



## Forum fills Legion Hall

Over 200 people filled Princeton Legion Hall to capacity for the first of two all-candidates forums hosted by Princeton & District Chamber of Commerce on October 28th.

The first half of the forum focused on the candidates seeking the seat of Regional District Area H (Princeton Rural) Director.

In their opening statements the two candidates briefly introduced themselves. Brad Hope, the challenger, explained he and his wife moved to Princeton 22 years ago and that he has experience in the operation of a variety of small businesses.

Gerri Logan, the incumbent, was

first elected Area H Director in 1999 and in addition to her Regional District duties, sits on boards for 12 different community groups and organizations.

When asked what their vision for the future of Area H and expected challenges were Logan stated, "The future depends on the people themselves" and that the challenge would be to "make it all work."

Hope responded by saying he saw a lot of challenges, along with opportunities.

"I see opportunity in every challenge" which included industrial development provided the environment is protected.

## Second forum moves to PSS gym

What do you do when you have the task of hosting an all-candidates forum with a record number of sixteen candidates?

The Princeton & District Chamber of Commerce did a pretty good job of planning the second of two forums at Princeton Secondary School Gym on October 29th.

The candidates were split up into groups of four per table with questions drawn at random and asked at one of four tables, also chosen at random.

The seating arrangements placed incumbent Ray Jarvis at Table #1 along with Rick Hudson, Solana Allison and Frank Armitage. Table #2 had Doug Rebagliati, Jim Bernard, Kim Maynard and John Babiak. Jason Earle, Dina Slowikowski-Campbell, Tom Guerster and Darrell Dobie were at Table #3 with Jon Bartlett, Bob Hart, Marilyn Harkness and Randall Gibson at Table #4.

Each candidate had a maximum of 45-seconds for his or her answers to questions collected earlier through submission to the Chamber of Commerce.

As was the case the previous evening, the questions covered a wide variety of subjects, issues and concerns.

On the matter of implementing a CBM no drill zone around Princeton the foursome at the table that got that question were all in agreement with the suggestion (Jarvis, Hudson, Allison and Armitage).

When asked about a safe, fun and relaxing place to be built for area youth Jon Bartlett stated, "Where are the parents in this question?" Bob Hart agreed with Bartlett but added, "Town Council is the leader" when it comes to such projects. Marilyn Harkness referred to it as "the 4,000 year old question" and suggested getting youth involved in creating the solution and Randall Gibson was blunt in his response, "We can't afford it."

When asked how many candidates had attended at least three complete Town Council meetings, with the exception of Ray Jarvis,

and with the exception of attending as part of a regular meeting agenda item, only Rick Hudson, Solana Allison and Jon Bartlett were able to say they had.

On the subject of what could be done about local food sourcing and affordable housing Jim Bernard responded with, "I don't know" and Kim Maynard said he was "not terribly knowledgeable about that" but suggested a food bank as a possible solution. John Babiak offered "setting up areas for people to lease market gardens" and Doug Rebagliati suggested taking an inventory of local resources and work on developing solutions based on those findings.

When asked if voting against a personal project, if it was in the best interest of the community, would be possible Dina Slowikowski-Campbell stated she would be elected by the public to represent them. Tom Guerster responded with, "It's not my decision. Majority rules." Jason Earle summed it up with, "If the Town wanted my pet project voted down, so be it."

One question focused on the large number of inexperienced candi-

dates seeking municipal office and questioned "How do you think you're qualified to make decisions on behalf of the Town of Princeton?"

Darrell Dobie said, "That's not my decision to make, that's your decision."

When asked about how many volunteer contributions had been made in the past 12 months, Ray Jarvis stated, "Well, volunteering is my middle name."

On defining the qualities of good leadership Bob Hart answered with, "You have to lead and be able to follow," where Marilyn Harkness explained, "Good leaders have a vision. Good leaders can tell others about that vision to get them excited and want to follow that leader."

On the subject of going to referendum for an indoor pool project, all candidates agreed that would be the way to decide on the facility.

A curious question asked candidates to stand if they were in favour of extending the water line from Firemasters up to the cemetery for proper sprinkling. Solana Allison, Doug Rebagliati, Tom Guerster, Darrell Dobie, Jon Bartlett,

Marilyn Harkness and Randall Gibson did not leave their seats.

When asked about availability for meetings Jason Earle was clear with, "Absolutely I'll make the time. I love this town."

A question asking what candidates felt the responsibilities of Town Council to the Town of Princeton were saw Jim Bernard answering with, "Listening to what the people want," and Kim Maynard agreed saying that would be "number one."

When asked why candidates wanted to be elected to Town Council Solana Allison stated, "I'm tired of lobbying for change from the outside."

As for the tolerance level of recreational drugs in Princeton, the table lucky enough to get that question all agreed (Bartlett, Hart, Harkness and Gibson) that they had no tolerance.

The issue of CBM being an incentive to seek election to Town Council was not why Doug Rebagliati, Jim Bernard, Kim Maynard or John Babiak filed papers.

they would be available to meet the public at the Council Chambers on a regular basis.

As for the deer problem, the most entertaining answers came from Jim Bernard who suggested taking a basket of carrots downtown and "lead them out of town," where Rick Hudson stated deer on the streets of downtown were perhaps not a Town Council issue, "It's a

parent problem."

Jason Earle stated, "Where you have deer, you have the animals who eat deer. That's the problem" and Jon Bartlett got everyone laughing with his statement that the deer issue "is an Area H problem."

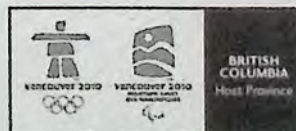
Only four of these candidates will become Councillors representing the Town of Princeton and you get to pick 'em on November 15th.



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# CMMC opens mine!

Copper Mountain Mining Corporation (CMMC or the Company) announced October 31st that the Company's Board of Directors have authorized management to proceed with the development of the Copper Mountain Project (Project) subject to the Company finalizing its financing arrangements as well as obtaining the required operating permit amendments for the Project.

The Company has ordered long lead major equipment items. Site work has progressed well with the re-establishment of water, sewer and power to the administration /mine dry building that will be used during project construction and operation.

Major items ordered include critical loading and hauling mobile equipment and the Sag Mill and Ball Mills needed to establish design and layout for the grinding and the mill building to maintain the production start-up date of December 2010.

Jim O'Rourke, Chief Executive Officer of the Company stated, "I am pleased with the project progress and the support from our Board of Directors in light of the financial uncertainty in the overall markets. We plan to proceed in a prudent manner to meet our pro-

duction goal by the end of 2010." Hatch Ltd. has been awarded the engineering contract and Merit Consultants International Inc. has been appointed construction manager. Both companies have a wealth of experience in developing mining projects in British Columbia.

