Recession delays mine opening

Town Council has revised its priorities due to new information about the mine opening at Copper Mountain. Council learned, at the May 4 public meeting, that the mine is not likely to open before summer 2011. The delay has been caused by the poor economic climate. However, work continues at the mine site.

The mine opening, and the Town's readiness for it, was one of the pri-

orities Council set for this year. Mayor Randy McLean asked Council to revise the priority list, giving greater weight to an evaluation of Town Hall. The building has problems, not only with inadequate space, but with structure. Mayor McLean wants a report as soon as possible about the viability of maintaining Town Hall as it is. He is concerned that the building may have to be replaced.

Crews mop-up forest fire

The sirens wailing along Highway 5A during the afternoon of May 4th were responding to a forest fire located near Round Lake.

Identified by the Protection Branch of the Ministry of Forests and Range as Fire K60112 - Round Lake/Allison Lake, the fire quickly grew to 125 hectares. A total of 60 firefighters and four helicopters fought the blaze, which was considered to be in the mop-up stage two days later. The Ministry defines 'mop-up' as the act of reinforcing containment lines and bulldozers were being used to create fire-

guards around the majority of the fire. The helicopters were used to dump water on the fire.

Although there was a lot of smoke in the area, traffic was moving along Highway 5A without delay.

There have been a total of 80 forest fires since April 1st in the Kamloops Fire District burning a total of 783 hectares. So far this fiscal year there have been 261 forest fires in BC which have destroyed 5,239 hectares of forest.

The cause of the Round Lake/Allison Lake Forest Fire has not yet been determined.

Council sidesteps ambulance request

Town Council received a letter from Ambulance Paramedics of B.C. asking for support. The paramedics are currently bargaining with the provincial government to bring wages into line with other emergency service employees. The ambulance paramedics letter stated the paramedics are currently the lowest paid emergency service workers, receiving only \$10 an hour, with an on-call standby wage of \$2 an hour.

The government asked for a 90 day delay before negotiations continue, and the ambulance paramedics wanted Council's support by passing a motion requesting the provincial government go back to the bargaining table with a third party mediator.

Council took the position that they had no business taking a position of attempting to influence the outcome of a labour dispute, and filed the letter.

Council okays curling club plans

Princeton Curling Club plans an upgrade of the lounge area this year. The club will install a 40 by 80 inch window in the lounge, with a view of the Similkameen River. They believe this will enhance the lounge area to host functions.

A second project is to improve lighting. This is a \$30,000 long term project for which the club is

currently seeking funding. The goal is to provide adequate lighting and reduce the cost of lighting through greater efficiency, thus reducing operating costs.

As the Town owns the curling rink, the club presented its plans to Town Council on May 4 and received approval to proceed with the project.

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District appoints new assistant superintendent

The Board of Education of School District No. 58 (Nicola-Similkameen) announced May 4th that Stephen McNiven had been appointed as the Assistant Superintendent of Schools for the district effective August 1st.

McNiven is currently the principal of Coquihalla Middle School in Merritt.

"He has provided strong leadership to the school and has led a number of new initiatives including a school based program for high risk students," notes a news release from the district.

McNiven is a graduate of this district and started his teaching career at Nicola-Canford.

He spent some time as the district's technology coordinator before moving his family to

Princeton where he was the principal of John Allison Elementary School. McNiven moved back to Merritt to take on the role of principal at Nicola-Canford Elementary before moving to his present position at the middle school.

He has been actively involved in advancing First Nations' education programs through his work with the First Nations Education Council and most recently, chaired the district's Laptop Review Committee which led to the Grade Seven Laptop program.

"Having lived in both Merritt and Princeton will be an asset in Mr. McNiven's transition into his new position," the news release adds.

McNiven has worked hard to build relationships with students

and staff as he believes this provides a basis of education programs that encourage success for students. He has also worked hard at building a profile built on integrity and hard work and has committed his time to attending various student and community events throughout the district.

McNiven succeeds Wendy Hyer, who is leaving the district as of July 31, 2009 to take on the role of Superintendent of Schools for School District No. 67 (Okanagan Skaha).

"The Board is excited to attract an assistant superintendent with the outstanding qualities and experience of Mr. McNiven and is looking forward to having him work under the leadership of our new Superintendent of Schools, Dr. Bob Peacock," the news release concludes.

