Chamber creates business plan

Princeton & District Chamber of Commerce President Keith Olsen announced October 17th that the Chamber will be writing a new business plan to guide its operation.

"Chamber Directors believe that a business plan that reflects current realities and opportunities is needed," Olsen says.

"The Chamber needs to be on a secure financial footing, and that means adding sources of revenue and providing focussed services to members and the community."

Olsen says the new business plan is another step toward the Chamber of Commerce serving the business community. The Chamber recently completed a survey of businesses to determine what they want from the Chamber of Commerce.

Internally, an Operational Policy Manual and the new business plan will enable the Chamber to respond to what the business community wants.

Chambers of Commerce in British Columbia earn revenue from two major sources. Members pay fees that are used to assist the business community with events, promotions and increasing business management ability. The second source is from fee for service contracts. For example, the Town pays an annual fee to the Chamber for delivery of tourism information services.

Chamber Director Frank Armitage thinks there are opportunities to increase revenues from both continued on Page 10

Some regrets were expressed due to there not being a Halloween event at the grounds this year. It was noted that no volunteers have come forward to take over this event, and the volunteer fire brigade no longer has time to arrange the event. PXA members would cooperate, but cannot do

the entire spook house and bonfire event on their own.

The annual general meeting will take place at Town Hall November 18 at 7:00 PM. This will wrap up the PXA activities for 2008. Except for the Ag barn, the remainder of the grounds are shut down for the winter months.

The Town of Princeton has received the endorsement and request from property owners for a boundary extension. This boundary expansion includes properties within "East Princeton" and Jacobson and Airport Roads. The boundary extension is premised on the Town extending its water system to the expansion areas that are currently receiving water from systems with boil water notices/advisories or are obtaining water from private wells. There are also a few properties that are being included in the boundary expansion proposal for practical purposes in order to keep contiguous boundary lines. The pro-

posed properties lie within the Regional District of Okanagan-Similkameen.

NOTE: only one non-resident property elector may submit an *Elector Response Form* per property, regardless of how many homeowners there may be.

If less than ten (10) percent of the Town electors submit an *Elector Response Form*, the boundary extension request will be deemed to have the approval of the electors and the Town of Princeton may proceed to the British Columbia provincial government cabinet for approval. Committee plans strategy

The committee of volunteers who organize the annual Keremeos Pepper Festival will continue to work all through the winter months planning the 2009 Similkameen Sizzle.

Typically, the committee meets once or twice following the September event to finalize financial statements and firm up budgets then takes a break until February.

This year the committee will continue to meet monthly in order to get an early start on a number of tasks related to the 2009 Sizzle.

First on the list of priorities is a complete upgrade to the Pepperfest webpage. The committee has been using a webpage supplied by their umbrella group, Similkameen Country, but now wants to improve the online presence of the event for a variety of reasons.

Committee member Vicki Morgan says a more professional looking website will assist the group when promoting the event and approaching corporate sponsors for financial assistance.

Committee Chair Carroll MacLean agrees that a more professional looking website will assist the committee in a big way.

The 2009 Similkameen Sizzle will be promoted on a website located at www.gotpeppers.info a domain name picked by and donated for Sizzle's use by committee member George Elliott.

"I think something fun like, 'Got Peppers?' will not only be different enough for people to remember when looking for the website but I think it'll also give the group a unique way to tie in all other advertising with a 'got peppers' theme."

Elliott admits the campaign is a borrowed idea, but thinks it'll make the event easier to market.

"As much as I really like the name Similkameen Sizzle, outside of the Similkameen it's difficult for people to spell the name of the valley, so something like 'got peppers' will be so much easier to get across just about anywhere and it asks a simple question. Got peppers? Here's where you can find out more about a celebration we

hold where we embrace all things hot and spicy. I think it'll be a lot of fun to play with."

The Sizzle committee will also use the 'off-season' to try to find ways to encourage more participation by area growers, particularly those with peppers in their fields.

"I've never really thought too much about it, but we have a celebration that celebrates peppers and there's not much selling of that product going on at the event, so we need to find a way to tie that in better," Elliott explains.

The less-than-perfect growing season did affect the pepper crop this year, so that's another issue the committee has to try to factor into the plan.

Aside from those key elements, the committee was very pleased with how the event went on September 20th.