The Company is continuing discussions with Mitsubishi Materials Corporation under the terms of the MOU announced in the Company's news release on October 1, 2008.

**About Mitsubishi Materials Corporation:**

- Established in 1950, MMC is one of the worlds largest diversified materials companies and is a leader in metal smelting and refining, cement products, fabricated metals and advanced materials for electric components.

MMC has invested in 4 (four) copper mines now under operation, namely Los Pelambres, Escondida (both in Chile), Huckleberry (Canada) and Batu Hijau (Indonesia).

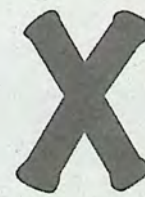

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

## Cawston StrongStart program opens

Okanagan-Westside MLA Rick Thorpe joined Okanagan Similkameen board of education chair June Harrington, parents, caregivers and district staff October 29th at the official opening of the Province's StrongStart BC early learning centre at Cawston Primary school.

"The Cawston StrongStart BC Centre will help many Similkameen-area children take their first steps toward success," said Thorpe.

"Parents and caregivers will also benefit as they learn skills and strategies to better prepare their children for increased confidence, awareness and learning ability."

StrongStart BC is a free drop-in early learning program for preschool-aged children accompanied by a parent or caregiver. A qualified early childhood educator leads activities, including stories, music, and arts, to help children grow linguistically, emotionally and socially, and become comfortable in a school-like setting.

All of B.C.'s 60 school districts

have been offered the opportunity to participate in the StrongStart BC program. The Province has committed \$43 million for 400 centres by 2010. StrongStart BC centres also help fulfill government's election platform and throne speech commitments to use underutilized school district space as centres to deliver early-learning services.

"We know that one in four children enter kindergarten not developmentally ready to succeed," said Education Minister Shirley Bond.

"StrongStart BC centres support families and young learners as they acquire the pre-literacy skills that are so critically important for their success."

The Okanagan-Similkameen school district has received \$50,000 for the Cawston StrongStart BC centre. This includes \$20,000 to prepare the Cawston Primary in-school space, including renovations and the purchase of new equipment and learning materials and \$30,000 to

fund this year's operating costs, including staff, professional development, supplies and healthy snacks.

"School District 53 Okanagan Similkameen is very pleased to be able to provide a StrongStart BC program at Cawston Primary school," said Harrington.

"We realize the importance of these early years in a child's intellectual development, and StrongStart BC is an excellent way to provide early learning opportunities for young children and parents."

StrongStart BC centres are helping the Province reach its goal of making B.C. the best-educated, most literate jurisdiction on the continent. In addition, the Province has created the Early Childhood Learning Agency, which is currently conducting a feasibility study on offering all-day kindergarten for five-year olds and optional pre-kindergarten for children aged three and four.

Since 2001, government has invested more than \$145 million in new literacy initiatives, including pre-literacy and early learning programs such as almost \$12 million to operate the kindergarten readiness program Ready, Set, Learn and \$2.7 million for the ActNow Literacy Education Activity and Play (LEAP BC) program that encourages literacy, physical activity and healthy eating in preschool-aged children.

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When asked how the candidates would respond if they had to choose between a personal ideal and Area H Hope said, "Finding consensus and working towards consensus is what we have to do."

Logan agreed crediting her advisory board for providing assistance.

"There's a lot of checks and balances along the way" and added she didn't get elected to further her personal goals, "I was elected by you to represent you."

On the subject of a District Municipality, Hope said it was a concept the "makes some sense" as he feels it is "awkward with only one person representing Area H" compared to a full council representing the Town of Princeton.

Logan responded by saying the current arrangement is working, with both Area H and the Town sharing a lot of services, and sees it continuing to work in the future.

When asked about choosing between economic growth and maintaining a small town atmosphere Logan stated change is inevitable and that economic growth is part of those changes.

Hope says both can happen, "It comes down to how creative we can be."

Other questions covered a number of topics from whether or not the candidates had conflicts of interest and were able to identify them (neither had any as far as they

could tell) to Highway 3 improvements to Hope (both supported the need).

In their closing statements, Logan said rural residents had "invested nine years into my political education" and that "we are not the same rural area we were nine years ago and no one knows that better than me."

Hope said that since moving to the area he's seen many threats to the region in the form of industrial development that could potentially damage the landscape, "I'm tired of fighting these things, I want to start building."

The second part of the all-candidates forum concentrated on the Mayor's race which features four hopefuls: incumbent Randy McLean, Jim Manion, Maria Sadegur and Esther Donovan.

When asked what their vision for the future of Princeton is McLean said the current Council had set a foundation "I believe will lead us" and referred to it as the Bridge to the Future that he said "will help us to feel better about our community."

Manion's future includes a "well-rounded economy in the town" where he would try to increase the tax base by attracting new business.

Sadegur thanked the town staff and consultants for helping develop the Official Community Plan, the document intended to direct the future development of the commu-

nity. She also sees improvements to the Industrial Park as "in the long run it'll bring pride back to the town."

Donovan said she saw positive economic growth in the future. "We have to show that Princeton is open for business" and assist in developing the town into "a happy, family place to live."

When asked what issues the candidates want to address once elected the list was varied.

Manion wants to finish projects currently underway and develop an economic base as well as new housing and solidify the local healthcare system. Sadegur pointed to the OCP, housing, healthcare, the industrial park and completion of current projects. Donovan wants to pursue new business and industry, get all businesses together on a downtown western theme, improve health services, develop affordable housing and promote the town as a destination for all seasons. McLean chose healthcare, complete current projects and package them into a total tourist strategy, housing and improvements to Highway 3 as high priorities.

Other questions asked of the candidates covered topics such as whether or not they favoured going to a referendum on a proposed pool project (all said yes) to the deer problem and ways to reduce carbon footprints.

The forum lasted a total of two hours.

During snow removal operations, plow operators cannot avoid leaving ridges of snow (called windrows) at the foot of driveways. Residents and business owners are responsible for clearing the windrow from their own driveways and entrances.

Residents and businesses are responsible for removing snow and ice from sidewalks in front of their homes and businesses. Failure to do so can result in a fine of up to \$100.

Thank you for your cooperation in following these simple steps to ensure a safe winter season and remember, if you're out on the roads during a snowstorm, drive with caution and according to road conditions. Stay a safe distance from snow removal equipment. They need room to do the job safely!

### Protect With Potassium

Potassium is a mineral essential to several body functions. Potassium helps regulate heart rhythm and keeps the nervous system healthy. Potassium helps prevent high blood pressure and stroke, and acts to balance the body's electrolytes. Adequate potassium is necessary for proper muscle contraction. It is essential in working with sodium (salt) to control the body's water balance. Potassium is needed for hormone secretion, but stress can cause hormones to be secreted that result in a loss of potassium.