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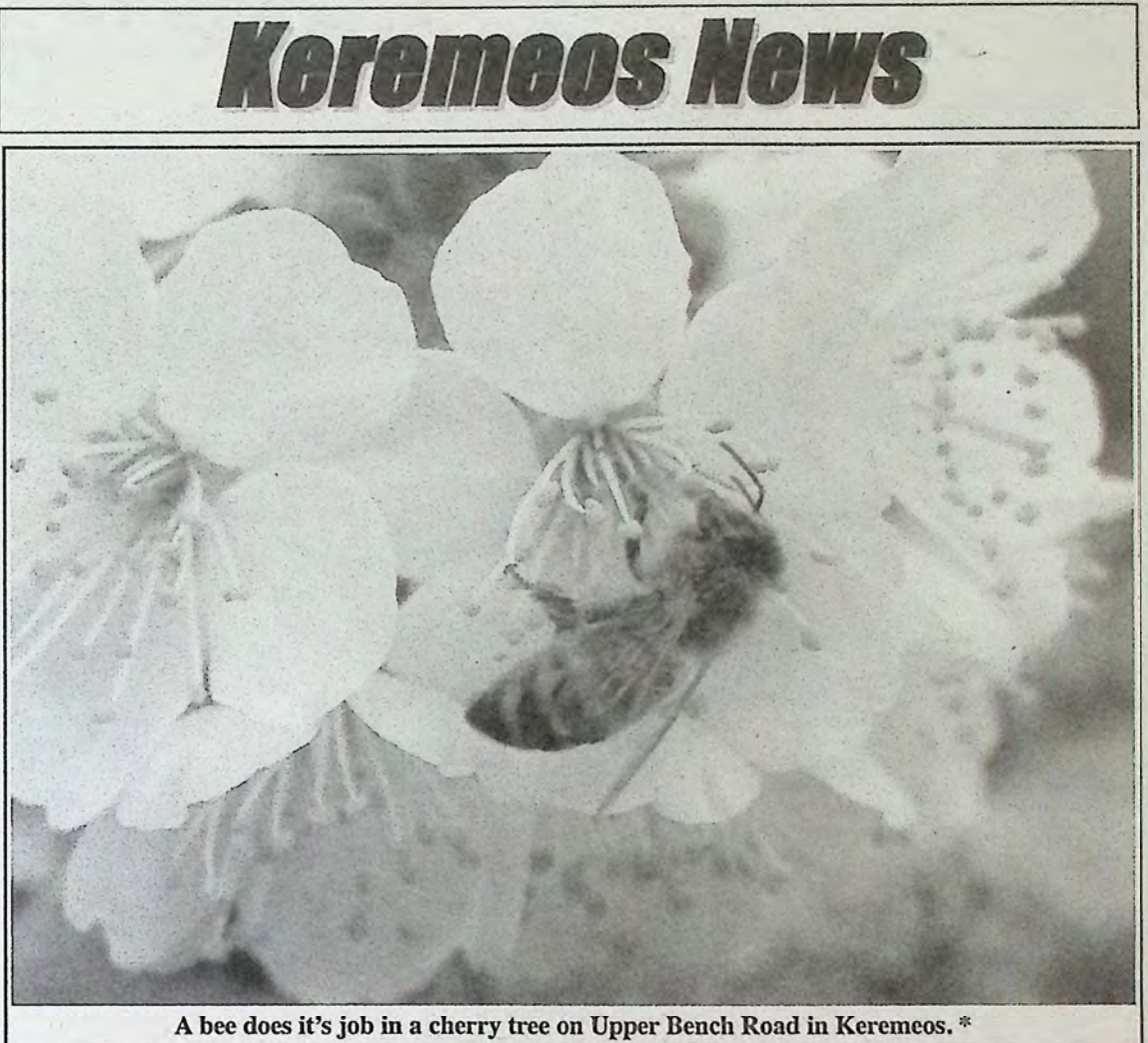

It's been a long weekend tradition for over seventy years, and with only a few weather-related issues, Keremeos Elks have been able to host their popular BCRA rodeo the same time each year. A few years ago rodeo weekend in Keremeos included lawn mower races, which have become an annual attraction. RDOS promotes Bear Smart policy

Joanne Siderius, a contractor for Okanagan-Similkameen Regional District (RDOS) attended the May 4 Town Council meeting to promote the Bear Smart Project. Her job is to educate the public to reduce human-bear conflict.