As for the schedule of events held in Memorial Park, a few changes will take place, but they will be related more to timing than anything else.

The Cruzeros were very well received and attempts are currently underway to see if they are available to performing in September 2009.

"These guys are very popular, so you never know, and we just can't wait too long or they could be completely booked up by then," Elliott adds.

The 2009 Similkameen Sizzle, the 8th annual, will be on Saturday, September 19th in Keremeos Memorial Park.

Walk Against Violence reaches Princeton

The Multi-Faith Walk Against Violence reached Princeton last week.

The walkers, led by Iman Syed

Soharwardy, has now completed more than 6,100-kilometres of their cross country walk.

The walkers are expected to reach

Vancouver later this month.

They began their walk on April 20th at the docks in Halifax and will eventually end up in Victoria

on October 27th.

The walk aims to raise awareness about the dangers and the consequences of using violence to resolve conflicts. The concept of the dignity of life, "Save a life, save humanity," is sacred to all faiths, and it is this concept which unites their followers.

The Walk is also a graphic representation of the fact that faith and faith leaders, far from being an impediment to conflict resolution, can be a powerful and valuable resource - especially when faith groups work together.

The Walk also focuses on the many faces of violence which include physical violence (the use of brute force such as battering and child abuse, domestic violence, gangs, bullying and elder abuse); terrorism (the calculated use of violence or threat of violence against civilians in order to attain goals that are political, religious or ideological in nature - this is done through intimidation, coercion or instilling fear); structural violence (violence

that is built into social, political and economic structures such as caste, patriarchy, etc.); and racial discrimination (any distinction, exclusion, restriction or preference based on race, colour, descent, national or ethnic origin which has the purpose or effect of nullifying or impairing the recognition, enjoyment or exercise, on an equal footing, of human rights and fundamental freedoms in the political, economic, social, cultural or any other field of public life).

Syed Soharwardy, the leader of the walk, and the founder of Muslims Against Terrorism, has made a commitment to walk the entire length of the route across Canada. Other faith leaders, who will be joining him along the way, have made their own resolutions as to the distances they will be walking.

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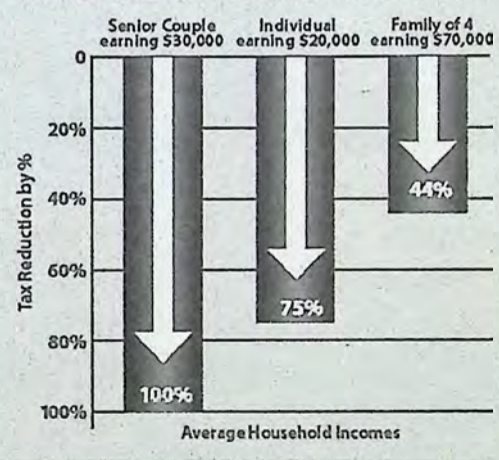
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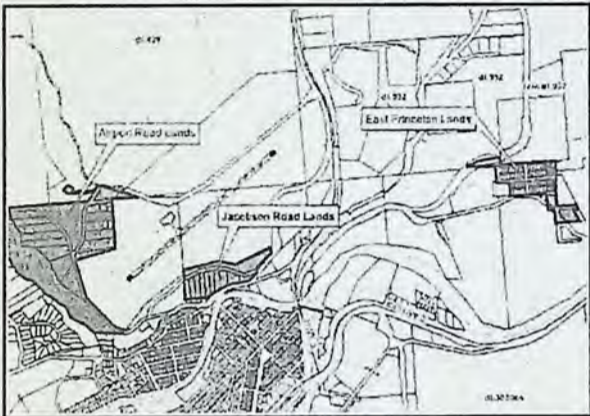

Pregnant moms, cancer patients get hi-tech 'video' checkups

(NC)—Pregnant women in remote areas of Quebec enjoy the same peace of mind in prenatal care as their urban counterparts, with the help of telehealth videoconferencing and electronic health records.

"Mainly what we do here is tele-ultrasound," says Dr. Nathalie Boulanger, a general practitioner in Kuujuaq, the main village in Nunavik, in northern Quebec. "Most are for pregnant women."

In addition to assessing a pregnancy's term date, the technology helps diagnose life-threatening conditions for mothers and unborn fetuses.