Diuretics, kidney disorders, diarrhea and laxatives can disrupt the body's potassium levels, as well as stress. Eating a lot of salty foods can reduce the potassium levels.

How can we keep our potassium levels adequate?

Many foods contain potassium. Potatoes, bananas, peas, beans, fish, apricots, avocados, blackstrap molasses, brewer's yeast, brown rice, dates, nuts, garlic, raisins, winter squash and yams are excellent sources, as well as dairy products, meat and fish.

The adverse effects of stress on potassium levels raises the issue of maintaining a reasonably stress-free environment, or incorporating de-stressing factors into daily life. The first and most important stress release technique is regular daily exercise. Choose the exercise which makes you feel most relaxed. Walking is one of the best exercises, but your own choice may be team sports, swimming or skiing. You may not be able to swim or ski every day, but you can mix your exercises. An hour a day is best, but any exercise is better than none.

If you are good at meditation, do it, and relax.

Get at least eight hours sleep every night.

Do deep breathing exercises. These can be done anywhere at any time.

Take one day off every week. Use this day to rest, exercise, do a hobby, and don't pressure yourself to do anything very much.

Avoid caffeine, smoking, alcohol and drugs.

If problems are stressing you, maybe you need to consult a professional to help you solve the problems in your life. There are a lot of ways to solve problems, but the key to reducing stress caused by problems is to replace worry with a plan of action.

Remember: keep potassium levels up for good health. Eat a wide variety of potassium-rich foods and keep stress to a minimum.

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### The Chocolate War INSIGHTS INTO BC'S HISTORY

In the spring of 1947 the price of a bar of chocolate was raised from five to eight cents, during a time when a child's weekly allowance rarely exceeded fifteen cents the price hike was considered an outrage. This meant that a week of chores would be taken-up by two measly chocolate bars, always assuming that one could scrounge up the extra penny!

The 60% price increase took place on April 25th 1947; official-

ly the reason given was the post-war price of cocoa beans. Young people across Vancouver Island protested vehemently outside their confectionery stores, but the small town of Ladysmith was to lead the way for BC and the rest of Canada.

Following the lead of others "The Wigwam" in Ladysmith had raised the price of their chocolate bars and a sixteen year old, one Robert Parker, and his school chums were outraged!

Signs were painted and a protest was organized in the form of a boycott and strike. Parker actually decorated his old car, a 1923 McLaughlin, and a parade was staged. It was so successful they turned around and went back up the street! News of the "Chocolate Strike" quickly spread and within a week protests stretched across the Province.

On April 30th 1947, two hundred screaming children closed down the British Columbia Government when they stormed the Victoria Legislature demanding the return of the five cent chocolate bar. A day later in Toronto, students from three different secondary schools staged a mass protest. In Fredericton, children combined their sugar rations to make large quantities of homemade fudge. As the unrest spread there was a demonstration in every major City. Child pickets besieged store owners with whistles, arm bands and placards bearing slogans such as "Don't be a sucker! Don't buy 8 Cent Bars!"

As chocolate bar sales dropped by 80% overnight, the national boycott that had first started in Ladysmith, BC, was no longer a laughing matter for stunned pro-

prietors.

A cross-country protest was set for May 3rd, but it was quelled when an anonymous person leaked the story to the Toronto Telegram that one of the supporters of the cause was the National Federation of Labour Youth - a group known to be sympathetic with communist causes. At the zenith of its popularity, the inspiring movement fell victim to the times.

The Toronto Telegram blasted the youthful dissidents as stooges of Moscow. The paper labelled candy strikers "Another instrument in the Communist grand strategy of the creation of chaos!" and charged that "Communist youth organizers have been instructed to use every possible means of developing and encouraging the chocolate bar agitation."

Such Cold War paranoia defused public support for the children. Cowed by allegations of Communist involvement, grown-ups worked to short circuit the drive for the nickel bar.

In Vancouver, the 2,500 members of the Sat-Teen Club caved into pressure from priests, parents, teachers and City officials to terminate the group's involvement with the candy boycott, glumly declaring, "Mob demonstrations and strikes are not consistent with the ideals of the Club".

As similar scenarios were replayed across Canada the demoralized movement that had started in Ladysmith, like chocolate in the sun, melted away. BC children, idealistic and innocent in pursuit of a just cause, had been undone by powers beyond their understanding or control.

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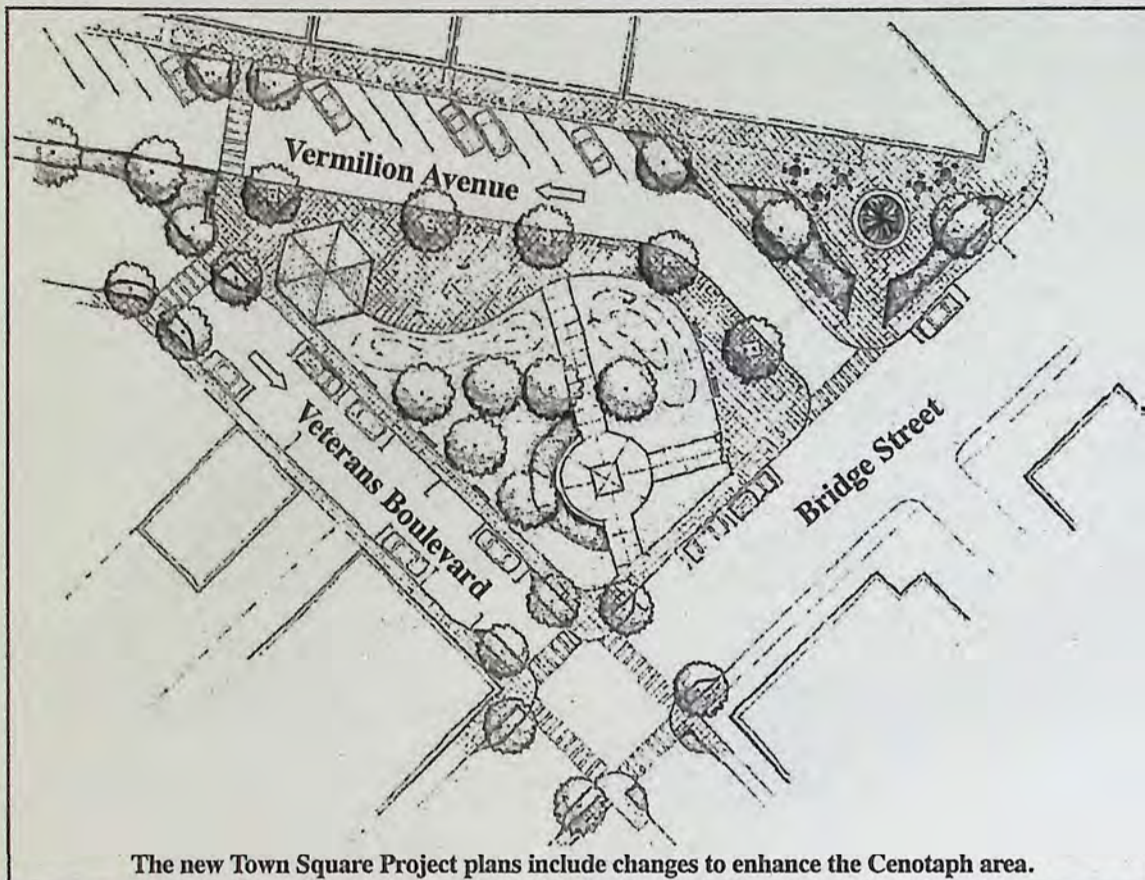

