Town Council approves schedule

A schedule of which Councillor will also act as Deputy Mayor was approved at the October 19th regular meeting of Town Council.

Councillor Ray Jarvis made the motion, which was seconded by Councillor Marilyn Harkness.

The Deputy Mayor does not replace the Mayor, but assumes the duties of the Mayor at times, which the Mayor is unable to. This includes a variety of functions and activities including Chairing Town Council meetings.

Councillor Frank Armitage was Deputy Mayor from December 6, 2008 to August 31, 2009 with Councillor Jason Earle filling the role from September 1, 2009 to May 31, 2010 followed by Councillor Marilyn Harkness from June 1, 2010 to February 28, 2011.

Councillor Ray Jarvis will be Deputy Mayor from March 1, 2011 to November 30, 2011 – the month of the next Municipal Elections.

Council awards marketing plan contract

Colliers International Consulting of Vancouver was awarded the contract to develop an Industrial/Business Park Marketing Plan at the regular meeting of Town Council October 19th.

The proposal by Colliers International Consulting was dated June 22nd and will cost a total of \$30,725.00 (+ GST) and outlines a detailed work plan which features six phases.

The first step is *Validation and Product Due Diligence*, which will be a review of research and data previously prepared to accurately determine that the Princeton Industrial Park attributes, and shortcomings are valid in the 2009/10 business environment. The review will also identify advantages and disadvantages not already discovered and will provide a product profile, which will be matched against target markets.

Second are the *Market Assessment*

and *Product Segmentation* steps where an overview of regional, provincial and national markets will be used to identify industry trends, buyer/user profiles, sales values, existing and planned supply and absorption rates. The market assessment will enable the segmentation of the overall market to identify prospective targets for the Princeton market.

Phase Three is *Product Pricing*, which will establish a benchmark price based on competitive market supply and pricing expectations. An examination of the Princeton Industrial Park's product development costs to determine profit margins will assist in arriving at a market price point which will then be adjusted to provide return on investment.

Client Consultation and Briefing will be the next step where an overview of recommendations for positioning and pricing in the market will be discussed. All of this will be determined from results of the market assessment, product seg-

mentation and pricing.

The fifth phase is the *Marketing Implementation Strategy*, which will be the development of an effective communication program to reach the target market and engage, compel and activate responses.

The final part of the Industrial/Business Park Marketing Plan will be *Report Preparation*

Vote disappoints Atamanenko

BC Southern Interior NDP MP Alex Atamanenko slammed Liberal and Conservative MPs October 22nd for passing a motion that will further delay Bill C-311, the Climate Change Accountability Act, from passing in the House of Commons.

"A similar NDP bill was passed in Parliament in 2008, but Mr. Harper killed the Bill before it could pass in the Senate by calling an unneeded federal election," said Atamanenko.

"Now with less than 60 days to go until the United Nations

Conference on Climate Change in Copenhagen in December, the Liberals joined Mr. Harper and passed a motion that further stalls any action by Canada on this fundamental serious issue of our time."

The motion refers the Bill back to a parliamentary committee, sentencing it to at least another 30 sitting days before it comes back to the House of Commons, too late to make a difference at the Copenhagen Conference.

"I am very disappointed with the vote results. I cannot understand why the Liberals voted with the Conservatives." Bill C-311 commits Canada to science-based greenhouse gas reduction targets and holds the government publically accountable for concrete action.

"The Conservatives and Liberals continue to ignore the pleas of thousands of Canadians to expedite

some concrete, measurable action to address the serious impacts of climate change on ourselves, our children and our children's children," stated Atamanenko.

"Among developed nations, Canada will now stand alone in Copenhagen by blocking global progress. The lack of concern by our two major political parties about the issue of climate change must become an election issue."

Community Services

Part 1 - From Peanuts To \$3-Million

In 1973, Joyce Fraser had an idea about how to help older people in the Princeton area. She put forward a proposal to the federal Local

Initiatives Project department and received a grant to provide a drop-in centre for the elderly and handicapped. The grant was mere "peanuts" when compared with today's more than \$3-million budget, but it provided the basics.

The services included transportation for isolated rural elders, taking people to Penticton for medical appointments, and bringing Hedley residents to Princeton for medical appointments. Many local elders were transported to bowling, seniors' activities and community events. Other services included homemaking and home repairs.

The services faced an end date: the grant would run out. People who thought the service should be continued formed a board of directors for Princeton & District

Community Services Society, and submitted an application to the provincial government to be recognized as a society, and a grant application to the provincial government for continuing funding. Community Services received both (the grant came on June 5, 1974), and was born on December 11, 1973.

The original Board of Directors was comprised of Sandra Henson (later to become mayor), Molly Cunard (retiree), Len Seto (pharmacist), William Foster (provincial government employee), Irene Manion, Sr. representing Tulameen area, Mr. J. Stone representing Hedley area, and Dawn Johnson (federal employee). Joyce Fraser was Administrator.