For example, says Dr. Boulanger, at the Tulattavik Health Centre of the Ungava, a woman who had a potentially cancerous 'molar pregnancy' - a condition that mimics pregnancy symptoms - was able to get life-saving treatment. Another woman, whose fetus lacked part of its abdominal wall, was flown to an urban centre to receive lifesaving surgery for her newborn.

An electronic health record and a satellite-based video-conferencing

system along with the ultrasound machine, transmit the images to a gynecologist in Montreal, who reads them 'live' onscreen, in real time. The unit is also used to assess pediatric cardiology and kidney patients.

"Telehealth is the backbone of much of the progress in health care delivery in remote areas," says Richard Alvarez, president and CEO of Canada Health Infoway (Infoway) - a not-for-profit body that invests in electronic health record initiatives across the nation.

Infoway spent \$28.8 million on telehealth projects in the fiscal year 2007-08. It has been involved with 254 electronic health record projects to date, 57 of which are telehealth initiatives.

In Ontario, the Ontario Telemedicine Network facilitates delivery of clinical, educational and administrative services to more than 540 health care sites. Using live, two-way videoconferencing with digital stethoscopes and hand-held exam cameras, practitioners thousands of kilometers away can view patient's lab tests, medications, digital X-rays and CT scans, and can interact with and 'see' patients.

Daniel Girard, a leukemia patient in Cochrane, Ont., was treated through telehealth after a bone marrow transplant. Without this tech-

nology, he would have had to travel 1,400 kilometres to Toronto every week for follow up care, but instead he simply went to his local hospital where he electronically 'visited' with Janice Wright, advanced practice nurse for the transplant program at Princess Margaret Hospital, to complete his care.

"The complexity with transplant cases is managing the symptoms," Wright says. "Often patients are on immunosuppressant medications and typically need to be monitored closely for their schedule and for tapering off."

Wright says telehealth equipment provides accurate diagnostics to properly assess the complicated post-transplant symptoms.

"We really do feel like pioneers," she says. "It also helps bring our expertise to the local community hospitals and improves their knowledge base."

Girard says "the convenience is unreal. It's so much better for my recuperation."

Through telehealth technology in Yukon, all 13 communities across the territory are linked to general practitioners in Whitehorse and Whitehorse General Hospital, as well as to specialists in Alberta and British Columbia providing diabetes education, cardiology consultations and rehabilitation services.

Eat your pumpkin!

A lot of good food is wasted every Halloween, and it is a shame. We toss aside those Jack o' Lanterns as if pumpkins were meant for nothing else, but in other countries, people carve them to cook them, for good reason.

Pumpkins are high in nutrition, especially high in beta-carotene, the nutrient that helps prevent cancer. Pumpkin is an excellent source of lutein and zeaxanthin, which helps prevent blindness in older people by keeping eyes healthy. Both lutein and zeaxanthin are found in the lenses of your eyes. These two nutrients scavenge free radicals, protecting not only your eyes, but your heart, circulation and immune system.

In cancer prevention, the pumpkin has something besides beta-carotene to work with. Pumpkins contain phenolic acids, which bind carcinogens and prevent them from being absorbed.

Pumpkin's rich beta-carotene content is good for your skin, and for your lymphatic system, helping to fight off flu and colds. Pumpkin is a great food for winter.

Pumpkins are rich in iron, but the seeds are even richer in iron. Instead of cleaning out the pumpkin and throwing out the seeds, clean the seeds and roast them as a nutritious treat. Not only will you get iron from pumpkin seeds, but zinc and protein.

In most countries of the world, pumpkin is eaten as a vegetable. It is roasted in pieces, leaving the skin on. You can eat it this way, or you can scrape the cooked flesh away from the skin and mash it.

North Americans, who learned from native Americans how to grow and eat pumpkin, have lots of ways to use this valuable vegetable. We mash it and strain it to make pies, cookies, puddings and pumpkin loaf, all of which are good for us.

When the kids are carving the pumpkin, have them do it the day before Halloween, then let it give light for one day, and cook it the next. For the sake of your health, don't throw it away!