## Will we forget the wars?

Each November 11, those who remember go to a service organized by the Royal Canadian Legion. These Remembrance Day services held across Canada began after World War I to honour those who lost their lives in the war. The date, the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month marks the day World War I came to an end.

We make a donation to the Poppy Fund to help veterans, and we wear poppies to the annual services. We try to remember, and we try to make our young people understand the significance of this special day.

The twentieth century will go down in history as the century of two world wars, two moderate wars (Korea and Viet Nam) and a number of minor wars including Bosnia, Rwanda, Cuba, Somalia, Chechnya, Cyprus, the Falklands,

Cambodia, Afghanistan, Uganda, Kuwait, the Congo, and numerous wars of civil rebellion which occurred all over the planet, with the exception of North America, Australia and western Europe.

Veterans today worry that people will forget. They urge veterans to record their experiences to share their stories with younger generations. For those of us who have never been involved in war, it is hard to understand what it means to go to war.

### World War I

It would probably amaze young people today to learn that the assassination of one man launched World War I. On June 28, 1914, Archduke Franz Ferdinand of Austria was shot in Sarajevo by a member of the Serbian secret society called the "Black Hand". A month later, Austria declared war on Serbia. For nearly 40 years,

Austria had occupied the Turkish provinces of Bosnia and Hercegovina, and had annexed these provinces in 1908, going against a deal with Russia, which was eager to control the area. The Serbians wanted the Austrians out.

Germany backed Austria and warned the Russians to back off, and warned France and England to keep out of the fray. Britain began to negotiate a peace, but Austria and Germany were determined to go to war. When they launched their attack on Serbia, Russia mobilized and Britain supported Russia.

On August 2, the war escalated when Germany demanded free passage through Belgium, a neutral nation, to invade France. Belgium never did give a response to the German demand, as German troops crossed the Belgian border ..... continued on next page

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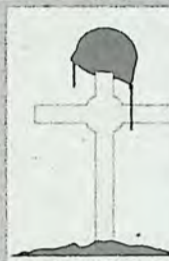

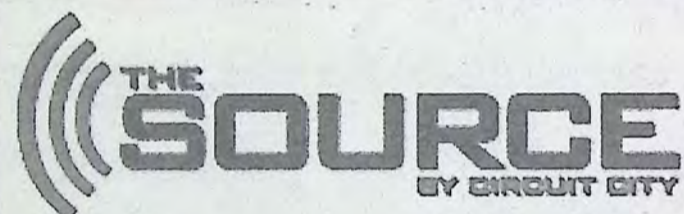

without waiting for a reply. Britain  
and France were in the war on  
August 4, 1914.

Hundreds of thousands of people  
died in the next four years. They  
died from wounds, starvation, dis-  
ease and exposure in the wet winter  
trenches.

#### World War II

World War II was to follow much  
the same scenario, with Germany  
building up its forces from 1933 to

1939. Germany was determined to  
take over Europe, but began in  
1935 with a war in Africa, with  
Italy as an ally. In 1939, Germany  
invaded Poland and Europe went  
to war again. Germany had another  
ally, the Japanese, and they had  
been attacking their ancient enemy,  
China. The war was spreading  
rapidly around the globe. From the  
first German, Italian and Japanese  
invasions, to the end of the war in  
August 1945, the world was at war

for 10 years. The war finally ended  
with the first military use of a  
nuclear bomb. Hopefully, this  
would be the last use of such a  
weapon.

Millions of people died in World  
War II.

#### The other wars

The next war began in Korea, with  
China as an ally to North Korea.  
This was the first deployment of  
United Nations troops, but that did  
not make it any less devastating for  
Korea. Today, Korea remains a  
divided country.

Viet Nam was the next war, fought  
primarily by the Americans and  
South Vietnamese on one side and  
China with the North Vietnamese  
on the other. Today, Viet Nam is all  
one nation, but the devastation of  
war is still in evidence.

The war in Afghanistan went on for  
more than 10 years as Russia tried  
to crush Afghani rebels covertly  
armed by the United States. Russia  
finally pulled out.

The next war was short lived:  
Britain went to war to maintain its  
ownership of the Falkland Islands,  
which were threatened by annexa-  
tion to a South American nation.

In the meantime, there were upris-  
ings and skirmishes all around the  
world, with the United Nations fre-  
quently asking member nations to  
step in with troops. Canada has  
played a major role in deploying  
peacekeeping forces to these areas.

The most recent wars were with  
Iraq. The first war, in the 1990's,  
was as a result of Iraq trying to take  
over Kuwait. This war was sanc-  
tioned by the United Nations. The  
second was the result of an  
American initiative with a goal of  
getting rid of Saddam Hussein. The  
United Nations would not sanction  
it. Canadian soldiers are still dying  
in the name of peacekeeping in  
Afghanistan.

The primary cause of all of these  
wars was economic expansion, eth-  
nic pride, and political ambition.  
Some things never change.

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## May 2009 Provincial Referendum on Electoral Reform

**Call for Applications for Referendum Group Funding - Application Deadline Dec. 1, 2008**

On May 12, 2009, British Columbians will vote in a provincewide referendum on whether to adopt the  
single transferable vote (STV) electoral system for electing Members of the Legislative Assembly.

The Government of British Columbia will provide \$500,000 in funding  
to one group on each side of the debate to support or oppose the STV  
electoral system proposed by the Citizens' Assembly on Electoral Reform.

#### How Can Funds be Used?

Each group will be able to use its funding for specific activities to support  
or oppose STV, including:

- producing brochures, posters, buttons or other communications materials;
- creating or sponsoring print, radio and TV ads;
- holding events such as rallies or debates; and
- paying related administrative expenses.