The purpose of the proposed Pest Management Plan (PMP) is to manage wood rot, wood pests and mechanical damage caused by pests on wood poles located on power line corridors, road frontage areas, generation facilities and electrical facilities within the FortisBC service area, including wood poles on FortisBC owned or leased property. The FortisBC service area is located in proximity to the communities of Creston, Crawford Bay, Kaslo, Slocan, South Slocan, Nelson, Castlegar, Salmo, Trail, Fruitvale, Grand Forks, Greenwood, and Midway, in the Okanagan Valley from Osoyoos to Kelowna, and in the Similkameen Valley from Princeton to Keremeos.

The pest management methods proposed for use include stubbing (non-chemical), pole replacement (non-chemical) and wood preservative treatments (internal and external). The use of wood preservative pesticides is intended within the area to which the PMP applies. The common name (and examples of trade names) of the pesticides proposed for use under this plan include: copper naphthenate, sodium fluoride, borax (Cop-R-Plastic, CobraWrap, CuRap20), metam sodium (Woodfume, Guardsman Post and Pole Fumigant), disodium octaborate tetrahydrate (Tim-Bor Professional), boron, boric acid, copper (Impel Boron Rods II, CobraRod), and bendiocarb (Ficam D). Application methods include: external bandages, internal liquid and solid treatments, and external insecticide treatments.

The proposed duration of the PMP is from January 2, 2010 to January 1, 2015.

The Board of Directors was backed up by an Advisory Group: Dr. N.J. Bosomworth, Human Resources Director Ron Rutherglen, Public Health Nurse Freda Easy, Senior Public Health Nurse Anna Mason, and legal advisor Stanley Turner.
None of the services would have been possible without all of these volunteers and more people from the community. There were only four original service workers: Frances Antonick, Neva Wilson, Brenda Forde and Ria Smith, along with Barry Porter, a student who helped

with removing snow and mowing lawns.
Today, nobody criticizes Community Services, but in 1973, and later, more conservative members of the community thought it was a waste of tax dollars. Despite the criticism, those who were part of the beginning persisted in their belief the community needed the services provided.
The provincial government, formed by the New Democratic Party, was helpful in any way, providing the basement of the Court House for office space, then allowing

Community Services to lease the former mine rescue building to turn it into a drop-in centre. This building had to be renovated and furnished. Through the generosity of volunteer trades people and donations from the community, the building came into being the same day as the society. It continued in use for several years, becoming the Mini Chef Restaurant, and later Belaire Restaurant, until it burned two years ago.
When the society first began, few, if any, of the members would have foreseen Community Services growing to the size it is now.

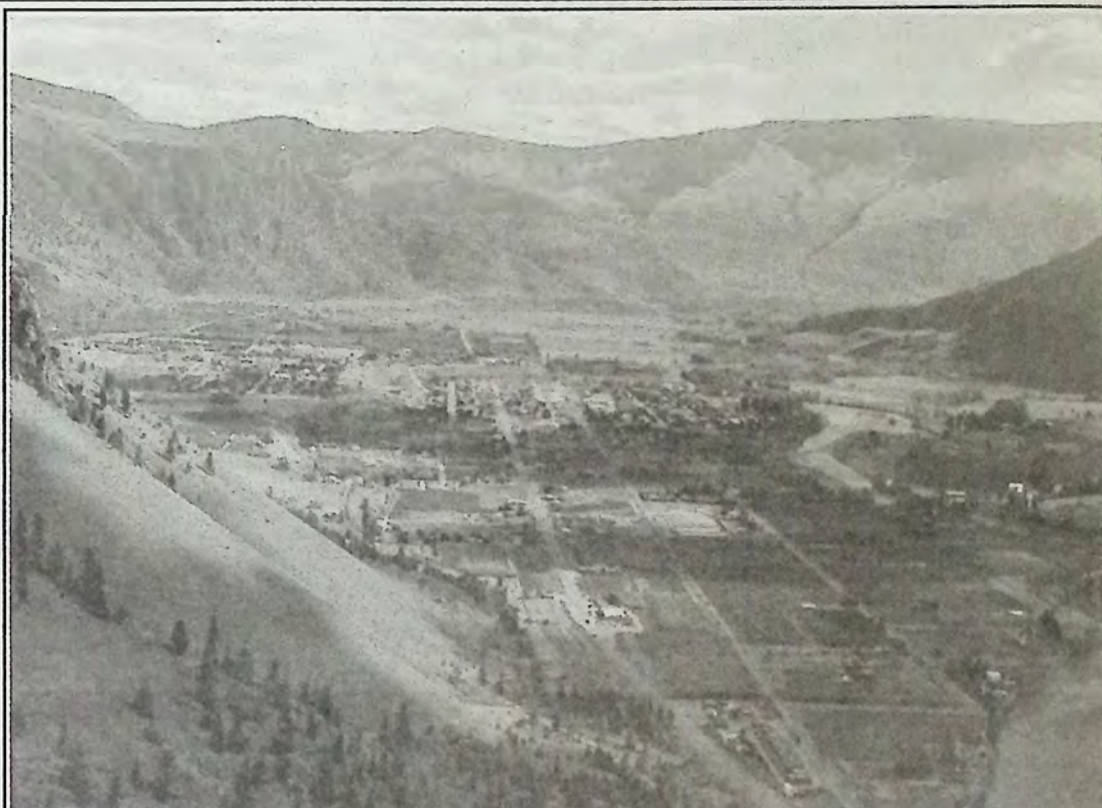

RDOS offers burning alternative

It's that time of year again when growers decide what stays and what goes. For many tree fruit and grape growers, burning has been the easiest way to dispose of unwanted trees and vines.