Last year 13 bears were destroyed due to human-bear conflict. Princeton averages 100 to 150 calls to the Conservation Officer each year to report a bear problem. Most of these problems can be solved by people following a few simple rules.

Siderius told Council the biggest single way to attract a bear to your neighbourhood is to put your garbage out the night before it is to be collected. Bears tend to be nocturnal visitors. She said residents should never put the garbage out

to activity planners, sub-committee members and general volunteers.

Electric Shocks: Facts and Consequences

(NC)—It's a fact: In Québec, more than 50% of all accidents wherein electricity is a causal factor happen to the general public. It is impossible to foresee the consequences of these accidents.

Sometimes, an electric accident will leave a tingling feeling in a limb; sometimes, the result is death. Never forget, appearances can be deceiving: even a low intensity current can cause major damage!

Here are the four factors that apply to all electric accidents:

- Duration of the contact – It's a fact: Depending on the length of time that contact is maintained, the heat produced by an electric current can reach up to 2,000°C. It has been observed that the duration of the contact is directly related to the severity of the accident. The reason for this is quite simple: As an electric current flows through the body,

it triggers a contraction of muscles such that the victim cannot relax them. As a result, the victim can suffer serious consequences after only a fraction of a second.

- The pathway through the body chosen by the current – It's a fact: An 80-milliampere current passing through the heart is enough to cause heart stoppage. This is a life and death situation, and is of the utmost importance. Because the heart and brain are vital organs, an electric current passing through either one of them will probably be fatal. If the current affects only a foot, leg, hand or arm, the consequences will be less devastating, but may nevertheless lead to amputation of the member.

- Resistance – It's a fact: Metals and water do not have the capability of resisting an electric current. That means that they are incapable of slowing or stopping the flow of

electricity. In an electric accident, this lack of resistance can have decisive consequences. The consequences of an electric accident can be greatly reduced, as a function of the resistance level. For example, a person working in a dry environment, having no contact with a metallic surface, will present a higher level of resistance to an electric current.

- The intensity of the current – It's a fact: if only one tenth of the current flowing through a 100-watt light bulb passes through the heart for more than one second, the accident can be fatal. The intensity of the current can therefore constitute a major element in the seriousness of the episode. Even though contact with a 120-volt electric circuit may have no repercussions on a person's body, one must always bear in mind the potential consequences of an electric current.

Healthy back tips for the golf course

(NC)—Considering the number of times a swing is repeated during a game of golf, it is not surprising that the season often ends early for those who are not physically prepared. In order to prevent injuries, your golf-training program should include stretching, endurance, balance and speed.

The following simple tips can also help to improve your golf score while keeping you pain and injury free.

1. When lifting your golf bag, bend your knees and lift using your legs and not your back.
2. Always warm up with a few minutes of aerobic activity, such as brisk walking.
3. Stretch the muscles in your back, abdomen and shoulders before your game.
4. Use clubs that are the correct length, so you do not have to bend or overextend your back.
5. Wear soft spikes on your shoes for greater cushioning and shock absorption.
6. Use a cart rather than carrying your clubs.
7. Take some lessons on how to swing and choose the correct club.
8. Occasionally practice swinging in the opposite direction to balance the stress on the muscles in your back.
9. Bend your knees and use a golf club for support when stooping to retrieve your ball.
10. Always stretch to cool down after finishing a game.

If you experience pain during or following your game, be sure to

Could You Use An Anti-Aging Pill?

By now, everybody has heard of the benefits of drinking red wine. Red wine contains the redness of red grape skins, and that is where the benefits come from. Doctors connected with the research into red wine will tell you this special ingredient is called resveratrol, and it does have an anti-aging effect.

Researchers wondered why the French, who eat a lot of rich fatty foods, have a much lower incidence of coronary heart disease than North Americans. The research led them to red wine, and resveratrol. Studies of resveratrol showed it is an anti-oxidant more powerful than Vitamin C or Vitamin E.

So why is a powerful anti-oxidant so good for you? Anti-oxidants scoop up and neutralize free radicals. These are oxygen molecules with nowhere useful to go, and they are a key factor in causing aging. Free radicals contribute to heart and liver disease, circulation problems, and other effects of aging, such as skin problems and loss of brain cells. Resveratrol, due to its high anti-oxidant function, reduces free radicals. Thus it is an anti-aging nutrient.