#### Who Can Apply?

Only non-profit organizations in British Columbia may apply. Political  
parties and constituency organizations are not eligible and other  
restrictions apply. See the referendum funding information on the  
Ministry of Attorney General website ([www.ag.gov.bc.ca/legislation/referendum.htm](http://www.ag.gov.bc.ca/legislation/referendum.htm)) for further information about eligibility.

#### How Will the Two Groups be Chosen?

The two groups will be chosen by the deputy attorney general based on  
the applicant organizations':

- experience in conducting public information campaigns;
- capacity to conduct a provincewide information campaign about STV  
and our current first-past-the-post electoral system;
- structure and stability and the involvement of the organization's  
members in supporting its mandate.

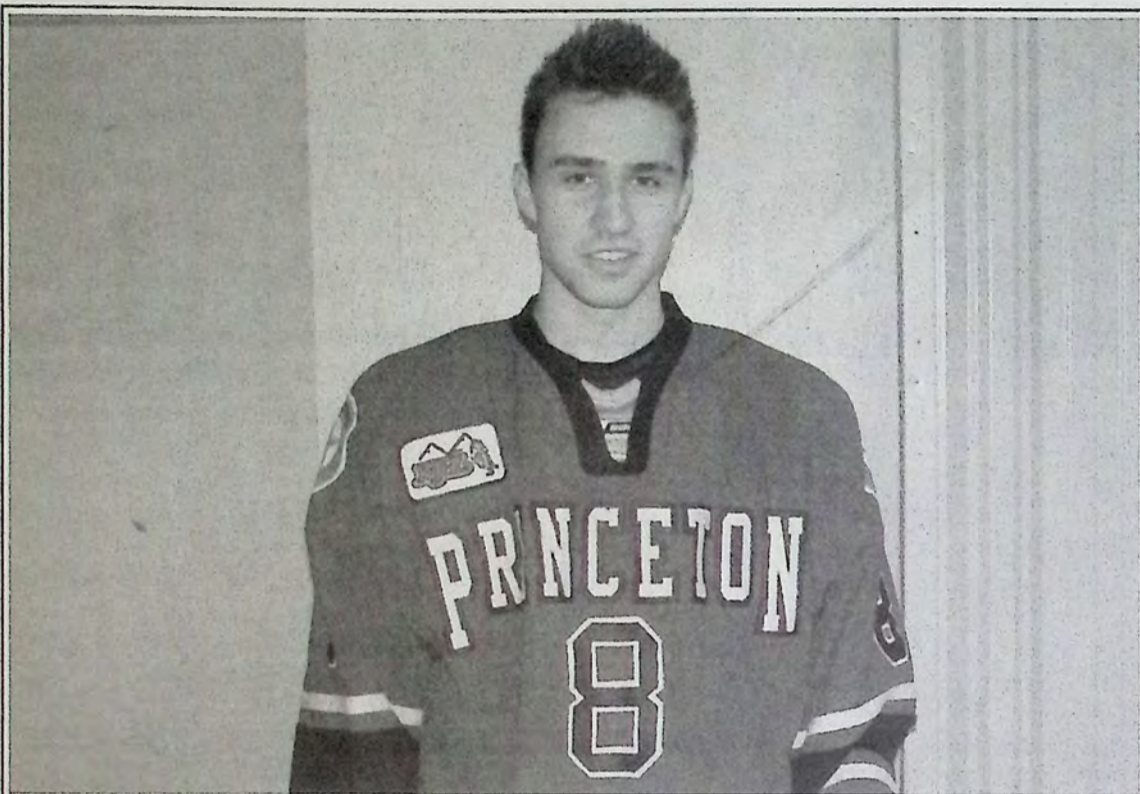

### Maple Cheesecake

(WITH TOASTED WALNUT CRUST)

(NC)—Here's a great way to celebrate maple syrup season. This festive cheesecake combines maple syrup and cream cheese in a delicious toasted walnut crust. (If you want a bigger flavour burst, add the optional maple extract.)

#### Crust:

- 1 cup Robin Hood All Purpose Flour 250mL
- 1/3 cup brown sugar, packed 75mL
- 1/3 cup butter 75mL
- 1/2 cup walnuts, toasted and finely chopped 125mL
- 3 pkgs (250g each) cream cheese, room temperature
- 1/2 cup brown sugar, packed 125mL
- 1/4 cup real maple syrup 50mL
- 3 eggs
- 1 tsp artificial maple extract, optional 5mL

Preheat oven to 350°C (180°F). Grease a 9" (23cm) spring form pan. Combine flour and brown sugar. Cut in butter until crumbly, add walnuts. Press into prepared pan. Bake for 10 - 12 minutes, until light golden. Meanwhile, beat cream cheese and brown sugar on medium speed until smooth, about 2 minutes. Add maple syrup and blend until combined. Add eggs, beating on low speed after each addition. Pour into baked crust. Bake for 45 - 50 minutes, until just set. Remove from oven and let cool 1 hour. Refrigerate until chilled. To serve, drizzle with warm maple syrup.

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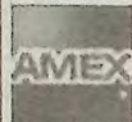

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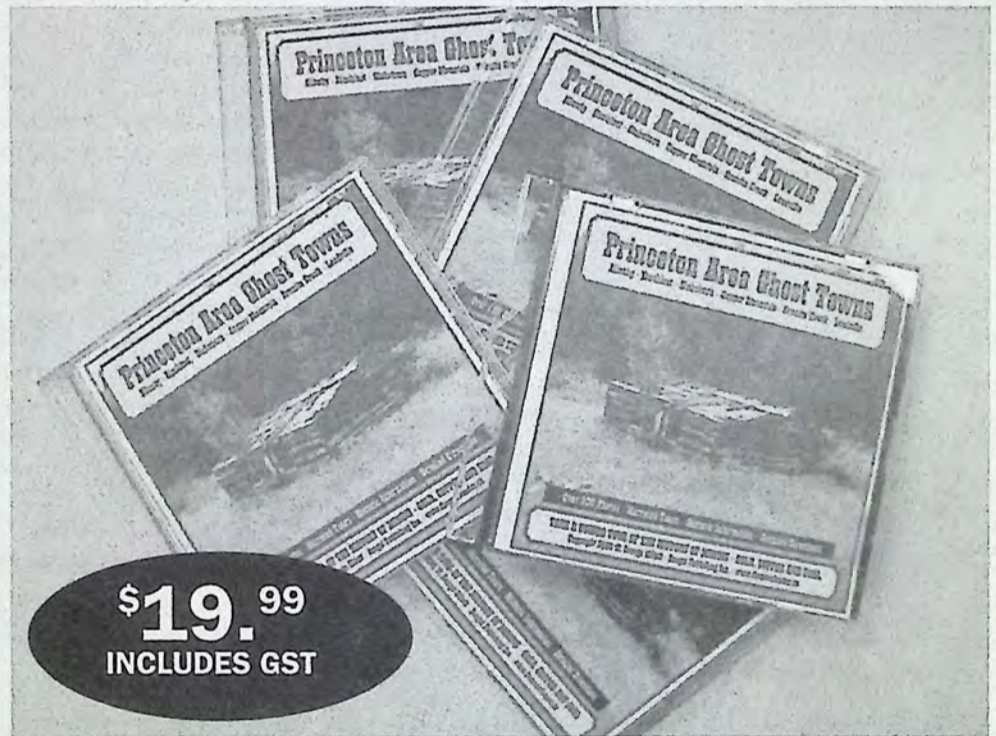

# Why should we remember?

Each year, we set aside a day to remember those who lost their lives in the service of their country. We remember the soldiers who fought in the wars of the twentieth century, probably the worst wars ever fought on earth. We remember those who were nurses and doctors and first aid attendants who lost their lives trying to save lives. We remember those who died in a variety of countries while trying to keep the peace. Why should we remember?