"There are other options available," says Janice Johnson, RDOS Air Quality Coordinator.

"Fruit tree or grape growers may be eligible for the RDOS Wood Waste Disposal/Chipping Program. Growers should contact the RDOS before removing trees to discuss the various disposal options."

This program was created to decrease burning of orchard wood waste, thus decreasing the amount of smoke particulate that enters

our air. It has been scientifically proven that these fine particulates found in wood smoke are harmful to human health.

Even more harmful is the smoke produced from burning of non-wood materials. Growers are reminded to remove orchard or vineyard infrastructure materials before pulling trees or vines and to dispose of these materials safely. Wire, irrigation tubing or pipe, and treated posts are illegal to burn because they release toxic chemicals into the air we breathe, and eventually make their way onto the surfaces of plants, our soil and into our water.

Growers wanting to learn more on Best Practices for fruit or grape

removal can pick up the entertaining video and colourful guide Agriculture Waste Disposal and Minimizing Smoke Pollution at the RDOS office located at 101 Martin Street, Penticton and at most local packing houses.

For more information on disposing of tree or grape infrastructure materials and or on the tree or grape wood waste disposal/chipping program contact RDOS Air Quality at (250) 490-4212 or toll free at 1-877-610-3737 extension 4212.

Tree fruit or grape growers who want to remove fruit trees or grapevines may be eligible for funding under the Tree Fruit and Grape Removal Program. This funding program helps cover the costs of removal and disposal and is a separate program from the Tree Fruit Replant Funding Program.

Growers do not need to be replanting fruit trees or ground crop but must sign off that the land will remain for agricultural use. There are other eligibility requirements, such as growers must have a minimum of 2.47 acres in production. If eligible, the funding amount works out to a payment of \$4,000 per hectare or \$1,618 per acre. Funding is limited.

Bedard attends national karate tournament

This past Thanksgiving long weekend Paul Bedard, Sensei of Princeton's Similkameen Shotokan Karate Club, attended the annual Canadian Nationals Tournament.

The tournament was held in Calgary, Alberta and was hosted by Sensei David Jones 7th dan and the Alberta International Shotokan Karate Federation (ISKF). This event was held in downtown Calgary at the Westin Hotel - a wonderful venue for such a large event.

There were participants from all across Canada, about 200 in all. Add in the officials, coaches, parents, support staff and spectators and there was a high degree of excitement in the air!

Friday evening began with a judges clinic and examination for new and upgrading judges. Judge classes include: D, C, B, A with A being the highest level. The practical evaluation was on Saturday afternoon, during the junior (under 18) and the senior (over 45) tournament.

Princeton's Paul Bedard successfully completed all requirements and is now a nationals level Judge (D class). Also on Friday evening, dan examinations were held with David Takishida of Port Moody receiving his 5th dan. Sensei Takishida first came to Princeton in May 1986. He

has been very helpful in the development of Sensei Bedard and Similkameen Shotokan.

Saturday morning an instructors class was held led by Master Teruyuki Okazaki 10th dan. This session of course was attended by instructors from all across Canada and ensures that all the ISKF are teaching at a similar level. The ISKF is over 40 countries strong and that is a lot of karateka doing the same thing! In addition to the instructor training, there was a black belt class led by Master Yutaka Yaguchi 9th dan and a brown belt session led by Sensei Frank Woon-A-Tai 8th dan, head of ISKF Canada.

Saturday evening there was a banquet with the head table where all the highest ranking officials were seated announced the successful karateka of the judge and dan examinations. At the head table was a very impressive representation of who's who in the ISKF.

Sunday morning the eliminations were held and in the afternoon were the finals. The excitement and adrenaline was quite evident as each provincial team was doing their best to leave their mark. In the end the BC Team came in third overall with Alberta and Quebec coming in First and Second respectfully. This put

our team ahead of Manitoba, Ontario, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia.

By the time that the tournament ended, BC came home with numerous First, Second and Third place medals in both kata (forms) and kumite (fighting). This achievement is due much to the credit of Sensei Joe Dixon 6th dan the technical director for BC and Sensei Marc Williams 4th dan the coach for the BC Team. Along with the regular training at the participants home dojos, the provincial team participated in numerous special sessions for this event.

This just shows the dedication involved, by both the leadership and the karateka. The results are the medals and positive experience that was gained.

Even though Calgary had record cold and snowfall for Thanksgiving weekend, we all came home with quite a warm feeling!