Do not rush out and buy red wine. You would have to drink much more than is good for you. In fact, some people cannot tolerate beverages containing alcohol, and many people cannot tolerate red wine. Furthermore, if you want anti-aging results fast, you would not get enough resveratrol at one time even if you drank a gallon of red wine every day!

As Dr. Oz said on the Oprah Winfrey show last month, if you want the highest benefits of resveratrol, you are going to have to take the pill.

Yes, this is the anti-aging pill. You need to be cautious about which resveratrol pill you take, because some of the resveratrol pills are not manufactured from grape skins, but from another source.

One of the reliable sources is Bel Marra Nutritionals located at Kleinberg, Ontario (P.O. Box 428, L0J 1C0). If you send an order, do not expect these pills to come cheap, but an order direct to the company is probably the cheapest source, and can save you about 30 percent. Otherwise, a three month supply will cost you around \$120.

A word of caution: resveratrol is a new product on the health food market, and while there is a lot of research from France indicating there is no likelihood of any harm, you take them at your own risk.

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Town adopts financial goals

This year will be a big spending year for Princeton, with nearly \$8 million in anticipated revenue, and expenditures of more than \$3 million, leaving a surplus.

The next few years will not see such a big increase in revenues and expenditures. 2009 is exceptional due to income from federal and provincial grants for capital projects. Revenues up to 2013 are expected to total around \$4 million.

Property taxes 2009

There will be a slight increase in property tax costs to Princeton homeowners this year. Municipal

taxes (Town of Princeton only) are expected to go up by three dollars for the average homeowner, around \$476 for a property assessed at \$170,170.

This does not paint the full picture. The homeowner must add hospital tax, regional district tax, library tax, BC Assessment Authority tax and school tax. The school tax is an unknown at this point, but the total of the other taxes would bring the tax bill for the average home to \$636.

Taxes are due and payable at the beginning of August. Tax invoices can be expected sometime in June.

Town encourages composting

Town Council has voted to participate in the Regional District Composter Initiative. The goal is to further reduce the amount of waste going into the landfill, so the Town is prepared to subsidize the sale of composters. The composters will cost \$24.00 each, thanks to the subsidy.

The composter is produced by Norseman Plastics and is called

The Earth Machine. This backyard composter is 33 inches high and has a 33 inch bottom diameter. It weighs 16 pounds and has an 80 gallon capacity. The lid locks, and there is no way for pests to access the compost.

If you would like to buy one of these composters, drop in to Town Hall soon and tell them you want one. There are only 100 available.

THE APPLICATION

On April 17, 2009, FortisBC Inc. ("FortisBC") applied to the Commission for approval of the Rate Schedule 95 - Net Metering ("the Application"). FortisBC developed and prepared the Application to support the policy goals of energy self-sufficiency and clean electricity generation as identified in the provincial 2007 Energy Plan, at the request of interested parties, and in response to Commission Order G-115-07.

FortisBC seeks an Order to approve revisions to Rate Schedule 80; Net Metering Rate Schedule 95; and the Net Metering Interconnection Agreement.

THE REGULATORY PROCESS

The Commission has established a written public hearing process and Regulatory Timetable for the regulatory review of the Application.

PUBLIC INSPECTION OF THE DOCUMENTS

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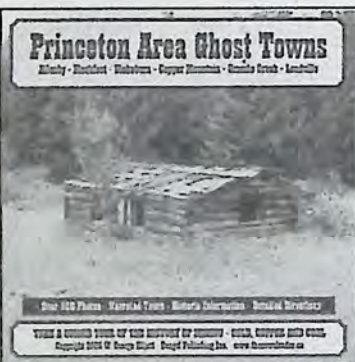

Council reconsiders heritage pictures

A proposal put forward in 2008 by Ed Muckle, owner of Image Emporium, suggested large historical photos be placed on downtown businesses to promote Princeton's 150 year anniversary. Town Council has had the proposal under review.

Since Muckle first brought forward the concept, a project has been developed. Downtown business owners would be approached for the use of their building for dis-

"With some regret, I am writing to advise you of our decision to close Princeton Branch on February 10, 1987. This was a most difficult decision and one that was reached only after careful consideration. Unfortunately, this community is not large enough in population to sustain the number of financial institutions in the area and as we were the last Bank to come in, it has been difficult to attract sufficient profitable business."