While some see Remembrance Day as a celebration of a proud military history, I see this day as a time to remember the tragedy of war.

War claims not only soldiers, but countless people who carried no weapons, and wanted no part of any fight. I am speaking of women and children, and even of the unborn. I am speaking of old people too weak to carry guns, and people too ill to fight anything.

I remember that people keep on being wounded and die even after the war is over. When I lived in Europe, there were people still being killed from unexploded weapons accidentally activated, like the time in Belgium when a farmer ploughing his field was killed when the plough struck some kind of artillery missile and it exploded. This was 25 years after World War II was over.

People in Viet Nam are still dying from the results of Agent Orange, and children are still being born with deformities from Agent Orange. You could say they are wounded in the womb.

Princess Diana drew the world's attention to the thousands of people, often children, who are missing limbs or who died as a result of land mines, long after the war is over.

When we talk about the ravages of war, we tend to forget the

longterm effects of human suffering, the women and children raped, starved, and brutalized in other ways. We forget the extent of human depravity unleashed with the consent of war, such as took place in Bosnia and Chechnya.

We tend to forget the contamination from weaponry. The Dutch were still pulling the rusting hulls of sunken ships out of the sea 50 years after World War II was finished.

When war is over, we forget about all of the homes destroyed, the priceless artifacts of ages stolen or destroyed, and the economy devastated. We tend to forget how long it takes to rebuild a country after a war has roared through it. We forget about the family histories lost when museums are bombed, or when only a child is left in a family, and has no memories to carry forward about his family. We forget about the emptiness left in a family when a father or mother, son or daughter, is killed in a war.

We do not take stock of the amount of human potential wasted because of war. We do not think of all of the young people who could not receive an education because of war. We do not think of the doctors, teachers, philosophers, musicians, artists, engineers and scientists who might have given us a much better world if only they had not been sacrificed to war.

In these days of recycling and reusing, we should think about the waste of war, the weapons, munitions, ships, planes, tanks, and all kinds of materials created

just to be wasted. We need to think of all of the money, as well as resources, spent to create this waste, money that could have been used to find a cure for cancer, or feed starving people, or provide fresh drinking water for people who need it.

When we have remembered all of this, we should remember those who cause war, and watch out for their manipulations of the truth, their greed, their obsession with power over others, and their fear of others. We should be cautious about people to whom we give power over us, and try to ensure that they have a strong sense of humanity. We should be cautious about nations taking pride in their military heritage and building their military strength.

We should be more concerned about being a nation that will reach out to other nations to help them when they need help.

We need to remember the horror of war in order to prevent it. While we give honour to those who sacrificed their lives so the rest of us could live in peace, we should remember that we Canadians have been blessed by not having to face the ravaged lands left behind in those nations where war is fought.

Those who sacrificed their lives, along with those who have put their lives on the line and survived, deserve to be honoured, but asking people to sacrifice their lives is too much to ask if there is a better way.

We hold ceremonies on Remembrance Day, lest we forget the high cost we pay for war.

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## 30 years and still talking to himself

Similkameen News Leader owner/publisher George Elliott recently passed a significant milestone in his career - the 30 year mark.

Did he celebrate?

"Actually, I hadn't even thought about it until that morning and I mentioned it to my wife Brenda over breakfast. That was about all we said about it."

Elliott started his media career in Radio Broadcasting, just months after graduation in his home town in Kelowna.

"My first job was a part-time tape operator position at CHIM-FM in Kelowna. It was on weekends for two or three hours each morning and basically all I did was cue up reel-to-reel tapes with pre-recorded interviews on them."

That was in October 1978.

About a year later he started working at CKOV-AM, which was in the same building.

"The control rooms were across the hall from each other and all the staff knew each other. I got a chance to work the graveyard shift (midnight to 6:00 AM) at the number one radio station at the time and jumped at it."

Various shifts and promotions followed and in July 1981 Elliott made the move to a different market.

"Penticton was still a growing radio market at the time and an old friend of mine I had worked with in Kelowna was there and I basically called him to see how he was doing. Before I knew it I was working both part-time at CKOR-FM and CKOK-AM."

What was originally going to be just a summer job turned into a 5 1/2 year stint.

"I did work a few weeks at CIGV-FM in early 1983, but spent most of my time in that market at CKOK."

Elliott was probably best known there as the evening rock 'n' roll DJ working weeknights from 7:00 PM to 12 Midnight.

A desire to be more than 'just a voice in a box' pushed Elliott to seek a greater challenge and in October 1986 he assumed the Assistant Manager position at Princeton radio station CKRP.

"My boss was the late Laurie Currie and we just had a great time working together. It was also a position where I learned a lot more about the business than I knew before which included news reporting and advertising sales."

Elliott was the 'morning man' on CKRP, which eventually became CIOR, until the local studio was closed in April 1999.

"Looking back on it I was not as sad about it as I thought I would have been. I think maybe it was because I knew I had given Radio a lot of years and it was time to take those skills and put them somewhere else."

Then one day in July 2000 Elliott was approached by one of the partners in the Similkameen News Leader about a possible employment opportunity.

"I guess it was the 'offer I couldn't refuse' that you always hear about when people talk about their lives. It was a new and exciting challenge as I had virtually zero experience or knowledge about computers, but I knew how to sell advertising and I had already had twelve years experience doing that in this market so I thought it could be a good move."

Well, as they say, the rest is history. Elliott bought the News Leader in February 2004 and operates it with his wife, Brenda. His former newspaper boss, Dawn Johnson works part-time for the paper.

"It's been an amazing time and I can hardly believe thirty years have

passed and I'm still finding challenges."

Elliott expanded into the internet with online business a year ago and discovered blogging shortly after that.

