today bears his name. He is buried at Westminster Abbey in London, England.

Between the years 1861 and 1863 the Cariboo Wagon Road was constructed; the most difficult and treacherous section being alongside the Fraser River between Yale and Lytton. Bulwer-Lytton had written with great passion about the wagon road builders - the Royal Engineers - after assigning them their duties.

The Cariboo Wagon Road reinforced Lytton's role as the central

hub of the Interior and it was suggested by some that "Lytton City" became the Capital of the Colonies. Unfortunately Governor Douglas wanted Victoria to fill that role and sure enough "Lytton City" lost out!

After the gold rush Lytton slumped from being a booming Town to a struggling little community until the construction of the Canadian Pacific Railway in the 1880's.

During the construction of the Railway, the stern-wheeler Skuzzy was launched at Spuzzum on the Fraser. It worked its way up the River and passed through Hell's Gate, courtesy of a steam winch and 150 Chinese pulling on ropes, it reached Boston Bar before finally making it all the way to Lytton. Her job was to move railway supplies along the Fraser River, primarily between Boston Bar and Lytton.

After the completion of the CPR,

the population dropped again, but resurged once more when the CNR construction commenced in 1910.

It was a beautiful Town during the 1920's with elaborate hotels, beautiful homes and a thriving economy. Fires had wiped out Lytton several times over the years, but on each occasion it had rebuilt.

The 1920's had also seen the Fraser Canyon Highway built, being only a day's journey by car from Vancouver it contributed immensely to the area's new vibrancy.

The 1950's saw the construction of the Trans-Canada Highway, which created a by-pass high above the Town. With the highway by-pass, Lytton's population started to decline and continued to do so until quite recently. Today, one of North America's continuously inhabited settlements has only around 375 residents although another 1,200 live in the surrounding area.