So wrote the then Manager, R. E. McDormand, of the Town branch of The Royal Bank of Canada on November 20, 1986. The closure was to be the latest, the first being in 1917, that the bank had retreated from the Similkameen Valley. It

was all more surprising considering at one time in 1912 Princeton had been supporting four banks and in addition at that time there was banks in Hedley, Keremeos and Coalmont.

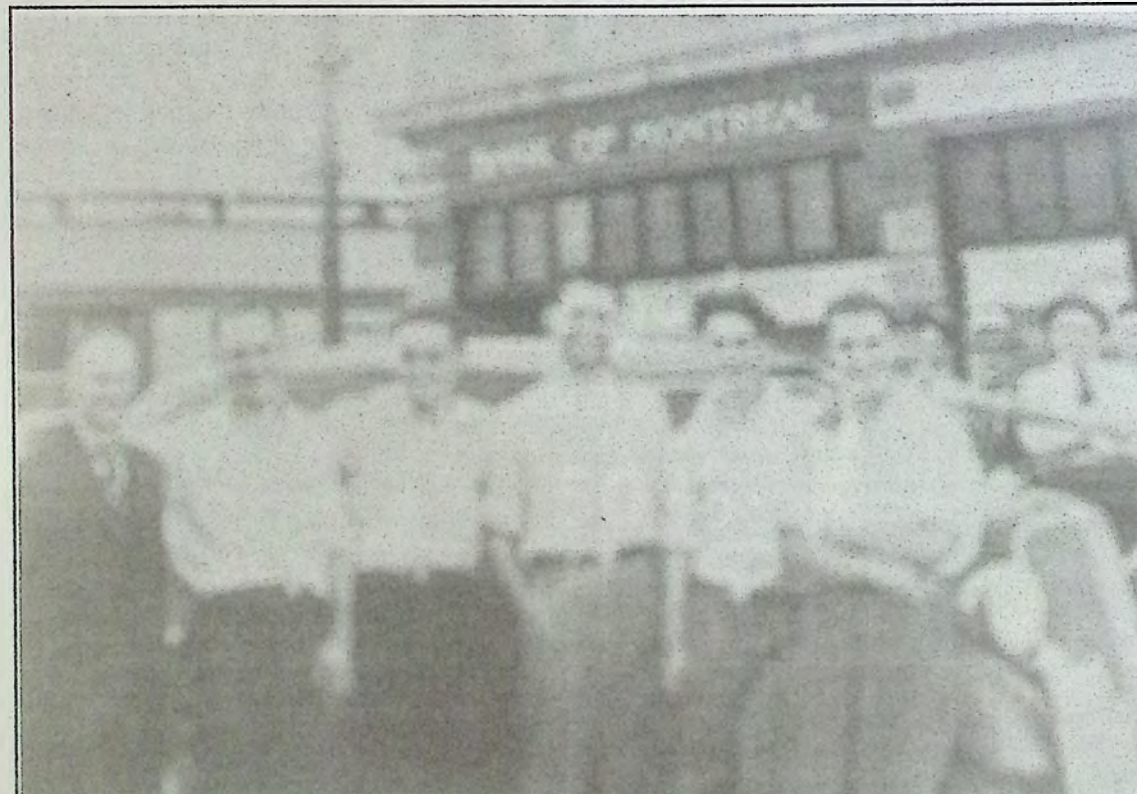
Established in 1867 and headquartered in Toronto, the first bank in Princeton and the Similkameen was The Canadian Bank of Commerce. Managed by W. Hallamore this opened in July 1905 at 209 Bridge Street, and then in July, 1909 moved to new quarters at the corner of Billiter and Bridge Street, before eventually moving into the Princeton Hotel.

Prior to The Commerce opening residents of the area did their banking either in Kamloops or

Vancouver. The Similkameen Star of July 15, 1905, said that the Bank had been established 25 miles from a railroad and wrote "They only await the railroad, mining men, merchants, real estate brokers, and manufacturers".

The Eastern Township Bank arrived in Princeton during 1912. This Bank had originally been established in 1855 but in 1912 it was merged with the Bank of Commerce which in 1900 had previously been merged with the London, UK, financed Bank of British Columbia.