"I currently have about a dozen blogs that I update weekly, a few more frequently than that. About half of those contain original material I write myself."

Similkameen Valley radio listeners can still catch Elliott on Giant-FM every now and then, as he continues to provide the Penticton radio station with news and information from Princeton and Keremeos.

"It's just something I do on a volunteer basis to keep my finger in the industry I started my career in."

The most recent challenge added to Elliott's list came his way last September by way of the Princeton Posse hockey club.

"They approached me to see if I was interested in providing the play-by-play for all home games played at Princeton Arena. It was not a hard decision for me to make as play-by-play was the only thing I had not done in my radio career. I have done everything else from on-air shifts, live and pre-recorded interviews, MC'd numerous events at a variety of venues in all the places I've worked and so on. Play-by-play was something I never considered as ever coming my way and suddenly there it was."

What does the future hold for Elliott?

"I'm open to pretty much anything, I guess. I've been very, very lucky. I realize that. I've also had a lot of fun along the way. As long as it keeps being fun, I'll keep doing what I'm doing."

Are there any challenges left on his list?

"There probably is, I just don't know what they are today."

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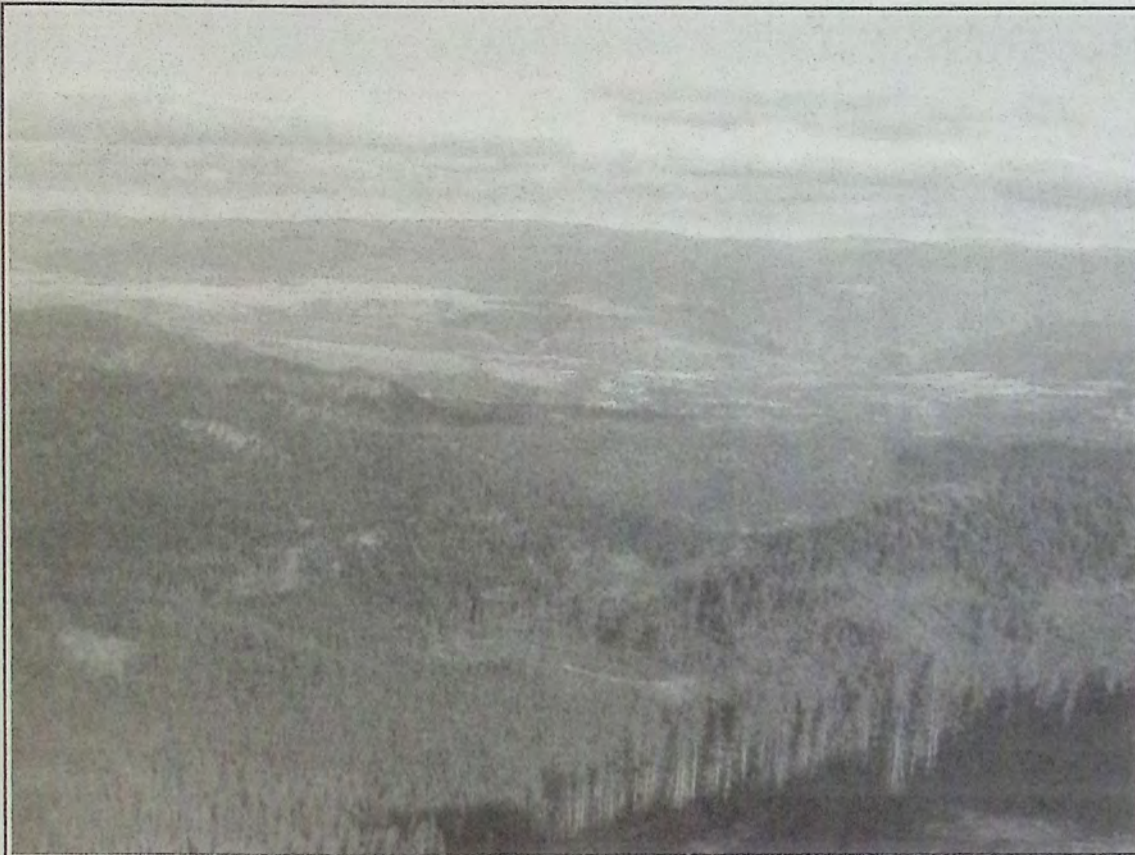
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The view of Princeton and surrounding area from the clearcut visible from town. - photo submitted

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
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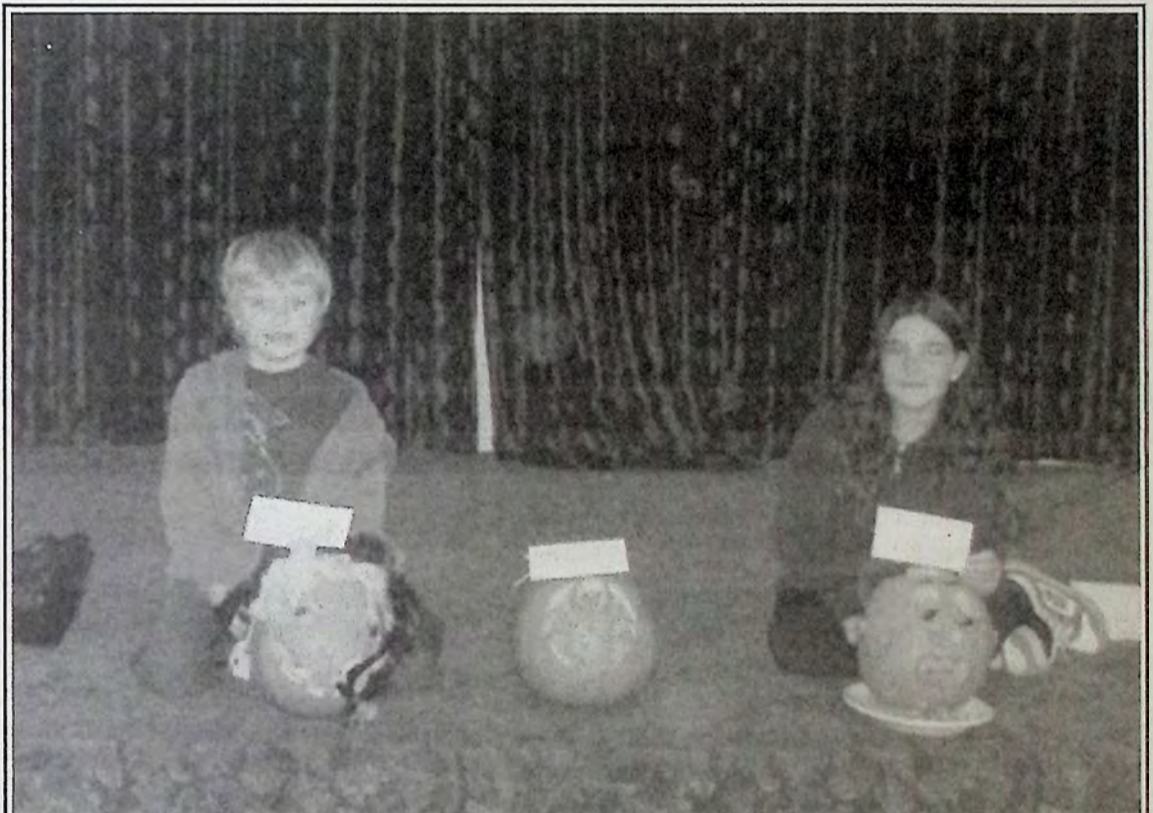