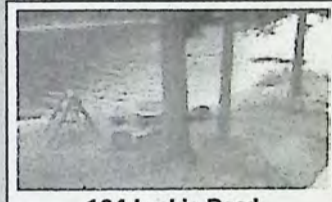

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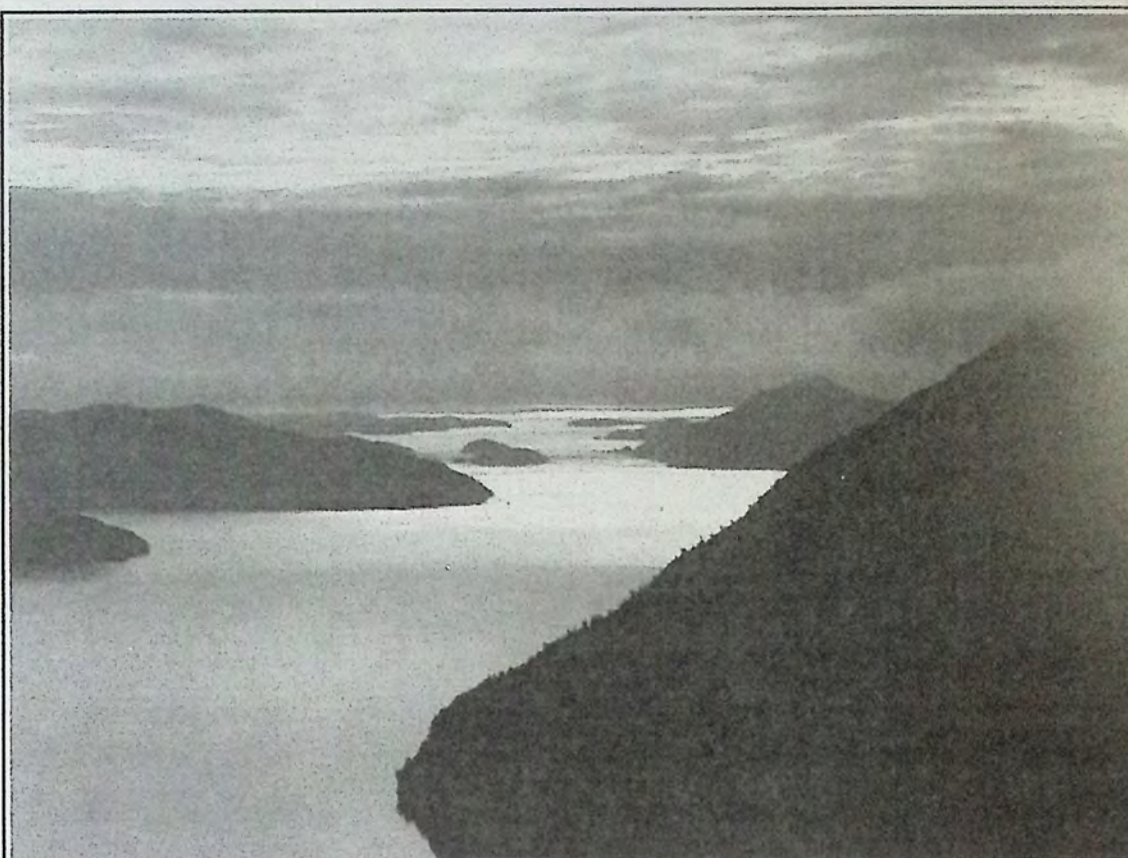

The Road From Bute - Pt. 1

ALFRED PENDERELL WADDINGTON
INSIGHTS INTO BC'S HISTORY

Alfred Waddington was born on October 2nd, 1801, at Crescent House, Brompton, England. He received his early education in England and attended the Ecole Speciale in Paris. He also spent two years at Leipzig and attended the University of Gottingen in Germany.

From the late 1820's to the mid-1840's Waddington worked with his brothers at a number of ventures in France, but none were financially successful. In May 1850, he sailed for California in the wake of the California gold rush and became a partner in the firm of Dunlip and Waddington, wholesale grocers in San Francisco.

Following the news of the Fraser River gold rush, Waddington moved north and in 1858 established himself in Victoria on Vancouver Island. Although not interested in the actual search for gold, Waddington had political and commercial aspirations. Shortly after arriving he published *The Fraser Mines Vindicated*, the first non-government book published in the Vancouver Island Colony.