Perhaps an optimistic view of Princeton's long term future had encouraged, also in 1912, the Bank continued on Page 24

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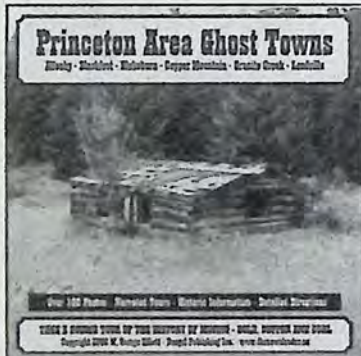

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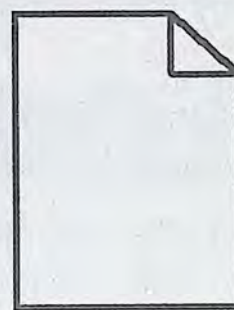


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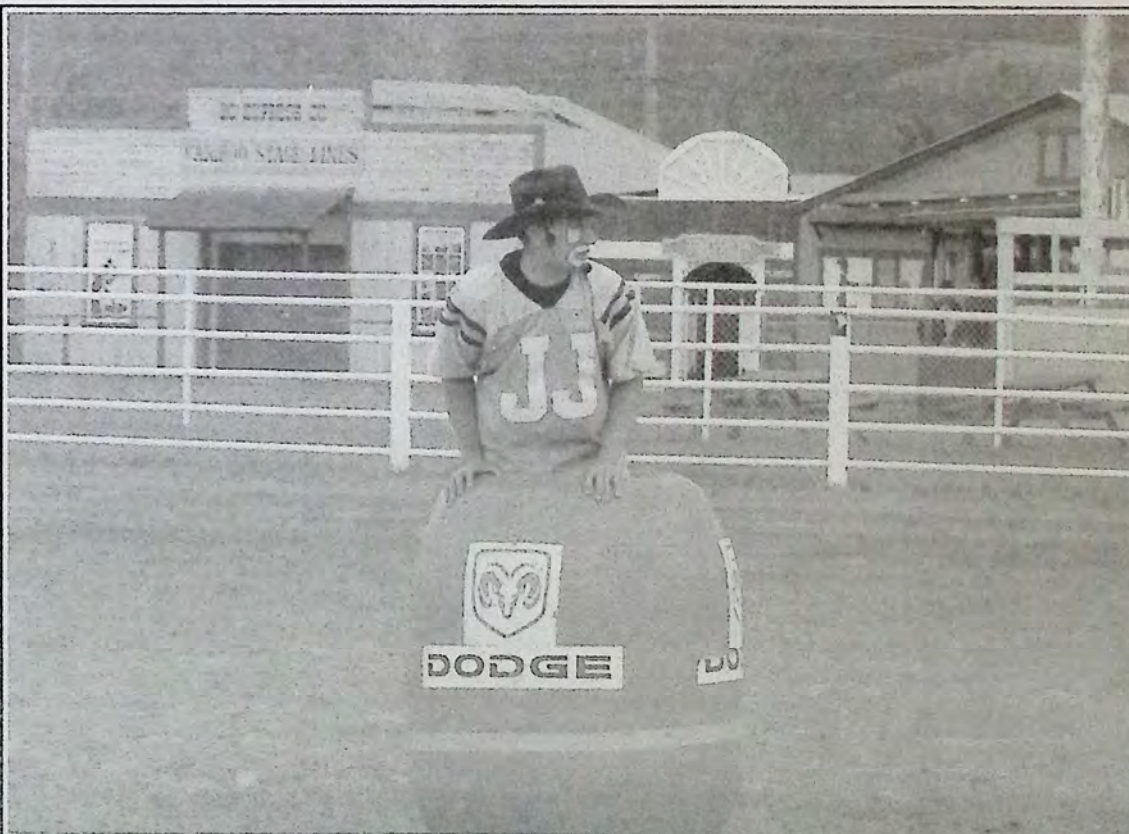

Beef & Broccoli Stir-Fry

(WITH GREEN CURRY)

Ingredients:

- 1 large bunch broccoli (about 1 lb / 500 g)
- 2 tbsp (30 mL) vegetable oil
- 1 lb (500 g) boneless beef (sirloin), sliced into strips
- 1 cup (250 mL) diced onion
- 1/2 cup (125 mL) diagonally sliced green onion
- 1 tbsp (15 mL) minced fresh garlic
- 1 tbsp (15 mL) minced fresh ginger root
- 1 cup (250 mL) Thai Kitchen coconut milk
- 1 cup (250 mL) beef stock or water
- 1 tbsp (15 mL) Thai Kitchen green curry paste
- 1 tbsp (15 mL) Thai Kitchen fish sauce
- 1 tbsp (15 mL) lime juice
- 1/2 cup (125 mL) julienned fresh basil leaves