The purpose of the proposed Pest Management Plan (PMP) is to manage vegetation, including noxious weeds and invasive plants, within facilities, which include generation facilities, switching stations, substations, buildings, structures, tower compounds, access roads and pole yards within the FortisBC service area. The FortisBC service area is located in proximity to the communities of Creston, Crawford Bay, Kaslo, Slocan, South Slocan, Nelson, Castlegar, Salmo, Trail, Fruitvale, Grand Forks, Greenwood, and Midway, in the Okanagan Valley from Osoyoos to Kelowna, and in the Similkameen Valley from Princeton to Keremeos.

The pest management methods proposed for use include physical (non-chemical) treatment methods (selective slashing, girdling, hand pulling, weed trimming, mowing, pruning, geotextiles and stump removal), the release of biological control agents (insects), cultural control methods (grass seeding), and the use of pesticides (herbicides). The common name (and examples of trade names) of the pesticides proposed for use under this plan include: chloresulfuron (Telar), clopyralid (Transline), dicamba (Vanquish), diuron (Karmex), glyphosate ((Roundup, Roundup Weathermax, Glyphos, Vantage, Vantage Plus), hexazinone (Velpar), imazapyr (Arsenal), picloram (Tordon 22K), simazine (Simadex, Princep) and triclopyr (Garlon 4 or Garlon Ultra). Application methods include: foliar, soil, wick/wipe-on and cut surface, using backpack, wick/wipe-on applicator, squirt bottle, injection tools and handgun (power hose and nozzle).

The proposed duration of the PMP is from January 2, 2010 to January 1, 2015.

Health / Lifestyle News**Top 10 germiest objects to avoid**

(NC)—Keeping our immune system strong is vital in the fight against flu germs this winter—and so is pinpointing the most likely places those little pathogens hang out.

While many health professionals are reminding us to wash our hands more thoroughly and frequently—and to support your hard working immune system with supplements like Cold-FX—still other researchers are sounding the alarm bell about detrimental behaviour that may not occur to us. For example, here are some everyday situations to avoid:

1. Soap Dispensers:

Most public containers are rarely cleaned and dirty hands cause bacteria to grow exponentially as soap scum builds. Be sure to scrub hands vigorously for at least 20 seconds.

2. Buttons:

Tiny, but readily offensive on elevators, phones, vending and bank machines. Disinfect your hands

immediately after use.

3. Water Fountains:

Since sick people are told to drink lots of water, a public fountain is often a germ depot. Research has shown that a spigot can carry twice as much bacteria as a toilet seat. Instead, take your own water with you.

4. Shopping Carts:

Ready potential to cross contaminate between the hands, face and food. E. coli bacterium is common, so wipe cart and hands with a sanitizer.

5. Restaurant Menu:

Germs can survive on a hard surface for 18 hours and menus are rarely cleaned. Keep them away from your plate and flatware and wash your hands once you've ordered.

6. Ketchup:

Since many people don't wash their hands before eating, the condiment bottles can be crawling with

germs. Do the job the eaterie should be doing and wipe them down with a sanitizer before use.

7. Purses & Wallets:

In public places, especially restrooms, place your purse on a chair or hook, not the floor. Paper money especially carries germs so wash your hands or sanitize after a purchase.

8. Phones:

Due to saliva, the mouthpiece is usually dirtier than the handle. If using any phone but your own, clean it first.

9. Remote Controls:

Did you know that a TV remote control is often the dirtiest object in a hotel room? Disinfect it at home and certainly when you travel.

10. Laundry Machines:

To kill germs effectively, especially in underwear, use very hot water and dry for a full 45 minutes. Without this, wet clothes can leave germs all over your hands.

Living Past 100**Cold Sores Come With Cold: Fight Them**

Cold sores are a nasty skin infection that often accompany colds, fevers and all sorts of infections. Exposure to sun and wind can often trigger an outbreak, and so can stress, menstruation, and a depressed immune system. Some people who frequently suffer from cold sores may have an underactive thyroid. These people should have their thyroid checked.

Cold sores are very contagious. They are caused by a virus called herpes simplex I. Cold sores occur three to ten days after contact with the virus.

The first sign of a cold sore is a small bump with localized tenderness. The bump turns into a blister, accompanied by more soreness. The sore may progress to oozing pus.

Because cold sores are so contagious, behave as if you have leprosy. Do not share cooking utensils and dishes with others. Wash them separately, rinse with boiling water, and let them air dry. The same applies to linens: do not let family or room mates use the same towels, face cloths, and bedding while there are open sores. Anyone with a cold sore should not kiss anyone else, nor should the person touch the cold sore without a thorough handwashing afterward.

Getting rid of cold sores requires medication. There are medications available and these should be used as soon as possible after a cold sore appears.

There are foods you can eat to prevent cold sores. The first is pork. Pork contains high levels of an amino acid called lysine, and lysine is in cold sore medications.

Acidophilus is excellent for preventing the herpes virus from invading the rest of your body. If you can tolerate dairy products, eat a high quality yogurt frequently if you are prone to cold sores.