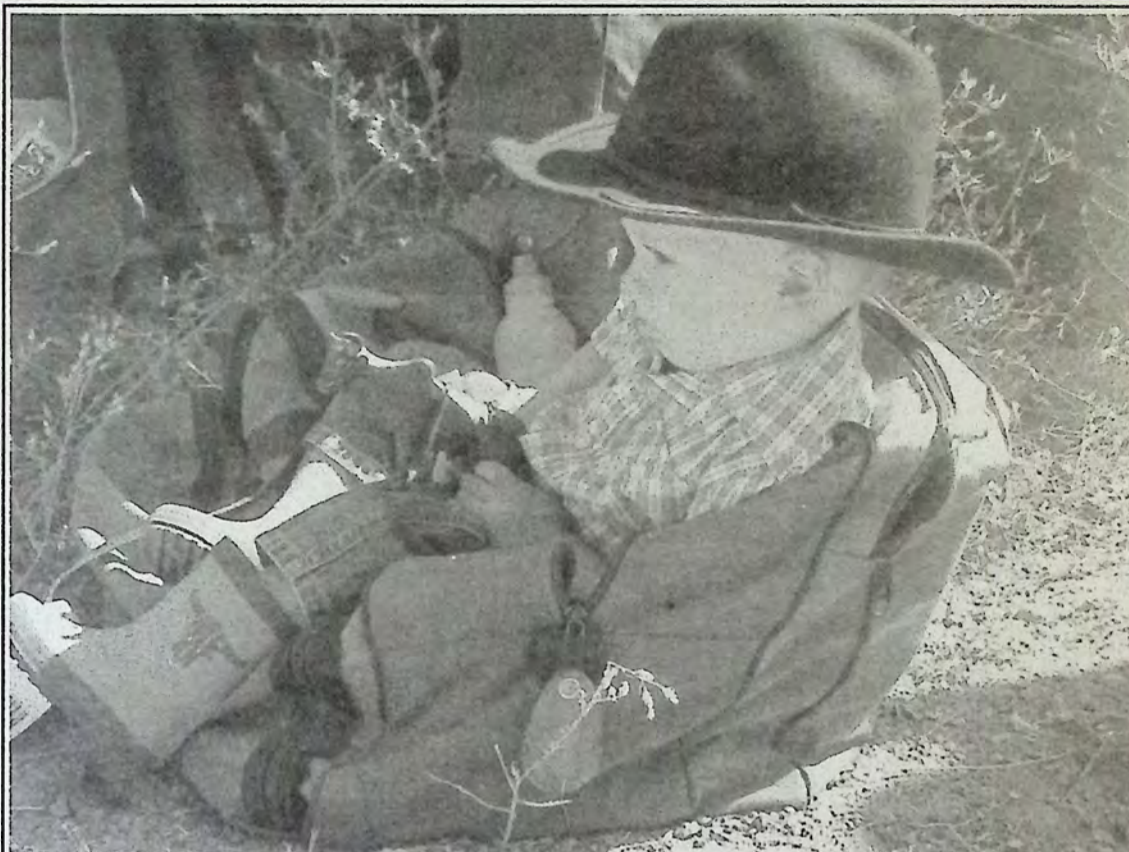

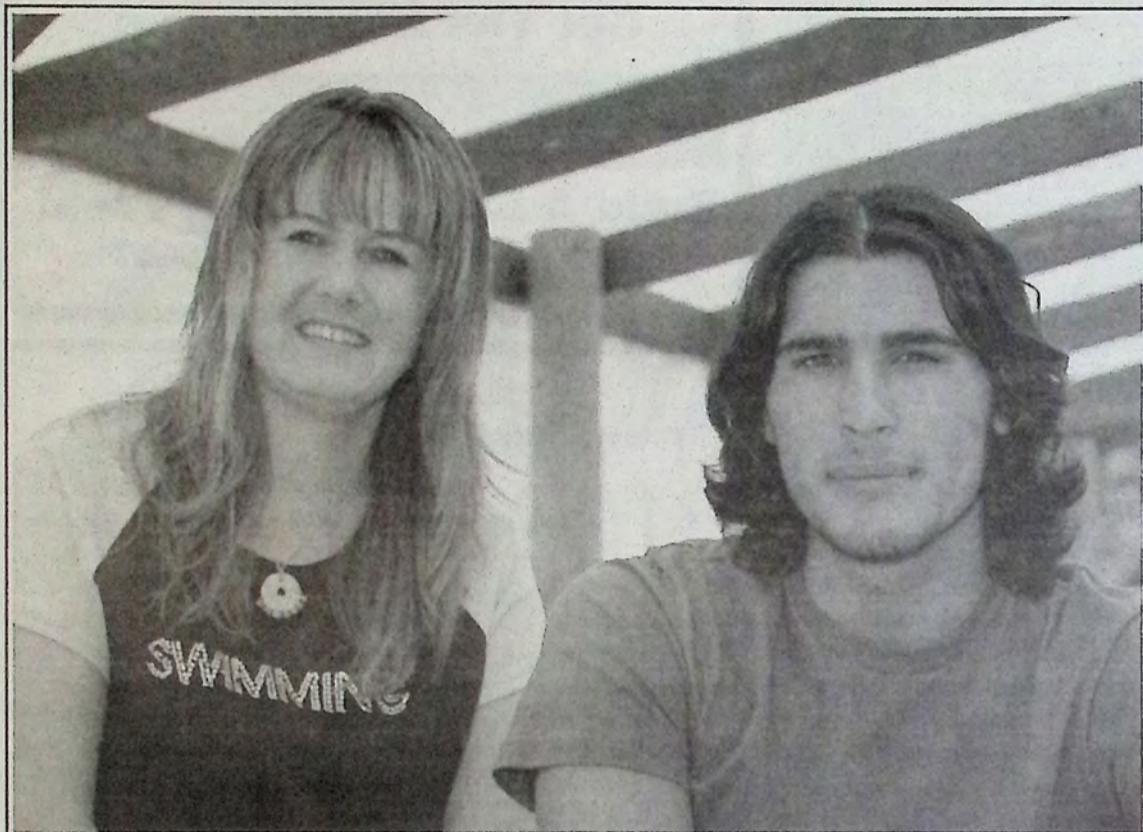

## Weyerhaeuser keeps program afloat

For Denis Ogrinc it was just a matter of time before he would pursue his childhood dream and become a competitive swim coach at Princeton's Centennial Pool.

"It's a great place, very friendly and highly rewarding to help the kids improve. When they drop seconds off their times it's exciting for everyone," said Ogrinc who came back to coach for the third consecutive summer.

Ogrinc is pursuing a movie directing career and is enrolled in Capilano College's motion picture program.

"I hope to be an independent film maker, making horror films with lots of special effects," said Ogrinc.

Ogrinc was told by the College that being a swim coach was good training for the movie directing business.

"To be a successful coach you need to be comfortable with a lot of organized chaos while you stay focused on every swimmer and their individual needs. You are like a director of a movie set," said Kokanee Swim Club President Amanda Carmichael.

"When there's a swim meet, it demands a high level of organization and anticipation on the part of coaches to keep parents, children and the rest of us focused on the next race."