He was elected to the Colonial Legislature in 1860 as a Reform candidate who favoured small, local government, religious equality and greater financial freedom. In 1861 he resigned because he was disillusioned and distraught by the political process.

Waddington's progressive thinking and actions were frequently premature, his ideas being too far ahead of the other colonists and his time. He also fought hard for women's rights and helped draft Victoria's charter, but declined a nomination to be Victoria's first Mayor.

No longer a member of the Legislative Assembly, Waddington shifted his focus to the construction of a wagon road to the Cariboo goldfields. Although several proposals had been made, Waddington passionately advocated the shorter Bute Inlet route and lobbied the press and his political allies for support. Both the financing and the construction of the road proved problematical, but Waddington persisted, finally ratifying a draft agreement in 1863.

Work began on the construction of the road at the head of Bute Inlet, but after the Chicotin War of 1864, the enterprise collapsed. Waddington tried unsuccessfully to recover his expenses, but the Bute Inlet Route had virtually bankrupted him.

Waddington meantime resumed his business interests and became active in the pro-Confederation campaign. Although the Government refused to provide him with compensation for his Bute Inlet enterprise, Waddington's visions only became larger.

He became a tireless advocate of a transcontinental railway, to be built from Canada to British Columbia and to connect to Vancouver Island via Bute Inlet.

Although he did not witness the construction of the CPR and his proposal was unlikely to win the contract, the Federal Government purchased his surveys that helped to create a solid foundation upon which to build what was then the largest railway in the world.

While in Ottawa lobbying for the Bute Inlet route, Alfred Penderell Waddington died of smallpox on February 26th, 1872 at the age of 71. continued next week

"Woodlie Park will be a place that young and old can enjoy the outdoors and the playground," says Christensen.

"The park has been designed to

Woodlie Park was named after three miners: Barry Woodin, Larry Leslie and Harry Wood who became caretakers in 1958 when Kootenay Power gave them land for a park and the Beacon Family, who owned the store at that time, also donated a piece of land.

The BC Spirit Square Project at Woodlie Park in Hedley is expected to be completed in late November which will be followed by a grand opening ceremony and celebration.

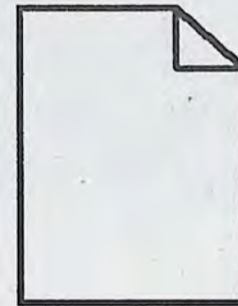

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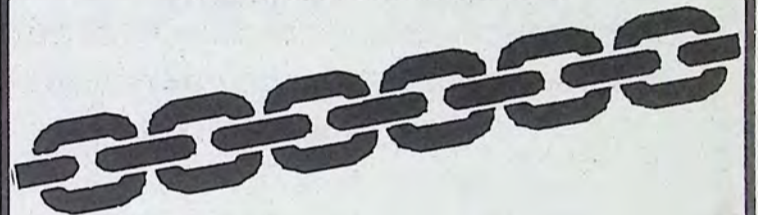

Thai Peanut Noodles

(NC)—Nobody knows peanut sauces like Thai cooks. Here is one of their simplest and best noodle dishes. Serve warm or at room temperature, perfect anytime.

- 1 jar Thai Kitchen Peanut Satay Sauce
- 1 red bell pepper, cut into small strips 1/4" wide and 1" long
- 1 cucumber, peeled and cut into small strips 1/4" wide and 1" long
- 1 large carrot, grated coarsely
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 1 tsp sugar
- 1 package Thai Kitchen Stir Fry Rice Noodles
- Optional garnishes: sprigs of fresh cilantro and 1/4 cup crushed unsalted peanuts

In a large bowl, combine Thai Kitchen Peanut Satay sauce, bell pepper, cucumber, carrot, salt, and sugar. Mix thoroughly and set aside.

Bring a large pot of water to a boil. Add Thai Kitchen Stir Fry Rice Noodles and cook for 3-5 minutes until noodles are soft, cooked through but still firm and al dente, not mushy. Rinse with cold water for 30 seconds. Drain the water from the noodles and immediately add the warm noodles to the vegetable mixture. Maybe there's room for some change and I have to say that any and all the candidates - regardless of what you may or may not know about them - deserve a little pat on the back for being brave enough to toss their hats in the ring with hopes of having a little to do with the future of our community.