You may think these are a lot of dire warnings about cold sores, but there is more to herpes simplex I than mere cold sores. This virus can cause encephalitis, a brain infection, as well as inflammation of the cornea of the eye.

These infections are very dangerous, far more dangerous than the cold sore, but the presence of the cold sore indicates the virus is invading. Don't let it make progress.

Although you may relate genital herpes to all forms of herpes, the virus causing genital herpes is not the same strain as the herpes virus that causes cold sores.

Another strain of the herpes virus is Herpes Zoster, the virus that causes chicken pox and shingles. It affects the nerve endings in the skin and is extremely painful.

In all cases, L-Lysine is very beneficial, along with Vitamin B complex, Vitamin A, C, D, and E.

Remember: prevention is always better than the cure (there is no cure for genital herpes to date). Whatever type of herpes you may get, even if it is just a cold sore, see a physician and practice top-notch personal hygiene to prevent it spreading.

Committee finalizes mission statement

The Sustainable Similkameen Project Committee held two panel meetings over the weekend in Keremeos.

The first was a short evening session October 23rd where members representing various segments of the population of the Similkameen Valley attempted to fine tune their original Mission Statement.

The day long session on October 24th brought the committee together to finalize the Mission Statement and define the Mission Objectives.

Dr. Laurence A. G. Moss and Dr. Romella Glorioso facilitate the project, funded by Similkameen Valley Planning Society.

The Mission Statement is: "To establish a socio-cultural, economic and environmental sustainability strategy for the Similkameen Valley that will maintain and enhance the quality of our rural and small town lifestyle."

The Mission Objectives are:

- 1) To celebrate the socio-cultural and biophysical diversity of our Similkameen Valley.
- 2) To protect our Similkameen Valley's water, land and air quality and biodiversity.
- 3) To promote a diverse economy with multiple opportunities.
- 4) To maintain a physically, culturally and spiritually healthy Similkameen Valley.
- 5) To propose a means to implement, monitor and evaluate the strategy.
- 6) To increase the participation of Similkameen Valley residents in achieving the mission.

Once the Mission Statement and Mission Objectives were finally agreed upon by all members as being complete the rest of the ses-

sion was used to further define Key Decision Factors that could have an impact on the Mission Statement and what socio-cultural, economic, political, technological and environmental impacts each KDF could face.

The resulting list was grouped together in common clusters to be analyzed by both Moss and Glorioso.

"The process appears to be long and involved," says Similkameen News Leader Owner/Publisher George Elliott who sits on the Committee.

"But by the time we took a break for lunch we had actually covered a lot of ground and made some key decisions."

What does the group plan to achieve?

"I think we all want to protect those things we value and it appears that regardless of whether you live in Coalmont, Princeton, Hedley, Keremeos or Cawston, there's a lot of things we have in common with each other and we basically want to ensure those things are still intact many years from now," Elliott says.

The final report from the Sustainable Similkameen Project will not be published until 2010 as the committee will continue to meet monthly to further define goals with hopes of all governing bodies in the Similkameen Valley adopting the Mission Statement and Objectives.

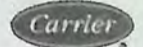

The Green Corner

How to tour your home to make it green

Early History of Princeton Airport

At the end of September, 1938, the Similkameen Star was telling that the Town's grass airfield had been extended by an additional 400 feet during the previous summer months and that the field was now 3,000 feet by 400 feet.

It reported that "The runway is ideally located with respect to approach and weather, in the opinion of experts, who regard it as a remarkable location in a mountainous area. It gives a 24 hour service, with radio beacon, radio contact, and meteorological reports. A staff of four operators is employed, with Mr P. Eldredge in charge."

The story really began nearly twenty years before. It is said that the first plane to land in Princeton

was during the course of 1914, but it is known for certain that on June 30th 1919 that a plane en-route to Penticton had to make a forced landing on Vermilion Avenue, just in front of Princeton School. Subsequently, private planes used range land at Five Mile for take-off and landing.

With the aid of the Federal Air Program, flat ground to the North West of Princeton which had been previously owned by the Princeton Athletic Association was earmarked as the site for a new Princeton Airport.

Work commenced during November 1932. With the 1930's depression in full flow the project was linked to the relief work pro-

gramme and appropriate facilities were constructed to house the workers, remnants of which can be seen to this day. The new airport was officially opened on June 1st 1933.

After the 1938 improvements were complete, the headline in the Similkameen Star read "Princeton's Airport Amongst the Finest in the Dominion" and it went on to say "While there is no saying what the future holds, local facilities are now up to the international standard of air travel."

On October 1st, 1938, the regular trans-Canada air mail service was born. Planes would leave Vancouver nightly at 7:00 PM and continued on Page 26

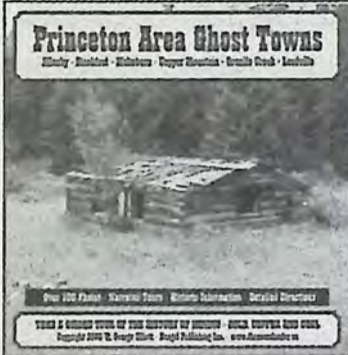

Princeton responded at 17:04 (Ben Morgan from Spencer Kristensen and Dayton Shaw) and Revelstoke replied with four more goals.