The Kokanee Swim Club offers competitive swim lessons to children from ages 6 to 15, including adult lessons. This year over 35 children will be taking lessons, and nearly 20 of them will be participating in swim meets throughout the Southern Interior.

The program has increased in popularity to the point that Princeton children now compete in Provincial

meets every year.

It's the first time that the Swim Club has accessed funds from Weyerhaeuser's Jobs for Youth Program to hire summer students. Seven British Columbia non-profit, community organizations hired students this summer thanks to Weyerhaeuser's Jobs for Youth program.

## Posse split weekend home games

The Valley First Princeton Posse had a two-game weekend where they hosted Summerland Sting on September 19th and Golden Rockets on September 20th.

The Summerland game saw both teams blazing through the first period firing on all cylinders.

The visiting team did close the period with a three goal lead, but the second frame was all Princeton as the Posse managed to capitalize on Summerland errors.

Princeton's first goal of the night came at 15:14 where Derrick DeLisser scored on the power play. Assists went to Wade Masch and Spencer Brooks.

The Posse tied the game at 14:30 (Brooks Christensen from Geoffrey Brechmann and Jared Hidber) but that was short-lived as Golden replied with a tying goal at 13:41.

By this time the crowd started chanting 'Go, Posse, Go!' which fired the home team up and Brooks Christensen fired home a power play goal at 9:18. Assists went to Jared Hidber and Derrick DeLisser.

The Rockets battled intensely to break the tie but Princeton was there at every opportunity and the score remained 5-all at the end of regulation time.

In the overtime period, Princeton quickly took control, missed on their first scoring chance, then 36-seconds into the frame Kyle L'Arrivee passed to Nick Ceconi who fed the puck to Dylan McKinlay in front of the Golden net and in a flash it was all over.

Princeton took 28-minutes in penalties to Golden's 14-minutes but totalled 37 shots on goal to Golden's 36.

Letter To The Editor

**Hope discusses Area H APC issue**

To The Editor;

I have always had an interest in local governance, particularly the Regional District and our own Area H. Area H is large, with a wide-spread diverse population, often times with differing concerns.

Issues important in Tulameen may be of little concern in Manning Park or Osprey Lake or Allison Lake. When we add rapid population growth, industrial development and other critical issues we begin to appreciate the necessity of achieving meaningful representation.

To ensure that Regional Directors meet with a range of their constituency on a regular basis, upper level governments strongly recommend that all area directors appoint Advisory Planning Commissions (APC's) to assist in the process. This APC is simply a group of interested local individuals in touch with various aspects of the district willing to work with the director in receiving and disseminating information and ultimately in the decision making process.

This course of action is demanding. It requires finding, organizing and meeting with dedicated volunteers. However, it is a far more daunting task to make decisions that impact the welfare of the community without that appropriate participation. When you consider that the town of Princeton, with only a slightly larger population than Area H, has a council of five elected officials receiving public input, it is obvious that no single elected official can effectively represent this large and diverse area without an active APC.

This has not been the case in Area H. Over the years this APC process has been at best an on again, off again practice.

What recently brought this to my

attention was a project in which I was involved in Area F near Summerland. That process, which involved acquiring approval for a charitable development, opened my eyes as to just how much consultation can occur involving the director and his or her APC. The procedure included a very lively and productive interaction with the director and his APC which ultimately resulted in a considered decision that was well understood by the community and therefore

received wide spread support.

The procedure was lengthy and yet the members were more than willing to participate.

In speaking with many individuals from Area H I have been impressed at how many are interested in being a part of this meaningful process. Community input and representation through an active and ongoing APC is not only possible it is unequivocally essential.

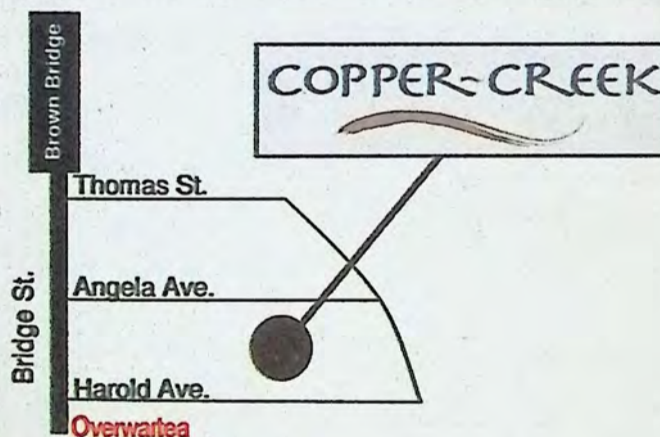