I know when I ran for Council I thought I could make a contribution of some kind to the community I had chosen to stay in and call my home. I thought that maybe my voice, however small it was in the overall scheme of things, may actually be heard on issues I cared about and issues I was passionate about.

I did not run for council thinking my single vote at the council table was going to make huge changes or grind the wheels of progress to a halt.

I was looking forward to working with a council that including voices from different segments of the community - which I thought gave 'the team' a real sense of balance.

I was also looking forward to lively debate and a team atmosphere where all of us could be winners.

I never got that chance as I was not elected to Town Council.

But I've always admired those who were elected by the people they work for to run our town as best they can with the tools they have available.

And although I've never always agreed with some of the things they've done, they've simply done what they can with the best interest of those of us they work for in mind.

Hopefully the new team carries on that tradition.

Too much panic spells disaster

At our Thanksgiving dinner last week, one of the things we were thankful for is that we are not American!

The financial problems of the Americans will touch us, but probably not for a few months. In the meantime, let's look at the positive side of being Canadian.

We tend to always compare ourselves to Americans without any real understanding of the good things we have put in place that make us more secure than the average American. Watching television shows giving advice to American families about what to do about their financial problems, the difference was brought home to me immediately. The first and strongest advice to Americans was to keep paying their health insurance, no matter what. The average American family of four pays around \$300 a month for health insurance. In the past, we compared our income tax rates to those of Americans, but I don't mind paying a little extra when it takes care of Medicare. I know the American health insurance companies would love to get their fingers into our health care pie, because it is worth a lot of money to them, especially when you consider they run on a private hospital system in which profits are the motive. Our health care system functions on the basis of need, and although we may have waiting lists, the system does not bankrupt individuals. We are far better off in the long run. Of course, keep on paying your BC Medical insurance no matter what, but be thankful it is not so high as the Americans pay.

One of the things the Americans did not mention was that their banking system ranks fortieth in the world, and ours ranks as Number One. A secure banking system prevents bank closures and keeps our savings safe. Some of our banks were giving mortgages to young people who could not afford them, following the lead of the craziness going on in the States. Again, let's not follow the

example of a system worse than ours!

Many Canadians felt something must be wrong with our financial situation because the value of our dollar was dropping against the American dollar. To understand why this occurred, you have to understand that the value of money depends on who wants it most at any given time. Dollars and other monies are bought and sold just like any other commodity. The value of the American dollar soared because the Americans were liquidating overseas assets and bringing their money back to the U.S.A. Many of the big mutual funds and hedge funds sold off foreign holdings in stocks and bonds, even selling at a loss, just to bring the money back home. Our dollar was quite secure.

Americans have lost 750,000 jobs during the past year, and are still losing jobs. Canada created 107,000 new jobs in one month. Yes, a lot of these jobs may be part-time, but those jobs represent money flowing into Canadian pockets.

What must be our biggest concern at this time?

Our biggest concern is to pay down credit card debt before the impact of the American financial disaster hits us. Not only will this make us more secure as individuals, but we will be more secure as a nation. The big reason to pay down your credit card debt is that the credit card companies will be increasing their interest rates and decreasing your limit. In other words, if you are able to run up \$10,000 on your credit card now, that could suddenly be decreased to a \$5,000 limit. When you go over your limit, you are expected to pay up immediately, and you could find yourself in a bind all of a sudden. Credit is going to get tighter, and those with the least debt will suffer the least. Cut your risks while you still have time.

Many people fear a major financial depression such as the Great Depression. True, what got the Americans into the present mess are the same kinds of things that sparked the stock market crash that led to the Great Depression. However, there is a difference right now. Few people

are aware that the Great Depression was not too bad for the first couple of years. What made it become so desperate was the Great Drought of the 1930's. The prairie provinces and states turned into a dust bowl. All those people who worked on farms were out of work. Food production dropped dramatically, as the prairies are the breadbasket of North America, and the breadbasket feeds not only bread to humans, but feed to hogs and cattle. Our prairies are producing food at the same level as always, and if we do not have another Great Drought, we will not see another Great Depression.

What we will see is a temporary downturn in our economy if people start paying off those credit cards. Do not expect it to be a major downturn, because there is another factor that comes to our aid: the pensioners. Our Canada Pension system is still in good health, and our old age pensioners will still be receiving their monthly bank deposits. Although this money is not big money, the pensioners will still be spending as they always do. When you consider that about 25 percent of our population (more in our region) are pensioners, we still have one out of four people continuing to spend in their usual way. This is a stabilizing influence.