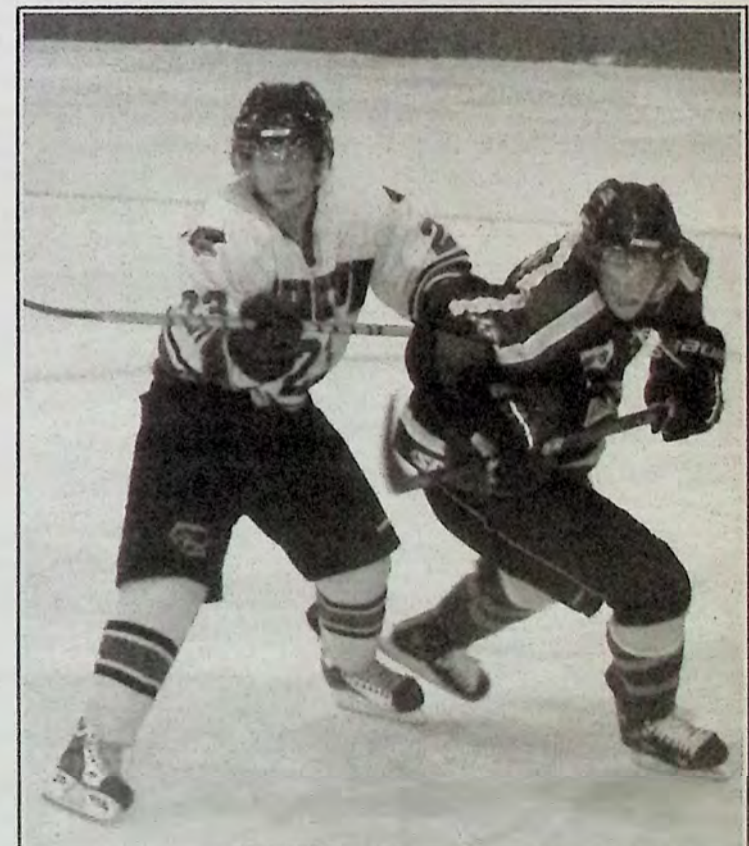
After the second period Robillard commented on the play with, "Obviously emotions are high. We're getting lit up here and we want this to be a battle. We want this to be a good game and we're

Cornbread and Andouille Dressing

(NC)—Spice up traditional turkey entrees with this unique Southern-inspired dressing. Sweet onion, green pepper, celery and jalapeno peppers bring the flavours of the South to your very own Thanksgiving table.

- 3 tbsp vegetable oil 45 mL
- 1 lb andouille sausage*, diced 500 g
- 1-1/2 cups chopped Southern U.S. sweet onion 375 mL
- 1/2 cup thinly sliced Southern U.S. celery 125 mL
- 1/2 cup diced Southern U.S. green pepper 125 mL
- 4 tbsp minced, seeded Southern U.S. jalapeño pepper 60 mL
- 8 cups crumbled cornbread 2 L
- 1/2 cup chicken stock or water 125 mL
- Salt and pepper to taste

In large skillet over medium heat, heat oil. Add sausage and cook, stirring, until sausage is crisp, approximately 5 minutes. Add onion, celery, green pepper and jalapeño. Cook, stirring until tender, approximately 5 minutes. Add cornbread and stir to combine. Add stock or water by the tablespoonful until mixture is well-moistened but not soggy. Cook, stirring, for 3 more minutes. Season to taste with salt and pepper and serve immediately.

Makes roughly 16 cups.

* If Andouille is not available at your grocery store, chorizo can be substituted.

Blame it on Free Trade

This weekend we change our clocks again as we say goodbye to Pacific Daylight Time and slide into Pacific Standard Time.

It means that at 2:00 AM Sunday morning (or Saturday night, depending on your particular point of view) I will officially gain an hour of sleep.

Sure, you may argue that I'll lose it in spring when we move the clocks forward an hour but I don't buy that. This weekend I'm going to gain an hour of sleep and I know it's going to make me cranky for the rest of the week.

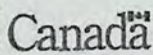

Are We Being Stupid?