**Solana Allison**  
Candidate for Councillor

Solana Allison has been active in the community for a number of years, and is best known for her work as a member of Save Our Similkameen. She is young, single and has no previous experience on Town Council. She has three major planks in her platform: housing, industry, business and people. She would like to see more affordable housing available in our community, and believes Town Council should go after any government partner to make it happen.

Allison wants to see good industry come to Princeton, industry that pays well and has a long term sustainability. She has some new ideas for developing the industrial park. She would like Town Council to provide incentives for business and industry to move to the park.

Allison would like to see tax incentives awarded to business moving to Princeton and encourage businesses to move here by changing zoning. Allison sees a lot of local youth "at risk". What does she mean? "It means our kids are in trouble from homes that have structural problems like alcohol and drug abuse and sexual abuse." She would like to see a youth centre.



**Jim Bernard**  
Candidate for Councillor

James is 37 years old, and has lived in Princeton, off and on, for most of his life. He says there is one overwhelming truth about Princeton, "this community has never changed."

He has never run for Town Council before, and he is running on a platform for change. He sees Princeton as a one industry town, dependent on Weyerhaeuser. He wants to know, "What has happened to small business?"

Jim Bernard would like to see new industries and new people come to town, but wonders where they would live, as Princeton is in a housing crisis. He says nobody can afford to buy because 38 percent of Princeton residents are retirees or on income assistance because of lack of jobs. He sees a real need for affordable housing. He wants to see housing rules and regulations to prevent overnight rent increases of up to 40 percent.

Another problem he sees is the lack of infrastructure for new subdivisions or for businesses that want to expand.

He is concerned there would not be enough safe drinking water for a new subdivision or business expansion. He says, Council needs to "be more pro-active to these issues."

Jason Earle has been a resident of Princeton for the past 13 years. He and his wife, April Ferguson, have two children. He works as a powerline technician.

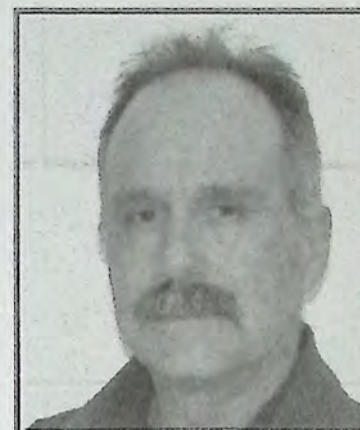

He wants to see a balance between environment and growth. "Princeton has the ability to grow yet hold onto its natural beauty," says Gibson.

He wants to see "thoughtful planning to bring in clean industry and jobs that are sustainable to our community and our children."

Gibson is concerned that the town relies on Weyerhaeuser and a few smaller forest industries. He sees a future of increased taxes to maintain infrastructure unless the town can grow and increase the tax base.

Gibson is critical of the construction of a new town square while he sees the water line to the industrial area has not been completed. He wants to see Princeton doing better than "just a stop over for gas on a hot summer day while on the way to somewhere else."



**Tom Guerster**  
Candidate for Councillor

Tom Guerster is a 42 year old businessman who has lived in Princeton for the past six years. He is entering local politics for the first time, and has no past experience in civic politics.

Guerster says the reason he is running for a seat on Council is to make Princeton more attractive. He would like to give the town a

"face lift" so that it would look more attractive for locals and tourists.

When asked what he would like to achieve if elected, he said he wants to clean up Princeton.

One of his other goals would be to serve on a Town Council which would give the people of Princeton more of a voice in the affairs of the community, where decisions are made by the people of Princeton, not just by the people on Town Council.

When asked what personal qualities he would bring to the Council table if he is elected, Guerster says he would bring honesty, accountability, drive, and passion. He states he would contribute his ability as a team player and he would bring some fresh ideas to the Council table.

He feels Princeton has stood still for years and he says, "It's time to move this beautiful town forward."

**Bob Hart**  
Candidate for Councillor

Bob Hart is 55 years old, and has been in Princeton for 10 years. He works as a consultant, businessman and salvage expert.

Although Hart has not run in a civic election before, he has served the community in volunteer positions: seven years with Vermilion Trails Society, two terms as a Director of Princeton and District Chamber of Commerce, is on the Board of Directors of the Attainable Housing Society, and has 15 years experience in unions.

Hart says, "Our town is moving forward, and all aspects of the Town must be handled and developed as a whole, not fragmented. Every aspect plays off one another - hospital, airport, infrastructure, housing, business park, highways and accessibility."

He sees Council as a decision-making body that acts in a leadership and support role to other committees and societies all working toward the betterment of Princeton. He believes he can contribute to Council through his vast knowledge, his ability to work with others and his ability to "think outside the box". His goal is to bring the town forward gradually, not erratically. He would "handle solutions and not shy away".



**Richard Hudson**  
Candidate for Councillor

Richard Hudson is 55 years old and has lived in Princeton for seven years. He is Vice-President of Vermilion Trails Society, and has served two terms as a Director of Princeton and District Chamber of Commerce as well as serving on the Similkameen Planning Board Tourism Advisory Council.

He is running because he believes Princeton needs strong leadership to address the concerns such as attainable housing, attracting and increasing hospital services and staff, the airport development, Town infrastructure, development of the industrial park and the proposed aquatic centre, and concerns about youth activity.

Ray Jarvis has lived in Princeton for the past 13 years, and has served on Town Council for six years.

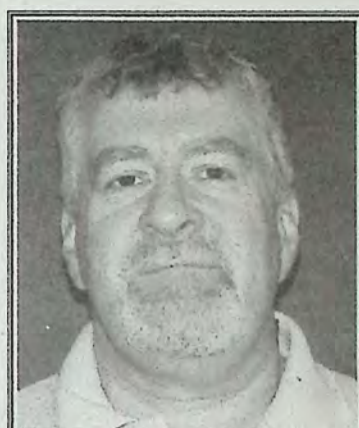
He is retired, but says he is age "49 going on 61". He is an active volunteer who says he is a "people person".