Directions:

- Slice broccoli stalks from florets. Cut florets into small chunks. Peel stalks and cut into small chunks. Set aside. Meanwhile, heat vegetable oil in a large wok or skillet over high heat. Brown beef quickly for 1 minute. Remove and set aside. Drain excess oil from pan, but do not clean.
 - Reduce heat to medium. Add onions, garlic and ginger. Stir-fry for 4 minutes or until onions are soft.
 - Add coconut milk, stock, green curry paste, fish sauce and lime juice. Bring to a boil. Simmer for 6 minutes.
 - Add prepared broccoli and simmer for another 3 minutes.
 - Return beef to the wok. Add basil and cook for 1 minute to heat through, stirring constantly.
 - Serve over Thai Kitchen Jasmine Rice.



There is an advertisement by Greypower Insurance which annoys me every time I see it. It shows a woman behaving like an idiot and says, "You don't drive like her, so why should you pay the same insurance as her?"

In addition to very poor grammar, the whole ad annoys me. When Greypower first began this type of ad, they showed a young man driving like an idiot.

Now it is always the idiot woman. Why the switch to a woman, especially when you consider that women tend to have a better driving record than men? The survey discovered lowest on the scale are car manufacturers and car dealerships. (Guess who's going bankrupt?) The vehicles being manufactured are aimed at a male market, but at least 50 percent of the drivers are women. What women want in a vehicle is adjustability, because women are smaller.

I have gone out to buy a new car and been seated in a car in which my feet could not reach the pedals unless I had the steering wheel against my chest. Needless to say, I did not buy that vehicle.

I like a pick-up truck with a manual transmission, but I found that most of the shift sticks were built for a man's muscle, and a lot of these pick-ups drive like tanks compared with a nice little car. The Ford Ranger was about the best of the lot, and it could have

She wants to know how safe the vehicle is, whether it is fuel efficient, how much the tires will cost, can she fit old aunt Bess into the back seat, what kind of warranty does it have and how easy is it to stuff the groceries in it. Women's sex appeal is not related to any kind of machine, and women know this.

I used to drive Ford Mustangs, but had to switch to something less sporty because my relatives and friends were getting too fat or too arthritic to get into the back seat of a two-door. That's the reality of daily life, and there is nothing sexy about it.

I often wonder whether manufacturers and advertisers ever ask what women want. These days, with women holding down jobs and providing 41 percent of the average family income, what women want is convenience, durability, and time saving devices.

Wage earner women have no time for nonsense. They want to know what a product does, what it costs, and whether it meets their needs. If an advertiser in any way insults a woman's intelligence, or makes her look like a useless twit, then that advertiser deserves to go broke.

The woman will open her purse somewhere else.

of Montreal to open a branch in Princeton. First sited in a building that was later to house Parkinson's Photography business, it too was later to occupy space at the Princeton Hotel. Headquartered in Montreal and founded in 1822 it was Canada's first bank.

The first Royal Bank of Canada branch in Princeton followed the trend set by its competitors and opened its doors in 1912 at the site of the old Travelers Café, but closed after a few months of operation.

In Hedley, managed by L. G. McHaffie, the Bank of North America opened for business in the

Hedley Gazette newspaper office. Later, both the Banks of Commerce and Montreal provided banking to the mining community on pay days, using their staff from Princeton to provide the service. The Bank of North America, from 1862, was the first of the Eastern Banks to have branches in Colonial British Columbia. In 1918 it was merged with the Bank of Montreal.

In Keremeos, The Eastern Township Bank, with J. A. R. Rome as Manager, opened for business in 1907.

After their merger in 1912, the Bank of Commerce took over the business. The Bank of Montreal for a short while also had a branch in

Keremeos but this was finally closed in 1923.

In 1911, The Royal Bank opened a branch in Coalmont, but with the decline of coal mining in the area and the cessation of operations at Blakeburn, that too finally closed its door in 1944.

So why was there the rush by the big Banks to establish themselves in Princeton during 1912? As today, the answer to that question is the thought of being able to make a fast big profit, but they were all to be disappointed. 1912 was the year of all the talk surrounding Princeton's state of the art Cement Plant, but that failure is another story.