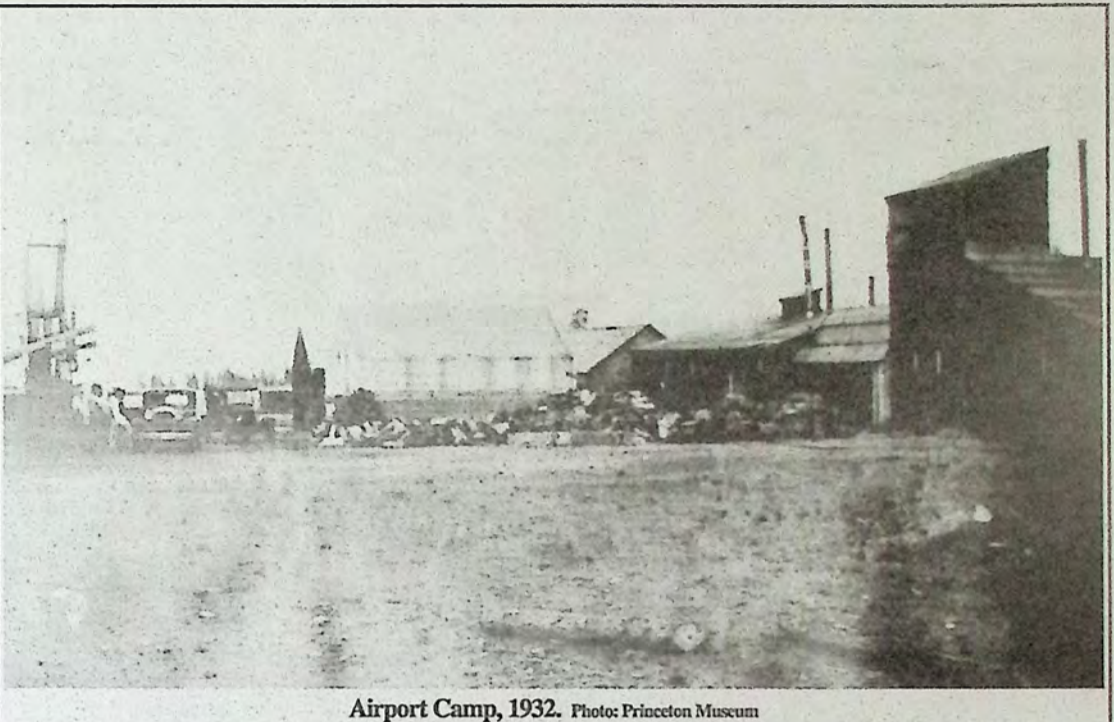

 Winnipeg at 2:00 AM, with a connection at Lethbridge for mail making its way North via Edmonton. The equipment installed at the Princeton Airfield was an important part of this network, but the hopes that the Princeton investment would directly benefit commercial air traffic to the Town were to prove a false dawn.

The time clock is now forwarded to November, 1968, when Dolphin Air Services Ltd. made an unsuccessful application to operate an unscheduled airline service between Princeton, Chilliwack and Vancouver. The initial plan was for three flights weekly, returning the same day, with additional services as required. The actual cost of the flight to Vancouver was expected to be \$25 one way.

In 1975, and again in 1977, Tradewinds Aviation Ltd. sought the Village Council's support to establish an airline service between Princeton, Merritt and Vancouver. That proposal was for a four times a week return service.

In 1978, then Forestry Minister, MLA Tom Waterland, came to Princeton to meet with the Chamber of Commerce, in his words, "To play the Devil's advocate" in the plans to pave the Airport's runway. Chamber of Commerce Vice President, Neil McHaffie asked, "The problem with the Airport is the question of whether the runway isn't paved

because it isn't used enough or whether it isn't used enough because it isn't paved?"

The Minister replied by saying that one of Princeton's biggest problems was its close proximity to Penticton and Vancouver.

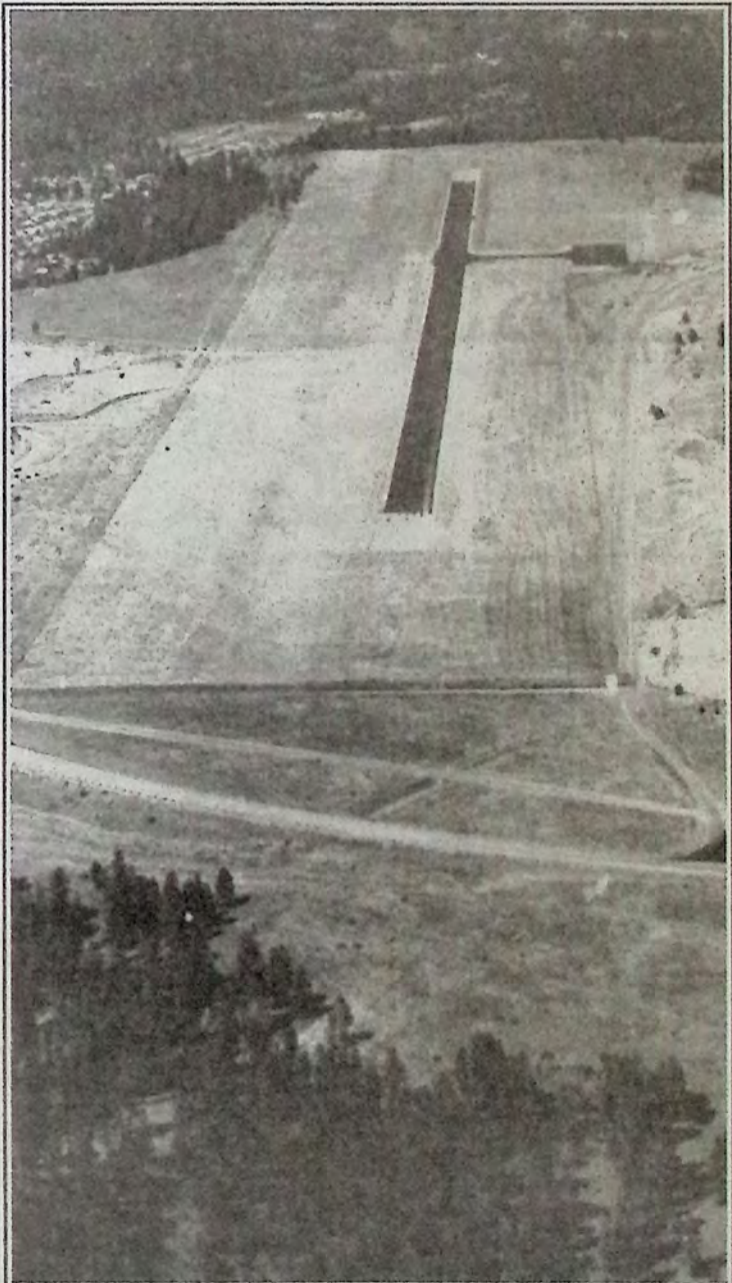
"People who are going to come to Princeton are going to come anyway, the Airport is just a convenience." He added, "The best way to encourage flying is to downgrade the highway!"