If you are wondering how you can pay down those credit cards and still buy what you need, try shopping in thrift stores, plan to produce some of your own food next year, and buy only what you need to buy. There is a big difference between "want" and "need". Shop at yard sales, especially those "down-sizing" yard sales. A lot of older people are trying to get rid of a lot of stuff without taking it to the landfill. Go shopping at the Elks Country Store, they have a lot of good furniture and housewares at rock bottom prices. The added advantage of this kind of shopping is 1. it is a form of recycling, and 2. your purchase price goes to charity. You win in three ways: you help your budget, you help the environment and you help your less fortunate fellow citizens.

Whatever you do, don't panic! Plan and be sensible.

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

POINTS OF PROGRESS - Health Care

1) We need to work harder than other communities to recruit and retain health care professionals, the competition is fierce and we need to continue to package all the assets and attributes Princeton offers in order to attract those interested in our quality of life. We need to renew and rejuvenate our recruitment and retention committee.

4) I was pleased to work with Joanne Ferguson, Interior Health and the Hospital Foundation in helping our ambulance attendants raise their qualifications to a higher standard. There has also been a movement to try to assist in the operation of the hospital by attendants interacting to a greater extent, this is a superb idea and we need to promote any interaction that will reduce pressure on health care personnel and help retain more highly qualified attendants.

6) Princeton has got to work towards being the best age friendly community it can be, from playgrounds and parks for our youngsters to trouble-free picturesque paths for our seniors. The consolidation of our health care unit and doctors' offices has helped to make one-stop services available and more financially attractive for potential full time doctors but we have to keep improving on the transportation service for those who find it difficult to access those services.

2) Our council's proactive interaction with Interior Health which was recognized by Health Minister Abbott that has resulted in full time locum coverage must continue and expand to all medical professional coverage. Council's total commitment to this undertaking will have to remain until we are in the position of total staff coverage that are full time residents.



3) In addition to recruitment, the employment situation for nurses has to be reviewed so that we are more able to attract and retain those who wish to remain in Princeton yet are not qualifying for full time status and benefits. This was brought to the Minister's attention at our meeting, he was in agreement with our position and his staff was preparing options to deal with it.

5) Our overall outlook to our transportation system within the community has to be revisited, from conveniences for the disabled all the way to paths which encourage walking and biking to work or for exercise. Princeton could be a leader in encouraging alternate modes of transportation and as we are doing it, the health of the community will be improving and the strain on our medical services would be decreasing.

Princeton is lucky to have the greatest level of compassionate medical professionals anywhere, from Doctor Adams and Doctor Van Heerden to our locum coverage, through our countless nurses and medical personnel. Yet we can never quit working to improve their working conditions and the staff they need to assist them, we must also never stop taking the time to remind them of how much we appreciate the job they do for us.

We owe a great deal to Irene and by presenting her with this framed certificate, we wish to honour her for all the contributions she has made, not only to the club and its members, but also to the community.

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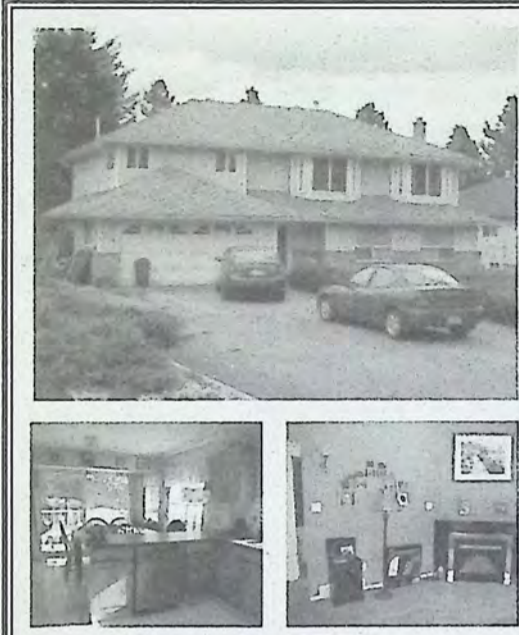