Despite the Minister's discouraging remarks, the Council and Chamber stuck to their beliefs. At a 1979 Council meeting, the Mayor

estimated the cost of the 4,000 x 75 feet runway would be in excess of \$200,000.

Later that year the Provincial Air Transport Program approved a grant of \$210,000 to the project.

On September 9th, 1979, the first jet to land at Princeton Airport, a BC Government Citation, brought the same Minister to open the new paved runway along with Princeton Mayor Dave Brown, whose dedication to the project, along with a small band of fellow believers, headed by Rollo Cecccon, had ensured the future of Princeton Airport.

Auxiliary donates \$25,000 to SOSMF

The Princeton Hospital Auxiliary Society presented the South Okanagan Similkameen Medical Foundation with a cheque for \$25,000 to be used for the purchase of the new CT Scanner at Penticton Regional Hospital.

Christina Scarisbrick, Auxiliary President explained that the new Scanner replacing the aging and obsolete scanner currently in use at PRH will be a welcome addition to the current medical equipment. It will reduce waiting times, produce better results, and benefit everyone with medical needs in our community. Christina would like to thank the Princeton area residents for their generous support of the Hospital Auxiliary Store to help make this possible.

A bit of background about the campaign is that in June, the South Okanagan Similkameen Medical Foundation launched the largest equipment campaign in our history, to replace the aging CT Scanner at Penticton Regional Hospital (PRH).

The current scanner serves nearly 90,000 residents from Summerland south to Penticton, Oliver and Osoyoos and over to Keremeos and Princeton. In 2008, 11,063 diagnostic scans were performed at PRH.

CT Scanning is extremely critical for diagnostic examinations of the head, neck, chest, abdomen and bones and with staging cancers such as lung, liver, prostate, colon and pancreatic. The new technology available will deliver a minimum of 40% less radiation.

The current machine has been a "work horse" doing up to 50 scans per day, seven days per week. However, the time has come to

replace it with newer and better technology, which has the capability of doing advanced Lung analysis, CT Colonography and CT Angiography instead of an invasive Angiogram. Head scans that currently take 5 minutes today will take 45 seconds in the future and will allow manipulations of images and instantaneously zero in on any area no matter how large or small.

Janice Perrino, Executive Director explained that, "the cost of the machine is \$1.5 million dollars over and above government funding. With the help of the Princeton Hospital Auxiliary Society the total raised to date is just over \$1.2 million. All of the funds must be raised before we can order the machine. Our hope is to raise all of the funds by February, 2010 and have the machine operational by May 1, 2010."

On behalf of the board of directors, staff at Penticton Regional Hospital and especially the patients thank you to all of the members of the Princeton Hospital Auxiliary Society for their dedication and

thoughtfulness. Their support of this project will directly benefit the citizens of Princeton.

In addition to the \$25,000 donation to SOSMF the Princeton Hospital Auxiliary approved donations at their October monthly meeting in the amount of \$10,000 to Ridgewood Lodge for new window coverings; and \$600 to Public Health for a baby measuring board and baby weight scale bag.

Other donations made this year include:

- \$6,000 for two Broda Tilt Recliners for Ridgewood Lodge
- \$15,000 for three pressure relief mattress surfaces for Ridgewood Lodge
- \$1,000 to The Anchorage for a much needed new washer and dryer
- \$10,000 to SOSMF toward equipment purchases for Penticton Hospital Pediatrics ward
- Over \$20,000 to Princeton General Hospital for a new ECG making the total donated so far this year by Princeton Hospital Auxiliary \$87,600.
